Compatriot Franklin Murphy died on February 24, at Palm Beach, Fla., following an operation. He was one of the first 200 members enrolled in the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. He became a member of the New Jersey Society November 24, 1891, and at once an active worker in the organization.

He was elected Secretary General at the Congress held in Chicago in 1893 and served continuously for five years, retiring at the Congress held in Morristown, N. J., in 1898, when he was elected a Vice-President General. At Detroit, in the following year, Compatriot Murphy was elected President General, turning over the office in 1900 to General J. C. Breckinridge. Three years later, in 1903, the State of New Jersey honored Compatriot Murphy by electing him its Governor, which position he held for three years. The last Congress he attended was at Newark, in 1916. His interest never waned and there were few more enthusiastic supporters of the aims and objects of the Society than Governor Murphy.

His long life of threescore and fourteen years was, from the adolescent period, visibly marked by praiseworthy acts for the advancement of the general interest of humankind. At the age of 18 years he entered the volunteer army in defense of the Flag, in 1862, and served two years and nine months in the Fighting Thirteenth New Jersey Volunteers. Successful as a manufacturer, he also gained much popularity for his extensive charity, his loyal friendship, pure patriotism, and as a believer in and defender of the Constitution.

At the funeral service held at his late home, Newark, February 27, Compatriot Louis Annin Ames, former President General, upon request of President General Chancellor L. Jenks, represented the National Society. President Carl M. Vail and a delegation of the New Jersey Society also attended.

The Utah Society advises of the death of Hon. Samuel Culver Park, ex-Vice-President General of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in 1915; President Utah Society, 1917; ex-Mayor of Salt Lake City; a member of our Society from March, 1909, who died at Salt Lake City, Utah, February 19, 1920.

Hon. John Milton Reifsnider, a member of the National Executive Committee and a Director General of the National Society, died at Baltimore, Md., on the morning of March 19, 1920. To his associates on the National Executive Committee and the National officers, as well as to his compatriots of the Maryland Society, his

death came as a powerful and sudden shock. Judge Reifsnider was a compatriot to whom all were deeply attached, a most lovable character, and one whose counsel and efforts will be greatly missed in the Society.

He had been in bad health for quite a long time, and death was caused by pleuro-pneumonia, which followed an operation for intestinal trouble.

The body was removed to his late home at Westminster, Md., where the funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon, March 21, at the Ascension Episcopal Church. The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution was represented by the attendance of Past Presidents General Louis Annin Ames and Elmer M. Wentworth, Vice-President General Thomas W. Williams and Secretary General Philip F. Larner. A large number of the compatriots of the Maryland State Society were also in attendance from Baltimore and elsewhere, accompanied by President Jas. Compatriot Durand was born January 10, 1847, at Colchester, Vermont; was a veteran of the War of the Rebellion, having enlisted and served in an Illinois regiment. He served in the Illinois National Guard as Assistant Inspector General and as a major in the First Illinois Infantry. In the Spanish-American War he organized a provisional regiment of infantry and as its colonel tendered its services to the United States. As a newspaper man, a business man, and a patriotic citizen, he was conspicuous for his sturdy Americanism and enthusiastic support of all patriotic work. He joined the Sons of the American Revolution October 24, 1893; State number, 264; National number, 1,404.

Believing, further, that the primary cause of most of the social unrest has been the lack of adequate control of immigration; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Kentucky Society, Sons of the American Revolution, urge upon its Representatives in Congress the necessity of providing such additional legislation as will put upon the immigrant the burden of proof to show that he will be a reasonably desirable addition to America, and to further provide means by which he may be promptly deported should his subsequent conduct indicate that he is undesirable.
