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THE OFFICIAL BULLETIN records action by the General Officers, the Board of Trustees, the Executive and other National Committees, lists of members deceased and of new members, and important doings of State Societies. In order that the OFFICIAL BULLETIN may be up to date, and to insure the preservation in the National Society archives of a complete history of the doings of the entire organization, State Societies and local Chapters are requested to communicate promptly to the Secretary General written or printed accounts of all meetings or celebrations, to forward copies of all notices, circulars, and other printed matter issued by them, and to notify him at once of dates of death of members.

PROCEEDINGS OF FIRST SESSION OF ANNUAL CONGRESS.

The Twenty-eighth Congress of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution was called to order, at Nashville, Tenn., on May 21, 1917, by President General Wentworth.

Present were: Elmer M. Wentworth, President General; R. C. Ballard Thruston, Member of the Advisory Committee, Past President General; Wm. K. Boardman, Vice-President General; State President Rawles of the Arkansas Society; State President Hume of the Tennessee Society; Professor Sioussat, John De Witt, Carey Folk, Delegates of the Tennessee Society.

The President General appointed Wm. K. Boardman as Secretary *pro tem.* of the meeting.

The following resolutions were submitted by R. C. Ballard Thruston, were seconded by State President Rawles of the Arkansas Society, and were unanimously carried:

The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, true to its principles, has so imbued its members and their families with the spirit of patriotic service that when our country entered into the present conflict to preserve the principles of democracy the response to the President's call was practically unanimous. Those of military age rallied to the colors. The older members engaged in the varied patriotic activities which are equally essential to place this nation in position to do its duty to humanity.

Recognizing that attendance at the Annual Congress of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution called to convene at Nashville, Tenn., May 21, 1917, would interfere with the performance by delegates of their higher duty of national service and of preparation for such service, the National Executive Committee recommended to the President General that the Congress should be postponed, and notice thereof was sent to all officers and delegates entitled to representation therein; and

Whereas the Twenty-eighth Congress of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, duly assembled in the city of Nashville this 21st day of May, 1917, is without the requisite number of delegates to constitute a Congress of the said Society for the transaction of business; therefore

Be it resolved, That this Congress do now adjourn to meet in the city of Nashville, State of Tennessee, upon the call of the President General, on the giving of at least three weeks' notice by the Secretary General of this Society of the time designated by the President General.

Adjournment was then taken.

NATIONAL SERVICE BAR.

The Executive Committee has authorized the issuance and presentation to each compatriot who may enlist in the Army or Navy of the United States during the War of 1917 a service bar in the colors of the Sons of the American Revolution, and it is the desire of the National officers that every compatriot so enlisting or now in the service of the nation be presented with and wear this bar, which is in accordance with official regulations. Application should be made through Secretaries of State Societies, stating name, address, and branch of service to which member belongs, the application to be endorsed by the State Secretary and forwarded to the Secretary General.

COUNCIL OF NATIONAL DEFENSE.

It is imperative that the patriotic efforts of the Sons of the American Revolution in connection with the War of 1917 be of the highest efficiency in the national service, avoiding all duplication or overlapping of activities by other organizations. After a careful consideration of many suggested methods through which the Society might render valuable independent service by the appointment of a Sons of the American Revolution War Council, or otherwise, the Executive Committee, at its meeting on May 24, concluded that the best results would follow co-operation with the existing national official body, and it was therefore voted to recommend that State Societies and Chapters operate under the advice and direction of the State Councils and Local Councils formed by the Council of National Defense as organized by act of Congress.

The conditions of modern warfare require thorough co-ordination of national, State, county, municipal, and individual resources and abilities. If democracy is successful to defeat autocracy, broad-minded co-operation of all units is imperative. To this end the Council of National Defense called a conference of State representatives at Washington on May 2 to consider the creation and effective use of State Councils of Defense to act in harmony with the National Council. The following plan for State organization was submitted in the interest of uniformity for the adoption of the States which have not already acted:

I. *Council of National Defense.*—Composed of Secretaries of War, Navy, Interior, Agriculture, Commerce and Labor; created by an act of Congress; aided by a civilian Advisory Commission.

II. *The State Council of Defense.*—The National Council of Defense recommends that the States appoint State Councils of Defense. Each State Council should elect a chairman as its executive head.

The State Councils should co-operate with each other and with the Federal Government in organizing and directing the resources of the State in men and materials, to make them available and effective for

national use, and should recommend changes in the State laws which may become expedient. When the State Council exercises its powers and duties on a given subject at the request of the Council of National Defense, it is suggested that the work should be done in the manner and form prescribed by the National Council.

The following committees were suggested as expedient for appointment in most States: (1) Finance; (2) Publicity; (3) Legal; (4) Coordination of Societies; (5) Sanitation and Medicine; (6) Food Supply and Conservation; (7) Industrial Survey; (8) Survey of Man Power; (9) Labor; (10) Military Affairs; (11) State Protection; (12) Transportation; (13) Local Councils should be organized in such manner as each State Council may determine to extend its activities throughout the State.

The above plan of operations has been adopted in most of the States, and the Sons of the American Revolution should co-operate to the fullest extent with the State and Local Councils and the official committees thus appointed.

LIBERTY LOAN BONDS.

The National Executive Committee on May 24 made a subscription in behalf of the National Society to the Liberty Loan Bonds and directed that notice be issued recommending that State Societies, Chapters, and individual members subscribe for bonds to the full extent of their ability. A number of Societies acted upon the recommendation by thus investing portions of their current or permanent funds. It is estimated that the personal subscriptions of Sons of the American Revolution throughout the country aggregated more than \$50,000,000, while very many millions more of subscriptions were made by establishments under the direction or control of members of the Society.

In a letter from the Treasury Department, dated June 18, the Director of Publicity of the Liberty Loan of 1917 wrote to the Secretary General:

The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution will always be found behind the government when called upon, regarding it as a patriotic privilege and a duty.

AMERICAN RED CROSS.

State Societies and individual compatriots are rendering efficient patriotic service through the contribution of ambulances and auto trucks or other supplies to aid the War Council of the American Red Cross. Among members who are serving as officers in the Red Cross work are

Past Presidents General Thruston of Louisville and Woodworth of Syracuse, chairmen of Red Cross war-relief work in their communities. The National Executive Committee of the Sons of the American Revolution recommends and urges that all State Societies and Chapters co-operate with the War Council of the Red Cross as the official body for war-relief work.

A number of State Societies, including those in New York, New Jersey, Kentucky, Utah, and Ohio, have raised funds for providing ambulances for war service.

LIBERTY STATUE IN PETROGRAD.

The Executive Committee of the "Liberty Fund," of which Compatriot William H. Taft is chairman and Compatriot James W. Wadsworth, United States Senator, is a member, organized by *The New York Herald* and *The American Hebrew*, has inaugurated a movement "to commemorate the emancipation of Russia and the deliverance of oppressed nationalities by the presentation of a Statue of Liberty to the Russian people" and its erection in Petrograd. Further information concerning this worthy project may be obtained from the Secretary General.

AMERICAN MISSION TO RUSSIA.

Compatriot Elihu Root of the Empire State Society is the head of the American Mission to Russia. On June 15 he made a stirring address to the Council of Ministers at Petrograd, in which he said:

For 140 years our people have been struggling with the hard problems of self-government. With many shortcomings, many mistakes, many imperfections, we still have maintained order and respect for law, individual freedom, and national independence. Under the security of our own laws we have grown in strength and prosperity; but we value our freedom more than wealth. We love liberty and we cherish, above all our possessions, the ideals for which our fathers fought and suffered and sacrificed that America might be free.

We believe in the competence of the power of democracy, and in our heart of hearts abides faith in the coming of a better world, in which the humble and oppressed of all lands may be lifted up by freedom to a heritage of justice and equal opportunity.

The news of Russia's new-found freedom brought to America universal satisfaction and joy. From all the land sympathy and hope went out to the new sister in the circle of democracies. And the mission is sent to express that feeling.

The American democracy sends to the democracy of Russia a greeting of sympathy, friendship, brotherhood, god-speed. Distant America knows little of the special conditions of Russian life which must give

form to the government and laws which you are about to create. As we have developed our institutions to serve the needs of our national character and life, so we assume that you will develop your institutions to serve the needs of Russian character and life.

M. Tereshtenko, in response to the address by Mr. Root, expressed great joy in welcoming the commission from America. He said that Russia's revolution was based on the wonderful words uttered by America in 1776. He read part of the Declaration of Independence and exclaimed:

"Russia holds with the United States that all men are created free and equal."

M. Tereshtenko sketched the history of the Russian revolution briefly, saying that the Russians, enslaved for centuries, threw off all the old order, just as the wind blows autumn leaves from the forest. Russia now faces two problems, said the Minister—the necessity of creating a strong democratic force within its boundaries and the fighting of an external foe. Then he declared for war and expressed unbounded confidence in the power of Russia to meet the situation.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, MAY 24, 1917.

A meeting of the National Executive Committee and the Advisory Committee, duly called by order of the President General, was held at the Hotel Martinique, New York City, at 1 o'clock on the afternoon of May 24, 1917. Present: President General Wentworth, presiding; Mr. Newell B. Woodworth, Mr. Albert M. Henry, Mr. John Lenord Merrill, Mr. Lewis B. Curtis, and Mr. Louis Annin Ames of the Executive Committee, Secretary General A. Howard Clark of the Advisory Committee, Treasurer General John H. Burroughs; also, by invitation for conference, Vice-President General Philip F. Turner, Past Presidents General Moses Greeley Parker, M. D., William A. Marble, Morris B. Beardsley, and Cornelius A. Pugsley, and Past President Chauncey P. Overfield of the Utah Society. The minutes of the meeting of November 18, 1916, were approved as printed in the December OFFICIAL BULLETIN.

The President General made a statement with regard to a *pro forma* session of the Annual Congress at Nashville, Tenn., on May 21, when President General Wentworth, Vice-President General Boardman, Past President General Thruston, and a number of others met and adopted resolutions adjourning the Congress to meet at Nashville upon the call of the President General.

The President General also reported on his recent visits to State Societies on the Pacific coast and in the Far West.

The Secretary General reported on the business of his office and presented annual reports from several of the State Societies. The report was accepted and ordered to be filed.

The action of the President General, on March 19, 1917, in authorizing the change in name of the Philippine Society to the Far Eastern Society was approved and ratified.

The Registrar General submitted a statistical report for the Society year ended March 31: The total number of new members enrolled during the year was 1,151 and the total active membership on April 1, 1917, was 14,428. By the addition of 453 new members since April 1 the total active membership on May 15 was 14,881. The growth during the period indicated was greater than at any other time in the Society's history. The largest number of new members during the Society year was enrolled by the New Jersey Society, 175; next, Empire State, 98; Massachusetts, 97; Illinois, 90, and Ohio, 62. On the Pacific coast, California enrolled 59, Washington 43, and Oregon 42. The losses during the year were 290 deaths, 115 resignations, and 239 dropped for non-payment of dues. The report of the Registrar General was accepted and ordered to be filed.

It was voted that the Syracuse Banner be awarded to the New Jersey Society for enrolling the greatest number of new members, and that the Traveling Banner be awarded to the Virginia Society for making the largest percentage of gain in membership.

Treasurer General Burroughs submitted his annual report, showing in detail the receipts and expenditures during the year, signed as "examined and found correct" by the Committee on Auditing and Finance. He also reported on the condition of the Permanent Fund, and Past President General Pugsley of the Investment Committee reported that the report was correct and the securities intact. The reports of the Treasurer General were thereupon accepted and approved and Mr. Burroughs was thanked for the able manner in which he had conducted the business of his office.

The receipts of the year were \$7,988.14, which, added to the balance on May 11, 1916, made a total on May 15, 1917, of \$16,319.17. The disbursements of the year, including the transfer of \$1,001.25 to the Permanent Fund, were \$9,053.78, leaving a balance May 15, 1917, of \$7,265.78, to which may be added \$1,157 for dues received after the account was audited.

It was voted that an uninvested sum of \$282.22 in the Permanent

Fund be increased by the transference from the General Fund of an amount sufficient to purchase a \$1,000 Liberty Loan Bond, making a total investment of \$11,000 in the Permanent Fund.

It was voted to recommend to State Societies, Chapters, and patriots to purchase Liberty Loan Bonds to the extent of their ability and to report the amounts of such purchases to the Secretary General.

A budget of expenses for the maintenance of the Society and carrying on its activities during the present year was discussed and approved and the amounts specified therein, or so much thereof as may be necessary, were appropriated therefor, including printing and distribution of the OFFICIAL BULLETIN, \$2,750; salary and necessary office expenses of the Secretary General and Registrar General, engraving and engrossing of certificates, general printing of stationery, application blanks, etc.; expenses of Secretary General in attendance at committee meetings and Annual Congress; miscellaneous expenses of committees, \$150; for Committee on Americanization and Aliens, \$1,500; for work of Memorial Committee, \$100; allotment toward expenses of President General, and traveling expenses of Treasurer General in attendance at Annual Congress.

It was voted to reimburse the Tennessee Society the sum of \$98.25 expended in preparation for the Annual Congress on account of contribution made by Board of Trustees toward expenses of the Congress of 1917.

The Secretary General, as Secretary of the Memorial Committee, reported progress by the joint committee of Sons of the American Revolution and Society of Descendants of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence in preparation of a memorial volume of the Signers. As nearly as practicable a complete set of copies of wills of the Signers has been obtained and important biographical data have been secured.

Mr. Curtis, chairman, and Mr. Turner and Mr. Williams, vice-chairmen on Organization in the Atlantic States, reported on the condition of State Societies in their jurisdiction. Mr. Henry reported on work in the Mississippi Valley east. President General Wentworth reported on conditions west of the Mississippi, the Mountain States, and the Pacific coast. He stated that during the year he had traveled about 32,000 miles in visiting 26 State Societies and numerous Chapters in States where membership was widely scattered and State meetings could not readily be held. He reviewed local patriotic conditions in certain parts of the country, where the most earnest efforts of the Society should be exerted to counteract present unpatriotic tendencies. He made over 200 addresses before Societies, schools, and colleges throughout the country.

Mr. Ames, chairman of Committee on Patriotic Education, reported on activities, particularly in the public schools of New York, and urged the promotion of actual patriotic service everywhere.

Mr. Merrill, Governor General of the Washington Guard, presented a written report reviewing operations of the year. Many of the young men now enrolled in the Guard have enlisted in their country's service. A military organization within the Washington Guard, under the name of the Washington Guard and the jurisdiction of its officers, has been formed to include Senior Guardsmen (15 to 21) and Guardsmen (10 to 15). The George Washington Post, No. 1, composed of 60 boys, is thus organized at Orange, N. J., and they are being trained in military tactics. This company is equipped with handsome uniforms and is in great demand for civic and patriotic gatherings.

An appropriation of \$50 was voted for promotion of the purposes and objects of the Washington Guard.

Mr. Woodworth reported progress in preparing general regulations for the organization and maintenance of local Chapters. The important influence of Chapters in concentrating local patriotic interest and increasing the Society's membership is becoming more and more evident throughout the country.

Chairman Jenks of the Committee on Americanization and Aliens was unable to attend the meeting of the Executive Committee, but submitted a detailed report of the work accomplished and in contemplation. He particularly urged the importance of teaching prospective Americans to speak, read, and write English, and of making the foreign-born familiar with our laws, customs, and home ideals. The Sons of the American Revolution were the pioneers in educational work on behalf of the aliens, and many other organizations are now following similar lines of activity. Mr. Henry described work among foreigners in Detroit, and emphasized the need of compelling aliens to learn English if they would succeed in their occupations and trades.

It was voted to recommend to the Americanization Committee that hereafter, as new editions of National Society Leaflet No. 1 in foreign languages are needed, they be printed in both English and foreign languages, face to face, in order that aliens may more readily familiarize themselves with the corresponding English expressions.

It was voted that the National Executive Committee urgently request at the present time that all papers published in foreign tongues print also in English such editorials as apply to Federal matters, in order that readers may become familiar with English equivalents on questions of national importance. The committee also recommends that where

church services are usually conducted in foreign languages part of the service at least be given in English.

The Secretary General presented a report from Col. Frederick C. Bryan, chairman of the Committee on National Archives Building in Washington, stating that plans of a building have been approved by the Fine Arts Commission. The plans have been submitted to the Archives Building Commission, of which the President of the Senate, Vice-President Marshall, is chairman, and to him urgent appeals should be made for prompt action. "There never was a time when there was more crying need for a National Archives Building. The present war will so greatly increase archives that should be preserved that immediate provision should be made for that purpose."

The Registrar General was authorized to prepare and furnish to State Societies, at a proper charge, preliminary application blanks for prospective members, similar to some now in use by certain States.

The Registrar General was also authorized to make provision on the standard application blanks for the insertion of the name of wife of applicants.

The Registrar General was also authorized to mail to each new member when entered on the National Society Register a card certificate of his enrollment.

The Executive Committee adopted and ordered to be recorded the following tribute to the memory of Compatriot Dewey, submitted by Rear Admirals Jewell, Baird, and Chester, a committee appointed by the President General:

George Dewey, the Admiral of the Navy, Doctor of Laws, was born at Montpelier, Vermont, December 26, 1837.

He became a member of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in his native State, on November 14, 1892, by right of service of his great-grandfather, William Dewey, as Corporal in Col. Jonathan Chase's New Hampshire Regiment.

He was graduated from the United States Naval Academy as Midshipman in 1858; was commissioned a Lieutenant in the Navy April 18, 1861; was promoted to Commander in 1872, to Captain in 1884, and to Commodore in 1896.

In January, 1898, he assumed command of the Asiatic Squadron, and for his services in Manila Bay on May 1, 1898, he was made a Rear Admiral and received the thanks of Congress. He was promoted to Admiral of the Navy March 2, 1899, in pursuance of a special act of Congress, and from March 29, 1900, until his death he served as President of the General Board of the Navy.

Admiral Dewey was a man of strong personality and courtly manners, untiring in his zeal and love of country, and inflexible in the performance of duty.

The death of Admiral Dewey is deeply mourned by his compatriots in this Society. He leaves the memory of a long life full of patriotic activity. He served his country nobly. His name, his deeds, survive to incite others to do their duty to their country fearlessly and faithfully, in war, in peace, to the very end.

The President General announced that he had appointed committees to prepare resolutions in memory of Ambassador George W. Guthrie and former Vice-President General Thomas M. Anderson, Major General, U. S. Army. [The Anderson tribute appears following these proceedings, and under doings of Pennsylvania Society are given resolutions in memory of Ambassador Guthrie.]

Communications were presented from several committees, associations, and leagues requesting co-operation in connection with national defense and general war work. In order that the influence of the Sons of the American Revolution may be most efficiently exerted without duplication of efforts, it was voted to recommend to State Societies and Chapters to operate under the advice and direction of the State and Local Councils, formed by the Council of National Defense and its Advisory Commission as organized by act of Congress.

Several of the State Societies reported contributions of ambulances to the Red Cross and to the French Ambulance Corps. The Empire State Society has also planned to purchase a Motor Machine-Gun Battery for service in New York State.

It was voted to recommend to State Societies and Chapters to co-operate with the War Council of the American Red Cross as the official body for war-relief work.

It was voted that the Society in France should be reorganized and administered as a Chapter of the Empire State Society.

It was declared to be the sense of the Executive Committee that the adjourned meeting of the Twenty-eighth Annual Congress should be called by the President General at the earliest date practicable after consultation with the Committee on Arrangements and the officers of the Tennessee Society.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the committee then, at 11 p. m., adjourned.

TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF THOMAS M. ANDERSON, MAJOR
GENERAL, U. S. ARMY (RETIRED), PAST
VICE-PRESIDENT GENERAL.

The following tribute to General Anderson, prepared by a committee consisting of three Past Vice-Presidents General appointed by the President General, was received on June 16, 1917:

Thomas McArthur Anderson was born at Chillicothe, Ohio, January 21, 1836. He was a grandson of Clough Anderson, a Lieutenant Colonel in the Virginia Line. His paternal grandmother was a first cousin of John Marshall. He was a nephew of Robert Anderson, defender of Fort Sumter.

Thomas M. Anderson was graduated from Mount St. Mary's College in Maryland in 1855 and from the Cincinnati Law School in 1858. He was admitted to the bar of the State of Ohio in 1858 and was engaged in the practice of his profession on the outbreak of the Civil War. Immediately after the attack on Fort Sumter he enlisted as a private in the Sixth Ohio Infantry. He was transferred to the Second United States Cavalry on the seventh of May, 1861, and seven days later he received a captain's commission in the Twelfth United States Infantry. He served with distinction throughout the war. He was wounded at Chancellorsville and Spottsylvania. He was brevetted major "for gallant services in the Battle of the Wilderness" and lieutenant colonel for gallantry at Spottsylvania.

At the close of the war he accepted a commission as captain in the Twenty-first United States Infantry. He served in all intervening ranks and was retired by operation of law January 21, 1900, as brigadier general. In recognition of his distinguished services Congress subsequently conferred upon him the rank of major general. He commanded the first expedition to the Philippine Islands and was in command of the land forces at the taking of Manila. He commanded the first division of the Eighth Army Corps in the battles of Santana, San Pedro, Passe, and Guadalupe.

Shortly after his retirement from the army Compatriot Anderson took up his residence at Portland, Oregon, where he died on the eighth of May, 1917. In 1869 he married Miss Elizabeth Van Winkle of Richmond, Virginia. She died in May, 1914. General Anderson is survived by three daughters and two sons: Mrs. J. W. Cairns of Manila, P. I.; Mrs. Charles Gauld of Portland, Oregon; Mrs. W. T. Patton of Seattle, Washington; Maj. Thomas M. Anderson, Jr., of the United States Army, and Van Winkle Anderson of Portland, Oregon.

In June, 1891, Compatriot Anderson founded the Oregon Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. He was its guest of honor in June, 1916, on the twenty-fifth anniversary of that event. He attended six Congresses of the National Society as a delegate from Oregon and was five times elected Vice-President General. The work of the National Society in the Americanization of aliens is due to his initiative. The clause in the National Constitution defining the objects of the Society is chiefly his work.

He was actively interested in other patriotic societies, notably the

Grand Army of the Republic, the Loyal Legion, and the Spanish War Veterans. He was a Mason of the Thirty-third Degree.

As a soldier and a civilian he gave to his country the best that was in him. He was interested in all that made for the welfare of his country and the community in which he lived. He was a man of clear vision and was drawn to public men who were genuine, unselfish, and patriotic.

General Anderson was of the strong, robust, virile type. He was the soul of honor, courageous, reliable, and dependable. Although he attained rank and distinction, he was unostentatious and democratic in manner; he was always to be relied on for the tact and courtesy of the gentleman. He enjoyed the companionship of his fellowmen and when in a reminiscent mood was one of the most charming of companions. No one stood higher than he in the affections of the members of this Society, which owes so much to his leadership and devotion.

As a husband, father, friend, gentleman, soldier, and citizen, he measured up to every responsibility, shirking no duty and always playing the part of a man of full stature.

Therefore be it resolved that in the death of General Anderson the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution has lost one of its most honored members, one whose strong, virile Americanism incarnated the ideals of the Society, one to whom our members were attached by ties of affection and many years of common service.

Be it further resolved that we extend our sympathy to the family of our departed compatriot, and that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to them by the Secretary General.

Allen, appointed by the President General as a special committee, took part in the ceremonies and military procession in connection with the reception of the remains of our late compatriot, Ambassador George W. Guthrie, and their transfer from a Japanese war vessel to a train en route to Pittsburgh.

On May 30, at the Palace of Fine Arts, official ceremonies were held on the occasion of the unveiling and presentation of a replica of the Houdon statue of George Washington by the "Daughters" in co-operation with the "Sons" of the American Revolution. It was voted to subscribe for \$2,000 of Liberty Loan Bonds.

Brigadier Charles F. Flamand of the Eighth regiment of the French army was one of the guests at the luncheon following the business meeting. Brigadier Flamand was with the French army in the advance into Alsace-Lorraine and with General Foch at the battle of the Marne. While with General Foch he acted as dispatch rider and was wounded. He returned to the front and saw service at Ypres, fighting with those in charge of the French mortars. He was also in the advance into Champagne in September of 1915.

The Board of Managers were the guests of Past President General, Gen. Edwin S. Greeley, at the Union League Club, New Haven, on March 31.

THE COLONEL JEREMIAH WADSWORTH BRANCH held its spring meeting at the Hartford Club, on April 12, when a paper was read by Mr. Meigs H. Whaples on "Col. Return Jonathan Meigs, a Revolutionary Soldier."

The District of Columbia Society, at its regular meeting, on March 15, was addressed by Mr. Frederick L. Huidekoper on "American Military History and Policy."

On April 18 Past President General R. C. Ballard Thruston delivered his address on "The History and Evolution of the United States Flag."

On April 16, at the opening of the Twenty-sixth Continental Congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Memorial Continental Hall, addresses were made by President General Wentworth and

Past President General Woodworth. On the platform were Ambassadors Jusserand, Spring-Rice, Celleri of Italy, and Ministers of Belgium and Bolivia. In the course of his address Mr. Wentworth said:

It was a German king on the throne of Britain who brought about the Revolution through his attempt to enforce upon America the very Teutonic theories which have brought about the present war. Had this British king succeeded in enforcing his desires upon the American people in 1776, he would have succeeded in forcing those same doctrines upon Britain, and civilization would thereby have been set back fully a thousand years.

I am one of the men, and the Sons of the American Revolution is one of the organizations, who believe that America should now pay to France the debt incurred by their forefathers. The Sons of the American Revolution believe in extending to democracy throughout the world the largest possible support that democracy may live and not perish in the present struggle.

Mr. Wentworth closed by expressing the desire of the "Sons" to work with the "Daughters" along the broadest lines of national service.

On the evening of April 16 several of the officers and members of the Sons of the American Revolution entertained President General Wentworth, Past Presidents General Woodworth and Thruston, and Mr. Lewis B. Curtis of the Executive Committee at the Army and Navy Club and conferred on matters of importance to the Society under present war conditions. Other conferences were held on April 17, 18, and 19.

On the evening of April 17 addresses were delivered at a meeting of the Society of Mayflower Descendants by Past Presidents General Woodworth and Thruston.

On Friday evening, April 20, Compatriot Thruston gave his flag address before the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The Empire State Society, at its annual meeting, on April 17, elected the following officers: President, Louis Annin Ames, 99 Fulton street, New York City; First Vice-President, Martin S. The Treasurer reported receipts of the year ending January 15, 1917, \$11,649.99 and disbursements \$11,126.48. The Special Fund, chiefly from

initiation fees and life memberships aggregates \$15,612.02. The Society will invest \$2,000 in Liberty Bonds for the Permanent Fund.

Through the efforts of Compatriot H. Cleveland Coxe, formerly Vice-Consul General at Paris, a number of prominent Americans have purchased Lafayette's birthplace, to be used, among other purposes, for a Franco-American Museum.

The Society took an active part in the "great patriotic mass meeting" held in Madison Square Garden on the evening of March 22, 1917. It was the only Society that entered the garden in a body. About 300 of its members, preceded by its Continental or "Spirit of '76" band and its collection of flags, marched the length of the garden to the section allotted to them and their friends amid the cheering of the crowd already there. The presiding officer was Compatriot Hon. Elihu Root. Among the honorary vice-presidents were Compatriots Louis Annin Ames, Hon. Charles E. Hughes, and Mr. S. Stanwood Menken.

A War Service Committee of 15 members, Brig. Gen. Oliver B. Bridgman, chairman; John H. Burroughs, vice-chairman, and including secretaries of Chapters, was authorized in May to solicit funds for the purchase of ambulances to be sent to France and a motor machine-gun battery for use in the State. An amount sufficient to provide for three ambulances had been secured up to June 15. A blank schedule has been sent to every member of the Society requesting an indication of some kind of work that can be done or particular service that can be rendered. The schedule specifies 26 occupation items.

The Society held its June meeting in the Aldermanic chamber of the New York City Hall at 4 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday, June 19. The members of the Society met at headquarters, 220 Broadway. Forming in line, four abreast, on Fulton street, near Broadway, they were there joined by nearly 100 members of the New Jersey Society, with the George Washington Post of the Washington Guard of that State and the boys of the New York State Nautical School with their band. The procession, extending over two blocks, marched up Broadway, led by the Color Guard, with the colors of the Society and their "Spirit of '76" band, to the City Hall and into the Aldermanic chamber, where President General Wentworth, President Ames, Gen. George B. Loud, and William A. Marble made fervent patriotic addresses.

President Louis Annin Ames addressed the assemblage after the Chaplain, Rev. Dr. Charles L. Goodell, made the invocation. Mr. Ames declared that the meeting was not a social gathering, but one to discover the best ways to fight tyranny and oppression and to see that the best traditions of the country were upheld at all costs. He asked the

support of the Society and it was pledged. Messages of regret from Compatriots Governor Whitman and Chauncey M. Depew, who was the first President of the Society, were received.

Mr. Ames announced that the National Executive Committee had called upon State Societies and compatriots throughout the land to subscribe to the Liberty Loan, and that members of the Empire State Society alone had personally subscribed for \$27,000,000 worth of bonds.

Mr. Wentworth, who had come from Iowa to be present at the meeting, said in part:

The world, allies and enemies alike, must be taught that "Uncle Sam" means business; that Americans, without boast or bluff, stand ready with life and fortune to protect American honor, to promote American ideas and ideals.

The President has made the goal—a world safe for democracy. In this he has the united support of the Sons of the American Revolution. He should and must have the same measure of support from every citizen of this nation, regardless of race hatred, class prejudice, or party antagonisms. Let criticism be courageously constructural rather than cowardly carping. Let the pacifist give thought to the fact that "a world safe for democracy" is the only world that is safe for pacifism, and do his duty to God and country. This is a war between the Huns and humanity. This is not a quarrel with Hohenzollern, Hapsburg, and Hamid, but a contest between governmental theories and policies as established by Teuton and Turk and a government where liberty is the heritage of every citizen, but liberty based upon and guarded by the common welfare of Society.

The allied armies and navies are not primarily defending humanity against Kaiser, Emperor, or Sultan. When our sons offer their blood and their lives that the world may be made a fit and decent place in which to live, 'tis not a belief in the Divine Right of Kings, but race ambitions that back the bullets and speed the shells of that enemy. The brain under the spiked helmet is conscious of but one cause, animated by one ambition—Germany over all.

On the evening of June 19 the President General, together with Compatriots Curtis, Merrill, Williams, Weeks, and Jones, were the guests of President Ames at the Hotel Martinique.

The Society played an important part in the welcome extended to the British and French War Commissions on their visits to New York City.

THE NEWBURGH CHAPTER held its 14th annual social meeting at the Palatine Hotel on April 19, attended by 125 members and guests. President Stewart presided, and addresses were made by Hon. B. B. Odell, on "Patriotism," and Past-President General C. A. Pugsley, on "American Principles, Policies, and Problems." Rev. Joseph W. Babbitt gave a recital of "Paul Revere's Ride." President Stewart, Secretary Layman, and Treasurer Forsyth represented the Chapter in the

official welcome given to Marshall Joffre and other members of the French War Commission at Washington's Headquarters on May 11:

THE BUFFALO CHAPTER recently held a patriotic service at St. Paul's Church, including the "Trooping of the Colors." Represented in the audience were the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Society of Colonial Wars, Mayflower Descendants, Boy Scouts, and other organizations.

THE SYRACUSE CHAPTER.—On March 26 the National Unity Committee, of which President Woodworth of the Syracuse Chapter is a member, began a campaign to secure signatures to a Declaration of Loyalty. The following pledge was posted in the municipal offices, banks, hotels, depots, telegraph offices, department stores, factories, and other accessible places throughout the city. There was immediate response to the call and many thousands of American men and women and those of foreign birth signed the pledge, which reads as follows:

DECLARATION.

To the President of the United States:

As an American, faithful to American ideals of justice, liberty, and humanity, and confident that the government has exerted its most earnest efforts to keep us at peace with the world, I hereby declare my absolute and unconditional loyalty to the government of the United States and pledge my support to you in protecting American rights against unlawful violence upon land and sea, guarding the Nation against hostile attacks, and in upholding international right.

THE CORNELIUS VAN DYCK CHAPTER of Schenectady, assisted by the Federation of Woman's Clubs, gave a reception to new citizens and their wives on May 25. County Clerk George C. Moon, President of the Chapter, administered the oath of allegiance to the citizens, and each one was presented with a copy of the Constitution of the United States. Professor Whitney of the high school presided. An address was delivered by Dr. B. W. R. Taylor.

The Florida Society, at its annual meeting at Pensacola, on April 19, elected the following officers: President, Frank G. Renshaw, M. D.; Vice-President, R. M. Cary; Secretary, John Hobart Cross; Treasurer and Registrar, F. F. Bingham (all of Pensacola); Chaplain, Rt. Rev. Edwin G. Weed of Jacksonville. A resolution was adopted in favor of adequate laws "providing for universal military training for the youth of our country and for such selective conscription as shall be necessary in any time of war."

The Far Eastern Society, as the new name for the Philippine Society, was authorized by the President General on March 19, 1917, and his action was approved by the National Executive Committee on May 24. It is proposed that members resident at Manila and Shanghai will form local Chapters, and Chapters will later be organized in other Far Eastern countries. The present officers are: Honorary President, Judge Charles Sumner Lobingier of Shanghai, China; President, H. Lawrence Noble, LL. B., P. O. Box 940, Manila; Secretary-Registrar-Treasurer, Leigh Cosart Winters, P. O. Box 1449, Manila; Members Board of Directors, Robert Christie Cotton, Capt. U. S. A., Hon. Thomas Atkins Street, and Edwin Bingham Copeland, Ph. D.

Frank Lee Strong, President of the Philippine Society for the year 1915-1916, died in New York City very suddenly on January 14, 1917, while in the States on a visit, seventy-three years of age. He was a New Englander by birth and of Puritan ancestry. The ruggedness of the Andover Hills, among which his boyhood was spent, was in his speech and manner. He was a man of sterling character and is sincerely mourned by all who knew him. He was genuine, for he said what he meant, there being no sophistry in his nature; he was a student, alert on all the questions of the day, his mind being as active as that of a man of half his age, as shown in many interesting addresses made while in his adopted land—the Philippines; he was a servant of his country, having seen service in the Civil War, and added additional luster to the glory of that record in the Spanish-American War while serving in Dewey's fleet as it entered Manila Bay; he loved his own countrymen first and best; he was loyal to his country, to the Philippines, to his home, friends, and companions. For his good works and his sincerity he is and will be known as "the grand old man." Tributes to his memory have been made by memorial services held in his honor by all the societies of which he was a member in the Philippines, as well as by the resolutions of the Manila Merchants' Association, who knew him as an energetic business man.

Manila Chapters of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution held their annual celebration of Washington's Birthday at the Army and Navy Club.

Mrs. Henry Elser, Regent of the Daughters, presided. In opening the program she referred to the meeting of the previous year, held at Cañacao, at which gathering Frank Lee Strong, President of the Sons, occupied the chair, the address being given by ex-Governor Newton W. Gilbert, Miss Mary Fee being one of the speakers.

H. Lawrence Noble, President of the Far Eastern Society of the Sons, spoke in feeling terms of the loss patriotic Americans sustained in the death of former President Strong.

The address of the evening was given by Fremont Morse, Director of Coast Surveys. Mr. Morse knew the Philippines in the early days,

as his work in connection with the laying of the Pacific cable brought him to Manila by way of Guam. There was real appreciation of the opportunity which the address afforded. Mr. Morse in the most modest way suggested the hundreds of employees and the ships engaged in the work of charting uncertain waters and coasts, the making of maps, and the magnitude of the work accomplished in the last eighteen years by a department of which little is known.

The pavilion of the Army and Navy Club was beautiful in its simple arrangement of the stars and stripes, the star-lit night, and the myriads of electric lights.

The Hawaiian Society on May 14 participated in a memorial service for Compatriot George W. Guthrie, late Ambassador to Japan, whose body was en route on a Japanese cruiser to the American mainland. Two large wreaths—one of laurel from the "Sons" and one of cypas and Easter lilies from the "Daughters"—were placed on the bier in the cabin of the battleship.

President Bryan is organizing committees to serve as advisers and otherwise assist the relatives and dependents of soldiers whose families may need assistance during the present war.

The Illinois Society held its annual Lexington Day session at the Auditorium Hotel, Chicago, on April 19, when an address on "American Patriotism" was delivered by Hon. Charles F. Clyne, United States District Attorney.

THE SPRINGFIELD CHAPTER observed April 19, when addresses were made by Compatriot Clinton L. Conklin, on "The Message of Lexington for Today," and by Rev. George T. Gunter, on "The Minute Men of 1917."

The Idaho Society.—Lieut. Col. M. W. Wood, U. S. A., President of the Idaho Society, although a retired army surgeon, was placed on the active army list June 22, 1916, since which time he has examined more than 6,000 men physically and has examined professionally more than twenty physicians for the Medical Officers Reserve Corps. "If the war lasts a year longer," he writes, "I expect to be in France, where the army will need my forty years of army experience and active service in three wars. Though in my seventy-second year, I am always ready to say, 'Here I am, take me!'"

The Daughters of the American Revolution in Idaho have inaugurated a campaign for a most worthy purpose, that of providing woolen

articles of comfort for the crew of the new U. S. S. *Idaho*, to protect them during their arduous service during the coming winter. They propose to knit many of these themselves and to furnish supplies and superintend the work of others who have offered to help them, so that a set will be ready for each member of the crew when the new *Idaho* is put in commission. The woolen yarn which will be required is about three pounds for each of the 400 sets and will cost approximately twelve hundred dollars. Since this sum is so large for the "Daughters," the "Sons" are co-operating with them in this service.

The Kansas Society on February 22 listened to the reading of a sermon preached by Hugh Henry Breckenridge on the eve of the Battle of Brandywine, September 10, 1777, in the presence of Washington's army at Chadd's Ford.

The Iowa Society held its annual business and social sessions at Ames on April 27, and the proceedings are printed in full in the April issue of *The Old Continental*, published by the Society. The following officers were elected: President, Hon. E. D. Chassell, Des Moines; Vice-Presidents, Dr. Edward E. Dorr of Des Moines and Lewis W. Mansfield of Cedar Rapids; Treasurer, William E. Barrett, Esq., Des Moines; Secretary, Capt. Elbridge Drew Hadley, Des Moines; Registrar, William G. Hamlin, Esq., Des Moines; Historian, Prof. Ezra C. Potter, Ames; Chaplain, Rev. W. B. Sandford, Des Moines.

Historian Potter presented his report in the form of a six-page folder, reviewing the work of the Society since its organization, in April, 1890. Since 1908, 291 medals have been awarded to students in Iowa colleges and high schools for the best work in history during the year.

Two thousand students of the State College held a drill in honor of the Society and were addressed by President General Wentworth, President Kirbye, Dean Stanton (acting president of the college), and Brig. Gen. Jas. Rush Lincoln, U. S. A. (retired).

At the social session addresses were made by President Kirbye, President-elect Chassell, Dean Stanton, General Lincoln, Past State Regent Mrs. Marston of the D. A. R., and President General Wentworth.

At the commencement exercises at Drake University, Des Moines, a National Society medal presented by the President General was awarded to L. W. Lane for excellence in American history studies, and particularly his work in arousing patriotic interest among the student body of Drake University in 1917.

The Kentucky Society on May 22 entertained the President General at the Pendennis Club, Louisville, and conferred on ways and means of rendering efficient national service during the present war. The Society has raised a fund for providing ambulances and other equipment for war relief through the Red Cross.

The Louisiana Society, at its annual meeting in New Orleans, on March 16, elected officers as follows: President, C. Robert Churchill, 408 Canal street, New Orleans; Vice-Presidents, Dr. V. K. A telegram was read from the President General, Elmer M. Wentworth, as follows: "Regards to Maryland compatriots. Your example is an inspiration worthy the day. Your loyalty cannot be surpassed."

The Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, and Historian presented their annual reports.

A resolution in favor of the enactment of a law providing for compulsory military training and service in the United States was passed. The matter of a State organization of motor vehicle owners to work in conjunction with the United States army in transporting troops in this country was brought favorably to the attention of the meeting by Compatriot Osborne I. Yellott, who is organizing the motorists in Maryland.

After the business of the meeting Gen. Clinton L. Riggs, formerly Secretary of Commerce and Police and Commissioner to the Philippine Islands, who is a member of the Maryland Society, delivered an illustrated talk on the Philippine Islands. The talk was a revelation of the great progress that has been made under United States rule in the Philippine Islands. The establishment of schools, the building of roads, the erection of worthy buildings, the introduction of sports, the sanitation of cities, the great improvement in education, and countless other matters had been accomplished by the United States, with many other wonderful things in the Islands.

The retiring President, Frank E. Woodward, presided at the business meeting. Resolutions were adopted indorsing compulsory military training and the sending of American soldiers to France in recognition of the service rendered this country during the War of the Revolution. There was present a detail from the Seventh Company, C. A. C., Capt. Arthur W. Burton commanding, at the presentation and salute to the colors. In the rear of the auditorium was a small stand on which were small flags of all the Entente Allies, with the United States flag in the center. Each of the flags at the call of the presiding officer was borne to the front by Brig. Gen. Philip Reade, U. S. A., retired, and placed conspicuously upon the platform.

Mr. Kimball, the Secretary-Registrar, announced that a movement has been started to introduce the teaching of civics in the public schools.

Following the meeting in the Old South, the members, under the escort of a detachment from the Coast Artillery, marched to the City Club, where dinner was served to about 200. Former Attorney General James M. Smith of New Bedford outlined conditions leading up to the declaration of war, and said that since that declaration the air seems

brighter and clearer, and that the anniversary of Paul Revere's ride and the Battle of Lexington seems to have a deeper significance.

One of the features of the after-dinner exercises was the presentation of Longfellow's poem, "Paul Revere's Ride," in cantata form, the music by Dudley Buck.

At a meeting of the Board of Managers, on March 30, a "1917 Minute Man Committee" was appointed to assist the State Committee on Public Safety in any way that may be useful, particularly to keep in touch with our local troops when in camp and to supply them with many things which the government fails to provide until mustered into its service. The committee consists of Marshall Putnam Thompson, chairman; Vernon A. Field, George H. Nutting, Capt. Charles B. Appleton, and Brig. Gen. Philip Reade. The committee at once opened headquarters on the south side of Washington and State streets, Boston, on the site of the book store kept by Gen. Henry Knox, and organized a permanent office force under the superintendence of Norman R. Willard. Already it has been useful in supplying small articles of comfort for recruits for the army. The Minute Man Committee of Boston Chapter has been furnishing the Massachusetts Naval Militia with medicines, bandages, gauze, adhesive plaster, absorbent cotton, etc. Several regiments have been supplied with comfort bags.

During the past year the Society has contributed toward the preservation of the ancient Fairbanks house, the oldest house in New England. The George Washington Chapter of Springfield has contributed \$100 for scholarships in the American International College in that city. Following the usual custom, flags were placed on grave-markers of Revolutionary soldiers in the North Dorchester Cemetery on Memorial Day. President Woodward and several members of the Board of Managers have attended many functions of the Chapters, hoping thereby "to impress upon our members that they are members of one great patriotic Society, whose influence in the community is in proportion to its unity of purpose and its ability to act as a cohesive force."

A monument in memory of a French naval officer, ordered erected by the Massachusetts legislature in 1778, but only recently completed, was unveiled on the grounds of King's Chapel, Boston, on May 24. The officer was the Chevalier de Saint-Sauveur, who came to Boston in 1778 with the fleet commanded by Count d'Estaing. While ashore one night with a company of officers he visited a part of the town in which a riot had broken out and was fatally wounded. The following month the vote for the monument was passed by the legislature. An inscription was prepared by Count d'Estaing, but for some obscure reason the

erection of the monument was postponed and finally forgotten. A century and a quarter later records of the vote were discovered and last year the legislature made an appropriation for the memorial. The architect was Alexander Wadsworth Longfellow, a nephew of the poet.

OLD ESSEX CHAPTER of Lynn held its twenty-second annual meeting at Wyoma on April 16. The principal guest at the "steak and onion" dinner was the son of the French Consul at Boston, Brigadier Charles F. Flamand, 20th Army Corps (known as the "Iron Corps"), 8th regiment, Army of the East, who has served in the army 35 months, in time of peace as in time of war, and been thrice wounded. "He gave a wonderfully vivid and accurate account of the incidents of the gigantic struggle in which we are allied and in which he certainly contributed his full measure of service."

Officers of the Chapter were elected as follows: President, Charles Frederic Smith, 106 Elmwood Road, Lynn; Vice-Presidents, Henry Fuller Tapley, Webster Bruce; Secretary, Luther Atwood, 8 Sagamore street; Treasurer, Frederic Bassett Abbott, 27 Nahant Place; Historian, Charles Howard Bangs, M. D.; Chaplain, Rev. Frederic Williams Perkins, D. D.

FALL RIVER CHAPTER was provisionally organized on May 25 and a petition signed for a charter from the State Society.

THE FRANCIS LEWIS CHAPTER of Walpole observed April 19 by entertaining the Nelly Custis Lewis Chapter of the D. A. R. and the Lewis "Castle."

On Memorial Day, May 30, the Chapter dedicated a burial lot to those Walpole patriots who were at Valley Forge in 1777-1778, given by the President, Isaac Newton Lewis.

The Michigan Society, at its annual meeting, on May 20, elected the following officers: President, George Harrison Barbour, 1022 Jefferson avenue East, Detroit; Vice-Presidents, Major Frederick Moulton Alger, 2039 Penobscot Building, Detroit, and Charles H. Leonard, 455 Morris avenue S. E., Grand Rapids; Secretary, Raymond Elmoine Van Syckle, 1729 Ford Building, Detroit; Treasurer, Frank Goff Smith, First and Old Detroit National Bank, Detroit; Registrar, Franklin Smith Dewey, 422 Majestic Building, Detroit; Historian, Prof. Warren Washburne, Ph. D., University of Michigan, Ann Arbor; Chaplain, Rev. Joseph Addison Vance, D. D., 21 Edmund Place, Detroit.

The five Chapters of the Society have the following membership: Detroit, 258; Kent Chapter, at Grand Rapids, 57; Washtenaw Chapter, at Ann Arbor, 21; Mt. Pleasant Chapter, 11, and Kalamazoo Chapter, 13.

THE DETROIT CHAPTER met on March 16 at the Detroit Athletic Club. Col. Walter Barlow was presented by the Society with a Spanish War medal in recognition of his military services in that war. These medals are made in part from the metal of a Spanish gun captured during the war.

The meeting was presided over by Dr. Stephen H. Knight, President, and Raymond E. Van Syckle, Secretary, and the program was arranged by Carl F. Clarke of the Entertainment Committee, to whom special recognition was accorded for his efforts in arousing increased interest among the younger members.

Secretary Van Syckle announced that the present international situation had caused a large increase in applications for membership in the Society, and stated that invitations to membership were being extended to all male relatives of Daughters of the American Revolution. He stated that the time was especially opportune for the carrying out of the purposes for which the Society was founded—the furtherance of American patriotism.

The speaker of the evening was Roy D. Chapin, and his topic was "The Work of the National Council of Defense."

THE KENT CHAPTER met on April 17 at the home of Compatriot William Alden Smith, Jr., in Grand Rapids, when Mr. Daniel T. Patton read a paper on "The Poles in the American Revolution." He dwelt particularly on the services of Kosciusko and Pulaski. General Covell spoke on our present state of unpreparedness and on the needs of the army.

The Missouri Society held its annual business meeting at the Mercantile Club, St. Louis, on March 3, 1917, and elected the following officers: President, R. E. Adreon; Vice-Presidents, Edw. T. Miller, John L. RoBards, C. P. Walbridge, Peyton H. Skipwith; Secretary, F. G. Williamson; Treasurer, I. Shreve Carter; Registrar, Linn Paine; Historian, W. H. H. Tainter; Chaplain, Rev. W. W. Boyd.

Compatriot S. M. Green addressed the meeting on the necessity of encouraging patriotism throughout the State, and a committee was appointed to report plans for the distribution of prizes for that purpose to the Ozark schools under the direction of the School Board.

At the annual banquet held at The Buckingham, St. Louis, on April 14, Past President General Thruston addressed the Society on the "History and Evolution of the United States Flag."

The New Hampshire Society held its annual meeting, at Concord, on June 12, and elected the following officers: President, Gen. J. N.

Patterson, Concord; Vice-Presidents, Harry T. Lord, Manchester, Henry H. Metcalf, Concord, and Walter S. Baker, Concord; Registrar, Charles C. Jones, Concord; Secretary-Treasurer, Howard F. Hill, Concord; Historian, William F. Whitcher, Woodside; Chaplain, Rev. L. Waterman, Hanover.

President F. W. McKinley of Manchester presided at the meeting, which was held in the lecture-room in the Historical Society Building. The present membership of the Society was reported as 221, seven deaths occurring during the year, including Isaac Walker, son of a Revolutionary War soldier.

An address on "The Evolution of the American Flag" was made by Compatriot Fred W. Lamb of Manchester.

A resolution was passed at the meeting deploring the use of the statement in newspapers and magazines and upon public platforms that the United States was dragged into this war, and asserting a most solemn conviction that the United States went voluntarily into this war, prompted only by the noblest sense of duty and animated by the high Christian desire to liberate the peoples of the earth from the cruelty and despotism of the Hohenzollern dynasty and the Imperial German Government and from the menace of this despotism to all the countries of the world.

The New Jersey Society on March 25 held a church service at the Old Soldiers' Home at Kearny, N. J. About 500 were present, including George Washington Post, No. 1, of the Washington Guard in full uniform.

On April 19 Newark Chapter held a largely attended meeting at the Robert Treat Hotel, Newark. Among other speakers was the President of the Empire State Society, Compatriot Louis Annin Ames.

Letters have been sent to all the members, urging them to support President Wilson in his war policies.

On May 25 Orange Chapter tendered a reception to President General Elmer M. Wentworth, when there was an exhibition drill of the Washington Guard. Addresses were made by Compatriots Ames, Henry, and Wentworth and President Jones of the New Jersey Society.

On May 27 the New Jersey Society held its annual church service at Grace Episcopal Church, Newark, which was largely attended by members of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution and of the Daughters of the Revolution.

On May 19 Newark Chapter held a recruiting meeting in Military Park and a large number of recruits for the Army and Navy offered themselves for services.

The Society is raising a fund of about \$2,500 to purchase a Red Cross ambulance.

A large delegation from the New Jersey Society and the George Washington Post of the Washington Guard took part in the Empire State Society parade and the patriotic meeting in the City Hall, New York, on June 19.

The National Executive Committee has awarded the Syracuse Banner to the New Jersey Society for enrolling the greatest number of new members during the past Society year, a total of 175.

The North Dakota Society met on May 25 at Grand Forks—Dominion Day—to observe the rapprochement of the English-speaking peoples and the alliance between America and the mother country jointly endeavoring to promote and protect throughout the world the principles for which our forebears fought in the war of the American Revolution. A telegram expressing the sentiments of the occasion was received from President General Wentworth, who had hoped to be present, but was unable to do so on account of the National Executive Committee meeting in New York.

The Ohio Society held its annual meeting at the Chittenden Hotel, Columbus, on April 26. The Benjamin Franklin Chapter entertained about thirty visiting members at luncheon. The following State officers were elected: President, Hermon A. Kelley, Cleveland; Vice-President, Robert H. Kelfogg, Delaware; Registrar and Secretary, Col. W. L. Curry, Columbus; Treasurer, Stimson G. Harvey, Toledo; Historian, Joseph R. Doyle, Steubenville; Chaplain, Dr. William F. Pierce, Gambier.

Registrar Curry has added 351 names to the list of Revolutionary soldiers buried in Ohio, as published in the last Year Book, making a total of 1,158 so far recorded in the State, and markers have been placed on many of the graves by descendants.

In the evening the social session was held at the Chittenden Hotel, at which the retiring President, Mr. George E. Pomeroy, presided. An address was made by Dr. W. G. Clippinger, president of Otterbein University. He discussed the effect of the world-wide war upon the individual nations hereafter and their international relationship. The speaker dwelt upon the rebirth of the different nations, which would take place, and the readjustment to each nation of their economic, industrial, educational, and religious conditions.

Ex-Gov. James E. Campbell spoke of the purposes of the Society in perpetuating the memory of our Revolutionary sires and the patriotism

which their lives should inspire in their descendants at this time. Mr. Hermon A. Kelley, President-elect, spoke of the function of the Society at this time in its efforts to inculcate greater love of country and patriotism, and the assistance which its members might give in various ways to furthering the success of our government in its union with the allied powers for a better democracy.

As announced in the March OFFICIAL BULLETIN, the Ohio Society authorized a contest for students of Ohio high schools for the writing of essays on the underlying causes of the Revolution and the results of the war. The prizes, consisting of one gold medal, one silver medal, and twenty-five bronze medals of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, will be awarded at the close of the school year.

THE WESTERN RESERVE SOCIETY of Cleveland has furnished the American Ambulance Field Service one fully equipped ambulance at a cost of \$2,100. It was considered by the Board of Managers that providing this ambulance for service in France is strictly in keeping with the objects and purposes of the Society. A plan is being worked out for the distribution of a Prize Fund of \$200 for the encouragement of war gardens in Cleveland.

The Oregon Society.—President General Wentworth spent March 31 and April 1 in Portland as the guest of the Oregon Society. On Saturday he was entertained at noon by the Board of Managers, and in the evening by General Anderson, followed by a reception by the Society, after which compatriots adjourned to a meeting of the Oregon Patriotic Service League, when the President General delivered an address. Compatriots H. H. Ward and Gen. Charles F. Beebe served on the reception committee. On Sunday he was entertained by President Wallace McCamant and Compatriot Ward.

The Society turned out in force on April 19 at a great patriotic celebration and procession in Portland. One hundred and ten compatriots were in line. Compatriot Rufus C. Holman carried the large Society flag and every compatriot carried a flag. Compatriot D. H. Rand provided a musket which was carried in the Battle of Lexington by his ancestor. This gun, with a banner showing what it was, was at the head of the column. The parade was one of the most remarkable events in the history of Portland. Twenty thousand men and women marched in the procession, which was three hours in passing a given point. The celebration terminated with a large mass meeting presided over by Compatriot H. H. Ward, and at which President McCamant made one of the addresses.

The President General presented a National Society medal for competition in Portland high schools.

On the evening of June 13 the Society held a session at the University Club in Portland. The guests of honor were Harry L. Sherwood, British Consul; C. Henri Labbe, French Consul, and S. Akamatsu, Japanese Consul. This was the first meeting held in Portland since the beginning of the war at which the official representatives of the other powers at war with Germany were invited to speak in connection with the work of a patriotic organization. The room was decorated with the flags of the nations represented and also with the flag of Italy, whose Consul was unable to be present because of the pressure of official duties. The French Consul received a great ovation, the members of the Society plainly remembering the debt of gratitude due from America to the land of Lafayette and Rochambeau. The Japanese Consul delivered an address in which he spoke of the stories of the yellow peril and of the aggressive plans of Japan as being all made in Germany. The meeting was advised of the action of the National Executive Committee at its meeting in May, and there was hearty concurrence in its recommendations. Resolutions were adopted appropriate to the death of Gen. Thomas M. Anderson. A tribute to the memory of General Anderson, prepared by a committee of the National Society, appears elsewhere in the present Bulletin.

On June 14 the Society marched in the Flag Day parade, which was one of the events of the Rose Fiesta. The new banner of the Society was carried along with the American flag at the head of the column. There was a fifer, drummer, and color-bearer representing the Spirit of '76; three men in the uniform of the War of 1812; three veterans of the Civil War in their blue uniforms; three Spanish War veterans, and three enlisted men from Company E of the Third Oregon Infantry. These men were preceded by banners which read respectively, "The Freedom of the Colonies," "The Freedom of the Seas," "The Freedom of Mankind," "The Freedom of Cuba," and "The Freedom of the World." Immediately after our silk banner at the head of the column there was carried a banner with the inscription, "The Sons of the American Revolution have Always Stood for Freedom." The members of the Society marched in platoons behind those who represented the different wars in which the country had been engaged.

The Salem Chapter has awarded prizes of \$25, \$15, and \$10 for essays on subjects connected with revolutionary history. One hundred and sixty essays were submitted in the contest—seventy-four on "The Siege of Yorktown," forty-four on "The Influence of Benjamin Frank-

lin upon the American Revolution," twenty on "The Part Played by the Colony of Massachusetts in the American Revolution," and twenty-two on "Privateers and Their Work in the Revolution."

The individual members of the Society have been most active in the patriotic work of the community. Compatriot H. H. Ward, a member of the Board of Managers, organized a patriotic service league which served as a clearing-house for the work of the various patriotic societies. One of the younger members of the Society, who is twenty-two years of age, invested his entire savings of \$5,000 in Liberty Bonds.

The Pennsylvania Society adopted the following tribute to the memory of Compatriot George W. Guthrie, who died at Tokyo on March 8, 1917:

George Wilkins Guthrie, born September 5, 1848; died March 8, 1917, while American Ambassador to Japan.

Mr. Guthrie was a loyal and distinguished member of the Pennsylvania Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and in his life, character, and public service sustained the highest traditions of his American ancestry.

His great-grandfather, John Guthrie, was a Captain in the Eighth Pennsylvania Regiment (Col. David Brodhead) and served throughout the Revolutionary War. His paternal grandfather was James Verner Guthrie. His maternal grandfather, Mangus M. Murray, was mayor of Pittsburgh during the years 1828, 1829, and 1831. His father, John B. Guthrie, was mayor of Pittsburgh in the years of 1851 and 1852. In 1905 Mr. Guthrie was himself elected to this important office. He entered upon the performance of his duties as mayor with a passionate purpose to realize, so far as possible, those ideals of public service which he had so strenuously championed for many years preceding his election. For four years he labored incessantly for the civic and the administrative advancement of the city and retired from office leaving a splendid record of achievement, which is gratefully and vividly remembered.

In recognition of his distinguished services to his city, his State, and his nation, and also in recognition of his very great ability and fitness for the position, President Wilson, shortly after his inauguration, in 1913, appointed Mr. Guthrie American Ambassador to Japan.

Mr. Guthrie's kindness, candor, and ability of spirit quickly won the affection and confidence, as his ability won the respect and regard, of the Japanese Court. At a difficult time, when many influences were at work to produce misunderstanding between the two countries, Mr. Guthrie rendered services of inestimable value, not only to the United States and Japan, but to the world, in preserving and cementing the ancient friendship between the peoples of these two lands. His exemplary life in the capital city of Japan has done much to strengthen the cause of Christianity in that country.

He received during his life in Tokyo extraordinary honor and attention from the Imperial Court, and upon his death the highest expressions of regard and grief.

The Japanese Government insisted upon manifesting the depth and sincerity of its feeling toward Mr. Guthrie by sending his body to his native land in a man-of-war of the Japanese Navy. Mr. Guthrie leaves behind him a memory which will long be an inspiration to noble living and unselfish public service. Intellectually he was a man of fine natural endowments. He was a student of public affairs and one of the distinguished lawyers of his State. He was a man of the highest probity himself; he was the champion of justice and fair dealing. His sympathies were always enlisted on behalf of the weak and oppressed. It was his highest pleasure to give lavishly of his means, his time, and his splendid ability in unselfish service. He was universally loved and respected. We who knew him and loved him and mourn his departure feel a just pride in the record of a blameless and fruitful life and cherish his memory as an incentive toward the development of all that is best in American life and character.

Members of the Society took part in the funeral ceremonies at Pittsburgh on May 30 and 31. He was a brother of Compatriot Col. Robert W. Guthrie, National Trustee for the Pennsylvania Society.

A news dispatch from Tokyo on March 8 reads as follows: The last official act of George W. Guthrie, the American Ambassador to Japan, who died suddenly of apoplexy here today, was the delivery of an impassioned and patriotic address at the raising of the Stars and Stripes over the new American steamship offices at Yokohama. Alluding to the present crisis, Mr. Guthrie said:

"God grant that America's love of truth, justice, liberty, and humanity may still be with us to inspire and guide us; that this flag and all that it stands for—justice and freedom of the seas—may be undestroyed, and that we, too, if the day ever comes, may be willing to sacrifice all and to die, if need be, so that the flag may never be impaired."

The Hawaiian Society, on May 14, and the California Society, on May 25, paid honor to the memory of our late compatriot on the reception of the body in Honolulu and San Francisco.

A session of the Society was held at the Union Club, Pittsburgh, on May 17, when an address was made by Hon. Joseph Buffington.

The Rhode Island Society participated with other organizations in a patriotic service held in Grace Church, Providence, on April 15, under the auspices of the British Empire Club. As the choir proceeded up the main aisle, Vice-President William A. Viall and ex-President Frederick D. Carr of the Sons of the American Revolution, marching before the choristers, carried a State flag and the Stars and Stripes. The church

was decorated with the national banners of all the nations now allied against Germany. Rev. Philemon F. Sturges offered prayer for the guidance of the nations and for the "protection of all the soldiers and the sailors of the Allies," and in his sermon he invoked the loyal response of every citizen, with "malice toward none and charity for all." "There has not been for half a century such a call to lift up our hearts as when the President summoned a nation to arms and dedicated the manhood and resources of the Republic anew to the principle that "the world must be made safe for democracy."

Members of the Society participated in a mass meeting at the Providence Opera House on April 22, when men and women of French descent made patriotic demonstration of their allegiance to this country and to the ideals for which it has cast its lot with that of France. Addresses were delivered in both French and English and were interrupted with cries of "Vive l'Amérique!" and "Vive la France!" The singing of "La Marseillaise" was followed by the "Star Spangled Banner."

Former Governor Aram J. Pothier presided and made the opening address. He was followed by Gustave Murel, editor of the *Woonsocket Tribune*. Former Lieutenant Governor Roswell B. Burchard, Henri T. Ledoux, President of St. Jean Baptiste Union of America, and Vicomte G. D. de la Jarrie, correspondent of the Minister of Public Instruction of France, were the other speakers. By acclamation the meeting

Resolved, That American citizens of French birth or ancestry, French Canadians, and Belgians in the State of Rhode Island declare publicly their patriotism and their loyalty to the Government of the United States. All declare themselves ready, according to their age, their ability, and their condition, to make any sacrifice necessary for the triumph of the sacred cause which this country defends. With fidelity, courage, and the spirit of sacrifice, the French and Belgian residents declare themselves united for the defense of the same rights; and all, filled with the same enthusiasm and touched to the depths of their hearts, swear obedience to the laws, the President, to the Government of the United States, and fidelity to the flag.

On May 30 the usual Memorial Day exercises, under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution, were held in Hopkins Park. Pupils and teachers of the Branch Avenue school assembled at the school-house and marched to the park to assist in the ceremonies.

Rev. C. Fremont Roper, Chaplain of the Society, invoked the divine blessing and William A. Viall, Vice-President, gave an introductory address, which was followed by the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by the pupils of the school. A recitation, "The Meaning of the Day," and a salute to the flag were given by the children. Little

Helen Gilmore placed a flag on the grave of Commodore Hopkins at the foot of the statue and the pupils sang "Our Own Dear Land."

Rev. Anthony Bove spoke to the assembly of school children and citizens from the band stand, first in Italian and then in English. "We assemble here year after year," he said, "as regularly as the sun appears day after day in the heavens, in honor of those who gave their lives, regardless of nationality, in the cause of freedom and law. The spirit of liberty and equity and justice which we love is the same as that for which they died. We should be ever ready to shed our blood to the last drop in defense of that flag which represents that spirit."

Referring to the struggle, for centuries endured by the Italian people in defense of the land of their birth, Rev. Fr. Bove said that the American flag represented here the principles of freedom for which their ancestors had fought. "Any good Italian," he continued, "will have the spirit of patriotism and defend the flag wherever he is found. I urge you to inspire your children with the great spirit of George Washington and those great Americans who have given us a free land and free institutions at the price of their lives."

Robert St. Angelo, nine years old, placed a wreath on the statue of Commodore Hopkins, the first great commander of the American navy.

The Sons of the American Revolution joined with other patriotic organizations in Flag Day exercises on the State House Plaza, Providence. Gen. Herbert S. Tanner was Chief Marshal of the parade and other compatriots served on the celebration committee. The exercises included trooping of the colors; national anthems of the allied countries; history of the Flag, by Compatriot E. Merle Bixby, and addresses by Governor Beeckman, Mayor Gainer, and Walter E. Ranger.

The Society has made an appropriation for the French Fund in New York and subscribed \$200 for Liberty Loan Bonds.

KENT COUNTY CHAPTER, at East Greenwich, on May 4, in observance of Rhode Island Independence Day, tendered a banquet to Howard Vernon Allen, President of the Rhode Island Society. The Society gathered at the Hotel Updike at 5 p. m. for a business session, entering the banquet hall at 6.30. The room was decorated with the national colors.

Rev. Daniel Goodwin, D. D., introduced by the master of ceremonies, Gen. Thomas W. Chase, gave an interesting historical address. He was followed by President Allen, Col. Christopher Rhodes, Secretary of the Rhode Island Society; Chaplain C. Fremont Roper of Riverpoint, Henry P. Eldredge, Jr.; Leverett Stevens of Minneapolis Chapter,

Charles Allen, Fenwick G. Taggart, M. D., and Howard Clarke. The general theme of each of the speakers was that the twentieth century is not one whit behind the spirit of '76, '61, and '98 when the occasion requires.

At the business session the following officers were elected for the year ensuing: President, Thomas W. Chase; Vice-President, Herbert Morton Clarke; Secretary-Treasurer, Elisha Waterman Bucklin; Registrar, William Arnold Browning; Historian, Philip Cordigan Means, M. D.; Chaplain, Rev. C. Fremont Roper.

The Tennessee Society made full preparation to entertain the Annual Congress at Nashville in May; but in view of the fact that attendance would interfere with the performance by delegates of their higher duty of national service, it seemed best to postpone the meeting until some later time.

On the evening of May 21 members of the Tennessee Society entertained President General Wentworth, Past President General Thruston, and President Rawles of the Arkansas Society at the Tulane Hotel. President Leland Hume presided as toastmaster. Addresses or short talks were made by Compatriots Wentworth, Thruston, Rawles, Peyton, Boardman, Folk, Martin, Brown, Sioussat, Martin, Lindsey, and De Witt, and there was earnest consideration of ways and means for making the Sons of the American Revolution a powerful factor for national service during the present war.

In the course of his address Mr. Wentworth said:

It seems to me that in days like these the only thing we can do as American citizens is to offer our services for any and everything our leaders may ask of us. On final analysis it is the influence of such organizations as this which will be the leaven that will move the lump and awaken the country to the obligations of Americanism. Patriotism that does not carry service and sacrifice is such as this nation will now have no use for.

The National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, through its Board of Trustees, in 1916, accepted the invitation of the Tennessee Society to hold their next Congress at Nashville, which, under the Constitution of the Society, is to be convened on the third Monday in May annually. Owing to the call of President Wilson to the citizens of the nation for the performance of duties of citizenship, which call appeals more strongly, we believe, to the membership of our organization, lineal descendants of the men whose activities won independence for the nation, attendance upon this Congress would have taken a very large number of the most active men from their various States and communities. It was decided that we could honor our ancestors and show our readiness to perform all duties devolving upon us as citizens better by continuing our activities in the various fields in

which our membership is engaged, and the Executive Committee decided to postpone the Congress so as not to conflict with the duties and responsibilities our membership has assumed in preparing for our national defense and in support of our National Government.

In accord with the Constitution, it is essential that this meeting be called on this date, which will be done this evening, and an adjournment taken, the meeting in Nashville as guests of the Tennessee Society to be held at a time to be designated by the Executive Committee, through the President General, in accordance with the provisions of the institution. The Sons of the American Revolution is incorporated by an act of Congress, and its members, without exception, are responding with time, service, and purse to the call of the nation and standing squarely behind the President of the United States in his effort to protect the sovereignty of the nation and the rights of its citizenship.

Later in the evening a *pro forma* session of the Annual Congress was held, as recorded elsewhere in the present BULLETIN.

A meeting of the Tennessee Society on April 23 was addressed by Chancellor Kirkland of Vanderbilt University.

The Virginia Society has been awarded the Traveling Banner for making the greatest percentage of gain in membership during the last Society year.

SPOKANE CHAPTER.—On March 29 the President General was the guest of the Spokane Chapter. At 9 a. m. he addressed about 1,000 pupils of Lewis and Clark High School. At noon he was entertained at the Hotel Davenport and addressed the members of the Chapter, and in the evening was the guest of President McClintock. The President General presented two National Society medals for competition in the Spokane high schools.
