Lecturing Credentials:

Scott has routinely presented programs for 2nd thru 12th grade students, home schooled, church groups, civic groups and lineage societies (Sons of the American Revolution, Daughters of the American Revolution, Children of the American Revolution, and Dutch Cousins). He is also a regular presenter for the Outreach Education at SAR HQ. He is Youth Protection Training Certified by the Sons of the American Revolution and Trail Life USA.

Presentation Requirements:

Typical requirement is an area large enough for the audience. Presentations can be given indoors or out. Special presentation requirements are listed below.

Colonial Surveying – large area (indoor or outdoor) where running a chain can be simulated.
The Star Spangled Banner, Its History and Meaning – a projector and screen are helpful but not required.
Fire Starting with Flint & Steel – outdoors only.
Writing with Quill Pens and Ink – area for writing where spilled ink will not be a concern.
Weaponry of the American Revolution – venue must allow flintlock firearms and edged weapons on site.
Battle Tactics – Old World versus New World – venue must allow flintlock and edged weapons on site.
The Great Wagon Road and the 1st Major American Migration – projector and screen are helpful for large audiences.

Audio-Visual Equipment:

For presentations listed above that require a projector, a projector and screen will be required.
Colonial Surveying – surveying equipment is provided as part of the presentation.
For the various flag presentations all the required flags are provided as part of the presentation.

Presentation Requirements:

6-8 ft. table for display of materials and a room which allows participants to see and participate in presentations with equipment, no restriction on group size. Can be indoor or outdoor, as the weather permits.

With prior written permission from the school Principal and SRO, Richard can bring Kentucky frontier-era weapons for display and discussion: sword, spontoon, Kentucky Long Rifle (non-projectile, black powder demonstration firing is also an option; outdoor only!)

Audio-Visual Equipment:

Projector and screen suitable for a laptop connection and power source for the historical presentations. Microphone/speaker system should be provided if desired.

Length of Program:

Minimum 30 minutes with Q & A

Appropriate Age Groups:

4th-12th grades, adults

Travel Range:

No greater than 60 miles from Lawrenceburg, KY

Fees:

No fees for schools, non-profits, veterans or civic groups. Donations to offset travel costs accepted.

Resources:

Richard has an extensive personal library of books on the revolutionary war and the colonial era. All presentations are thoroughly researched using primary and secondary sources. He has visited all the battlefields he lectures on and can provide the perspective of having stood the ground where the actual events occurred. All presentations conclude with a list of the research sources used.
