## OFFICIAL NOTICES.

Since the publication of the National Committees in the June BULLETIN, the President General has appointed Compatriot Wilson H. Lee, of Connecticut, as a member of the Committee on Organization for the New England District.

Also the names of the following compatriots, all residents of Buffalo, N. Y., have been added to the Committee on Credentials, viz: Milhard H. Dake, Franklin P. Cragin, Harlan P. Bosworth, and John P. Abbott.

The record of new members admitted since the last issue of the BULLETIN, amounting to over 300 in number, shows the interesting fact that of this entire number the Societies located in the States usually referred to as the Southern States have produced over one hundred of the entire number. Maryland, under the energetic management of President General Preston, heads the entire list of all States, with 42 new members, followed by Massachusetts and New Jersey, each with 41. Of the other Southern States, Louisiana has added 20 to its rolls and Tennessee 16.

A copy of a Boston newspaper recently received contains an official notice from the Massachusetts Society, addressed to the compatriots of that Society, announcing the death of Compatriot Winthrop Murray Crane, former Governor and Senator from that State, who died at his home in Dalton, Mass., October 2. A committee of four members was appointed to represent the Society at the funeral. The announcement bears the names of President G. H. Nutting and Secretary Fletcher S. Hyde.

This publication is particularly referred to in this manner as a method of announcement for Societies on occasions of the death of members, which has long been in use elsewhere and the use of which should commend itself to other Societies.

The very large supply of World War medals, amounting to about 1,500, has been disposed of and additional inquiries recently have made it necessary to order another supply of 300 medals. It is hoped that those desiring medals will advise the Secretary General at as early a date as possible.

In a recent visit to the city of Boston the Secretary General had the pleasure of meeting many of the officials and prominent members.

Massachusetts State Society, being also entertained by Vice-President General Nutting and a large number of compatriots at luncheon at the City Club during the visit. Later, through the courtesy of Vice-President General Nutting and Genealogist General Watkins, he was able to inspect, at the Boston Athenaeum, an original library of George Washington, purchased by citizens of Boston for the Anthracum and kept there in the official quarters. Later a visit was made to the State Capitol, where many of the most interesting and valuable historical records in manuscript of the early days of Massachusetts were exhibited through the courtesy of the State officials, making the visit one of not only unusual interest and value, but of great pleasure.

The Secretary General recently also made a visit at the new headquarters of the New Jersey State Society, now located at East Orange. He found Secretary David L. Pierson in charge of the office at work and most agreeably situated for carrying out the activities of this great State Society.

## CONSTITUTION DAY CELEBRATIONS.

All material received by the Secretary General relative to meetings held by the various State Societies on Constitution Day has been referred to Past-President General Louis Annin Ames, chairman of the General Committee on Constitution Day Observance, who desires to cover the entire subject in the report to be submitted by that Committee.

## THE WASHINGTON GUARD.

Compatriot John Lenord Merrill, of New Jersey, Governor General of the Washington Guard, has made a most earnest request that each State Society should compile a list of the Sons of members in the respective States. With such a list and full data accompanying the same, it is hoped to thoroughly organize the Washington Guard. It is desired to make this organization a valuable asset to the Society, and if the foundation can once be established with firm basis of a proper enrollment, Compatriot Merrill hopes to have active work started by the various State Societies, aided by the National Officers.

The request of Compatriot Merrill is presented in this manner in the hope that it will not only reach the officials of each State Society in securing their aid to accomplish the desired end, but as this BULLETIN



goes to each one of the many thousands of members of the Society, it is earnestly hoped that every member will lend his aid in this valuable work, and not only act for himself, but urge every other member with whom he may come in contact to also give his aid and assistance in every manner possible.

#### DEATHS.

The National Society regrets to announce the death, on Wednesday, August 18, 1920, of Major General Joseph C. Breckinridge, U. S. A., retired, who at one time was President of the District of Columbia Society, and later elected President General, National Society, S. A. R., at the Congress held at New York city, May 1, 1900.

General Breckinridge was Inspector General of the Army from January, 1889, until his retirement, April 12, 1903. He was 78 years of age. The body was removed for burial to the old family homestead at Lexington, Kentucky.

General Breckinridge was born in Baltimore, January 14, 1842. He was appointed to the Army from Kentucky from civil life. Like many other high ranking officers of the Regular Army now living, he entered the military service as a volunteer officer at the outbreak of the civil war. On April 14, 1862, however, he was appointed a second lieutenant of artillery in the regular establishment, promoted to first lieutenant in 1863, and made a major and Inspector General of Volunteers in 1881.

General Breckinridge was brevetted captain for gallant and meritorious service in battle in front of Atlanta, Ga., July 22, 1864, and major for gallant and meritorious services during the civil war.

August 30, 1861, he joined General William Nelson at Camp Dick, Robinson, Ky., where Kentucky and Tennessee volunteers were being organized; he was aid-de-camp to General George H. Thomas through both advances toward east Tennessee, terminating in the victory of Mill Spring, Ky. He was then in the movement to Nashville, Tenn., and toward Shiloh, and through the siege of Corinth, Miss. He also participated in numerous other campaigns and engagements.

In 1889 General Breckinridge was appointed Inspector General of the Army, which position he held fourteen years. At the outbreak of the Spanish War he applied for a command with troops, and was given the volunteer commission of major general and placed in command of the First Army Corps, at Lexington, Ky. He later went to Cuba and was present through the engagements before Santiago. He was the father of Henry Breckinridge, former Assistant Secretary of War.

#### THE YEAR BOOK FOR 1920.

The Year Book for 1920 has been mailed to each State Society and Chapter and to such officials as under the rules are entitled thereto. This book is published in limited edition, and free distribution is made only to the General Officers, Executive Committee, Trustees, one copy to each Chapter, two copies to each State Society, one to each delegate at Hartford, and to a list of libraries. Such additional copies as may be available can be sold at cost price.

#### UNMARKED GRAVES OF SOLDIERS OF THE REVOLUTION.

Admiral George W. Baird, of the District of Columbia Society and chairman of the National Committee on Naval and Military Records, has called attention to certain instances where soldiers of the Revolution have unmarked graves, and this was referred to particularly in a communication through which it is hoped that various State Societies can be induced to aid in having the burial places of such soldiers suitably marked and cared for. A statement of the instances referred to by Admiral Baird follows:

"1. Captain Thomas Thompson, a captain of the Colonial Navy (see Vol. V, page 422, Journal of Continental Congress), sleeps in an unmarked grave in a cemetery near Portsmouth, N. H. He was a Mason and I tried six years ago to get the members of his lodge (St. Johns, No. 1) to get a marker from the Q. M. G., but I have never been informed if they did it.

"2. Francis Hopkinson, a Signer, is buried somewhere in Philadelphia, and the only memorial I can find is a door in the choir at the Valley Forge Church. It seems that Hopkinson was a musician, and the choir thought enough of him to have this carving made.

"3. The grave of William Whipple, Signer, is marked by a very modest little stone. It is in a cemetery near Portsmouth, N. H. One informant tells me there is no marker at Whipple's grave.

"4. The Rev. Mr. Warburton says that lat the churchyard at Philadelphia 'There never has been any memorial at the grave of Jos. Hewes. He and Hopkinson and Ross lie in our burial ground in unmarked and unlocated tombs.' The Society of the Descendants of the Signers were talking about erecting a tablet for the church walls. I do not think they have erected it.

"The burial place of Richard Dale, John Paul Jones' first lieutenant, cannot be found.

"The grave of Patrick Henry is in Charlotte County, Va., where a very little and unbecoming marker designates the resting place of the man who has been so much quoted.

"There were three Captains Nicholson (brothers) in the original

Colonial Navy. The eldest is buried in old Trinity Churchyard, at New York, and his grave marked by a slab, but the graves of his two brothers have not been found."

#### RECEPTION OF NEW MEMBERS.

Suggestions have been heretofore made in reference to a more extended and satisfactory form for the reception of new members into the Society than has been generally used, and the following, adopted for use on the occasion of its recent annual Flag Day observance by the John Morton Chapter of Terre Haute, Ind., is printed as presenting a form which may meet the requirement in many instances:

**THE SECRETARY:** Mr. President, the following men, since our last meeting, have made application for membership, accompanied by records that have been approved by the Board of Managers of the Indiana Society and the Registrar of the National Society. I recommend that they be accepted into fellowship of the John Morton Chapter.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The men nominated for membership will be escorted before the colors.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The members of this Society are pledged to 100 per cent Americanism; to protect the institutions of our sovereign Nation; to guard the flag, and resist to the utmost every act or sentiment unfriendly to our country. Does each one of you so pledge?

**RESPONSE IN UNISON:** I do. As my ancestors offered their lives and fortunes that this sovereign Nation might be established, I, in their names, pledge myself to defend it against all enemies, to protect the flag, to attack false sentiment or alien propaganda, and to foster love of country. I serve but one God, one flag, one country.

**THE PRESIDENT** to members: Compatriots, your officers have certified the records and recommended these gentlemen, and they are now formally accepted as members of the Indiana Society and the John Morton Chapter.

**MEMBERS IN UNISON:** Compatriots, we give you hearty welcome.

**ALL:** I pledge my allegiance to my country's flag and to the Republic for which it stands: one nation, indivisible, and with equal rights and justice for all.

#### MINUTES OF MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, NATIONAL SOCIETY, SONS OF THE AMERICAN

REVOLUTION, HELD OCTOBER 19, 1920,

AT BALTIMORE, MD.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Society was held at the residence of President General James H. Preston, in Baltimore, Md., at 10.30 a. m., October 19, 1920.

President General Preston presided, with the following members of the committee in attendance: Louis Annin Ames, Rev. Dr. Lyman Whitney Allen, and W. K. Boardman; also present: Historian General George C. Arnold; Treasurer General John H. Burroughs; Past Presidents General C. A. Pugsley, M. B. Beardsley, and E. M. Wentworth;



Past Director General Lewis B. Curtis, and Secretary General Philip F. Larnier.

Letters of regret, on account of inability to be present, were received from several present and former officials.

Of the other members of the Executive Committee, Past President General Chancellor L. Jenks was absent by reason of illness, Mr. G. F. Pomeroy on account of a very important business engagement, and Judge A. P. Sumner, who was holding court in the State of Rhode Island and could not be in attendance on that account.

The minutes of the last meeting of the Board were adopted as printed in the BULLETIN.

The Secretary General reported that he had distributed already about 1,500 of the World War medals ordered by the Society, and that the supply was now practically exhausted. Owing to a sudden demand for more medals, he had been compelled to order 200 additional.

He also reported that after a recent survey of the number of engraved membership certificates now on hand, it was found that 1,000 additional were needed to keep the stock supply at a proper number for each State. These had been ordered from the Bank Note Company at a cost for each blank certificate of \$1.25, or \$1,250.00 for the entire order of 1,000, this being the second increase in the price of such certificates within the past year.

Treasurer General Burroughs submitted a statement of the financial affairs of the National Society under date of October 12, 1920, by which it was shown that the balance on hand May 12, 1920, was \$9,328.75; total receipts since that date, \$1,447.11; total disbursements, \$3,930.46; balance on hand October 12, 1920, \$6,845.40.

The Treasurer General also submitted an estimate of the probable receipts and necessary expenditures for the period between this date and March 1, 1921, from which it appears that the Treasury of the National Society may have a deficit of \$1,000.

The committee then considered the recommendation, coming over from the last Executive Committee meeting, that steps should be taken to increase the income of the National Society, in view of the increased cost of various features of the work. The many questions involved and the rights and powers of the Executive Committee under the National Constitution in the direction of the desired object were given a long, patient, and most careful consideration by the officials present, which resulted in the unanimous adoption of the following recommendations to the next Congress of the National Society:

*First.* That the Executive Board recommend to the next Congress the advisability of discontinuing the publication of the Year Book,

which of necessity has only a limited circulation, and that in the future the proceedings of the Annual Congress appear in the OFFICIAL BULLETIN, to the end that the OFFICIAL BULLETIN will take on largely the character of a quarterly magazine which reaches our entire membership.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

*Second.* That Article VI of the Constitution of the National Society be amended to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE VI.—Initiation Fee and Dues.

SEC. 1. In addition to the initiation fee, if any, charged by a State Society, there shall be paid an initiation fee of five dollars for membership in the National Society, Sons of American Revolution. Said fee shall be forwarded to the Registrar General with each application for membership. The payment of said fee shall include an engraved certificate of membership for each newly elected compatriot, to be furnished by the National Society.

SEC. 2. Each State Society shall pay annually to the Treasurer General, to defray the expense of the National Society, fifty cents for each member thereof, unless intermitted by the National Congress.

SEC. 3. Such dues shall be paid on or before the 1st day of April in each year for the ensuing year, in order to secure representation in the Congress of the National Society.

On motion, the following committee was named as the Committee on Arrangements, appointed by the National Executive Committee for the Buffalo Congress:

President General James H. Preston, *ex-officio*, Baltimore, Md.; Past President General Louis Annin Ames, chairman, New York, N. Y.; Frank B. Steele, Buffalo, N. Y.; Eugene Tanke, Buffalo, N. Y.; Oliver H. Berry Champplain, Buffalo, N. Y.; Edgar B. Jewett, Buffalo, N. Y.; Milford H. Dake, Buffalo, N. Y.; William E. Otto, Buffalo, N. Y.; Captain Henry A. Brown, Buffalo, N. Y., and Colonel George B. Lauman, Chicago, Ill.

The proposal of the Massachusetts Society relative to the erection of a bronze tablet in Plymouth, Mass., in honor of General James Warren, as presented by Compatriot George Hale Nutting, President of that Society, at the Hartford Congress, was considered and, on motion, the following committee was appointed to give consideration to the matter and report to the Executive Committee at its next meeting, namely: Judge A. P. Sumner, Providence, R. I., chairman; E. M. Wentworth, John H. Burroughs, George Hale Nutting, Lewis B. Curtis, and George C. Arnold.

A letter was presented from Mr. T. W. Wells, suggesting the aid of the National Society in the publication of the booklet entitled "The



Spirit of America," which contains certain great historical documents. On motion, the consideration of the subject was deferred to the next meeting of the committee.

The present status of the Nevada State Society was then laid before the Executive Committee for action, and after careful consideration the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas the Nevada Society has failed to comply with the laws of the National Society for a period of five years last past, be it *Resolved*, That the Nevada State Society be declared extinct, its charter be, and is hereby, revoked, and authority be granted Compatriot George C. Huntington to form a new State Society.

A proposed amendment to the National Constitution received from the Spokane Chapter of Washington State relative to the formation of an additional State Society was given careful consideration, and the Secretary General was instructed to notify the author of the proposed amendment that it was not in due form for consideration under the Constitution and must be submitted through the Secretary of the State Society.

Compatriot F. B. Culver, Registrar of the Maryland State Society, was introduced to the committee, and presented a communication relative to the advisability of securing publication by the U. S. Government of the Revolutionary pension records on file with the U. S. Pension Office. The committee deemed the recommendation of Mr. Culver of great importance, and advised that steps be taken to lay the matter before Congress, and that compatriots throughout the country be advised to communicate on the subject with all members of Congress who are connected with the Society of Sons of American Revolution.

President General Preston reported that a bronze plaque in memory of the late Director General John M. Reifsnider, as previously authorized, had been provided for his grave, at a cost of \$50; which action was ratified and approved by the Committee.

The President General also reported that a Chapter of the Society was in process of organization at this time in Georgia, and he was given authority to issue a charter thereto.

Also a Chapter was under organization in the State of West Virginia. Compatriot W. K. Boardman also reported the organization of a Chapter in Memphis, Tenn.

The committee discussed various matters of interest to the Society and adjourned at 6 o'clock p. m.

Interesting addresses were delivered by James E. Cattell, of Philadelphia, and Compatriots Pugsley, Wentworth, Rev. Dr. Allen, Louis Annin Ames, and George C. Arnold. Upon conclusion of the addresses a bountiful buffet luncheon was served and the visitors were cordially received by members of the Maryland Society.

A very busy day was closed with many expressions of appreciation on the part of the visitors for the very cordial hospitality extended to them by the President General and his associates of the Maryland Society.

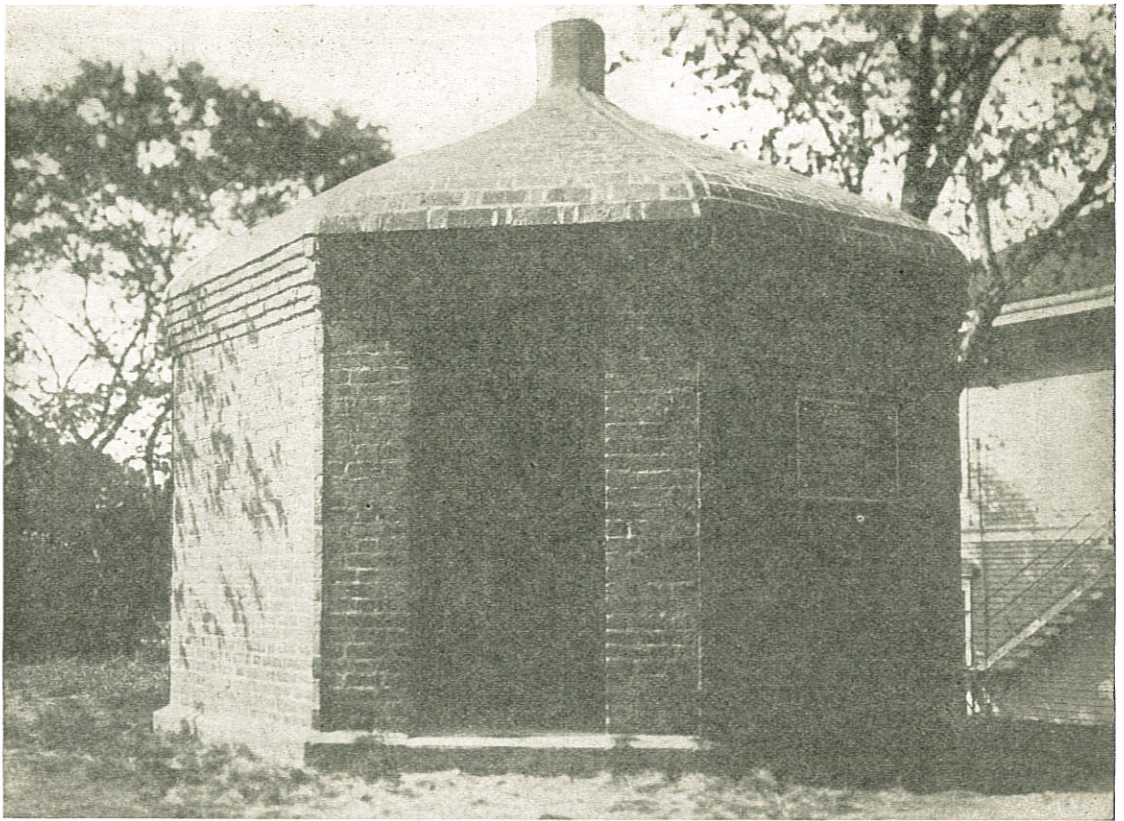
## REVOLUTIONARY POWDER HOUSE ON BURIAL HILL, PLYMOUTH.

*President Massachusetts State Society.*

The Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution has this year rebuilt, from the specifications found in the records of the town of Plymouth, the old Powder House, the original of which was erected in 1770. The cost to the Society was upwards of \$2,000, and the new "Old Powder House," while following as nearly as possible the specifications of the Revolutionary one, is in many respects far superior to it in construction, having been built with a view to permanence. The foundation is said to be sufficient to hold up a very

large structure, while the roof contains a considerable quantity of steel reinforcing rods. The original building served its purpose throughout the War of the Revolution, but entirely disappeared from view more than fifty years ago.

In the year 1876 the plan was adopted by the local authorities to commemorate the building by planting a young elm tree in the exact center of the spot formerly occupied by it. This was done, with some ceremony, in the presence of the Standish Guards and quite a concourse of people. The names of all the members of the Guards and of many of the spectators were recorded and then placed in a metal receptacle at the bottom of the excavation.

The elm tree, however, has not grown at all well, but the Society and the local authorities decided not to disturb it, and so the new structure was placed a few feet to one side of the original site.

As a part of the Tercentenary Improvements now being made by the National, State, and local governments, quite a number of houses on the street leading up to the Powder House from the main street, at the left of the Court-house, are now being demolished, which will considerably improve the locality of the new building and bring it more prominently into view.

The total amount to be expended on the Pilgrim Tercentenary improvements at Plymouth is expected to reach very nearly the sum of \$1,000,000, most of which is to be of a permanent character.

To the Massachusetts Society, S. A. R., belongs the distinction of having erected and completed the first of the permanent memorial buildings of the Pilgrim Tercentenary Celebration.

The Powder House bears the following inscription on the bronze tablet affixed to the outside:

The Old Powder House was built  
here in 1770.

This building, erected in 1920, is dedicated to  
those descendants of the Pilgrims,  
by birth or of the spirit,  
who helped establish American Independence.

On the inside of the building the original inscription stone of the Revolutionary building, which had been religiously preserved by the Pilgrim Society in Pilgrim Hall, has been permanently affixed. It is of



slate stone and is badly weather-worn. At the top, however, is a representation of an old powder horn. The date, 1770, is still legible, and also, at the bottom, a representation of an ancient cannon in the act of discharging. The Latin inscription is undecipherable.

The contractor for the Society was very fortunate in being able to obtain old hand-made brick of the Revolutionary period, so that the new building starts on its career with quite an appearance of antiquity already upon it.

"The Old Powder House" replica was dedicated on the occasion of the Fall Field Day of the Society, held at Plymouth on the 12th of October. The principal exercises were held in the First Parish Church, when a fine address was delivered by the Hon. Arthur Lord, President of the Pilgrim Society, and the building was formally presented to the town of Plymouth by President George Hale Nutting, of the Massachusetts Society, S. A. R.

#### EVENTS IN THE STATE SOCIETIES.

The Arkansas Society, in connection with other patriotic societies, properly celebrated "Flag Day" in the city park, at Little Rock, on June 14. A detachment of the historic Third Division, now stationed at Camp Pike, gave an exhibition drill, and music was furnished by the Third Division Band. Addresses were made by representatives of the several patriotic societies participating, and S. A. R. World War medals were awarded fourteen members of this Society who participated in the war, the presentation being made by Past President Frank A. Rawles, who stated that 20 per cent of our membership were in the uniform.

The Colorado Society recently reports that they now have over 400 members in that State, about 300 being in Denver.

The District of Columbia Society has prepared a program of great interest on the occasion of the unveiling by the local Society of a bronze tablet placed on the pedestal of the statue of John Paul Jones in Potomac Park, at the foot of 17th street, in Washington, which event will occur on Saturday, October 30, with appropriate ceremonies, in recognition of the 145th anniversary of the birth of the United States Navy. The tablet will be unveiled by Miss Sarah Watson, daughter of Rear Admiral Watson, and addresses delivered by Secretary of the Navy Daniels and Hon. James H. Preston, President General of the

National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The U. S. Marine Band and a battalion of marines will take part.

In the Indiana Society, at the Flag Day meeting of the John Morton Chapter, five members were decorated for military connection in the World War and six new members were received in the Chapter. Members and guests responded to memorable dates in the History of the American Flag.

The reception service for members (new), printed elsewhere in this BULLETIN, was used for the first time and proved impressive, with old and new members participating.

The ceremonies were conducted by Judge James J. Swango, President of the Chapter.

The Iowa Society, through its publication, "The Old Continental," shows its active work in the interest of the organization. This number contains an especially interesting article, entitled "Twenty Years a Secretary," in which the efficient service of the Iowa State Secretary, Captain E. D. Hadley, and the great work accomplished by that organization during his service are reviewed in an interesting manner.

In the Kentucky Society, Louisville, Independence Day celebration was held at Tyler Park under the joint auspices of the American Legion, Sons of American Revolution, and Tyler Park Club. Com-patriot Marvin H. Lewis, President of the S. A. R., was chairman of the Committee on Arrangements.

The program was quite extensive, including music and various addresses, one being delivered by J. H. Richmond, representing the Kentucky Society, S. A. R.; also an address by Hon. E. P. Morrow, Governor of Kentucky. The entertainment closed with an exhibition of fireworks.

It was estimated that 35,000 people were present, and it is said to be the largest crowd assembled in Louisville on any one occasion. With the audience singing the hymns and participating in the exercises, it was made a very interesting affair. The park was decorated with lanterns, and it was said to be a great occasion and one that will live in the memory of the Louisville people. A salute of 48 guns was fired by a battery from Camp Taylor.

In the Maryland Society there was an elaborate celebration on September 6 at Mt. Vernon Place, Washington Monument, in honor of the birthday of General Lafayette, in which celebration many of the civic authorities and distinguished citizens united.



At the foot of the Washington Monument there was a triple celebration, including the observance of General Lafayette's birthday by dedicating a pedestal on which will be placed, in a few months, a bronze equestrian statue of the patriotic Frenchman; also, the celebration of the first battle of the Marne, where the French and English repulsed the invading hordes of Germany; also, the completion of the beautifying of Mt. Vernon and Washington Square.

The leading address of the occasion was delivered by Honorable James H. Preston, President General, S. A. R.

Many distinguished citizens, including an attaché of the French Embassy in Washington, were present. It is estimated that fully 5,000 people gathered before the platform.

An address was also delivered by Mayor Broening, of Baltimore.

The program was quite lengthy, including several musical numbers and recitations.

In introducing former Mayor Preston, Mayor Broening said that the improvements in the square were due to him.

"He was a big, broad mayor, who builded," continued Mr. Broening. "He did things which brought forth criticism, but I am confident that in time he will be vindicated."

After acknowledging the tributes of Mayor Broening, Mr. Preston said:

"The celebration here tonight is an expression of gratitude of a nation to General Lafayette. A nation may express gratitude as can an individual. General Pershing, when in France, said that, next to the man whose statue tops yon monument (General Washington), credit is due to General Lafayette for the winning of liberty for the American people. Could there be a more appropriate place in the world for this celebration than at the base of Washington Monument?

"He did more than win battles for us. He was responsible for the bringing of Rochambeau and of the French fleet, which gave us victory. Here we should lay our tributes to this great man. Here was broken the ground for this pedestal by General Joffre and by Pierre de Coubertin, a great-grandson of General Lafayette. On this pedestal will soon be placed an equestrian statue of Lafayette, an inspiring example to our youth. Let us emulate his real love of liberty, the liberty of the people, liberty and democracy, which shall ever be the heritage of mankind."

In the Massachusetts Society. Vice-President General George Hale Nutting, accompanied by officers of the Massachusetts Society, attended the Tercentenary celebration at Provincetown, Mass., in August. They were joined there by President Ashley K. Hardy, of the New Hampshire Society. Together they attended the exercises at the Town Hall,

and were shown every courtesy by the local committee. A visit was made to the U. S. Battleship *Florida*. In the parade the four flags carried by the Massachusetts Society—the National, the Betsey Ross, the Massachusetts State flag, and the State S. A. R. flag—were carried in the line, in charge of Capt. C. B. Appleton, with a detail of sailors from the Battleship *Florida*. The State S. A. R. delegation was led by a fifer and two drummers in Continental uniform.

The GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER, of Springfield, held a dinner meeting at Nyassat Club on October 6. Patriotic songs were sung and interesting addresses made by Maj. B. A. Adams and Rev. E. R. Laine, Jr.

President S. F. Punderson, President of the Chapter, presented medals of the insignia of the order to Rev. Laine and F. P. Forbes for securing three new members for the Chapter in a recent membership contest.

The Massachusetts Society on October 12 dedicated the memorial structure recently erected at Plymouth in honor of the Tercentenary of the landing of the Pilgrims, which was a reproduction of the Old "Powder House on Burial Hill." The original building of which this is an exact replica was erected in the year 1770, in anticipation of the struggle which broke over the country five years later.

A suitable illustration and descriptive matter by Vice-President General George Hale Nutting is published in this issue of the BULLETIN. The following named committees had charge of the exercises connected with the dedication:

*Tercentenary Committee*.—Dr. Charles H. Bangs, chairman; President George Hale Nutting (*ex officio*), Hon. John Churchill, Frank E. Woodward (Past President), Hon. George H. Fall, and Alfred F. Powers.

*Field Day Committee*.—Walter K. Watkins, chairman; Fred A. Jenks, Geo. Hale Nutting (*ex officio*).

The program of the occasion was most elaborate, including various addresses and several musical features. The address of dedication and presentation of the Powder House to the town of Plymouth was delivered by President George Hale Nutting, President of the Massachusetts State Society. Chairman Dr. Charles H. Bangs gave a review of the work of the Tercentenary Committee. The address of acceptance on behalf of the selectmen of Plymouth was made by William T. Eldridge.

Greetings from the Empire State Society were presented by Com-patriot George D. Bangs, Vice-President of that Society.



The Massachusetts Society has been making a special effort to enlarge its membership and revenue and thereby increase the strength and usefulness of the Society. The members have been especially requested to make a list of all male blood relatives, including minors, residing in New England and their addresses and forward the same to the State Officials.

The New Hampshire State Society held its annual meeting in the State Capitol, at Concord, on June 22.

The meeting was called to order by (Retiring) President Harry F. Lord, of Manchester.

The invocation was made by the Rev. Joseph W. Presby, Chaplain of the Society.

The delegates and guests were welcomed to Concord by the representative of the Governor, who was himself absent from the city.

The meetings, both morning and afternoon sessions, were held in the Representatives Hall in the Capitol.

The Regent of the New Hampshire State Society, D. A. R., Mrs. Charles W. Barrett, made a very interesting address in the afternoon, giving a brief résumé of the activities of that splendid organization during the World War.

Following this the President, Mr. Lord, introduced George Hale Nutting, Vice-President General of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, who read a remarkable description of the principal events of the War of the American Revolution, contained in a Thanksgiving sermon delivered at Boston, in the Brattle Street Church, by the Rev. Joseph Willard, A. M., President of Harvard University, on December 11, 1783—the year in which the treaty of peace was signed by Great Britain acknowledging the independence of the United States.

After this came the address of the day by Wilder D. Quint, Esq., editor of *The Boston Post*, on "Lafayette, and His American Visit in 1825," in which year he visited Concord, attended a banquet in his honor on the grounds of the State capitol at Concord, and afterwards planted an elm tree on the exact spot where he sat at the banquet, which tree is still growing and flourishing to this day.

At the close of the exercises a regiment of the New Hampshire State Guard marched into the capitol grounds, to which the assembly then adjourned to attend the exercises held jointly under the auspices of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the New Hampshire Society of Colonial Wars, and the New Hampshire Society, Sons of the American Revolution, for the unveiling and dedication of bronze tablets com-

memorating the visit of Marquis de Lafayette to Concord in 1825, and also marking the fine old elm tree planted by him on that occasion.

Speeches of presentation were made and the tablets were duly accepted by the representative of the State government. Appropriate music was furnished by the regimental band, and the outdoor exercises were closed by the playing of America and the Marseillaise on the chimneys of the old church adjoining the spot.

The remainder of the day was very enjoyably spent by the visitors in going over the fine building of the New Hampshire Historical Society, presented by Mr. Edward Tuck, and in which, among other objects of great interest which attracted much attention, are two flags of New Hampshire Revolutionary regiments which had been captured by General Burgoyne's troops prior to the capture of the latter by General Gates at Saratoga and smuggled over to England in the personal baggage of some of Burgoyne's officers. They were recently purchased in England by Mr. Tuck and by him presented to the State Historical Society.

The following officers were elected at the annual meeting: President, Prof. Ashley K. Hardy, Hanover; First Vice-President, Ira F. Harris, Nashua; Second Vice-President, Walter S. Baker, Concord; Third Vice-President, Sewall W. Abbott, Woburn; Secretary-Treasurer, Will B. Howe, Concord; Registrar, Charles C. Jones, Concord; Historian, Rufus H. Baker, Concord; Chaplain, Rev. Joseph W. Presby, Grassmere.

The New Jersey Society has been active during the month of September in preparing for the new season of patriotic activity. On the 11th Paramus Chapter, of Ridgewood, enjoyed its second annual automobile pilgrimage to points of historical interest in Bergen County, where the Chapter is located. Among the guests were Rev. Dr. Lyman Whitney Allen, President of the State Society; Carl M. Vail, Chester N. Jones, past Presidents; Secretary David L. Pierson, Treasurer Earle A. Miller, Registrar William J. Conkling; Herbert R. Crane, President of Newark Chapter, and C. Symmes Kiggins, National Trustee.

Among the many interesting places visited was Camp Merrill, now being dismantled, where it is proposed to erect a \$100,000 memorial, marking the site of this embarkation camp, through which there passed 1,400,000 soldiers. At the end of the trip the party was escorted to the home of Compatriot Fred. Z. Board, President of the Chapter, on the old Ridgewood road, where he and Mrs. Board entertained till late in the evening. The house, which is built on the site of the original



Zabriskie mansion, is a typical style of the Dutch architecture of the colonial period, built just at the concluding days of the Revolutionary War.

Rev. Dr. Lyman Whitney Allen, President of the New Jersey Society, made an address before 5,000 people at Watsessing Park, East Orange, on the evening of Monday, July 5, which was observed as Independence Day.

PASSAIC VALLEY CHAPTER observed the 140th anniversary of the Battle of Springfield with a church service at the Presbyterian Church erected on the site of the one destroyed during the fight. The day chosen for the observance was Sunday, June 20, and the event will long linger as one of the most enthusiastic held in S. A. R. circles in New Jersey. The address by State President Dr. Allen was of a very high order of thought and was punctuated with appeals for the eligible people of the neighborhood to associate with the S. A. R. or the D. A. R.

On Wednesday, June 30, Secretary David L. Pierson addressed a noonday meeting at the Sprague Electrical Works, Bloomfield, after which citizenship papers were handed to a number of the employees. The slogan in this large plant is 100 per cent American labor.

The Secretary made an address at the Crocker-Wheeler Electrical Plant, Ampere, in East Orange, at noon on August 12, calling the attention of the operatives to the importance of observing Constitution Day.

President Allen made the dedicatory address at the Washington Inn, Maplewood, New Jersey, on June 29. This was the Timothy Ball house, erected in 1743. The house and park are to be used for patriotic purposes. Washington was frequently entertained in this house while encamped at Morristown.

On June 19 Secretary Pierson made an address at the home of Com-patriot Albert French, Basking Ridge, it being the anniversary of the evacuation of Valley Forge, and Montclair Chapter made an automobile pilgrimage to the home, which is directly opposite the house where General Charles Lee was captured, December 13, 1776.

On the same day Compatriot John Lenord Merrill was re-elected President of the Washington Memorial Society, which had charge of the Wallace Home, Somerville, where Washington made his headquarters in 1778.

Compatriot Frederick A. Farley, of Milburn, and a member of the Passaic Valley Chapter, was overcome with the exercise of marching in the Independence Day parade in Summit on July 5 and died soon afterward.

Bertram Young, the first Secretary of Orange Chapter, died at his home in Scranton, Pa., on July 20. He was auditor of the Lackawanna Railroad.

Former President General R. C. Ballard Thruston pleasantly surprised the New Jersey Society during the latter days of August by appearing in its jurisdiction in quest of material relating to the New Jersey Signers and others. Mr. Thruston visited the headquarters at 44 Harrison Street, East Orange, on Monday, August 30, and on the evening of Thursday, September 2, President Allen, Vice-President General T. W. Williams, former President Chester N. Jones, and Secretary Pierson called on Mr. Thruston at his headquarters in the Robert Treat Hotel, Newark. The evening was delightfully spent.

Compatriot Fred. B. Bassett, father of Admiral Bassett, who was one of the speakers at the banquet following the Detroit Congress, is in the Alexian Brothers Hospital, Elizabeth, where he is slowly recovering from a fractured leg caused by a fall from a trolley car.

#### AT PICPUS CEMETERY.

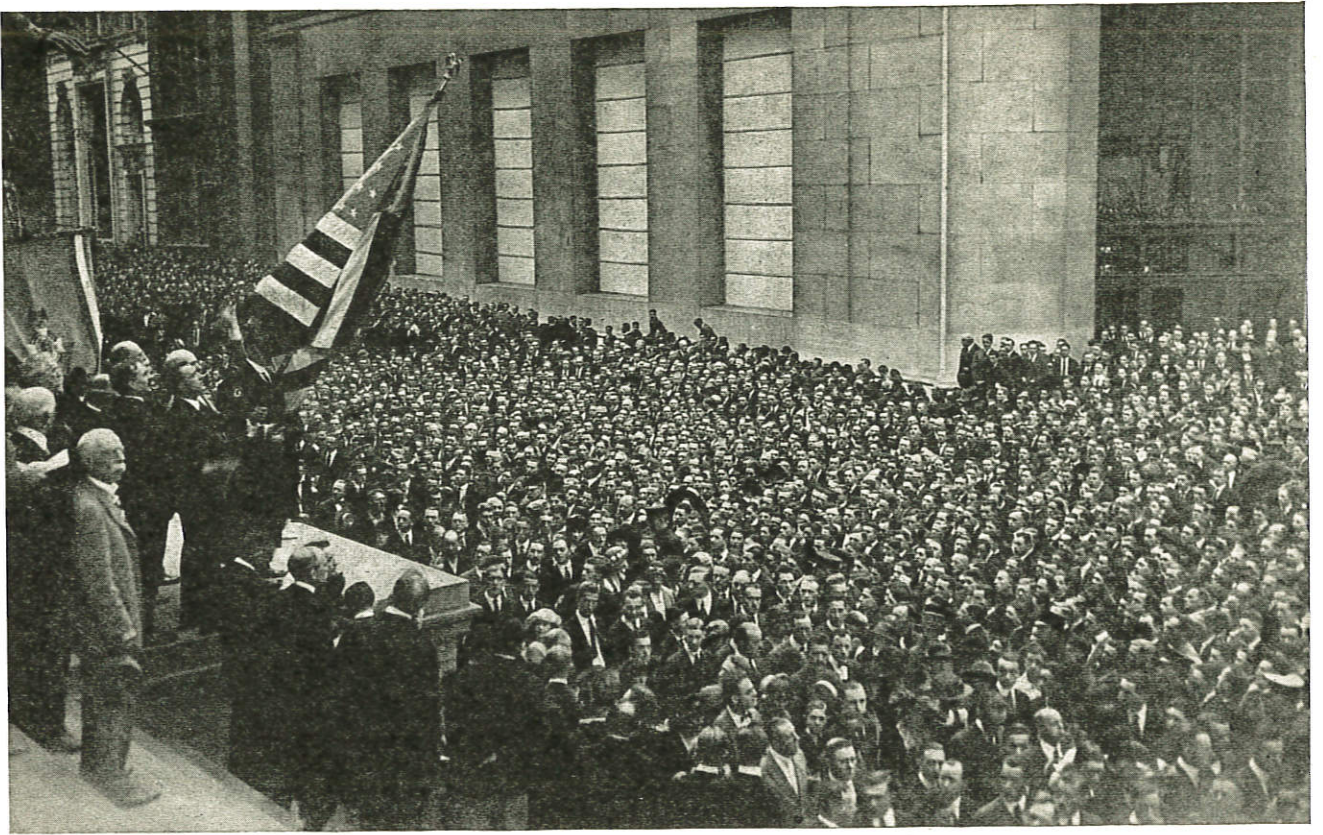

M. de Neveu has presented the colors of America and France to the school children of his town every Independence Day since America entered the war, and the event has become a feature of the year with the youngsters of school age there.

The audience numbered more than 10,000.

THE NEW YORK CHAPTER held its annual meeting on April 19, 1920, at the Hotel Martinique, having as its guest the Empire State Society, S. A. R. This being election night, the attendance was large and the addresses of the evening were by prominent speakers.

At the election the ticket presented by the nominating committee was unanimously elected. The retiring President, John H. Burroughs, was presented with a gold watch and chain and pearl stick-pin. Refreshments were served.

Memorial Day was observed by the Chapter by noonday services at St. Paul's Church (General Washington's old church), at which there was a large attendance of the Society. The Empire State Society, Sons of the American Revolution, loaned their many handsome flags for the occasion.

Flag Day was observed on June 14 by a joint assembly of the Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of Revolution, on the invitation of the latter.

The two societies marched side by side, in column of squads, preceded by the band and a detachment of United States troops from Governor's Island, from Frances Tavern to the Subtreasury, where a most attractive and brief patriotic program was arranged, the singing being led by the vested boy choir from the Church of the Heavenly Rest.

The Sons of the American Revolution and Sons of Revolution were equally represented on the staff of the marshal.

Third Vice-President of the Sons of the American Revolution, the Hon. Job E. Hedges, delivered the address. The Reverend Herbert Shipman, D. D., rector of the Church of the Heavenly Rest, made the invocation.

A garden party was held at Governor's Island in the afternoon, the guests being transported in the Government tender.

As has been the custom of this Society, ceremonies commemorating Constitution Day were held upon the 133d anniversary, Friday, September 17, at 12 o'clock noon, on the steps of the Subtreasury, Wall Street. The address by Brigadier General William J. Nicholson, U. S. A., was heartily received.

The Sons of the Revolution were invited as guests of the Chapter on this occasion. The Arrangements Committee, of which Col. Louis Annin Ames was chairman, prepared a very interesting and impressive ceremony.

COLONEL CORNELIUS VAN DYCK CHAPTER, Schenectady, N. Y., held its annual meeting June 1, at which the following officers were elected for

The regular quarterly meeting of the Chapter was held Tuesday evening, September 7, at 8 o'clock, in its new rooms, in the County Building, at which plans for the dedication of the Col. Van Dyck Memorial on September 14 were perfected.

On the afternoon of Tuesday, September 14, the unveiling of the memorial tablet to Col. Cornelius Van Dyck, under the auspices of St. George's Lodge, No. 6, F. & A. M., and the Col. Cornelius Van Dyck Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, were held, preceded by a procession leaving the Masonic Temple for Vale Cemetery.

Past President General Newell B. Woodworth and Mrs. Woodworth entertained at their summer home, near Syracuse, New York, the distinguished English and Dutch official mission visiting this country in connection with the Tercentenary Celebration of the Landing of the Pilgrims. The members of the official party were greeted by a very large company of distinguished citizens of the State and community.

THE NEW YORK CHAPTER has planned for a special meeting on November 1, in New York city, to entertain the Empire State Society, at which time also the Chapter will hold a business meeting.

In the Ohio State Society Senator Warren G. Harding has been elected as a member of the Sons of the American Revolution.

In Pennsylvania the board of managers of the Society have directed that markers be obtained for the graves of Francis Hopkinson, a Signer of the Constitution of the United States, and of Joseph Hewes, another prominent personage of Revolutionary days.

The Rhode Island Society reports that at a recent meeting of the Board of Managers a special meeting of this Society was called for the purpose of considering a revision of the by-laws, more especially for the purpose of defining the duties of the Secretary and Treasurer.

The Society is about to prepare and publish a new Manual, and it is noted that an assessment of \$2 on each member has been made for the purpose of publishing this Manual.

The Tennessee Society, at its annual meeting, held on the Anniversary of the Battle of King's Mountain, elected the following officers for the ensuing year, after the members had been entertained with a dinner given by the Society: President, Wm. K. Boardman; Vice-

President for Middle Tennessee, James N. Cox; Vice-President for East Tennessee, Garnett Andrews; Vice-President for West Tennessee, Wm. Lawson Wilhoite; Secretary, F. W. Millsbaugh; Treasurer, Carey Folk; Registrar, Jno. C. Brown; Chaplain, Dr. Jas. I. Vance, Surgeon, Dr. Paul De Witt; Historian, John De Witt.

Following the election of officers, the members had the pleasure of listening to a very interesting and instructive address on the Battle of King's Mountain, which was delivered by Compatriot John De Witt, who was particularly fitted to deliver such an address, as he has long been interested in all matters pertaining to the history of Tennessee and is President of the Tennessee Historical Society.

A branch Chapter is in process of formation at Memphis, and efforts are being made to establish a branch at Chattanooga. The Tennessee Society on this date has 108 members, which is a considerable increase over any number it has ever had before.

The Virginia Society. During the week of October 4 to 9 representatives of the Sulgrave Institution were guests of the patriotic and historical societies of Virginia, visiting places of the earliest historical events in America—Cape Henry, Norfolk, Jamestown, where the British first settled in 1607 and where the first legislature met in 1619; Williamsburg, seat of William and Mary College, successor of the School and College of Henricus, established in 1619, and capitol of Virginia from 1690 to 1790. Commemorative ceremonies were held in each of these places. A reception was given at Hampton, one of the oldest settlements in America. On Friday evening, October 8, the party arrived in Richmond and a reception was given at the Westmoreland Club, at which the visitors did most of the speaking. The next day the principal points of historical interest in the city were visited in autos, lunch was taken at the mansion of the Governor of Virginia, the drive winding up with a reception at the Woman's Club. In all of these functions the Virginia Society, Sons of the American Revolution, took an active part. The visitors expressed great pleasure in the cordial reception accorded them.

In Washington State, Vice-President General Bell is actively working for the enrollment of new members and the formation of new Chapters. He has urged the members of the Committee on Organization in his National District, as one aim to be worked for, the establishment of a Chapter in every community of 25,000 people or over.

SPOKANE CHAPTER celebrated on September 6 the 163d anniversary of Lafayette's birth by holding a banquet, marking the beginning of the



Chapter's fall activities, and also in honor of the members who served in the World War.

The officers of this Chapter have considered the question of inviting the National Society to hold an Annual Congress in Spokane with a special view to the Congress in 1922.

Action has been taken toward submitting an amendment to the Constitution of the National Society proposing the organization of a separate Society in eastern Washington.

The State Society reports the death, at Spokane, on August 2, of Thomas Howard Brewer, a well-known member of the Society and a man of high standing in the State and city. His death is a severe loss to the Society.

The Spokane Chapter held a meeting jointly with the Spokane Ad Club in the Hall of the Doges, on October 20, in commemoration of the victory of the American forces at Yorktown. Prof. James H. Berch, instructor of history at Whitworth College, spoke on some of the interesting events of the American Revolution.
