

Honoring a Patriot

Richmond Pearson was born in Virginia in 1751 and moved to North Carolina in the early 1770s. He settled in the Forks of the Yadkin River area of old Rowan County, around the present-day town of Cooleemee.

At the time of the War of Independence, the colonial militia met at Veach's Muster Ground near the present location of Liberty United Methodist Church.

This unit went for the Patriot Cause under Col. Pearson. The area was later named the Liberty District.

The "Boys from the Forks" fought at the Battle of Cowans Ford, where General William Lee Davidson fell. This local militia harassed British General Cornwallis as he crossed Renshaw's Ford, marching through what is now Davie County, in pursuit of General Nathanael Greene.

Richmond Pearson came to own thousands of acres of land and scores of slaves.

Patriot Richmond Peason died in 1819
and is buried in the family graveyard near Cooleemee, N.C.
