LETTER TO STATE SOCIETY PRESIDENTS.

What plan have you in mind to promote the activities of the Sons of the American Revolution?


What suggestion can you make to broaden the influence of the State and National Societies?

The President General has planned visits to most of the State Societies during his term of office in order to arouse the personal interest of every member in the general objects of the organization and in practical patriotic work of present-day importance. He has already arranged for extended trips in October and November to many of the Eastern Societies.

OFFICIAL NOTICES.

The National Year Book for 1916 was completed on September 27. It is sent officially to the General Officers and Trustees, officers of State Societies, one copy to each local Chapter, delegates attending the Newark Congress, chairmen of National Committees, and to about 100 public libraries. In response to the notice in the June OFFICIAL BULLETIN and by postal card of June 7, subscriptions for 430 additional copies were received, as required, before August 1, from State Societies, Chapters, and individual members. The Secretary General holds a few remaining copies for sale at 75 cents each, in paper covers, or \$1.00, cloth bound, postpaid. The book is of 355 pages, containing a list of the General Officers and of National Committees for 1916; the National Charter; Constitution and By-Laws; list of officers of State Societies and local Chapters; the Proceedings of Newark Congress, May 15, 16; addresses at the banquet, May 16; minutes of meetings of Trustees and

Executive Committee, and pedigrees of members enrolled from May 16, 1915, to April 30, 1916.

THE FLAG COMMITTEE has been increased in membership by the addition of Rear Adm. George W. Baird, U. S. N., Washington, D. C., and Lieut. Col. M. W. Wood, U. S. A., Boise, Idaho.

SIGNERS' MEMORIAL BOOK.

A joint committee of three members on the part of the Sons of the American Revolution and three from the Descendants of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence has in preparation a memorial volume to the Signers, to be published under the joint auspices of the two organizations. The joint committee is as follows: R. C. Ballard Thruston, Mr. A. Howard Clark, and Col. George A. Elliott, of the Sons of the American Revolution, and Mr. Charles Thornton Adams, Mr. Gordon Woodbury, and Judge Albert McClellan Mathewson, of the Descendants of the Signers. All the thirteen members of the National Memorial Committee of the Sons of the American Revolution will participate in the undertaking. It is expected that the joint committee will meet in November and be ready to report definite progress.

The Constitution of the Guard is published in the 1916 National Year Book, pages 197-199. It provides for a National Commandery, State Commanderies, and Posts. Several State Commanderies and Posts have been organized and others are being formed. Full information may be obtained from John Thornley Neff, Secretary General of the Guard.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES BUILDING.

Some progress has been made toward the early construction of a National Archives Building through the approval by the President, on June 28, 1916, of a law repealing the following clause in the act of March 4, 1913, this clause having delayed the adoption of plans and estimates already prepared:

That before the said designs and estimates are completed inspection shall be made under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury of the best modern national archives buildings in Europe, and consultation shall be had with the best authorities in Europe on the construction and arrangement of archives buildings.

The plans proposed show a building containing 3,000,000 cubic feet of space, with an extension to 8,900,000 cubic feet, and also showing an intermediate capacity which the Department will recommend as absolutely necessary for immediate use. Several sites have been considered and estimates have been prepared of the cost of each. A draft of the legislation necessary for acquiring a site and proceeding with the construction of the building will now be submitted to Congress.

COMMITTEE ON AMERICANIZATION AND ALIENS.

Chancellor L. Jenks has been appointed by the U. S. Bureau of Education a member of a "Committee of One Hundred" to take part in the "America first campaign." The committee is to work to induce 3,000,000 non-English-speaking immigrants to attend night schools and learn the language of this country. The membership of the committee is made up of representatives of the Young Men's Christian Association, American Association of Foreign-language Newspapers, State Superintendents of Instruction, various societies of alien citizens, etc.

The Citizenship Education Committee of the Y. M. C. A. of Honolulu, in co-operation with the Sons of the American Revolution, has published a 12-page pamphlet prepared by Charles F. Clemons, Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Hawaii, entitled "What an Applicant for Naturalization Should Know About Our Government." It is a carefully prepared quiz on the Constitution of the United States

and American history. It is made up of 74 questions, with clearly stated answers to each. Mr. Chancellor L. Jenks, chairman of the National Committee on Americanization and Aliens, states that the quiz is "remarkably good, and its circulation among those who expect to become citizens of the United States would be a work of great value." LAFAYETTE'S BIRTHDAY.

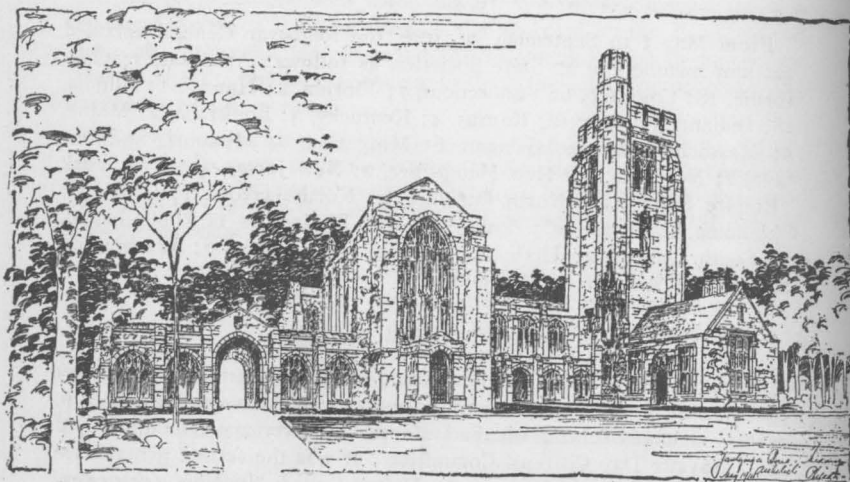
The Sons of the American Revolution in various parts of the country participated in the observance of Lafayette's Birthday on September 6, several members serving on the Lafayette Anniversary Committee and the Lafayette Day Citizens' Committee. It was the second general observance of this anniversary in the United States. In New York exercises were held in the afternoon at the City Hall, under the direction of the Citizens' Committee, and in the evening a banquet was given at the Waldorf-Astoria in honor of Ambassador Jusserand, under the direction of the France-America Society.

MEMORIAL AT VALLEY FORGE.

At historic Valley Forge there is being erected a Washington Memorial Chapel, adjoining which is a Patriots' Hall, Cloister of the Colonies, Historical Museum and Library, and a Thanksgiving Tower, the entire group to cost more than a quarter of a million dollars.

The Memorial Chapel is nearly completed and will be opened for services in November, 1916. Every object in the chapel will be a memorial to those who took part in the building up of our nation. The design of the chapel roof or ceiling furnishes a splendid opportunity

for each State of our Union to be represented by one of the forty-eight panels, on which is to be carved the State coat of arms, while in the floor below will be placed the seal of the State in bronze with the name of person in whose honor the panel and seal are placed. The State Societies of the Sons of the American Revolution should quickly avail themselves of this opportunity to be represented in this Valley Forge Memorial, many panels already having been taken by other Societies and individuals.

The plans for Patriots' Hall and Thanksgiving Tower are completed and provide ample room for meetings of such patriotic societies as desire to assemble at this sacred spot; and in the Museum will be preserved and exhibited the rare relics of the Revolution and other periods of the country's history which have already been gathered here.

Funds to provide for the early erection of the entire group of buildings are being collected and the committee in charge of the work hope for a country-wide interest in the project. Information may be obtained from Rev. W. Herbert Burk, Valley Forge, Pa., or from Col. George A. Elliott, Wilmington, Del., President of the Delaware Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, both of whom are members of the Memorial Chapel Committee.

On October 14 the Society of the Cincinnati, the Sons of the American Revolution, the Sons of the Revolution, the Society of Colonial

Wars, the Order of Founders and Patriots, and the Military Order of Foreign Wars, all of Connecticut, will dedicate a Bay in the Cloister of the Colonies in memory of the Connecticut soldiers who suffered and died at Valley Forge.

DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

The California Society on the evening of June 16 commemorated the Battle of Bunker Hill by giving a dinner and dance at Hale's Pompeian Court, San Francisco. The program included a solo, "The Sword of Bunker Hill," by Mr. Delevan B. Bowley, and an address on "The Significance of Bunker Hill," by Compatriot Thomas B. Dozier.

Flag Day was observed in San Francisco and throughout California by the general display of the "Stars and Stripes," and appropriate exercises were held in many of the public schools.

Under date of August 22 the Society addressed the following notice to principals of high schools:

Hoping to arouse an interest in American history, the California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution offers three prizes of \$25, \$15, and \$10 respectively to the pupils in the high schools of California for the three best essays written on "What Was the Spirit of 1776?"

Essays to contain from nine hundred to eleven hundred words, signed with name of the writer, with name and address on separate paper, and sent to the Secretary of this Society by the principal before January 1, 1917. The Society to retain essays, with the right to publish.

Judges of award are: Henry A. Melvin, Justice of the Supreme Court; Thomas B. Dozier, and Thomas E. Haven of San Francisco.

Objects of the Society are "to inspire among the members * * * and the community at large a more profound reverence for the principles of the government founded by our forefathers; to encourage historical research in relation to the American Revolution."

The Colorado Society undertook a very successful campaign to have every automobile in the State display the Stars and Stripes on Flag Day. Many members of the Society participated in the historical pageant in connection with the celebration of Colorado's fortieth birthday as a State, representing Signers of the Declaration of Independence and other American patriots.

The Connecticut Society held its annual business meeting, at the Hartford Club, at noon, on June 14, when the following officers were elected: President, Capt. Clarence H. Wickham, Hartford; Vice-President, George F. Burgess, New Haven; Secretary, Charles G. Stone, Hartford; Treasurer, Henry C. Sherwood, Bridgeport; Registrar, Fred-

erick Bostwick, New Haven; Historian, Frank B. Gay, Hartford; Chaplain, The Rev. Dr. William De Loss Love, Hartford; Necrologist, Leverett Belknap, Hartford; Auditors, Frederick W. Hall and Samuel F. Beardsley, Bridgeport.

Secretary Stone reported a membership of 1,063. Six hundred dollars had been contributed to the Belgian relief fund. It was announced that the first high-school winner in the prize essay contest was the granddaughter of a German emigrant, and the first grammar-school winner was a Russian girl, who came to this country only five years ago.

Treasurer Henry C. Sherwood of Bridgeport reported a balance on hand of \$1,463.04.

Historian Frank B. Gay read a war-time letter from Governor Jonathan Trumbull to General Gage, the British officer.

A meeting of the Board of Managers preceded the annual meeting. President Lee presided. A. R. Kimball of Waterbury reported that the money for the Connecticut Bay in the Cloister of the Colonies of the Valley Forge Memorial Chapel had been raised.

Dr. George C. F. Williams of Hartford moved that a committee be appointed to confer with the committees of other societies, that all might unite in selecting an inscription. President Lee named as the committee Doctor Williams, Judge Morris B. Beardsley, and Lewis B. Curtis of Bridgeport.

The District of Columbia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution united with the Sons of the Revolution in conducting patriotic exercises at the base of the Washington Monument on the morning of July 4. The chairman of the joint committee was Commander John H. Moore, U. S. N. (retired).

The large audience included many recently naturalized citizens and their families, who had been specially invited, as well as members of several Italian, Greek, Hebrew, and German societies.

The Marine Band furnished a concert program. Gaillard Hunt, President of the Sons of the Revolution in the District of Columbia, presided. The French Ambassador and Mme. Jusserand attended as special guests, and there were also present several members of the cabinet, other members of the diplomatic corps, and many members of Congress.

The order of exercises included: Invocation by Chaplain George Livingston Bayard, U. S. Navy, of the Sons of the Revolution; presentation of the colors; greetings from the Presiding Officer; reading of the Declaration of Independence, by Albion K. Parris of the Sons of the Revolution; address by Associate Justice Ashley M. Gould of the Su-

preme Court of the District of Columbia; addresses for our new citizens by William F. Gude, Esquire, to former Germans; Salvatore Desio, Esquire, to former Italians; Dr. John Constas, to former Greeks; Dr. Leopold Glushak, to former Russian Hebrews.

The Empire State Society held its regular meeting on June 20, at Huntington, L. I., when 28 members were present from New York City, besides those of the local Chapter. The visitors were entertained by the local compatriots and by the Ketewamoke Chapter, D. A. R., at the Huntington Marine and Golf Club for lunch, and afterward on an automobile ride through the country and at receptions at the homes of Compatriot and Mrs. George D. Bangs and of Mr. Wm. J. Mathewson. President Ames told of the work done by the Society and of plans for the future. Addresses were made by compatriot Edward Hagaman Hall, on the early history of Long Island; by Compatriot Douglas Conklin, on the early Colonial history of Huntington; by Mrs. Gilbert Scudder, Regent of Ketewamoke Chapter, D. A. R., on the work of the Daughters of the American Revolution and their co-operation with the S. A. R.; by Compatriot Hon. Cornelius A. Pugsley, on "Preparedness," and by the Rev. J. Jeffrey Johnston, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Huntington, on the history of the early religion in eastern Long Island.

The usual custom of the Society in having a flag placed on the tomb of Lafayette in Paris on the Fourth of July was made a very impressive and important occasion this year. Many prominent officials and men of France and the United States were present, and Premier Briand made glowing tribute to the Americans now fighting for France. The Paris edition of the New York *Herald* reproduced a picture of the ceremony, which was in charge of Compatriot Hanson Cleveland Coxé of the Empire State Society.

The Society had entire charge of the celebration held in Central Park, New York City, on the Fourth of July, and furnished the escort to the speakers at the Stadium and posed the tableau of the Spirit of 1776 at the City College. President Ames was chairman of the Manhattan Safe and Sane Fourth of July City Committee.

The Year Book for 1915-1916 (107 pages), besides the usual interesting account of the work of the year, with patriotic addresses, list of members, etc., contains about a dozen colored illustrations of flags and banners.

THE CORNELIUS VAN DYCK CHAPTER of Schenectady on June 14 presented an American flag to Union College. Many alumni attended the exercises on the campus. Former Governor Myron T. Herrick of Ohio, late Ambassador to France, was the principal guest of the occasion.

County Clerk Moon, President of the Chapter, presented the flag in the name of the Sons of the American Revolution. Doctor Richmond accepted both flag-pole and flag in the name of the college. "They shall not only indicate loyalty, but shall express to us national patriotism, which has its home in every man's breast."

Ambassador Herrick said in part:

The flag which you have just raised means more to us this year than it has meant to us in many years. We have had an expression of patriotism in Europe from which we are drawing new inspiration every day here in America. To many it has seemed we had forgotten that our first obligation is to our country. In Europe we have seen the shedding, like a garment, of all selfishness and the subordination of all personal interest for their country. It is our obligation to prepare to defend that flag, that it may never be lowered in disgrace.

A very successful meeting commemorating Lafayette's Birthday was held on September 6 in the Historical Society rooms. Chas. P. Sanders and others were the speakers. On October 28 President Moon will present the naturalization papers to new citizens admitted by the September term of the Supreme Court. The Chapter has issued attractive folders describing the meetings for 1916-1917 and listing officers and members.

ADIRONDACK CHAPTER, at Hudson Falls, held an interesting meeting in August, when the following officers were elected: President, Willoughby L. Sawyer; Secretary, I. Van H. Gill; Treasurer, Archibald S. Derby.

THE SYRACUSE CHAPTER is arranging, through President Wickes, an interesting and vital program for the year, particularly dealing with the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution and their framers and signers as they relate to the present-day problems and trials of our democracy.

Americanization Day exercises were held at the State Armory under the management of a Citizens' Committee, of which Hon. Newell B. Woodworth was chairman. Special guests included citizens naturalized in June, 1916. Four thousand citizens stood in the great drill hall and pronounced the pledge to the flag. The exercises included music by Syracuse Harmony Orchestra; introductory remarks by the presiding officer, Mr. Woodworth; receiving the colors and pledge to the flag; massing of the colors by patriotic organizations; address of welcome by Mayor Walter B. Stone; address on "The Spirit of America," by Dr. Peter Roberts; address by Gen. Le Vant Dodge; flag drill, and tableaux.

The printed program gave the names of more than a thousand naturalized during the preceding year.

Mayor Stone extended a welcome to the newly naturalized citizens, not only on behalf of the great American Republic, but on behalf of the city of Syracuse, which they have chosen for their home.

Dr. Peter Roberts spoke on "The Spirit of America."

This spirit rests upon the freedom of the individual, the vindication of human rights, and an undivided allegiance to the Republic.

The War of 1812 was fought with Great Britain to establish the right of the individual to make his own choice of citizenship. The Civil War was fought to end forever the inhumanity of slavery. An undivided allegiance to the Republic does not require of every citizen that he forget and put behind him everything connected with the country of his birth, for that is manifestly impossible and unnecessary; but it does mean an unqualified support of the doctrine of "America first in right and in justice, in all things and at all times."

Those who come to us from foreign shores are acquiring an interest in the estate of a rich family, not an impoverished one. The right of participation in that estate carries with it an obligation to observe the laws of the land and a willingness to make sacrifices to preserve these laws and to uphold the Constitution.

Gen. Le Vant Dodge of Kentucky declared that all mankind has placed upon the United States the task of demonstrating that democracy is more than an ideal; that it is real and practicable. The welding of the children of all nations into one American people, with common ideals and common interests, is the task which is now being performed. The success of the experiment, General Dodge declared, rests largely with the conduct of these new citizens who were guests of honor at the celebration. They must necessarily play an important part in this great work, the speaker said.

HUNTINGTON CHAPTER, Huntington, L. I., held its regular meeting on June 5. The new President, Mr. Fred M. Hazzard, presided. Reports of committees showed a new flag-pole had been erected at the new Town Hall at an expense of fifty dollars; also eight essays had been received in competition for medals offered by the Society. Members were appointed to serve on the following State Committees: Patriotic Legislation Committee, Patriotic Educational Committee, Historical Committee, Recruiting Committee, Standard Bearers to serve on State Color Guard.

NEWBURGH CHAPTER held its summer meeting on the evening of June 21, at the invitation of Samuel L. Stewart, President, at Brookside Farms, and was well attended. It was preceded by a dinner. Compatriot Stewart reported as delegate to the Twenty-seventh Annual Congress at Newark. The Chapter took a leading part in the Independence Day celebration at Washington's Headquarters. A., patriotic exercises were held at the Palace Grounds, Honolulu, on the morning of July 4. Hon. Sanford B. Dole presided. The program included reading of the Declaration of Independence by Mr. C. C. Bitting, address by Judge Horace W. Vaughan, and patriotic music.

The Indiana Society.—Secretary S. S. Miller having been called into military service, he has been succeeded by Edward J. Bennett, 1023 N. Delaware street, Indianapolis.

The Iowa Society on September 13 made to the following colleges of Iowa its tenth offer of bronze history medals for the best work in the history of the United States: Iowa State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts, Ames; Iowa State University, Iowa City; Iowa Wesleyan College, Mount Pleasant; Upper Iowa University, Fayette; Drake University, Des Moines; Central College, Pella; Iowa State Teachers' College, Cedar Falls; Cornell College, Mount Vernon; Grinnell College, Grinnell; Morningside College, Sioux City; Leander Clark College, Toledo; Des Moines College, Des Moines; Tabor College, Tabor; Ellsworth College, Iowa Falls; Coe College, Cedar Rapids; Penn College, Oskaloosa; Simpson College, Indianola; Highland Park College, Des Moines.

The six institutions first above named have been constant from the first in their acceptance of the offer. In the nine years just passed 136 college medals have been awarded and given to students in these higher institutions of learning. Medals of different design have, in the meantime, been awarded through the gift of individual compatriots to 154 winners in high schools; in all 290 medals, to promote the study of the country's history and in the hope of stimulating patriotism.

The Kentucky Society on September 16 lost one of its most prominent members, Gen. Basil Wilson Duke. The following tribute to his memory appeared in a Louisville paper:

It is impossible to speak of General Duke in terms of moderation, for his boundary was of such large dimension. His courage, his kindness, his reading, his memory, his humor, his every faculty, native and acquired—rare, indeed, could be found his equal. Like all strong men,

he had his friends and his enemies. To all he was as open as the day. In his death there is lost so much that was noble, so much that was constant in opposition to all that is ignoble, so much that inspired admiration, so much that was an example of upright thinking and of upright living, so much that contributed to our "stock of harmless pleasure." Neither his family nor his friends can mourn for him as one whom they have lost, for he will live in their memory—a memory that will be a storehouse out of which will come nothing of evil, only good. For him what epitaph so speaks the truth as "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

The Maine Society.—At a meeting of the Board of Councillors, on September 16, Rev. William G. Mann of Westbrook was elected Chaplain. Vice-President General Philip F. Turner of Portland, Me., represented the National Society at the Fairbanks Family Association meeting at Dedham, Mass., in August.

The Massachusetts Society has appointed a School Republics Committee to promote the introduction of the school republic method of moral and civic training in all the public schools of the State. This system has been successfully carried out in many cities of the country under the direction of Mr. Wilson L. Gill, formerly a member of the Sons of the American Revolution. The Massachusetts Society Committee consists of George H. Nutting, chairman; James C. Peabody, Vernon A. Field, Frank E. Woodward, *ex officio*; Lieut. Col. Charles M. Green, Treasurer of School Republics Fund.

The Society Field Day will be held at Plymouth on October 12.

THE FRANCIS LEWIS CHAPTER of Walpole.—Members of the recently organized Post of The Washington Guard celebrated July 4 by taking part in a street parade and with exercises and a banquet at the "Armory," the home of President Isaac Newton Lewis. Two of the young men of the Francis Lewis Post of The Washington Guard are in the service of their country—Capt. Edward A. Lewis, U. S. Army, and Lieut. Harold F. Lewis, U. S. Navy.

THE OLD ESSEX CHAPTER of Lynn held its twenty-first annual meeting at the Associates Camp, Swampscott, on April 14. Col. James Morgan, "Uncle Dudley" of the Boston *Globe*, gave a talk on the "Tercentenary Celebration of the Landing of the Pilgrims." The Chapter numbers 220 members. The following officers were elected: President, Charles Frederic Smith; Vice-Presidents, Henry Fuller Tapley and Webster Bruce; Secretary, Luther Atwood, 8 Sagamore street; Treasurer, Henry Morris Kelley, 20 Sagamore street; Historian, Charles Howard Bangs, M. D.; Chaplain, Rev. Frederic Williams Perkins, D. D.

The Nebraska Society has elected as its Secretary Mr. Addison E. Sheldon, Legislative Reference Bureau, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, to succeed Secretary Clarence S. Paine, who died on June 14. Compatriot Paine, as Secretary of the State Society and former President of the Lincoln Chapter, was one of the most earnest and efficient members of the organization. He was 48 years of age. Stricken with pneumonia, his illness was of only five days' duration. A wife and four children survive him. Mr. Paine was secretary of the Nebraska State Historical Society and of the Mississippi Valley Historical Society. He was splendidly equipped for historical work, and the Nebraska Society has become strong and influential through his efforts. He was a member of the Lincoln Rotary Club, the Knights of Pythias, and Elks. As a member of the Sons of the American Revolution, his services were always at the command of his compatriots.

The New Hampshire Society on June 13 held its annual meeting in the State Senate Chamber at Concord, when Rev. Dr. Chalmers delivered an address on "The Effect of the Revolution on Religion." Compatriot Isaac Walker, a real son of a Revolutionary soldier, sat on the platform. Officers elected were: President, Franklin W. McKinley, Manchester; Vice-Presidents, Harry T. Lord of Manchester, Henry H. Metcalf and Gen. J. N. Patterson of Concord; Secretary-Treasurer, Howard F. Hill, Concord; Registrar, Charles C. Jones, Concord; Historian, William F. Whitchee, Woodsville; Chaplain, Rev. Lucius Waterman, D. D., Hanover.

The New Jersey Society.—The holding of the Annual Congress at Newark aroused deep interest in the work of the Society throughout the State. There are nine local Chapters fully organized and others in process of formation.

Rev. William Force Whitaker, D. D., former Chaplain General of the National Society, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Elizabeth, passed away in his sleep on July 9. He was born in Southhold, L. I., and was in his fifty-fifth year. Doctor Whitaker was a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and of the Union Theological Seminary, of which he was a director at the time of his death. He was an authority on the history of New York and New Jersey and had made a number of addresses on that subject. Doctor Whitaker was unmarried and is survived by his mother, 84 years old, and his father, 94 years old, the Rev. Dr. Ephraim Whitaker, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Southhold.

The National Society was officially represented at the funeral by Vice-President General T. W. Williams.

At the request of President General Wentworth, a committee consisting of Newell B. Woodworth, chairman; David L. Pierson, Thomas W. Williams, John H. Burroughs, and C. Symmes Kiggins has prepared a fitting tribute to the memory of Doctor Whitaker for publication in a memorial volume which the church at Elizabeth has in preparation.

PARAMUS CHAPTER met at Ridgewood, at the home of its President, Judge Cornelius Doremus, on the evening of June 16. Reports were received on the activities of the Chapter, and upon the recommendation of the Committee on Monuments and Memorials the placing of markers on the graves of Revolutionary soldiers, buried in the following places, was authorized: Arcola, Bergenfields, Closter, Demarest, and Hackensack.

The Committee on National Preparedness presented the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That Paramus Chapter, No. 6, New Jersey Society, S. A. R., hereby expresses its belief in a system of preparedness as a measure to insure peace, and that it pledges its support to any reasonable plan for that purpose which may be adopted, and that it recommends to the Legislature, State of New Jersey, and to the Congress of the United States the adoption of some effective plan.

After the business session, the guest of the evening, Mr. H. B. Goetschins of Hackensack, and a former President of the Bergen County Historical Society, spoke on the "Growth of the Republican Idea in Europe." He sketched the growth and history of the early republics, so called, and pointed out the fact that they were not really as we understand the term. It was not until the foundation of this republic on American soil that it was admitted that the source of power resided in the individual. Leading his hearers up through the successive steps which were taken, often blindly, in the struggles that were made for more rights until the day of equal rights for all men dawned, the speaker showed what immeasurable blessings the citizens of this the first real republic enjoy. It was a most effective plea for enlightened patriotism. Mr. Goetschins sees danger signs ahead, however, most strikingly, he thinks, in the declining interest manifested in religious affairs—the increasing tendency to ignore a higher power than the human power in government.

On July 2 a patriotic service was held at the First Reformed Church, attended by the Paramus Chapter and other patriotic societies.

The address was delivered by the Rev. J. A. Van Neste, who took as his text Psalm xlv: 3: "For they got not the land in possession by their own sword, neither did their own arm save them; but thy right hand, and thine arm, and the light of thy countenance, because thou

hadst a favor unto them." It was an appeal for recognition of God's hand in the birth and development of this Nation and for adherence to the moral and religious principles on which it was founded and which have been eloquently set forth by its poets and hymn-writers.

The Rhode Island Society observed Lafayette's Birthday, on September 6, with exercises at the monument to "Our French Allies in the Revolution" in the North Burying Ground, Providence. The invocation was by Rev. Charles Fremont Roper, Chaplain of the Society.

President Frederick Dickman Carr delivered a short address, and also read the General Order issued by President Andrew Jackson, on June 21, 1834, to the Army and Navy of the United States on the death of General La Fayette.

Chaplain Charles Fremont Roper delivered an address and eulogized the French General for the services which he rendered to the struggling Americans during the War of the Revolution.

The Society furnished a floral piece, made of the colors of the S. A. R., in form of the rosette.

Under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution, the celebration of Independence Day by the city of Providence was held at the Opera House on the morning of July 4. Seats were reserved for newly naturalized citizens, and at the completion of the exercises they were given a reception by the speakers and committee. The program included: Prayer by Rev. Thomas J. O'Connor; introduction by Adj. Gen. Charles W. Abbot, Jr., ex-President of the Rhode Island Society; reading of the Declaration of Independence by Grace H. E. Foley of the Oxford Street School; solo, "Star Spangled Banner," by Mrs. Olive B. Schleicher, the audience standing and repeating Pledge to Flag—"I pledge allegiance to my flag, and to the republic for which it stands. One nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all"; letter from His Excellency R. Livingston Beekman, Governor of Rhode Island; address by His Honor Joseph H. Gainer, Mayor of Providence, and address by Rev. Edward Holyoke, D. D.

The General Laws of Rhode Island, Chapter 349, Section 31, provide that "any person not a member, respectively, of the Society of the Cincinnati, Society of Sons of the American Revolution, Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution [and about fifteen other organizations], who shall use or wear, respectively, the name, badge, decoration, insignia, button, or rosette thereof, unless he or she shall be entitled to use or wear the same respectively, under the Constitution and By-Laws or rules and regulations of said societies or orders respectively, shall be fined twenty dollars for each offense."

The Tennessee Society has begun a propaganda for a more general display of the American flag on public buildings, school-houses, office buildings, hotels, etc., in Nashville and throughout the State. A news story stated that on one day in May last only two flags were seen flying in the entire city of Nashville.

The Utah Society held a banquet at the Alta Club, Salt Lake City, on the evening of Tuesday, June 27, when the guest of honor was President General Elmer M. Wentworth.

During the banquet Governor Spry acted as toastmaster, and Attorney General Albert R. Barnes, President of the Utah Society, gave the introductory toast. Mayor W. Mont Ferry spoke to "Preparedness for War," and George Albert Smith had "Preparedness for Peace" as his subject. C. C. Goodwin made an address. Former President Heber M. Wells was presented with the ceremonial badge of the Society.

When the time came for the Governor and other officials present to bid adieu to members of Battery A, bound for the Mexican border, a recess was taken. The Governor, the Mayor, and other officials invited General Wentworth and the other diners to join them in greeting the troops.

After the farewell demonstration had concluded, the party returned to the club and the program of after-dinner speeches began. It concluded with all present taking the oath of allegiance to the United States, administered by the Governor, as it is taken by the guardsmen.

In the course of his address Mr. Wentworth told of the aims of the Society and outlined the work of the year. He said in part:

The Sons of the American Revolution is not a mutual admiration society. It is non-partisan, non-sectarian, non-controversial. It has as its aim the promotion of patriotism whenever and wherever possible.

It is a society made up of descendants of those sturdy forefathers of ours, and who inherit the spirit and energy of these latter. Those ancestors of ours proved their faith by their works. Emulating their example, the Sons of the American Revolution have shown themselves leaders of men, devoted to whatever movement might advance the common welfare.

Presidents McKinley and Roosevelt and Taft and presidential candidate Hughes have been affiliated with the Society.

Our Society stands for a high degree of patriotism and demands that every man enjoying the privileges of American citizenship shall perform the duties of citizenship. It believes that all men becoming citizens, either through the naturalization of their parents or otherwise, should feel called upon to take such an oath as that imposed upon the soldiers of this country. The oath follows:

"I solemnly swear before the Almighty God to bear true faith and allegiance to the United States of America; to defend them against all invasion whatsoever, foreign or domestic; to obey all orders of the constituted authorities, and to be faithful to the end."

The Utah Society participated on July 4 in the naturalization ceremonies at Liberty Park, Salt Lake City, when final papers were given to more than thirty citizens. Addresses were made by Governor Spry, Mayor Ferry, George Albert Smith, W. H. Folland, and others, and by representatives of several British, Greek, German, Italian, and other societies. Mr. Dickson, who spoke in behalf of the German Harmonie Society, presented three American flags to the Sons of the American Revolution, Daughters of the American Revolution, and Daughters of the Revolution.

The Virginia Society.—Through the efforts of President Arthur B. Clarke and other members of the Sons of the American Revolution, co-operating with other patriotic organizations, Richmond for the first time observed Flag Day, on June 14. In response to the request of a committee, Governor Stuart directed that the flag be displayed on the Capitol from sunrise to sunset. Mayor Ainslie also joined in the celebration and issued a proclamation inviting the citizens of Richmond to show the national colors on their buildings and automobiles.

The show of flags in Richmond was notable. On each side of the City Hall tower a large flag hung from the top window. From most of the hotels and bank buildings and out of windows of other places in the downtown section, as well as in the residential section, the national banner was on display.
