FOREWORD TO OUR COMPATRIOTS

The Officers of the National Society and the Editors of the Bulletin, following the direction of the National Congress and the Executive Committee, have discontinued the Year Book and instead have enlarged the BULLETIN to cover, to a certain extent at least, the information that was contained in the Year Book, which reached but a small proportion of our members. On account of the shortness of the time between the National Congress, held in Buffalo May 16 and 17, and the issuance of this BULLETIN, which, under the postal regulations, must be mailed before the end of June, this issue must necessarily be somewhat hastily compiled, and no doubt many errors have been made. However, it will be the endeavor of the Officers and Editors in the remaining issues of this year to make the BULLETIN a complete, interesting, and live record of all the matters pertaining to the best that is in this Society. The co-operation of the compatriots is cordially invited to assist the Editors in this work, and our members are assured that it will be the endeavor of those in charge to give space and prominence to all matters that affect the best interests of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT GENERAL

DEAR COMPATRIOTS:

There are two administrative matters to which the attention of the Society should be directed. One of them relates to the troublesome question of finances. The expenses of the National Society have increased out of all proportion to its income. Additional revenues are required if the balance is to be maintained on the right side of the ledger. The showing to this effect was so clear that there was no substantial difference of opinion on the subject at the Buffalo Congress. After canvassing the ways and means of increasing the revenues, the Congress voted by a large majority to increase the per capita tax from fifty cents to one dollar. The State Societies are earnestly requested to accept this increase in a proper spirit and to render the financial support which is essential to the important work the National Society is doing.

It is important that correct lists of the names and addresses of members be maintained by the State Societies and lodged with the Secretary General. I should be gratified if all the State Societies would immediately revise their membership rolls and forward correct records for the use of the National Society. The lists now in use urgently require revision.

I hope that during the coming year the Society may make its influence felt in the matter of patriotic education. The public schools are by far the most effective force making for Americanization. It is essential that their teaching be sound on the fundamentals of Americanism. There should be a nation-wide censorship of the text-books on history and constitutional government. Some of the text-books now in use are full of errors; others are inadequate in the emphasis they lay on the American Revolution and the sacrifices it involved; a few of them are sympathetic with radical propaganda. Students should be correctly taught the facts leading up to the creation of the American Commonwealth; they should be impressed, while still children, with the value of our political heritage.

The faculties of our institutions of higher learning should be purged of destructive radicals. Men out of harmony with the principles of the Constitution should not be given the floor at the students' assemblies in our universities. We are particularly within our rights when we ask that institutions supported by taxation be sound in their teaching and in the atmosphere they throw about their student bodies.

Residing as I do in a section of the Union remote from the great centers of population, it will not be possible for me to visit the State Societies so freely as some of my predecessors have done. I do hope to make one eastern trip in the course of the year, probably in February, 1922. I also hope to bring the Far Western Societies into closer touch with the National Organization than in times past.

WALLACE McCAMANT

President General

WALLACE McCamant was born at Hollidaysburg, Pa., on the 22d of September, 1867. He is the son of Thomas and Delia (Rollins) McCamant. His father was Auditor General of Pennsylvania from 1888 to 1892.

Wallace McCamant was educated in the public schools of Harrisburg, Pa., and graduated from Lafayette College in 1888. He read law in Lancaster, Pa., and was admitted to the bar of the Second Judicial District of Pennsylvania in 1890. He immediately removed to Portland, Oregon, where he has been engaged in the practice of his profession ever since.

He was Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Oregon from January 9, 1917, to June 4, 1918. He was a delegate to the Republican National Conventions of 1896, 1900, and 1920. In the latter convention he served on the subcommittee on resolutions, which framed the platform, and he also placed in nomination Hon. Calvin Coolidge, the present Vice-President.

He has been a member of the Sons of the American Revolution since 1891 and served as President of the Oregon Society from 1907 to 1921. He was Vice-President General of the National Society from 1913 to 1914. During his incumbency as President of the Oregon Society this Society entertained the National Society at Portland.

Mr. McCamant married Katherine S. Davis, of Phillipsburg, N. J., in 1893. Mrs. McCamant is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and has been State Regent in Oregon.

Mr. McCamant is a 33d-Degree Mason, deeply interested in the work of the Masonic fraternity, and has been for nearly thirty years a member of the Oregon Commandery of the Loyal Legion. Mr. McCamant is a Presbyterian and a member of the Arlington and University Clubs at Portland, Oregon. He is also a member of the Oregon and American Bar Associations. He was President of the Oregon Bar Association from 1919 to 1920.

His Revolutionary ancestors were his great-grandfathers, James McCamant, an ensign in the First Company of the First Battalion of the Pennsylvania Militia, commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel John Gardiner, and Eliphalet Rollins, private in Captain Benjamin Burton's Company, Third Lincoln County Regiment, Massachusetts Troops.

Mr. McCamant has two sons, Davis and Thomas, the former of whom is of age and a member of the Oregon Society. The younger son is a member of the Class of 1922 at Princeton.

GEORGE HALE NUTTING

Vice-President General for New England District

George Hale Nutting, President of the Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, was born at Haverhill, Mass., February 27, 1867. He is the oldest son of the late David Hubbard Nutting, M. D., and Mary Elizabeth (Nichols) Nutting.

He is descended from John Nutting, of Chelmsford and Groton, Mass., one of the original proprietors of the town of Groton, who was killed by the Indians in the attack on that frontier town, March 9, 1676, at the opening of King Philip's War.

He is also descended from William Nutting, of Groton, and David Hubbard, of Hancock, N. H., Revolutionary soldiers, and from Deacon Thomas Barrett, of Concord, Mass., who was a member of the Committee of Correspondence and Safety, and a brother of Colonel James Barrett.

Mr. Nutting joined this Society in 1892, and has been a delegate to the National Congresses at Chicago, Newark, Detroit, and Hartford, and has served successively as Manager, Vice-President, and President of the Massachusetts Society, S. A. R.

He is executor and trustee of the J. Howard Nichols estate and is a member of the Boston Chamber of Commerce, Boston City Club, Society of Colonial Wars, Bostonian Society, Prospect Lodge, Mt. Vernon Chapter, and Boston Commandery, K. T., and other Masonic bodies, and also of the Bunker Hill Monument Association, and a proprietor of "The Old North Church" (Christ Church), Boston.

In 1890 Mr. Nutting married Hannah M. Brown, a descendant of old Colonial and Revolutionary stock, by whom he has two children—Nathaniel Hubbard Nutting and Dorothy Barrett Nutting. Her death occurred in 1907. In 1909 he married (second) Gertrude M. Freeman, by which union there have been four children—Elizabeth M., Margaret F., John Freeman (who died in 1918, aged three years), and James Barrett Nutting, who was born in 1919.

In 1919 Mr. Nutting presented the Washington and Franklin medal, for excellence in the study of United States history, to the Massachusetts Society, in memory of his son, John Freeman Nutting, who was enrolled as a member of the Washington Guard at the time of his death. This medal was awarded by the Massachusetts Society in 1920 to one hundred high schools and academies in the Commonwealth, and is to be awarded annually hereafter by the Massachusetts Society.

PHILIP F. LARNER

Vice-President General for Middle and Coast District

PHILIP F. LARNER, elected Vice-President General at Buffalo, N. Y., May 17, 1921, is a native of the City of Washington, D. C., as also were his father and grandfather. His great-grandfather, Jacob Gideon, Jr., removed to Washington from Philadelphia, Pa., about the time the location of the National Capital was established.

Mr. Larner is a graduate of the original Emerson Institute, located in Washington for many years and a well-known educational institution; afterward a graduate of the Law College of the Columbian University and a member of the bar of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia. Later he has been actively connected for many years with various business organizations in Washington. He is a member of the University Club, as well as several civic and religious organizations.

Mr. Larner became a member of the District of Columbia Society, Sons of the American Revolution, in 1891, his ancestor being his great-great-grandfather, Jacob Gideon, Sr., who enlisted at Valley Forge and served with the Pennsylvania troops in the battles at Guilford, Eutaw Springs, Cowpens, and Yorktown.

Mr. Larner was for a long term of years Treasurer and afterwards President of the District of Columbia Society, and has been a delegate from that Society to numerous annual congresses of the National Society, and was Secretary and Registrar General, 1919-1920. His wife, Fannie D. Larner (deceased), was a charter member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, having the national number 185 in that organization. His daughter, Mrs. Albert J. Gore, is an active member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the founder and first regent of the Captain Molly Pitcher Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, in the City of Washington. His father, Noble D. Larner, at one time President of the District of Columbia Society, died in 1903, while holding the office of Vice-President General in the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

MARVIN H. LEWIS

Vice-President General for Mississippi Valley-West District

Marvin H. Lewis, stock and bond broker, was born at Elizabethtown, Ky., June 16, 1873, and was educated in the public schools of Louisville and at the South Kentucky College, Hopkinsville. He then engaged in newspaper work and filled various positions on the Louisville Times and Courier-Journal, having been financial editor of the latter paper for several years. On May 1, 1906, he organized Marvin H. Lewis & Co., which firm does a business in stocks and bonds. He is a member of the Louisville Stock Exchange, Society of Colonial Wars, Sons of the American Revolution, and Pendennis Club. He married, in 1903, Isabel Ambyr Rodgers, of Pittsburgh, Pa. They have one son, Marvin Arthur Lewis, born December 28, 1911. The home address of Mr. Lewis is Weissinger-Gaulbert Apartments; business address, 201 Keller Building, Fifth and Main Streets, Louisville, Ky.

He served in various capacities during the World War, being chairman of the Four-Minute Men, Chairman of State Speakers' Bureau, and member of Executive Committees in the Liberty Loan and other campaigns.

HENRY B. HAWLEY

Vice-President General, Mississippi Valley-West District

HENRY B. HAWLEY, of Des Moines, Iowa, was born on a farm in New York State, near Warsaw. Mr. Hawley began life on his own account as a school teacher, followed later by a short but successful period as a business man, where the field of insurance attracted and held his interest and attention. Aside from insurance, his position in the business, political, and social world of Des Moines is commanding. A man of initiative and with altruistic principles, he has been extremely active along all lines of social betterment, and carried with him from Buffalo, where the first charity organization society in America was established, those ideas of philanthrophy which resulted in the Associated Charities of Des Moines and have permeated the entire group of organizations which are affiliated in the work of human rehabilitation in that community. He was recently made a Life President of the Associated Charities of Des Moines. Mr. Hawley is Past President of the Iowa State Society, having been a member since April, 1898. Among the public-spirited personal efforts of Mr. Hawley in the direction

of patriotic education we note his presentation of a medal each year to the high school at Warsaw, New York, given to the pupil attaining the highest term mark in American history. This presentation has been made annually since 1911. Mr. Hawley stands high in banking circles in Des Moines and is a member of the Bankers' Club and bank director.

JOHN W. BELL, Jr.

Vice-President General for Mountain and Pacific District

JOHN WILLIAM BELL, JR., of Spokane, Wash., was elected Vice-President General for the Mountain and Pacific District at the Congress held in Hartford, Conn., May 18, 1920. He is the son of John William and Mary Perkins (Horton) Bell, and was born in St. Paul (Merriam Park), Minn., January 30, 1891. Is great-great-grandson of Lieut. John Jones, who was a member of General Washington's army. John Jones was descended from Governor Eaton, first governor of Connecticut. On another line he can trace his ancestry back to Joseph Jenckes, from whom Past President General Jenks is descended.

He was admitted to the Washington State Society on January 20, 1914. In 1917 was appointed Secretary-Treasurer pro tem. of Spokane Chapter and the following year was elected to the office. In 1919 was President of the Chapter and First Vice-President of the Washington Society. Is now Secretary-Treasurer of the Chapter again, having been elected in January, 1920.

Lived in St. Paul until 1900, when he moved to Tacoma, Wash., and in 1904 to Spokane. Is a member of the Episcopal Church. Married Lillian B. Blakeslee in Spokane, September 2, 1914. Is engaged in the coal business, both wholesale and retail, being assistant to the manager of the Roslyn Fuel Co.'s Spokane branch.

FRANK BARTLETT STEELE

Secretary General

Frank Bartlett Steele, elected Secretary General May 17, 1921, at the Buffalo Congress, was born in Buffalo, New York, March 28, 1864. He is the son of Charles Gould Steele and Harriet Virginia Snyder, and great-grandson of Zenas Barker, who fought in the Revolutionary War with the New York troops in the battle of Oriskany. Mr. Steele was graduated from the State Normal School of Buffalo and studied law in the offices of George Clinton, grandson of De Witt Clinton. Mr. Steele joined the Buffalo Chapter of the Empire State Society in 1897 and became its Secretary in 1901, which office he has held continuously since. He has been a delegate to every National Congress since 1906, except those held at Denver in 1907 and Portland in 1915, and has been on a number of important national committees.

Mr. Steele, in co-operation with the School Department of the City of Buffalo and the Daughters of the American Revolution, has been active in the work of Americanization, the field for this work being almost unlimited in Buffalo, due to its large foreign population.

Mr. Steele, shortly after his admission to the bar, became the Clerk of the Superior Court of Buffalo, and was thereafter transferred into the Supreme

Court of the State of New York. He was at one time clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Eric County.

He is a member of the Society of Mayflower Descendants in line from Governor William Bradford.

During the World War Mr. Steele was made Executive Secretary of the Home Defense Committee of Eric County, a body created by the State of New York, and during this period gave his time unstintedly to the many activities and responsibilities that were placed upon this committee by the National and State Government. Under a statute of the State of New York creating local historians, Mayor Buck appointed Mr. Steele Historian of the City of Buffalo, and in this capacity he assisted in writing and compiling the History of the City of Buffalo and Eric County in the World War; also, at the suggestion of the State Historian, Mr. Steele has made a complete survey of the records and archives of Buffalo and Eric County, and upon his recommendations steps are now being taken by the City Commissioners to improve the conditions under which these records are being preserved.

Mr. Steele married Helen Cleveland Varian, of Titusville, Pa., in 1896. Mrs. Steele is also of Revolutionary ancestry, descending from the Atlees of Pennsylvania, the Varians of New York, and Litchfields of Connecticut. She was a daughter of Col. William Varian, Surgeon on the staff of Gen. Gordon Granger during the Civil War, now buried in Arlington Cemetery.

JOHN HARRIS BURROUGHS

Treasurer General

John Harris Burroughs was born at Trenton, N. J., April 17, 1849, son of Charles Burroughs, wso served as mayor of Trenton for fifteen consecutive years—from 1832 until 1847—who was also judge of the Court of Common Pleas for Mercer County, N. J., for sixteen years. John Burroughs, the grandfather of the subject of this sketch, was active in the Revolutionary War from the latter part of 1776 until the surrender of Cornwallis at the battle of Yorktown, in 1781. Mr. Burroughs is descended from John Burroughs, who settled in Newtown, Long Island, in 1653, with other English colonists. In the capacity of Treasurer, Vice-President, and President, he has served the Union League Club, Brooklyn, N. Y., in which city he has resided since 1865. He was President of the Empire State Society in 1910 and 1911. From 1874 to 1918 Mr. Burroughs was a dealer in commercial paper and bank stocks in New York City. He is now manager of the Brooklyn Branch of the Corn Exchange Bank of New York.

He was elected Treasurer General at the Baltimore Congress, in 1909, and reelected at each succeeding Congress.

WILLIAM SCOTT PARKS

Registrar General

Compatriot WILLIAM SCOTT PARKS, the Registrar General, was born in Warren, Trumbull County, Ohio, and was educated in the public schools of his native city and Washington, D. C., where he has resided since boyhood. His classical education was received in Columbian College, now George Washington Univer-

sity. He graduated from the Law School in 1881 with the degree of LL. M., and was admitted to the bar after the required examination of the Bar Association, but, with the exception of a few minor cases, has seldom appeared in court. He entered the Treasury Department as a clerk, afterwards a law clerk and accountant, serving in several of the important bureaus.

He is a member of the District of Columbia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution and was its President in 1918, a member of the Sons of the Revolution in the District of Columbia and its present Historian, a member of the Society of Colonial Wars of the District and of its Board of Governors (Council). Mr. Parks is also prominent as a member of the Masonic order, having been Grand Commander of Knights Templar of the District during 1917-1918. He is a member of the National Geographic Society and was a charter member of the Ohio Society of Washington. He was Secretary General of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution from January 2, 1919, to May 16 of the same year, and was elected Registrar General of the Society May 17, 1921. His Revolutionary descent is both through his paternal and his maternal ancestry. His great-grandfathers, Reuben Parks and Weait Munson, were soldiers of the Revolutionary War.

Mr. Parks is ninth in direct descent from Robert Parke (1580-1664), who was born in Preston, England, and came to Boston in 1630; was Deputy to the General Court of Connecticut in 1641 and again in 1642, and died February 4, 1664. He also is of the ninth generation of Captain Thomas Munson, who was born in 1612 and died May 7, 1685.

Mr. Parks is married, and has a son and a grandson, his son being a member of the District of Columbia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

LIEUT. GEORGE CARPENTER ARNOLD

Historian General

GEORGE CARPENTER ARNOLD, of Providence, R. I., First Lieutenant, Company C, First Regiment of Infantry, Rhode Island Militia, elected Historian General at the Rochester Congress, May 21, 1918, and re-elected at Detroit Congress, in 1919, at Hartford Congress in 1920, and at Buffalo in 1921, was born at Providence July 31, 1868, son of William Rhodes and Sarah Hill (Carpenter) Arnold. His ancestry runs without break back to the Puritan immigration, William Arnold, the immigrant, being mentioned in Lincoln's history of Hingham, Mass. In 1635 William Arnold and family left Somersetshire, England, and came to New England. After residing a short time at Hingham, he became associated, in 1636, with Roger Williams and others in the purchase from the Indian sachems, Canonicus and Miantonomoh, of land at Mooshausic, afterward called Providence, and received grants of land from Williams. His initials, "W. A." are second on the famous Indian deed of Roger Williams. His real estate was mostly in Providence, Pawtuxet, and Warwick, R. I. One hundred and twenty acres of the original grant (including a 27-acre lake) at Warwick, R. I., are now owned by the subject of this sketch, the ancestral home, built in 1771 (by his great²-grandfather, George Arnold), being used by him as a summer residence.

Lieutenant Arnold received his education in the schools of his native city and at the Episcopal Military Academy of Cheshire, Conn., class of 1887.

In November, 1887, he joined Company C, First Regiment of Infantry, Rhode Island Militia; was elected Corporal, 1889; Second Lieutenant, 1890; First Lieutenant, 1891, 1892, 1893, and 1894. For nearly a quarter of a century he was engaged in the worsted yarn business. He is President and Treasurer of the Possnegansett Ice Company; Treasurer and Director of the Arnold Real Estate Company; Treasurer of the Arnold Numismatic Company; Director of the Central Real Estate Company and of the Providence Realty Company; Treasurer of the Motor League of Rhode Island; Treasurer of the Society of Descendants of the Founders of Providence Plantations. He is the author of several books—one treating on Numismatics (of which he is an authority)—and publisher of the "Genealogical Tree of the Arnold Family, embracing nearly thirty generations, from 1100 A. D."

He married Flora Etta Richards December 14, 1892, by whom he has three sons: Lincoln Richards Arnold, Brown University, Class of 1916; Philip Rhodes Arnold, Amherst College, Class of 1918, and Capt. George Carpenter Arnold, Jr., Dartmouth College, Class of 1918, now United States First Vice Consul at Seville, Spain.

EUGENE C. BONNIWELL

Chancellor General

EUGENE C. BONNIWELL was born in Philadelphia, September 25, 1872. He was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania Law School in 1893. He was college champion in pole vaulting and running, a director of the Athletic Association of the University of Pennsylvania, and immediately began the practice of law in his native city. On November 6, 1913, he was elected Judge of the New Municipal Court by an overwhelming majority, a position which he now holds. Five times the firemen of Pennsylvania have conferred upon him the honor of selecting him as president of the Firemen's Association of the State of Pennsylvania. He is a director of the National Security League, President of the Philadelphia Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution; president of the Veteran Athletes of Philadelphia; a director of the Pennsylvania State Chamber of Commerce; vice-director, Committee of Public Safety of Pennsylvania; a member of the Sons of the Revolution; Society of the War of 1812; Friendly Sons of St. Patrick; J. F. Reynolds Camp, No. 4, Sons of Veterans; Registrar of Order of Washington; member of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania; the City Business Club; the City History Club; Order of Eagles; Fraternal Order of Orioles; Order of Moose; Philadelphia Order of Elks, and Chevalier Commander Order of Lafayette.

On June 5, 1900, Judge Bonniwell was married to Madeline H. Cahill. He has seven children, all living.

As a public official, in charge of the mass of misery coming for relief into the great Desertion Court of Philadelphia, during twenty-two months Judge Bonniwell handled 6,000 cases, involving 20,000 children, and collected for deserted wives and infants over half a million dollars. Throughout his public and private life he has always maintained to the fullest degree an untiring interest in the red-blooded activities that make the American youth unsurpassed in their qualities of initiative, resoluteness, and daring, and a public career without blemish has made him one of the foremost citizens of Philadelphia in

all the things that relate to indomitable courage, capacity, and interest in civic matters.

WALTER K. WATKINS

Genealogist General

Walter Kendall Watkins was born in Boston, August 5, 1855, and graduated from the Phillips Grammar and English High Schools. Since 1880 he has been engaged in historical and genealogical researches in this country and Great Britain. He has published frequently articles in newspapers and magazines and edited the Colonial Wars Magazine and publications of the Society of Colonial Wars in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. A specialty has been his works on the early history of Boston and contributions to the publications of the Bostonian Society.

He has been a charter member and director of Boston Chapter, S. A. R.; charter member and historian of Old Suffolk Chapter; charter member and secretary of Malden Chapter. He now holds the office of Historian of the Massachusetts State Society. He was elected Historian General at the National Congresses of 1908 and 1909; a charter member of the Massachusetts Society of Colonial Wars; he has been Genealogist of the State Society since 1896 and Secretary for fifteen years.

He is a charter member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants and Secretary of the Bay State Historical League, composed of seventy-five historical societies in Massachusetts. A member of the New England Historic-Genealogical Society since 1889; he has been on its library committee for several years, and is chairman of the committee on records.

He is also an active and honorary member in several historical societies. He is a resident of Malden, Mass., and Grafton, N. H.

LYMAN WHITNEY ALLEN

Chaplain General

Lyman Weitney Allen was born in St. Louis, Missouri, November 19, 1854. He is a son of George Otis Allen and Julia Olds Whitney, of the historic Thornton family of Virginia, conspicuous as officers in the American Revolution. He graduated at Washington University, St. Louis, 1878, receiving the degree of A. B., later A. M.; pursued post-graduate studies in Princeton University and his theological course in Princeton Theological Seminary. He received the degree of D. D. from Wooster University, Ohio, in 1897. He married Myra Irwin, of St. Louis, daughter of Archibald Steele Irwin, an officer in the Civil War. She died in 1900. In 1904 he married Phebeti L. Massena, of Glen Ridge, N. J. She died in 1915. Dr. Allen's ministry was in St. Louis and vicinity from 1882 to 1889, when he was called to the South Park Presbyterian Church of Newark, N. J., where he remained as pastor 27 years.

In October, 1916, he resigned his church to engage in literary work, to which he has given his time and energy up to the present. He has published several volumes of poems, and also miscellaneous poems and prose articles. In 1895 he won the prize of \$1,000 offered by the *New York Herald* for the best poem on

American history. His poem, "Abraham Lincoln," was published in the Christmas issues of the *New York Herald*, the *Boston Herald*, and the *St. Louis Republic*. Afterward it appeared in book form and has passed through several editions.

Dr. Allen in 1916 wrote the official Celebration Ode for the 250th Anniversary of the City of Newark, N. J. In 1917 he wrote the official poem for the dedication of the Barnard statue of Lincoln in Cincinnati. May 30, 1917, he delivered the Memorial Day oration in the Soldiers' National Cemetery, Battlefield of Gettysburg. His well-known poem on "Lincoln's Pew" is tableted on the historic pew in the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church (the Church of the Presidents), Washington, D. C. He is connected with several leading clubs and societies in New York, notably the Dickens Fellowship, of which he is President; the Browning Society, the Shakespeare Club, the Dante League, the McDowell Club, the National Arts Club, the Authors' Club, and the Poetry Society of America.

Dr. Allen became a member of the New Jersey Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in 1890. Since then he has been active in the work of the Society, having been Chaplain, First Vice-President, then President. He is now filling his second term as President. At the last meeting of the National Congress, at Buffalo, he was elected Chaplain General. Two of his poems have appeared in recent issues of the National Society's Bulletin, "The New America" and "The Mayflower Pilgrims."

Constitution Day Inaugurated by the Sons of the American Revolution in 1917

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SYNOPSIS OF THE PROCEEDINGS

of the Thirty-second Annual Congress of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution,

> HELD AT LAFAYETTE HOTEL, BUFFALO, N. Y., MAY 16 AND 17, 1921

Morning Session, Monday, May 16, 10 a.m.

The President General and other National Officers came forward, escorted by the Color Guard and the Committee on Ceremonies and Colors. The Colors were saluted and the President General, James Harry Preston, assumed the chair.

Chaplain General Rev. Lee S. McCollester, D. D., invoked the Divine blessing. Addresses of welcome were extended to the Congress by Mayor George S. Buck, Mr. Eugene Tanke, President of the Buffalo Chapter, and Mr. Charles R. Robinson, President of the Chamber of Commerce. These were responded to by Past President General Louis Annin Ames.

The American's Creed was recited by the entire Congress.

The preliminary report of Teunis D. Huntting, Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, was presented and received.

Past President General Woodworth moved that a Committee on Resolutions be appointed by the Chair, to which all resolutions shall be referred without debate. Motion adopted.

The Chairman appointed as a Committee on Resolutions Past President Generals Woodworth and Thruston and Vice-President General Houk.

Mr. Ames moved that the Secretary General send greetings of the Congress to all Past Presidents General not present. Carried.

Annual Address of President General

The custom of our Society requires that before turning over the Society to the incoming President General the retiring President General shall give a brief résumé of the activities of the Society while under his administration.

It is a matter of regret that the demands of an engrossing profession have prevented me from following the admirable example of the previous Presidents General of the Sons of the American Revolution in making nation-wide tours in the interest of our Society.

Visits, however, have been paid by me to the South and through the Middle West and North during the past year, which I feel have resulted in some good to the Society.

A brief tour through Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Illinois, New York, and New Jersey has resulted in pleasant associations with some of the membership in those States and in an interchange of views which I believe has advanced the aims and purposes and activities of the Society.

Perhaps the most definite accomplishment of the year has been the formation of a State Society in Georgia, starting off with an initial number of fifteen members, under the leadership of Mr. Allan Waters, of Atlanta, Georgia. I am glad to be able to report that we have prospects of a very large and flourishing State Society in Georgia.

In addition to the formation of the Society in Georgia, already accomplished, steps are being taken to form a Society in London, through our compatriots of the Sons of the American Revolution now living there, and particularly those connected with the Embassy, and to enlarge the Society in France, now affiliated with the Empire State Society.

We have also under way the formation of a Society in West Virginia and the stimulation of the South Carolina Society.

I feel that by a closer co-operation between the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Sons of the American Revolution a very stimulating influence may be had on both the membership and the activities of each of the Societies. If the various State Societies of the Sons of the American Revolution obtain from the State Societies of the Daughters of the American Revolution the names and addresses of male relatives and circularize these carefully, the result will be a great increase both in the membership and in the usefulness of the Sons of the American Revolution.

In Maryland we have obtained one hundred members by a very brief campaign for membership, addressed particularly to the male relatives of the members of our sister Society, the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The membership of the Sons of the American Revolution throughout the country amounts to 17,113, a net gain of 864 over the previous year, and the indications are that it will have a steady, even rapid, growth.

Three new chapters have been formed in Maryland, of which State Society I was president for the past two years, but I am not informed as to the number of new chapters in the other States.

In common with all our organizations that have been operating under dues and admission charges established before the World War, we find the financial condition of the Society far from encouraging.

I refer you for full particulars on this subject to the reports of the Secretary General and the Treasurer General and to the debate which will doubtless occur on the amendment proposed for increasing the initiation fees or dues.

The expenses of the Society are confined almost exclusively to the Secretary General's office in Washington. There are no charges whatever that fall on the National Society or the State Societies, incident to the National organization, outside of the Secretary General's office. Traveling expenses, hotel bills, postage, printing, and correspondence charges and the details of office administration are borne by the general officers themselves out of their private pockets or are paid by the State Societies. But even this leaves the Society with very slender resources for the administration of a trust which extends over the entire country.

I very sincerely hope that some step will be taken to increase the revenue of the Society, subject to such limitations and restrictions as the Congress may invoke.

In line with economy, it has been suggested by the Executive Committee that

we discontinue the Year Book and enlarge very much the scope of the QUARTERLY BULLETIN. This is a matter which should receive the careful consideration of the membership of this Congress.

I am inclined to think that we should issue a quarterly magazine, somewhat similar in scope and design to the magazine of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Being a quarterly magazine, it ought to contain more in detail the activities of the State Societies and the National Society than do either our present BULLETIN or the monthly magazine issued by the Daughters of the American Revolution. In other words, it ought to take the place of the Year Book.

If the dues or initiation fees are increased, as I hope will be done, this increase, if intelligently applied, will furnish a very useful, interesting, and instructive magazine to take the place of the present BULLETIN and Year Book.

May I not say that the aims and purposes of our Society are so lofty and its accomplishments have been already so great, so salutary, that an increase in the revenue of the National Society will, I believe, result in increased membership, increased usefulness, and increased patriotic accomplishment for our splendid Society.

President General Preston's address was received with genuine appreciation. It was moved and seconded that the minutes of the last Congress as printed in the last Year Book be approved. Motion carried.

The report of Secretary General Larner was read and approved.

The report of Registrar General Larner was read and approved.

The report of the Treasurer General, John H. Burroughs, was received and adopted as read, subject to the approval of the Auditing Committee.

The report of the Genealogist General, Walter K. Watkins, was read and approved.

The report of Chancellor General Remington was read and approved.

The report of Chairman Pugsley, of the Committee on Permanent Investment, was received.

The report of Treasurer General Burroughs on the Permanent Fund was received.

The report of Historian General Arnold was received.

Vice-Presidents General Nutting, of Massachusetts; Williams, of New Jersey; Houk, of Ohio; Paine, of Missouri, and Bell, of Washington, reported from their several districts.

Upon motion, all reports of the officers submitted to the Congress were approved and adopted.

Recess until 2.30 p. m.

Afternoon Session, May 16

The President General called the Congress to order at 2.30 p. m.

Mr. Cowart, of New Jersey, presented a resolution in relation to a monument to the memory of Mollie Pitcher; also a resolution in relation to conflicts

between capital and labor; also a resolution in regard to an international code of laws for universal peace; all of which were referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Nutting, of Massachusetts, presented a resolution for the protection of North Church, Boston. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Watkins, of Massachusetts, presented a resolution in regard to preserving data at Washington in connection with pension records. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Ely, of District of Columbia, presented a resolution in regard to the elimination from a pageant in Milwaukee of a float representing the Landing of the Pilgrims. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions. Also a resolution in regard to Bolsheviki propaganda. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Kenyon, of the District of Columbia, presented a resolution in regard to Socialism in American colleges. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Sherman, of Ohio, moved that telegrams of greeting be sent to the President and Vice-President of the United States. Motion adopted.

Judge Remington, of New York, presented a resolution drawn by Col. John W. Vrooman, of Herkimer, New York, in relation to prize essays on patriotic subjects. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Steele, of New York, presented a resolution in relation to war service medals. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Fairchild, of Minnesota, presented a resolution in relation to compensation for ex-soldiers. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Past President General Marble presented a resolution in regard to the work of Captain Hugh S. Martin. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

All of the above resolutions were referred to the Committee on Resolutions, under the rules,

Reports of committees were then taken up.

Mr. Parks, of the District of Columbia, read the report of Mr. Cox, chairman of the Flag Committee.

Mr. Ely, of the District of Columbia, presented the report of the Committee on War Records, which was read by Admiral G. W. Baird.

Past President General Thruston, chairman of the Committee on Memorials, presented the report of that committee. A rising vote of thanks was tendered to Chairman Thruston.

Mr. Curtis, of Connecticut, made a verbal report of the Committee on Flag Day Celebration.

The Secretary General read the report of the Patriotic Committee, presented by George A. Brennan, of Illinois.

The Chairman presented the reports of the Publicity Committee—Frank L. Stetson, chairman—and the Committee on Increased Membership—Chancellor L. Jenks, chairman.

Mr. Ames, of New York, moved that a committee be appointed by the Chair, to be known as the Committee on Official Reports and Recommendations; this committee to take these reports, take out the vital points at issue in each report, and bring them in at the close of this session and report on which should be printed in the BULLETIN. Motion unanimously carried.

The Chairman appointed Mr. Ames as chairman of this committee and Mr. Jewett, of Indiana—a committee of two.

Mr. Andrews, of Maryland, presented the report of the Committee on the American's Creed.

Mr. Read, of Massachusetts, presented a report in relation to a Memorial to General James Warren, to be erected at Plymouth, Mass. It was moved that the Secretary General be instructed to communicate with the several State Societies and ask them to contribute their proportion of \$2,500 for the erection of this memorial. Motion unanimously carried.

Mr. Read, of Massachusetts, gave an interesting description of the gavel used by the President.

The Chairman called upon Mr. Matthew Page Andrews, of Maryland, to make a statement in regard to the book containing the history of the American's Creed.

Mr. Hayward, of Maryland, offered a resolution approving of this history of the American's Creed. This was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Wentworth, of the Committee on Americanization, made a verbal report for this committee.

Mr. Ames, of the Committee on the Celebration of Constitution Day, presented his report.

The Committee on Resolutions was asked to report, and, pending this report, Judge Bonniwell, of Pennsylvania, brought up the matter of the markers for Revolutionary graves, and moved that the matter of proper markers for Revolutionary graves be referred to the incoming Executive Committee, with instructions to consider the matter of markers and report their recommendations. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Chairman Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, read the proposed resolution on immigration, as follows, and moved its adoption:

Whereas our heritage, the heritage from men who lived and wrought and fought and died to safeguard the fundamental institutions of America, depends upon quality of citizenship;

And whereas quality of citizenship depends to a great extent upon a permanent and comprehensive solution of the immigration problem, which since the World War has become especially grave in some of its aspects; therefore be it

Resolved, That the National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, in annual session at Buffalo, N. Y., respectfully petitions the Congress of the United States to give to this subject of immigration its careful consideration, with a view to adopting a policy, both selective and restrictive in character, that will aim, first of all, to safeguard the future of the nation for our children and our children's children, and be at the same time, in so far as possible, consistent with our economic needs.

Unanimously adopted.

Chairman Woodworth presented the proposed resolution in regard to amending Article VI of the Constitution of the National Society as follows and moved its adoption:

That Article VI of the Constitution of the National Society be amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI.—Initiation Fee and Dues.

SEC. I. In addition to the initiation fee, if any, charged by a State Society, there shall be paid an initiation fee of five dollars for membership in the

National Society, Sons of the American Revolution. Said fee shall be forwarded to the Registrar General with each application for membership. The payment of said fee shall include an engraved certificate of membership for each newly elected compatriot, to be furnished by the National Society.

SEC. 2. Each State Society shall pay annually to the Treasurer General, to defray the expense of the National Society, fifty cents for each member thereof,

unless intermitted by the National Congress.

SEC. 3. Such dues shall be paid on or before the first day of April in each year for the ensuing year, in order to secure representation in the Congress of the National Society.

Mr. Cowart, of New Jersey, moved as an amendment to this report of the Committee on Resolutions that each member of the National Society shall be assessed one dollar for his membership in the National Society.

After a full, complete and prolonged discussion, in the course of which several amendments and substitutes were offered, but which were ruled out by the Chair and his decisions sustained by the Congress, the Chairman put the question as follows: The question occurs on the amendment to the amendment, which I understand is, that instead of a five-dollar initiation fee, there be imposed one dollar annual dues instead of fifty cents annual dues to the National Society. The question now occurs on that amendment. All in favor please rise and be counted.

The vote was then taken, the result being 60 in favor of the amendment to the constitutional amendment and 30 opposed.

The CHAIRMAN: The question now occurs on the adoption of the section as amended, which is that the annual dues of the National Society shall be one dollar per year instead of fifty cents per year, as presented in the Constitution. The motion was adopted.

Adjournment taken to Tuesday, May 17, at 9 a. m.

Morning Session, Tuesday, May 17

Congress called to order by the President General.

Rev. Dr. Petty, of Connecticut, invoked the Divine blessing.

The Secretary General read a communication in regard to the death of Dr. Cogswell. Moved by Major Adams that the communication be referred to the Committee on Resolutions for action. Adopted.

While awaiting the report of the Committee on Resolutions, Judge Bonniwell, of Pennsylvania, brought up the question of the Washington Guards, upon which some discussion ensued.

Mr. Bowman, of Illinois, presented a proposed resolution regarding the Society furnishing a certificate of membership without charge. After some discussion, the resolution was lost.

Moved by Major Adams that the discussions of all subjects be limited to three minutes, except by consent of the House. Adopted.

A resolution was offered relative to making the Star-Spangled Banner the National Anthem. Referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, presented a report of the committee in reference to the several resolutions introduced on the subject of immigration, and moved that the several resolutions be referred to the incoming Committee on Americanization. The motion was adopted.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, reported that the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the Society in reference to creating two societies in a State was not approved by the committee, and moved the adoption of the report of the committee. Motion adopted.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, reported favorably on the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

War Service Medals

Whereas many of our compatriots are veterans of the various wars in which the United States has participated and emerged victorious; and

Whereas due recognition of such valorous services has already been made by the issuance of the War Service Medal of the Sons of the American Revolution; and

Whereas such medal is in such form that it may not be consistently worn in connection with our ceremonial insignia; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, authorize and adopt the following decoration to be used in connection with said ceremonial insignia:

Item.—A plain bar to be attached to the ribbon, with the war in which the compatriot has served stamped thereon in relief, one for each such war, the exact design and material thereof to be determined by a committee of three, to be appointed by the President General.

Captain Hugh S. Martin

Whereas Captain Hugh S. Martin, of the Regular Army, having been located in Russia for quite an extended period, has during the past few months, under the auspices and direction of the New Jersey Society, Sons of the American Revolution, delivered various addresses on the subject of the conditions in Russia, especially relating to the Bolsheviki movement, which has attracted the most sincere attention on the part of all who have heard him. He recently delivered the same address at the luncheon of the Members Council of the Merchants Association in New York City, which so aroused the enthusiasm of his hearers that one of the prominent divines of New York City later approached the officers of the Merchants Association and suggested that a fund could be raised to cover the expenses of Captain Martin to have him deliver his address throughout the country, giving his entire time to that work. It was further stated that on a number of occasions when Captain Martin had been making an address some one in the audience asked the question as to who or what organization was behind him in the work he was doing. The suggestion was made that if some patriotic organization of national scope could stand behind him, it would give a greater force to his work and obviate any adverse criticism that might be made unless he could have a backing as above suggested.

We offer the following resolution:

Whereas there is no grander work that the S. A. R. could engage in than to carry the message of Capt. Hugh S. Martin to the public at large; and

Whereas it has been suggested that possibly the necessary funds could be secured to cover the expenses of Captain Martin to enable him to devote his entire time to the carrying on of his message far and wide; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, recognizing the merit of the work that can be done by Captain Martin, hereby give its sanction to such work, and that a committee of three, with power, be appointed by the Chair to take under consideration a proposition to give the endorsement of the National Society to Capt. Hugh S. Martin and assume the responsibility for this propaganda, provided the necessary funds are furnished, so that no part of the expense would have to be borne by the National Society.

Star Spangled Banner

Resolved, That the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, endorse House Bill No. 4391, declaring the Star-Spangled Banner as the National Anthem, and that the proper committees in Congress be notified and the State Societies requested to communicate with their respective Representatives and Senators in Congress.

Archives in Washington

Whereas there is on file in the archives of the Revolutionary War Section of the Bureau of Pensions, at Washington, D. C., a large amount of valuable and interesting material in the form of applications for pensions on the part of officers and soldiers of the American Revolution; therefore be it

Resolved, That the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, meeting in Buffalo, N. Y., respectfully calls the attention of its representatives in Congress to the desirability of having these pension records made available to the public by having abstracts bearing upon the personal history and war services of each Revolutionary pensioner compiled, arranged, and printed by the Government in a form convenient for ready references, and that an appropriation by Congress be obtained for defraying the expense thereof.

Old North Church, Boston

Whereas Christ Church, Boston, Mass., situated on Salem Street, generally known as "The Old North Church," and beloved throughout the length and breadth of our whole country for its association with the famous "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere," is now menaced constantly with destruction by fire from the fact that a public bake-oven has been erected right next to its easterly side; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in Congress assembled at Buffalo, New York, this 17th day of May, in the year 1921, That it shall, and hereby does, go upon record as in favor of the establishment by act of Congress, by right of eminent domain, and by any other powers it thereto enabling, of a small national park, of a size to effectually safeguard the said "The Old North Church," Salem Street, Boston, Mass., from fire hazard, to enclose and surround the said church, to consist of several acres of land from which all buildings except church buildings, including the new "Italian Mission Church," and school and engine houses, shall be entirely removed, and the said tract of land shall be beautified by the setting out of trees and shrubs and the laying of suitable walks and paths therein; to the end that the said "The Old North Church" may be safeguarded, protected, and beautified as a national heritage and a source of patriotic inspiration to the entire country for all time; and be it further

Resolved, That the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution hereby directs its Secretary General to have these resolutions suitably drawn up and signed by the President General and all the officers of the said National Society of the year 1920-1921 and transmitted to the Congress of the United States as urgent business and with a request for speedy attention. Also, further, that the Secretary General cause these resolutions to be printed in proper form for distribution to each of the State Societies and the District of Columbia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, with the request that they each shall severally ratify and adopt the same without alteration and forward, with proper attestation of the President and Secretary of each Society, to their representatives in the Senate and House, in Congress at Washington, as urgent business, and with a request that it be given speedy attention.

American Legion Compensation

Whereas the Sons of the American Revolution is essentially a patriotic society, devoted to furthering the highest and best interests of our beloved country in times of peace as in times of war; and

Whereas the American Legion, an association composed of veterans of the late World War, is an organization of similar aims and attributes; and

Whereas all those men who so served in the Army and Navy of the United States of America in the great conflict, and whose valor and unselfish patriotism contributed in such large measure toward the glorious victory won by the Allied Forces overseas, suffered a serious economic loss because of the said services, while those of military qualification who remained at home in commercial pursuits received an utterly disproportionate reward for the performance of such commercial activities; and

Whereas the American Legion has fathered legislation in our National Congress looking toward an adjusted compensation for these ex-soldiers; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, in Thirty-second Annual Congress assembled, does here and now, unqualifiedly and without reservation, endorse the American Legion's fourfold plan of adjusted compensation, as exemplified in the bill now pending in the National Congress of the United States; and be it further

Resolved, That a duly attested copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the President of the United States, the Secretary of War, and the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives and Finance Committee of the Senate; and be it further

Resolved, That each and every State Society or Chapter existing under the jurisdiction of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, be, and is hereby, requested to endorse the text of these resolutions to their respective congressional delegations, with appropriate recommendations.

Mollie Pitcher

Whereas the Thirty-second Congress of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is informed that the Hon. T. Frank Appleby, Representative of the Third Congressional District of the State of New Jersey, has introduced in the House of Representatives, in the Congress of the United States, now in session at Washington, D. C., a bill to appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of erecting on the Battlefield of Monmouth a suitable memorial to perpetuate the heroism of Captain Mollie Pitcher in that decisive battle of the American Revolution; therefore be it

Resolved, firstly, That this Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, now in session in the City of Buffalo, New York, this 16th day of May, A. D. 1921, most heartily commend the patriotic purposes of this bill and recommend its support by the other Representatives and by the Senators of the several States in the present Congress.

Resolved, secondly, That a copy of this resolution, certified to by our President and Secretary, be forwarded to the clerk of the House of Representatives and to the clerk of the Senate, at Washington, D. C., with a request that it shall be read at the earliest convenient date, in a session of each branch of the present Congress.

Book of American Creed

Resolved, That the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution approves of the use of the American's Creed in school and citizenship work, and that the National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution endorses the plan proposed for the use of the "Book of the American Creed," issued

under the auspices of the National Patriotic Societies, through a committee of which the President General of the Sons of the American Revolution shall be ex officio the chairman.

Resolved, further, That this National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution recommends this book to the attention of all State Societies and local Chapters, to the end that they may endeavor to have the same presented to the graduates of their local grammar and junior high schools in the names of the donors or through a special appropriation of local school boards.

It is suggested that the book be presented to the child upon his or her memorizing the American's Creed, and that the child's name be placed thereon, together with a suitable inscription, signed by the principal of the school or some other school authority.

Intercollegiate Socialism

Whereas the future prosperity of America and the stability of our institutions of government depend in very large measure upon the proper education of the young men and women who are annually graduated from our institutions of higher learning; and

Whereas disclosures recently made have brought to light the existence of an insidious and active campaign on the part of the Intercollegiate Socialist Society and some similar organizations to inoculate the minds of college students with the principles of socialism and eventually to bring them into formal membership in the Communist and Socialist parties; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution, held at Buffalo, on May 16, 1921, regards the situation thus disclosed with very grave concern and calls upon the administrative officers and the boards of trustees of American colleges and universities to put forth their utmost efforts not only to eradicate this pernicious propaganda, but also to counteract it by providing for their students thorough instruction in American history and in the fundamental principles of American constitutional government.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, reported that in regard to Section 4, Article V, of the Constitution, giving the Executive Committee authority to discipline its members—members of the Society—the committee would recommend the insertion of these words in the resolution offered: After "the Executive Committee shall have authority" the committee suggests this amendment: "Upon written charges preferred by any State Society, any State Board of Managers, or any local Chapter. With that amendment, the committee recommends the adoption of the resolution offered."

SEC. 4. An Executive Committee of seven, consisting of the President General as Chairman and six members, to be nominated by him and approved by the Board of Trustees, shall in the interim between the meetings of the Board transact such business as may be delegated to it by a Congress of the Society or the Board of Trustees.

The Executive Committee shall have authority, upon written charges preferred by any State Society, any State Board of Managers, or any local Chapter, to discipline or to expel any compatriot who by conduct disloyal to the ideals or prejudicial to the interests of the Sons of the American Revolution shall render himself unworthy of membership therein. Any member who feels himself aggrieved by the action of the committee acting under this power shall have the right of appeal to the next succeeding Congress.

The members of the Executive Committee other than the President General shall be known as Directors General, and by virtue of their office shall be members of the National Congress and entitled to vote at the annual meeting of the National Congress during their terms of office.

(Italic type indicates amendments added.)

Motion adopted.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, reported that the committee took action on the resolution referring to labor and capital and disapproved the same, on the ground that it was not a proper subject for consideration by this Congress. Upon motion, the report of the committee was adopted.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, reported that the committee took action on the resolution referring to the League of Nations and disapproved the same, on the ground that it is not a proper subject for action by this Congress. The report of the committee was adopted.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, reported that the committee approves the reference of the communication and enclosures from Compatriot John W. Vrooman, of the Empire State Society, on the subject of prize essays on patriotic subjects in the schools, to the Committee on Patriotic Education. Recommendation adopted.

Mr. Woodworth, of the Committee on Resolutions, presented the report of the committee in reference to the proposition to amend the Constitution as follows:

4. Proposed by the Connecticut State Society:

You are advised that a committee of seven appointed at a special meeting of the Connecticut Society, Sons of the American Revolution, requests that the Executive Committee of the National Society present, with legal notice of the same, the following proposals, namely, that Article 5, Section 4, of the National Constitution be amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. An Executive Committee of seven, consisting of the President General as chairman and six members of the Board of Trustees, to be nominated by him and approved by said Board of Trustees, shall in the interim between the meetings of the Board transact such business as may be delegated to it by a Congress of the Society or the Board of Trustees."

Also that Article 13, Section 4, of the By-Laws be amended by striking out from the fourth, fifth, and sixth lines thereof, as shown on page 45, National Year Book, 1920, the words "other than such as may be called during the session or immediately upon the adjournment of an annual or Special Congress of the National Society"; and also by the insertion in line 6 of said Section the word "proposes," between the words "time" and "and".

and asked unanimous consent of this Congress to waive any objections to the technical side of presenting that amendment to this body for consideration. Unanimous consent being given, the Congress proceeded to the consideration of the report of the committee, which was that the committee disapproved of the proposition or proposal, or proposed amendment as offered.

The CHAIRMAN: The question is upon the adoption of the unfavorable report of the committee.

Judge Remington, of New York, moved that the time of President White, of the Connecticut Society, to speak be extended indefinitely. Such consent was granted.

It was moved that the Connecticut resolution be adopted.

The CHAIRMAN: The question is now on the unfavorable report of the committee and whether it shall be received as the judgment of the Congress.

A full, complete, and prolonged discussion then ensued.

Mr. Woodworth then moved the previous question.

The previous question being put by the Chairman, it was stated that the motion appeared to be lost. It was then moved that the resolution of the Con-

necticut Society be substituted for the report of the committee, and this motion was ruled out of order by the Chair.

Mr. Fairchild appealed from the decision of the Chair, and the decision of the Chair was sustained.

The previous question was again moved and carried.

The Chairman: The question occurs now upon the recommendation of the committee. Those in favor of sustaining the report of the committee will say aye, those opposed will vote no. I will restate the question in order to make it perfectly clear to you. Those who are in favor of sustaining the report of the committee will vote aye, those opposed to the committee's report will vote no.

The motion being put, the noes seemed to have it.

The CHAIRMAN: The noes seem to have it.

A division was called for, and the report of the committee was sustained by a vote of 66 to 58, and the report of the committee was adopted by the Congress.

President Nutting, of Massachusetts, presented an invitation to hold the next National Congress in Springfield, Mass.

Referred to the incoming Board of Trustees.

It was moved that a vote of thanks be tendered to the National Society of Constitutional Government for having sent pamphlets on socialism in American Colleges. Motion carried.

At this point Colonel Adams, of New Jersey, was called to the chair.

Presentation of Banners

The presentation of the Traveling Banner was made by Col. Arthur B. Clarke, of Virginia, and accepted by President Preston, of Maryland.

Dr. Lyman Whitney Allen, of New Jersey, presented the Syracuse Banner to the New Jersey Society, which was accepted by Major Adams, of New Jersey.

It was moved and seconded that the Year Book be discontinued for the coming year. Motion adopted.

Mr. Sage, of Rochester, New York, invited the members of the Congress to visit the city of Rochester on June 7, to participate in the unveiling of the tablet to Lafayette.

The final report of the Credentials Committee was called for, and Chairman Huntting, of this committee, reported as follows:

General Officers, 12; Past Presidents General, 7; Directors General, 3; Delegates, 136; Total, 158. Ladies, 47.

There being no further business under the head of new business, the Congress proceeded to the election of officers.

Colonel Guthrie nominated John Leonard Merrill, of New Jersey, for President General, whose name was thereafter withdrawn by Major Adams, of New Jersey.

Mr. Edward D. Baldwin, of Oregon, placed in nomination the name of Wallace McCamant for President General and, upon motion, the nominations were closed and the Secretary General was authorized to cast one ballot for Wallace McCamant, of Oregon, for President General. The Secretary having cast the ballot, Judge Wallace McCamant, of Oregon, was duly elected President General of the National Society for the ensuing year.

Judge McCamant was escorted to the platform by Mr. Baldwin, Judge White, and the Rev. Dr. Allen and accepted the office with a short speech of appreciation.

Mr. Wiggin, of Massachusetts, placed in nomination the name of George H. Nutting, of Massachusetts, for Vice-President General of the First District. There being no further nominations, Mr. Nutting was unanimously elected Vice-President General for the First, or New England. District.

Mr. Parks, of the District of Columbia, placed in nomination Mr. Philip F. Larner, of the District of Columbia, for the office of Vice-President General for the Second, or Middle and Coast, District. There being no further nominations, Mr. Larner was unanimously elected Vice-President General for the Second, or Middle and Coast, District.

Mr. Thruston, of Kentucky, placed in nomination the name of Marvin H. Lewis, of Kentucky, for the office of Vice-President General for the Third, or Mississippi Valley, East, District. There being no further nominations, Mr. Lewis was unanimously elected to the office of Vice-President of the Third, or Mississippi Valley, East, District.

Mr. Paine, of Missouri, placed in nomination the name of Mr. Henry B. Hawley, of Iowa, for the office of Vice-President General for the Fourth, or Mississippi Valley, West, District. There being no further nominations, Mr. Hawley was unanimously elected Vice-President General for the Fourth, or Mississippi Valley, West, District.

Mr. Wentworth, of Iowa, placed in nomination the name of Mr. John W. Bell, Jr., of Washington, for the office of Vice-President General for the Fifth, or Mountain and Pacific, District. There being no further nominations, Mr. Bell was unanimously elected to the office of Vice-President General for the Fifth, or Mountain and Pacific, District.

Mr. Shriner, of Maryland, placed in nomination the name of Mr. George Sadtler Robertson, of Maryland, for the office of Secretary General.

At this point Vice-President General Nutting assumed the chair.

Judge Remington, of New York, placed in nomination for the office of Secretary General the name of Frank B. Steele, of New York.

The Chairman appointed Mr. Brewer, of New Jersey; Mr. Barrett, of Michigan, and Mr. Ritchie, of Utah, as tellers, and the Congress proceeded to ballot. Mr. Steele, receiving the majority of ballots cast, was declared duly elected to the office of Secretary General of the National Society.

Mr. Marble, of New York, placed in nomination for the office of Treasurer General the name of John H. Burroughs, of New York. There being no further nominations, Mr. Burroughs was unanimously elected to the office of Treasurer General of the National Society.

Mr. Adams, of New Jersey, placed in nomination the name of the Rev. Lyman Whitney Allen, of New Jersey, for the office of Chaplain General. There being no further nominations, Mr. Allen was unanimously elected to the office of Chaplain General.

The name of Mr. Selden M. Ely, of the District of Columbia, was placed in nomination for the office of Registrar General.

Judge Remington, of New York, placed in nomination for the office of Registrar General the name of Mr. William S. Parks, of the District of Columbia.

There being no further nominations, the Congress proceeded to ballot, and Mr. Parks, having received the majority of votes cast, was declared duly elected to the office of Registrar General of the National Society.

Mr. Bowen, of Illinois, placed in nomination the name of Mr. George A. Brennan, of Illinois, for the office of Historian General.

The name of Mr. George Carpenter Arnold was placed in nomination for the office of Historian General. There being no further nominations, the Congress proceeded to ballot, and Mr. Arnold, receiving the majority of votes cast, was declared duly elected to the office of Historian General of the National Society.

Mr. Read, of Massachusetts, placed in nomination for the office of Genealogist General Mr. Walter Kendall Watkins, of Massachusetts. There being no further nominations, Mr. Watkins was unanimously elected to the office of Genealogist General.

Colonel Guthrie, of Pennsylvania, placed in nomination for the office of Chancellor General the name of Judge Eugene C. Bonniwell, of Pennsylvania. There being no further nominations, Judge Bonniwell was unanimously elected to the office of Chancellor General.

The Congress then proceeded to the election of Trustees from each State. The Secretary General read the list of the nominees for Trustees as follows:

Mr. Wentworth moved the election of the gentlemen whose names have been read to the position of Trustees for the respective State Societies. The motion was carried and the Trustees as read were declared duly elected.

The Congress tendered resolutions of thanks to the Buffalo Chapter for its splendid hospitality, to Mrs. John Miller Horton for her courtesy in opening her house for the beautiful reception, and to the President General for his uniform courtesy and fairness in handling the affairs of the National Society, and especially in his direction of the present Congress. Also to Dr. Lee S.

McCollester for his services as Chaplain General, and a special vote of thanks was given to the Committee of Ladies of Buffalo for the courtesies shown to the visiting ladies of the Congress.

President General Elect McCamant assumed the chair and announced that the Board of Trustees would meet immediately after the adjournment of the Congress.

The Congress then adjourned sine die.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY GENERAL

COMPATRIOTS: In reviewing the affairs of the National Society for the past year, I find that practically every event or matter of interest has been laid before the entire membership of the Society in the quarterly Bulletins as published during the preceding twelve months. I am hopeful that these BULLETINS, prepared and printed at the result of so much time, labor, and expense, have received the careful attention of our membership, but I have at times been confronted with the inquiry as to whether I believe the membership of the Society do really give these publications the attention which a live interest in the organization would suggest. It may be that the numerous copies returned by the post-office as undelivered and the many changes in address of which notices have not been given to our office, except through the post-office, might indicate a lack of interest in the membership. In the course of a year these items constitute a very large number, and every issue of a BULLETIN requires the preparation of very many slips for changes in the addressograph stencils, which, added to the stencils for new members, call for the making of several thousand new stencils each year.

One of the most conspicuous events of the past year has been the election of the President and Vice-President of the United States as members of our Society.

Another event of great and very hopeful interest has been the organization of a new State Society in Georgia, which was chartered during the month of March. The Society has been regularly organized and officers elected. The President, Compatriot Allan Waters, of Atlanta, has shown a lively and determined interest in the new organization and seems hopeful that at a very early date he will be able to report at least one hundred members on his roll. It is hoped that at a very early date we may have additional encouragement in the revival of interest in our organization in other portions of the Southern States, where the field would seem so ripe for effort.

A very considerable interest has been shown during the past year in the matter of the World War Medals, and nearly two thousand of these have been distributed up to date.

Due notices have been given that four amendments to the Constitution of the National Society have been proposed for consideration at this Congress.

In addition to these amendments, there is a recommendation from the Executive Committee covering the advisability of discontinuing the publication of the Year Book, which has only a very limited circulation, and that in the future the proceedings of the Annual Congress appear in the Official Bulletin.

which reaches the entire membership. It may be added also that the Year Book, containing a very large proportion of material published in the BULLETINS, is a duplication of printing at a very heavy expense. The publication of the Year Book for 1920 was the subject of considerable thought and effort. The cost of printing seemed to have reached its peak. A canvass of the printing business in Washington showed that uniformly there was increase in wages of 35 per cent, binding 50 per cent, and in the cost of paper from 200 to 400 per cent. An investigation of the subject elsewhere showed the same result. We found we could do no better on bids than to allow the printing to remain with the establishment which had done the work for many years, and the cost reached the sum of \$2,011.14 for 500 copies, the number of the issue being reduced 100 copies from the usual amount. Let me say here (for I believe the Society at large ought to know a few of these things), we have now on the shelves of our headquarters more than 500 copies of unsalable Year Books covering a period of several years. They have cost much money. Occasionally, there is a call for one, but at long intervals. They take up much valuable shelf space and constitute a very doubtful asset.

I have spoken of the excessive cost of printing during the past year. I will state here that for the year ending May, 1919, the usual and ordinary printing of the Society cost \$5,264.40. For the past year the cost has been \$7,808.34. Owing to increased business, there has probably been an enlargement of our printing supplies, notably in the case of application blanks, for which the demand has been quite heavy. The Year Book has also required an increase in size, in view of the enlarged Genealogical Record and also the extended character of the Proceedings of the Annual Congress, with its large number of official reports. So also in the case of membership certificates, which, as you know, are engraved in the name of and for each separate State. Their cost has increased in recent years from 60 cents each to \$1; then \$1.25, and now at \$1.40. The engrossing costs us 85 cents each. To this must be added the increased cost of mailing tubes, etc. During the past year 642 certificates have been ordered. Some of the State Societies have lessened their orders. We have now on hand, distributed among all the State Societies, awaiting orders, 1,580 certificates, which stand us at the cost of \$1,728.35.

Altogether it has been a very busy year. The report of the Registrar General will show the statistics as relating to the membership. Over 1,600 applications have been approved and recorded during the past year and many supplementals also examined and recorded. The past three months have been the most active for several years. In the month of March alone, 220 applications for membership were examined, approved, and recorded. The State official, who in a very few instances handles one hundred applications during a year, will appreciate the work caused by the number received by the National Society in the one month.

The correspondence of all kinds has been very heavy during the year. It relates to many subjects and a multitude of inquiries requiring thought and investigation. It has been my practice to answer every letter personally and to keep a carbon copy of the answer. Unlike our Sister Society of the D. A. R., we do not have among our officials a "Correspondence General," hence I am unable to state accurately just how much mail we have handled. An investi-

gation of the matter, however, convinces me that I have personally dictated not less than 2,200 letters during the past year. In addition to this, there are hundreds of circulars, bills, and advices to State Officials on form sheets which have been mailed.

As an interesting illustration of the pressure which may be experienced in this branch of the work, I will state that about a month ago, on the invitation of our Philadelphia compatriots, I attended the Franklin Statue exercises in that city, held under the auspices of the S. A. R. I was absent from Washington only over Saturday and Sunday, and yet when I returned to my office on Monday morning I found sixty-eight pieces of mail relating to the business of this organization awaiting attention.

I have mentioned a few of these matters of interest simply because I desired to give you some idea of the activity of this office. Such duties require much time and labor; it needs much and competent assistance. The Society is receiving faithful and careful service. The work is being done and I am pleased to say that it is kept well in hand and is now practically up to date.

I am reminded that I have been a member of this organization now for thirty years. I am proud to be of service to it, and I trust that there may be a renewed spirit and united effort in our work which will result in a wide and greatly enlarged strength and influence throughout our country.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR GENERAL

From March 31, 1920, to April 1, 1921

Your Registrar General has the honor to report that since the formation of the Society, on April 30, 1889, to the end of the present fiscal year, 34,740 members have been enrolled in 52 Societies. The total net membership on April I of last year was 16,257. During the present year, ending April I, 1921, 1.614 new members have been added. The losses by death or from non-payment of dues have amounted to 750, leaving a total net membership in 47 State Societies of 17,121, or net gain of 864. Since that date to the present meeting of the Congress about 200 more applications have been approved. In addition to the 1,614 original claims accepted, 286 supplemental papers have been approved. This shows a steady increase from last year, and the losses, while heavy in some States, are not as great as last year, which immediately followed the World War. Reconstruction was then necessary, but now most of the Societies have settled down with renewed interest to their former active routine, The records show that 642 certificates of membership have been issued. While each member, by the By-Laws, may be entitled to a certificate, the present increased cost of the engraving and labor is such a task upon the Treasury of the States that they are now being ordered for about one-third of the new members,

The State Society showing the largest active membership is Massachusetts, which has 1,800 members; the second highest is the Empire State Society, with 1,701; then New Jersey, with 1,590; Illinois, 1,189, and Connecticut, 1,150.

The State showing the largest number of new members is New Jersey, which enrolled 191 and will again retain the Syracuse Banner. The second largest enrollment was in Massachusetts, 163; then New York, with 145, and Illinois next, with 120. The Traveling Banner, which was presented by the Colorado Society, to be awarded to the State numbering one hundred or more which makes the greatest net percentage of increase, goes this year to the home of the President General, Maryland having added 133 new members to its former roll of 347. The Registrar General here wishes to especially congratulate the Registrars of the States above mentioned upon the high standard of excellence which the applications received from them have invariably shown.

Through the efforts of President General Preston, a new Society, with 16 members, was organized in Georgia and a charter to that effect delivered. There is still much missionary work needed in several of the Southern States, where, as shown by the large membership rolls of our sister organization of Daughters of the American Revolution, thousands of descendents of the heroes of that war now reside and need simply the proper leadership to form an organization of our own.

Through the generosity of the late President General Logan, a large volume, containing the full pedigree and membership of every member, was published in 1901, and since that date the work of enrolling every new member has been continued in the Year Book, with an extract of the pedigree, together with the service, which is published quarterly in the BULLETIN. This method not only places on record a large amount of historical knowledge, but is a help to many seeking aid in joining the Society.

Among the names prominent in the management of the nation's affairs who have been enrolled during the past year are: Hon. Warren G. Harding, President of the United States, who joined the Ohio Society; Hon. Calvin Coolidge, Vice-President of the United States, who became a member of the Massachusetts Society; Hon. Edwin P. Morrow, Governor of Kentucky, and Ex-Governor Folk, of Missouri. Within the past two weeks the papers of Hon. Westmoreland Davis, Governor of Virginia, and Governor Denny, of Delaware, have been approved.

Among the new members from Maine and Rhode Island are two real sons of Revolutionary soldiers.

Among the well-known members who have died since the last report are Lucius P. Deming, First President General of the National Society and First President of the Connecticut Society; Major General Joseph C. Breckenridge, Past President General and Past President of the District of Columbia Society; Dr. John O. Föster, Past Chaplain General of the National Society; Frank W. Rawles, Past Vice-President General of the National Society and Past President of the Arkansas Society; Joseph Ferrant Tuttle, Jr., First President of the Colorado Society; Ex-Governor John Franklin Fort, Past President of the New Jersey Society; Hon. Taylor Beattie, Past President of the Louisiana Society, and William Lowrie March, Past President of the District of Columbia Society. Two real sons of Revolutionary soldiers among our members also passed away.

With the hope that each member of the Congress will return to his home with a determination to do his best in helping to increase the membership in

organized States as well as in his own locality, this report is respectfully submitted.

Social Functions Incident to the Meeting in Buffalo of the National Congress, May 15-17, 1921

On Sunday evening, May 15, a beautiful and impressive service was held at St. Paul's Cathedral. The delegates and guests marched from the head-quarters, preceded by the National Emblem and the flags of the different State Societies. A special musical program had been prepared and was beautifully carried out by the full vested choir of mixed voices. The rector, Dr. Charles H. Jessup, spoke a few impressive words of welcome, and a most eloquent and patriotic sermon was delivered by Chaplain General Lee S. McCollester, D. D. The Right Reverend Charles H. Brent, Bishop of the Diocese of Western New York, also spoke a few words of greeting.

Monday noon, between the sessions of the Congress, a luncheon was served for the gentlemen attending the Congress at the Hotel Lafayette, and a charming luncheon was tendered to the visiting ladies at the Twentieth Century Club, under the direction of a committee of local women, of which Mrs. John Miller Horton was chairman.

On Monday evening a reception in honor of the visiting delegates and ladies and members of Buffalo Chapter and their ladies was given by Mrs. John Miller Horton, Regent of Buffalo Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, at her home, in Delaware Avenue. This was a beautiful occasion and attended by over three hundred guests.

Tuesday afternoon an automobile drive was taken around the city of Buffalo and its beautiful parks, with a stop at the Albright Art Gallery and the Buffalo Country Club, where light refreshments were served.

On Tuesday evening the Annual Banquet of the National Society was held in the banquet room of the Lafayette Hotel and attended by the delegates, members of Buffalo Chapter, and ladies to the number of about three hundred. The decorations, carrying out the color scheme of our organization, were most beautiful and appropriate.

Captain Hamilton Ward, of the Buffalo Chapter, acted as toastmaster, a

function that he had performed when the National Society met in Buffalo in 1908. The addresses of the evening were made by Past President General James Harry Preston and Samuel B. Botsford, of Buffalo, who spoke impressively on some fads of Americanization; Mr. Charles Francis Adams, former President of Buffalo Chapter, gave several selections from American poets in a manner that charmed and delighted his audience; Mrs. John Miller Horton, Regent of the Buffalo Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, gave words of greeting from our sister organization; President General Wallace McCamant made a most thoughtful and eloquent address on the Constitution. After the banquet, dancing was enjoyed by the guests until midnight.

On Wednesday morning the delegates and guests were given a trip to Niagara Falls in special cars and around the Great Gorge Route. A luncheon was served at the Prospect House, and the guests returned to Buffalo some time during the afternoon.

MEETINGS OF TRUSTEES AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Held May 14, 1921, at Rochester, N. Y.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, was held, on call by the President General, on Saturday, May 14, 1921, at 11 Livingston Park, Rochester, N. Y. (the D. A. R. House of Rochester Chapter), upon invitation of Compatriot George B. Sage, President of the Rochester Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution.

The meeting was called to order by President General James H. Preston, at 11 o'clock a. m. Those present were President General Preston, Mr. Louis Annin Ames, of New York; Mr. George E. Pomeroy. of Ohio, and Judge A. P. Sumner, of Rhode Island, members of the Executive Committee; also Vice-President General George H. Nutting; Past President General Newell B. Woodworth; Historian General George C. Arnold; Chancellor General Harvey F. Remington; Genealogist General W. K. Watkins; also present Compatriot George B. Sage, President of Rochester Chapter, and Compatriots Frank B. Steele and Millard H. Dake, of the Buffalo Chapter. Of the absent members of the Executive Committee, Past President General Chancellor L. Jenks, of Illinois, was detained by reason of a trial in court in which he was interested as an attorney; Rev. Dr. Lyman Whitney Allen, of New Jersey, by reason of pulpit engagements for Sunday, and Compatriot W. K. Boardman, of Tennessee, on account of an important business engagement at Nashville.

The minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee were approved as printed in the BULLETIN.

Letters were read from various compatriots expressing regret at being unable to attend the meeting.

The Secretary General presented several matters deemed of interest to the committee, covering principally the work of the Society during the past year and the present status of the membership, as shown by the annual reports to be submitted to the Congress at Buffalo.

The matter of a careful revision of the list for mailing the Society BULLETIN, covering about 18,000 stencils for the addressograph machine, which had not

been revised for several years, was considered and especial reference made to certain States which do not report to the National Society and whose membership still remains on the lists.

On motion, it was ordered that the Secretary General prepare a list of States not reporting, and that the same be referred to the Vice-Presidents General for suitable investigation and report to the Executive Committee, with recommendations.

On motion of Judge Sumner, it was ordered that the matter of obtaining a correct list and the addresses of actual members be referred to the next Executive Committee, with the additional recommendation that steps be taken to obtain a complete roster of the National Society membership.

A letter was submitted from J. E. Caldwell & Co., of Philadelphia, requesting an increase in the contract price for furnishing the Society Insignia. Referred to incoming Executive Committee for action.

The President General reported the organization of a new State Society in Georgia.

On motion, the courtesies of the floor were extended to all present not members of the committee.

Compatriot Frank B. Steele, of Buffalo, was introduced and described the program for the Congress to be held in that city.

The members of the Executive Committee and others present entered upon a general discussion of the proposed amendments to the National Society Constitution to be submitted to the Congress.

The Secretary General was instructed to notify all officers to use India ink on membership certificates.

A letter was submitted from the District of Columbia Society covering a suggestion from the joint committee having charge of the annual meeting held in Washington on February 22, in which it was suggested that the next celebration be undertaken in the names of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the General Society of Sons of the Revolution, and the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, under such arrangements as may be entered into with these respective organizations by the local Societies. The suggestion was approved by the Executive Committee as to the joint annual meeting to be under the auspices of the three Societies, this endorsement not to be considered as carrying a financial obligation.

It was ordered that a representation of the grave-marker manufactured by D. H. Jones Co., of Massachusetts, with a description thereof, should be printed in the BULLETIN for information to the members of the Society.

A letter was presented from the District of Columbia Society containing a resolution adopted by that Society relative to the recognition of the American Flag and opposed to the use of "yellow fringe or frippery of any kind" on the flag. It was suggested by the committee that the District of Columbia Society should consult the regulations of the State and War Departments relative to the flag.

A letter was also presented from J. C. Weight, of Indiana, calling attention to the lack of proper protection from fire of the original drafts of the Constitution of the United States and Declaration of Independence in the State Department at Washington.

The letter was referred to the Secretary General to ascertain the condition of care of these documents at Washington with reference to protection from destruction by fire.

The annual report of Treasurer General John H. Burroughs was presented, showing a balance on hand May 12, 1920, of \$9,328.75; receipts, \$12,705.03; total, \$22,033,78; disbursements, \$16,076.36; leaving a balance on hand May 11, 1021. of \$5,957.42.

The report was ordered received and filed.

The attention of the committee was called to the decision of the Registrar General with reference to claims for membership based solely upon what is known as the "New Hampshire Association Test," reference being made to the Year Book for 1920, page 110.

Upon consideration of the matter, it was ordered that the question involved be referred to the Chancellor General and Genealogist General for consideration and report. It was further ordered that the Secretary General be directed to procure from the Maine Society a copy of the legal opinion referred to in the report of the Registrar General for 1920.

The President General reported on various matters of interest to the committee and filed several letters for future reference.

A vote of thanks was extended to the Daughters of the American Revolution of Rochester, for their generous hospitality.

The meeting then adjourned.

Moved by Mr. Ames that the June Bulletin shall contain the names of the National Officers, the Presidents and Secretaries of the State Societies, with addresses as far as possible, and a synopsis of the National Congress held in Buffalo, May 15-17, 1921; and also that there be printed five hundred copies of the Constitution and By-Laws, and that this fact be stated in the Bulletin in conspicuous type, to call attention of the members thereto. Motion adopted.

Motion was made and adopted that the salary of the Secretary General be fixed at \$900 for the year, and that the salary of the Registrar General be \$600 for the year.

Motion was made and adopted that the sum of \$600 be appropriated for the expenses of the offices of Secretary General, Registrar General, and Treasurer General for the next six months, and that a committee of two be appointed to approve these bills for expenses. The Chairman appointed Mr. Ames and Mr. Adams such a committee.

Moved and adopted that a committee be appointed, consisting of Past President General Woodworth, of New York, Judge Eugene C. Bonniwell, of Pennsylvania, and Judge Arthur P. Sumner, of Rhode Island, who shall have power to revise and accept grave-markers.

It was moved and adopted that the President General and Executive Committee have full authority to settle matters by mail and telegraph.

A vote of thanks was extended to Dr. Charles Van Bergen for his generous hospitality in entertaining the Executive Committee.

On motion, the meeting was adjourned.

ITEMS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Through the activities of the Flag Day Committee, practically every community in the United States held celebrations on June 14. Governor Lake, of Connecticut, at the solicitation of Lewis B. Curtis, chairman of the Flag Day Committee, issued a fervent proclamation designating June 14 as Flag Day and urging special observance by schools and communities. Many other communities throughout the country carried on celebrations, either officially or semi-officially, and it is felt that this committee of the Sons of the American Revolution has made its influence felt in a very broad and effective manner.

The National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, presented to the Sulgrave (Washington) Manor, England, the ancestral home of the Washingtons, a handsome silk United States Flag, trimmed and mounted according to United States regulations, on June 21, 1921. The acceptance of the flag was by the Honorary President of the Sulgrave Manor, our Ambassador, Colonel Harvey.

The following telegram was received by Past President General Louis Annin Ames on the occasion of the celebration in New York City of the first inaugural of General Washington as President of the United States:

To the Sons of the American Revolution and other patriotic organizations joining in the celebration of General Washington's inauguration as first President, I want to extend greetings on this anniversary. The establishment of constitutional government under the great leader, in achievement of independence, was the foundation of our national security and power. Let us all join in the hope that this foundation shall never be shaken, and that our future shall be a continuing justification of Washington's faith.

In Memoriam

The following resolution on the death of General Horace Porter, Past President General, has been prepared by a committee representing the National Society, through appointment by President General McCamant:

Whereas the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, has learned with sincere sorrow that Brigadier-General Horace Porter, a distinguished Past President General of the Society, closed his wonderful career on Sunday, May 20, 1021.

Resolved, That this minute of esteem and affection be inscribed upon the records of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

General Horace Porter was born at Huntington, Pa., April 15, 1837, the son of a Governor of that State. He was a direct descendant of John Porter, a gallant soldier, who fought at Warwick under William the Conqueror.

The first Porter of this family to settle in America was Robert Porter, whose son Andrew, General Horace Porter's grandfather, distinguished himself as an officer in the American Revolution. With such an ancestry, it was only natural that Horace Porter should leave Harvard for West Point and an army career.

When Fort Sumter was fired upon he was commissioned second lieutenant. His rise in the army was so rapid that at the age of 27 he was commissioned Brigadier-General and Aide-de-Camp to General Grant; then Field Commander of the Union Armies. He won six brevets for bravery. A special act of Congress bestowed the Congressional Medal on him for his bravery at the Battle of Chickamauga.

At the close of the Civil War, when General Grant was Secretary of War, General Porter acted as his assistant. He resigned from the Army at the end of General Grant's first term as President, when he was Executive Secretary to the President, and accepted a vice-presidency of the Pullman Car Company. He was the first president of the West Shore Railroad, later became president of the New York elevated railroads, and during this period he invented the ticket-chopper which is still used at elevated and subway stations.

General Porter raised the sum of \$600,000 in a few weeks for the erection in 1892 of a mausoleum on Riverside Drive, New York, where rest the remains of General and Mrs. Grant.

General Porter served with honor the Sons of the American Revolution as President General from 1892 to 1896.

President McKinley, in 1897, appointed General Porter as Ambassador to France, and he remained at that post for eight years. It was while he was Ambassador that General Porter recovered the body of John Paul Jones, the "Father of the American Navy." He spent six years at this task and a large sum of money, for which he refused to be reimbursed, as well as an infinite amount of pains and study to make sure of proper identification of the body, which was in a remarkable state of preservation. The body was brought to this country by an escort of battleships and placed in the crypt of the chapel at the Naval Academy at Annapolis. For this General Porter received the thanks of Congress, which extended to him the privileges of both houses for life.

In 1907, at the age of 70, he represented the United States at the Second Hague Peace Conference.

He closed his career as an earnest advocate of universal peace.

Resolved, That the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, in paying tribute to the memory of so eminent a compatriot as General Horace Porter, honors itself; for he won the admiration of all as a gallant soldier, a gifted statesman, an able diplomat, a brilliant orator, a fine executive, a successful inventor, and was beloved as a devoted husband, kind father, noble friend, an upright citizen, and earnest patriot. Men of General Horace Porter's character and ability have made America great.

The Pilgrimage of the Franklin Statue

Any story of the wonderful pilgrimage of the Franklin Statue from Baltimore, where it was cast, to Waterbury, Conn., its final resting place, would be inadequate unless written by one who accompanied the statue. This meager description, culled from newspapers, programs, and other sources, can give but a mere outline of what took place and especially the part that was played by the Sons of the American Revolution. It is hoped that in the near future a detailed and well-written history of this statue will be in order, that it may be preserved for future records.

The statue, conceived and designed by the famous sculptor, Paul Wayland Bartlett, was to be placed in Waterbury, Conn., through the generosity of the late Elisha Levenworth. It started April 10 from Baltimore, where it was cast in bronze, with a remarkable ovation, in which the Sons of the American Revolution took a most prominent part. Our President General, James Harry Preston, representing the patriotic societies, made the address of the day, and many of our members took an active part in the ceremonies.

In Wilmington, Del., the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution attended the exercises in a body, and Mr. Edward W. Cooch, a direct descendant of Thomas Cooch, who was a Revolutionary soldier and for whom Cooch's bridge is named, made an address.

In Philadelphia, after stopping at many towns on the way, the ceremonies were in charge of Compatriot Eugene C. Bonniwell, and were most elaborate and impressive. Judge Bonniwell made an address, as did former President General Elmer Wentworth. The story of this ceremony would be worth writing for itself alone.

From Philadelphia the statue was taken to Trenton and Brunswick, stopping at many towns on the way. Arriving in New York, a great demonstration was given and the New York Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, carried out the program, and members of the Society attended in a body.

After leaving New York it was driven to Boston, Mass., and there at Old South Meeting House, on Sunday, May 8, a most beautiful program was carried out under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution, Vice-

President General George Hale Nutting, of our Society, being the general chairman. The Rev. Lewis Wilder Hicks, Chaplain of the Massachusetts Society, and Rev. Lee S. McCollester, Chaplain General of the National Society, gave the invocation and benediction, respectively. Compatriot T. Juloan Silsby was chairman of the Committee on Arrangements.

Before arriving at Waterbury, homage was paid to the statue and the memory of Franklin in New Haven by President Arthur T. Hadley, of Yale, and then by the compatriots at Bridgeport, where it was received with the same enthusiastic and reverent greetings. It finally arrived at Waterbury, its resting-place, and there, after being placed on its foundation, was unveiled by two young collateral relatives of Elisha Levenworth, Mark Levenworth Sperry and Richard Smith Sperry.

The idea of this pilgrimage originated with the Sons of the American Revolution—in fact, it was first suggested by one of our most prominent Past Presidents General and the plans were largely carried out by members of our Society. Compatriot John Henry Smythe accompanied the statue the greater part of the way, and by his presence and knowledge of the subject aided materially in making the pilgrimage the success it achieved.

EVENTS OF STATE SOCIETIES

The Arizona Society joined with the Maricopa Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, on Lexington Day, April 19, 1921, in appropriate exercises upon the occasion of the admission to citizenship of thirty aliens, the successful applicants for final naturalization papers. After swearing in the newly made citizens, United States District Judge Sawtelle, in the Federal Court room at Phœnix, relinquished the bench to the Secretary of the Arizona Society, who presided in the absence of President Wilkinson. Addresses of welcome and congratulation were made by veterans of the Civil War, Spanish-American War, and the World War, followed by representatives of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution. The Daughters distributed flags to the new citizens and the Woman's Auxiliary of the American Legion distributed flowers to their wives and sweethearts. Through the efforts of the Arizona Society the Governor issued a proclamation for special observance of Flag Day.

The Arkansas Society held its annual meeting in the parlors of the Marion Hotel, at noon of Washington's Birthday, February 22, 1921. The meeting was well attended and much interest manifested. The following officers were elected for the coming year: President, Gen. Benjamin W. Green; Vice-President, John M. Bracey; Second Vice-President, Frank D. Leaming; Honorary Vice-President, Philander K. Roots; Secretary, Fay Hampstead; Registrar, Ernest C. Newton; Treasurer, Thomas M. Cory; Historian, John O. Blakeney; Chaplain, Dr. John Van Lear.

Resolutions of condolence for the death of Past President Frank W. Rawls and General Jonathan A. Kellogg were adopted. A resolution appointing a committee to confer with the Governor of the State and other State officials with a view of assembling the various historical collections in the State Capitol in one office was adopted. The annual banquet following the meeting was attended by nearly one hundred members and friends. Patriotic addresses were made by Mr. Ally Smith, Gen. B. W. Green, Mrs. Clarence Woodward, State Regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and Mr. Fay Hempstead. The latter's address on the "Genesis of the Flag" was especially interesting. Mr. Hempstead has served as State Secretary of the Arkansas Society for over 25 years.

The California Society held its annual meeting and election of officers at the Commercial Club, San Francisco, on Wednesday evening, April 20. After the business meeting the Society commemorated the anniversary of the Battle of Lexington at an informal dinner. Duncan Matthewson, captain of detectives, spoke on "Tong Wars." James A. Johnson, Warden of San Quentin prison, spoke on "Indeterminate Sentence."

The Society presented bronze memorial medals to the following members and sons of members who served in the World War: First Lieutenant S. D. Barnes, Sergeant E. G. Barnum, First Lieutenant J. N. Blood, Second Lieutenant W. V. Empire, Major H. R. Fay, Captain J. B. Frisbee, First Lieutenant W. T. Goldsborough, Captain J. G. Heywood, Second Lieutenant V. D. Lord, First Lieutenant R. H. Lutz, Private J. W. Marsh,

Major J. Mora Moss, Captain G. M. Mott, Major C. D. Y. Ostrom, Private J. R. Perkins, Jr., Commander S. A. Purviance, Major O. H. Sampson, Captain E. T. Thurston.

The Delaware Society held its annual reunion and dinner on Saturday evening, April 16. Reports showed that the organization had largely increased its membership during the last year. Former Mayor Horace Wilson, President of the Society, presided at the meeting and was toastmaster at the dinner. Plans were discussed for the part that the Society is to take in the ceremony relating to the Rodney statue; also the matter of a reunion on the Battlefield of the Brandywine was considered.

The District of Columbia Society held its April meeting at Franklin Square Hotel, on Wednesday evening, the 20th. The address of the evening was delivered by Hon. Wade Hampton Ellis, on the subject "The Enemy Within Our Gates." Mr. Ellis, former Attorney General of Ohio and First Assistant Attorney General of the United States, made a forceful speech and gave first-hand information on his topic, which is so closely related to the purposes of this Society. There was a buffet luncheon and smoker after the meeting.

The Indiana Society held its annual meeting on February 21, at the Lincoln Hotel, Indianapolis, the date being the 143d anniversary of the capture of Fort Sackville (Vincennes) by General George Rogers Clark. The adoption of a program for extensive historical work throughout the State was featured in the afternoon session. The members visited Monument Circle, where President Austin H. Brown placed, in the name of the Society, a wreath upon the monument of General George Rogers Clark. The speakers at the evening session were Hon. Henry J. Ryan, chairman of the National Americanization Committee of the American Legion; Captain W. A. Ketcham, Commander-in-Chief of the G. A. R., and Vice-President Cornelius C. Posson, who spoke feelingly of the neglected graves of some 800 soldiers of the American Revolution which lie in Indiana. At the business meeting the marking of these graves was endorsed.

The Louisiana Society was represented at the State meeting of the Daughters of the American Revolution held at New Orleans, March 31, by Henry Robinson, Historian of the Louisiana Society, S. A. R., who read an address prepared by Colonel C. Robert Churchill, recounting the brilliant exploits in the campaign of young Galvez and his men, who helped the Americans to victory by crushing the British ambitions for control of the Mississippi Valley during the War of the Revolution.

The Maine Society held its annual meeting at the Falmouth Hotel on February 22, 1921. After the election of officers and business meeting the annual banquet took place, the speaker being Hon. Harold E. Cook, who gave a thoughtful address on "Some of the Perils that Confront the Nation." The newly elected President, Hon. James O. Bradbury, also spoke along the same lines.

The Massachusetts Society held its 32d annual meeting at the Municipal Auditorium, at Springfield, Tuesday, April 19. An elaborate program was carried out, continuing throughout the day. At 11 a. m. the ringing of the municipal chimes by Compatriot Ernest Newton Bagg ushered in the ceremonies. At 11.15 the opening business session, with an address of welcome by Compatriot Hon. Edwin F. Leonard, Mayor of Springfield. At 12.15 a band concert, followed by a parade to the Hotel Kimball, where a luncheon was held for the members of the Society and ladies. Here a presentation of World War Service Medals was made. The annual address was given in the afternoon by the Rev. Edward Raymond Hance, of Naugatuck, Conn., who spoke on the "Cavalier and the Puritan." During the session a resolution was passed petitioning the Government to recognize the services of the veterans of the United States Army during the Indian War in New Mexico in 1867, and that a suitable pension be granted these veterans.

The Michigan Society held its annual meeting at Detroit, April 15, at the Detroit Club. Vice-President General Moulton Houk, of Delaware, Ohio, was the guest of honor and speaker. The election of officers and delegates to the National Congress preceded the dinner. Members attended from Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Ann Aıbor, Pontiac, Adrian, and other Michigan Chapters and made reports of work and progress.

Several interesting addresses were made and Mr. Tower acted as toastmaster at the banquet, and the War Service Medals were presented by Mr. Lucius Boltwood to Don W. Ferrant, Lemuel S. The Minnesota Society held a splendid meeting in the Historical Society's building April 19, in commemoration of the Battle of Lexington. A reception was given to the members of the Daughters of the American Revolution, about 125 attending. Prof. A. E. Jenks, of the State University, delivered a fine address on "Materialism." He was introduced by the President, Mr. Charles E. Rittenhouse. Light refreshments were served.

The Missouri Society celebrated Flag Day on June 14 with a program of patriotic exercises in Jefferson Memorial Building. Hon. W. D. Vandiver, President of the Missouri Society, made the address of welcome. Mr. Linn Paine, Chairman of the National Committee on Patriotic Education, made an interesting report of the National Congress held at Buffalo, N. Y., and the Rev. Z. B. T. Phillips, Chaplain of the Missouri Society, made an eloquent address on the American Flag.

The Nebraska Society joined with Lincoln Chapter in placing a commemorative tablet upon the monument of Past President Herbert M. Bushnell in Wyuka Cemetery, at Lincoln, and participated in the Flag Day parade on June 14 by a detachment of the Lincoln Chapter.

The New Hampshire Society held the annual meeting and election of officers on April 19, at Concord. An address on "The United States and World Affairs" was delivered by Prof. Albert H. Washburn, of Dartmouth College. This address was up to the minute in matters pertaining to the country and was full of sane and sound matter.

The South Park Presbyterian Church, Newark, was the scene of a very patriotic meeting on Sunday afternoon, April 17, when exercises under the direction of the New Jersey Society were held in remembrance of Lexington and Concord anniversaries. Rev. Dr. Howard Duffield, of New York, preached a stirring sermon on the spirit of the day.

Newark Chapter has elected Compatriot Sylvester H. M. Agens its President. He hopes to double the membership in the course of the year. Under the auspices of the chapter, Prof. William C. Armstrong, of Elizabeth, gave an historical lecture at the New Jersey Historical Society rooms, Saturday, April 16. A large representation attended.

Plans for the placing of a flag pole at the cemeterial tract owned by the New Jersey Society, on the Battlefield of Springfield, were being completed at the time of sending this report. Passaic Valley Chapter will observe the 141st anniversary of this battle, in the First Presbyterian Church, Springfield, on June 26. Orange Chapter gave a reception to its delegates to the National Congress at the headquarters of the State Society, on Thursday evening, May 26.

Orange Chapter observed Flag Day June 14, with exercises at the Orange Park, to which foreigners particularly were invited.

Under the auspices of the New Jersey Society, Sons of the American Revolution, a granite boulder was dedicated in the burying ground adjoining the old First Presbyterian Church, Elizabeth, Sunday, June 19, in memory of Rev. Dr. William Force Whitaker, Chaplain General 1913-1915. The address at the exercises held within the edifice was delivered in a masterful and eloquent manner by our Chaplain General, Rev. Dr. Lyman Whitney Allen, President of the New Jersey Society. At the dedicatory exercises, held immediately afterward, David L. Pierson, former Historian General and chairman of the Committee on Monuments and Memorials of the New Jersey Society, delivered an address and the memorial was unveiled by Mrs. George H. Gibson, in whose household Dr. Whitaker spent the greater number of his years. Compatriot Frederick D. Hahn, retiring President of Elizabethtown Chapter, was chairman of the Committee of Arrangements.

A liberty pole forty-five feet in height will be dedicated at the battleground of Springfield, N. J., on Sunday, June 26, by the New Jersey Society, following exercises held in the old First Church of that town, under the direction of

Passaic Valley Chapter. The presiding officer will be David L. Pierson and the pole will be presented by Harry F. Brewer, First Vice-President of the New Jersey Society, and will be accepted by Rev. Dr. Allen, President.

Empire State Society was invited to and attended a patriotic service in the Brooklyn Academy of Music on March 13, 1921, given by the Fort Greene Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Compatriot Louis Annin Ames represented the Society at a luncheon held at the Down Town Club to discuss with representatives of other patriotic societies plans for an American Committee of Good-will, the object being to maintain and increase good-will between the people of the English-speaking commonwealths. The Society went on record as protesting against unpatriotic and hostile utterances, such as had recently occurred in New York City, and aims to co-operate with other patriotic and civic societies to suppress such propaganda.

On April 18 a committee represented the Society at the unveiling of the statue to the South American Patriot, General Simon Bolivar. The principal address of the evening was by Prof. John Adams Taylor, of the University of North Dakota, on "The Social and Economic Life of the Pilgrims," an instructive and inspiring address on a timely subject.

Hon. Walter L. Stockwell brought fraternal greetings from the Sons of the Revolution. The address of the President, Frank Drew Hall, was based on "The American's Creed." Through the efforts of President Hall a copy of the American's Creed, by William Tyler Page, suitable for framing, has been sent to each public school in the State. It was voted to arrange, if possible, to place a copy of this creed in the hands of each newly made citizen in the State during the coming year.

Authority was granted for the establishment of a local chapter at Grand Forks, which will be the first local chapter in the State.

The officers elected were: Prof. Howard E. Simpson, of Grand Forks, President; Hon. John O. Hanchett, of Valley City, Vice-President; Walter R. Reed, of Amenia, Secretary and Registrar; J. W. Wilkerson, of Grand Forks, Treasurer; Frank D. Hall, of Fargo, Historian; W. J. Clapp, of Fargo, Chaplain. The next annual meeting will be held at Grand Forks.

The Ohio Society held its annual meeting at Dayton on Lexington Day, April 10, 1921. The members were the guests of the Richard Montgomery Chapter and were royally entertained by the enthusiastic members of that Chapter. The Society has had an increase of 75 members during the past year, and much interest has been manifested among the various chapters in the State in patriotic educational work through the distribution of hundreds of copies of the United States Constitution and the booklet "Information for Immigrants." A general response to these efforts has been noted throughout the State by celebrations in commemoration of Constitution Day, Lexington Day, Memorial Day, and other important anniversaries by the schools. The Society has been active in its efforts for an appropriation by the State to improve the grounds surrounding Fort Laurens, the first fort erected in the territory of Ohio during the War of the Revolution, and in favor of the movement to erect two monuments in memory of Mad Anthony Wayne, one on the battlefield of Fallen Timbers, near Toledo, and one near Greenville, a historical spot, where important treaties were signed by the Indians. The Society is active in the work of identifying and marking the graves of Revolutionary soldiers, over 1,200 having been so far reported. One hundred and forty medals have been presented to soldiers of the World War who are members of the Ohio Society. An elaborate banquet in the evening concluded the gathering for this State meeting and was attended by one hundred and fifty, including many ladies. A message of greeting was sent to President Harding, who replied with a cordial message. The guest of honor was Col. Benson G. Hough, Commander of the famous 106th Regiment, Rainbow Division, now a judge of the Ohio Supreme Court. Other prominent speakers were Rev. E. P. Whallon, of Cincinnati; Dr. W. F. Pierce, and the President of Kenyon College.

Western Reserve Chapter, of Cleveland, celebrated February 22d by holding its annual meeting, and a varied and attractive program was carried out. The annual meeting and luncheon was held at the Cleveland Athletic Club. About sixty were present and the speaker of the occasion was Colonel Hayden Eames, who spoke on the subject of "Radicalism."
