PRESIDENT GENERAL'S LETTER TO COMPATRIOTS.

BALTIMORE, October 7, 1908.

COMPATRIOTS: A year ago your President General addressed you a letter telling briefly of the work then in contemplation by the National Society, and the Society's most urgent needs.

The months since then have been busy ones for your officers and committees; the work then outlined to be done among immigrants has been actively prosecuted; a new circular has been issued for the benefit of those contemplating acquiring citizenship by naturalization; legislation for the better protection of the national flag has been advanced, and greater respect for the national anthem has been secured.

The apparent slow, but steady, decline in our membership which had been observed for several years has not only been checked, but there is

now a steady advance. This appeared in the number of members reported by the State Societies at the Congress in Buffalo; and the registration of new members admitted from May I to October I is numerically greater than during the corresponding period last year Notwithstanding this favorable turn, our membership is still far below what it should be. Individual work on the part of each of our members still remains our most urgent need. The next three months should be the most favorable portion of the year for this work. Will you not individually and collectively, do your utmost?

OFFICIAL BULLETIN

Our Society has passed the experimental stage of its existence; it has demonstrated that it has a reason for its being; it has found that there is work for it to do; and it is doing that work as far as its means permit. The Sons of the American Revolution has won and been accorded recognition as a national institution, not as an historical or genealogical association, but as a patriotic organization. The personnal of the Society forms a roll of which any may well be proud, including two Presidents of the United States, cabinet officers, men renowned in diplomacy, high officials in large number in both the army and navy, statesmen, and men prominent in professional and mercantile life throughout the length and breadth of our land.

The opportunities for effective patriotic work are opening on every hand, but we are held back by the lack of a membership of adequate proportions. It lies with each one of you to remove this bar to our progress. Give us more than your good wishes; give us your active. personal interest and aid.

OFFICIAL NOTICES.

The Executive Committee announces that through the generosity of a member of the Society, a full-sized gold insignia of the Society is offered to the State Society which, during the year ending April 30, 1900, shall, in proportion to its numerical size, enroll as members the largest number of sons of present members.

The "Traveling Banner," presented to the National Society by the Colorado Society, will be awarded at the next annual Congress to the State Society of one hundred members or more, that shows the largest percentage of increase in members during the year ending April 30, 1909.

The twentieth annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, will be held in the City of Baltimore, April 30, and May 1, 1909.

There will shortly be issued to the Secretaries of State Societies blanks calling for information as to the work accomplished by each Society since its organization. Secretaries of State Societies are requested to have these reports made as full and returned as promptly as possible.

The National Year Book is nearly completed and will soon be mailed, as ordered by the Buffalo Congress and the Executive Committee, to the General Officers, Trustees, National Committees, officers of State Societies, and Delegates to the Congress. There will be no distribution to States in bulk as heretofore. The present Year Book includes the names and records of 186 actual sons of patriots of the Revolution who have been registered since April 30, 1889.

The United States Government now furnishes white marble headstones for marking the graves of soldiers or sailors of the Revolution and other wars; delivered at the nearest railroad station free of charge. Information concerning these headstones and inscriptions thereon, and the nature of proofs of service required, may be obtained by correspondence with the Quartermaster General, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C.

State Societies, Chapters and individual members are urged to continue and increase their efforts to add to the membership of the Society.

PROCEEDINGS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, SEPTEMBER 26, 1908.

A meeting of the Executive Committee, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Hotel Belmont, New York City, at 1.30 p. m., September 26, 1908.

Present: President General Stockbridge who presided, Mr. McClary, Mr. Beardsley, Commander Moore, Dr. Parker, Mr. Richardson, and the Secretary General. Regrets were received from Mr. Marble, who was unable to attend.

The minutes of the meeting held May 2 in Buffalo, printed in the OFFICIAL BULLETIN for May, 1908, were approved.

The President General, acting under authority granted by the Executive Committee at its meeting of May 2, reported that he had communicated with the American Federation of Musicians and other organizations of musicians and with about fifty publishers of music throughout the country urging them to omit from all medlevs played by bands or orchestras, "The Star Spangled Banner" or strains taken from it, and to encourage on all appropriate occasions, the rendering of the national anthem as a separate and distinct feature. Favorable replies were being received from several publishers. The American Federation of Musicians at its convention in St. Louis, May II-16, 1908, adopted a resolution requesting the leaders of all bands and orchestras to comply with this suggestion. The Federation also adopted a resolution requesting the Sons of the American Revolution to use all patriotic means to have restored to common use, especially in text books of the public schools, the third stanza of the Star Spangled Banner (beginning "And where is that band," etc., etc.,) and to preserve intact the national anthem as it was written by Francis Scott Kev.

On motion the Committee voted that expression of appreciation of the Federation's action be communicated to that organization.

A letter was received from Thomas R. Shipp, Secretary of the National Conservation Commission, requesting that the proper officer be designated to receive material with reference to the conservation of the country's natural resources, in which the Sons of the American Revolution might be interested. Secretary General Clark was designated to receive communications from this Commission.

Acting on a letter from a compatriot concerning the proper location of statues of John Paul Jones and John Barry, in the city of Washington, it was voted that the Executive Committee express to the Secretary of War the hope that the statues be not placed in Franklin Square, but that a more eligible or suitable site be selected such as the Naval Observatory circle.

Reports were received from Dr. Guyer, Chairman of the Committee on Organization in the West and Major Tebbetts, Chairman of the Committee on Organization in the South, showing progress in the formation of new societies in New Mexico, North Dakota, Mississippi, Georgia, and South Carolina. Acceptable papers have been filed in considerable number by applicants in these States.

The Secretary General announced that three hundred new members had been registered since May I, showing an increase over the registration during the same period last year.

Dr. Parker, chairman, reported for the Committee on Local Chapters, that information was being gathered as to the present condition of the Chapters in the several States. In view of the importance of this work it was voted that Mr. McClary and Commander Moore be added to this committee, and the Committee was requested to present definite recommendations, if possible, for consideration at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

The President General submitted for consideration a series of questions to be sent to State Societies, calling for information as to work

accomplished by them since their organization. The form of questions was adopted and ordered to be printed and communicated to State Secretaries.

Commander Moore, Chairman of the Committee on Information for Aliens, reported that leaflet number two, entitled Naturalization of Aliens in the United States, telling in simple language, How to Become Citizens, What is Required, and Rights and Duties, had been printed in English in an edition of fifteen thousand copies. Arrangements were being made for its translation into various languages and its general distribution.

It was voted that mention be made in the next Official Bulletin of leaflets numbers one and two on information for aliens and the methods of their distribution.

The Secretary General reported that in compliance with direction of the Buffalo Congress, standard blank forms for State Society reports had been prepared and issued and that voucher blanks had been distributed to State Treasurers for use in payment of accounts to the National Society.

It was voted that the printing of official notices be continued in future numbers of the Official Bulletin.

The President General was requested to prepare a special letter to members of the Society for publication in the October issue of the Official Bulletin.

The Secretary General reported that, under authority granted by the Buffalo Congress, the Official Bulletin for May had been distributed to all members of the Society by mail direct from Washington, and that future numbers would be distributed in the same manner without expense to State Societies or to members.

An appropriation not to exceed one hundred dollars was voted for the use of the Flag Committee, General Vincent, chairman, for printing and other necessary expenses. It was announced that the Flag Committee would use every effort to secure the enactment by the House of Representatives, of Senate Bill 565, passed May 20, 1908, to prevent and punish the desecration, mutilation, or improper use of the flag of the United States of America.

The Committee then, at 6.30 o'clock, adjourned.

INFORMATION FOR ALIENS.

The Committee on Information for Aliens has, after many difficulties, had translated the leaflet, "Information for Immigrants Concerning the

United States," into the following languages: Italian, Polish, Yiddish, Magyar, Slovinian, Slovak, Croatian, Swedish, Greek, Bohemian German, Norwegian-Danish and Lithuanian, and they are now ready for distribution.

Many copies in Italian and Polish have been distributed and requests for copies in the other languages have commenced to come in. The pamphlet has been adopted in several of our large cities for use in their night schools, and could be used to advantage in all public night schools where so many foreigners are being educated.

Leaflet No. 2, "Naturalization of Aliens, How to Become Citizens What is Required, Rights and Duties," has been printed in English and submitted to the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor for its approval and adoption. A few thousand copies have been distributed It is hoped that the Department will shortly adopt it, when it will he translated into the same languages as No. I leaflet.

It is earnestly requested that compatriots will interest themselves in the distribution of these leaflets where they will do the most good Applications for copies to Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N., 1755 P Street, Washington, D. C., will receive prompt attention. There is no charge whatever for furnishing or delivering these leaflets.

DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY on September 3 celebrated the 125th anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Paris by holding a banquet at the Hotel St. Francis, San Francisco, when addresses were delivered by U. S. Senator George C. Perkins on "The Navy in Time of Peace." and Rev. William Rader on "Conservation of the World's Peace."

A local Chapter was organized at Los Angeles on May 18. Col. A. S. Hubbard was present from San Francisco as the representative of the State Society. As the city and county has a population of four hundred thousand, much is expected of this new local organization.

The Society has issued a pamphlet containing the Constitution, Byraws, and roster of members corrected to May II, 1908, and information for applicants and new members.

THE COLORADO SOCIETY has enrolled 36 new members since the Ruffalo Congress. A number of these, resident in New Mexico, will, at an early day, organize a new State Society. At Greeley, Colo., an enthusiastic Chapter is being formed.

On June 13 the Society presented to the City of Denver a United States flag for use on the new auditorium, an address on "The Flag" being delivered on that occasion by Compatriot J. F. Tuttle, Jr.

In a circular issued to Colorado members, calling upon them to do their utmost to secure new members, President Howard T. Vaille says:

"You are proud of the part which your ancestor or ancestors took in fighting for liberty, and the principles for which they hazarded their lives and property are dear to you. The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is a patriotic organization. It has justified its existence in the past, and we intend that it shall in the future. There is a growing work for us to do, by reason of the large foreign immigration, which, at the rate of 1,300,000 per annum, is coming to America, thousands of the immigrants finding their way to Colorado. These new arrivals, for the most part, will make splendid citizens-in fact, many of them are more American in spirit today than some of our own citizens. The growth of anarchy and of socialism and the increasing disregard of law must be checked by the inculcating of true patriotism. We believe that those of us who have studied historical subjects in our Society meetings have become more intelligent, and, consequently, more patriotic Americans. Our Society, by arousing intelligent patriotism in its own members, makes its members better exponents of patriotism to others. We are going to carry on our work in the future along the same lines as in the past, namely, by the observance of national holidays, by the presentation of flags to public schools, by being ready to express ourselves as a Society in favor of any movement which tends to the welfare of our country, and in any other way which presents itself."

THE CONNECTICUT SOCIETY ON September 3 held a field day, the first of its kind, at Savin Rock near New Haven. A dinner at the Hotel St. Lawrence, a feature of the day, was presided over by Lewis B. Curtis, President of the Society. The speakers included Governor R. S. Woodruff; Gen. George H. Ford, who delivered an historical address on the British raid on New Haven; Senator Stiles Judson, Mayor Edward W. Hooker, ex-Treasurer General Birdseye, and Col. N. G. Osborn. In his address Senator Judson said:

"We are living in an era of large movements, and matters of sentiment are often lost sight of. There is an enormous influx of foreign population to our shores, and these people do not understand or know of our traditions. We may feel a special pride in the Revolutionary heroes, and back of them in the handful of colonists which settled Connecticut. Luminous was the beacon light streaming forth from the New England coast. But today the light is even more effulgent, due to the efforts of these same early settlers.

"Let us apply in our own political careers the spirit which animated our forefathers. Let the rights they handed down to us, which we have allowed to slip from us, be restored. Let us not disgrace our ancestors by apathy. Let us not give to professional politicians the rights our forefathers gave to us. Remember our New England manhood and right will prevail."

THE HAWAIIAN SOCIETY ON June 17 celebrated the anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and the thirteenth anniversary of the founding of that Society, by a banquet at the University Club, Honolulu. As guests of the Society were Secretary of the Interior James R. Garfield, on an official visit to the Islands; Governor Frear, Territorial Secretary Mott-Smith, Captain Harber, of the U. S. S. Maine; Captain Veeder, of the U. S. S. Alabama, and Major Dunning, of the Twentieth U. S. Infantry. Toasts to the President, the Army, and the Navy were responded to by Secretary Garfield, Major Dunning, and Captain Harber, and a toast to Our Forefathers by Compatriot Peter Cushman Jones. President Effinger presided and Justice Ballou was toastmaster.

Following the banquet the annual business meeting of the Society was held, at which reports were read and the following officers, all of Honolulu, were elected for the ensuing year:

President, George Robert Carter; Vice-President, Dr. Chas. Bryant Cooper; Secretary, Lyle A. Dickey: Treasurer, Robert James Pratt; Registrar, Hon. Sidney M. Ballou. THE IOWA SOCIETY, "believing that a careful study of American history is the best preparation for the duties coming with citizenship," has given to the colleges and universities of that State maintaining a department of history, appropriate bronze medals to be awarded each year to the student doing the best work in that department of study. Twelve such medals were awarded at the close of the last educational year to students in as many cities, the medal competed for in the Iowa Agricultural College, at Ames, being won by Vincente Ferriols, a Filipino. This year twenty-five institutions have been given authority to make similar awards.

An enthusiastic letter from E. R. Hutchins, President, is printed in "The Old Continental," published monthly by the Iowa Society in Des Moines, urging every member of the seven chapters now in that State to renewed effort in increasing membership to better further the objects of the Sons of the American Revolution, and to retain the traveling banner won last year. The Chapters and their Presidents are as follows:

Alexander Hamilton Chapter, Chariton, Col. Warren Scott Dungan; Ben Franklin Chapter, Des Moines, Elbridge Drew Hadley; Bunker Hill Chapter, Waterloo, Julian W. Joseph Henry Merrill; Washington Chapter, Ames, Herman Knapp; Woodberry Chapter, Sioux City, John Church Cushing Hoskins, (Vice-President).

The Louisiana Society celebrated the Fourth of July by decorating the tombs of Revolutionary patriots in the Old St. Louis Cemetery at New Orleans. First the assembly call was sounded at the tomb of Miguel Dragon, where Thomas Dabney Dimitry, State Secretary of the Society, and a lineal descendant of the Revolutionary hero before whose tomb he stood, read a brief eulogy recalling the services of Miguel Dragon as sergeant and lieutenant in the army of Galvez, the Spanish Governor of Louisiana. Mention was made of the service rendered by the Spanish officer in the campaign against the British by which they were prevented from going up the Mississippi and capturing the Illinois country. The ceremony of unveiling the emblem of the National Society and the raising of the Spanish and United States flags over the tomb followed. The grave was then covered with flowers, conspicuous among which was a wreath tied with buff, white and blue ribbons, the colors of the old Continentals.

Taps were then sounded and the Society marched to the tomb of Michel Fortier, a captain of artillery in the army of Galvez. Mr. Dimitry read the war record of Captain Fortier, covering his services under the Spanish Governor in Louisiana, Alabama, and Florida. The

records show him to have been an officer of the Orleans Volunteers, and his commission, signed by King Charles III of Spain, is still in the possession of Compatriot Alcee Fortier, who is a lineal descendant of the soldier whose memory was honored. Here also Spanish and United States flags were raised and flowers heaped upon the tomb.

A similar ceremony was held at the tomb of Benedict Francois de Pradelles, third lieutenant in the Regiment Royal des Deux Ponts de France, who served under Count de Rochambeau and earned distinction at the siege of Yorktown.

THE MASSACHUSETTS SOCIETY, with the coöperation of the Berkshire Bar Association and others, unveiled at Lanesboro, on August 20, a memorial tablet to Jonathan Smith, "whose calm and sensible speech carried the convention in Boston in 1787 for the ratification by the State of the Federal Constitution." A distinguished company of State officials and Berkshire County citizens was present. The idea of a tablet to perpetuate the memory of Jonathan Smith originated with the Berkshire County Chapter of the Massachusetts Society. Acting Governor Eben S. Draper and former Attorney General Herbert Parker were the principal speakers. Mrs. John M. Stevenson, regent of the Peace Party Chapter, D. A. R., also made a brief address.

The following inscription on copper plate was written by President Eliot, of Harvard:

IN MEMORY OF JONATHAN SMITH,

a plain farmer of Lanesboro, who by a speech full of good sense and good feeling carried the Massachusetts convention, September, 1787-February, 1788, by a vote of 187 to 168, in favor of ratifying the Federal Constitution.

". . . I have lived in a part of the country where I have known the worth of good government by the want of it. . . . I have been a member of the convention to form our State constitution, and had learned something of the checks and balances of power; and I found them all here. . . Take things in time, gather fruit when it is ripe. . . . We sowed our seed when we sent men to the Federal convention; now is the harvest; now is the time to reap the fruit of our labor. . . ."

The Malden Chapter of the Massachusetts Society held its ninth annual dinner on May 23. The speakers were Hon. Louis A. Frothingham, ex-Speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives; Mayor G. L. Richard, Rev. H. J. Kilbourn, ex-Representative George H. Fall, and Melville C. Freeman, Esq. Frank E. Woodward was elected President, and Walter K. Watkins, Historian General of the National Society, was chosen Secretary. Forty-three members and guests were present.

THE EMPIRE STATE SOCIETY has issued a Year Book of 108 pages containing the annual reports of the Secretary, Treasurer, and Registrar; names of present members, and names of members deceased, resigned, transferred, or dropped during the year; addresses at the eighteenth annual banquet and at meetings on February 18 and April 21; and a sermon presented before the Society on February 23.

THE OHIO SOCIETY has published a "Manual and Membership Roll," with lists of officers and members, an account of the last annual meeting of the Society, April 17, suggestions to applicants for membership, the local Constitution and By-Laws, and other information of interest to members.

The Western Reserve Society of Ohio has likewise printed a small pamphlet containing an historical sketch of the National, Ohio, and Western Reserve Societies, their aims, suggestions to applicants for membership, the local Constitution, a list of members, and interesting data as to troops and events in the Revolutionary War.

THE PENNSYLVANIA SOCIETY has adopted a plan of giving an informal luncheon once a month in Pittsburg. Such luncheons were held in August and September, attended by about fifty members, when informal natriotic speeches were made.

THE RHODE ISLAND SOCIETY ON May 30 held its customary Memorial Day exercises at Hopkins Park, Providence, assisted by pupils of the Branch Avenue Grammar School. The program included the placing of a wreath on the statue of Commodore Esek Hopkins and a flag on his grave. Addresses were delivered by ex-Gov. Charles Warren Lippitt, President of the Rhode Island Society, and by Hon. R. B. Burchard, Speaker of the Rhode Island House of Representatives. An essay on Hopkins's Last Days as Commander, translated into Italian by a pupil of the Classical High School, was read before the large number of foreigners present.

On October 3 President Lippitt delivered an address at the dedication of the soldiers and sailors monument at Warren, R. I., in memory of the patriots of that town who have borne arms in the wars of our country.

THE SOUTH DAKOTA SOCIETY is being reorganized and strengthened through the persistent work of the Committee on Organization in the West. Publicity has been given to the work of the Sons of the American Revolution by a number of newspapers in the State.
