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The Official Bulletin records action by the General Officers, the Board of Trustees, the Executive and other National Committees, lists of members deceased and of new members, and important doings of State Societies. In order that the Official Bulletin may be up to date, and to insure the preservation in the National Society archives of a complete history of the doings of the entire organization, State Societies and local Chapters are requested to communicate promptly to the Secretary General written or printed accounts of all meetings or celebrations, to forward copies of all notices, circulars, and other printed matter issued by them, and to notify him at once of dates of death of members.

#### OFFICIAL NOTICES.

A suggestion has been made that the Secretary General send to the Secretaries of the State Societies before the issue of each BULLETIN a notice fixing a definite period within which material for publication in the BULLETIN must be furnished. In order to receive the benefit of the postal laws covering the mailing of printed matter, the Society is compelled to print and mail its BULLETIN during the month in which it bears date of publication. As the material for the BULLETIN must be in the hands of the printers before the 15th of the month of issue, it will be necessary to send such matter to the Secretary General not later than the first of that month. This will afford time to use the material if desirable and avoid disappointing the sender. With this general statement, it is hoped that the Secretaries will be able to fully understand and meet the requirements of the situation.

Admiral Hugh Rodman, commander of the great naval fleet now on the western coast, has been for a long time a member of the District of Columbia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Owing to the greatly increased expense to the National Society in the matter of furnishing the engraved certificates of membership, it has been found necessary to establish a new price of \$2.00 for each certificate.

The "high cost of living," as might have been expected, has shown its effect in various ways upon the business of the National Society. On this account a new schedule of the cost of application blanks has become necessary.

The Secretary General is in receipt almost daily of requests for copies of pamphlets formerly printed and issued by the Society relating to the subjects of immigration, naturalization, etc. These requests often cover supplies of 500 or 1,000 copies. It is desired that members of the Society and all others interested should be informed that the publication of the pamphlets referred to was discontinued several years ago, and to some extent assumed by the United States Government. Information on the subject may be had by addressing the Bureau of Naturalization, U. S. Department of Labor, Washington, D. C.

The Traveling Banner, presented to the National Society by the Colorado Society, is awarded each year, by the terms of the gift, to the

State Society of one hundred or more members which makes the largest percentage of net gain in membership during the year ending March 31. At the Detroit Congress it was awarded to the Louisiana Society.

The Syracuse Banner, presented to the National Society by the Syracuse Chapter, is awarded each year to the State Society making the greatest actual enrollment of new members during the year ending March 31. At the Detroit Congress it was awarded to the New Jersey Society.

### MEDALS FOR MEMBERS WHO SERVED IN WORLD WAR.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee held at Baltimore, Md., December 12, 1918, a committee was appointed with power to secure bronze memorial medals or badges for members, sons of members, and families of deceased members who have served in the late World War, the State Societies to pay the cost of the badges and the presentation to be made with some formality, in the presence of a National Society officer.

In accordance with this authority a design for the medal was prepared and contract entered into for the manufacture thereof. The committee fixed a price of \$1.00 for each medal.

The Secretary General has received a supply of five hundred medals, of which about four hundred have already been secured by State Societies. It is hoped that all States will promptly act in this matter and advise the Secretary General of the number of medals required by each, in order that an adequate supply may be secured from the manufacturer.

#### WAR RISK INSURANCE

An appeal has been made by the Conservation Section of the War Risk Insurance Bureau of the U. S. Government, asking the aid of this Society in its effort to reach every soldier in the late war who took out Government insurance when he entered the army and has allowed it to lapse, for whatever cause, after leaving the service. The War Risk Bureau states that "the Sons of the American Revolution have formed for the purpose of fostering the spirit which caused so many brave men to join the colors at the nation's call. It is our purpose to assist the soldier after his duty has been performed." Therefore they "wish to enlist your entire membership in the work of voluntary war risk insurance conservation."

#### ANNUAL CONGRESS.

The Executive Committee having accepted the invitation of the Connecticut Society, the next Annual Congress will be held in the city of

Hartford, on the third Monday in May, 1920. We hope to be able to announce in our next BULLETIN the local Committee of Arrangements as well as any other information available concerning the arrangements for the Congress.

#### THE YEAR BOOK FOR 1919.

It is hoped by the Secretary General that it will be possible to issue the next Year Book about the same time as the distribution of this BULLETIN. It has, however, been found extremely difficult to procure information absolutely necessary for making a complete official record of the various State Societies as well as other requisite data from different sources. A start was made early in June to procure necessary material, but at this writing it is still being received in a somewhat incomplete manner, and a considerable number of State returns are yet missing.

Secretaries of State Societies are requested to advise the Secretary General as to the number of Year Books which each Society may desire. Under the ruling of the Executive Committee the Year Book is published in a limited edition, free distribution being made only to the General Officers, Executive Committee, Trustees, one copy to each Chapter, two copies to each State Society, one to each delegate at Detroit, and to the usual list of libraries. Such additional copies as may be available may be sold at cost price.

# LA VERNE NOYES FOUNDATION FOR EDUCATION OF SOLDIERS AND SAILORS AND THEIR DESCENDANTS

Under this title the BULLETIN of October, 1918, contained a description in detail of the magnificent gift of Compatriot La Verne Noyes, former President of the Illinois Society and Vice-President General of the National Society, to the University of Chicago, consisting of real estate valued at about \$2,500,000, creating thereby the "La Verne Noyes Foundation," the income from which will be used for the education of soldiers or sailors who have served in the present World War, their children and descendants.

The Detroit Congress adopted resolutions extending the thanks and

congratulations of the entire membership of the Society to Compatriot Noyes for his generous and patriotic action.

We have since learned from the newspapers that Compatriot Noyes died in Chicago on July 24 last. It is stated that he was born in Genoa, N. Y., in 1849, and was a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and president of the board of trustees of the Chicago Academy of Science, to which he made many contributions. The Ida Noyes Hall, a \$300,000 social center and gymnasium at the University of Chicago for woman students, was his memorial to his wife, a writer and artist, who died in 1912.

## PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY.

The following amendment to section I, article 5, of the Constitution has been proposed by the Empire State Society, the same having been offered by Past President General Louis Annin Ames, at a meeting of that Society held at the City Hall, New York City, on Flag Day, June 14, 1919, the offer being seconded by Past President General Marble, and carried unanimously by the Society, as follows:

To insert, following the words "Historian General," the words "Genealogist General, Chancellor General," and in the National By-Laws change the number of article 9 to article 11, and to insert after article 8, article 9, "Genealogist General," and that reads:

"The Genealogist General shall examine and report to the National Executive Committee upon all appeals from the decision or want of action of the Registrar General, which shall be submitted to him for that purpose, within thirty days after submission to him, and shall at the same time advise the Registrar General of the National Society, from whom he received such appeals, of the result of his examination."

#### ARTICLE X .- Chancellor General.

The Chancellor General shall be a lawyer duly admitted to the bar, and it shall be his duty to give legal opinions on matters affecting the Society when called upon by the proper officers.



CELEBRATION OF CONSTITUTION DAY SEPTEMBER 17, 1919.

Under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution, directed by a committee composed of distinguished members of the Society, with Past President General Louis Annin Ames as chairman, many meetings were held in various sections of the country in celebration of Constitution Day, September 17. Several reports of the meetings have been received.

The meeting at Boston, at the Old South Meeting House, was a great success, President Henry Fuller Punderson, presiding, and an address was delivered by Hon. David Jayne Hill, D. D., President of the District of Columbia Society.

The one at Independence Hall, Philadelphia, attracted nation-wide

The one in New York City was very unique. The compatriots left Broadway and Fulton Street, old St. Paul's Church, at 11.45 a. m., marched down Broadway to Wall Street, on Wall Street east to Nassau Street, the Sub-Treasury Building, Nassau and Wall Streets, the site on which was ratified the Constitution of the United States by New York. Major Chas. A. Du Bois, Secretary of the Empire State Society, was grand marshal; presiding officer, Past President General Louis Annin Ames. The speaker was Dr. Herbert Adams Gibbons, a war correspondent of the New York Herald and a member on the staff of The Century. In attendance was the Police Glee Club of the City of New York. The exercises opened with the singing of the Star Spangled Banner by the Glee Club and introductory remarks by the chairman. After the address by the orator of the occasion, the Glee Club furnished two operatic selections and the audience, numbering about 8,000, joined with the Glee Club in singing "America." It was a magnificent sight. Every man in the audience was uncovered and all of the office buildings on Wall, Broad, and Nassau Streets had spectators in the windows. Never did the strains of "America" float over lower New York in greater volume than during the noon hour on Constitution Day, September 17, 1919.

The Oregon Society celebrated the day by sending speakers to the different high schools in Portland, and to some extent throughout the State. At six of the eight high schools in Portland the speakers were members of the Oregon Society. Twelve towns in the State held exercises under the direction of members of the Society. To each of the high schools was presented a framed copy of "The American's Creed," and the Oregon Society expects to present a similar copy of the creed to all the high schools in the State.

The California Society also celebrated the day by a dinner in San Francisco, on October 15.

#### THE CONSTITUTION.

#### ADDITIONS TO MEMBERSHIP

There have been enrolled in the Registrar General's Office from May 30, 1919, to October 1, 1919, 349 new members in 30 State Societies, as follows: California, 3; Colorado, 5; Connecticut, 9; Hawaii, 2; Idaho, 1; Illinois, 31; Indiana, 2; Iowa, 15; Kansas, 7; Kentucky, 6; Louisiana, 23; Maine, 10; Maryland, 4; Massachusetts, 23; Minnesota, 11; Missouri, 18; Nebraska, 11; New Jersey, 38; New York (Empire State), 50; North Carolina, 1; North Dakota, 8; Ohio, 19; Oklahoma, 3; Ore-

gon, 5; Pennsylvania, 15; Rhode Island, 11; Virginia, 10; Washington, 4; Wisconsin, 3; Wyoming, 1.

#### ACTIVITIES OF THE PRESIDENT GENERAL.

With the purpose of bringing about a closer sympathy and co-operation between the State Societies and Chapters and to establish a more intimate relationship between the State Societies and Chapters and the National Society, the President General is making an extended series of official visits. These visits have thus far included the Anthony Wayne Chapter, at Toledo; the Western Reserve Chapter, at Cleveland; the Buffalo, Rochester, and Syracuse Chapters; the George Washington Chapter, at Springfield, Mass.; the Worcester Chapter; the Massachusetts Society, at Boston, and the Boston Chapter, at Nantasket Beach; the New Hampshire Society, at Concord; the Maine Society, at Portland; the Wisconsin Society, at Milwaukee; the Minnesota Society, at St. Paul and Minneapolis, and the Iowa Society, at Des Moines.

Schedules have been arranged and active preparations are now in progress for additional visits, as follows: The Vermont Society, at Burlington, October 16; on the same day the President General will participate in the dedication exercises of a tablet to be erected on the site of the residence of Vermont's first governor, Thomas Chittenden, at Williston; the Connecticut Society, at Hartford and Bridgeport, October 21; the Rhode Island Society, at Providence, October 22; the New Jersey Society and the Orange Chapter, at South Orange and East Orange, on October 25; the Maryland Society, at Baltimore, on October 27; the District of Columbia Society, at Washington, October 28; the Missouri Society, at St. Louis, October 30.

The Western trip includes receptions as follows: The Nebraska Society, at Lincoln, on November 7; the Colorado Society, at Denver, November 8; the Wyoming Society, at Cheyenne, November 10; the Utah Society, at Salt Lake City, November 11; the Idaho Society, at Boise, November 13; the Oregon Society, at Portland, November 15; the Washington Society, at Seattle, November 16, and the California Society, at San Francisco.

It is the ambition of the President General to visit officially each one of the State Societies. The meetings thus far held have been most enthusiastic and a campaign for increased membership and increased activity is in progress throughout the country. The central thought at all of the gatherings attended by the President General has been the Americanization movement. Public interest in the Society is evinced by the space given in the newspapers to the functions in honor of the

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President General, and to the aims and achievements of the organization. The observance of Constitution Day has done much to focus the patriotic thought of compatriots all through the United States. Another vivifying influence is the study which is going on in preparation for the nation-wide observance of the 300th Anniversary of the Landing of the Pilgrims.

On August 31, at the Coliseum in Chicago, the President General presided at the opening of the All-American Exposition. Additional speakers were James Edgar Brown and Major W. G. Adkins, of the Illinois Society, Sons of the American Revolution; other members of the Illinois Society acted as ushers and the affair received much creditable mention in the Chicago dailies.

#### HOW TO BUILD UP YOUR MEMBERSHIP.

(1) Get up a good, attractive, live booklet, in which the purposes and aims of the Society are set forth and in which a complete roster of the members is shown. Make it appear that the organization is alive and doing something. Nobody wants anything to do with an organization that is dead or in a moribund state.

(2) Then get up a list of every available eligible person that you can think of. Get this list by personal solicitation and letters from among the members of your State Society. Compile the list carefully.

(3) Then go to the Daughters of the American Revolution and kindred societies and get lists of all their members. Get some of the ladies interested and get them to give you names of people who are eligible—a father, brother, or son of any of the members of the Daughters of the American Revolution are eligible.

Having gotten up your list, proceed to get to work. Do not depend upon a membership committee unless you know that that committee is going to work. Do not depend upon sending engraved or other types of invitations out to other prospective members. Half of the time these invitations are not opened. They find themselves going straight to the waste-basket.

Use the press whenever possible, but do not do a lot of talking through the newspapers that you cannot back up.

Distribute the booklets freely and plentifully—take name of every prospect to whom you give a booklet and follow this up by mail from time to time.

Have your Society give a dinner or two and one or more entertainments. Agitate at each of these gatherings the getting of new members. Show how necessary it is to get new members in order to build the Society up. And then go to work!

Work on the members to get in their brothers and sons. Work on these people to get in their cousins. Bring the matter before active members of the Daughters of the American Revolution organization and urge each and every one of these ladies to get in their father, brothers, and sons and their husband, too, if he is eligible. Send every member of the Daughters of the American Revolution a booklet and invite them to the gatherings.

Believe me, this is really the best and most profitable way in which to build up the membership. And when you once get a man interested, keep after him. Do not let him off with a mere letter, but use a regular follow-up system, telling him, if possible, whose papers you could use on which to bring him in. Make up these papers for him. Do not wait for the man to make them himself, otherwise he will never do it. Have them made up for him.

Now, all of this work takes time and takes some money, but you cannot get anywhere without expecting to take some time and make some expenditures.

In several instances, knowing that it takes a lot of time and costs money to have papers made up, we have arranged with some certain parties in the outlying towns to have copied for the prospective member his mother's, sister's, cousin's, and brother's paper and bring it to him to sign. In some instances we have allowed the party attending this work for us the initiation fee. In one instance a lady member of the Daughters of the American Revolution wrote up about twenty papers and got in fourteen new members.

In all instances where papers have been made up in the writer's office we have allowed one of the young ladies a special fee of 25 cents, which the Society pays, for every prospect we have actually gotten in. This lady has averaged making up three papers for every two applicants that we secured. You do not go anywhere without work—plenty of work and steady work. You have to make a business of the proposition, just as you would do with your own affairs.

The wearing of the lapel button is one of the best methods of bringing members into the Society. It causes people to ask questions, and when they are told the significance of the button they get to thinking and in many instances they voluntarily say, "I think I am eligible for that Society," and if properly followed up it may mean another member.

The Louisiana Society is recognizing the advertising value of the

buttons and gives each of its members at least one button a year with the understanding that they will wear them,

The average man does not think to send in twenty-five cents for a button and the result is he never wears one. If the button is given to him he will wear it, and generally with good results.

During the month of May a button was mailed to every member of the Louisiana Society, together with a letter in which the member was asked to wear the button and to solicit members as a result of inquiry relative to the button.

Within ten days after the buttons were mailed we had inquiries from five people which will probably lead to five new members.

In the spring of 1917, at the time the writer became President of the Louisiana Society, we had nominally about 105 members; there were actually about 50 members; so we weeded out all of the dead ones and started afresh. Before the end of the national fiscal year, in May, 1918, we had built up our membership to 102 good, active members.

Then we got bold and determined we should put over a real honest membership campaign. We did not get busy on this until the summer of 1918 and did not get it working until the fall of 1918. The result is, however, that by March 31, 1919, the end of the National Association's fiscal year, we had grown to 221 members and besides had about a dozen applications pending and possibly fifty more in sight.

What the Louisiana Society has done others can do. Why not try?

#### EVENTS IN THE STATE SOCIETIES.

The Connecticut Society, on the 14th of June, 1919, elected officers for the year, as follows: President, Dr. George C. F. Williams, Hartford; Vice-Presidents, Hon. Rollin S. Woodruff, New Haven; Hon. H. Wales Lines, Meriden; Hon. Ernest E. Rogers, New London; Secretary, Chas. G. Stone, P. O. Box 847, Hartford; Treasurer, O. H. Brothwell, Bridgeport; Registrar, Frederick Bostwick, 144 Grove Street, New Haven; Historian, Frank B. Gay, Hartford; Chaplain, Rev. Orville A. Petty, New Haven; Necrologist, L. Belknap, Hartford. The Society held its annual meeting and luncheon in Hartford, at the Hartford Club. The membership of the Society has been increased to 1,156. Dr. Williams was President of the Society several years ago.

Lucius P. Deming, the first President General of the National Society, has presented to the Connecticut Society, of which he was a member, a photograph of the group of men who met in the celebrated Fraunce's Tavern, in the city of New York, on April 30, 1889, and organized the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. Jonathan Trumbull.

of Norwich, who was President of the State Society seventeen years, died during the year.

The Connecticut Society will hold a field day in Bridgeport on October 21 and give a reception and dinner in honor of President General Jenks. The managers of the Society will offer prizes amounting to \$150 for essays on subjects of the American Revolution to be written by pupils of grammar and high schools of the State. A war relief committee was appointed to look after any cases of want or distress to members of the State Society or their families during the late war.

The General David Humphreys Branch, No. 1, of the Connecticut Society, assisted by the Second Company Governor's Foot Guard, organized March 2, 1775, decorated the graves of 128 soldiers and patriots, in Grove Street Cemetery, and many others in various places in New Haven and vicinity, on Sunday, June 15, 1919. An interesting program was followed, including special exercises at the graves of Eli Denslow and General David Humphreys.

The District of Columbia Society mourns the loss of one of its oldest and most highly esteemed members in the death of Colonel William Baker Thompson, a former President and a most devoted member of the Society. His death occurred on the 15th of August last, at his summer home, at Haven, Maine. He had long been a resident of Washington, having located there after the Civil War, in which he served as a member of the Michigan cavalry, from which State he enlisted. He served in the railway mail service of the Post-Office Department for many years, becoming General Superintendent of that service and later an Assistant Postmaster General, retiring in 1885. Thereafter and until his death he was a member of a firm of railroad attorneys which he had formed. His body was buried in the Arlington National Cemetery. An eloquent funeral address was delivered by Senator Townsend, of Michigan, at the church service. Colonel Thompson was a delegate for the local Society at numerous Sons of the American Revolution National Congresses. He was a member of many organizations, a man who made many friends, and through his amiable and lovable qualities he retained them to his death. It was difficult to realize that his death came just thirteen days prior to attaining the age of 81 vears, having been born August 27, 1838.

The Florida Society reports good and increasing interest in that State and promise of co-operation in building up the Society. It is hoped to have Chapters in Jacksonville, Tampa, Miami, and Orlando.

The Hawaiian Society held its annual meeting at Honolulu, on June 17, and elected officers for the year as follows: President, David L. Withington; Vice-President, Rev. L. L. Loofbourow; Secretary, James T. Taylor; Treasurer, John Effinger; Registrar, Elmer T. Winant. At the same time the Society celebrated its twenty-fourth anniversary with appropriate exercises in which the ladies of the Daughters of the American Revolution united. On July 4 the Society, with various other organizations, joined in patriotic exercises on the palace grounds. the Hon. Sanford B. Dole presiding. On August II the Society, at the first regular meeting of its officers and managers, adopted resolutions of respect to the memory of Compatriot George W. R. King, an enthusiastic patriot and honored member of the organization, who died July 5, 1919. Also resolutions of respect to the memory of their deceased President, David L. Withington (who died on July 21, 1919), in which is expressed the great loss suffered by the Society, and by the officers who deeply feel the loss of a personal friend and fellow-worker greatly loved by them.

Secretary Taylor (whose address is 511 Stangenwald Building, Honolulu, T. H.) says that in case any of the officers or members of the National Society stop over at Honolulu on their way to the Far East the local members should be glad to be notified, so that they will be able to entertain the visitors while they are in Honolulu. Compatriot Leon L. Loofbourow has become President of the Society.

The Maryland Society held its first meeting of the winter on October 18, 1919, at the home of its President, Hon. James H. Preston. The occasion marks the anniversary of the "burning of the brig Peggy Stewart" and also the "surrender of the British army at Yorktown."

The Massachusetts Society held a celebration of Constitution Day in Faneuil Hall, Boston, on September 17, the address being delivered by Hon. David Jayne Hill, L.L. D., ex-Ambassador to Germany and President of the District of Columbia Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

The Town of Westfield, on September 3, held very interesting exercises at the unveiling of the statue of Major General William Shepard.

The General Francis Lewis Chapter of Walpole spent the entire day of July 4 as a "Welcome Home" to their men returned from the World War. The Nelly Custis Lewis Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution joined in the ceremonies, which included a luncheon and a parade through the town, escorted by the G. A. R. Post and music, to a stand on the Common, where a certificate of service and a

bank check was presented to each soldier, accompanied by addresses appropriate to the occasion.

On June 23 George Washington Chapter welcomed into New England President General Chancellor L. Jenks, of the National Society, with a reception held at the Springfield Country Club. Addresses of welcome were delivered by President Samuel F. Punderson, of the local Chapter, and by Henry F. Punderson, President of the State Society. The President General delivered an appropriate address, and later, with Mrs. Jenks, was handsomely entertained by the Chapter.

On June 25 Boston Chapter gave a complimentary dinner to President General Chancellor L. Jenks at the Atlantic Club, Point Allerton, Mass., and the next day he was the guest of the board of managers of the State Society at its monthly meeting at the Boston City Club.

On June 28 the George Washington Chapter held its Annual Historical Pilgrimage to the Pine Grove Springs Hotel, Lake Spofford, N. H., about 70 miles from Springfield. The Keene, New Hampshire, Chapter was invited to meet with the visitors.

The New Hampshire Society held its annual meeting on June 17, in the rooms of the New Hampshire Historical Society, at Concord. The meeting was very successful and was marked by the presence of many members of Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who were invited guests of the Society. The report showed a membership of 214, having added 6 since the last meeting. The feature of the meeting was an exceptionally fine paper on "Revolutionary Times in New Hampshire," by Miss Mabel J. Brickett, of Molly Stark Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, of Manchester. The following officers were elected: President, Harry T. Lord, Manchester; Vice-Presidents, Ashley K. Harvey, Hanover; Ira F. Harris, Nashua; Walter S. Baker, Concord; Secretary and Treasurer, Howard F. Hill, Concord; Historian, Rufus H. Baker, Concord; Chaplain, Rev. J. W. Presby, Chichester.

The New Jersey Society dedicated a boulder and bronze tablet in memory of Abraham Clark, a New Jersey Signer of the Declaration of Independence, at Roselle, in that State, on Saturday, September 13. Carl M. Vail, President, Mayor MacQuoid, of Roselle, and Governor William M. Runyon, of New Jersey, delivered the addresses of the occasion. The feature of the ceremony was the presence of thirteen young ladies of the town, representing the Original States. Each one deposited a bouquet of flowers upon the memorial as a tribute from the States. The procession, in which a number of distinguished citizens,

school children, and others took part, preceded the exercises, which took place at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The exercises were planned by David L. Pierson, chairman of the Committee on Monuments and Memorials. The tablet was the gift of the New Jersey Society and the boulder was provided by the residents of Roselle.

The Empire State Society, on June 14, 1919, held a meeting at the City Hall, New York City, at which time medals for war service were distributed to the members of the Society that had been engaged in the World War. Over 150 members and their friends marched from the headquarters, 220 Broadway, preceded by the "Spirit of '76" Band of the Society, to the City Hall. The procession was headed by Col. William H. Corbusier, one of the oldest members of the Society, a veteran of the Civil, Spanish-American, and Philippine wars and still in active service. Over thirty members were decorated with the medals by Past President General Louis Annin Ames, assisted by Past President General William A. Marble, who presented his son, Lt. Col. William E. Marble, with his medal, and President Harvey Foote Remington his son, Lieut. William B. Remington. The ceremony was very impressive and gave the Society the opportunity to become acquainted with those that had taken part in the conflict.

Newspapers received from Paris contain accounts of the ceremonies at Lafayette's Tomb on July 4th, and we make the following interesting extract from one of the papers:

The Sons of the American Revolution which in past years has conducted the ceremony at Lafayette's Tomb, Picpus Cemetery, combined with the Embassy and Army this year.

Cleveland Coxe, national delegate for the S. A. R., placed on the tomb a splendid wreath, duly inscribed and joined with the colors of the Society—blue, buff, and gold. This was the only wreath on the historical tomb besides that placed there by the American Ambassador.

Mr. Coxe also placed, yesterday, on Washington's Monument, Place d'Iéna, a similar wreath in the name of the S. A. R. and another in the name of Mr. William Nelson Cromwell, who takes a great interest in the Society. At the monument of Lafayette he also placed, in the name of the S. A. R., another big wreath, as has been the practice since the war.

Noticeable at the Picpus ceremony was the Marquis de la Fayette, whom Captain Cleveland Coxe introduced to the Ambassador, saying that since the days of General Horace Porter, his distinguished predecessor, the Marquis de la Fayette, had always represented the family.

It is also stated that an active campaign is being waged to induce the men of the A. E. F. to enroll in the Sons of the American Revolution.

Newburgh Chapter held its sixteenth annual meeting on June 2. The Chapter reports show that it is in a flourishing condition and gaining in membership. This Chapter also held its sixteenth annual banquet on April 25, a very successful and enjoyable affair. An address was delivered by President General Louis Annin Ames. The Chapter held the usual Independence Day celebration at Washington's Headquarters in Newburgh.

The Oregon Society celebrated Lafayette's birth, on September 6, by holding a reception in honor of the members of the Society who had served with the colors during the war. The meeting was large, enthusiastic, and interesting, and was held at the University Club in Portland.

Salem Chapter having ceased to function, a petition from its members was received requesting that it be discontinued, and action has been taken dissolving the Chapter, but retaining its members as members of the Oregon Society.

The Pennsylvania Society sends us the cheerful news that "Pennsylvania is not dead yet," and this accompanies a newspaper account indicating that considerable interest is being shown in the establishment in Conneautville of a branch of the "Sons of the American Revolution." It is hoped that "Conneautville may be the initial town in four counties to establish a Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, thereby placing itself on the map in a new and most substantial way." Membership is urged on the ground that "it is, without question, the duty of every person qualified to join this, the most patriotic American organization in the United States, which establishes one's Americanism beyond doubt."

The Virginia Society, through its President, Compatriot Arthur B. Clarke, extended an invitation on behalf of the Commonwealth of Virginia, to attend, on August 15, the celebration of the "Three Hundredth Anniversary of the First Law-making Body Assembled on the Western

Hemisphere," which met at Jamestown July 30, 1619. The celebration was held at the Capitol, in Richmond. At the exercises, held before a joint assembly of the State Senate and House of Delegates, addresses were delivered by Dr. John L. Hall, of the College of William and Mary; by Governor Westmoreland Davis, and by Dr. Thomas Nelson Page, U. S. Ambassador to Italy.

The State of Virginia is collecting every paper that can be found relating to the Revolutionary War, and we are in receipt of a copy of the recently published "Proceedings of the Committees of Safety of Cumberland and Isle of Wight Counties" printed by the State Librarian. It has been presented by President Clarke, of the Virginia Society, Sons of the American Revolution, and is a useful reference book as well as an addition to our collection.

The Wisconsin Society reports the death, August 22, 1919, of Compatriot Horace A. J. Upham, a well-known member of that Society. Mr. Upham was a prominent member of the Milwaukee bar and of high standing in Wisconsin legal circles. He had a long and successful career as an attorney and was a trustee of numerous large estates at Milwaukee.
