PURPOSES AND OBJECTS OF THE S. A. R.

(EXTRACTS FROM CONSTITUTION)

The purposes and objects of this Society are declared to be patriotic, historical, and educational, and shall include those intended or designed to perpetuate the memory of the men who, by their services or sacrifices during the war of the American Revolution, achieved the independence of the American people; to unite and promote fellowship among their descendants; to inspire them and the community at large with a more profound reverence for the principles of the government founded by our forefathers; to encourage historical research in relation to the American Revolution; to acquire and preserve the records of the individual services of the patriots of the war, as well as documents, relics, and landmarks; to mark the scenes of the Revolution by appropriate memorials; to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war and of the Revolutionary period; to foster true patriotism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, and to carry out the purposes expressed in the preamble of the Constitution of our country and the injunctions of Washington in his farewell address to the American people.

Qualifications for Membership

Any man shall be eligible to membership in the Society who, being of the age of 18 years or over and a citizen of good repute in the community, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who was at all times unfailing in his loyalty to, and rendered active service in, the cause of American Independence, either as an officer, soldier, seaman, marine, militiaman or minute man, in the armed forces of the Continental Congress or of any one of the several Colonies or States, or as a Signer of the Declaration of Independence, or as a member of a Committee of Safety or Correspondence, or as a member of any Continental, Provincial, or Colonial Congress or Legislature, or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts of resistance to the authority of Great Britain.

Application for membership is made on standard blanks furnished by the State Societies. These blanks call for the place and date of birth and of death of the Revolutionary ancestor and the year of birth, of marriage, and of death of ancestors in intervening generations. Membership is based on one original claim; additional claims are filed on supplemental papers. The applications and supplementals are made in duplicate.

THE PRESIDENT GENERAL'S MESSAGE

Compatriots:

At last, after years of anticipation, our hopes have been realized, and on August 26, 1927, title was taken to a home of our own, the former Norman Williams Mansion, at 1227 Sixteenth Street Northwest, Washington, D. C., which is now known as the National Headquarters of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Notwithstanding the fact it is heavily mortgaged and entails large payments of interest, we have great reason to be proud of our new home. While there will be considerable expense in operating the building, yet, when the indebtedness shall have been paid and the contemplated endowment obtained, the running expenses of the property should entail no extra expense to this Society. In fact, some economies will be made, for the Registrar General, Francis B. Culver, of Washington, D. C., in the Hill Building, removed his office on October 1, thus saving a yearly rental of \$1,500. Our genial Secretary and Mrs. Steele, having removed from Buffalo, are now living in the new Headquarters and are in charge of the property, under direct supervision of the Executive Committee. It is also planned to have an Assistant Treasurer General's office in this building.

Likewise, much routine of the President General's office will be conducted there. By taking an evening train from New London, I can be at my desk in the Headquarters Building at eight the next morning. Much of the long delay in the issuance of certificates of membership can be overcome, for the certificates can be signed at the Headquarters and forwarded direct to the several State Societies, without first traveling over long distances in our country to obtain the signatures of the three National Officers required to sign them: the President General,

Secretary General, and Registrar General. Instead of the Secretary General and Registrar General corresponding nearly every day, they can confer and their mail be sent out by one typist. The above are only a few of the many changes contemplated for efficiency and economy.

I believe that the acquisition of our new home and the necessary effort to pay for it will be an incentive to our members, and no doubt will result in a largely increased membership. It will strengthen our work in all departments and furnish the proper machinery for assisting our committees and societies in promoting the patriotic and educational work for which we are organized. Let's complete our subscriptions for the property during 1928. It can be done, provided we give Chairman Baker and his committee hearty support with financial assistance.

On June 30, 1927, Director General F. W. Millspaugh was appointed by me as "Director of Statistics." Already he has compiled some very interesting figures, which are helpful in analyzing our growth in membership. He has prepared records covering all the States and districts, but in this connection I will quote only the total of our National Society.

Many members drop out in some localities after the first year or two, as they find little to interest them, but the greatest loss comes from unpaid dues, showing, as Compatriot Millspaugh says, the need of "Reinstating committees." The usual average loss by death is inevitable.

The activities of this organization are conducted chiefly through committees, and I have been much gratified during the past four months to notice the interest and devotion exemplified by the chairmen of committees. Our National Vice-Presidents General and the Presidents of State Societies also have important responsibilities, accompanied with great opportunities. If, with sufficient reason, a compatriot holding one of these offices finds it impossible to give attention to the work of this National Society, he should appoint an assistant to attend to the correspondence and other important matters.

The President General and Mrs. Rogers start on their coast-to-coast trip from their home in New London, Connecticut, October 16, arriving at the National Headquarters in Washington, D. C., for the fall meeting of the Executive Committee the 18th; attending the banquet of the Maryland Society, in Baltimore, the 19th; then leaving for Ohio, Indiana, Chicago, Minneapolis, Iowa, Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Oregon, Washington, and California. The return trip will be via New Orleans and Florida.

In addition to statistical information of this great patriotic organization of ours, it will be very helpful to the Chief Executive, in the early part of his administration, to visit the field, becoming more intimately acquainted with his fellow-compatriots and surveying local conditions. I would like to visit every State Society Headquarters, but, of course, that is impossible. I anticipate the trip with pleasure. It is taken entirely in the interests of the National Society, S. A. R., with special emphasis on the importance of permanent National Head-

quarters. Upon my return I hope to use the information and experience for the further upbuilding of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Mr. State Secretary—Have you adopted the suggestion of the meeting of Secretaries at the National Congress at Richmond, on Tuesday, May 17, about listing your telephone number under "Sons of the American Revolution" in your local telephone book?

State Secretaries are requested, in preparing demit blanks, to provide the *new* address of the compatriot being transferred. A new form of blank is now provided, *requiring* this information.

ATTENTION IS CALLED to the list of chapter officers—Presidents and Secretaries—published in this issue of The Minute Man. This roster is compiled and printed annually, and requests for correct lists of chapter officers went out early in the summer. In several cases, direct requests for this information have been made repeatedly of State or chapter officers with no response. If the information here printed is in any case not correct or not complete, please place the blame where it is due.

This is the time for all State and chapter organizations to appoint their committees on Good Citizenship Medals. The "Plan" should be presented to the pupils thus early in the school year in order that they may truly strive to win the medals throughout the entire school year. If anyone is unfamiliar with the Good Citizenship Medal Award Plan, please inquire of the Secretary General, 1227 16th Street N. W., Washington, D. C.

The idea has been advanced that historical patriotism would be encouraged if all National and State Officers and so many compatriots as possible would use the United States postage stamps of the commemorative issues, especially those commemorative of the Sesquicentennial events. These stamps may be obtained in nearly all the post offices upon inquiry and should be furnished later upon request.

ATTENTION OF STATE AND CHAPTER OFFICERS IS CALLED to the fact that names of supplementary ancestors engrossed on certificates of membership are charged for at the rate of 50 cents each for any over the original claim. This is a fixed charge and has been in effect since the present plan of presenting each new member with the large certificate has been in order, namely, since October 1, 1924. By referring to The Minute Man for October, 1924, the authorization for this and the Report of the "Certificate Committee" will be found. This statement is made because it has come to the attention of the Secretary General recently, from several sources, that State officers seem to be unfamiliar with this provision. All new members should be told of this and the charges anticipated, as extra ancestors' names are automatically placed upon the new certificate if filed at the time of application.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY

Held at the Residence of the President General, New London, Connecticut, August 6, 1927

Present: Hon. Ernest E. Rogers, President General, presiding; Directors General Henry F. Baker, of Maryland; Wilbert H. Barrett, of Michigan; Harry F. Brewer, of New Jersey; Ganson Depew, of New York; Frank B. Steele, Secretary General.

There were also present, as guests, George S. Godard, President of the Connecticut Society; Frederick W. Aldred, President of the Rhode Island Society; J. Monroe Holland, Treasurer of the National Headquarters Committee; Clark Belden, chairman of the National Committee on Publicity; Herbert H. White and Frederick A. Doolittle, of the Connecticut Society.

The meeting was called to order by the President General, and upon motion of Mr. Brewer, the minutes of the meeting held on May 18, 1927, as printed in the June MINUTE MAN were approved.

Mr. Barrett moved that the courtesy of the floor be extended to all of the visiting compatriots. The motion was adopted.

The President General presented several invitations to hold the fall meeting of the Eecutive Committee—Minneapolis, Detroit, and Washington.

Mr. Baker moved that the fall meeting be held in Washington, D. C., provided nothing should arise to prevent. The motion was adopted.

The matter of a field secretary was discussed, and it was moved by Mr. Barrett that the matter of employing a field secretary be left to the President General, and he be authorized to take a mail vote if necessary. The motion was adopted.

The President General presented the matter of a registration fee for future meetings of the Congress, and after a full discussion of this important matter it was moved by Mr. Baker that a registration fee of five dollars be charged for each delegate, alternate, or guest attending the National Congress. The motion was adopted.

Mr. Brewer moved that notice of this motion imposing a registration fee be sent to each State President. The motion was adopted.

Upon discussion, it was decided that the Executive Committee would act upon invitations for the 1928 Congress at its October meeting.

The President General presented a letter from Past President General Thruston, in reference to the history of the Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of the Revolution and other matters relating to the two societies.

It was moved by Mr. Depew that a committee consisting of Past President General Thruston, Past President General Louis Annin Ames, and Mr. George S. Godard, be appointed for the purpose of publishing a booklet giving in brief a history of the founding of the two organizations, the Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of the Revolution, and setting forth the essential differences that exist today in their organization and qualifications for membership. The motion was adopted.

As this meeting of the Executive Committee was called primarily to consider the matter of the National Headquarters in Washington, consideration of the several matters referred to the Executive Committee by the Congress and the Board of Trustees was postponed until the fall meeting, to be held in October.

Director General Henry F. Baker, chairman of the Headquarters Committee,

then reported that the special committee named at the last meeting of the Executive Committee to execute the contract for the purchase of the proposed National Headquarters Building and pay the first installment on the purchase price thereof had carried out these details, and that the contract for sale was properly signed, and that the initial payment of \$5,000 had been duly made.

Thereupon it was moved by Mr. Brewer that the action of the committee be and is hereby, approved, and that this special committee be discharged. The motion was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. Brewer that the action of Mr. Baker and Mr. Holland in paying over the first \$5,000 as initial payment be approved. The motion

Mr. Baker then read his formal report, which was, upon motion, received and approved. The report follows:

AUGUST 6, 1927.

Hon. Ernest E. Rogers, President General, Sons of the American Revolution.

DEAR MR. ROGERS: I beg to report as follows in respect to the situation pertain-

ing to the National Headquarters project:

As you know, this project was unanimously approved by the Congress held at Philadelphia in June, 1926. Due to the absence from the country of two members of our committee, plans for the campaign could not be formulated until early in 1927. The first step determined upon was to acquaint the membership with the project by letters and pamphlets, sent each member by first-class mail. This was done twice-first in February and again in April, just prior to the Richmond meeting. Thus every member of the Society was made familiar with the propo-

The Presidents of State Societies were requested to write their members, asking them to carefully consider the project as presented by the committee. The Vice-Presidents General were asked to communicate with the Presidents of State Societies in their respective districts and urge their co-operation with the committee. The Past Presidents General and all National Officers were requested to communicate with their friends in the Society, urging their cooperation and thus lend their great influence. The purpose of these communications was not to solicit funds primarily, but to lay the foundation for a complete understanding of the proposition.

The members of the Advisory Committee, composed of Past Presidents General, Vice-Presidents General, and Presidents of State Societies were given an outline of the tentative plans for the conduct of the campaign and their suggestion and criticisms sought.

Through the publicity given as herein described, the membership generally were well advised on the subject before the Congress convened at Richmond. At the Richmond Congress pamphlets describing the project were distributed among

As many had suggested the advisability of having some definite property presented for consideration, an option was obtained on the Norman Williams mansion, 1227 16th Street N. W., Washington, D. C., at the price of \$145,000, including furniture, rugs and hangings, this option to expire upon the adjournment of the Congress.

Throughout the sessions of this convention photographs and plans of the building and grounds were on display. During the afternoon of the second day of the convention the question of National Headquarers was thoroughly discussed and opportunity given for a free expression of opinion, both as to the project itself and the property under consideration. The result of this deliberation was that your committee were instructed, without a dissenting voice, to proceed to acquire

At the meeting of the Executive Committee held immediately following the adjournment of Congress a resolution was unanimously adopted providing for a committee, composed of the President General, Judge Josiah A. Van Orsdel, and the chairman of the Campaign Committee, with authority and under instruction to enter into a formal contract to purchase the property. Pursuant to this resolution, the contract was executed by Ernest J. Clark, Vice-President General; Judge Van Orsdel, and myself and \$5,000 was paid as part of the first installment of \$25,000, the balance \$20,000, to be paid on or before August 26, 1927, when title would be given.

Recently your committee has mailed to each and every member of the Society a pamphlet containing pictures of the building, a description of the property, and reasons for establishing National Headquarters. Accompanying this pamphlet was a personal letter of your chairman, urging prompt action in order that sufficient funds might be in hand with which to complete the first installment of \$25,000 before August 26.

In addition to these communications, your committee submitted a tentative plan of campaign to all Presidents of State Societies, in effect as follows:

First. The said Presidents to send letters to all their members urging prompt compliance with the committee's request.

Second. To appoint committees of the State Societies and chapters to conduct the campaign and subcommittees to personally see the members.

Third. To concentrate on those who might make a substantial contribution before beginning a general campaign among the members.

Fourth. After the list was exhausted, to make a general drive on a per capita

We distinctly stated that each Society would be permitted to plan and conduct its campaign in any manner its committee might decide upon.

From reports received, your committee are convinced that the project is meeting with general favor. Considering the vacation season, when so many are away, the response has been encouraging. We are now of the opinion that the necessary funds will be in hand in time to complete the first installment by August 26.

The committee created by the Executive Committee to execute the contract,

having performed its function, should be discharged.

Your campaign committee was appointed for the exclusive purpose of raising the funds. Therefore, when funds are available to complete the first installment, the Executive Committee should assume the duty and responsibility of completing the contract and the arrangement of all details connected with the acquirement of the property and the management thereof.

Several suggestions have been received relative to the future conduct of the campaign, which I will discuss verbally with you, the Executive Committee, and the Advisory Committee with the view of getting the best thought on the subject.

After a full and thorough discussion of the several matters brought out in the report of Mr. Baker, it was moved by Mr. Barrett that, in view of the proffer made by certain compatriots to make temporary loans with which to meet the payment due August 26, 1927, on the property purchased, therefore be it

Resolved, That authority be, and hereby is, delegated to the National Headquarters Committee to receive such loans as shall be necessary for the purpose mentioned and to repay such loans from the first funds received. The motion was

Mr. Brewer moved that the Headquarters Committee be, and is hereby, authorized to negotiate temporary loans for the purpose of raising funds in anticipation of subsequent subscriptions and to repay the same as and when funds are available. The motion was adopted.

Mr. Barrett moved that the selection of Mr. J. M. Holland as treasurer of the Headquarters Committee be approved and ratified, and that the chairman of said committee and treasurer be authorized to sign jointly checks for the disbursement of funds coming into the hands of this committee relative to its work in connection with the purchase of the national Headquarters Building. The motion was adopted,

It was moved by Mr. Depew that the chairman and treasurer of the Headquarters Committee be placed under \$25,000 bonds, premiums to be paid out of the funds received. The motion was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. Barrett that the President General be, and he hereby is, empowered to designate the Executive Committee of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution as trustees to take title to the property now contracted for and to maintain and manage the same as National Headquarters. The motion was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. Brewer that a committee of five be appointed by the President General to revise the National Constitution and By-Laws and report the recommendations in such time that the necessary amendments may be presented to the forthcoming Congress for action. The motion was adopted.

Note.—Because of certain provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws, it was thought advisable by the members of the Executive Committee to have the property contracted for as National Headquarters taken in the name of the Trustee until such time as it can properly be transferred to the Society.

Following the adoption of the unanimous resolution of the Congress, held at Richmond, Virginia, in May, the Committee on National Headquarters, under the chairmanship of Mr. Henry F. Baker, of Baltimore, carried out the instruction given at that time, and on August 26 the transfer of the property was made, and this splendid building is now held for the advancement of the work of our great organization.

Perhaps a short description of how the building will be used by the officers now established therein will be interesting to the compatriots.

Secretary General Steele will use the library on the ground floor for the work of his office. This room is at the left of the main entrance hall and is seen at once upon entering the front door. This room is ample for the work of the Secretary, for the present at least, but when the Society grows and develops as it is felt it will, there will be other rooms available for expansion.

The Registrar General will occupy the third floor front, where there are two large and well lighted rooms. Here will be kept all the genealogical and other records of the Society in fireproof boxes. In these rooms, too, will be at least part of the working library of the Society, and it is hoped in a very short time that this library will grow and become a large and valuable collection of historical and genealogical books. It is urged at this time that members in every part of our country from time to time contribute books that can be used for the work of the Society.

At the present time the Secretary General and Mrs. Steele are occupying the apartments on the fourth floor, and, as Washington is the mecca to which all good Americans bend their steps at some time or other, a most cordial invitation is extended to compatriots who are visiting Washington to call and inspect the beautiful new Headquarters. From reports received from those who have been in charge of the building during the past few months, there is no doubt but that this invitation will be acted upon by our compatriots, for it is understood that hardly a day passes but one or more visitors have called at the new home of the Society. Nothing but the most enthusiastic comments have been heard from all who have seen the new building, and it is felt that if members will see this center of the work and how it is being carried on, they will be enthusiastic supporters of the campaign for the funds to complete the purchase of this headquarters, and it will be but a short time before we will follow the remarkable example of our sister Society and have a headquarters in Washington that will be not only the pride of our compatriots everywhere, but will materially assist in the growth and development of the Sons of the American Revolution and make it more powerful and effective in this land of ours, which is so in need of the spirit that lives and moves and has its being in our great organization.

FAREWELL DINNER TO THE SECRETARY OF THE BUFFALO CHAPTER

For approximately twenty-five years Secretary General Frank B. Steele has been the Secretary of the Buffalo Chapter, Empire State Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and in recognition of his long service and the fact that he is now leaving Buffalo to take up his duties in Washington, the Buffalo Chapter, on September 23, tendered him a most delightful dinner at the Buffalo Club, in that city.

More than fifty friends and members of the chapter were present to bid Mr. Steele good-bye and God-speed in his new work. The President of the chapter, Mr. Leslie J. Bennett, presided and called upon many of the guests, old friends in the organization, to say a word of appreciation for the work that had been accomplished by the Secretary during these years of constant attention to his duty.

Captain Hamilton Ward, a former President of the Buffalo Chapter, spoke of the distinct loss that Mr. Steele's leaving would be, not only to the chapter, but to the city. President Ganson Depew, of the Empire State Society, spoke of the long years of devotion to the chapter by Mr. Steele, and at the conclusion of his address presented Mr. Steele with a beautiful white gold watch in recognition by the Buffalo Chapter of the service of the Secretary. Secretary Steele was taken completely by surprise and for a moment was unable to find words to adequately thank the chapter for this splendid gift, but managed to show his appreciation of this most thoughtful remembrance. Mr. Steele then told of one of the first dinners he had attended in this room, when the Buffalo Chapter said good-bye to the famous 13th United States Regular Infantry, which covered itself with glory at the famous battle of San Juan Hill, in Cuba, in the Spanish-American War, in 1808.

Major, afterwards General, William A. Auman, who was considered by many writers to be the real hero of San Juan, was present that night, and afterwards was elected an honorary member of the Buffalo Chapter. Mr. Steele also recalled the two National Congresses which were held in Buffalo, in 1908 and 1921, both of which were most successful. He closed by urging the members of Buffalo Chapter to be steadfast in their allegiance not only to the chapter, but to the State Society, and especially to the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, which was entering upon a new and definite plan for growth and accomplishment.

Many other friends of Mr. Steele spoke feelingly of the work and devotion of Compatriot Steele, among those being Past President Charles F. Adams, Registrar William A. Galpin, Ross Graves, Vice-President William E. Otto, the only charter member present; Raymond F. Brown, Past President Daniel F. Potter, and others.

THE SOCIETY'S ROSETTE

Hon. Archie Lee Talbot, of Lewiston, Maine, Past President of the Maine Society and author of the Tricolors—Blue, White, Buff—writes The Minute Man relative to the rosette of the Sons of the American Revolution Society as follows:

Dear Compatriot: Have carefully read the June Minute Man, and we are glad to know that our beloved Society of the S. A. R. has able compatriots in the important committees who are not swept off their feet by hasty action of compatriots without careful examination of questions of vital importance. "Considerable debate was had with respect to the adoption of a more nearly permanent insignia or recognition button in place of or in connection with the present silk rosette" (page 44), which was referred to the Committee on Resolutions (page 48), and by said committee referred to the Executive Committee "with request for serious consideration, with power." We can see that this is prompted by the desire to have a metal button that will not soil easily.

This movement shows that the nature of the S. A. R. Society is not fully understood as it should be. A metal button is a service button, worn only by those who have been actually in military or naval service in war—the Grand Army of the Republic, the Spanish-American War, and the American Legion in the Great War. Our Society of the S. A. R. is a hereditary Society. The first in America is the Society of the Cincinnati, founded by Washington and his generals, embracing commissioned officers only. A silk rosette was adopted, the same as the European hereditary societies. The Order of the Loyal Legion, composed of commissioned officers of the War for the Union, has a silk rosette distinguishing actual service of the first class and hereditary membership of the second class. The Order of Foreign Wars has a silk rosette. No European hereditary order would wear a metal button.

The Society of the S. A. R. is in the same high class and has a handsome silk rosette. It soils easily, but no more than the silk rosette of other hereditary societies and orders. We have never heard a member of the Loyal Legion complain that the silk rosette soils easily. It is usually worn when one is wearing their best clothes. It was my practice, in the days when active in the work of the Society, to have two rosettes—one for daily use and one fresh and bright for special occasions. Personally we could never wear a metal button of a hereditary society, for it would violate the laws and usages of heraldic and hereditary societies. One "recognition" rosette is all that should be adopted, and that one the silk rosette we now have. A change requires an amendment of the By-Laws, which are all right as they are.

We have given much thought and study of the laws of heraldic and hereditary societies and would like very much to have this communication reported in the October MINUTE MAN.

OLD FORT NIAGARA

At the recent dinner of the American Bar Association held in Buffalo, New York, Hon. John Lord O'Brian, who is a student of the history and development of the Niagara frontier, said, in describing Old Fort Niagara, that it played a most important part in the history of this country and the attainment of civil and religious liberty.

For more than a century and a half the struggle of France and Great Britain for supremacy in this frontier country had been waged with unceasing vigor and bitterness. The desire for the acquisition of this fertile territory and the profitable trading in furs with the Indians was the aim of both of these nations, and in this particular part of the frontier the French had made the most substantial progress.

The site where the old fort now stands was one of the crucial, strategic points of the contest and was the key to the trade with the Indians and the explorations of the early French. Situated at the mouth of the Niagara River, where it empties into beautiful Lake Ontario, it commanded the route to the west. Three centuries ago it marked the point of contact of the first French missionaries with the Neuter Nation of Indians, and here began the civilization of the unknown West. Twenty-odd years later the famous Iroquois annihilated the Neuters and, using the site of the old fort and the surrounding countryside as a capital and meeting ground, set up a type of civilized government and civilization that, had it been allowed to develop, would have approached that of the ancient Aztecs, the archeologists tell us.

The first fortification on the site of the present fort was built by La Salle, the French explorer, in 1679, and was called "Fort Conti." The work of building was directed by de la Motte Lussiere, who had come to Canada with La Salle the preceding year. One year later this fort was burned through the negligence of the sergeant and men in charge; nothing but the magazine was left standing.

The site remained unfortified until 1687, when Marquis de Nonville, Governor General of Canada, built a fort which carried his name. It was a timber stockade of four bastions; was built in three days; occupied for eleven months by a garrison which dwindled from 100 men to a dozen, who were saved from starvation and death from the dread disease, scurvy, by the timely arrival of friendly Miamis. It was finally abandoned on September 15, 1688.

The next fort, the one now standing, was built by the French under orders of the Governor General of New France, General de Vaudriel. The engineer, Jaspard De Lery, selected the site and drew the plans of the first permanent Fort Niagara. (It is interesting to know that photographs of these original plans were obtained from the French Government by Frank Severance, of the Old Fort Niagara Association and Secretary of the Buffalo Historical Society, and are now in the hands of the U. S. Government engineers in charge of the restoration.) Engineer De Lery got his stone from Lewiston Heights and his timber from the forest west of the river to build the castle. Some of the cut stone was brought across the lake from Kingston. This was completed in 1727.

The French held the post until 1759, when it was surrendered to the English under command of Sir William Johnson. It was during the last defense under the famous Captain Pouchot that the French first established the fortification to the eastward, with two bastions and a curtain wall, apparently on about the same lines as those since maintained. On July 25, 1759, French power on the Niagara frontier came to an end.

During the Revolutionary War the fort was held by the British and was not

surrendered to the United States until 1789 or thereabouts. During the War of 1812 the post was taken by the British and the Niagara frontier was laid waste. By the Treaty of Ghent, signed in 1815, the Americans obtained possession and the Stars and Stripes have since that time floated over Fort Niagara.

For many years it has been the earnest wish of those interested in the history of this remarkable old fort to have it preserved and restored to the original plans. The late Hon. Peter A. Porter and others were most active in trying to interest the Government in this project, but it was only after the persistent efforts of a group of men known as the Youngstown Men's Club, led by Mr. W. W. Kincaid, that a definite accomplishment was achieved. A few years ago there were appropriated sufficient funds to strengthen the sea wall where Lake Ontario was undermining the north end of the structure. Then an appropriation was made by Congress about a year ago toward restoring Fort Marion, in South Carolina, and this old fort.


Under the direction of a most competent Government expert, Mr. Adams, this work has been going on during the present year, and the results have been not only remarkable, but to the observer most fascinating.

Using the plans unearthed by Dr. Frank Severance, many features that have been lost to the world have been discovered. Probably the most interesting was the old well, that had been covered for nearly a century and a half, about which there was a tradition or legend to the effect that two spies had been thrown into this deep well after their heads were severed, and that their spirits came forth at midnight to protest. The Severance plans showed the well, and when those in charge of the work dug down under the stone flooring, there it was, twenty-five feet deep, with clear and pure water. The most authentic story is that when the British took the fort, in 1759, they thought the well had been poisoned by the French, and had had it sealed up. But here it is, and now it has been built up and is a source of wonder and awe to the thousands of tourists who have visited the castle this past summer.

Then there is the trading room, where the French traders bartered with the Indians for the rich furs, and at the door of which there has been found the remarkably secure method of literally barring the door to intruders. The walls are some two feet thick, and in opening up this old door, which the plans showed was there, a wide opening lined with timber was found, into which the massive har was thrust, which held the door in place against any attempts to break it open.

Early in the summer, while a workman was pounding a brace for a window in a small room, a large sheet of old surface plaster fell to the ground, and then was made a most remarkable discovery. There, on the surface of the underlying plaster, were scratched the names of some ten or fifteen Frenchmen, with the dates 1741, 1742, 1743, and others equally early; and then, on the other walls of this room, after removing the whitewash and plaster, many other names were found. To all

To assist the Government in its work, there has been formed the Old Fort Niagara Association, Inc., composed of representatives of all the patriotic and historical organizations of the Niagara frontier from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario. and this Society is working unceasingly to foster the interest in this historic place so that it can be preserved for future generations. Secretary General Frank B. Steele, of the Sons of the American Revolution, is Vice-President, in charge of membership, of the Old Fort Niagara Association. It is hoped to have the ground upon which this old fort and the surrounding buildings, which are nearly as old. set aside by the Government for a park and museum. That this is most desirable is shown by the thousands of people who now visit this beautiful spot, where the great Niagara flows into Lake Ontario.


Because of its importance in the French and Indian War, it was stormed and captured by Sir William Johnson, and has been considered by historians as one of the three decisive vantage points which, when taken, changed the whole history of this continent. Old Fort Niagara, Ticonderoga or Crown Point, and Quebec. taken by the English, brought to this land the constitutional government of Britain rather than the imperialism of France.

STAFFORD HILL MEMORIAL-1765-1927

The dedication on Independence Day of the memorial erected in honor of Col. Joab Stafford and the early Massachusetts settlers from Rhode Island, who are described on the monument as the Founders and Patriots of New Providence, was the consummation of a most remarkable patriotic and civic achievement on the part of the people of Berkshire County, inspired and led by Berkshire County Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution.

The late Governor Long once said of Stafford Hill (New Providence) that it was the only deserted village in Massachusetts. Not a vestige remains of the once prosperous community. The outstanding fact is that Stafford Hill and what is now Cheshire sent over 150 enlisted men to the Battle of Bennington, and that from Berkshire County as a whole over 500 volunteers went out to participate in that critical battle. Historians generally recognize the immeasurable contribution thus made by western Massachusetts to the cause of the colonists, not only in this pivotal battle, but throughout the Revolutionary War; and many careful writers expressly assert that the Berkshire troops did much to turn the tide and save the day at Bennington. It has been long felt in western Massachusetts that there has been no adequate visible memorial of these contributions to the winning of the Revolutionary struggle.

The design, construction, and dedication of the Stafford Hill Memorial to signalize these important historic events will always reflect great credit on western Massachusetts and upon the numerous organizations of Berkshire County which participated therein, including the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Masonic Fraternity, the Baptist Church, and many others. The chief honor in all this, however, fairly belongs to our own Berkshire County Chapter and its devoted officers and members, who conceived the importance and historical pro-

priety of the memorial, and then by their enthusiasm inspired and by more than a year of persistent effort accomplished the fulfilment of their aim.

Compatriots William B. Browne, President of the Berkshire County Chapter; William L. Root, its Secretary and Treasurer; Eugene B. Bowen, chairman of Committee of Arrangements, and the many others who contributed to the success of the undertaking, cannot be too highly praised for their unfailing devotion and self-dedication to the completion of this well-deserved and appropriate memorial.

The dedicatory exercises were in all respects impressive and appropriate. United States Senator Gillett was the orator of the day; Governor Weeks, of Vermont, was personally present and took part in the exercises. Speaker John C. Hull, of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, was present and spoke as the representative of Governor Fuller. The actual service or ritual of dedication of the memorial was participated in by Ernest E. Rogers, President General of our National Society; Benjamin N. Johnson, President of the Massachusetts Society, and by representatives of the Connecticut and Vermont Societies, and many of the officials prominently connected with the Sesquicentennial Celebration of the Battle of Bennington, observed August 16.

The memorial itself, adequate in dimensions and beautiful and dignified in design, stands upon the noble hill named for Colonel Stafford, about three miles from the present Cheshire village and once the site of the thriving New Providence of Revolutionary days. From this hill one has a commanding view of the surrounding country, including majestic Greylock. The memorial can, therefore, be seen from many directions and from a considerable distance.

It was not at all singular that prior to the services of dedication President General Rogers should have said to Mr. Eugene B. Bowen, chairman of the Committee of Arrangements, that no chapter of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution had in recent years any achievement to its credit more worthy of honor and distinction than the construction and dedication by the Berkshire County Chapter of this Stafford Hill Memorial.

PRESIDENT GENERAL ROGERS' ADDRESS AT STAFFORD HILL, MASS., JULY 4, 1927

Mr. President, Berkshire County Sons of the American Revolution:

When the centennials of events of the American Revolution were celebrated, commencing at Lexington and Concord, in 1875, and ending at Yorktown, in 1881, a renewed spirit of patriotism swept over these United States. The outcome of these celebrations was the formation of many patriotic organizations, among them the great National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, in 1889.

Fifty years later the sesquicentennials of these important events are being held, commencing again at Lexington and Concord. Today another worthy sesquicentennial is being observed by the Berkshire County Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, at Stafford Hill, in memory of the bravery, patriotism, and the self-sacrifice of your noble ancestors. The results of these sesquicentennial events in many instances are the placing of important memorials. I have come here to congratulate the Berkshire County Chapter upon placing so prominent, appropriate, and worthy memorial tower. The combination of this superb memorial and these noteworthy exercises probably has not been surpassed by any local chapter.

One of the objects named in the Constitution of our National Society is "to perpetuate the memory of the men who by their services or sacrifices during the War of the American Revolution achieved the independence of the American people"; which purpose you are today fulfilling by rearing this memorial. In my opinion, the history of the American Revolution should not be taught simply from its social and economic viewpoints, but reference should be made to the personal deeds and the spirit of patriotism exhibited by those who fought for liberty. The erection of this memorial will, in a visible form, teach for all time what these brave men did.

The principles established by the founders of our country are constantly being assailed, and now is the time when true patriotism should be fostered, when American institutions should be maintained and the Constitution of these United States reverenced.

Mr. Rogers then presented insignia to three members of the chapter—William B. Browne, President; Eugene B. Bowen, Vice-President, and Newton C. Bond, architect of the memorial—for their faithful service to the Sons of the American Revolution.

Mr. Rogers said, in closing, that, so far as he knew, no local chapter in the country had carried out a more expensive or more worthy work than had this Berkshire County Chapter.

GEORGE WASHINGTON DONE IN ROUGE

Some time back Mr. Rupert Hughes, in speaking before the Sons of the American Revolution, took the occasion to cast aspersions upon the name and fame of the Father of his Country; whereupon he was warmly rebuked by the presiding officer. This rebuke, together with subsequent criticism from the Daughters of the American Revolution, appears to have incited Mr. Hughes to write a book to establish his thesis.

It would seem that volumes prepared by, with, or for a purpose should be disqualified as entries in the historical catalog. Unhappily, however, the list of disqualifications on this score may be so extended that the disqualified volumes would leave the others in a minority! Some are written with a view to eulogizing an individual, a country, a cause, a State, or a section, while others seek to adduce the opposite by way of detraction or in a spirit of sheer opposition.

So let us be fair and reasonable with the "still-vex't" Rupert, who has slipped out of his accustomed field in order to show us (somewhat in the order of his own expressions) that Washington was awkward; equivocal on occasion, weak-voiced; that he had almost white eyes; was a terrible speller; an assassin (with a few extenuating circumstances); the poorest example that could be chosen as a model of filial obedience; a past-master of gambling, drinking, and flirtation; a hound for gossip; that he was whipped by the English language from youth to death; was actuated by adventurous, mercenary, and immediate motives; in fact, that he suffered shame and ridicule at home, infamy and contempt abroad.

Incidentally, the author calls his work "a biography," despite the fact that it treats only the earlier and less distinguished half of Washington's career. While, in the opinion of the writer, he is distinctly unfair to his subject, these comments in limited compass may likewise be unfair to the author; for, in the early chapters, Mr. Hughes capably presents many little-known matters of considerable importance; and at this stage he does his work after the best fashion of the most erudite historians. He asserts that these aspersions, in frequent repetition, tend to clarify the atmosphere and make Washington loom up before us "bigger and better" than before. Also, be it said, he often praises Washington, at times very highly. To be fair, therefore, we should, perhaps, repeat a number of the phrases of Rupertorial approval, even though some be a trifle sarcastic, as when he rejoices that George outgrew his alleged habit of sticking to the truth. Since space forbids the analysis of all these charges, we may confine ourselves to the one Mr. Hughes has most emphasized, the one around which the purpose of his book appears to revolve.

Unhappily, in the latter part of his work, the author seems to have become weary in historical well-doing, namely, in combining the results of extensive research with a pleasing presentation or style; so that subsequently the book becomes scrappy, if not positively dull in spots, not unlike the "annalists" which the novelists so often condemn as "dry as dust." Hence Mr. Hughes closes his "biography" shortly after he has reached (and passed) his climax, viz., the publication and discussion of George Washington's letter to Sally Fairfax, written subsequently to the formal announcement of his engagement to Martha Dandridge Custis. For this momentous disclosure and the extensive exegesis based upon it, Mr. Hughes prepares us with scores of insinuendoes—one needs to invent a word to describe expressions that so constantly hint of scandalous revelations—as certain of the settlers on the Chesapeake reduced heresy to an absurdity by the

use of the term *herediculous*. Just so, Mr. Hughes' analysis of the situation seems too funny for words—that is, the ones we ordinarily use.

After diligently perusing several hundred pages, this particular reader could no longer stand the suspense of so lengthy a series of intimations, insinuations, innuendoes, iterated and reiterated; so he skipped a chapter to lay bare the shocking denouement, to find that the long-expected mountain was scarcely a mole-hill. By no possible chance could the most unsophisticated scandal-seeker get a "kick" out of what is evidently less than half of I per cent moonshine! But to proceed in more orderly fashion to prepare for the same finale, viewed in the light of common sense and some little acquaintance with social customs:

History tells us of the youth of high-school age who made such accurate surveys beyond the Blue Ridge that they cannot be bettered by experienced surveyors of modern times, with their improved instruments. Mr. Hughes not only reviews this evidence, but admits it. Anxious, however, to establish his thesis that George was an early failure, he tells us at the same time, and at very much greater length, that George was "jilted" outrageously by half a dozen sweethearts. In other words, he exaggerates into unwittingly ridiculous prominence the startling discovery that in the first half of the nineteenth century the same things happened to this youth that have happened to thousands of other boys then and since, except, perhaps, in the more Puritanical communities, where the sexes were sedulously separated until the time when the young man was formally prepared, through the medium of a lengthly speaking tube, to address the object of his fixed and generally final attention.

. Thus a good romanticist has turned historian for a moment to tell us solemnly that the juvenile George was tortured dreadfully by what the commentator calls his "pathetic hankering after the companionship of women"; but who, he says or intimates, was incontinently rejected by dozens of them.

Why all this humorless distress about George? A much more diverting and imaginative tale of agonized cub devotion may be found in the adolescent novels of Booth Tarkington. In any event, George appears to have got some satisfaction out of his earliest epistolary efforts; for he is found writing poetic, and hence more or less inconsequential, effusions in somewhat the same words to different girls at very nearly the same time. Yet this recent commentator, with two others almost equally absurd, assumes that, only a few years later, George was utterly crushed over another alleged heart failure. This one, they say, is proved by his fervent reply to the letter of the lady herself. On the contrary, common sense and a reasonable knowledge of the persiflage of polite society would lead us to conclude that Mrs. Fairfax had jestingly rallied Colonel Washington for deserting her in favor of Martha. Here it seems that George did, perchance, take a lady's humorous reference to sentimental associations altogether too seriously. He felt called upon gallantly to respond in terms of eternal regret, much after the fashion of the expressions of his salad days. Yet have we not known of stupid masculine creatures doing the same thing in our own day and generation? They often think the dear demonstrative creatures are even more sentimental than they are themselves. Again, what man accused by woman of being something of a devil of a fellow has not been more or less gratified with this eternally subtle compliment?

These profound deductions by the "biographer" in question, coupled with dark insinuations appearing every now and then throughout the preceding pages, are all intended to indicate the approach of a frightful scandal; in fact, it is frequently intimated that George was almost, or wanted to be—perhaps he was, really—a home breaker, since the lady who thus rallied Colonel Washington was at that very time Mrs. Fairfax.

The fearful record is underscored, thrice repeated, and otherwise expounded and emphasized. It seems that George himself, as Martha's announced fiance, wrote of "a thousand tender passages that I could wish to obliterate till I was bid to revive them." Thus did the father of his country fall for a bit of feminine banter. But not nearly so heavily as his biographer; for the latter, looking for scandal and determined to interpret it, is deceived twice—first by the lady and then by the correspondence.

A thousand such passages! Think of it—or of them, if you prefer! Such is the cerebration of three such commentators. At least one of these should be an impartial critic of sounder judgment. The other two appear to be related to the lady, and for that reason are doubtless partial to the idea that she was able to smash to everlasting smithereens the open heart of the mighty Washington; so that all the excellent Martha had left was something less than a lot of unmendable fragments.

On the other hand, may it not be pertinent to observe that, in matters of sentiment, plain, ordinary numbers would never do. Suppose, in his gallant reply, George had recalled only a mere dozen, or even a hundred, "tender passages." True, as he says in his letter, he had never thought of mentioning any before she had suggested them. In any case, any figures short of "a thousand" would have been worse than a previous mistake, when the youthful George wrote to one hope of his frightfully susceptible temperament to the effect that he was somewhat compensated for the absence of her dear self by the presence and amiable qualities, which he undertook to describe, of another young lady immediately at hand.

Hence we may now rejoice in a brand-new 90 per cent sentimental portrait of Washington, done, not in gun, but in boudoir powder, with a bit of rouge and a lip-stick thrown in. Nevertheless, if not taken too seriously, it is preferable to a wooden bust on a mid-Victorian mantelpiece.

We do not want to perpetuate the effeminized or the Puritanical idea of Washington; but the original tendency to overdignify has now given place, in some quarters, to the unwarranted detraction of those who want to use the name of Washington for special purposes. Possibly their idea is to excuse their own weaknesses on the peculiar shortcomings of the age in which we live. It is well, therefore, to bear in mind that no one can point to any figure in the Revolutionary period who was big enough, able enough, and unselfish enough to have filled the place of Washington and have brought the War of the Revolution to a successful conclusion; or who could, by virtue of a powerful personality, have guided the course of the Republic during the critical years of its infancy. Perhaps these commentators admit all this; but, if we follow their methods, we may see the greatness of the man only through the underbrush of their faultfindings.

The President General presents each new member of the Society with an "American's Creed Card," with a personal letter of greeting. The chairman of the Committee on Publication of this unique production, Mr. Matthew Page Andrews, writes: "The enclosure would be unique, and certainly no society ever offered the Republic or any other nation a contribution so unusual. It is altogether, from start to finish, a production of the S. A. R., through Messrs. Chapin, Preston, William Tyler Page, and myself. I don't think this fact is realized by the S. A. R. generally."

THE BENNINGTON SESQUICENTENNIAL

The celebration of the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the Battle of Bennington, on August 13, 14, and 15, was one of the most notable of the many sesquicentennials which this year has so far seen.

The Vermont Society, Sons of the American Revolution, took a most prominent part in all the exercises, Secretary Walter H. Crockett, of Burlington, being a member of the Sesquicentennial Commissions, both State and National.

On Sunday, August 14, religious services were held by the 172d Infantry, Vermont National Guard, on the monument grounds in Old Bennington, and there were special historic services in all the churches.

On Monday morning, August 15, members of the Vermont Society attended the dedication of a marker on the site of the residence of James Breckenridge, known as the "Birthplace of Vermont," directed by the Bennington Chapter, D. A. R. Following this dedication a bronze tablet was erected by the Vermont Society, Sons of the American Revolution, marking the site of the house in which Lieut.-Col. Friedrich Baum, the British commander, died after suffering a mortal wound in the Battle of Bennington. Members of the D. A. R. organization united with members of our Society in attending these exercises.

President Mortimer R. Proctor presided, and the address on the use of the German troops in the Revolution was delivered by Walter H. Crockett, Secretary of the Vermont Society. The address probably will be printed in the near future, in the yearbook to be issued by the Vermont Society.

Late on Monday afternoon another marker was erected on the site of the first encampment of General Stark, which was presented by the State of New Hampshire, and the address was given by Governor Spaulding, of that State. On Tuesday morning, August 16, the Massachusetts and Connecticut Societies, S. A. R., united in dedicating the marker, near the site of the residence of Col. Seth Warner, at North Bennington. President General Rogers, of the National Society; President George S. Godard, of the Connecticut Society, and President Benjamin N. Johnson, of the Massachusetts Society, participated in the exercises. Exercises were also held on the Bennington Battlefield, situated in the town of Hoosic, New York. A marker was dedicated and Governors Weeks, of Vermont, and Spaulding, of New Hampshire, were present. Memorial wreaths were placed on and around the marker by representatives of various States and by numerous patriotic organizations.

Another most interesting item of the celebration on Monday was the parade of Bennington's schoolboys and girls. This parade was a beautiful and inspiring sight, especially on the village green, where the procession halted, and a marker, the gift of the boys and girls of Bennington, was dedicated on the site of Bennington's first schoolhouse.

On Tuesday afternoon, following a military parade, exercises were held in front of Bennington Battle Monument in Bennington. The principal address was deliv-

ered by Justice Frank L. Fish, of the Vermont Supreme Court, a former President of the Vermont Society, Sons of the American Revolution. Remarks were made by Governor Weeks, of Vermont; Governor Spaulding, of New Hampshire; Speaker Hull, of Massachusetts, and representatives of the Governors of Maine, Rhode Island, and Connecticut. The Historical Pageant, presented on Monday and Tuesday, was participated in by nearly a thousand persons and was a brilliant and successful presentation of historical events which preceded the Revolution and involved the intense controversy between the States of New Hampshire and New York as to control over the territory and settlers afterward constituting the new and independent State of Vermont.

DEFEAT OF BURGOYNE CAMPAIGN

The culmination of New York's Sesquicentennial occurred during this summer and fall with the commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the defeat of the Burgoyne campaign in 1777, which resulted in the surrender of Burgoyne and his army on October 17 and turned the tide of the American Revolution toward independence and victory. It brought recognition, money, men, and ships from friendly European powers. It put a new spirit in the hearts of the patriots and enabled them to create a new nation and to usher in a new era in world history. This campaign occurred on New York soil, its battles were fought largely by New York men, and its defeat was a New York triumph. The whole world recognizes the defeat of Burgoyne as one of the most decisive events in the history of nations.

Appropriately, therefore, New York State observed on October 8 the sesquicentennial of the defeat of the Burgoyne campaign on a grand scale and in a manner that was both dignified and educationally impressive. Other States in the Union, all of which have descendants whose sires fought at Saratoga, were invited to participate as guests.

On October 19, 1927, the 150th anniversary of the battles of Saratoga and the surrender of Burgoyne were memorialized by dignified and educational exercises, consisting of addresses, excursions over the battlefield, the dedication of the battlefield as a memorial park, music, and a stirring historic pageant in the evening. This was Governors' Day and all the governors of the Nation were invited to be present as the guests of the Empire State. Governors whose troops fought in the Burgoyne campaign made addresses in dedicating the battlefield as a historic park. The representatives of the foreign powers who participated in this battle were present.

The pageant, which was participated in by more than one thousand people and witnessed by probably one hundred thousand, was one of the most impressive and magnificent ever given in the State of New York. It was written by Mrs. John G. Wickser, of Buffalo, New York, who also wrote the pageant for Fort Stanwix.

AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP Extract from the Report of the Committee

(Presented at the meeting of the American Bar Association, Buffalo, New York, August 31 and September 1 and 2, 1927.)

To the American Bar Association:

The first Committee on American Citizenship, established as a special committee of the Association in 1922 and made a standing committee in 1924, set for its purpose and the object of its work "to re-establish the Constitution in the hearts and minds of the people." This committee has adhered single-mindedly to this object. There have been many requests and many temptations to engage in other forms of citizenship work, all of which we have put aside. "To re-establish the Constitution in the hearts and minds of the people" is a sufficiently large task.

To that end we have devoted our efforts to securing the continued observance of the national holidays, to celebrating Constitution Week by the broadcasting of addresses and otherwise, and to aiding where possible the oratorical contests on the Constitution, the chief of which, by the great newspapers, brought forward this year over 2,000,000 contestants from the high schools of the country.

We have worked also and mainly for the teaching of the Constitution, not literally by rote, but its historical background and particularly the benefits and blessings that it has conferred upon the American people. We believe, as all students of the Constitution do, that to know the Constitution is to be its defender. A sound knowledge of it is necessary to intelligent citizenship. Questions related to the welfare of the Republic, which are arising more and more frequently, cannot be rightly decided by voters wholly uneducated in the philosophy of our government. This lack of education extends from the schools up to the State Legislature and the National Congress. The founders of the public-school system intended that it would make men and women capable of self-government, able to pass with educated sureness on governmental questions. This the schools have failed to do.

How lacking is the spirit for intelligent self-government which proper education would create is illustrated by the judicial election in Chicago in June, when there were 21 judges to be elected. Notwithstanding the prevalence of criminality and the general criticism of the judicial system for not adequately dealing with crime, only one man or woman out of ten voted, 206,000 out of over 2,000,000 men and women twenty-one years of age. Nine out of every ten abdicated their sovereignty.

At present we are chiefly concerned with two things: the teaching of the Constitution in our schools, the fixing upon the plastic mind of the young an ineffaceable impression of the value of our National Government and of the science underlying it, and the education of applicants for admission to the bar.

There are thirty-seven States which now require by statute the teaching of the Constitution in the public schools; eleven States have no such law. A careful survey of the practical working of these laws has been made by Samuel P. Weaver, Esq., of the Spokane, Washington, bar, which is contained in the pamphlet which this committee issued last year, entitled "The Constitution in the Schools." Mr. Weaver's survey shows that most of the laws are ineffective, owing either to their own weakness or to the indifference of the teaching profession. This committee has drafted a uniform bill covering the subject and supplying the deficiencies of existing laws. This survey and our own investigation prove conclusively that the Constitution cannot be taught effectively except as a separate course. Taught as it now is, mixed with a course called "Civics," or with American History, little is

accomplished. We think that too much attention is paid to what teachers call "Civics," which is a study of the local governments, school district, city, county, and State.

If a part of the time devoted to this study of local institutions were given to the framework, background, history, and benefits of the National Constitution; if every pupil were required to pass an examination on the Constitution in advancing from one grade to another, from the grade school to the high school, from high school to the State-supported colleges, before admission, the result for which this committee aims would be accomplished. The law upon this subject should insist upon a separate course, however limited the hours, and upon this examination. The greatest difficulty is that the teachers who undertake to teach the Constitution do not themselves understand it; we must teach the teachers. Teachers employed in the public schools should be compelled to pass an examination upon this subject as thorough as that passed in the three R's. Most of the State laws are deficient in this respect. It is entirely natural that the teaching profession, already overwhelmed with the multiplicity of subjects attempted to be taught, should be reluctant to undertake a new study and add to the already overburdened curriculum. They do not understand the fundamental importance of this subject, that the primary object of the public education is to make a capable and therefore a good citizen.

The diploma at the end of the term means nothing unless the graduate understands what his country, what his Constitution, and his system of government means to him and his. Without this his education, however refined, is a failure; and yet this knowledge of paramount importance is almost universally withheld from the adolescent mind.

The Constitution must be taught in our schools, and there must be a reformation in the manner of teaching it. Knowledge of local self-government may be safely left to practice, to absorption through daily contact with its working, but the National Government is far off, reaching the citizen in ways largely invisible and insensible, appealing to him only biennially or quadrennially, and remains a sealed book unless he is given proper instruction at the threshold of his career in life.

* * * * * * *

Our examination of the curriculi of the law schools of the country convinces us that only a minority of them go beyond the Contract Clause, the Commerce Clause, and the Fourteenth Amendment, those parts of the Constitution with which the lawyer is most commonly brought in contact in earning fees. A distinguished law professor said to a member of this committee last year, "I am not teaching my boys the Constitution; I am teaching them how to get into the Supreme Court and win their cases." It is a laudable ambition to make money at the bar (probably most of us engage in it because of that), but it would be a bitter reproach to our profession if that were its only ambition. Those who attain eminence at the bar are generally profound students of the Constitution, not only of its positive provisions, but also of its wonderful history and background. Certainly it is an asset to any young lawyer in this day of deeply growing interest in the Constitution, an interest which we note with pleasure and hope, to be able to go before civic and community fraternal bodies and tell the people what the Constitution means to them. How many of the law schools turn out their graduates fitted for that important work?

Our purpose and the aim for which this committee and these special committees. will work is national, teaching of the Constitution. Our aim is a federated organization working to a common end, the local committees handling their special problems, our standing and special committees dealing with the national problems We close with a quotation from last year's report.

"Education! this is our job!"



In outlining the work for the year it was decided to try the plan, hoping to instill in the young people the highest ideals. The Regent took the plan to the superintendent of the city schools, Mr. C. L. Wright, who expressed himself as being greatly pleased with the plan, saying, "nothing has come to my attention I consider more worth while." He insisted that they give them in the high as well as junior high school. Later, in an address to the Central Junior High students, he told them, "You may have an education; you may have great wealth, but unless you have the qualifications of a good citizen you are a failure."

The winner was chosen in the manner outlined in the plan of award of the Sons of the American Revolution and was presented at the commencement exereises of each semester. The enthusiasm manifested upon the award showed conelusively that it was the most outstanding award of the entire school. The testimonials of the principals and teachers proved beyond a question their appreciation of the results attained, stating that nothing had ever been done that made such great improvement in the morale of the school. The public generally expressed sincere appreciation of the splendid work this group were doing in the community, many saying they would rather their sons would win that medal than anything else in the school.

The successful contestants are shown and named in the accompanying photograph. The schools they represented were Huntington High, Central Junior High, Lincoln Junior High, Enslow Junior High, West Junior High, Cammack Junior High, Vinson Junior High, Douglass High, and Douglass Junior High.

JOE GIVES HIS NICKELS TO SAVE GEORGE WASHINGTON

The above title and the following item, quoted from the Chicago Tribune of June 8, will explain why Joseph Esposito was given one of the Society's Good Citizenship Medals. The story was brought to the attention of the Secretary General by Compatriot Frank M. Comrie, of the Illinois Society, who purchased a medal for Joseph, and his patriotic act was further recognized by a personal letter from the chairman of the Medal Committee:

"Joseph Esposito is a thrifty boy. He earns his money by selling ice cream, and he saves most of it.

"Joe also is patriotic, and recent reports that the schools had been subsidized by King George disturbed him. Likewise the substitution of a picture of the signing of the Declaration of Independence for George Washington's portrait on the frontispiece of his history book troubled him. He knew a lot about George Washington and little about declarations. So Joe took a mighty resolve. He would sell more ice cream, save the nickles, and put George Washington back in the school.

"Yesterday his dream materialized. A large oil painting of George Washington, paid for with \$85 of his ice-cream money, and copied by a Chicago artist at Joe's order from a portrait in the Art Institute, was hung in the seventh-grade room of the Dore Elementary School, where he is a pupil. Joe is 14 and lives at South Morgan Street."

"RANGER" LAUNCHING COMMEMORATED

In the March issue of The Minute Man a story was published of the then prospective sesquicentennial anniversary of the launching of the sloop-of-war Ranger on May 10th last, through the interest and courtesy of Compatriot Joseph Foster, rear admiral, retired. The actual celebration of this anniversary was deferred to a later date in the summer, but the date itself was fittingly commemorated by the laying of the keel of the last of the six V-type submarines in the Portsmouth navy yard. This ship is to be the largest submarine for the United States naval service.

The ceremony was witnessed by Governor Huntley Spaulding, of New Hampshire, and Governor Brewster, of Maine, with members of their staff, who were received in the yard with the customary honor.

Governor Alvin T. Fuller, who also had planned to visit the yard, was unable to come, owing to an injury he received on Monday,

Following the ceremony, Governors Spaulding and Brewster were the luncheon guests of Rear Admiral W. D. MacDougall, commandant of the yard.

Rear Admiral McDougall made a short address, telling of some of the famous ships launched from the Portsmouth navy yard, beginning with the Ranger, the ship of John Paul Jones, and expressing the hope that the future captain of the V-5 would have, rather than the brilliant war service rendered by the famous heroes of past years, the opportunity to serve his country best by maintaining the quality and readiness of his fine ship as one unit of a navy whose strength insures the country's peace.

Governors Brewster and Spaulding also made brief addresses on the history of the Navy and what it means today.

AN ACCOUNT OF THE FIRST NAVAL BATTLE OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

PRINTED BY THE NEW BEDFORD CHAPTER, SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

This battle, fought May 14, 1775, was the first armed resistance to the British forces after the Battle of Concord and Lexington. It was the first of many successes of this country on the water. It was fought on the waters of Buzzards Bay, south of the town of Fairhaven.

There exists a full account of the engagement. Captain Nathaniel Pope, one of the commanders in the battle, told the story to his son, Joshua Loring Pope, who wrote the account of the affair. This Pope manuscript now is in the possession of Harry Lawrence Pope, a member of the New Bedford Chapter, S. A. R.

The following account of the battle of May 14, 1775, is rewritten from the

Pope manuscript:

Following the Battle of Concord and Lexington, the village of Fairhaven, then a part of Dartmouth, put two distinct military corps in training under the supervision of a "Committee of Safety." One of these was composed of mechanics and farmers, permanent residents, commanded by a ship-builder, Daniel Egery. The other company was principally seamen and was commanded by a sea captain, Nathaniel Pope.

On Saturday afternoon, May 13, 1775, twenty-four days after the Battle of Lexington, the two little military corps, each numbering 25 men, were in a field just outside the village, paraded for drill. While thus employed, a rider was seen coming at full speed from the east, who, turning to them and leaping from his horse, informed them that a 20-gun ship, having come into Vineyard Sound, had captured two sloops, one of which belonged in part to himself; that they were manned and armed and then were in the bay as decoy cruisers, and that the object of his visit was to apprise the committee of their true character.

With this information it was immediately resolved that the parties present give bonds that might be demanded for an old sloop of about 40 tons, then lying up at the wharf, the sloop Success, and in her put out to intercept the enemy. It was deemed that a force of 25 men, rank and file, would be sufficient, and that that number would be as many as could be put out of sight on board the Success. These points settled, the men of both companies were paraded in line and informed that 25 volunteers were wanted for an immediate and secret expedition, and that at tap of drum those ready to offer would step two paces in front.

At drum beat (by Captain Egery) the whole 50 stepped forward. They were then informed that but 25 could be taken, and this point was then settled by the men balloting for their chances. The force was divided into separate parties, who were instructed to collect and prepare the sails, rigging, etc., which had been some time on shore, get water and provisions, and not to appear with any demonstration at the vessel until after dark, that their non-combatant neighbors of the opposite shore should not be apprised of the movement.

At 9 p. m., all things being in readiness, the Success, with the two commanders, the old drummer, a boy, and the 25 rank and file, put off from the wharf at Fairhaven. There was a light air at southwest, with fog, and as the little wind was adverse, the sloop had to be "swept" out of the inner to the outer harbor, and was then left to drift. The sailor captain, Captain Pope, had the helm and conduct of the vessel, the program being that but two men and the boy be shown, the drummer to remain in the cabin and the 25 men in the hold. That, in event of discovering one of the cruisers, a rap of the foot upon

deck would bring Captain Egery to him, if below, for a council of war, when he returning below would, through the bulkhead partition, order the men to be ready, and when the sailor captain should have succeeded in placing the vessel in the desired position, a second rap of his foot would be followed by a tap on the drum in the cabin, which was the signal for the men to leap upon deck, ready for action.

The night continued calm and foggy. At early dawn they heard the crowing of cocks at the east of them on Sconticut Neck, and soon after, finding themselves in a strong current of tidal flow, they knew they were over a ledge some five miles from the inner harbor, and just as dawn pierced the fog a sloop at anchor, and but a cable's length from them, was discovered directly under their lee, in the tide that would in a few minutes sweep them upon her. The discovery by the other party brought the hail, "Sloop ahoy, sheer off; you'll be into us." Captain Pope replied, "Aye, aye," while his rap immediately brought Captain Egery from below, whose glance was sufficient, when he disappeared to apprise his men and await the second rap. Upon the deck of the vessel at anchor were two menone a sailor, the other a marine in His Majesty's uniform—who immediately commenced to load his gun. The sailor now cried out again, "Sheer off; you'll be into us." "Aye, aye," was again the response, as the captain now endeavored to lay his vessel aboard.

On the next instant the tap of the drum brought the eyes of both the sailor and the marine to the *Success* at the moment the men were tumbling up from the hold. The marine at once dropped his gun and, seizing the ax, was about to cut the cable. The sailor ran out on the bowsprit to loose the jib ties, but both were checked by threats from the captain, who in the next moment laid the *Success* alongside her victim, when, grappling both vessels together, the patriots leaping on board surprised the party below. There were below, including midshipmen and other warrant officers, eleven men. They were well armed and prepared for rough work, all of which ample provision was now turned over to their captors.

With the rise of the sun the fog dispersed, a gentle breeze sprang up at the west, and the 13 prisoners were disarmed and placed below. Captain Pope, one man and the boy taking charge of the prize and the prisoners, both vessels then made sail and worked up for the windward point of the outer harbor upon which stands the lighthouse and about three miles from town. On nearing this point a consultation was held, and it was decided that the prize be run in with the prisoners and the *Success* stand out and look for the second cruiser, although the prisoners had denied all knowledge of such vessel. The prize parted company and within a half hour was at anchor off the town with the prisoners.

The Success, standing out into the bay, soon discovered the second cruiser at anchor in a cove at the west, which, making sail, ran out in chase. The contest began.

The commander of the cruiser being dressed in the livery of the King, and evidently deeming discretion the better part of valor, sought to secure his plumage from Yankee sharpshooters by standing within the gangway doors that opened out from the high quarter deck, giving from that position his word of command, seldom exposing himself. This being perceived by Captain Egery, he called Shockley, one of the Minute Men, ordering him to "present his card to the commander when he should again pop out." He did so and the commander fell, receiving the shot in the head. A little confusion now followed, and the enemy struck to the Success of Fairhaven. Besides the commander, some two or three

others were wounded. The Yankees escaped. The English shots went over, as appears in the canvas, as they evidently aimed for higher game.

One facetious Yankee of the party said the Success had but one carriage gun, a swivel, which, having lost its trunnions, was, when loaded, lashed to a timber head, and when chance brought it in position fired; but proving yet loyal to the King, it kicked out of the traces and went overboard at the first fire.

The prisoners were soon disarmed and, both vessels putting away for the harbor, the Success and her prizes were at anchor before "meeting time." The prisoners were sent ashore to a shack under guard. The wounded were sent to the surgeon, Doctor Perry. The officer, the lieutenant of the ship, was a Scot, and took his mishap philosophically, saying that his kin had always been characterized as a thick-skulled family, and that the truth of it had been exemplified in his case. He had received a large buckshot directly in front, on the retreating line of his forehead, which, piercing to the bone, slid on its surface, cutting the scalp on its course, and was found on the back of his head—flat, thin, and sharp.

This bold stroke, following immediately upon the only preceding clash of arms, and that intended as a raid merely for the destruction of military stores, seriously alarmed the people of New Bedford, who had much of their commerce afloat in the port, while the British ship, the sloop-of-war Falcon, Captain Linzie, then lying in Tarpaulin Cove, possessed the forms of retaliation for the loss of some of her officers and crew. Acting on the impulse of this feeling, a strong delegation from the "Men of Peace" (Quakers), came early on Monday morning from New Bedford to Fairhaven and there in convention, "resolved" to return the men and the captured property to Captain Linzie with an apology.

The captains, having early notice of the current of feeling at the convention, distributed the booty of arms, etc., among themselves, and Captain Egery at once marched off 15 of the prisoners for Taunton. This number, being all officers and marines, were more emphatically the servants of the King, while the sailors, not being fighting men, were allowed to wander at will, the four wounded remaining.

Captain Egery, leaving his prisoners in Taunton jail, appeared on Tuesday morning at Watertown and reported to the Provincial Congress, there in session. The matter was placed in the hands of a committee, who reported in the afternoon of the same day. A spirited debate followed and the subject was recommitted "for further examination and inquiry into the affair."

On the 17th, the committee again reported that "the inhabitants of Dartmouth be advised to conduct themselves, with respect to the prisoners that they have taken agreeable to the direction of the Committee of Inspection of that town."

"After a long debate," says the record of the Provincial Congress, "it was moved that the consideration of the matter should subside, and an order was passed directing the secretary to inform the gentlemen from Dartmouth of the determination of the Congress and the reasons thereof."

On the 7th of June, four of the prisoners, brought to Watertown on the 2d, were ordered to Concord, and the commander was ordered discharged on his parole.

In the partition of the trophies of this capture by the Success, a saber with a rather tastefully silver-trimmed hilt and a "King's arm"—in other words, a musket and its equipment—were awarded the captain of the Minute Men, Captain Nathaniel Pope.



WILLIAM AND MARY COLLEGE, WILLIAMSBURG, VIRGINIA

To compatriots who attended the Richmond Congress and were so fortunate as to take the delightful trip to Jamestown, Yorktown, and Williamsburg, the accompanying pictures of some of the buildings on the campus of William and Mary College will revive that day of pleasure and profit to their minds. The following brief description of the buildings here shown and their history will be of interest:


William and Mary played a prominent part in the Revolution, her sons figuring prominently in many phases of the conflict. Four of them signed the Declaration of Independence, one of them after he had drafted it. This roll of celebrities included, beside Thomas Jefferson, George Wythe, Carter Braxton, and Benjamin Harrison. To this group must be added the fifteen members of the Continental Congress, including Peyton Randolph, its first President. While George Washington was not an alumnus, his first public office, that of surveyor, and his last, that of chancellor of the college, were conferred on him by William and Mary.

During the Revolution the Sir Christopher Wren (Main) Building was for some time in the hands of the English. After Rochambeau took possession of the college, the building was used by the French as a hospital. The building is now used as an academic class-room building.

The Phi Beta Kappa Building was built by the United chapters of the organization to commemorate the 50 students of William and Mary who founded Phi Beta Kappa on December 5, 1776. This building is one of the latest additions to William and Mary's campus. It supplies excellent auditorium accommodations, as well as a replica of the room in which the society was founded and a large reception room containing several portraits of famous members of the society.

EVENTS OF STATE SOCIETIES

Alabama Society.—Mooresville Chapter reports an increase of 5 in membership since the June issue of The Minute Man, making a total membership to date of 21. Twelve applicants are filling papers at the present time and to three of these applicants we especially point with pride, namely, Dr. George H. Denny, the illustrious president of University of Alabama; James E. Horton, Jr., judge of the Eighth Circuit Court, and Allen S. Cutts, pastor of Athens Baptist Church. Mr. Cutts is a young man of great force as a speaker and possessed of a splendidly trained mind. As chaplain he should prove a great addition to Mooresville Chapter.

The chapter acknowledges with sincere appreciation a gift from our everloyal friend, ex-President General Wilbert H. Barrett, of a beautifully bound book for the minutes of the chapter.

Four Citizenship medals were presented by the chapter in June—two in Decatur, one in Athens, and one in the local school. The last named was won by Miss Kathleen Rush Peebles, daughter of Compatriot John H. Peebles, Jr. The children have already made inquiry if these medals will be given this year and were told that two will be given—one for the boys and one for the girls. These medals are exceedingly popular and the children really work for them.

For Constitution Day, two prominent ministers in Athens, preached on the "Observance of the Constitution." The county papers had editorials on the subject and the high-school pupils in the local school wrote essays on the subject. The best essay was to be printed in one of the county papers the week following.

The official grave-marker will soon be placed on the grave of James Collier, the ancestor upon whose record W. G. Peebles and J. H. Peebles, Jr., entered the Sons of the American Revolution. This young soldier, who descended from Charles Collier, of King and Queen County, Virginia, and on his mother's side was closely related to Sir Francis Wyatt, Colonial Governor of Virginia, was wounded in the battle of Eutaw Springs, by a saber cut across the cheek and, while he killed the soldier who inflicted the wound, he carried the scar to his grave. He was born in Lunenburg County, Virginia, in 1757, and died in Alabama, August 20, 1832. On July 3, 1788, he married Elizabeth Bouldin, daughter of James Bouldin and his wife, Sally Watkins, of Charles City County, Virginia. She is buried beside her husband, in the old Collier graveyard, 8 miles east of Mooresville.

On August 30 the chapter entertained with their first annual barbecue. About two hundred invitations were issued, the man invited in each case being eligible to membership in the organization. Invitations included ladies also. This proved to be a very delightfully informal, old-fashioned party. A telegram was received and read by President Hill from President General Rogers, and a short talk was made by Mr. Harold W. King, President of the Alabama Society.

August I, Henry W. Hill, President of the Mooresville Chapter, was appointed State Secretary by President King, to fill the unexpired term of the former Secretary, term of office to end March, 1928,

Arkansas Society.—The Arkansas Society, for several years one of the enthusiastic supporters of the Good Citizenship Medal Plan, presented five medals to the junior high schools of Little Rock, in June last. The winners of the respective schools were: The Pulaski Heights Junior High, Leon Choate; West Side Junior High, Jim Halliburton; East Side Junior High, Charles Brown; Pine

Bluff Junior High, Thurman McCool; through Mr. Allyn Smith, to Monte Nesbitt, of Cross Roads. Elsewhere than at Little Rock, these pupils won medals: Edward G. Gibbs, Smackover; Gould Cloud, Eldorado; Elizabeth Curry, Smackover.

California Society.—SAN DIEGO CHAPTER.—Tuesday, June 14, marked the sesquicentennial of the adoption of the American Flag, and San Diego Chapter, like many others throughout the country, observed the important date. A dinner was held at the Café Cabrillo, and to this the members invited the ladies of their families and friends.

The speaker of the occasion was Judge John T. Kean, of La Jolla, well known as a public speaker and a profound student of the history and institutions of America. His general theme was "The Flag of Our Country—Its History and Significance." Judge Kean was at one time Lieutenant Governor of South Dakota and for eight years was connected with municipal affairs in Minneapolis. He has been President of the City Planning Commission here.

At the last annual meeting, the following officers were elected by this chapter: President, Lt. Col. Charles McNaughton Frost, O. R. C.; First Vice-President, Willis Warner Brown; Second Vice-President, Maj. Gen. Joseph Henry Pendleton, U. S. M. C., retired; Secretary, Allen Henry Wright; Treasurer, Franklin Pierce Reed; Registrar, Dr. Arthur Wegeforth; Historian, Brig. Gen. William Dorrance Beach, U. S. A., retired; Librarian, John Vanderbilt Smale; Marshal, Louis Raub Johnson; Chaplain, Rev. Howard Cary Dunham.

The chapter has made a gratifying increase in local membership during the past year, with eleven or twelve new members, and has lost by death, three highly respected members—Compatriots William O. Chamberlin, Capt. Roger B. Bryan, U. S. A., and Fitz Henry W. Drummond.

The chapter preserves in its files photographs of its members and urges every member to furnish his own for this purpose.

Constitution Day was recognized by compatriots in San Francisco at a luncheon meeting, at Hotel St. Francis, at which over three hundred were present. Hon. Archibald N. Treat made a masterly address on the Constitution, telling how its framers, though free from political coercion, struggled and argued, yielding point after point, until they emerged with a charter that has stood the test of time. Carl G. Brown, President of the State Society, presided. Others at the speakers' table were Mrs. Theodore J. Hoover, Vice-Regent of the California Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; Major General John L. Hines, U. S. A.; Major General Eli K. Cole, U. S. M. C.; Rear Admiral Thomas Washington, U. S. N.; Colonel Dickinson P. Hall, U. S. M. C.; and Howard C. Rowley, Vice-President General, S. A. R. Two stands of national colors, flanked by a color guard of United States Marines, augmented the red, white and blue hangings festooning the Colonial room. Patriotic selections were given by James Isherwood, baritone, accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Isherwood.

AUBURN CHAPTER celebrated the anniversary, in combination with the local Rotarians, on Tuesday of Constitution Week, with Paul C. Oehler, of Auburn, acting as chairman of the meeting. Short talks were made by various members of the organization and the principal address, on the Constitution of the United States, was made by Rev. Brown, of Sacramento. He gave a very interesting talk. Director General Rulef C. Schanck, of the National Society, was a guest and speaker. Rev. Grant L. Shaeffer, of Auburn, who was song leader for the day, sang a solo that was appreciated by the members and guests.

Colorado Society.—Denver Chapter.—The romance of the first discovery of gold in the Rocky Mountains in paying quantities, and which led to the settling of Colorado, was commemorated by Denver Chapter on June 24, 1927, on the site of the first authentic gold strike in the State, at the junction of Little Dry Creek and the Platte River.

The spirit of the indomitable fifty-eighter is perpetuated in the legend wrought in a bronze tablet on the rough-hewn but beautiful granite monument. It reads: "Placer Camp, Little Dry Creek.—In this stream paying quantities of gold first discovered in Colorado, 1858, by the Russell party."

The dedication of this marker was on the anniversary date of the arrival of the Russell party of gold-seekers at the mouth of Cherry Creek, Kansas Territory, June 24, 1858. How that pioneering party met every discouragement known to prospecting, then made a strike of about \$5,000, which has led to the mining of over 700 million dollars' worth of gold in Colorado since then, is the tale. One of our members, Mr. Nathan C. Baker, who at the age of 16 camped on the spot when the Russells were working their claim, was an honored guest at the ceremonies. Representatives of the city of Denver, Sons of Colorado, Colorado State Historical Society, and Arapahoe County also participated in the program. A special feature was the demonstration of the panning of gold by J. O. A. Carper, member of the American Mining Congress.

In erecting this monument Denver Chapter is not only paying a tribute to the early pioneers in Colorado, but also commemorating the spirit of those men and women who came into the wilderness at the edge of the great American desert and laid the broad foundation of the great Commonwealth of Colorado.

Connecticut Society.—General David Humphreys Branch, No. 1, deferred its usual Memorial Day ceremonies of the decorating of the graves of soldiers and patriots to Sunday, June 26, and on this day one hundred and sixty-two graves in various places in New Haven and vicinity and one hundred and thirty-two in the Grove Street Cemetery, New Haven, were suitably decorated. The ceremonies began with special exercises at the grave of Noah Webster and concluded with a final program at the grave of General David Humphreys, at which the members of the committee and compatriots of the chapter and others assembled before, and after separating placed wreaths on the scattered graves of other patriots.

On September 16, under the auspices of the branch, Judge A. McClellan Matthewson broadcasted a Constitution Day address through the Deolittle Radio Corporation.

COLONEL JEREMIAH WADSWORTH BRANCH, on the eve of Constitution Day, held a very interesting and patriotic meeting at the Hartford Golf Club. Among the guests present were President General Rogers, who gave an inspiring talk on the present condition of the National Society, its future development along the lines for which it was founded, and closer co-operation throughout the country in carrying on its work. He also noted the distinct advance in the activity of the National Society in securing the building in Washington for National Headquarters.

Mr. Herbert H. White, chairman of the Connecticut Committee on National Headquarters, told of the response of Connecticut, following a recent visit of Mr. Henry F. Baker, National Headquarters chairman, in furnishing several thousand dollars toward the amount urgently needed to secure title to the Headquarters property. Positive interest was shown by all present, and it is confidently hoped that Connecticut will do its share in raising the amount necessary to pay for the property and furnish a fund adequate to maintain the functional activities of the

National Society (now carried on disadvantageously at several different points) that will be brought together in Washington.

Mr. Leverett Belknap spoke of the good results of the campaign under his leadership toward increasing the membership by bringing in young blood.

The principal speaker of the evening was Prof. Edward W. Humphrey, of Trinity College, who gave a very instructive talk on the Constitution, how the Convention came to be called, and character sketches of several of the influential members of the masterly group of men who formulated that wonderful document. Mr. Humphrey's talk was listened to with rapt attention and pleasure. He was introduced by Dr. F. T. Murlless, President of the branch, in part as follows:

One hundred and forty years ago in the city of Philadelphia there was given to the world by a comparatively small body of men the American Constitution, upon which they had labored and debated through a long and sultry summer. Such has proved to be the value and consistency and power of this instrument during the years which have intervened between that time and this that the personalities and service in this connection of many of its creators have been somewhat dimmed and forgotten in the light of the great instrument which they formulated, while yet others of their number have been quite eclipsed in the glory of their accomplishment.

Approximately one hundred and forty years before their day, in a quieter and far less tense period of our history, a no less prophetic instrument was promulgated here in Hartford. This masterly production is known as the Fundamental Orders. This working agreement between the settlements at Hartford, Windsor, and Wethersfield was the beginning of the Constitution of the Colony of Connecticut.

These men who gathered at Philadelphia had impressions of the meaning of personal liberty which had been acquired through bitter experience and a high sense of their responsibility, but the distances which separated the Colonies which they represented and the great differences in climatic conditions, the disparity of their interests, and of even their sources of wealth gave to the discussions in the Convention at times an acrimony and personal flavor which all but destroyed the value of its deliberations.

The Revolutionary War was over and the imminent danger past and lack of harmony between the Colonies was already all too evident. The vision of liberty was clear to all, but it was seen from as many and as divergent points as the fingers of a clock face. The members of adjacent Colonies naturally formed minority groups which were in practical agreement, each upon its own stipulations, yet all overlapping, and many measures of importance were without a majority.

When these weary men were about to adjourn without definite action, the inspired Franklin declared that what they had done did not suit him, but that he believed that the result of their deliberations was the best that fallible men could do, and besought them not to go home without definite action, because in that case the undertaking would only have to be begun again. As the result of Franklin's persuasions, agreement was reached, and, blind as they must have been to the magnificence of their achievement, there was given to the world the greatest formula for the expression of liberty and equality that has ever been known.

It is indeed fitting that we of Connecticut, the Constitution State, which first formally adopted it, and here in Hartford, where were formulated the Fundamental Orders upon which it was modeled, should upon the anniversary of its adoption by the Convention celebrate the making of the Constitution.

The meeting was of absorbing interest and was well attended.

GENERAL SILLIMAN BRANCH, BRIDGEPORT, entertained the Grand Army on Memorial Day with a luncheon, as has been done for the past nineteen years. This year the Grand Army had a quartet, the youngest member of which was 84 years old, which rendered a number of selections and made quite a hit with all those present.

The General Silliman Branch held their annual Spring Field Day at the home of Compatriot Clement E. Adams, on the banks of the Housatonic River, in Stratford, on June 18, with an attendance of between 50 and 60, the principal feature being the pageant representing the buying of the town of Stratford from the Indians by the Puritans.

The new officers elected for the year 1927-28 are as follows: President, Harry H. Pritchard; Vice-President, John Avery Spafford; Secretary, Frederick A. Doolittle; Registrar, Major Chas. H. Sprague; Treasurer, Albert W. Andrews; Historian, Buckingham Marsh; Chaplain, Rev. Wm. H. Day.

Society in France.—The annual ceremonies on July 4 at Picpus Cemetery, Paris, in veneration of Marquis de Lafayette were conducted by the Society in France under most auspicious circumstances. Wreaths were placed on the tomb by the Society in France, Sons of the American Revolution and Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Colonial Dames of America. Compatriot Edward H. de Neveu was master of ceremonies. Addresses were made by Mr. Sheldon Whitehouse, the Comte du Chauffault, Marquis de Dampierre, and Mr. Laurens M. Hamilton. After the ceremony, taps were blown by the American Legion bugler.

A notable assembly of guests were present, including Mr. Sheldon Whitehouse, American Chargé d'Affaire; the civil, military, and naval staff of the embassy; Mr. Alphose Gaulin, American Consul General; Mr. Alexander M. Thackara, former Consul General; the Marquis de Dampierre, representing the Lafayette family; the Marquis de Rochambeau; Mr. Laurens M. Hamilton, Vice-President, Society in France, Sons of the American Revolution; Major and Mrs. Arthur W. Kipling; the American Legion color guard, Mr. Sedley Peck; Mr. William S. Davenport, Jr., of the Association of American Volunteers with French Army; a delegation of French Boy Scouts; the Comte du Chauffault, representing the Comité France Amérique, and representatives of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Cincinnati, the American Legion Auxiliary, the American Club of Paris, the American Women's Club, the Colonial Dames of America; our Society was also represented by Major Albert B. Georgia Society.—The first local chapter to which the Georgia Society has given a charter has been formed at Milledgeville. The little group of thirteen compatriots located here have applied for and received a charter and are holding this number, symbolical of the Thirteen Original Colonies, as their "lucky" number. The credit for this movement is largely due to the efforts of the First Vice-President of the Georgia Society, Dr. J. L. Beeson, of the Georgia State College for Women, located at Milledgeville.

Illinois Society.—The Illinois Society commemorated Constitution Day jointly with the Chicago Bar Association at a banquet on Friday evening, September 16, at the club rooms of the Chicago Bar Association, in the Burnham Building. The guest of honor and speaker was Judge Floyd E. Thompson, of Rock Island, of the Supreme Court of Illinois, the youngest man ever so honored. Judge Thompson,

son spoke on the United States Constitution, upon which he is well qualified to speak. There was a large attendance of members of both organizations, with ladies. Mr. Carl A. Latham, President of the Chicago Bar Association, presided as toastmaster. President Henry G. Colson, of the Illinois Society and Vice-President General of the Sons of the American Revolution, also made an address. Patriotic music and violin solos completed the program.

Indiana Society.—The usual conditions have been reversed in Henry County, Indiana, for here a local D. A. R. chapter is being organized, fired by the enthusiasm aroused by the recent formation of the thriving Patrick Henry Chapter, S. A. R. Mention of this new chapter was made in the June Minute Man, and the genial Secretary, Dr. Clarence H. Smith, writes: "Since our Sons have started so thriving an organization here, the Daughters have organized a local chapter, which some of them had been talking about for years, but never took action until they saw what we men had done. It is usually the other way, and we are so delighted that we got the start of them."

Iowa Society.—The slogan of the Iowa Society, as decreed by State President Harold K. Bowen, is commanding: "Americanism Begins in Our Homes!" The 6,005 Daughters in Iowa are having it brought to their attention that there are but 413 members of the Sons of the American Revolution in Iowa. State officers of the Daughters of the American Revolution are manifesting a cooperating spirit, and local chapters are reported to be gradually organizing committees on "Co-operation with the Sons of the American Revolution." Some applications are being received from eligible male relatives of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Four officers of the Iowa Society are officers of the Iowa Branch, Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims. The remaining offices will be held by active members of the Daughters of the American Revolution. This should tend to bring about better co-operation between the two Revolutionary societies.

Iowa has 40 active committees, including a Committee on Visitation of Chapters, for the use of which committee \$150 has been set aside by the Board of Managers.

State Secretary George A. Jewett celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary on September 9. This was also the 70th anniversary of his entrance as a student to the Preparatory Department of Central College, Pella, Iowa. He took the occasion to revisit his Alma Mater, and was royally welcomed. Would that all could be as young at eighty as compatriot Jewett.

Memorial Hall, Topeka, is the patriotic headquarters of Kansas, where the State offices of the American Legion, Spanish War Veterans, Grand Army of the Republic, and the Sons of the American Revolution are located, as well as the headquarters of the Kansas State Historical Society, of which William E. Connelley, the capable and able State President of the Sons of the American Revolution, is the Secretary. One of the largest genealogical collections in the United States is found in Memorial Hall.

Homer Eiler, Secretary of the Kansas Department, is out to win the banners again in 1928, but wants to tell how Kansas won in 1927.

General publicity was placed in the daily and weekly papers of the State by the State Historian, and the State-wide assistance of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who sent in a list of eligibles, was a great help. A follow-up system of personal letters and application blanks was sent out. Every member of the State society was made a committee of one to secure more members, and the State Editorial Association became interested in the contest. Every State Representative and Senator was mailed a personal letter by Secretary Eiler, with application blanks.

A follow-up campaign was made on all prospects, who were assisted to make out their papers. Later a second mailing out of Sons of the American Revolution literature was sent to a prepared list.

Personal letters from Secretary Eiler were sent to each Regent of each State Daughters of the American Revolution Chapter, stating that to enroll Kansas eligible citizens as members of the Sons of the American Revolution was as much a matter of patriotism as any other phase of work outlined by either of the two societies. The Sons of the American Revolution also expressed a desire to cooperate in securing new members for the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Much of the success of the campaign was due to the Sons of the American Revolution column in the *Topeka State Journal*, managed by Compatriot Arthur Carruth. This column was written several times a week by Compatriot Griffith Bonner, State Historian and Publicist, and the cause of the Sons of the American Revolution through the State was thus widespread. Hon. William E. Connelley, State President, was most active during the campaign to bring it to a successful termination. A cordial welcome awaits members of the Sons of the American Revolution and all patriotic societies when they are in Topeka at the office of President Connelley, in Memorial Hall.

Kentucky Society.—On July 5 the Board of Managers received an application for a chapter charter from the members of the Kentucky Society in Pike County, and on September 9 "Pike Chapter No. 2" of the Kentucky Society was formally organized and a charter delivered at a meeting held in the Methodist Church at Pikeville.

The following compatriots were listed as charter members: Andrew E. Auxier, Jacob P. Cline, John S. Cline, Adam F. Childers, Joel E. Childers, Adam G. Osborne, James F. Record, Richard G. Wells, Elbridge D. Wells, and Ira May Williams, all of whom were present with the exception of compatriots Jacob P. Cline and Elbridge D. Wells, who were unavoidably prevented from attending.

Through the courtesy of the Rotary Club of Pikeville, Kentucky, an invitation having been extended by the President, a joint meeting was held with the Rotary Club, and after a most delightful luncheon, which was served by the ladies of Methodist Church, and a short session of the Rotarians, the charter was formally instituted with the following program:

The first order of business was the roll-call of charter members; then followed the pledging of members, after which a business meeting was held for the purpose of electing the officers of the chapter, and the following were unanimously elected to serve during the ensuing term: John S. Cline, Chairman; James F. Record, Vice-Chairman, and Richard G. Wells, Secretary.

During the joint meeting two addresses on Americanism were delivered by Compatriots Adam F. and Joel E. Childers, members of Rotary Club and also charter members of "Pike" Chapter, which were most interesting and greatly enjoyed and appreciated by all present.

Robert Churchill, who retired from a twelve-year tenure of the office last spring, his decision being a matter of much regret, and his services and efforts in behalf of the Society deeply appreciated. Members are urged to greater activity in securing an increase and to their obligation in this respect and in support of the Society of the Children of the American Revolution for the youthful members of their families. In conclusion, the telegram of sympathy at the distress caused by the Mississippi flood, which went to the Louisiana Society from the National Congress in convention at Richmond, is printed, with appreciative comment.

Maryland Society.—At the Flag Day dinner of Frederick Chapter, of which an account was given in The Minute Man for June, a very interesting presentation was made by Compatriot Gordon M. Ash, former Registrar of the chapter.

A fine gavel made from the wood of old Independence Hall, Philadelphia, and originally given Mr. Ash by the former President of the Poor Richard Club of Philadelphia, was presented to Frederick Chapter for its use. The band of silver on the gavel bears the inscription: "Relic of Independence Hall, Philaphia, Presented by the Poor Richard Club of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, through the courtesy of Gordon M. Ash (Registrar 1920-27) to Sergt. Lawrence Everhart Chapter, S. A. R."

Massachusetts Society.—The thirty-eighth annual meeting of the Massachusetts Society of the Sons of the American Revolution convened on Tuesday, April 19, 1927, in the city of Lowell. Never before has this Society attempted the observance of Patriot's Day on a scale so comprehensive.

Overnight hospitality for out-of-town guests by the members of Old Middlesex Chapter, S. A. R., and a reception to all members of patriotic societies by Vice-President General Burton H. Wiggin and Mrs. Wiggin at their Belmont Avenue home were the features of the night before the annual meeting. The number who attended the reception filled the spacious house to capacity, and sociability, entertainment, refreshments, and dancing passed the evening away all too quickly.

Ample entertainment for ladies accompanying compatriots who attended the annual meeting was provided by the wives of Old Middlesex Chapter members and by the ladies of the Molly Varnum, Old Bay State, and Lydia Darrah Chapters, D. A. R., of Lowell.

The annual meeting held in Memorial Hall, City Library Building, opened promptly at 10 o'clock and acted expeditiously on the business brought before it.

Amendments to the constitution, together with the changes in the by-laws made at the meeting of February 22 last, make the local chapter of much more importance in the organization, as it is now possible to assign to it territorial jurisdiction and to require approval by the local chapter of all applications originating in its jurisdiction before action can be taken by the Massachusetts Society; also the end of the fiscal year for the Massachusetts Society and all its chapetrs is now fixed at March 31, instead of April 15, as heretofore.

The Massachusetts Society held its fall Field Day on Saturday, September 10, as the guest of New Bedford Chapter at New Bedford and Fairhaven. The special feature of the occasion was the dedication of a tablet to commemorate the first naval battle of the American Revolution, fought on May 14, 1775, between a sloop manned by men from Fairhaven and two British sloops, which resulted in the capture of the two sloops with their crews.

New Bedford Chapter has provided an appropriate tablet placed on a ledge facing the scene of the battle. This ledge is on the grounds of Fort Phœnix, in one of the parks of the town of Fairhaven.



The U. S. Navy Department ordered a destroyer at New Bedford for September 10 to help in the celebration, and the President of the Naval War College was ordered to assign a speaker to take part and bring the greetings of the Navy. Rear Admiral Andrews, Commandant of the First Naval District, was also present. A more detailed account of the battle is given on another page of The Minute Man.

GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER, Springfield.—Lieut. Col. John F. Streeter presided at the first fall meeting of this chapter, which was marked by approval

of a number of important resolutions favored by the committee on resolutions at the National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution. One related to the requiring of all teachers in institutions supported by the State to take the oath of allegiance.

The resolution was as follows:

"Resolved, That the George Washington Chapter hereby indorses the resolution adopted at the last National Congress of the Society, requiring all teachers in educational institutions supported by the State, including the public schools, to take the oath of allegiance, and respectfully urges the Massachusetts Society, through its board of managers, to petition the General Court at its next session for legislation which will carry the spirit and provisions of the original resolution into effect in this Commonwealth."

This was unanimously approved by the chapter, as was the other, relating to compulsory instruction in the Constitution and the political principles on which it is founded.

Committees were appointed looking to active memberships and interesting meetings. President Streeter announced that the 146th anniversary of the surrender of Yorktown, October 19, would be the occasion of the next meeting of the chapter, when it is expected that Lieut. Gov. Frank G. Allen, of Massachusetts, will be the speaker. This will be ladies' night.

Samuel F. Punderson, Past President, presented President Streeter the active President's insignia, this to be passed on to successive chapter presidents for use while in office. A communication was read from E. K. Wilcox Post, G. A. R. thanking the chapter for making the members of the G. A. R. organization honorary members of the S. A. R. local chapter.

The speaker of the evening was Mr. Fred R. Marvin, former editor of the New York Commercial, at present executive director of the Key Men of America. Speaking on "The Menace of Radicalism," the author of several publications against radicalism took a shot at those who would prevent the action of the law in the Sacco-Vanzetti affair and read extracts from the "World Revolutionary

in the Sacco-Vanzetti affair and read extracts from the "World Revolutionary Movement," which he termed an exceedingly dangerous organization. He declared that this organization would destroy the army and navy and favored abolition of all military training for youth because of the patriotic spirit such training engenders.

BRIGADIER GENERAL, JAMES REED CHAPTER of Fitchburg held its fourth annual meeting at the Fay Club on June 21 and made it the occasion for inviting a number of gentlemen to attend the meeting and become acquainted with the organization and its aims. Six members were elected to membership, and the Secretary has expressed his hearty appreciation of the assistance given at the headquarters of the Society in the preparation of application papers.


President Benjamin N. Johnson, of the Massachusetts Society, made his official visit to the chapter and gave an address of great interest, which was followed by a general discussion.

Nebraska Society.—A beautiful birthday party celebrating the sixtieth anniversary of Lincoln, Nebraska, was given by the Lincoln Chapter. The city was presented with a handsome bronze tablet of very appropriate design and size, the inscription and imprint of the brown-stone house showing very clearly the place and date of the birth of the capital. The tablet was placed on the east front of the new million-dollar station of the Burlington Railroad Company, one of the strong factors in the development of city and surrounding territory.

A very large crowd attended the presentation and unveiling ceremony. Mayor Verne Hedge accepted for the city of Lincoln with a very suitable address and C. J. Ernst, of the Burlington, expressed the appreciation of that company in being honored with the custody of the tablet, on the wall near the main entrance of the station.

Many distinguished guests were present on the platform and gave expression to memories of that day and to their sentiment regarding the fitness and value of the marker in commemoration of that event. Among those present were the three sons and a daughter of David Butler, Governor of Nebraska on that epochal day. Governor Butler was very influential in the selection of the town and a strong factor in its development. The daughter of John Gillespie, one of the commissioners to locate the capital, represented the members of that family in welcoming the marker. The daughter of W. T. Donovan, Mrs. Mary Donovan Johnson, came from California to participate in the ceremony of the marking of the site where the little brown-stone house stood, once owned by her father, and whose home it was when the commissioners met to decide upon and sign the papers locating the capital at Lincoln.

The program, in the absence of State President Nelson B. Updike, was presided over by Dr. Benjamin F. Bailey. The entire achievement has received the active support of the officers and members of the Lincoln Chapter. The total cost of the tablet and other expenses was over \$400—all contributed by members of the S. A. R.

J. A. Piper, Secretary-Treasurer of the Lincoln Chapter, accompanied by his wife, represented Nebraska at the National Congress. They afterwards had an enjoyable visit at Roanoke, Virginia, the home of their daughter.

State President Updike plans this fall to have a gathering of all the members in Douglas County at the Old Bellevue Mission, in Bellevue. The rains during the summer have deferred the holding of this gathering on the grounds of the Old Mission, where it would be highly appropriate.

The members of the State Society have planned an active part in the celebrating of Constitution Day.

New Jersey Society.—Constitution Day was well remembered in New Jersey. The principal feature was the luncheon served at the Hotel Berwick, Newark, at

noon on Saturday, September 17, and in which the D. A. R. and the D. R. of New Jersey co-operated. David L. Pierson presided, and there were excellent addressed by Compatriot J. Henry Harrison, who spoke of the need of safe-guarding the Constitution against unnecessary amendments; Mrs. William A. Becker, Regent of the D. A. R. of New Jersey; President Richard Hartshorne, of the New Jersey Society, S. A. R., and Mrs. Clarence A. Hand, Regent of the Nova Cæsarea Chapter, D. A. R.

A telegram was received from Director General Chauncey P. Overfield, of Salt Lake City, in which he declared that "The Far West extends greetings to the New Jersey Society at its Constitution Day celebration."

After the luncheon the party adjourned to the lawn of the Newark Museum, where a well curb taken from the property of Benjamin Coe, of Newark, and which was carved out of solid block of sandstone by slaves in the days preceding the War for American Independence, was unveiled under the auspices of Nova Cæsarea Chapter, D. A. R.

There was a general display of flags throughout the day. David L. Pierson, chairman of the National Committee on Observance of Constitution Day, also requested, through the medium of a number of newspapers, that this be done. Church bells were rung at the noon hour for three minutes, which had a great effect in calling the attention of the people to the celebration and also paying a tribute to the founders of the Government. Governor A. Harry Moore issued a proclamation calling upon the people to observe the day.

NEWARK CHAPTER remembered the anniversary at a meeting on Friday night, September 16. West Fields Chapter joined with the West Fields Chapter, D. A. R., in a mass meeting in Westfield, on the evening of Constitution Day, and there was a rousing address by former U. S. Senator Joseph S. Frelinguysen, of New Jersey. Passaic Valley Chapter joined the Beacon Fire Chapter, D. A. R., on September 19 in a reception at the Hotel Beechwood, Summit, and there was a fine address by former Governor Edward C. Stokes on the Constitution.

David I. Pierson spoke at several factory meetings at noon, in Essex County, on the Constitution, and Dr. William R. Ward, Past President, spoke at the weekly luncheon of the Newark Kiwannis Club on Thursday, September 15.

A number of the S. A. R. members attended a church service at the Morrow M. E. Church, Maplewood, on Sunday evening, September 18, under the auspices of Watch Tower Chapter, D. A. R., in remembrance of Constitution Day.

The New Jersey Society has inaugurated a new form of activity which has met with the greatest success. After more than a year of painstaking effort, Compatriot John Willis Weeks, assisted by Willard I. Kimm, Russell B. Rankin and Elmer K. Sexton, has completed the first lecture in the series, "New Jersey the Battle Ground of the Revolution," illustrated with about fifty slides. It was first produced at the annual meeting of Elizabethtown Chapter, on June 14, and was again shown at the meeting of Newark Chapter, on September 16. It has been pronounced not only very faithful to the scenes portrayed, but also of incalculable value as an educational medium. It is to be deposited at the State Museum on November 1, and from there is to circulate among the schools of the State. The lecture deals with the opening of the Revolutionary War and features Washington's retreat across New Jersey in November and December, 1776, and closes with the occupation of winter headquarters at Morristown, in January, 1777.

Headquarters of the Society were opened for the new season on September I, having been closed immediately after Independence Day. A meeting of the entire Society is being planned for October 29, which will be preceded by a luncheon.

The Board of Managers was entertained at its regular June meeting with a dinner, by Compatriot Merritt G. Perkins, at the Essex Club, Newark, one of the most exclusive in the State. Colonel J. H. M. Dudley, of Elizabeth, gave a very encouraging address on the real spirit of Americanization, speaking of some of the evils in public life of today. The meeting was the 80th consecutive monthly meeting attended by Secretary David L. Pierson, having a clear record since he was elected, on January 1, 1920.

At the opening meeting of the new season, on September 9, which was a dinner meeting, Compatriot John M. Thomas, D. D., Chancellor of the Society and President of Rutgers University, addressed the members on the urgent need of higher education for the youth in the progress of the complex life of today. He urged the co-operation of the S. A. R. in making the institution an increasing medium of service in this respect as a State college. Dr. Thomas has during the two years of his presidency made some notable and most helpful advances in the usefulness of this well-known university.

Registrar Edwin N. Hopson has compiled a list of 300 relatives of members of the Society who are eligible, and there is also a list of 100 members of D. A. R. families who will be urged to become members of the organization. The membership is steadily growing.

President Richard Hartshorne was accorded the honor of presiding at the official 150th anniversary of the birth of the Flag of Stars and Stripes in Newark, on June 14, which were planned to be held at the Liberty Pole in Military Park, at noon, but on account of rain the exercises were held in the Terminal Theater. A feature was the presentation of the Betsey Ross Flag to the Continental Congress, and then it was hauled to the top of the pole, while Battery C of East Orange fired a salute of twenty-one guns.

An address on the flag was given at the Springfield Presbyterian Church on Sunday evening, June 10, by Secretary David L. Pierson. The edifice is a replica of the one destroyed by fire during the battle which raged there on June 23, 1780.

Director General Harry F. Brewer broadcasted a message on "An Appreciation of the American Flag on its Sesquicentennial Birthday" from station WGGP, Newark. It was a fine effort and well received in various sections of the eastern part of the country.

Compatriot Peter B. Fairchild, whose number, State and national, 15, were identical, died at his home, in Orange, on June 19. He was very active in the early days of the Society and was one of the few remaining of the first 100 members of our Society who were given the same number for their National and State designation. He was 89 years old.

Dr. John H. Logan, State Commissioner of Education, and who has just been chosen the superintendent of Newark public schools, was the speaker at the rededication of the bronze tablet placed on the New Brunswick Post-Office Building on June 24. This was the 13th anniversary of the National S. A. R. pilgrimage, passing through the city on its way to Cambridge, marking Washington's route when he journeyed to assume command of the Continental Army. The tablet was placed on the Second Reformed Church at that time, but the edifice was razed and the Federal authorities granted permission for its new placement. Secretary David L. Pierson, as chairman of the Commitée on Monuments and

Memorials, presided, and a dinner was enjoyed afterward at the Hotel Klein by a number of the State officers and local members.

It is now planned to formally institute the Raritan Valley Chapter at New Brunswick on October 28. A temportary organization was effected on March 31, with Henry P. Schneeweiss as President, Captain Charles B. Carman, Secretary, and John C. Conger, Registrar. The arrangements for the institution of the chapter are in the hands of Compatriot Willard I. Kimm, chairman of the Chapters Committee.

Secretary David L. Pierson spoke at the Independence Day celebration in Watsessing Park, East Orange, on July 4, and also at the outing of the First Ward Local Interest Club on July 9; at the Orange Rotary on July 7; at the Crocker-Wheeler electric works on the same day, at noon; at the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Co., East Orange, on August 3, and at the General Electric Company, Bloomfield, on August 10, all being of a patriotic character.

ELIZABETHTOWN CHAPTER, the first one organized in the country, on September 26, 1893, held its annual meeting on Flag Day and chose the following officers: President, John K. Leeds; Vice-Presidents, Fred L. Crane and Frederic D. Hahn; Secretary, Hugh Nelson; Treasurer, Henry W. Crane; Registrar, Harry F. Brewer; Chaplain, Rev. Dr. Lyttleton E. Hubard; Historian, Dr. Frederick E. Emmons.

Orange Chapter, following a custom of the past twenty years, placed a wreath upon the Dispatch Rider statue on Flag Day, June 14. The memorial is dedicated to the men and women who assisted in establishing the independence of the country. A large delegation of the chapter attended the dedication of the memorial to the Founders of the Oranges, erected by the New England Society of Orange, on June 23, the anniversary of the Battle of Springfield. David L. Pierson, as chairman of the local history committee of that organization, arranged the general plan, which consists of a tablet and boulder and a liberty pole and grinding stone taken from a grist mill erected in 1780. The memorial is placed on the lawn of the chapter headquarters, at 22 Hillyer Street, Orange. Orange Chapter will hold its opening meeting of the new season on October 20.

Montclair Chapter, through the leadership of its President, Compatriot Louis Sherwood is raising a fund for educational work. The plan is to use it by assisting deserving young men and women in securing education and in other ways. A committee of the chapter is working with a similar committee of the Eagle Rock Chapter, D. A. R., in the preparing of a program for joint activities.

NEWARK CHAPTER observed the 150th anniversary of Flag Day at the State headquarters, Newark, June 15. An address was given by Compatriot J. Henry Harrison, of Caldwell, in which he deplored the fact that only 25 per cent. of the people appeared at primary election. Twenty-five questions were submitted to the members in a questionnaire prepared by President Sylvester H. M. Agens, dealing with the history of New Jersey at the time of the Revolutionary War. David L. Pierson, Secretary, and Edwin N. Hopson, Registrar of the State Society, were the judges. First prize was won by Rev. Joseph F. Folsom.

Conklin, rector, opened the Dutch Church at Old Tappan for the party. It was here that Major André was placed on trial and convicted. The speaker at the dinner was Rev. V. A. Conover, of Oakland. J. Oscar Bunce, President, presided.

PASSAIC VALLEY CHAPTER, according to its annual custom, observed the anni-

versary of the Battle of Springfield, fought on June 23, 1780, with services in the Presbyterian Church in that town. Robert W. Chasteney, President, presided, and the address was delivered by Judge Adrian Lyon, of Perth Amboy, former President of the State Society.

West Fields Chapter, which inaugurated a sunrise Independence Day celebration, under the direction of C. Milton Tremaine, several years ago, had another successful affair this year at Mindowaskin Park, Westfield, at 7.30 a.m. Dr. William R. Ward, former President of the State Society, was the speaker.

CAPTAIN ABRAHAM GODWIN CHAPTER is holding under advisement the plan of securing the Dey mansion at Preakness, where Washington made his headquarters during a part of the summer of 1780. The chapter observed Flag Day with a dinner, and Compatriot Edwin N. Hopson gave an account of the Richmond Congress.

Independence Day was observed by the Captain Abraham Godwin Chapter in co-operation with the Westside Improvement and Protective Association. Dr. William H. Rauchfuss, former President, read a poem of his own composition, "Long Ago," and Compatriot D. Stanton Hammond delivered the principal address, on the "Cause of Independence."

Dr. Rauchfuss induced several other organizations to participate in special exercises, all of which was very helpful.

In Ridgewood, President J. Oscar Bunce secured the co-operation of the Ridgewood Herald in some very excellent publicity.

Empire State (New York) Society.—Constitution Week, in observance of the adoption of the Constitution, on September 17, 1787, was opened with informal services by the Sons of the American Revolution, at the Hall of Fame, at New York University. Wreaths were placed on the busts and tablets of eminent Americans.

Brigadier General Oliver B. Bridgman, President of the New York Chapter, decorated the bust of George Washington, and was assisted by Commander Franklin B. Huntington, a great-great-great-grandson of Benjamin Franklin. Commander Huntington, aided by William Guggenheim, of the University of Pennsylvania, placed a wreath on Franklin's bust.

Mrs. Thomas Jefferson Randolph, 4th, the widow of a great-great-grandson of Thomas Jefferson, placed a wreath on the Jefferson bust. Another was laid by J. W. H. Crim, representing the College of William and Mary, who also decorated the bust of John Marshall. A third wreath was laid on the Jefferson bust by Gorden M. Buck, Dr. William E. Dold, and Dr. Francis W. Shine, representing the University of Virginia. Alfred S. Dashiell, of Princeton University, decorated James Madison's tablet, and the bust of Alexander Hamilton was bedecked by James D. Livingston, Jr., of Columbia University, and by Dean Daniel W. Redmond, of City College, who represented Hamilton College.

An invocation was delivered by Dr. Benjamin F. Farber, of the Fourth Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. George V. Hewes, of St. Anne's Episcopal Church, the Bronx, gave the benediction.

The 140th anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution was further observed when Joseph A. Lawson delivered an address at noon at the Subtreasury in Wall Street. Services were also held at the tomb of Alexander Hamilton in Trinity Churchyard, and at the statues of George Washington and Benjamin Franklin.

Because of New York City's reception to Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh falling on June 13, 14, and 15, all Flag Day celebrations by patriotic societies had to be

canceled, but the observance of the day itself was stressed in the general news and much publicity gained thereby. .

THE MINUTE MAN

Dr. Edward Hagaman Hall, a former Registrar and Vice-President of the Empire State Society and for twenty-nine years Secretary of the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society, has relinquished that office to become Secretary of the Municipal Art Commission of New York City. His work in his former position has been recognized by honorary degrees from New York University and Hobart College and a decoration from the French Government. On August 6 two of our compatriots took a prominent part in the exercises commemorating the 150th anniversary of the siege and relief of Fort Stanwix, Col. John W. Vrooman unveiling the bronze inset on the monument, on which 232 additional names of Herkimer soldiers had been inscribed, and G. Linnemann Prescott delivered an address. Compatriot Linnemann's father aided Governor Seymour in erecting the monument in 1884. Colonel Vrooman's speech was published in the Rome Daily Sentinel of that date.

NEWBURGH CHAPTER'S record during the membership contest between the Empire State and Massachusetts Societies showed that in adding 37 new members to the 28 then on their roll they exceeded any one of 34 State Societies of the National Society in increasing membership. The Newtown-Battle Chapter at Elmira increased its membership by 22.

Compatriot Royal S. Copeland, senior U. S. Senator from New York, made the Independence Day address at Washington's Headquarters in Newburgh, New York.

The quarterly meeting of the Syracuse Chapter was held at the headquarters of the Onondaga Historical Association. Mr. Ward B. Flaxington delivered an address on "The Flag," it being June 14. The officers of the other local historical societies were invited. At the conclusion of the address a social hour was enjoyed. Compatriot G. Edward Coon, of Rochester Chapter, on August 16 was elected Grand Warden by the State Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows at their convention in Buffalo.

TICONDEROGA CHAPTER of the Empire State Society was granted a charter on June 3, 1927, and when organized elected the following officers: President, Edward C. D. Wiley; Vice-President, Henry J. Haviland; Secretary, William Wallace Jeffers; Registrar, Willard W. Belden; Treasurer, Arthur E. Phelps; Chaplain, Rev. Willard P. Harmon. Its members are very enthusiastic and have started out to increase their membership. Mrs. Francis B. Wickes, the wife of one of its members, did a great deal of work in the formation of this chapter, not only in procuring members, but in working on the lineage of some of the compatriots.

COL. CORNELIUS VAN DYCK CHAPTER, Schenectady.—Clarence E. Bennett, of the history department in the city schools, was elected President of Col. Cornelius Van Dyck Chapter at the annual meeting, held in the Rose Room of the Twentieth Century Lunch, Jay Street, in June. Dinner preceded the business session.

Seventy-one members are on the roster, according to the annual report of Hanford Robison, Secretary, an increase of five for the year. Dr. Harry V. Gregg was elected to membership.

Chairman P. Schuyler Miller, of the Good Citizenship Medals Committee, reported that eight medals had been awarded at mid-year commencement of the city schools and sixteen at the June commencement of city and neighboring schools.

The retiring President, George E. Young, reported a successful year, with considerable interest manifested in patriotic subjects on the part of the membership. Chief accomplishment was the recent erection of the granite and bronze

marker on the site of the Continental Barracks and Hospital, 1776-1780, at Union and Lafayette Streets.

The new officers elected are: President, C. E. Bennett; First Vice-President, I. Glen Sanders; Second Vice-President, A. J. Colman; Secretary, Hanford Robison: Treasurer, Horace W. Raymond; Chaplain, Aaron Becker; Historian, Malcolm W. Rix; Registrar, A. E. Reynolds; Executive Committee, G. E. Young, L. E. Montgomery, P. Schuyler Miller, E. A. Shaw, and L. H. Goddard.

As a musical feature appropriate to Flag Day, Mr. Bennett's new song, "The Star-Spangled Banner-National Peace Chime," the music of which was written by Frank Oliver, of the WGY staff, was sung by Sidney Cromie, baritone, with piano accompaniment by Professor Warren C. Taylor, of Union College.

Mr. Bennett gave an outline of the origin of the American Flag, discounting the traditional Betsy Ross story and giving more credence to the account of a conference in which General Washington, Robert Morris, and Robert Ross participated, with Benjamin Franklin called in as advisor.

Copies of Mr. Bennett's book, "Advance and Retreat to Saratoga," which is dedicated to Col. Cornelius Van Dyck Chapter, were shown at the meeting. The book, which has been running serially in newspapers, is divided into three sections, all preceding the Burgoyne campaign. These are entitled "American Offensive," "Advance to Quebec," and "Retreat to Ticonderoga." A map for the guidance of motorists and other illustrations supplement the text.

North Dakota Society.-The 11th Bulletin of the North Dakota Society shows progress, in that it has emerged from the mimeograph stage to a printed threepage issue. The address of the retiring President, Hon. John O. Hanchett, on the occasion of the annual meeting, on April 14, is printed in full. A word of greeting from the new President, Mr. John L. Bell, of Bismarck, is also a feature.

Ohio Society-RICHARD MONTGOMERY CHAPTER, Dayton.-Constitution Day was observed in Dayton when an assignment of speakers, sponsored by the Richard Montgomery Chapter, gave short talks in the various senior schools of the city and the University of Dayton.

Major W. W. Neifert, President of the chapter, spoke on the significance of the day at Roosevelt High School, while John C. Shea brought the matter to the attention of the pupils of the University of Dayton.

Other speakers in the Dayton schools were Virgil Z. Dorfmeier at Steele High School, Max G. Dice at Stivers High School, William M. Pettit at Parker High School, Lester J. Cecil at Emerson Junior High School, and Reuben R. Holmes at Wilbur Wright School.

The day was further celebrated by the local chapter at a luncheon meeting held at the Gray Manor, at which Dr. W. R. McChesney, President of Cedarville College, was the speaker.

Hon. Ernest E. Rogers, President General of the National Society, of New London, Connecticut, will pay a visit to Richard Montgomery Chapter, Dayton, on October 21. Though no plans have as yet been made, he will be fittingly entertained on his arrival, it was stated by Major W. W. Neifert, President of the chapter. Mr. Rogers is making a cross-country tour, visiting various chapters of the organization.

Certificates of membership in the National Society were presented to Earl F. and Otis F. Lake. Mayor A. C. McDonald and Rev. Charles L. Venable, new pastor of the First Lutheran Church, were present and gave short talks.

Pennsylvania Society.—At a recent meeting of the Board of Management publication of the Pennsylvania S. A. R. News was authorized. The first number appeared in July; it is an eight-page pamphlet, a most creditable production News to and for compatriots and chapters within the State, including news items of interest from other State societies, are given. The principal feature of this issue is the announcement of the first S. A. R. Golf Tournament, for which unique idea the Pennsylvania Society must be given credit, as a novel manner in which to promote sociability and personal contact among those members who are fond of the game. The first game was played on July 28, at Pittsburgh Edgewood Country Club, and any member of the Pennsylvania Society was eligible, as also sons of members between the ages of 16 and 18. If over 18. the player must be a member. Prizes were offered, and there is evidence that this first venture was a great success. The tournament was followed by dinner for players and their families. A second match, in which contestants from the Tennessee and New York Societies were entrants, was also arranged for September and successfully carried out.

Vice-President H. L. McKain, chairman of the Decoration of Graves Committee, reports that immediately preceding and on Memorial Day members of the committee traveled 840 miles, delivered three addresses, visited ten cemeteries, and decorated 63 graves, and rededicated McKee burial ground, located near Greensburg, founded in 1769. The committee has gathered data on 163 graves, which will be covered in its annual report.

Valley Force Chapter, Bethlehem, conducted Flag Day exercises attendant upon the presentation of a flagpole and flag to the city of Bethlehem, which was installed at the city park in Bethlehem on Tuesday, June 14. The presentation address was made by President W. S. Hutchinson of the chapter and the acceptance on behalf of the city was by Hon. James B. Yeakle, mayor. The program included firing of the national salute of 21 guns by Battery C, 213th C. A. A., Pensylvania National Guard.

Tennessee Society.— The annual meeting of the Tennessee Society took place on October 7, in commemoration of the anniversary of Saratoga Battle, report of which could not be obtained in time for this issue of The Minute Man. The Society appointed Compatriot Thomas A. Clarkson, of Nashville, as Secretary early in the summer, to complete the unexpired term of former Secretary Austin P. Foster, who was obliged, because of pressure of private business, to resign. Compatriot Foster's resignation was regretfully accepted. The Society's latest bulletin announces nine new members since its former publication.

Utah Society.—Constitution Day observance was very general throughout the State of Utah, over 700 addresses being made in the various schools of the State. A proclamation was issued by the Governor of the State of Utah, and proper recognition was also made by the school superintendents throughout the State.

The Utah Society will shorty unveil a tablet and monument in honor of Father Escalante and his band of religious workers, who crossed the Green River in 1776 on the way from Santa Fé, New Mexico, to Monterey, California. The monument will be placed on the highway east of Vernal, Utah, near the Green River and 211 miles east of Salt Lake City.

The Society has also been very active in the obtaining of new members and in general patriotic work, and the year will be in every way a most successful one for the Society.

Treasurer General Louis A. Bowman, of Chicago, was a visitor to Salt Lake City in August, while touring the Western States, and was entertained by Director General Chauncy P. Overfield, and former Vice-President General George Albert Smith, and other Utah compatriots during his stay in the city.

Virginia Society.—RICHMOND CHAPTER observed the 140th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution of the United States by holding appropriate exercises on Constitution Day, September 17, 1927, in Richmond, Virginia. This chapter also sponsored the observance of this historic event by obtaining the co-operation of the Governor, the mayor, schools, colleges, clergymen, citizens, churches, civic, patriotic, fraternal, business, and other organizations.

Governor Harry F. Byrd, of Virginia, issued a proclamation designating September 17 "Constitution Day" and the following week "Constitution Week," and

he requested "that the people of the State of Virginia peruse the Constitution of the United States and display the flag, and that patriotic and civic organizations remember to honor the day and week, and that all ministers thank God for the Constitution and the immortal Virginians who gave it to us, and that all schools and colleges of the State hold appropriate exercises which will stress in some way the liberties, privileges, and guarantees of this document."

Mayor J. F. Bright, of Richmond, proclaimed Constitution Day and Week and requested "that all citizens and organizations fittingly observe this sacred American anniversary."

On Constitution Day, September 17, impressive morning and evening exercises were held by Richmond Chapter in the Capitol Square.

At 8 a. m. George C. Gregory, Vice-President of Richmond Chapter, placed a

wreath on General George Washington's Monument and made a brief address, in which he lauded him for his military genius and for his leadership in civil affairs, especially for his wisdom and ability as President of the Constitutional Convention in 1787.

At 8 p. m. the main exercises were held in the Hall of the House of Delegates, in the Capitol Building. Mr. Gregory presided, and speeches on the Constitution were made by Hon. Robert H. Talley, Hon. Rosewell Page, and Rabbi Edward N. Calisch, of Richmond. "America" and the "Star-Spangled Banner" were sung by a quartet, and the opening prayer and the benediction were said by Rev. G. McLaren Brydon, Chaplain, Richmond Chapter. The colors were presented by a color guard from the Richmond Blues, in full-dress uniform, under Major B. H. Baylor, and the oath was repeated by all present. President E. D. Hotchkiss, of the Virginia Society, wired his approval and regrets at inability to attend.

During Constitution Week all school children were instructed concerning the Constitution. The American Legion and civic clubs held meetings featured by speeches on the Constitution. Short articles on different features of the Constitition were written by men of prominence and published in the daily papers in Richmond. Many ministers prayed for the Constitution in their Sunday services. Newspapers were generous in their publicity.

The committee of the Richmond Chapter on Observance of Constitution Day consisted of the following members: Edwin H. Courtney, chairman; M. E. Bristow, L. S. Evans, and Dr. Nelson Mercer.

It is believed that much good will result from the proper observance of Constitution Day by bringing all of its valuable features to the attention of the public and especially the younger generation.

Washington Society.— Seattle Chapter—Now that summer vacations are over the weekly meetings of the Seattle Chapter have been resumed. At the first meeting there were a goodly number present; the President appointed Compatriot William T. Beeks a committee of one to secure speakers for each weekly meeting. The President also appointed a committee, consisting of Compatriots Walter F. Meier and Henry J. Gorin, to arrange for the oratorical contests in the public schools, the two winners receiving a gold and silver medal. The subject of these contests will be of a patriotic nature.

The officers of Seattle Chapter are: President, Major Ira C. Brown; Vice-President, Col. Harry V. Wurdemann; Treasurer, Charles B. W. Raymond; Historian, John C. Gregory; Chaplain, Rev. Ambrose M. Bailey; Secretary, Clarence L. Gere.

Constitution Day was celebrated at the Capitol, in Olympia, by an address given in the auditorium of the high school, where upward of eight hundred people applauded a vigorous presentation of a speech entitled "The Constitution," by Compatriot Major Edwin S. Gill, Past President of Seattle Chapter. In Seattle several speeches were made upon the Constitution, under the auspices of Seattle Chapter, and in every school addresses were made.

The Membership Committee is very active, with prospects of a substantial increase within the next few months. Seattle Chapter has a membership consisting of more members than all the other chapters in the State combined.

With these plans there is anticipated a very interesting winter. In March it is planned to have the opera "Maryland" presented in Seattle by a professional

company from the East; in the presentation of this opera our early history is brought to light in a very pleasant and agreeable way.

Past President Compatriot William De Forrest Totten represented Washington State Society at the Sesquicentennial Celebration of the Siege of Fort Stanwix, at Rome, New York, on August 6.

The verses written by Judge Totten for the memorial edition of the Rome Daily Sentinel, and which appear in its issue of August 6, entitled "Fort Stanwix Gateway Stream," related to Fort Stanwix, where the American Flag was first unfurled in battle, and to the stream navigated for more than two hundred years prior to 1825, between the Fort and Oneida Lake, on the Mohawk-Oswego Trail. His poem deals with the stream at a time when, as he poetically phrases it,

"Not yet had Genius carved the plain,
Nor set his seal of progress where
From Erie to Atlantic's main
Steam could the fruits of commerce bear."

Gov. ISAAC INGALLS STEVENS CHAPTER, No. 6, Olympia, observed Constitution Day by an address from Compatriot E. S. Gill before the Society and the officers of the D. A. R. on Friday afternoon, September 16, in the High School Auditorium. There were present 900 high-school pupils.



(298) KIRKPATRICK.—Wanted: Ancestry, Revolutionary service, and personal history of Hugh Kirkpatrick, with name and ancestry of his wife. He was born (1734), perhaps, in Boston, Massachusetts, or arrived there in infancy with his parents, who came from Scotland. He had two sons, James Kirkpatrick and Hugh Kirkpatrick, who was born (1772) in Boston and when of age moved to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, where he married Ann Morrow, who was born (1775) in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, of Scotch parentage. They afterwards moved to Allegany County, Pennsylvania, and in 1816 to Harrison County, Ohio, where Hugh died June 30, 1845, and his wife August 8, 1835. They had ten children. The authentic history of this family prior to Hugh Kirkpatrick, Sr., is desired. (M. J. K. Q.)

(299) **RAINWATER.**—Wanted: Information relative to the origin of the Rainwater family, and particularly with regard to William Rainwater, who was a resident of Anderson County, South Carolina, about the close of the Revolution and who emigrated to Georgia about 1812, and thence to Mississippi. (H. S. B.)

(300) I. ANDRUS-ALDRICH.—Wanted: Parentage of Jonathan Andrus, born (1730) in Hartford County, Connecticut, and died (1810) in Tioga County, New York; also, of his wife, Elizabeth Aldrich, born (1732) in Hartford County, Connecticut; died in 1800 or 1810; married in 1752. Andrus was a Revolutionary soldier.

2. PARKER-HUSTED.—Wanted: Parentage of Jared Parker and his wife, Temperance Husted. Apparently, they were originally Connecticut people. Their eldest son, Calvin, was born (1791) in Oneida County, New York. Other children were: Bethany, married Langley, of Newark; Jared H., married Carney, of Onondaga; Olin; Clarissa, married W. Warner; Electa, married Truman E. Lyman; Mary, married Elisha Ford, of Syracuse; Richard and Jane. Were there Revolutionary soldiers in these families?

3. CHAPPEL.—Wanted: Parentage and Revolutionary ancestor of Ezra Chappel, born in 1787; died (1873) at Cambria Mills, Michigan; married in Oneida

County, New York, Huldah Roxana Carpenter, born in 1790; died (1871) at Cambria Mills, Michigan.

4. BLAISDELL-HUBBARD.—Wanted: Parentage of Ephraim Blaisdell and his wife, Mehitable Hubbard, of York County, Maine, whose daughter Mary (born in 1824) married Moses McCorison; also, any Revolutionary record.

5. McCORISON.—Wanted: Revolutionary record of Elder James McCorison, a Scotch minister, who settled (1765-1769) in Gorham, Maine.

6. ALLEN.—Wanted: Parentage and Revolutionary ancestors of Andress Benedict Allen, born (1818) in southwestern Connecticut; married (1850) Melissa Chappel, of North Fairfield, Ohio. (J. L. M.)

(301) **SEMMES (SIMS)-JARBOE.**—Wanted: Dates of birth and marriage of Verlinda (Semmes) Jarboe, of Maryland, daughter of Joseph and Catharine (Culver) Semmes (or Sims). (F. E. B.)

(302) I. **THOMPSON.**—Wanted: Dates of birth, marriage, death, name of wife, and Revolutionary service record of Robert Thompson, of Amherst County, Virginia, whose son David was born there in 1775 and became a notable scout in the later Indian wars, as shown by letters written in 1795 by Captain Alexander Gibson and Major William Clark, of Virginia, to Major-General Anthony Wayne, commending his services at the attack on Fort Recovery. David Thompson emigrated (in 1816) to Butler County, Ohio, and again (in 1824) to Henry County, Indiana.

2. **SWOPE.**—Wanted: Names and any information of parents of Mary Swope, who married David Thompson aforesaid. She had a brother, Michael Swope. Were they descendants of Michael Swope, Esq., whose letter to the Committee of Safety appears in *Pennsylvania Archives*, Second Series, Volume 1, page 445? (C. H. S.)

(303) **HENTON.**—Wanted: The genealogy of the Henton family of Pennsylvania, which, so far as is known, was founded by William Henton, who came to Philadelphia County before 1700 and settled in the same neighborhood with the Boones and Lincolns. Who were his children? Who was the father of the second William Henton (evidently a grandson of the first William), who in later life lived in Philadelphia? The original spelling of this name is Henton, but some of the descendants of William spelled it Hinton. (A. H. Y.)

(304) GLOVER.—Wanted: Dates of birth, marriage, and death of Amos (Amose) Glover, who served in the Revolutionary War (in 1780) as a drummer and fifer in Captain William Moore's Company of the Second Delaware Regiment, commanded by Col. Henry Neill. He moved to Centerville, Belmant County, Ohio, in the early part of the last century and later (about 1840) moved to Iowa with his daughter, Nancy Lucas. Also, information concerning his second wife, Nancy (neé Smith), by whom he had issue: Thomas, Crawford, David, James, Samuel, Sarah, Nancy. (A. E. B.)

(305) I. **BOONE.**—Wanted: Genealogical record of the Boone family, as my great-grandmother was Catharine Boone, a niece of Daniel Boone. She was born about the close of the Revolutionary War and married (in 1808) Conrad Iler, in Frederick County, Maryland. I am seeking the name of her father, who was a brother of Daniel Boone.

- 2. SERVIS .- Wanted: The record of the marriage of Philip Servis, a Revolutionary officer from Hunterdon County, New Jersey, where he was born and where he died. He married about the beginning of the Revolution.
- 3. BASSETT.-Wanted: Date and place of birth of Bassett (first name not known), who died (1849) in Ohio (place not known). He had children: Sarah (born 1803), married Mott; John (born 1805); William (born 1808); Abigail (born 1812), married Charles Servis.

- 6. DAVIS .- Wanted: Date of marriage of Ephraim Davis, of Wilkes County, North Carolina, who married Elizabeth Holman, daughter of Thomas Holman, Sr., aforesaid. (H. E.)
- (306) CLUM.-Wanted: Information relating to the name, ancestry, and descendants of the head of the Clum family in America, with names and Revolutionary records of members of this family. Correspondence is invited, by way of exchange of family data, by Franklin W. Clum, Orange, Texas. (F. W. C.)
- (307) ANDERSON-PATTILLO.—Wanted: (a) Ancestry (with all dates possible) of Mary Anderson, of Hanover, Virginia, who married (1755-1756) Rev. Henry Pattillo, who came (about 1740) to America from Dundee, Scotland. Pattillo was an eminent Presbyterian preacher in Virginia and North Carolina for fifty years, and died (1801) in Dinwiddie, Virginia. (b) Colonial and Revolutionary record of Mary Anderson's family. (c) Name, age, and whereabouts of children of Mary and Henry Pattillo. One daughter, Anne Pattillo (born 1757), married (1) Major Richard Earle Harrison, who served in the Revolution, reared a large family and died (1792) in Spartanburg District, South Carolina; and (2) Thomas Farrow, who had children, Henry Pattillo and Nancy. Anne Pattillo Harrison-Farrow is buried at the Farrows' old home, on the Enoree River, in the lower part of Spartanburg County, South Carolina. Another daughter married David Thompson, son of "Sir Charles Thompson and his wife, (Lady) Jean Douglass Thompson," who immigrated (1700) from Scotland to Cumberland County, Virginia. (C. M.)
- (308) I. DELPH.-Wanted: Ancestry, etc., of Rebecca Delph, who married (about 1775) Michael Carpenter, of Madison County, Virginia. Michael Carpenter was a first lieutenant in Captain William Lowther's company of Virginia
- 2. BARRICKMAN.-Wanted: Ancestry of John and Jacob Barrickman, soldiers of the Revolution in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania Militia. (W. C. B.)
- (309) KIBBE.-Wanted: Revolutionary War record of Jacob Kibbe, whose daughter Bethesda (by Sarah, his wife) was born (1740) in Connecticut, married Stephen Wood (Revolutionary soldier), and died (1825) at Monson, Massachu-

[Jacob Kibbe was doubtless too old for active military service in the Revolution. His name does not appear in the S. A. R. or D. A. R. indexes of ancestors. He may have served on a Revolutionary Committee. - EDITOR.]

(310) KEEN.-Wanted: Revolutionary service record of Nicholas Keen, who at one time resided in Rowan County, North Carolina, where his name appears

in the 1790 census. I believe that he was a son of James Keene, whose will was probated (1765) in Fairfax County, Virginia. This James Keene left an estate of 585 acres on Pohick Creek, same county, to five sons. Two of the sons were named Nicholas and John. My ancestor, Nicholas Keen, had two sons, Francis and John. (W. K.)

(311) McPIKE-MOUNTAIN .- Wanted: Reference to a record of marriage (about 1782) between James McPike and Martha Mountain, probably in western

Maryland; also, births of their children. (E. F. M.)

(312) JENCKES.-Wanted: Ancestry of Dr. John Jenckes, of Smithfield, Rhode Island; also, name and ancestry of his wife. He was born in the early part of the eighteenth century, probably at Providence or Smithfield; had a daughter, Sarah, who married (1760) Ichabod Comstock, and a daughter, Caroline, who married (1772) Jason Angell. Was he identical with the John Jenckes (born 1710), son of William and Patience (Sprague) Jenckes? (A. S.)

(313) I. ROSE.—Wanted: Reference to record, acceptable to S. A. R., of military service of Andrew Rose, Jr., who was great-grandfather of President McKinley and is mentioned in "Life of William McKinley," by P. T. Collier and Son (1901), as follows: "Soldier in the Revolutionary War; after the battle of Monmouth sent back to his iron foundry to make cannon and other ordnance supplies for the Army; after the war moved from Bucks County, Pennsylvania, to Chester County." (Correspondence with relatives invited by P. W. Bruce, 1135 Grand Avenue, Topeka, Kansas.)

2. GRANT.-Wanted: To ascertain which one of General U. S. Grant's uncles was the father of Eliza Grant, who married Samuel Gossett, whose daughter Eveline married Ambrose Eaves. (Relatives please write P. W. Bruce, 1135

Grand Avenue, Topeka, Kansas.)

3. GOUCHER .- Wanted: Revolutionary War record of my great2-grandfather, Henry Goucher, of Greenville, Pennsylvania, who made powder for the army and was given bounty land near Hilltown, Ohio, the farm remaining in the family until recently. He married Rhoda Rose, the sister of Mary (Rose) McKinley, grandmother of President McKinley. (Relatives please address as above.)

4. BRUCE.—Wanted: Data as to Revolutionary record of James Bruce, who, with his brothers William, Henry, and Thomas (all from Scotland), served in the American Army. James Bruce enlisted in the Yadkin River Valley of North Carolina, married Lucy Gaines, moved, in 1800, to the vicinity of Chapel Hill, near Nashville, Tennessee, and died March 8, 1822. His brother William had a son who died in Shelby County, Illinois. (Correspondence invited by P. W. Bruce, 1135 Grand Avenue, Topeka, Kansas.) (P. W. B.)

(314) I. BAKER.-Wanted: Ancestry, etc., of Mary Baker, daughter of Thomas and Azubah (Rice) Baker, who married George Earle, of Leicester, Massachusetts, on April 26, 1757; also, of her mother, Azubah Rice.

2. YOUNG.-Wanted: Ancestry, etc., of Elizabeth Young, daughter of John and Elizabeth Young, who married Frederick Earle, of Leicester, Massachusetts,

July 6, 1701.

3. BARKER.—Wanted: Ancestry of Elizabeth Barker, daughter of Joshua and Aurelia Barker, who married Halford Earle, of New Bedford, Massachusetts, June 14, 1842. Who has a copy of "The Barker Pedigree," by Rev. William Gibbs Barker, of Stoneleigh, England, printed in 1877? Am told she is descended from the Barker who came to Plymouth about 1628.

Becket, Massachusetts, town records show that John Davis, of "No. 4" (an early name for Becket), and Jean Brown, of Blanford, were married February 23, 1758. Were these the parents of Esther Davis? John Davis had Revolutionary service from Becket.

2. AUSTIN-HIGLEY.—Wanted: Lineage (with Revolutionary ancestry) of Hannah · Austin (1799-1888), who married (1819) Jerry Higley (1794-1875).

She lived in Vermont, but probably was not born there.

3. SHERMAN-HIGLEY.—Wanted: Lineage (with Revolutionary ancestry) of Betsey Jane Sherman, who married (1857), in Vermont, Carlos Higley (1838-1882). (W. W. N.)

(252) **CUNNINGHAM.**—My Revolutionary ancestor was William Cunningham, who served on the brig *Liberty*, commanded by his first cousin, Captain James Barron. This William Cunningham gives a list of children in his will, and one of them was named *Robert*, born about 1788. I have the record of the first Cunningham who came to Virginia and also the ancestry of the aforementioned William Cunningham. (A. C. B.)

(253) 2. VAN DEVENTER.—The inquirer may, perhaps, obtain information through Mr. Anthony Dibrell, Leesburg, Loudoun County, Virginia. (A. C. B.)

(256) 2. **DAVISSON.**—Obadiah Davisson was undoubtedly the son of Josiah Davisson, who lived (about 1740-1760) in New Jersey and who was descended from the Massachusetts family of Davisons. Josiah changed the spelling of the name. Mr. A. H. Davison, 1272 East 9th Street, Des Moines, Iowa, is an authority on Davison family history. (D. S. H.)

(256) 8. **MENDENHALL** et al.—Mr. R. Cadwallader, of San Francisco, California, has data concerning the Mendenhalls, who are collaterals to his Cadwallader line. The Collins line married into the Cadwallader in Ohio. Dr. Clifford U. Collins, of Peoria, Illinois, may throw some light on this line, (R. C.)

(292) I. HARALSON.—Herndon Haralson, in his MS. autobiography, written in 1842, states that his grandfather, Peter Haralson, immigrated from Holland to North America in the year 1715 and landed in Virginia. He married shortly after-

wards, in Hanover County, a Miss Chambers, by whom he had four sons and one daughter. About the year 1750 these four sons, after their father's death, removed and settled on the Hyco, a small tributary of the Dan, in Orange County, North Carolina. Paul, who was the third son of Peter Haralson, married (1754) Nancy Sea, the daughter of James Sea, then of Orange County and of the ancient family of Seas now (1842) living in Caswell County, in North Carolina, by whom he had eight sons and five daughters. Paul and Nancy (Sea) Haralson were the parents of Herndon Haralson (born October 12, 1757; died May 27, 1847). Herndon Haralson married Mary Murphey, in Caswell County, on October 4, 1791, by whom he had eight sons and three daughters, namely, Archibald (born July 5, 1792), Jonathan (born February 12, 1794), Herndon (born January 20, 1796; married Ann Hollingshead), Paul Anderson (born June 22, 1798; married, in 1824, Leanna Graves), Green Lee (born July 27, 1800), Bettie Murphey (born August 15, 1802; married, in 1822, Robert Hughes), William Henry (born September 2, 1805, and died in 1856, married in 1840, Elizabeth McCullough), James Madison (born April 3, 1807), Jane Ann (born November 6, 1809; married, in 1828, Thomas W. Pritchard), Mary Herndon (born July 7, 1813; married, in 1829, James S. Steele), John Haywood (born June 24, 1817). (G. S. L.)

(292) 2-7. MURPHEY.—Write to the Historical Commission of North Carolina at Raleigh, North Carolina, and request a copy of "Letters and Papers of Archibald D. Murphey" (2 volumes), by Hoyt. The Historical Commission will send these books free of cost by express (charges collect). Archibald Murphey Aiken, Esq., Danville, Virginia, has accurate information which will answer almost all the questions of the inquirer. John Greene Murphey died in Rutherford County, Tennessee, as shown by the county court records. He married there, for the second time, as the marriage records will show. He inherited lands in said county from his father by will, proving that he was the John Greene Murphey who was a son of Archibald Murphey and a brother of Archibald D. Murphey.

(c) Francis Thornton (d. 1794-5), who built Fall Hill, married (1758) Anne Thompson (1744-1815). He was a member of the "Committee for Stafford County, Virginia," during the Revolution ("American Archives," 4th Series, Vol. I, pp. 617, 618). His son, Francis Thornton, of Fall Hill, was born at "the Falls" on June 11, 1767, and married (1792) Sarah Innes (b. 1776). Their daughter, Sally Innes Thornton, born January 11, 1799, married Murray Forbes, at Fall Hill, on June 22, 1815, and died in Fredericksburg, Virginia, in 1885, having reared ten children, of whom Delia Smith Forbes married Alfred Augustine Thornton, through whom Francis Alexander Thornton may be descended.-(J. M. B.) (d) If the inquirer will communicate with Mrs. R. C. Ellis, (née Thornton), 1221 Grand Avenue, Dayton, Ohio, he may possibly obtain considerable information.—Editor.

"Washington," by Joseph Dillaway Sawyer, is not only the latest biography, but also "the last word" in the biographical histories of the most famous personage in the annals of our country. "No man did more for the advancement of liberty's cause, yet among the recorded names of American heroes how seldom do we find his name! Few men of Maryland's struggling days did so much toward furnishing material for the history of Maryland, yet how has history forgotten him!" We felicitate Mr. Delaplaine on his "Life of Thomas Johnson," which he has brought out in a limited edition bearing the author's autograph. On sale at \$7 per copy.

Genealogists and descendants of "The Welsh and Hyatt Families of Maryland and their Kin" will be pleased to learn that Dr. Luther W. Welsh, A. M., M. D., 224 Bryant Building, Kansas City, Missouri, after investigations covering a period of forty years, has in preparation for publication the genealogical history of the Welshes and Hyatts, which will also include the allied families of Howard, Worthington, Hammond, Maccubbin, Griffith, Greenberry, Baldwin, Dorsey, Van Sweringen, Warfield, Gaither, and Duvall. This work is intended to be a "refer-

ence genealogy" containing officials proofs of "services" and lines of descent, according to the prospectus, and hence it will be valuable in the preparation of membership papers for patriotic societies. It is in the nature of a "labor of love" on the part of the author, and therefore the edition will be limited practically to the number of prepublication subscriptions obtained and will not be issued unless warranted by a sufficient number of such subscriptions.
