

ings have been held in various cities, especially on Washington's Birthday Anniversary, where the medals were presented to members entitled thereto, with appropriate ceremonies of a formal and most interesting character. About twelve hundred of these medals have been supplied by the Secretary General, a small number remaining on hand, some of which have already been ordered. It is believed that thus far about two-thirds of our members who served in the war have been presented with medals.

ACTIVITIES OF THE PRESIDENT GENERAL.

The following outline of the recent active work of the President General will be found of great interest by the Society:

January 17, Kentucky Society, at Louisville. There was a conference with the Board of Managers at a luncheon at the Pendermis Club, and in the evening there was a large banquet and reception at the same place. On this occasion Governor Morrow was welcomed into the Society and delivered a most eloquent address.

Monday, January 19, the Florida Society, at Pensacola. Following the dinner at the San Carlos Hotel, there was a meeting in the auditorium of the hotel, to which the general public was invited. The President General also spoke before the Rotary Club.

Thursday, January 22, the Louisiana Society, at New Orleans. Here many functions were given in honor of the President General, including banquets, luncheons, and a large public reception.

Saturday, January 24, he met members of the Texas Society at Houston and in Galveston, at the Hotel Galvez. Luncheon at the University Club.

Monday, January 26, Oklahoma Society, at Oklahoma City. There was a large banquet in the parlors of the First Presbyterian Church. He was also invited to speak before the Lion's Club.

Wednesday, January 28, he was the guest of the Arkansas Society, at Little Rock. At the banquet, which was followed by a large public reception, the President General was welcomed to the State by Governor Charles H. Brough, and to the city by Mayor Ben. D. Brickhouse. Addresses of welcome were also delivered by Miss Stella P. Hardy, Vice-President General of the D. A. R., and by Mrs. Louis Flickinger, Regent of Little Rock Chapter of D. A. R. The President General also spoke before the Lion's Club of Little Rock.

Friday, January 30, Springfield, Illinois, Chapter, S. A. R. The

affair was given under the auspices of the famous Mid-day Lunch-
eon Club and was very largely attended.

Monday, February 23, Pennsylvania Society, at Pittsburgh. The
annual business meeting was held at the William Penn Hotel, in
the afternoon, and a large banquet and reception in the evening.
Past President General Hancock and Vice-President General Houk
were present and spoke.

Tuesday, February 24, Ohio Society, at Columbus. There was a
luncheon at the Chittendon Hotel and a banquet and reception in
the evening, attended by many members of the D. A. R. Vice-
President General Houk was also present at the meeting.

Wednesday, February 25, Indiana Society, at Indianapolis. A
banquet was held in the Riley Room, at the Claypool Hotel. Hon.
Charles W. Jewett, Mayor of Indianapolis and the outgoing Presi-
dent of the Indiana Society, presided. Among other speakers was
Governor James P. Goodrich.

At each of the Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Indiana receptions serv-
ice medals were awarded to returned soldiers by Vice-President
General Houk. A pleasant feature of these three affairs was the
presence of George N. Wright, of Chicago, bearing cordial greet-
ings from the Illinois Society.

Friday, March 5, Oak Park Chapter, Oak Park, Illinois, in the
parlors of the First Congregational Church.

In addition to these meetings, the President General has ad-
dressed many posts of the American Legion and other organizations
in different parts of the country.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT GENERAL.

To my Compatriots:

I have had the unusual privilege of visiting thirty-five State
Societies and many Chapters of the Sons of the American Revolution
during the past year. In nearly every part of the country
there is activity and growth. An earnest desire to perform efficient
patriotic service is evident everywhere. The prestige of the or-
ganization is most gratifying and its ideals are such as to attract
to its membership the highest type of citizens.

I urgently ask the careful consideration by all Societies and
Chapters of the following suggestions:

Compatriots should accustom themselves to think of the nation-
wide scope of the organization, which is now promoting the cause
of patriotism in fifty Societies and one hundred and six Chapters.
Societies and Chapters should get away from a sense of isolation.
In the words of the hymn, "We are not divided, all one body we."
What our Order needs is nationalization.

Societies and Chapters should get into closer touch with the
National Society. There should be more correspondence between
State and Chapter officers and the National officers. The latter
invite the active co-operation of the membership everywhere in
promoting the best interests of the organization as a whole, and
of the different groups.

Frequent reports should be sent to the Secretary General, for
publication in the BULLETIN, of elections and of the activities of
the Societies and Chapters. There is great remissness in this
respect. The only purpose of the BULLETIN is to keep the field
advised of the progress of the organization. These reports should
be as full as possible. They are of great value, not only in sug-
gesting to others successful methods of expansion, but in arousing
a healthful spirit of emulation.

There should be fostered a warmer fellowship between neigh-
boring Societies. Reciprocal courtesies should be extended to officers
to attend and address annual and other meetings. It should be
one of our traditions that every visitor from another State is a
guest of honor.

Every State Society should send a good representation to our
annual Congresses. It is a great privilege to attend these con-
ventions of patriotic-minded citizens from all sections of the coun-
try. Delegates bring back to their Societies fresh inspiration.
Increased activity always follows our Congresses in those So-
cieties which are represented.

The button should be worn by compatriots as constantly as pos-
sible. It is a mark of honor. It identifies the bearer as a 100 per
cent American.

The conferring of the S. A. R. service medal has proved to be a
most popular and attractive feature of our meetings. The ceremony
should be made as impressive as possible, and the meetings should
be widely advertised. It has worked well in many cities, to use a
public hall or church for the occasion and to invite the public to be
present. This ceremony always gives the Societies the most credit-
able kind of publicity. The presence of a National officer, though
desirable, is not necessary.

In this connection let me suggest that we should use all proper
means to get the right kind of publicity for the organization.
Every time the name "Sons of the American Revolution" appears
in the newspapers, beneficial results follow. Let us not be too
modest. We have a most important message for the American
people. There is no better way to deliver that message than
through the public press.

No compatriot should regard himself as a legal American unless
he is actively engaged in some form of Americanization work.
"The harvest is plenty, but the laborers are few." Our country's
call for this service at this crucial time should fall upon our ears
with especial force. Sons of the American Revolution are recog-
nized as conservators of the American ideal. Much is expected of
us, and we must see to it that this expectation is not disappointed.
The American's Creed, by William Tyler Page, of the Maryland

Society, is thoroughly identified in the minds of the public with the Sons of the American Revolution. In order to make this impression permanent, we must redouble our activity in the distribution of this inspired and inspiring document.

The enthusiasm with which the country received the suggestion of the National Society that September 17 be set aside as a day for the commemoration of the signing of the Federal Constitution was one of the most inspiring incidents in the history of our organization. Last September over thirteen thousand meetings were held, more than half being under the direction of our compatriots. I urge all Societies and Chapters to become prominently identified with this important celebration, so that it may continue to be known as a Sons of the American Revolution affair. The Constitution is a crystallization of American ideals and its widespread study is the finest kind of Americanization.

May 1st next is to be observed as "American Day" in every part of the country. I trust that every Society and Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution will take an active part, either independently or in co-operation with other patriotic bodies, in the exercises of that day.

This is the psychological moment to add to our membership. The war has caused a nation-wide study of American principles, resulting in a better understanding of and a deeper love for the flag. The best men in every community are waiting for the word of invitation. Let this be the slogan in membership campaigns, "Membership in the Sons of the American Revolution opens up new avenues of service to our country." Especial effort should be made to get young men to join. There is a dearth of young men in the organization in all parts of the country.

The ranks of the American Legion offer a most attractive field of labor for our membership committees. Indeed, there is no greater service the Sons of the American Revolution can perform for America than to establish close and cordial relations with the American Legion. Every opportunity should be used to cultivate and deserve the confidence of this magnificent body of eager American youths.

I have become convinced of the great value of the Chapter system. It scatters over a State groups of compatriots who are more effective in securing a widely distributed membership than is possible from a single point, however central. It brings the Society in closer contact with the people through local meetings. It enables all members to attend gatherings and to participate in the activities of our organization. There is no better way to build up State Societies than by developing the Chapter system.

The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution occupies a high and unique position in America. Compatriots may well be proud of their membership. Let none of us forget the peculiar obligations which rest upon us of alertness, loyalty, and initiative.

THE THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL CONGRESS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY.

As heretofore reported in our BULLETIN, the Thirty-first Annual Congress of the National Society will be held in Hartford, Conn., and will convene on the morning of May 17, 1920. The Connecticut Society, having charge of the entertainment of the delegates to the Convention, reports that arrangements for the Congress, so far as completed in Hartford, are that the headquarters will be at the Center Church House, a building centrally located at the corner of Gold and Lewis Streets, where there is an attractive assembly hall, with galleries where ladies may sit if they feel inclined to listen to the proceedings. There is a large room contiguous to the assembly hall, which is suitable for registration purposes, with ample space for committee meetings. The delegates can register here on Sunday evening if they choose to do so.

On the evening of Sunday there will be a service and sermon for the delegates at the South Church, corner of Main and Buckingham Streets. The sermon will be delivered by the pastor, the Rev. Warren S. Archibald.

Monday afternoon a reception will be given by the President of the Connecticut Society, Dr. George C. F. Williams, and Mrs. Williams, who will welcome at their home, No. 990 Prospect Avenue, all delegates and accompanying ladies between 4 and 7 o'clock.

Tuesday afternoon there will be an automobile ride; Tuesday evening the usual banquet.

There is no hotel in Hartford large enough to accommodate all

the delegates, so they will have to distribute themselves among several hotels of the city, where they will find accommodations entirely comfortable, and sumptuous if they seek the latter. It is impossible to obtain rates at this time, but probably in about a month before the assembling of the Congress rates will be secured. In the meantime further information with regard to hotel accommodations can be obtained by addressing Mr. Charles G. Stone, Secretary of the Connecticut Society, Sons of the American Revolution, No. 53 Inlay Street, Hartford, Conn., or the delegates, if so inclined, can correspond direct with the Highland Court Hotel, The Garde, The Bond, or The Heublein.

AMENDMENTS TO THE NATIONAL CONSTITUTION.

The Connecticut State Society has given notice of the following proposed amendment to section 4, article 5, of the National Constitution.

The following amendment, which it is recommended shall be added to the end of section 4, article 5, is as follows:

Each State or District Society shall file with the Secretary General, on or before the opening of the National Congress each year, the names of two of its members who reside within the State or District of said Society, and the President General shall select his nominees to the Executive Committee, known as Director General, from the names so filed, and not more than one member from a Society shall be nominated for such office by the President General.

Another proposed amendment to the Constitution has been received from the Arkansas State Society and is as follows:

AMENDMENT TO SECTION I, ARTICLE VII, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

WHEREAS section I, article VII, of the Constitution of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution provides for the holding of its annual meeting and Congress on the third Monday of May of each year; and

WHEREAS it is believed that a later date would be preferable, so that one might combine the summer vacation with the annual meeting, and thus secure a larger attendance for the same; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Arkansas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution respectfully suggests to the National Society the propriety of making a change to a later date of the time of meeting of the National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, and that

we request that the Secretary General shall send to the President of each State Society a sixty days' notice of such proposed alteration, prior to the meeting of the next Congress, made at the suggestion of the Arkansas Society.

Adopted at the annual meeting of the Arkansas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, February 21, 1920.

In each of the above instances the Presidents of the several State Societies have received the sixty days' notice of the proposed amendments in time for action at the next annual Congress.

DEATHS OF FORMER OFFICIALS.

The National Society officials have been pained in recent weeks to learn of the death of two Past Presidents General.

GENERAL EDWARD S. GREELY died at his home in New Haven, Conn., on January 10, 1920.

President General Jenks appointed a special committee to take appropriate action with reference to the death of General Greeley and the committee has adopted and presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS it has pleased God to take from us our Brother Com-patriot, General Edwin S. Greeley, who died at his home in New Haven, Conn., on January 10, 1920; and

WHEREAS General Greeley has for nearly thirty years been a member of The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution and has served the Society by holding many offices, including that of President General of the National Society, and has been its constant supporter up to the time of his death; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the President General and the Executive Committee of The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution express their deep sorrow at their bereavement and extend to the family of the deceased their sincere sympathy.

Resolved, That this resolution be recorded in the records of the National Society and a copy conveyed to his family and be published in the Bulletin.

Compatriot FRANKLIN MURPHY died on February 24, at Palm Beach, Fla., following an operation. He was one of the first 200 members enrolled in the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. He became a member of the New Jersey Society November 24, 1891, and at once an active worker in the organization.

He was elected Secretary General at the Congress held in Chicago in 1893 and served continuously for five years, retiring at the Congress held in Morristown, N. J., in 1898, when he was elected a Vice-President General. At Detroit, in the following year, Compatriot Murphy was elected President General, turning over the office in 1900 to General J. C. Breckinridge. Three years later, in 1903, the State of New Jersey honored Compatriot Murphy by electing him its Governor, which position he held for three years. The last Congress he attended was at Newark, in 1916. His interest never waned and there were few more enthusiastic supporters of the aims and objects of the Society than Governor Murphy.

His long life of threescore and fourteen years was, from the adolescent period, visibly marked by praiseworthy acts for the advancement of the general interest of humankind. At the age of 18 years he entered the volunteer army in defense of the Flag, in 1862, and served two years and nine months in the Fighting Thirtieth New Jersey Volunteers. Successful as a manufacturer, he also gained much popularity for his extensive charity, his loyal friendship, pure patriotism, and as a believer in and defender of the Constitution.

At the funeral service held at his late home, Newark, February 27, Compatriot Louis Annin Ames, former President General, upon request of President General Chancellor L. Jenks, represented the National Society. President Carl M. Vail and a delegation of the New Jersey Society also attended.

The Utah Society advises of the death of Hon. SAMUEL CURYER Park, ex-Vice-President General of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in 1915; President Utah Society, 1917; ex-Mayor of Salt Lake City; a member of our Society from March, 1909, who died at Salt Lake City, Utah, February 19, 1920.

Hon. JOHN MILTON REITSNIIDER, a member of the National Executive Committee and a Director General of the National Society, died at Baltimore, Md., on the morning of March 19, 1920. To his associates on the National Executive Committee and the National officers, as well as to his compatriots of the Maryland Society, his

death came as a powerful and sudden shock. Judge Reitsnider was a compatriot to whom all were deeply attached, a most lovable character, and one whose counsel and efforts will be greatly missed in the Society.

He had been in bad health for quite a long time, and death was caused by pleuro-pneumonia, which followed an operation for intestinal trouble.

The body was removed to his late home at Westminster, Md., where the funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon, March 21, at the Ascension Episcopal Church. The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution was represented by the attendance of Past Presidents General Louis Annin Ames and Elmer M. Wentworth, Vice-President General Thomas W. Williams and Secretary General Philip F. Larner. A large number of the compatriots of the Maryland State Society were also in attendance from Baltimore and elsewhere, accompanied by President Jas. Harry Preston.

Compatriot Reitsnider was born in Westminster, Md., in 1865. He was a student at the Western Maryland College, and completed his education at the University of Virginia, afterwards studying law and admitted to the bar in 1886. He was a Mason and Past Master in that organization. A member of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and at the time of his death a member of the vestry of Ascension Church, Westminster, in which office he had served for many years. At the time of his death he was chairman of the Public Service Commission in Maryland. He possessed a deep love for his country and an abiding faith in it and its institutions, as well as a great pride in the part his ancestors had taken in its history. A former President of the Maryland Society, Sons of the American Revolution, he took a great interest in that Society. He also was greatly interested in the American's Creed, and was instrumental in having a copy of it presented to each of the schools in Baltimore, and having the school children learn it by heart. He did a similar work in connection with the schools of the State outside the city, and was also instrumental in having the creed spread among the schools of the country through the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

Commenting editorially on the death of Compatriot Reitsnider, one of the Baltimore papers contains the following reference:

"The Public Service Commission loses in the death of Chairman J. Milton Reitsnider an extremely useful, sane and well-balanced

member. Mr. Reifsnider's work on the commission was marked by conscientiousness, industry and thoroughness, and added to his previously well-earned reputation as a faithful and reliable public servant. We trust Governor Ritchie will be able to find a successor who will serve the State with equal high mindedness and devotion."

In the District of Columbia Society has occurred the death of LAWRENCE WASHINGTON, who was for some time a member of that Society. Mr. Washington was a great-nephew of George Washington and was born at Mount Vernon in 1855. He made his home, after marrying, in Fauquier County, Virginia, and then moved to Alexandria in 1890, living there to 1907. For a number of years past he has been in charge of the Congressional Reading-room of the Library of Congress, where he has been employed for 25 years, and enjoyed the friendship of a great number of members of both the House and Senate.

EVENTS IN THE STATE SOCIETIES.

The Arizona Society held its 24th annual meeting February 24, at Phoenix. Following the annual banquet of the Society the following officers were elected: President, F. W. Perkins; Vice-President, H. B. Wilkinson; Secretary, Harold Baxter; Treasurer, Lloyd B. Christy; Registrar, Howard S. Reed; Historian, Rt. Rev. J. W. Atwood; Chaplain, Rev. J. Rockwood Jenkins; National Trustee, Clay F. Leonard.

The California Society.—At the December meeting of the San Diego Chapter, California Society, the President General was the guest of honor, giving an address.

The Chapter has elected the following officers for 1920: President, Fitz H. W. Drummond; 1st Vice-President, Henry Blanes Adsit; 2d Vice-President, Walter Warner Austin; Secretary, Allen Henry Wright; Treasurer, Franklin Pierce Reed; Registrar, Alfred Hermon Hanes; Historian, Fred Baker, M. D.; Chaplain, Rev. Charles Edward Spalding; Marshal, Capt. Roger Bates Bryan, U. S. A., retired.

The State Society has issued an appeal to the members to secure a complete list of the membership of each family and the relatives thereof who are eligible to membership to the Society, this also to include a list of all acquaintances who are eligible.

In the Connecticut Society, at the suggestion of President C. E. P. Sanford of General David Humphrey Branch No. 1, a complimentary dinner was given to the newly naturalized citizens of New Haven on the evening of Lincoln's Birthday, at the Hotel Taft. Mr. Sanford presided, and after a hearty welcome introduced Vice-President General George F. Burgess, of the National Society, as toastmaster. Patriotic addresses were made by Rev. George L. Paine and Edwin P. Root, both members of the branch. Appropriate responses were given by John D. Antonia, Americanization Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association; Antonio J. Suraci, and Eric H. Swan, the latter two having been made full citizens in December last.

Among the guests were representatives of nine European countries, and the interest shown by them was most encouraging. The General David Humphreys Branch is the first in Connecticut to carry out a citizenship movement of such interest and is to be congratulated on its success.

At the close of the program all present were invited by the New Haven Grays to join them at their 104th Annual Dinner and listen to an address on Lincoln by Rev. James Grant.

After Mr. Grant's address Vice-President General Burgess in a short speech expressed the appreciation of the Society of this courtesy and the desire of the National Organization to co-operate with all others in patriotic work.

In the District of Columbia Society a ladies' night was given on the evening of January 17, 1920. The address of the occasion was delivered by President David Jayne Hill, in his usual graceful and interesting manner, the subject being "Our Mission." Music was furnished by the Nevin Trio. The formal exercises were closed by a supper, followed by dancing. The Society was greatly pleased to have among its guests Director General J. Milton Reifsnider, of Baltimore, who was accompanied by his son, Lieutenant Commander Reifsnider, and wife; also by the presence of Com Patriot George S. Robertson, Secretary of the Maryland State Society, accompanied by Mrs. Robertson.

On February 23, 1920, was held the usual annual election of officers for the Society, the following being elected: President, Albert D. Spangler; Vice-President, Henry L. Bryan; Vice-President, Rear Admiral Frank F. Fletcher; Vice-President, Lisle S. Lipscomb; Secretary, William A. Miller; Treasurer, Alfred B. Dent;

Registrar, Capt. Overton C. Luxford; Assistant Registrar, Henry P. Holden; Historian, Selden M. Ely; Librarian, William L. Boyden; Chaplain, Rev. James M. Nourse.

The election was followed by reports of the officials and general business, interrupted by a substantial luncheon.

On the morning of February 23 the Sixth Joint Celebration of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Sons of the American Revolution, and the Sons of the Revolution was held in Memorial Continental Hall on the 188th anniversary of the birth of George Washington. The presiding officer for the occasion was Mrs. George Thacher Guernsey, President General of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Music was furnished by the U. S. Marine Band. There was a presentation of the colors, followed by a recitation of the American Creed by its author, Mr. William Tyler Page, of Maryland, and also the presentation, through the French Ambassador, of a gold medal to a student, Charles Lanham, of the Eastern High School, for his essay on "What the United States Owes to France." A reading from papers of George Washington was given by Colonel Frederick Bryan, Past President of the District of Columbia Society, Sons of the American Revolution. The address of the occasion was by Mr. Justice Wendell P. Stafford, of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia. The Marseillaise was sung by Lieutenant Jean J. Labat, formerly of the French Military Mission. Altogether it was a most interesting and enjoyable occasion.

The Florida Society had the honor of a visit from President General Jenks on January 19, 1920, and entertained him at a dinner on that date, after which a meeting of the Society was held at which the general public was invited. The President General spoke on "The Power of the American Ideal."

The Florida Society is making an earnest effort to increase the number in its ranks.

The Illinois Society, through its Board of Managers, has adopted a resolution in memory of its highly esteemed and beloved compatriot, Eliot Durand.

Compatriot Durand was born January 10, 1847, at Colchester, Vermont; was a veteran of the War of the Rebellion, having enlisted and served in an Illinois regiment. He served in the Illinois National Guard as Assistant Inspector General and as a major in the First Illinois Infantry. In the Spanish-American War he organized a provisional regiment of infantry and as its colonel tendered its services to the United States. As a newspaper man, a business man, and a patriotic citizen, he was conspicuous for his sturdy Americanism and enthusiastic support of all patriotic work.

He joined the Sons of the American Revolution October 24, 1893; State number, 204; National number, 1,464.

The annual meeting and banquet of the Oak Park Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, was held on the evening of March 5, at the First Congregational Church House, President John C. Miller acting as toastmaster. Prior to the banquet, a reception was given to President General Jenks and his wife, who were the honored guests. President General Jenks gave a speech which gave food for thought to those present, and complimented the Chapter on its work for the past year. Ninian H. Welch, Master-in-Chancery of the Circuit Court of Cook County, gave a very in-

spring talk on "Americanization," and was pleased to learn of the work that the organization was doing in this line.

The work of the Chapter for the past year has consisted of obtaining the permission for the Board of Education to place copies of the "American's Creed" in the hands of every pupil in the seventh and eighth grades, and has hopes of making it obligatory for them to memorize it. A drive for new members was started and it is hoped to increase the Chapter membership 100 per cent before the next annual meeting.

The following is a list of the officers for the ensuing year, duly elected: President, John C. Miller; Vice-President, George R. Hemingway; Secretary, Frank L. Stetson; Treasurer, Louis A. Bowman; Historian, Dr. Wm. E. Barton; Director, Joseph R. Noel.

The Indiana Society held its annual meeting in Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, February 25, 1920, in observance of the anniversary of the capture of Fort Sackville, Vincennes, by Colonel George Rogers Clark. The business meeting and banquet brought out the largest attendance and most enthusiastic gathering in years. The official guests of the Society were President General Chancellor L. Jenks and Hon. Moulton Houk, Vice-President General of the Mississippi Valley District, East. Compatriot George N. Wright, of Chicago, extended the greetings of the Illinois Society.

The Secretary reported the active membership totaled 217, a net increase of 77 since the last annual meeting. Of these 24 are new members and 53 reinstatements. Of the reinstatements some had been inactive for more than five years.

The following officers were elected: President, Austin H. Brown; Vice-President, Cornelius F. Posson; Vice-President, H. Louis Mauzy; Vice-President, Dr. Charles L. Fleming; Vice-President, Mason J. Binlack; Secretary, Edmund L. Parker; Treasurer, Edmund L. Parker; Registrar, Herbert E. Redding; Chaplain, Rev. Manfred C. Wright; Honorary Vice-President, James Somes; Delegate to National Congress, Charles W. Jewett; recommended to be trustee of National Society, Charles Timothy Jewett.

Mayor Charles W. Jewett, of Indianapolis, retiring President, was toastmaster at the banquet, which was served in the Riley Room of the Claypool Hotel. War Service medals of the National Society were conferred by the Vice-President General on twelve compatriots. The War Service medal for Herbert Briggs, Jr., was presented to Herbert Briggs, Sr.

The President General, in behalf of the Indiana Society, decorated Compatriot Governor James P. Goodrich with the War Service Medal in recognition of the patriotic efforts of the Governor in mobilizing the resources of the State of Indiana to the support of the Government in the war.

Greetings were announced from officers of the State Societies of the district. Short addresses were given by Compatriots Herbert Briggs, Terre Haute; Inman H. Fowler, Spencer; Mason J. Niblack, Vincennes, and Samuel D. Royse, Terre Haute. The celebration closed with an inspiring patriotic address by the President General.

The Indiana Society sends an encouraging report of its work. It has made good gains this year, showing a net increase of 77 members, and delinquents have been brought into line to the number of 53—a splendid showing. The Secretary reports that the prospects are so good that his office is swamped with work. In fact, he is so busy that he has not had time to read the rules and find out what reports are necessary. The warning is sent out to watch Indiana for Flag honors this year.

The Kentucky Society is starting a movement to bring pressure to bear on Congress to control immigration. In doing this they are trying to reach what they consider the primary seat of the trouble. At the meeting of the Society a resolution was adopted, and they propose to ask the National Federation of Women's Clubs, the D. A. R., American Legion, and other societies to cooperate with them, as well also as the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The following is the resolution as adopted:

Believing that the preaching of sedition in its various forms must be firmly suppressed, if our present constitutional government is to endure; and

Believing, further, that the primary cause of most of the social unrest has been the lack of adequate control of immigration; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Kentucky Society, Sons of the American Revolution, urge upon its Representatives in Congress the necessity of providing such additional legislation as will put upon the immigrant the burden of proof to show that he will be a reasonably desirable addition to America, and to further provide means by which he may be promptly deported should his subsequent conduct indicate that he is undesirable.

Resolved, further, That the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, American Legion, D. A. R. Society, Daughters

of the Confederacy, and the National Federation of Women's Clubs, through their various State organizations, be asked to co-operate in this movement by passing suitable resolutions and writing to their Representatives in Congress, to the end that sound laws may be passed for the control of immigration.

The Society held its annual celebration on the evening of January 17, 1920, being in recognition of the battle of the Cowpens, and at the same time a dinner was tendered to President General Jenks. An attractive program was presented, including an address by the President General and also an address by Governor Morrow, of Kentucky. Prizes were awarded to high-school students in the American Legion's 100 per cent Americanism Poster Contest.

The Louisiana Society membership is still striving hard for and should have an increase in members. The returns for the fiscal year ending March 31, it is hoped, will reflect new activity, although they hardly hope to excel the record of last year.

The Society held its annual meeting on December 12, at the De Soto Hotel, the affair being marked by a representative attendance and much enthusiasm. An increase in membership of 98 members since the last annual meeting was reported by President Churchill, making a total gross membership of 256, less losses by death, transfer, and resignation for the same period of 7, or a net membership of 249, the greatest in the history of the Society. The meeting was featured by the passage of uncompromising resolutions denouncing the spread of the pernicious doctrine promulgated by the anarchical I. W. W. and Bolsheviks and urging upon Congress the immediate passage of drastic laws providing, in the case of naturalized citizens, for the cancellation of citizenship of any affiliating with such organizations and the appropriation of sufficient funds to carry forward properly and promptly the deportation of undesirable aliens. In conclusion, the Society offered its services, collectively and individually, to the Government to assist it in its work in any possible way, a copy of the resolutions being ordered sent to each of the Senators and Representatives from Louisiana in Congress.

Lieut. Col. P. S. Morris, formerly chief engineer of the Allied Expeditionary Forces in Northern Russia, gave his impressions of "Bolshevik Russia"; Walker M. Ellis, of the Air Service, told of "The War and After"; Carl C. Friedrichs, of "The Battle of Lake Borgne," while Henry W. Robinson talked on "Interesting Historical Points in New Orleans."

The annual election of officers resulted as follows: President, C. Robert Churchill; 1st Vice-President, Lynn H. Dinkins; 2d Vice-President, J. Wallace Alexander; 3d Vice-President, George G. Weeks; Secretary, Herbert P. Benton; Treasurer, Thomas H. Taylor; Financial Secretary, Robert T. Butwell; Registrar, Sol. Bloodworth; Chaplain, Rev. John Talbot Sawyer. Light refreshments were served following the business session.

An occasion of moment in the annals of the Louisiana Society was the visit of President General Chancellor L. Jenks, of the National Society, on January 22. President Jenks was the recipient of many courtesies on the part of the Society, being taken on a tour of the French Quarter and in the evening being the guest of honor at a membership dinner at Antoine's. He addressed a gathering of Sons of the American Revolution, Daughters of the American Revolution, and Colonial Dames later in the evening, in the rooms of the Association of Commerce. President Jenks delivered a message to the Louisiana Society that was notable in many respects.

William Yarbrough Harper, a prominent Louisiana insurance man and a member of the Louisiana Society, Sons of the American Revolution, died at his residence in New Orleans, February 19, 1920. He was widely known throughout the State and had recently been elected President of the Society for the Prevention of Fire Waste for Louisiana and Mississippi. He was 50 years old and is survived by a widow, three sons, and a daughter.

The Maine Society reports a somewhat interesting case of unusual deliberation by a man in presenting his application. We are advised that this gentleman had his application papers in his possession, and after the lapse of sixteen years has at last concluded to present them. The Maine Society must feel that the organization has been well "deliberated," and that there can now be no doubt on the subject.

The members of the State Society held their annual meeting and banquet on February 23, at Portland, with President W. K. Sanderson presiding, the occasion being a most successful one from every standpoint. It was voted to take up with the State authorities the proposition to secure a much more suitable memorial at Valley Forge to represent the State of Maine than the one there now.

A greeting from the President General was read. A dinner was served in the evening, with a large number of members and their wives present. Appropriate exercises followed the dinner, during which Past Vice-President General Philip F. Turner, acting in behalf of the National Society, presented to those who were present the World War medals. An interesting address was delivered by Major Dwight, of New York.

The Maryland Society celebrated the birthday of George Washington by a general meeting at the Hotel Belvedere. Hon. Richard Yates, United States Representative from Illinois and former Governor of the State, spoke, and Hon. Martin L. Davey, United States Representative from Ohio, delivered an address on "The Menace of Red Radicalism."

In the Massachusetts Society the George Washington Chapter, at Springfield, has elected the following officers: President, Samuel Fuller Punderson; Vice-President, Charles Franklin Warner; Secretary, Henry Adelbert Booth; Treasurer, Charles Lewis Baird; Chaplain, Rev. The State Society observed Washington's Birthday at the Harvard Club, in Boston. A luncheon was served at 1 o'clock. A feature was the presentation of medals to twelve members of the Society who served with the American forces during the world war. Dean McCollister, of Tufts College, Chaplain General of the National Society, made the presentation address. President Henry F. Punderson presided. A paper on Brigadier General Reade, who was, up to the time of his death last year, Historian of the Society, was read by Marshall P. Thompson. Dr. C. H. Bangs, of Lynn, was the principal speaker.

In the Michigan Society, in order to meet the persistent un-American propaganda being made in the city and nation, with an equally persistent campaign of education upholding American ideas, the Board of Governors of the Detroit Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, plans to present, in conjunction with the

Board of Education, Board of Commerce, and other organizations, a program in monthly meetings in school-houses and other public places, especially in what is known as the foreign-speaking districts, which will help to counteract the vicious influences of the anarchistic elements that have centered in and about Detroit.

The members of this Society feel that a duty rests upon them to restate and re-establish the principles and ideals of their ancestors, who founded this Republic, for the benefit of thousands of foreign-speaking people who have come to our shores in much the same spirit and for much the same reason that our forefathers came. It is thought that a manifestation of a spirit of friendliness and brotherhood toward these foreign people will do much toward increasing their appreciation of the merit of our institutions. A season of meetings will be held and various committees appointed to cover the special branches of the proposed enterprise.

THE DETROIT CHAPTER, Sons of the American Revolution, entertained at dinner at the Detroit Athletic Club, Monday evening, January 26, members, guests, and ladies. The speakers of the evening were Dr. Edward A. Steiner, of Grinnell College, Iowa, who spoke on the "Immigrant of the 18th and the 20th Centuries"; Mrs. C. W. Carter, on "Women and the New Patriotism"; Rev. Joseph A. Vance, on "Benjamin Franklin," whose birthday was honored, and George W. Bates, who spoke on "The Wayne Tablet and Its Significance." The Wayne tablet was placed on the County Building in 1896 by this Society to commemorate the surrender of this territory to General Anthony Wayne and the founding of Wayne County, in 1796. ORANGE CHAPTER held a very largely attended reception at the Women's Club, East Orange, on the night of February 23, which was in remembrance of the birthday of Washington and also in honor of the returned men of the Chapter who had been in Federal service during the World War. Each one, forty in number, was presented with the war service medals.

The New Jersey roll of honor numbers over 200 names.

The Society is having a season of prosperity in so far as it relates to the acquisition of new members. The total number on the roster now exceeds 1,500, and it is confidently expected to add another hundred to the list before the end of the fiscal year, on March 31.

The Society, which has occupied its present quarters at 756 Broad Street, Newark, for the past seven years, has been notified to secure new quarters. A new office building is to be erected on the site of the one in which the Society has been located.

They are proud to have as members of the Society the type of manhood these speakers represent and trust they may be able to carry out the principles for which the speakers stand.

The Rhode Island Society actively participated in the observance of Constitution Day last September, in the ball-room of the Narragansett Hotel. Addresses were delivered by several prominent citizens and the celebration of Armistice Day was also held in the Narragansett Hotel.

Attention is called to the death of Compatriot John Prescott Farnsworth, who was for many years the poet of the State Society and was beloved by all. Not only as a manufacturer, but in various public ways he was known as one of the representative citizens of Rhode Island. He was president of the Providence Chamber of Commerce during the year 1914.

The co-operation between the Rhode Island Society, S. A. R., and the Providence Chamber of Commerce has been very successful as well as expedient. The Secretary of the Rhode Island Society is the Secretary of both organizations.
