Burroughs, Treasurer General, S. A. R., 15 William St., New York, N. Y. Members are also urged to do their utmost locally in the sale of Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps.

#### ANNUAL CONGRESS

Local conditions caused by the war will prevent holding the Annual Congress at Nashville in May. The President General is in correspondence with the National Officers, the National Executive Committee, and others, endeavoring to select a suitable place for the meeting, and notice will be issued to State Societies promptly after a decision is made.

The activities of the National Society and of the organization throughout the country are in good condition. About 750 members are in active service in the Army or Navy of the United States.

### ADDITIONS TO MEMBERSHIP.

From December I, 1917, to February 28, 1918, the Registrar General enrolled 427 new members in 35 State Societies, as follows: Arizona, 1; Arkansas, 5; California, 7; Colorado, 3; Connecticut, 15; District of Columbia, 17; Idaho, 5; Illinois, 40; Indiana, 13; Iowa, 19; Kansas, 7; Michigan, 35; Minnesota, 3; Massouri, 2; Massachusetts, 34; shire, 2; New Jersey, 23; New York (Empire State), 37; Ohio, 23; Dakota, 1; Texas, 2; Utah, 26; Virginia, 13; Rhode Island, 4; South Wisconsin, 32; Wyoming, 1.

Waters; "Religion in War," by T. M. Cory; "What the War Means to Us," by A. M. Ward; "Abraham Lincoln," by Mrs. F. W. Tucker; "Freedom for All Forever," by President Rawles; "French Aid in the American Revolution," by President Rawles. Addresses were also made by Captain Braemer of the British army, Captain Carbonnell of the French army, and Judge Jacob Trieber of the United States court.

The California Society held an informal dinner at the Hotel Fairmont, San Francisco, on the evening of November 3, attended by a number of British, French, and United States Army officers and other officials. About one hundred members of the Society and guests were present. Addresses were made by Col. R. C. Croxton, U. S. A.; Capt. M. Clavel of the French army; and Hon. A. The Connecticut Society held a "war-time lunch" at the Hotel Taft, New Haven, at I o'clock, on February 22, with an attendance of about 225. Among the guests of honor were: Hon. Theodore E. Burton,

former U. S. Senator; Hon. Marcus H. Holcomb, Governor of Connecticut; Hon. David Fitzgerald, Mayor of New Haven; Col. Isaac M. Ullman, President of the Chamber of Commerce and of the State Board of Defense. President Clarence H. Wickham of the State Society presided. Brief addresses were made by Gen. Edwin S. Greeley and Judge Morris B. Beardsley, former Presidents General of the National Society; Mr. Lewis B. Curtis of the National Executive Committee; former State Society Presidents Wilson H. Gill and Dr. G. C. F. Williams, and by Mayor Frank A. Hagarty. At the conclusion of the dinner the party was escorted by a platoon of the Governor's Foot Guard to Woolsey Hall, where a patriotic meeting was held, under the auspices of the New Haven War Bureau of the Connecticut State Council of Defense. The exercises included patriotic songs by a Liberty Chorus of about 150 public school children and addresses by Hon. Theodore E. Burton and Gov. Marcus H. Holcomb. The topic of ex-Senator Burton's address was "The Antecedents of German Frightfulness." He traced back conditions in Germany to the foundation and sought out the reasons why Germany is a menace to the world. His talk was an analysis of the peculiar conditions in the German Empire, and he pointed out the characterizations which led to the attitude that Germany was an enemy of the rest of the world.

Governor Holcomb gave a stirring address on "Patriotism," and pointed out Washington as a fine example of an American patriot.

THE COLONEL JEREMIAH WADSWORTH BRANCH held a patriotic rally and supper at the Hartford Club, on the evening of December 13, 1917, when Lester B. Scheide, driver of the American Ambulance Corps, related some incidents of personal service at the front and described instances of German brutality.

The District of Columbia Society, at its meeting on December 19, was addressed by Dr. J. Newton Baker, on "The War Creed of Germany." On January 16, the customary Ladies' Night, addresses were made by Hon. David Jayne Hill, former Ambassador to Germany, on "Problems of the World War"; by President Jno. Milton Reifsnider of the Maryland Society, and Mrs. Guernsey, President General of the D. A. R.

The annual business meeting was held at noon, on February 22, when officers were elected as follows: President, William S. Parks, The Farragut, Washington, D. C.; Vice-Presidents, Henry L. Bryan, Dr. Edwin A. Hill, and Dr. G. Tulley Vaughan; Secretary, John B. Torbert, U. S. Geological Survey; Treasurer, Alfred B. Dent; Registrar, Albert D. Spangler; Assistant Registrar, Henry P. Holden; Historian, Selden M. Ely; Librarian, Charles W. Stewart; Chaplain, Rev. James M. Nourse.

Resolutions were adopted in memory of Compatriot Zebina Moses, a most zealous patriotic worker, who died on January 20, 1918. Compatriot Moses bequeathed \$2,000 to the District of Columbia Society and a like amount to the National Society.

In the forenoon of February 22 more than ten thousand persons assembled at "The Tabernacle" to observe Washington's Birthday, under the direction of a joint committee of the Sons of the American Revolution, the Sons of the Revolution, and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The exercises included music by the United States Marine Band and a trained chorus of several hundred voices; addresses by Ambassador Jean Jules Jusserand of France and Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio; reading of Henry Lee's eulogy of George Washington in 1799. The presentation of a gold medal for a prize essay was made in a brief address by Earl Reading, the British Ambassador. The "Marseillaise" was sung by Lieutenant Labat of the French Military Mission. In the course of his thrilling address, Ambassador Jusserand said:

Everybody knows the unanimity of feeling of all French people who ever met Washington; how, during our Revolution, French citizenship was bestowed on him as being "one of the benefactors of humanity," and how, when he died, the French nation went into mourning, officers wore crepe, and our flags were flown at half-mast.

To conduct oneself well is a harder task in days of gloom and anxiety. In both Washington stands a model. He knew all the trouble which may result from delays, mishaps, and mismanagement, but never thought of a patched-up peace.

The fight is on. As we shall no more desist than Washington did, even at his most perilous hour, the result is certain. The work must be done so that it may not have to be done again. In this we are, all of us, with you whose enthusiasm, valor, resourcefulness, and inexhaustible generosity bring such cheer and comfort.

Senator Harding said the time had come to apply the maxims contained in Washington's farewell address concerning the pernicious effects of internal dissension in a national emergency.

Referring to the lack of frugality of the American people, even in war time, he declared that "no people in \$18 shoes is equipped for the conquering march of civilization." The address has been published as a Senate document.

The Empire State Society observed the 28th anniversary of its organization by holding a war dinner, given at the Martinique Hotel, New York City, on Tuesday evening, February 19, at which about one hun-

dred compatriots and ladies were present. The menu was a modest one, in harmony with economic spirit and demands of the day.

The guest of the evening was Col. Fred. C. Jamieson, head of the Canadian and British Recruiting Mission stationed in New York City, who spoke of the necessity of arousing the American public to the seriousness of the conflict which civilization is waging against the ruthless Huns of Prussia, in the outcome of which the interest of the Americans is as vital as that of the Englishman, Frenchman, Belgian, or Italian. He made a strong plea for the hearty co-operation of the Allies for loyal teamwork.

President Louis Annin Ames stated that over 50 new members had been added to the Society roll since the last meeting, and that over 100 of the compatriots were now enrolled in the army and navy of the Republic, under the national flag. A list of compatriots in active service, including a number of sons of members, is printed in a leaflet on the work of the Society.

The annual religious service was held in St. Paul's Methodist Episcopal Church, at West End Avenue and 86th Street, New York City, on Sunday afternoon, February 17. The Rev. Charles L. Goodell, D. D., chaplain of the Society and pastor of the church, in khaki uniform, preached an inspiring sermon, full of earnest patriotism, in which he denounced in scathing terms the pacifists of the hour, in which he claimed that Christ was the opposite of a pacifist when he scourged the traders and money-changers from the temple at Jerusalem, and that George Washington, were he alive today, would demand vigorous prosecution of the war against German autocracy.

About 125 of the compatriots were present, to whom a company of the New York State Nautical School Cadets, 75 in number, acted as an escort. President Ames, after the services, in the Parish House, thanked the Cadets for their courtesy in a patriotic address.

THE ROCHESTER CHAPTER has presented to each of its 24 members and sons of members in the army and navy a sterling-silver case for the identification tags. At its meeting on January 15 the Chapter was addressed by Lieut. George M. Grahame, British Recruiting Officer, on matters pertaining to the war.

THE PAINTED POST CHAPTER held its annual meeting at Corning on January 14. Past President Willard S. Reed presided. The following officers were elected: President, John L. Chatfield of Painted Post; Vice-President, Hon. Harry H. Pratt of Corning; Secretary, William J. Heermans of Corning; Treasurer, Dr. Arthur M. Breed of Corning; Chaplain, Rev. Committees were appointed on War Service and Recruiting. Compatriot Carlos Parsons Darling has established claim to 12 ancestors in service in the Revolution, embracing all his maternal and paternal ancestors between 16 and 65 years of age during the period of the war.

THE CORNELIUS VAN DYCK CHAPTER of Schenectady united with the Daughters of the American Revolution in the observance of Washington's Birthday. The quarterly meeting was held on March 6, at the Schenectady County Historical Society Rooms.

The Florida Society participated in a celebration of Washington's Birthday at the Pensacola High-school Auditorium, when an address was delivered by Compatriot The Hon. A. C. Blount.

The Illinois Society celebrated the birthday season by a luncheon meeting on February 16, midway between the Washington and Lincoln

Rev. Dr. Ernest Wray O'Neal of Joliet, Ill., delivered one of the most eloquent and patriotic addresses ever given before the Society, his theme being "Lincoln, the Man of the People." The speaker's fervor and forcefulness elicited round after round of applause.

The Society has subscribed and paid in full for a well-equipped ambulance to be used at the front, bearing the Society's name. It has also sent needed supplies and comforts to a group of its members who are officers in the former 1st Illinois Infantry, and is planning to assist in providing similar comforts to others of its members in the service.

Fifteen members of the Board of Managers met President General Wentworth at an informal luncheon on February 23.

Among new members are a father (Compatriot Thomas H. Hungate) and his three sons, all elected at the Board meeting on February 16.

THE OAK PARK CHAPTER held its annual banquet on January 24, with an address by Chancellor L. Jenks. The Chapter continues its valuable work of awarding prizes to the schools for essays upon patriotic themes.

today that it has been all down through the ages. Dr. Burrage declared that this war must be won for democracy to make the world safe for people to live in for the remainder of time.

The Maryland Society celebrated Washington's Birthday on the evening of February 22, at the Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore. The address of the evening was made by Dr. Thomas Hamilton Lewis, President of Western Maryland College, on "The True Doctrine of Public Education as Expounded by Washington." His address was able and brought out distinctly the danger of teaching in any other language than English in the primary and elementary public schools of America. As the Maryland Society had been mainly instrumental in forcing the School Board of Baltimore city to eliminate the teaching in and study of German in the primary and elementary public schools of Baltimore city. his address was doubly interesting. His remarks evoked considerable applause, and afterward a resolution was unanimously passed, providing that a committee, consisting of Osborne I. Yellott, chairman; T. M. Maynadier, G. R. Sappington, W. O. Atwood, and John B. Thomas, frame and present to the Maryland legislature a bill making it compulsory that the English language be used exclusively as the medium of instruction in the public schools of Baltimore, and that in the elementary schools and classes no language other than the English language shall be taught.

A distinctly martial and patriotic touch was given the meeting by the formal salute to the colors and the pledge to the flag, as the Star Spangled Banner was borne into the hall by three members of the Society now in the military service, the audience singing the "Star Spangled Banner" after the pledge to the flag. A service flag was also unveiled containing eighteen stars, representing one colonel, one major, seven captains, six lieutenants, and three privates, members of the Society now serving in the military forces.

The Massachusetts Society observed Washington's Birthday by a luncheon at the Hotel Vendome, Boston, attended by 112 members, including Past Presidents and the Presidents of the several Chapters throughout the State. At the rear of President Field's chair was hung the Society's service flag, containing 119 stars.

After the invocation by Chaplain Hicks, the salute to the flag, and the singing of the national anthem, the President welcomed the members and guests, referring to the feeling of the Board of Managers that the observance of the day should be in deference to the general restraint.

President Marshall Putnam Thompson of the Boston Chapter delivered an address, in which he said that recently in Boston the eloquent

editor of the Manchester (England) Guardian stated that before his departure an English lady requested him to ask the "wasteful" Americans if they would not return some of the tea their ancestors had so recklessly thrown into Boston Harbor some years ago (December 16, 1773). Mr. Thompson suggested, since the descendants of the British Grenadiers are now fighting shoulder to shoulder in a common cause with the descendants of the Minute Men of Lexington, that as a slight return and as a token that there is no meanness in regard to that tea, that the Society forthwith send ten pounds of the best tea procurable to that magnificent regiment, the British Grenadier Guards. Mr. Thompson's suggestion was adopted unanimously.

After the luncheon, Mr. Melville C. Freeman of the Roxbury High School of Practical Arts delivered an address on George Washington. He said in part:

The United States is in the midst of a great Revolutionary war, fighting essentially in the same battle as in '75 and after. Our forefathers fought to keep a strip of this western continent sacred and safe for self-government. The nation, grown out of this travail and sacrifice, has joined in the great struggle to insure the onward march of that ideal. She is standing beside the great free nations of the world; beside France, to whom General Pershing carried the inevitable message, "Lafayette, we are here." France, which during three terrible years has been for us a bulwark against the menace of autocracy; beside Belgium and Servia, pledged to restore them to life and health; beside Italy, birthland of freedom; beside the motherland, from whom we inherit our institutions and our liberties. Traditional ideas of our struggle with England for independence have been wrong. The United States in '76 was fighting the battle of English liberty against the monarchical ambitions of George III. The best and most far-sighted men of England were with the Americans in the struggle, though without political strength to prevent the war. The present reunion of spirit is an event for which to be profoundly grateful. In its continuance lies a great hope for future peace. . . .

The victory for democracy of Washington's day did not mean the democracy of the present era. Checks and balances which greatly limited the popular will in its effective expression then have been and are being removed. Universal suffrage is sure to be realized. Education, the most efficient and wisest that can be devised, is the great essential for the future. We have seen what systematic education has accomplished for autocracy; the education for democracy is vastly more important, but also a far more difficult problem, which needs the patriotic devotion of the best minds in our land. A very miracle of democracy, couraging for our present crisis and suggestive for the future. The young manhood from every class of American life is being forced by common discipline and common training for one great cause and is responding with wonderful spirit. We can almost hear those firm lips of Washington say, "Democracy is safe here and will be everywhere."

President Field then addressed the Society on the work of "The 1917 Massachusetts Minute Man Committee," citing the watchword of the Committee as "Instant response to emergency calls," and spoke of the need of a continuous fund of \$2,500 and of the great and effective good the Committee was doing, and called on Mr. Thompson, the chairman of the Committee, who explained in detail the scope of the Committee's work, which covered supplies of medicines to the several local units, comfort kits, knitted goods, jellies, books, and magazines to the men, looking after the needs of soldiers' families and care of the men in transit, the forwarding of packages overseas, and in short locally meeting every emergency that arose where Government or Red Cross facilities could not reach, owing to the sudden need.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER of Springfield entertained the Board of Managers of the State Society on the evening of January 11. After receiving the colors the compatriots sang the "Star Bangled Banner." The program following the dinner included an impersonation of Charles Dickens by William Sterling Battis and short addresses by President Field, Vice-Presidents Read, Bruce, and Boardman, Secretary Tuller, Brig.-Gen. Philip Reade, compatriots Silsby, Roote, Powers, Gould, and Punderson, all members of the State Board, and compatriot Rev. John H. Rosebaugh of the Colonel Jeremiah Wadsworth Branch of Hartford, Conn.

The 24th annual observance of Washington's Birthday by the Chapter at Springfield was held at the Nayasset Club on the afternoon of February 22 with an attendance of 74 members. At the business meeting officers were elected as follows: President, Richard H. Stacy; Vice-President, S. F. Punderson; Secretary, Henry A. Booth; Treasurer, Paul I. Loomis; Registrar, James C. Phelps; Chaplain, Rev. Frank L. Briggs. The Chapter numbers 182 members. Prof. George T. Ladd of Yale University delivered an address in which he scathingly denounced the Germany that has become converted under the heel of Prussian materialism and power until it has become rotten through and through. In an outline of her acts leading to the war and in its conduct the past four years, with an explanation of the reason, based in philosophy, he called upon America to provide for her own safety and to endure to the end in the defense and rescue of humanity.

THE OLD SALEM CHAPTER held its annual meeting at the residence of the President, Stephen W. Phillips, on February 26, the one hundred and forty-third anniversary of the repulse of Colonel Leslie at the North Bridge, Salem. The following officers were elected: President, Stephen W. Phillips; Vice-Presidents, Edward C. Battis and Williard W.

Woodman; Treasurer, Major Frank S. Perkins; Secretary, Osborn Leach; Registrar, Andrew Nichols; Executive Committee, Dr. Frank A. Gardner, Lawrence W. Jenkins, David Pingree, Walter P. Richardson, and Charles F. Ropes. It was voted to have a dinner, with speakers, at the Roger Conant Inn, Salem, at an early date in spring, and a committee was appointed to make suitable arrangements with that object in view. It was also voted to accept an invitation extended by the Registrar, Andrew Nichols, to have a Field Day meeting on the grounds of his Danvers home on some day in the month of June. By a unanimous vote it was ordered that the following communication be sent forthwith to the Treasurer of the Chapter, who is at present "somewhere in France."

Dear Compatriot Perkins: The Old Salem Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, holding their annual meeting tonight, on the anniversary of Leslie's retreat at the North Bridge, are thinking of you and the Salem fellows who are doing so much to maintain the best traditions of our city and to preserve the institutions which the founders of this country established at the Revolutionary period. We extend to you our most sincere wishes for a successful and speedy termination of the war and your happy return to us once more.

The Chapter is flourishing and eagerly looking forward to its next annual meeting, when we hope to have an address on our army in

France by a distinguished member of the Chapter.
With the sincere good wishes and friendly greeting of every member

Following the dispatch of business, President Phillips gave a talk, sketching the salient features in the careers of the major generals and brigadier generals of the Revolutionary period, men whose very names have become unfamiliar at the present day.

The Michigan Society is doing active work through its local Chapters. Over 100 new members have been admitted since April 15, 1917. More than 50 compatriots are now in active service in the Army or Navy of the United States.

THE DETROIT CHAPTER held its first meeting of the season on November 16, 1917, at The University Club, when a narrative was given by Captain Baxter, Canadian Expeditionary Forces, of his experiences at the front in command of a company. The Committee for the Relief and Comfort of the Michigan Naval Militia reported collection and

disbursement of \$205.67 in its behalf. The Surgical Dressings Committee reported \$830.77 collected from members and disbursed. On January 19, 1918, an address was given by Rev. M. S. Rice on observations at the front during his recent visit to the Allies' lines. On February 16, 1918, a reception to the Chapter was tendered by Dr. and Mrs. Stephen H. Knight at their home. The guest and speaker was Sous-lieutenant Jean Becker, French army, stationed at Camp Custer, who told what the American army would experience in France. The officers of the Daughters of the American Revolution assisted in receiving. Reports of the progress made by the Yarn Committee were made by Regent Mrs. McDonald and Mrs. Knight. The Committee of the Detroit Chapter, S. A. R., to solicit funds for the purchase of yarn, reported that it had obtained and turned over to the Daughters \$1,000.

THE ST. CLAIR CHAPTER, located at Port Huron, was organized on March 11 with 17 members, including Milton R. Purdy, an actual son of a Revolutionary soldier. The officers of the Chapter are as follows: President, Burt D. Cady; Vice-President, Sydney E. McLouth; Secretary, William R. Chadwick; Treasurer, Albert D. Bennett; Historian, William L. Jenks; Chaplain, A. L. Chamberlain.

Kent Chapter held its annual meeting in Grand Rapids on January II. A letter was read from State Secretary, Raymond E. Van Syckle, stating that Michigan had had the largest increase in membership during the present year of all the States, and that it had had a larger increase than all the New England States and New Jersey put together. The officers elected were: President, Charles N. Remington; Vice-President, Charles M. Alden; Secretary, W. T. P. Spooner; Treasurer, T. J. Barker.

The serving of refreshments at meetings of the Chapter has been discontinued during the war as a patriotic effort to assist in the conservation of food.

The Secretary's report showed a membership at the beginning of the year of 52 and at the end of 78—a net gain of 26.

During his incumbency of the office of Secretary, Mr. Remington, by searching the records of the State and National Societies and the files of the daily newspapers, together with such information as he was able to gather from the later members of the Chapter, has compiled a comparatively complete history of this Chapter, and also a complete genealogical record of all present and former members of the Chapter. He has also placed copies of both the history and the genealogies in the Grand Rapids library.

The Montana Society held its 24th annual business meeting and dinner at Helena on February 22, with quite a large attendance from all over the State, the meeting being the best in the history of the Society. Officers were elected as follows: President, William Rush Burroughs, Helena; Vice-President, Francis Wright Sharpe, Great Falls; Secretary-Treasurer, Leslie Sulgrove, Helena; Registrar, Oliver Turnbull Crane, Helena; Historian, Llewellyn Henry Thurston, Roundup; Librarian, John Hatton Young, Helena; Chaplain, Paris Baskett Bartley, Helena.

A resolution was passed with great enthusiasm which pledged the full loyalty of all of the compatriots and their hearty support of the administration in all of its efforts to prosecute the war.

At the conclusion of the business session a banquet, tendered to the compatriots by the President of the Society, Lieutenant-Governor William Wallace McDowell, was held, at which Associate Justice Sydney Sanner of the Montana Supreme Court delivered an address on "What Washington would do were he living at the present time and confronted with our crisis." It was a commentary upon Washington's life and abilities as well as an analysis of his motives and objects which led to the opinion that the Father of his Country would have maintained his careful watch upon the expanding growth of the country he established, and to advance the cause of freedom among mankind and protect our own nation would have done just what the government is trying to do now.

The Nebraska Society held its annual meeting at the Commercial Club, Lincoln, on the afternoon of February 22, and elected the following officers: President, Clarendon E. Adams, Omaha; Vice-Presidents, George A. Dane of Lincoln and Grant Lee Shumway of Scotts Bluff; Secretary and Registrar, Addison E. Sheldon, Lincoln; Treasurer, Charles E. Bardwell; Historian, H. M. Bushnell, Lincoln. It was voted to remit the dues of members who are in active Federal or Allied service in the present war. Officers' reports showed the Society to be in the best condition for years, with a membership of 236—a gain of 28 new members during the year. Mayor John E. Miller presented the greetings of the Lincoln Chapter, and responses were made by Sylvester R. Rush of Omaha, Jay M. Dunham of Crete, Frederick C. Laird of Freemont, and Grant Lee Shumway of Scotts Bluff.

In welcoming the Society to Lincoln, Mayor Miller said that notwithstanding all of the opposition there never was a crisis before in which all of the American people were united as they are in the present one. He pointed to the pacifist as the chief worry, and said he was more bothered about the people who were pacifists than he was over the man who was born in Germany and still sympathized with the mother country. He recommended that it be remembered when the next election comes. There were two things he believed that people should prepare for now and not put off until the close of the war. One was that no man should enjoy the privileges of citizenship until he became a citizen, and the other was that no man should vote unless he could read the Constitution in English.

Mr. Rush reviewed the struggle of the Revolution, and pointed to the help we can get by studying the way that Washington handled his problem. He pointed to similarities in the present struggle, and spoke especially of the work that is being done by the graduates of West Point, which was one of the institutions that found its inception in Washington's time and was his idea.

The annual dinner, held at the Lincoln Hotel on the evening of Washington's Birthday, was attended by sixty members and guests, including ladies. President C. C. Quiggle of the Lincoln Chapter presided as toastmaster. Compatriot Wardner Williams of the Colorado Society delivered an address on "The place of the United States among the nations of the world."

The Society has published a Flag Bulletin, giving a history of the American Flag, Etiquette of the Stars and Stripes, the Flag Salute in Schools, and a history of the Great Seal of the United States. There was also printed for information at the annual meeting a list of members and of those in war service, with a letter of greeting by President Bowlby and the Secretary's note on the condition of the Society.

The New Jersey Society has enrolled more than 1,800 members since its organization, on March 7, 1889. Chapters are being organized at Belleville and Newton.

THE MONTCLAIR CHAPTER held services commemorative of Washington's Birthday, at the First Congregational Church, on Sunday afternoon, February 24, attended by other patriotic societies. The presentation of the colors and salute to the flag formed part of the service as conducted annually by the Montclair Chapter.

An address was delivered by Dr. Allen, who declared that the Sons of the American Revolution was not simply a name, but its members were truly sons of the Revolution. Defining the Revolution as "a great activity in the interest of great ideals," Dr. Allen said these ideals of liberty, righteousness, and the brotherhood of man were great living principles today. While England would never be our foe again, and with France would join in ruling the world in righteousness, it was

against her autocracy that we had fought, he declared, and the shells bursting today are but reverberations of the first shot fired at Concord bridge.

Paying tribute to Washington and Lincoln and tracing the history of the country down through the Civil War, the speaker concluded that only peace embodying the ideals of unity and righteousness that these great men had stood for would suffice.

The offering at the service was donated to the Montclair Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Compatriot A. R. Elliott has presented, through the Montclair Chapter of American Red Cross, a completely equipped Red Cross ambulance, now in active service on the French front.

The New Mexico Society held its annual meeting at the Alvarado Hotel, Albuquerque, on February 22. President T. P. Martin, M. D., outlined the patriotic activities of the Society during the year and reports were filed by the Historian, Secretary, Registrar, and Treasurer. The following officers were elected: President, Meldrum Keplinger Wylder, Albuquerque; First Vice-President, Herbert F. Robinson, Albuquerque; Second Vice-President, E. A. Major Henry R. Brown of the U. S. Army, stationed at Camp Cody, Deming, addressed the Society concerning the military operations, especially with reference to the hospital work of the Government.

The North Dakota Society held its annual meeting at Hotel Gardner, Fargo, on February 25. Twenty-one members attended the Hooverized luncheon. After the business meeting the annual address was delivered on "The Anglo-Saxon Ideals in the Conflict" by President V. P. Squires, and addresses were made by J. Hector St. John, Dr. Wallace N. Stearns, and "Problems of Reconstruction after the War" were discussed by Judge B. F. Spalding.

THE ANTHONY WAYNE CHAPTER held its annual meeting at Toledo on February 22 and elected the following officers: President, George E. Seney; First Vice-President, H. J. Sherman; Second Vice-President, Dudley W. Moore; Secretary, Eugene P. Mettler; Treasurer, Col. S. G. Harvey; Registrar, Dr. D. G. Gardner; Historian, Herbert P. Whitney; Chaplain, Rev. Nathan Clark. Rev. Karl A. Stein delivered an address on "Why I am an American."

The Oklahoma Society, on October 1, 1917, elected as Secretary-Treasurer Mr. D. R. Luttrell, Colcord Bldg., Oklahoma City, in place of J. A. Luttrell, removed from the State.

The Oregon Society held its annual meeting at Portland on February 22. The Registrar's report showed that the Society had made a net gain of 21 during the past year. The present membership is 247. The membership has been exceedingly active in the patriotic work of the community. One compatriot, Mr. Walter B. Beebe, has organized a ship-building plant which has turned out seven steel vessels, and it is expected that others will follow at short intervals. The names of members who are with the colors were read by the Secretary at the dinner in the evening, and all arose in respect to them while their names were read. At the dinner telegrams of greeting were read from the President General, from Col. M. W. Wood, on behalf of the Idaho Society, and from G. E. Tilton, on behalf of the Washington Society. Unusual interest is manifested in the Society's essay contest. At the annual dinner addresses were made on "Oregon and the Great

War," by Chief Justice Thomas A. McBride; "The American Soldier," by Gen. Charles F. Beebe; "The Day We Celebrate," by Rev. John W. Perkins; and on "France," by Oliver P. Coshow.

The Pennsylvania Society, at its annual meeting held at Pittsburgh, on February 22, elected the following officers: President, Dr. Samuel B. McCormick, Chancellor of the University of Pittsburgh; Senior Vice-President, Dr. H. C. Westervelt; Vice-Presidents, James A. Wakefield and Gen. Willis J. Hulings; Secretary, F. Armstrong, Jr., 515 Wood St., Pittsburgh; Registrar, John W. Grove; Treasurer, A. W. Wall; Chaplain, Rev. Dr. R. B. Miller; and Historian, Thomas Wynne. Robert W. Guthrie was nominated for Trustee of the National Society.

The annual dinner at the William Penn Hotel in the evening was attended by about 215 members and guests. The dinner was presided over by George R. Wallace, who was toastmaster and made a plea for the purchase of war savings stamps. At the speaker's table were Col. T. W. Griffith of the army; Lieut. Com. Newton Mansfield of the navy; Dr. Joseph H. Bausman, professor of English literature at Washington and Jefferson College; Dr. Ethelbert B. Warfield of Williams College, Chambersburg, and Dr. Harry W. McKee of New Castle.

An address was made by Congressman Albert Johnson, who related incidents and described conditions observed by him during a recent visit to the front in France in company with a party of Congressmen. Rev. Robert MacGowan, D. D., told of life in the American training camps.

"German propaganda in this country at this moment," said Dr. Mac-Gowan, "is trying to stir up a war between the classes and the masses that would be the greatest revolution of all time. Washington fought for the principle that taxation without representation was tyranny. America today is fighting for Belgium, which country is being filched for millions at this minute by the Huns without any representation."

"From all our observations we are led to believe," said Congressman Johnson, "that Germany is a great shell, only strong on the outside. It is only a question of time until this shell will break. We must stand together—and closer together than ever before. We should punish treason with death. Let us deny ourselves all that we can, so that we may come out victorious in this great conflict."

On the evening of November 19, 1917, Mr. George R. Wallace of Pittsburgh delivered an address before the Pennsylvania Society on "The German Menace to America," which has been published as a pamphlet of 16 pages.

THE NEW CASTLE CHAPTER held its annual business meeting and dinner on January 7, when the following officers were elected: Presi-

dent. A. D. Mornes; Vice-President, S. W. Perry; Secretary, David Long; Treasurer, G. W. Gageby; Registrar, Col. J. S. Du Shane. President Decker, Colonel Guthrie, and other officers of the State Society were among the guests of the evening. Attorney H. K. Gregory delivered an address on "The Public Service." Of German descent himself, Attorney Gregory told of the need for every one to awake to the need for active service for the public good, and he found considerable satisfaction in the fact that America has been aroused to the gravity of the situation before any terrible catastrophe has occurred, like the sinking of a loaded transport, air attacks on American shores, or any of the other crimes which the Germans are inflicting on the Allies. He told of finding, in his wide travels about the country on business, men and women talking nothing but war, and the latter ever busy knitting on trains and in stations. He spoke of the dollar as having assumed a new sublimity in this great conflict, since nothing can he accomplished without its aid. He said the German attitude and state of mind was a mystery to him, since the Germans among whom he was reared in the Susquehanna Valley were law-abiding, gentlemannered, and peaceful. He thought that a psychological change had taken place in the German race in the last generation, and he insisted that nothing but the annihilation of Prussian autocracy would render the world safe for democracy and free from a future menace of Teutonic aggression and ruthlessness. The motif of his speech was "The Public Service," a term he constantly repeated for emphasis and which he proclaimed as the only consideration which should be permitted to agitate the minds of American citizens in these perilous hours.

Attorney C. H. Akens read an extended statement, or set of resolutions, drafted at the request of the Chapter, for the purpose of showing in concise form "Why the United States is at war, from the standpoint of the Sons of the American Revolution."

The Rhode Island Society held its annual business meeting at the Rhode Island Historical Society rooms, at noon on February 22. The following officers were elected: President, William Angell Viall, P.O. Box 1385, Providence; Vice-President, Arthur Preston Sumner, 639 Grosvenor St.; Secretary, Christopher Rhodes, 290 Benefit St.; Treasurer, Edward Bowen Hamlin; Registrar, Francis Eliot Bates, P.O. Robert Perkins Brown was nominated for Trustee of the National Society. George Curtis Darling was elected to represent the Rhode

A resolution offered by William M. P. Bowen, by which the Society "sends its heartiest good wishes to all our brave men who, on land and sea or in the air, are today renewing the struggle of the early patriots in withstanding the despotism of federated autocracy," and pledging earnest support to the boys in the service, was adopted.

The annual dinner was held in the evening at the Narragansett Hotel. President Allen presided. The first toast was "To the Patriots of the American Revolution," followed by all present pledging allegiance to the flag. Attorney General Herbert A. Rice responded to a toast "To Our State"; Mayor J. H. Gainor, toast "To Our Capital City," and Col. H. Anthony Dyer, toast "To the Defense of Our Nation." Capt. Arthur Hunt Chute of the First Canadian Division of Overseas Forces delivered an address, in which he urged every one to do something besides talk patriotism.

"We have come again to the 'Minute Men of 1918.' We have come to the time not to get up and talk about liberty, but to roll up our sleeves and get down into the mud and fight for liberty, and unless we are willing to fight for it we ought not to have it."

The Utah Society held its 24th annual banquet at the Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City, on February 22. President George Albert Smith was master of ceremonies and Judge Justin D. Call presided as toast-master. The Society now numbers 199 active members. A service flag, made by Mrs. S. M. Barlow, was exhibited, recording 42 compatriots in the army and navy, and there was also shown an engrossed roll of honor, bearing the names of these members, prepared by Secretary Hutchins. Among the guests of honor were former Senator and Mrs. George Sutherland; former Governor Arthur L. Thomas; former Governor and Mrs. Heber M. Wells; former Governor and Mrs. William Spry; Governor and Mrs. Simon Bamberger, and Col. Alfred Hasbrouck.

Prof. George E. Fellows responded to the toast "The Sons of the American Revolution," and Prof. Levi Edgar Young to the toast "The Unfinished Task." Former U. S. Senator George Sutherland delivered an address on "The Message of America to the World." He said in part:

This is no time for peace talk nor for peace negotiations. To talk peace or even think of it is treason. It is treason to everything we hold sacred—treason to millions of men who have died in the cause of

liberty and to millions of the hopelessly maimed, who never again will have the joy of life. It is treason to the suffering souls of thousands of women who have been unspeakably wronged; treason to the murdered children of Europe and to our own children. . . .

For us the path is straight ahead, and we must turn a deaf ear to the weary who say "we have suffered enough," for we must suffer to the end, until the sacrifices which have been made shall not have been made in vain, and that our children may not have to undergo in their lives the distressing things which we have undergone in ours.

The medal annually awarded by the Utah Society for the best essay on patriotism was presented on March 6 to Thatcher Allred, student in the Agricultural College at Logan. The subject of the essay was "Phases of Patriotism." The presentation was made by D. S. Spencer and speeches were made by Mayor W. Mont Ferry of Salt Lake, Rev. Edwin Lewis of Logan, and President George Albert Smith of the Utah Society. President Smith has been appointed a member of the Executive Committee of the Third Liberty Loan to represent the Sons of the American Revolution in the State of Utah.

The Vermont Society held its annual meeting at the Hotel Vermont, Burlington, on February 27. Judge Frank L. Fish, the President, presided. Prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Isaac Chipman Smart of Burlington. The reports of the various officers were read and accepted. The following officers were elected: President, Frank L. Fish of Vergennes; Vice-President, Guy W. The Traveling Banner awarded to the Virginia Society for enrolling the greatest percentage of new members during the year ending March 31, 1917, was displayed at the annual meeting.

At 9.30 o'clock the Society united with the Sons of the Revolution in the observance of Washington's Birthday. John Stewart Bryan, who presided as chairman and toastmaster, discussed the characteristics of Washington as they apply to problems of today, when "we are fighting with the best plans that philosophers have ever conceived, combined with the savage brute strength of an orang-utan." Major Dunlop of the British army discussed the part that America will play in the world

"The training of a vast citizen army with which to combat trained troops under trained generals, that is the great problem confronting the United States today," he stated. "If there is one thing that this war has taught us, it is that civilization does not make bad soldiers. The army of Cromwell, the troops of Napoleon all deny this fact. The colonial troops had a great disadvantage to overcome in the fact that they must need combat with well-trained soldiers; but they stuck and they won.

"Not a thing in the pages of history compares with what the modern soldier does. Will the sons of the heroes of Valley Forge let the tradition of their heroic doggedness fall to earth?"

Addresses were also made by a lieutenant of the French army and by Brigadier General Brett, in command at Camp Lee.

The Washington State Society held its 23d annual meeting in the Masonic Club Rooms, Seattle, on February 22. The business meeting was preceded by a noon luncheon, attended by members with their families and friends, which was addressed by Prof. Clarke Prescott Bissett of the University of Washington. The business session was attended by about 40 members, including Presidents of Chapters at Hoquiam, Olympia, and Tacoma. The Registrar reported an increase of 19 new members during the year. A banner flung to the winds in the midst of a revolution, and its high ideals wafted by the breezes to the sons of men in every clime.

The white, the purity of our motives, and as clean as drifted snow.

The stars to be our guides to Bethlehem, the manger, and the cross, if need be in the salvation of the world.

The harmonious whole a picture of our glorious past, and the promise of a still grander future. In all our wars, waged for humanity, it has been the protecting ægis of a just cause. It has fluttered in peace as well as in war, but the triumph of justice is the only peace. You may cry "peace," but there can be no peace until the victory is won for the right.

It declares to every American citizen of today: "If you would live in peace, under my beautiful banner of the free, you must defend the principles for which I stand." It has always been the spirit and soul of the nation.

It received its baptismal fire at Lexington and Bunker Hill, when were fired the shots that were heard around the world. It sustained the suffering, ill-clad, ill-fed soldiers in the terrible winter at Valley Forge, and waved triumphant at Yorktown. It passed through the fiery furnace of the fiercest Civil War and came out enobled.
