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Acceptable Content

Color guard activities at chapter, state, and National level are what should be submitted. These include activities where color guard units participate: parades, Grave markings, Flag retirements, posting/retiring colors at meetings, presentation of color guard medals (Bronze, Silver, Von Steuben, Gold, Molly Pitcher, etc). This includes the National Color Guard events as listed in this magazine.

All images submitted must show color guard participation in some way. Submissions without guardsmen present will not be included. The editor requests that along with each submission, there is also a brief description of the event.

Events that do not include the color guard should be submitted to the SAR Magazine instead of the SAR Colorguardsman.

<u>Celebrating the 250th Safely</u>

Greetings, NSSAR Color Guardsmen.

This is to follow up on the SAR 250th Event Planning Guide that was sent out on March 19th, 2025. Some good ideas and information were provided with the "Planning Guidelines for 250th Ceremony", but it was not coordinated with the NSSAR Color Guard Committee and I'm offering some observations for your consideration and future planning of Color Guard activities in support of 250th Anniversary events.

Under Preparations: There is no mention of a risk assessment or insurance for an event. If there is a firing event, is the color guardsman qualified and does the chapter/state have insurance? Has a safety survey been conducted of the proposed event site for obstacles or trip hazards both indoors and outdoors? Are there heat or weather conditions that require attention? It was mentioned in the Planning Guidelines about providing for emergency operations, please add who should be called at <u>State and National</u> should there be an accident or incident at an event.

Under Conduct (agenda) of a Ceremony, item #4 Pledge of Allegiance. Nothing forbids the Star-Spangled Banner (National Anthem) being played or sung and then having the Pledge of Allegiance in the same ceremony. Doing the National Anthem first is providing Honors to the Flag. For Item #10 Presentation of suitable song or music, my personal recommendation is "God Bless America". Our Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution Color Guard Adjutant sings this at all our Grave Marking events (provides credit for providing music) and other Color Guard functions. This was most recently done at VASSAR's Patrick Henry event on March 16th and followed by a VASSAR 250th event March 23rd also at St. John's Church in Richmond, VA where a VASSAR member sang God Bless America. The Virginia Governor and Ken Burns were both present at the second Patrick Henry event.

For the Color Guard and based on the event conditions, whether indoors or outdoors and limitations due to obstacles or space, consider these options for the display of flags in the ceremony:

- Pre-posted
- Paraded, but not posted
- Paraded, posted, and left in place
- Paraded, posted, and retrieved



For item #11 Musket Salute (fire 3 times); for firing at events, again insured and trained color guardsmen only. No firing in parades. While musket salutes have been done with three volleys at grave markings, this is the tradition for funerals. It's evolved by tradition, that many assume this is required. An option is the feu de joie (fire of joy). This did occur on May 6th, 1778, with General George Washington celebrating at Valley Forge the new alliance with France. The whole army deployed in line and discharged their muskets in succession down the ranks. The firing begins and spreads from right to left as each soldier fires. This means firing once, requires practice, but impressive. I have done this at Mount Vernon and have started training VASSAR Color Guardsmen to try this at events. Worth consideration, ensure practicing this and the safety space and firing zone for events.

At the beginning of every event indoors or outdoors, inspect all firelocks and cartridges to be fired. At the end of the firing, work with the program emcee and allow for the musket squad to secure and search their firelocks before facing the public. A short narrative can be read to the audience about what the color guardsmen are doing having fired black powder and they are doing a safety check and clearance. Goes a long way.

Stay safe and have fun!

<u>National Color Guard Quartermasters - The Unsung</u> <u>Heroes Behind the Scenes</u>

Did you ever wonder how all the flags and stands make it to Leadership, Congress, and most recently the Battle of Concord? The answer lies with the National Color Guard Quartermasters. Usually based out of Kentucky, the Quartermasters ensure that the National Color Guard Inventory is well maintained.

The Quartermasters have a range of crucial duties, including:

- Inspecting and inventorying all equipment before and after each Leadership meeting and Congress
- Transporting equipment to and from the Leadership hotel in Louisville
- Preparing equipment for shipping to Congress
- Purchasing new flags when newer versions of older state flags are adopted
- Making sure the Drum Major's drum is delivered to Congress and Leadership meetings

One of their primary tasks is to maintain an inventory of all flags and stands. They ensure that everything is in perfect condition by inspecting the equipment before and after major events. This meticulous diligence guarantees that the National Color Guard's presentations are flawless.

The Quartermasters are also responsible for the transportation of equipment. They move the flags and stands to and from the hotel in Louisville, ensuring that everything arrives on time and in good condition. This logistical coordination is essential for the smooth operation of events.

As states adopt newer versions of their flags, the Quartermasters purchase and replace the outdated



ones. Over the past few years, they have replaced flags for Mississippi, Minnesota, and Utah. Moreover, they always have two state flags at headquarters, ready to replace the first one in case something happens.

The National Color Guard Quartermasters play a vital role in the success of Leadership meetings, Congress, and other significant events. Their dedication to maintaining and transporting the National Color Guard Inventory ensures that these events run smoothly. Without their tireless efforts, the Color Guard at these events would not be possible.

<u>Music in the American</u> <u>Revolution (Yankee Doodle)</u>

This article will cover what is considered the most iconic tune from the American Revolution, Yankee Doodle. Today Yankee Doodle is considered a patriotic air for children as that is when most of us learned this song. (To be honest it is probably the only song from the American Revolution that most Americans know.) While its whimsical and apparently silly lyrics appeal to children of today, back in the American Revolution the lyrics delivered a more serious political and cultural message.

The tune for Yankee Doodle dates back well before the American Revolution and even the French & amp; Indian War. The exact date for the origin of the tune is unknown, but some believe it to be from the 15 th century. The tune was well known across much of Europe with a wide variety of lyrics applied. There are at least 190 different verses currently associated with the tune.

In the context of the American Colonies, the first known usage of the tune was by British Officers to mock the "uncouth" and "disorganized" colonists (Yankees) with whom they served during the French & Indian War. The title and lyrics used by the British were written around 1755 and are attributed to British Army surgeon Richard Shuckburgh.

These lyrics were meant as insults which in today's vernacular we do not recognize. The main implication of these lyrics was that the American colonists were rude towards the British and cowards in warfare.

Although the lyrics originated during the French and Indian War, they remained popular with the British for many years. When the British arrived to occupy Boston in 1768, the British musicians played the song to taunt the American colonists as they marched down the streets. Early in the American Revolution the British and Loyalists frequently played the song to ridicule the Continental soldiers, but the Americans soon adopted it as their own and played it proudly. The lyrics commonly employed by the British in 1775 describe the visit of a colonial farmer and his son to a military encampment. The lyrics, written from the viewpoint of the son, portray the two visitors as being country bumpkins completely ignorant of the military and life in camp. In the course of the song's narrative, the farmer and his son mistake a drum for a barrel with leather heads (which is knocked upon with little clubs) and, in some versions, interpret a cavalry charge as being a horse race. In addition, reference is made to "Captain Washington", an obvious slight to General Washington, as being vain in his manner and dress. At the end of these lyrics the son is frightened, runs home, and hides in his mother's room.



Another insult towards the Americans is provided in the phrase "Yankee doodle dandy". At the time the word "doodle" meant fool or simpleton, while a "dandy" was a man who placed an inappropriate amount of time and attention to his appearance in order to impersonate someone of wealth and social standing. Therefore, "Yankee doodle dandy" was stereotyping the American colonists as emasculated fools.

The lyrics applied to the tune were fairly fluid on both sides during the war. During the war the Americans substituted lyrics that mocked the British and praised General George Washington. Eventually the song was transformed into a very anti-British message of .defiance as the "uncouth and disorganized" colonists turned

the tide of the war. By 1781 Yankee Doodle had become a favorite patriotic song for the colonists

An eyewitness of the British surrender at Yorktown wrote that General Lafayette ordered the American musicians to play Yankee Doodle as the British troops marched past. According to this account of the surrender, as the British marched past they turned their heads towards the French troops and refused to acknowledge the presence of the Americans. Angry at this disrespectful act, Lafayette had his fifers and drummers strike up Yankee Doodle which caused the British troops to turn towards the Americans. After the surrender, the Americans then added the following verse as a taunt to the British:

Cornwallis led a country dance The like was never seen, sir Much retrograde and much advance And all with General Greene, sir.

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did not appear in print until 1842 when it was published in the book, "The Nursery Rhymes of England". No earlier reference to these lyrics is known.

Even at this late date after the war, it appears there was still some British animosity towards Americans. The lines "stuck a feather in his cap, and called it macaroni" comes across today as a somewhat bizarre and silly line. However, at the time, the meaning was well understood. The term "macaroni" referred to a style of high fashion popular in 18th century Italy and across Europe. Macaroni fashion involved wearing brightly colored and flamboyant clothing as well as ornate ribbons, extravagant wigs, and makeup – even by men. Therefore, this verse implied that the Americans were simpletons who believed the addition of a single feather to their hats would transform their common appearance into a state of high fashion.

Since the American Revolution, numerous sets of lyrics have been set to this tune. Some of these lyrics have been purely for entertainment while others have expressed serious political views. Despite its ever-changing lyrics, the lively and endearing nature of the tune ensures it will be around for quite some time to come.

A local event celebrating Memorial Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day may be counted as a National Color Guard event for the purposes of applying for a Color Guard Medal. Only a single event on each day may be counted. Multiple events on the same day cannot be counted multiple times. If the event is on a weekend nearest the actual holiday, that can be counted with respect to the single event limitation. For example, if a Veterans Day Parade occurs on a Saturday such as the 8th, then an event on the 11th does not count. Since 2020 Spring Leadership, a policy was adopted by both the National Color Guard and National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committees formally establishing that only the National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committee may designate National Historic Events based on that committee's established criteria. The only exception being that established Color Guard policy of recognizing President General, or his designated SAR General Officer representative, attendance at an otherwise unrecognized event will make that actual event a National Event.

The afternoon sessions covered how to carry and post a flag, commands given to the color guard, dispositions of the color guard during a ceremony, giving of honors, saluting, wreath presentations, and flag folding. Particular attention was given to maneuvers in accordance with the 1764 Manual of Arms. A fifer and drummer were added to the afternoon sessions to provide music for marching and also to practice fife & amp; drum calls and signals.

Everything learned in these training sessions will be applied numerous times in the coming months as the various chapters of the Kentucky Society have a full schedule of events in 2025.

National Medal of Honor Day falls on March 25 every year. In the year 2025, the Harry S. Truman Chapter, Missouri SAR Society, organized and hosted the 2nd annual MOH Ceremony held at the Harry S. Truman Presidential Library and Museum. Following placement of a wreath at the burial vaults of Harry S. and Bess Truman by State President Gene Henry and SC-VPG James Osborn, two Medal of Honor recipients were recognized for their valiant and courageous conduct: Ralph Puckett, U. S. Army, and James Stockdale, U. S. Navy. Their biography was shared by Chapter President Ivan Stull, and NSSAR Chaplain General John Vernon Welkner. The Truman High School JROTC dispatched cadets who proudly carried flags for the six service branches, and three young ladies from the school sang a beautifully harmonized Star Spangled banner. Approximately 30 color guard representing Nebraska, Kansas, and many chapters from Missouri carried forth colors in the opening procession. Six musket men fell in line for a triple volley to firing commands by the Missouri State Color Guard Commander. All participants delighted a crowd of perhaps 50 museum attendees and guests. Missouri DAR Alexander McNair Chapter invited the Ozark Mountain-Missouri SAR chapter's Color Guard to support a dedication ceremony held March 15, 2025. The **Taylor Graveyard** is in the middle of pastureland about 3 miles to the northeast of Mt. Vernon, Missouri, GPS 37.135911, -93.798930. Seven contemporary descendants attended the ceremony that achieved key objectives:

- revel in the outstanding job by the McNair Chapter in their year-long task to resurrect the cemetery from extreme over and undergrowth
- locate, repair, and clean buried and broken gravestones
- install a flat bronze marker for the patriot
- erect a historical marker that reveals the significance of the cemetery.



The historical presentation honored the early settlers, which included Revolutionary War patriot Thomas Hash (P-176969, A052346). His son Phillip, and daughter, and perhaps several other children and/or grandchildren are buried here. The gravestone of Patriot Thomas Hash's son, Philip Hash, was marked for the first time as a Patriot's Son. His history and participation in the War of 1812 was presented by MOSSAR Surgeon Norm Knowlton.

About twenty persons were buried in this yard. The property owner-cattle rancher, Brent Wilmoth, aided in the installation of new fence to protect the gravestones. Many stones were broken requiring epoxy repairs. SAR & DAR markers set there decades ago were found and reset. The condensed family history was presented explaining how the Hash and Taylor surnames intersect. Both have patriot connections to Montgomery County Virginia. Thomas (1756-1848), served in Capt. Enoch Osborn's company, at the very end of the war. In 1800 he removed to Kentucky, where his wife died in 1822. That same year he and son Phillip moved to the Sangamon Valley in central Illinois. Ten years later they both moved to Lawrence County Missouri.



Color Guard posted colors at the beginning of the ceremony, and later issued a double volley for the patriot and patriot's son Phillip. McNair Chapter Regent Maella Blalock and her chapter led the way with the national anthem, American's Creed, and prayers.

Kudo's for two area DAR chapters who over the past four or five years located, cleaned up, restored and commemorated two lost and forgotten private graveyards in Lawrence County, which have connections to patriots, early settlers, and their descendants.



On April 26, color guardsmen gathered on the shores of the Mississippi River to welcome the Marquis de Lafayette on his visit to the city. In 1825, the original Lafayette visited the city on his wildly popular tour of the United States. On April 29, 1825, Lafayette arrived by steamboat on the Missouri side of the river as he was greeted by crowds and cannon fire. He spent one night in the city and participated in parades, met with city dignitaries--including William Clark--and was the guest of honor at a ball held at the Mansion House Hotel.

The SAR Color Guard welcomed the present-day Lafayette with the same spirit that was present in 1825.

Virginia

On 22 March 2025, the Col James Wood II Chapter of the Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution conducted a grave marking ceremony to honor Revolutionary War Patriot Captain Jeremiah Smith. The ceremony was held at the Smith Family Cemetery, Gore, Virginia. Paul Christensen, President of the Chapter, emcee'd the event with a presentation of the colors by the Color Guard commanded by Dale Corey. Virginia Society 3rd Vice President Randy Atkins presented greetings for the State and a tribute to Smith was presented by Corey. Smith was born in New Jersey in 1711 and came to the Virginia Back Creek Country in the 1730's. He eventually settled on 806 acres of land in 1736 and assisted in surveying land with Col James Wood I. Eventually,



Smith's land holdings grew to exceed 1,000 acres. In 1742, he and another man were ordered by the Orange County Court to "view and lay" a road between a mill near what is now Winchester and what is now Capon Bridge, West Virginia. This road was the forerunner of U.S. 50. Smith built a home for his family along the road, situated on sloped land from which he could see any Indians coming from either Great North Mountain or Little Timber Ridge into Back Creek Valley. It remains standing today as the front portion of an existing farmhouse and is considered to be one the oldest houses in Frederick County.

In 1755, Braddock's defeat during the French and Indian War, left the British frontier undefended. The French were leading Indian raiding parties into the Virginia Frontier. A meeting was called of local militia captains. This did not provide a means to defend the settlers. Captain Smith raised a company of 20 men to provide the needed protection. In 1756, a party of about 50 Indians led by a French officer crossed the Allegheny Mountains to spread death and destruction. Captain Smith marched with his company to meet them at Capon River. After a fierce battle, the Indians were defeated and left the battlefield. The French officer was found to be carrying plans for attacking Fort Frederick, Maryland.

During the Revolutionary War, Smith provided material aid to the cause. He provided pasturage for horses, gave 1 1/2 bushels of corn and 100 pounds of hay for the Continental Army. He was married three times and fathered nine children. Captain Jeremiah Smith was one of the first settlers in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. He was a heroic frontiersman who helped tame the frontier wilderness of Old Frederick County. He was married three times and had 13 children. He fought with distinction during the French and Indian War and was a leader of economic development during times of peace and provided support to the cause during the Revolutionary. He died 25 March 1786 in Frederick County and is buried in the Family Cemetery.

After the unveiling of the marker by Deborah Corey and Anne Simmons, wreaths were presented and a musket volley fired to honor the patriot. On 15 March 2025, the Virginia Society Color Guard conducted a color guard workshop hosted by the Colonel William Grayson Chapter at Rippon Lodge, Woodbridge, Virginia. Rippon Lodge was built around 1747 between Neabsco Creek, the Potomac River and the King's Highway. Richard Blackburn and son Thomas



grew tobacco, wheat and other commodities. Located near the port town of Dumfries, the goods were shipped to England. Thomas served in the Revolutionary War as a militia member. One of his daughters married Bushrod Washington, George Washington's nephew.



The workshop consisted of working sessions and group instruction. When first assembled, the guardsmen went through musket safety check and then were given a safety briefing by Virginia State Safety Officer Mark Sink. We then broke out into four separate work stations. Brett Osborn, NSSAR Safety Officer/Virginia State Commander and Sink conducted a Musket Qualification Session with Barry Schwoerer instructing cartridge rolling and what goes in cartridge boxes. Dale Corey, Virginia State Adjutant conducted a session on flag etiquette with Virginia State Training Officer Ken Bonner providing drill and ceremonies with assistance from Andrew Mills.

25 guardsmen attended the workshop representing eight chapters from the Virginia Society. Chapters included Col Fielding Lewis, Col James Wood II, Col William Grayson, Fairfax Resolves, George Washington, Sgt Maj John Champe, Thomas Jefferson and Williamsburg. At the conclusion of the training, five Silver Color Guard Medals were presented by Commander Osborn and Adjutant Corey to guardsmen Gary Dunaway, John Hamilton, Gary Hodges, John Lynch and Allan Phillips. 
