

OFFICIAL NOTICES.

The National Executive Committee has elected Frank W. Rawles of Little Rock, Arkansas, as Vice-President General for Mississippi Valley, West District, to fill the vacancy caused by the non-acceptance of that office by C. Robert Churchill, elected at the Rochester Congress. Compatriot Rawles also becomes Chairman of the Organization Committee for that district, and Secretary Fay Hempstead of the Arkansas Society is appointed a member of that committee.

Judge Harvey F. Remington of Rochester, N. Y., and David R. Gray of Salt Lake City are appointed members of the Committee on Americanization and Aliens.

H. Donald Holmes, Summit, N. J., is appointed Secretary General and Earle A. Miller of East Orange, N. J., a Lieutenant Governor General of the Washington Guard.

THE AMES BANNERS.—President General Ames will present, at the Detroit Congress in 1919, a silk banner bearing the name of the State Society and to be held by it in perpetuity, to each Society that increases its membership 20 per cent during the year ending March 31, 1919, provided the increase is not less than 10 over the number of members reported on April 1, 1918.

THE TRAVELING BANNER, presented to the National Society by the Colorado Society, is awarded each year, by terms of the gift, to the State Society of one hundred or more members which makes the largest percentage of net gain in membership during the year ending March 31. At the Rochester Congress it was awarded to the Wisconsin Society.

THE SYRACUSE BANNER, presented to the National Society by the Syracuse Chapter, is awarded each year to the State Society making the greatest actual enrollment of new members during the year ending March 31. At the Rochester Congress it was awarded to the Massachusetts Society.

THE PUBLICITY COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Publicity Committee, David L. Pierson, 21 Washington street, East Orange, N. J., requests that items of general interest pertaining to the Society, newspapers containing articles on the Society, and any information regarding the organization or its members be forwarded to him. There must be a strong alignment of every individual enrolled in the Society in order to keep its purposes and objects constantly before the public. Official material for permanent preservation and for use in the OFFICIAL BULLETIN should be forwarded to the Secretary General.

LETTER TO RIGHT HON. LLOYD-GEORGE.

On August 4, 1918, the fourth anniversary of the entrance of the Government and people of Great Britain in the great war, a number of officers and members of the Society of the Cincinnati, the Sons of the American Revolution, and the Sons of the Revolution assembled in Fraunce's Tavern, New York, sent a dispatch addressed to the Right Hon, Lloyd-George, Prime Minister of Great Britain, expressing their highest appreciation of the noble efforts and heroic self-sacrifice of her valiant soldiers and sailors who drew the sword without hesitation for the cause of Belgium and world freedom.

On August 5 a response was received from the Prime Minister, in which he expressed the gratitude of the Government and people of the British Empire for the very generous message, and said: "It is a cause for deep satisfaction that the great democracies of the world are standing side by side and opposing a united front to the assaults of a modern barbarism which aims at destroying all that we hold best and all that has been counted sacred in our common traditions of freedom and liberty. The principles which our two democracies hold even dearer than life itself have been consecrated afresh by the splendid heroism and sacrifice of the brave American soldiers at the front within these recent days."

LA VERNE NOYES FOUNDATION FOR EDUCATION OF SOLDIERS AND SAILORS AND THEIR DESCENDANTS.

Compatriot La Verne Noyes, former President of the Illinois Society and Vice-President General of the National Society, has given to the University of Chicago eight parcels of real estate, with a total value of about \$2,500,000, creating thereby the "La Verne Noyes Foundation," the income from which will be used for the education of soldiers or sailors who have served in the present great world war, their children and descendants. In establishing this foundation Mr. Noyes wished to "express his gratitude to those who ventured the supreme sacrifice of life for their country and for the freedom of mankind in this war, and also by giving them honor, to aid in keeping alive through the generatons to come the spirit of unselfish patriotic devotion, without which no free government can long endure or will deserve to endure."

A stipulated portion of the income may be used for payment of salaries of the university staff engaged in teaching American history or the public duties of citizenship, including political economy, political science, and sociology. The funds are to pay tuition in the University of Chicago for deserving students, without regard to sex, race, religion, or political party, who shall be citizens of the United States and shall have served in the Army or Navy of the United States during the present war and been honorably discharged, or shall be descendants by blood of any one who may have so served and have died or been honorably discharged.

CONSTITUTION DAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 1918.

Constitution Day was celebrated this year in many of the States, under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution. The President General issued a proclamation to each of the State Societies, re-

questing their earnest efforts in behalf of a proper observance of the anniversary. This was supplemented by a letter from the office of the Chairman of the Publicity Committee, in which all compatriots were invited to assist in arousing the spirit of citizens generally in a recognition of the event, and there were over 1,100 notices in various newspapers calling attention to the adoption of the Constitution which started the machinery of the United States Government, as we have it today, running along channels of helpfulness and of general uplift to the people in need of a better system than that prevailing under the Articles of Confederation.

In New York City all the public schools held exercises; in many parts of New Jersey church bells were rung at noon and factory whistles were sounded for a period of three minutes. Public schools and other institutions remembered the day by special exercises. President E. G. Spillman of the Oklahoma Society sent a very strong and patriotic letter to the compatriots of that organization and secured some excellent results. Spokane Chapter of the Washington Society, co-operating with the Chamber of Commerce of that city, held interesting exercises at a patriotic luncheon.

Governor Sleeper of Michigan, upon the request of the Publicity Committee, issued a proclamation, calling upon the people of Michigan to observe the day, and General Coolidge of the Michigan Society also co-operated. Others assisting in the celebration were Governor Charles S. Whitman of New York, member of the Empire State Society; Lieutenant Charles Timothy Jewett, President of the Indiana Society; President G. T. Wellman of the Alexander Hamilton Chapter of the Iowa Society, the Utah Society, and the Ohio Society.

This anniversary has now become a fixture in the calendar of events of the Sons of the American Revolution, and it is hoped for a larger participation next year.

STORY OF GALVEZ AND LOUISIANA IN THE REVOLUTION.

Response to a toast at the banquet celebrating the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Louisiana Society, Sons of the American Revolution, New Orleans, May 16, 1918, by Henry W. Robinson, Past President of Louisiana Society.

The story of Galvez is the story of Louisiana's part in the American Revolution. It is a story of romance, strategy, suffering, valor—the story of the events which destroyed the British power in the Gulf States and the British menace of attack on the American Army from the South. It is a story so full of the picturesque that it makes us regret Louisiana has not the plenitude of poets, romancists, and historians of New England and New York; for while Louisiana helped to make history, the deeds of our colonial times are little known, even to our people. Bernardo de Galvez belonged to the most powerful family of Spain.

His father was Viceroy of Mexico, his uncle Secretary of State of Spain and President of the Council of the Indies—a post almost equaling in political power that of the king.

In 1777 Bernardo de Galvez, as colonel of the Spanish regiment at New Orleans, was commander-in-chief of the Spanish forces. He was then 21 years of age. So that by the time he was but 25 years old he had won three brilliant campaigns against the British, captured their armies and ships in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, and Florida, and destroyed their military ascendance in the Southern country.

The achievements of this youth were not the incidents of accident, nor due to the guidance of older minds, for he acted where his chiefs held back, and by his personal bravery and leadership compelled their cooperation.

Spain appears to have been very friendy to the American forces. In 1777 and 1778 Oliver Pollock came down the Mississippi with canoes and was supplied with munitions and supplies for Fort Pitt and the Ohio outposts, which doubtless helped to make possible George Rogers Clark's masterly campaign at Vincennes and the routing of the British from the Western territory. Captain Willing of Philadelphia, another agent of the American Army, was likewise furnished with military supplies and enabled to conduct from New Orleans an expedition against the British colonies on the Mississippi.

On May 8, 1779, Spain declared war on England, and almost immediately Galvez prepared to move against the British forts at Natchez and Baton Rouge. He collected a most remarkable army in New Orleans a cosmopolitan force only possible in the New Orleans of that day. It consisted of 170 Spanish regulars, 330 militiamen, or recruits; 20 carabineers, 80 free blacks and mulattoes, Oliver Pollock, and 9 Americans. With these he marched toward Manchac, being joined on the way by 600 planters from the country and 160 Indians, so that his total army was 1.440 men.

On September 7, 1779, he captured Fort Bute, on Bayou Manchac, and at once pressed on to Baton Rouge, defended by a stout fort, with garrison of 400 regulars and 100 militiamen.

Galvez at once invested the fort, cannonaded it vigorously, and, on September 21, Colonel Dickson capitulated—the surrender including Fort Pannure, at Natchez, a small post on the Amite River, and one on Thompson's Creek, in the West Florida parishes.

This exploit made Galvez a brigadier general. He energetically reorganized his forces and sailed early in January, 1780, to attack the British at Mobile. A winter storm scattered his ships and partly spoiled his ammunition and provisions. He returned to New Orleans undaunted and in a few weeks again sailed. He invested Fort Charlotte, at Mobile, with such vigor that it capitulated on March 13.

Galvez at once determined to complete the divestiture of the British of any hold on the Gulf States by driving them out of Pensacola, and for that purpose visited Havana, where he sought and obtained aid. He sailed from Havana on October 16, 1780, but the next day a storm foundered some of his ships, dispersed the rest, and the expedition was deferred.

On February 28, 1781, Galvez, promoted to Mariscal de Camp, sailed from Havana as commander of one man-of-war, two frigates, several transports, and 1,451 soldiers, with complement trains of artillery. Nine days later the expedition arrived at the bar of Pensacola. The Spanish admiral held back from crossing the shallows in the face of the English guns. Galvez, fearing cannons less than storms and apprehensive that squalls might disperse the ships, entered a small boat and personally led the way and made soundings. The navy then followed. Fort George, defending Pensacola, was attacked by the vessels in front and by Galvez's land forces, reinforced by Espelita from Mobile and Miro from New Orleans. The fighting was continuous until May and the casualties heavy. The Spanish were harassed by English regulars and Indians, but constantly advanced their trenches, fighting with handgrenades, howitzers, muskets, and bayonets. Finally a shot struck a magazine in one of the redoubts of the fort and blew it up, making a substantial break. Galvez immediately availed of this catastrophe and attacked.

On May 9, 1781, Fort George capitulated and the whole of West Florida, including the garrison of 800 men, surrendered.

It is, of course, possible that these brilliant campaigns of Galvez postponed by some years the incorporation of Florida, southern Alabama, Mississippi, and the east bank of Louisiana into the American Union. But it remains the historic fact that these defeats of British arms, coupled with Lafayette's victory at Yorktown, wonderfully heartened the American cause, correspondingly decreased London's determination to deny independence to the Colonies, and so helped materially to shorten the war and bring us victory.

I have had opportunity to only bluntly sketch the facts of these campaigns. Their romance has been ignored. Some day, perhaps, we will have a great historical novel based on them. One of its chapters will be the tragic flight of the British colonists near Natchez. When news came of Galvez's expedition to Pensacola, the British at Natchez, believing that Galvez's fleet had been dispersed by storms, by stratagem captured Fort Pannure. Almost immediately came the true news of Galvez's brilliant success. Fearing the wrath of the Spaniards, the colonists, consisting of several hundred men, women, and children, fled in a desperate march through the wilderness to the Atlantic coast. One section was captured by the Americans in Georgia; the other, after 131 days of awful privation, starvation, and attacks by Indians, reached the British settlement at Savannah.

Galvez, hero of three wonderfully successful campaigns at 25, was crowded with honors. He was made Viceroy of Mexico—a king, in fact, of a larger empire than that of his imperial master. He died in Mexico at the age of 38.

These events show that Louisianians, from their beginning, have acted history even when negligent of writing it.

ADDITIONS TO MEMBERSHIP.

DOINGS OF STATE SOCIETIES.

The California Society held its midsummer meeting at the Fairmont Hotel, San Francisco, on June 20, when an address was delivered by Prof. Henry Morse Stephens, formerly of London, on "The Great Reconciliation Between England and the United States." Members of the Society are active in Red Cross and other war work. Compatriot Marshal Hale, as manager of Pacific Division of the American Red Cross, has gone to France on a mission for that organization.

The District of Columbia Society on July 4 held the usual joint celebration with Sons of the Revolution at the Washington Monument. The exercises, presided over by Brig. Gen. George Richards, U. S. M. C., included: Presentation of the colors; reading of the Declaration of Independence, by Col., Frederick C. Bryan; address, by Hon. William C. Fitts, Assistant U. S. Attorney General; address, by Ambassador Jules J. Jusserand. Music was furnished by the U. S. Marine Band.

On September 6 a joint celebration of Lafayette Day and the fourth anniversary of the Battle of the Marne was held at the Lafayette Monument, in Washington, by the Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of the Revolution, and Daughters of the American Revolution. President General Louis Annin Ames presided and made the opening address. The exercises were attended by the President of the United States and Mrs. Wilson. Addresses were made by Count de Chambrun, great-great-grandson of Lafayette, Counsellor of the French Embassy, and by Hon. Josephus Daniels, Secretary of the Navy. Henry Van Dyke's poem, "The Name of France," was read by Mr. Barry Bulkley. "The American's Creed" was pronounced in unison by the audience. Messages were read from President Poincaire and Marshal Jofffe. Another joint meeting of patriotic societies, held in the evening at Memorial Continental Hall, was addressed by Major C. H. Lyell of the British Army. He paid high tribute to Lafayette, and said:

Pause for a moment and think how unusual it would have been a few years ago for an officer of the British Army to join in celebrating the birthday anniversary of General Lafayette. Why is it not strange today? Because our outlook has been changed. Our viewpoint is different. Great Britain feels today that the American Revolution was, after all, a war for Britain herself, because we realize that but for the sharp lesson taught us by the colonists the British Empire of today would never have existed.

The British officer was greeted with a thunder of applause when he expressed the hope that some day a statue may be erected to George Washington in London and on it placed the inscription, "Founder of the British Empire." Empire State Society.—The "win the war" meeting, held at the City Hall, Manhattan, on Tuesday, June 18, at 4 p. m., was a very impressive and inspiring occasion. From the moment that President General Ames called the distinguished assemblage to order and Chaplain Rev. Charles L. Goodell, D. D., pronounced the invocation, there was not a moment that did not inspire the highest patriotic feeling in those present.

After the reception of the colors, the service flag was dedicated by the President General in an impressive manner. He pointed with pride to the 238 stars on the flag, which he said represented the compatriots of the Empire State Society and their sons. Two gold stars on the flag, stood for two members who had died at the hands of the Hun, namely, Lindon Bates, lost on the "Lusitania," and Henry Ammon, who died on the French front. Representing the French Army and Ambassador of France Jusserand, General V. Vignal, in a very graceful and earnest speech, accepted the gift of war ambulances presented to the Republic of France by Compatriot John H. Burroughs in behalf of the Empire State Society. The address of Lieut. V. de Wierzbicki was a wonderful exposition of the enthusiasm and fighting spirit of the French soldier and the French nation. He cited the prominence of the river Marne in the world's history as the point at which the invasion of France by Attila the Hun was stopped in the year 451 A. D., and again the Crescent was thrown back by Charles Martel in 732, while once more civilization was saved from militarism, or Germanism, by General Foch's heroic counter-attacks in the famous Battle of the Marne in 1914. He said the despoiler had never been able to pass the French Army and the Marne, and he predicted they never would do so. This would seem a patriotic prophecy, when we consider how again in the past summer the brave French Army, assisted by the dauntless unit bearing the Stars and Stripes, once again, and we believe for the last time, hurled back the power of Prussianism. France's sacrifices in treasure as well as men were graphically depicted by the speaker, who said that France had lost by conquest four-fifths of its industries and one-fifth of its wealth, yet the people paid taxes four times as great as paid by the population of the United States, and that to equal the loans raised in France the loans of our country would have to reach the stupendous sum of seventy-four billions of dollars-a truly inspiring example with which to measure our Fourth Liberty Loan. Among the guests present were General V. Vignal of the High French Commission, Lieut. V. de Wierzbicki, Commissioner, and Richard E. Enright.

In accordance with the annual custom for many years, a delegation of the Sons of the American Revolution, in Paris, on July 4 placed wreaths on Lafayette's grave and statue and on the statue of Washing-

ton. The event is thus described by Compatriot Coxe in the New York *Herald* (Paris), July 5:

Today the Sons of the American Revolution feel great satisfaction in seeing their work and labor of years past brought to the point at which France takes over the ceremony of the Fourth of July which we inaugurated, and when the French nation sees what propaganda for good Franco-American relation can help achieve.

Never, before the Sons of the American Revolution took it up, was the Fourth of July marked by such ceremony. They inaugurated a ceremony at Lafayette's tomb. They had to struggle against many difficulties, which now seem infantile when compared with the results. Lafayette's tomb will always be remembered, but we enter into another phase of the whole situation. At the beautiful statue of Washington, in the Place d'Iéna, where the great ceremony was held today, the Sons of the American Revolution (the New York Society is called after the well-known title of 'Empire State Society') were the pioneers in making this statue a meeting-place for patriots on Washington's Birthday.

The first meeting we had only three were present. At the next meeting we increased our numbers, and so on for years. Why some one never took this matter up before we did is a mystery, but the noble replica of the statue in New York stood for years, since its inauguration by the American Ambassador, in 1900, neglected and, to a certain extent, unknown.

It is something to point to a record such as that of the Sons of the American Revolution. It is something to see the development, little by little, of the cordial relations on public holidays in Paris. We have truly done our bit. Nothing could be more satisfactory than to see the French take up the Fourth of July in Paris and make it their holiday. It is a compliment to our Society and to America, from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast.

The Empire State Society also took a prominent part in the celebration of Lafayette's birthday in Paris, France, in which General Pershing and representatives of all the Allied governments prominently participated. A wreath of roses was placed upon the tomb of Lafayette, in the Picpus Cemetery, by H. Cleveland Coxe, a delegate of the Empire State Society, who also placed similar wreaths upon the statue of Lafayette in the grounds of the Louvre and upon Washington's monument in the Place d'Iéna.

President General Ames on August 26 addressed a letter to Hon. William G. McAdoo, Secretary of the Treasury, protesting against the allegorical figure representing Germany on the façade of the Custom House, New York, and on September 5 the newspapers announced that the Secretary had authorized Cass Gilbert, architect of the Custom House, to remove all German insignia from the statue and substitute the insignia of Belgium.

Former Chaplain, Rev. Frank Oliver Hall, is a volunteer chaplain, U. S. A., at Camp Gordon, near Atlanta, Georgia. Constitution Day was observed throughout the country on September 17 at the request of the S. A. R. The Department of Education of the City of New York requested that at the morning session in each school there should be special exercises appropriate in character, and reference should be made to the story of the birth of the Constitution and the rights and privileges that American citizens enjoy under its protection.

THE COL. CORNELIUS VAN DYKE CHAPTER held its quarterly business meeting on September 17 in the rooms of the Schenectady County Historical Society, attended by about fifty members. The Secretary reported that the membership had reached 62. The Rev. Dr. Eugene A. Noble read a paper on "The Constitution of the United States and its Makers."

Officers were elected as follows: President, Allen W. Johnston; First Vice-President, Willis W. Roe; Second Vice-President, George McK. Roberts; Secretary, Hanford Robison; Treasurer, George E. Young; Registrar, Henry T. Williams; Historian, William C. Frame; Chaplain, Charles P. Sanders, D. D.; Color Guard, Hon. E. J. Hand, E. A. Shaw, and Heber Williams.

THE NEWBURGH CHAPTER unanimously adopted a resolution asking that the study of the German language be excluded from the public schools of the city of Newburgh, and the Board of Education unanimously approved the substitution of French and Spanish for the German course. Under the lead of the Chapter, on the Fourth of July a national salute was fired and the church bells of the city were rung at sunrise. There was a large parade of patriotic societies at 9 o'clock, followed by exercises at Washington headquarters, presided over by former President S. L. Stewart of Newburgh Chapter. The principal speaker was Supreme Court Justice Arthur S. Tompkins of Nyack. Five thousand people were present, including many recently naturalized men of foreign birth.

Members of the Chapter attended in a body Bastile Day service, at Trinity M. E. Church, on Sunday evening, July 14. An effective patriotic service was preached by the Rev. and Compatriot J. Lewis Hartsock, Ph. D., Chaplain of the Chapter.

THE ROCHESTER CHAPTER, as a result of interest aroused by the Congress of the National Society, enrolled nine new members at its meeting on July 10, and is actively engaged in war-service work.

THE NEW YORK CHAPTER, with a membership of 897, was fully organized on October 15, with officers as follows: President, John H. Burroughs: First Vice-President, Richard T. Davies: Second Vice-

September 17 was celebrated in Honolulu by "The Hands Around the Pacific Movement," as Balboa Day, by a luncheon, with appropriate and patriotic speeches and music, on the roof garden of the Young Hotel. The Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution were represented by their members, occupying a special table decorated for the occasion with banners of the Societies.

The Idaho Society during the last year enrolled 14 sons of members of the Society. A medal of honor was awarded by lot to one of these sons, Robert Lee Nourse, Jr. The Society has published a "Roster and Year Book" of 35 pages containing a list of members, roll of ancestors, and the 1918 gold medal essay on "British-American Relations," by Ora Lewellen of Nampa.

The Illinois Society celebrated Constitution Day, September 17, by a meeting of the Board of Managers at the Union League Club, Chicago, attended by 25 members of the Board. Mr. Harry F. Atwood of Chicago, author of a new book, recently published, entitled "Back to the Republic," gave a most interesting address on the great significance of the Constitution. Seventeen new members were elected and routine business transacted. The Society has furnished a fully equipped ambulance for the battlefields of the western front.

Arrangements to hold the annual Yorktown Day banquet at the Auditorium Hotel on October 19 had been fully completed, when it was necessarily canceled by order of the city authorities, forbidding all meetings and banquets on account of the influenza epidemic. The exercises were to have included addresses on "Stories from a Government Official," by Hinton G. Clabaugh, superintendent Bureau of Investigation, Department of Justice; "Stories from the Trenches," by Miss Ada Ward, official entertainer to the British troops, and "America and the World Crisis," by Prof. Herbert L. Willett, D. D., of the University of Chicago.

The service flag to have been dedicated at the banquet contains 130 stars.

Almost without exception the officers and members of the Illinois Society are active in various civilian posts of government service. Three former Presidents of the Society are giving their whole time voluntarily in connection with the selective-service boards, while many others are serving on appeal boards, commissions, and in all the various forms of war welfare work.

Illinois is this year celebrating its centennial of its admission to the Union. It is only during the last two or three years, as the centennial appoached, that any public notice has been taken of this anniversary. It should be noted, however, that for nearly 30 years the Illinois Society, Sons of the American Revolution, has recognized the anniversary by a provision in its Constitution that the annual meeting of the Society shall be held on December 3, the anniversary of the admission of the Prairie State into the Union.

As related in detail elsewhere in the present BULLETIN, Compatriot La Verne Noyes, former President of the Society, has most generously established an endowment of about \$2,500,000, the income of which will be used for the education of soldiers and sailors in the present war and their descendants.

The Louisiana Society held its midsummer meeting at the Grunewald Hotel, New Orleans, on July 17. Compatriot Weston told of the proceedings at the Rochester Congress, and survivors of the ill-fated S. S. "Carolina" related their experiences when submarined by a German Uboat.

The story of Galvez, told by Compatriot Robinson at a meeting of the Society on May 16, is printed in the National Year Book and reprinted elsewhere in the present BULLETIN. As an addition thereto is given a list of some of the men serving in the army of Galvez. If any member of the Society has any information on this interesting campaign it should be communicated to C. Robert Churchill, President of the Louisiana Society, S. A. R., 408 Canal street, New Orleans.

The Massachusetts Society had arranged for a Field Day at Lowell on Liberty-Columbus Day, October 12, as a memorial to the late Moses Greeley Parker, but the event was necessarily postponed on account of the influenza epidemic. President General Ames was to have been one of the guests. A visit was to have been made to the grave of Col. Louis Ansart, a hero of the Revolution.

Colonel Ansart was a Frenchman, who came to Massachusetts in 1776 to furnish the State with solid bored iron cannon by means of a machine invented by his father in France. Massachusetts authorities appointed

him Colonel of Artillery and Inspector General of the Foundries, in which capacity he served to the close of the Revolutionary War. His name was Marie Louis Amand Ansart de Marisquelles, but upon being naturalized his name became Louis Ansart by act of Legislature in 1793. He built furnaces at Stoughton, Titecut, and Bridgewater and resided in Dracut. In 1778 he was aid-de-camp to Gen. John Sullivan at Newport, R. I., and was there wounded in the engagement with the British. The Society has placed a bronze marker, suitably inscribed, at Colonel Ansart's grave in Woodburn Cemetery, Dracut.

The Ohio Society.—Vice-President General Henry, Chairman of the Organization Committee, Mississippi Valley, East District, attended a meeting of the officers and Board of Managers of the Ohio Society and Presidents of local Chapters at Delaware, Ohio, on October 5, when the desirability of increased membership was discussed and plans arranged to forward the work by the methods so successfully carried out by the Michigan Society.

The Rhode Island Society.—Christopher Rhodes, for twenty-five years Secretary of the Society, died August 10, 1918. Nathaniel F. Davis, 159 Brown street, Providence, R. I., has been elected as Secretary until the annual election in February, 1919.

The Utah Society.—The anniversary of the adoption of the Constitation of the United States was commemorated in Utah by a proclamation by the Governor of the State that all schools and churches throughout the State fittingly celebrate the day with appropriate ceremonies, and that flags be displayed on all public and private buildings. The Mayor of Salt Lake City issued a similar proclamation. Patriotic addresses were made at the East Side High School by President George Albert Smith of the Utah Society and Mayor W. Mont Ferry, compatriot. Patriotic addresses were made at the West Side High School by former Presidents of the Utah Society, Frank B. Stephens and Chauncey P. Overfield. The anniversary was very generally recognized by the citizens and public officials throughout the entire State.

THE AMERICAN'S CREED.

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people, whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic; a sovereign nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable, established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies.

STORY OF THE AMERICAN'S CREED.

The idea of laying special emphasis upon the duties and obligations of citizenship in the form of a national creed originated with Henry S. Chapin. In 1916-1917 a contest, open to all Americans, was inaugurated in the press throughout the country to secure "the best summary of the political faith of America." The contest was informally approved by the President of the United States. The artists and authors of the Vigilantes, especially, and representatives of other patriotic societies
