In a previous BULLETIN we had the pleasure of announcing that President Warren G. Harding had become a member of our Society, and we now have the additional pleasure of stating that Vice-President Calvin Coolidge has united with the Society through the Massachusetts State Society.

Compatriot W. L. Orvis, of the Empire State Society, now in the service of the U. S. Government in the Panama Canal Zone, writes that he had reason to be very proud of his rosette, when President-elect Harding visited the Zone not long ago and shook him warmly by the hand and called him "Compatriot."

National Officers and chairmen of National committees who desire to submit annual reports are requested to have the same prepared in time to be submitted at the Annual Congress to be held at Buffalo, N. Y., May 16.

Compatriot T. D. Hunting, chairman of the Credential Committee for the Buffalo Congress, has requested us to make the following announcement:

"To facilitate the work of the committee, and to avoid trouble and loss of time, delegates to the Congress of the National Society, which is to be held at Buffalo, N. Y., on May 16 and 17, 1921, will have their papers fully and properly made out before presenting them to the committee. All three forms must be filled out before they will be accepted and the bearers allowed to register."

Past President General R. C. Ballard Thruston, of Louisville, Ky., informs us that, owing to rearrangement of his office accommodations, he is compelled to dispose of a number of surplus volumes of the National Society Year Book, which he will gladly give to any one who desires them. The books referred to are for 1911, unbound, 3 dozen; 1913, unbound, 5 copies; 1915, bound, 3 copies, and 1916, bound, 12 copies.

It is earnestly hoped that officers of State Societies will as early as possible attend to the selection of a Trustee to represent each State, and report such selection to the Secretary General promptly before the meeting of the next National Congress, at Buffalo, on May 16-17, and

thereby avoid the necessity of a selection under the rules to supply a deficiency.

Attention is particularly called to the publication on the last page of this BULLETIN relative to the erection of a memorial at Plymouth, Mass., in honor of General James Warren.

We are advised that the exercises connected with the Pilgrim Tercentenary Celebration at Plymouth, Mass., as now planned, will occur on the dates of July 16, 18, 19, and 20, and July 30, August 1, 2, 3, and August 15, 16, 18, 1921.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY.

Several amendments have been proposed for consideration at the next National Congress, to be held at Buffalo, N. Y., on May 16 and 17, 1921, and for the information of members these proposed amendments are given below.

1. Proposed by the National Executive Committee:

That Article VI of the Constitution of the National Society be amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI.—*Initiation Fee and Dues.*

"SECTION 1. In addition to the initiation fee, if any, charged by a State Society, there shall be paid an initiation fee of five dollars for membership in the National Society, Sons of American Revolution. Said fee shall be forwarded to the Registrar General with each application for membership. The payment of said fee shall include an engraved certificate of membership for each newly elected compatriot, to be furnished by the National Society.

"SEC. 2. Each State Society shall pay annually to the Treasurer General, to defray the expense of the National Society, fifty cents for each member thereof, unless intermitted by the National Congress.

"SEC. 3. Such dues shall be paid on or before the 1st day of April in each year for the ensuing year, in order to secure representation in the Congress of the National Society."

2. Presented by the National Executive Committee, on motion of Past President General Jenks, as follows:

Section 2 of the Constitution of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Paragraph 1. Whenever in any State or Territory in which a State Society does not exist, or in which a State Society has become inactive, or failed for two years to pay its annual dues to the National Society, fifteen or more persons duly qualified for membership in this Society may associate themselves as a State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and organize in accordance with this Constitution, and they may be admitted by the Board of Trustees to the National Society as 'The — Society of the Sons of the American Revolution,' subject to the provisions of this Constitution, but this provision shall not be construed so as to exclude the admission of candidates residing in other States.

"Paragraph 2. *Whenever in the judgment of the Board of Trustees the physical, local, or geographical conditions make such action advisable, more than one Society in any one State may be admitted by the Board of Trustees to the National Society as 'The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution of the State of —.'*"

Section 6 shall be amended to read as follows:

"Whenever the word 'State' occurs in this Constitution or By-Laws, it shall be held to include within its meaning the District of Columbia and the Territories of the United States and *both Societies where more than one State Society shall exist in any State.*"
(Italics indicate amendments added.)

3. Proposed by the National Executive Committee, on motion of Director General Sumner, as follows:

Amend Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. An Executive Committee of seven, consisting of the President General as chairman and six members, to be nominated by him and approved by the Board of Trustees, shall in the interim between the meetings of the Board transact such business as may be delegated to it by a Congress of the Society or the Board of Trustees.

"*The Executive Committee shall have authority to discipline or to expel any competitor who by conduct disloyal to the ideals or prejudicial to the interests of the Sons of the American Revolution shall render himself unworthy of membership therein. Any member who feels himself aggrieved by the action of the committee acting under this power shall have the right of appeal to the next succeeding Congress.*"

"The members of the Executive Committee, other than the President General, shall be known as Directors General, and by virtue of their office shall be members of the National Congress and entitled to vote at the annual meeting of the National Congress during their terms of office."

(Italics indicate amendments added.)

4. Proposed by the Connecticut State Society:

You are advised that a committee of seven appointed at a special meeting of the Connecticut Society, Sons of the American Revolution, requests that the Executive Committee of the National Society present, with legal notice of the same, the following proposals, namely, that Article 5, Section 4, of the National Constitution be amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. An Executive Committee of seven, consisting of the President General as chairman and six members of the Board of Trustees, to be nominated by him and approved by said Board of Trustees, shall in the interim between the meetings of the Board transact such business as may be delegated to it by a Congress of the Society or the Board of Trustees."

Also that Article 13, Section 4, of the By-Laws be amended by striking out from the fourth, fifth, and sixth lines thereof, as shown on page 45, National Year Book, 1920, the words "other than such as may be called during the session or immediately upon the adjournment of an annual or Special Congress of the National Society"; and also by the insertion in line 6 of said Section the word "proposes," between the words "time" and "and".

The usual notices to the Presidents of the several State Societies have been given, in accordance with the requirements of our Constitution.

DEATH OF PAST PRESIDENT GENERAL LUCIUS P. DEMING.

Lucius P. Deming, the first President General of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, elected at the Congress held at New York City, April 30, 1889, and one of the founders of the organization, died on November 28, 1920, at Auburn, N. Y., at the age of 84 years.

Lucius Parmenius Deming was born at West Stockbridge, Mass., on March 10, 1836, the son of John Carlton and Polly Mary (Slautter) Deming. He was educated in the Massachusetts country schools, Russell's Military School, in New Haven, Conn., and the Yale Law Department, 1877, taking the prize for the Townsend Oration. He was married twice, his first wife being Miss Laura Russell, by whom he had one son and two daughters. His second wife was Miss Eleanor M. Parmelee, of which union there was born one daughter.

He began studying law with Lucius Peck at New Haven in 1857, but, his health failing, he went to sea for seven years as captain of a coasting vessel. Was a member of the firm of Deming, Browning & Co., dry goods. He began the practice of law in 1877, and held office as

assistant city attorney, assistant judge and judge of the New Haven City Court, and judge of the Court of Common Pleas of New Haven County.

Mr. Deming served as chairman of a labor commission appointed by Governor Henry B. Harrison. In 1877 he visited nearly every State prison in the United States. He also served as judge advocate in the Second Company, Governor's Horse Guards, New Haven.

In 1890 Mr. Deming traveled through Central America and the Republic of Guatemala, and many times was in great personal danger. He wrote letters of travel for the *New York Tribune*, the *Bridgeport Standard*, and other papers, and wrote and delivered illustrated lectures.

Mr. Deming was interested in fraternal societies and assisted in organizing the first fraternal insurance association in the United States. He was a 32-degree Mason, a prominent Odd Fellow, a member of the New England Order of Protection, and other orders.

Since 1900, until about ten years ago, he lived in New Mexico, where he was interested in mining and ranching, but as his health failed he again turned eastward and has farmed in a small way in New York State near his son.

He was interested in some land in North Carolina, and after his 80th birthday spent the greater part of one winter in the mountains of that State looking after his interests, removing to Auburn, N. Y., about five years ago.

THE THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL CONGRESS OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY.

The next Annual Congress of the National Society, as heretofore announced, will be held in Buffalo, N. Y., and will convene on the morning of Monday, May 16, 1921. The Buffalo Chapter, of which Compatriot Frank B. Steele is Secretary, having special charge of the entertainment of the delegates to the Convention, announces a partial program of arrangements, which is subject to possible changes. The headquarters have been selected at the Hotel La Fayette, on La Fayette Square, which is provided with every facility for comfort. A card of rates for rooms can be had upon application to the hotel.

The usual church service will be held on Sunday. On Monday morning the sessions of the Congress will begin in the banquet hall of the hotel. Monday evening a reception will be given by Mrs. John Miller Horton, Regent of the Buffalo Chapter, D. A. R. On Tuesday will be

held the final sessions of the Congress, with luncheon to the delegates before a drive about Buffalo and its parks, with a possible stop at one of the country clubs. Tuesday evening the usual banquet at the La Fayette Hotel for the delegates and ladies.

At the present writing the committee is planning to take all delegates and ladies to Niagara Falls on Wednesday morning for a trip around the Great Gorge Road and a view of the Falls, leaving at 9 o'clock on special cars for the Falls, returning to Buffalo about noon.

On account of the great increase in railroad rates, the committee suggests that as many of the delegates who can, drive in their cars to Buffalo. The city can be reached from any place in the East by the best roads in the country, and the trip can be made in from two days to two days and a half.

The Buffalo headquarters are at 121 West Chippewa Street, and any communications to Compatriot Steele will receive courteous attention.

DECORATION AT THE NATIONAL WASHINGTON MONUMENT ON FEBRUARY 22.

An entirely novel and impressive feature of the celebration in Washington City on the 22d of February was the decoration and attendant ceremonies at the Washington Monument. On the invitation of the U. S. Superintendent of Public Buildings and Grounds, Maj. C. S. Ridley, the Secretary General of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, united with various officials of the Government and civic and patriotic organizations in placing a wreath at the base of the monument. Forty-eight flags were placed at intervals around the mound on which the monument stands, and two companies of High School Cadets stood guard during the ceremonies, a cadet at each flag. Following the sound of the "colors" by buglers, the list of the representatives present was called, and as each name was announced, the individual advanced and placed in position a handsome wreath, the list beginning with the name of the President of the United States, for whom a handsome floral piece was placed. Several departments of the Government were represented in the decorations. As the representative of our National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, the Secretary General provided a large wreath, beautiful in design, bearing a suitable card and ornamented with the colors of the Society. The ceremony was the first of its character, and it is hoped that it will be continued annually, with many other organizations participating. The program was arranged and carried out under the supervision of Com-

patriot Fred D. Owen, of the office of Public Buildings and Grounds, and a member of the District of Columbia Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, NATIONAL SOCIETY, SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, HELD FEBRUARY 23, 1921, AT NEW YORK CITY.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Society was held at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, in New York City, at 10.30 a. m., February 23, 1921.

President General Preston presided, with the following members of the committee in attendance: Chancellor L. Jenks, Louis Annin Ames, Judge A. P. Sumner, Rev. Dr. Lyman Whitney Allen, and Secretary General Philip F. Larnier; also present: Vice-Presidents General George C. Hale Nutting and Thomas W. Williams, Historian General George C. Arnold, Treasurer General John H. Burroughs, Past President General F. M. Wentworth, and Past Director General Lewis B. Curtis.

Mr. George E. Pomeroy, a member of the committee, was absent, being on a trip to California, and Mr. Wm. K. Boardman, detained by business engagements.

The minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee, held October 19, 1920, were approved as printed in the BULLETIN of October, 1920.

The Secretary General reported that on February 22 he had accepted, as the official representative of the National Society, an invitation from Government officials to attend and place a wreath at a ceremony of decoration of the Washington Monument in Washington, D. C., the wreath being provided at a cost of \$10. On motion, this action was approved.

The question as to the reporting and printing of the entire proceedings of the National Congress, as well as the speeches at the subsequent banquet, was presented for consideration, and, on motion, the President General and Secretary General were instructed, if in accordance with their judgment, not to report or print the banquet speeches, and they were further authorized to edit for publication the full proceedings of the Convention.

The matter of a change in form and size of the membership certificate issued by the National Society having been suggested by several sources, the subject was given thorough consideration and it was decided that no change in the certificate would be made at this time.

Vice-President General Nutting submitted the question of the proposed aid from the National Society for the erection of the General Warren Memorial at Plymouth, Mass. Attention was also called to the fact that two committees in the Society were now under appointment for the same object, and, further, that the Massachusetts Society presents an application, for insertion in the March BULLETIN, of a request for subscriptions to the Warren Memorial. On motion, it was ordered that the two committees referred to be consolidated, and that the application of the Massachusetts Society for publication of the request for subscriptions be granted.

A communication from the Illinois Society was presented, covering a report of a special committee appointed by that Society to consider and report upon the desirability of adopting the proposed amendment to Article 6, Section 1, of the National Constitution, to provide for the payment of an initiation fee to the National Society. This report had been unanimously adopted by the Illinois Society Board of Management, which expressed the opinion that the proposed amendment would not satisfactorily accomplish the purpose of increasing the income of the National Society. The committee further suggested that the proposed plan, if adopted, would tend to restrain the growth of the Society.

After a very thorough and general discussion of the matter, the President General suggested the appointment of a special committee to consider the entire subject of the income and expenses of the National Society, with a view to the suggestion of such changes as may seem desirable in the financial outlay or increase of revenue.

On motion of Mr. Ames, the Executive Committee decided to appoint a committee to consider the matter of the financial needs of the Society and desirability of the proposed amendment to the Constitution, with instructions to report to the Congress, the President General being authorized to appoint the committee.

The President General announced the appointment of Past Presidents General Ames, Wentworth, and Jenks as the committee authorized by the motion adopted.

It was further ordered that the Illinois Society be notified of the action of the committee.

A report from the Treasurer General and letter accompanying same were submitted and read, the report showing a cash balance on hand in the treasury amounting to \$1,608.42. The report was received and filed and copy of same ordered to be sent to the committee previously named.

On motion of Judge Sumner, the appointment made by the President

General of Louis Annin Ames to represent, with power, the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, at a meeting of a national committee for the co-ordination of patriotic and civic work, was ratified.

Mr. Ames then reported that the committee on co-ordination of patriotic and civic work planned for the organization of a National American Council, its object being to co-ordinate the plans and work of the various organizations engaged in patriotic and civic activities throughout the United States, to promote the co-operation of the public, to eliminate duplication and waste, and to minimize appeals for financial support. The first meeting of the Council is to be held in Washington on March 15.

The report of Mr. Ames was adopted and, on motion of Past President General Jenks, President General Preston and Louis Annin Ames were appointed a committee of two to represent the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, at the meeting of the Council in Washington on March 15.

Mr. Ames submitted a list of the "Unused Rights in the Society of the Cincinnati in the State of New York," and the same was ordered published in the Society BULLETIN and the congratulations of the Executive Committee extended to the Cincinnati Society for having obtained the list.

Judge Sumner submitted the following amendment to the Constitution of the National Society, which, on his motion, was ordered to be presented to the next Congress, to be held at Buffalo, N. Y., on May 16, 1921, due notice to be sent to Presidents of the State Societies, as required by the Constitution, viz:

Amend Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution so as to read as follows:

"SEC. 4. An Executive Committee of seven, consisting of the President General as chairman and six members, to be nominated by him and approved by the Board of Trustees, shall in the interim between the meetings of the Board transact such business as may be delegated to it by a Congress of the Society or the Board of Trustees.

"The Executive Committee shall have authority to discipline or to expel any compatriot who by conduct disloyal to the ideals or prejudicial to the interests of the Sons of the American Revolution shall render himself unworthy of membership therein. Any member who feels himself aggrieved by the action of the committee acting under this power shall have the right of appeal to the next succeeding Congress."

"The members of the Executive Committee other than the President General shall be known as Directors General, and by virtue of their office shall be members of the National Congress and entitled to vote at the annual meeting of the National Congress during their terms of office."

(Italics indicate amendments added.)

Past President General Jenks submitted an amendment to the Constitution of the National Society which, on his motion, was ordered to be referred to the Chancellor General, to be prepared in suitable form for presentation to the next National Congress, to be held at Buffalo, N. Y., May 16, 1921, and due notice to be sent to Presidents of State Societies, as required by the Constitution, said proposed amendment as subsequently prepared by the Chancellor General being as follows:

Section 2 of the Constitution of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Paragraph 1. Whenever in any State or Territory in which a State Society does not exist, or in which a State Society has become inactive, or failed for two years to pay its annual dues to the National Society, fifteen or more persons duly qualified for membership in this Society may associate themselves as a State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and organize in accordance with this Constitution, and they may be admitted by the Board of Trustees to the National Society as 'The ——— Society of the Sons of the American Revolution,' subject to the provisions of this Constitution, but this provision shall not be construed so as to exclude the admission of candidates residing in other States.

"Paragraph 2. Whenever in the judgment of the Board of Trustees the physical, local, or geographical conditions make such action advisable, more than one Society in any one State may be admitted by the Board of Trustees to the National Society as 'The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution of the State of ———.'"

Section 6 shall be amended to read as follows:

"Whenever the word 'State' occurs in this Constitution or By-Laws, it shall be held to include within its meaning the District of Columbia and the Territories of the United States and both Societies where more than one State Society shall exist in any State."

(Italics indicate amendments added.)

The President General reported that on the preceding day, February 22, he had visited the city of Washington on the invitation of the local committee and presided at the annual joint meeting of the local Societies of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Sons of the American Revolution, and the Sons of the Revolution, which meeting was very largely attended and of much interest.

The Executive Committee meeting then adjourned.

SOCIAL FUNCTIONS INCIDENT TO THE MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

President General Preston and other National Officers, including Vice-Presidents General T. W. Williams and George Hale Nutting, Historian General George C. Arnold, Treasurer General John H. Bur-

roughs, and Secretary General Philip F. Larner, with members of the Executive Committee, including Past Presidents General Ames and Jenks, Rev. Dr. Allen, and Judge A. P. Sumner; also Past President General Pugsley and Past Director General Curtis, were guests of the Board of Managers of the New York Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, on the evening of February 22, 1921, at a delightful dinner given at the Hotel Martinique. Following the dinner the visitors were guests at a meeting of the New York Chapter, held at the hotel, at which a large number of companions were present.

General Bridgman, the President of the Chapter, presided at the meeting, when addresses were delivered by the guests of the evening, following which a buffet supper was served.

The meeting of the Executive Committee at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel on February 23 was suspended during its session to accept the invitation of the President General to luncheon. While at luncheon Mr. Hugh S. Martin, who is engaged by the New Jersey Society in its Americanization work, addressed the committee, giving a description of his service in that State and the difficulties encountered in the work.

CO-ORDINATION OF PATRIOTIC AND CIVIC WORK.

A convention of patriotic and civic organizations in the interest of the formation of a new National American Council for the co-ordination of patriotic and civic work and to promote patriotism and good citizenship, was held in the city of Washington on the 15th of May, the convention having been called by a national committee representing sixteen organizations, including the Sons of the American Revolution, with Past President General Louis Annin Ames as the representative of the Society.

Representatives of about eighty civic and patriotic organizations participated in the organization sessions of the convention, which were presided over by Dr. David Jayne Hill, a Past President of the District of Columbia Society, Sons of the American Revolution. These organizations are said to have a membership of nearly five million persons. The Council, it is believed, will not create new machinery, but will endeavor to so co-ordinate the existing agencies that they will present a solid front in working for American ideals and against America's enemies.

The National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, was represented at the convention by Secretary General Philip F. Larner. The first annual meeting of the new organization will be held in New York in May.

EVENTS IN THE STATE SOCIETIES.

The **Arizona Society** held its twenty-fifth annual business meeting on February 22, 1921. Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read and received. The Society adopted the Kentucky Society's form of resolution for the control of immigration.

The election of officers to serve for the coming year resulted in the unanimous choice of the following: President, H. B. Wilkinson; Vice-President, Lloyd B. Christy; Secretary, Harold Baxter; Treasurer, Kenneth G. Freeland; Registrar, Clarence P. Woodbury; Historian, Rt. Rev. J. W. Atwood; Chaplain, Rev. J. Rockwood Jenkins; National Trustee, Clay F. Leonard.

The twenty-fourth annual dinner of the Society was held at the Woman's Club, Phoenix, Arizona, on February 23, 1921. There were present 37 members and guests. Compatriot Frederick W. Perkins presided as toastmaster, and the program for the evening included the installation of the newly elected officers.

The **California Society** offered prizes to pupils of the high schools of the State for the three best essays on "The Effect of the American Revolution on British Colonial Policies."

SAN DIEGO CHAPTER held a dinner on February 22, with members of the local Chapter of the D. A. R. in attendance. The San Diego compatriots are working hard to build up this Chapter, which is the only one in the State Society.

The **Connecticut Society**. Compatriot Herbert H. White has been elected President to fill the unexpired term of Hon. Morgan G. Bulkeley, who resigned on account of poor health.

The **Delaware Society**, under the enthusiastic management of Secretary-Treasurer-Registrar Chas. A. Rudolph, has recently come forward with a most encouraging effort in the presentation of twenty-four new applications for membership. It looks very much as if Delaware will give some other State a run for the Banner this year.

The **District of Columbia Society** held its regular Ladies' Night meeting on January 20, the address of the evening being delivered by Hon. Albert Johnson, member of the Washington State Society. The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, at its Congress in May, 1920, voted to erect a suitable memorial at Plymouth, Mass., in honor of General James Warren, as its share in the permanent improvements there to commemorate the 300th Anniversary of the Landing of the Pilgrims. (See page 163 of the 1920 Year Book.)

The Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, as its part, has reproduced the Old Revolutionary Powder House, on Burial Hill, Plymouth, the original of which was built in 1770. For details as to this, reference is made to page 11 of the October BULLETIN.

Our sister Society, the Daughters of the American Revolution, plans to erect a memorial fountain in Plymouth, to cost \$25,000, and other National Societies are also planning to do some commemorative work there. While we cannot compete with the D. A. R., it is planned to put up a dignified memorial to General Warren.

He was born in Plymouth in 1726; was a member and President of the Provincial Congress in 1775, and in the same year became Paymaster-General of the Revolutionary Army. He married Mercy, the sister of James Otis. As a son of Plymouth and a Revolutionary hero of distinction, it is eminently fitting that our National Society should honor him.
