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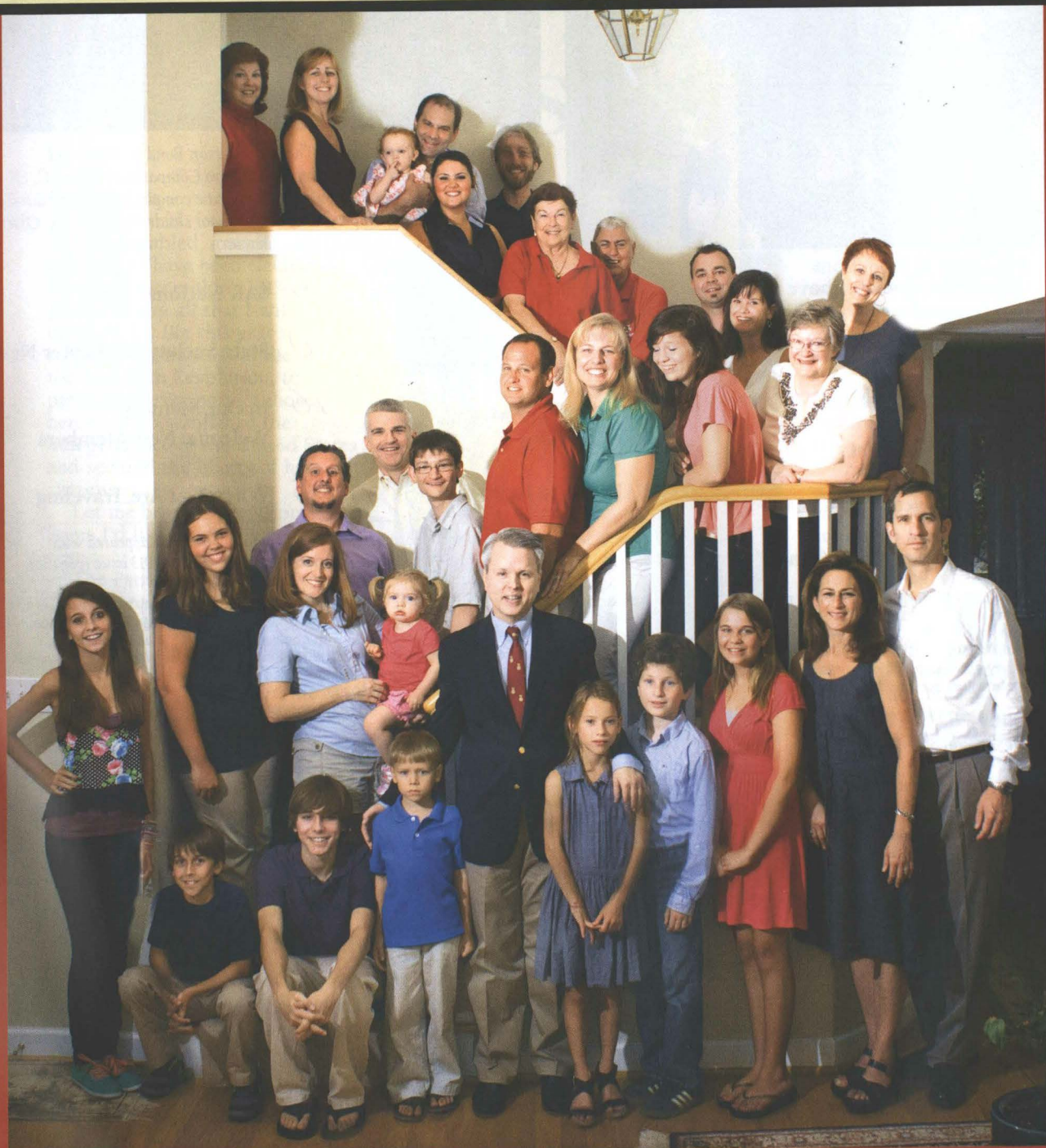

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The President General's Message



Fulfilling the Mission

Compatriots,

I am humbled, grateful and honored to have been elected as President General for 2013-14. I pledge to you all that I will dedicate my life this year to fulfilling the mission of the Sons of the American Revolution, to preserve the memory of those heroes who established the independence of the United States and secured the liberty of her citizens.

Let me briefly review some items I'd like us all to work on this year.

The Patriotic Education Committee has been renamed and refocused. It is now the Education Committee. Its primary purpose is to disseminate information about the education programs in the various state societies and what the state societies are doing to reach elementary, middle and high schools. Larry Stevens of the Texas Society chairs this committee.

The Young Members Committee has been re-established. Some young members have informed me there is a need for such a committee. Mike Elston of the Virginia Society chairs this committee.

At the recommendation of Col. Chuck Sweeney of the Florida Society, a Vietnam War Veterans Corps has been established as part of the Veterans Recognition Committee. This Corps is similar to the one previously established for World War II and Korean War veterans and will be chaired by Col. Sweeney.

Finally, I am adding the USO to the list of organizations with

which the Patriotic Outreach Committee is charged to foster cooperative arrangements, along with the American

Legion, Wreaths Across America and Blue Star Salute. I'm establishing a special task force to encourage this partnership with the USO. Dan McMurray of the Missouri Society chairs this task force.

I have devised five President General Initiatives for 2013-14. Hard copies of these were distributed at the Installation Banquet. These also have been posted on the SAR website and are printed in this edition of the *SAR Magazine*, beginning on page 14.

I understand that five President General Initiatives may seem like a lot. It is not my intention to overwhelm you, but to give you meaningful choices. I do not expect every state society, chapter and individual compatriot to pursue all five of these initiatives. But I hope—I ask you all—to pursue as many of them as you can in the furtherance of the goals and objectives of the Sons of the American Revolution, and in honor of our patriot ancestors.

May the Lord bless you all. May He bless the SAR. And may He bless the United States of America.

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Kansas City Hosts Smooth Congress

The 123rd Congress, hosted by the Missouri Society, drew 448 Compatriots and guests to Kansas City. From July 7 to 10, the delegation soaked up the Midwestern lifestyle, which includes far more than the city's renowned barbecue.

Sunday's Memorial Service, pictured here, honored the 580 compatriots who died in 2012. It was held in the historic Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral, which hosted an NSSAR celebration of George Washington's birthday in 1895. "Welcome back," said The Very Rev. Peter DeVeau.

With the exception of the Welcome Reception, which was held at the spectacular National World War I Museum, all meetings and banquets were held at the Kansas City Marriott Downtown. Business sessions at the Sunday evening Joseph S. Rumbaugh Orations were held in the Count Basie Ballroom.

Among the outside tours were trips to the Steamboat Arabia Museum, an art tour and a trip to nearby Independence, Mo. Many compatriots added a day onto their trip to visit historic Fort Leavenworth as well.

Under the direction of Peter O. Grassl of Kansas, the national chairman of the Congress Planning Committee, and Richard T. Bryant and Russell K. DeVenney of the Missouri Society, the Congress chairman and vice chairman, the Congress ran as smooth as the jazz for which the city is known.



Highlights of the opening business session included a spirited welcome from Kansas City Mayor Sly James, the announcement of a major gift from Dr. Estelle H. Rosenblum, and greetings from the DAR, C.A.R. and the American Legion.

Rosenblum, joined by members of her family, presented a \$125,000 bequest by her late husband, James E. Hesse, a NMSSAR Compatriot, genealogist and color guard member. The front mezzanine level of the SAR Genealogical Research Library will be named in Hesse's memory.

Greetings were delivered by President General Lynn F. Young, a 36-year DAR member who has served DAR in many national, state and local roles. This includes serving from 2006-09 as State Regent of Texas, the largest DAR State Society with more than 17,000 members and 195 chapters. Young is the first Texan in the DAR's 123-year history to be elected to the top post.

NEW OFFICERS ELECTED

In the only contested election of the Congress, Librarian General Michael Wells was re-elected. Elected by acclamation were President General Joseph W. Dooley (Va.), Secretary General Lindsey C. Brock (Fla.), Treasurer General Judge Thomas E. Lawrence (Texas), Chancellor General John Dodd (Calif.), Genealogist General Larry P. Cornwell (Ala.), Registrar General J. Michael Tomme Sr. (Ga.), Historian General Col. Robert Forrest Towns (Ga.), Surgeon General Dr. Abraham Ruddell Byrd III (Ariz.) and Chaplain General Rt. Rev. Louis V. Carlson Jr. (Calif.).

Later, PG Dooley announced his appointments to the Executive Committee as outlined in the NSSAR bylaws: President General Stephen A. Leishman (2012-13), Timothy Edward Ward (OHSSAR), John T. Manning (MASSAR) and Mark S. Brennan Sr. (VASSAR).

BUSINESS SESSIONS CONDUCTED

Following the posting of colors by the combined SAR Color Guard and an invocation by Chaplain General Rev. Dr. Randy D. Moody, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited and greetings presented.

The seven Presidents General in attendance presented comments, led by Larry D. McClanahan (2001-02), who discussed the construction of The Center for Advancing America's Heritage on Main Street in Louisville and introduced a sneak peek by Solid Light, a comprehensive museum and exhibit design firm, showing how the 7,000-square-foot museum exhibit space may appear.

Other PGs in attendance included Roland G. Downing (2005-06), Nathan E. White Jr. (2006-07), Bruce A. Wilcox (2007-08), David N. Appleby (2008-09), Edward F. Butler Sr. (2009-10), and J. David Sympson (2010-11).

During Wednesday's business session, revisions were made to Bylaw 23 to bring it into compliance with state and federal laws in regards to SAR's investment policy, which will be discussed further at the Fall Leadership Meeting.

A presentation by Bennett Greenspan of FamilyTreeDNA, a commercial firm offering genetic genealogy, proved popular with attendees.

Six Honored as Minutemen

Established in 1951, the Minuteman Award is the NSSAR's most prestigious award. Only those compatriots who have made distinguished and exceptional contributions of service on the national level may be recognized. The recipient may receive the award only once.

The Minuteman Award was first made at the 1952 National Congress, with former President General Benjamin H. Powell of Texas the first honoree. The award is given to a maximum of six recipients each year. A total of 376 compatriots to date have been recognized.

To receive this prestigious award, the compatriot must attend the National Congress. A compatriot Minuteman who has received this award previously escorts each new inductee.

The senior Minutemen in Kansas City, both members of the Class of 1987, were Timothy Bennett of the D.C. Society and Robert Eugene Burt of the Kansas Society.

Compatriot Patten has served the National Society as a national trustee and alternate trustee for the Pennsylvania Society, as a member of the Executive Committee and as chairman of the capital campaign for the SAR Foundation Board of Directors. Patten was the first-line signer for 13 new compatriots. He has served faithfully for many years on national

Compatriot Pittard has served the National Society as a Vice President General of the South Atlantic District, and a national trustee and alternate trustee for the NCSSAR. Pittard was the first-line signer for 14 new compatriots. He has assisted in the creation of four chapters—Halifax Resolves, General George Washington, Albemarle and Lumber River chapters. He has served faithfully for many years on national committees, most notably as a member of the Newsletters and Periodicals Committee for eight years, five of those years as chairman; the Historic Sites and Celebrations and the Membership

Pocket-sized Booklets Available

Many SAR members have pocket-sized booklets containing the texts of the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution. These booklets are published by a number of organizations, including the U.S. Government Printing Office, Center for Civic Education, Cato Institute, Heritage Foundation and others.

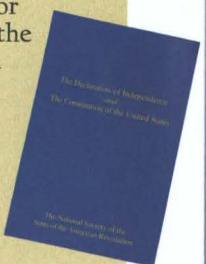
Now, add the SAR to the list of publishers. President General Joseph W. Dooley has had 2,000 copies printed of an SAR booklet of the Declaration and the Constitution. He

gave a copy to everyone who was at the Installation Banquet, and he is making 25 copies available for free to every state society. Beyond these first 25 copies, state societies and members can purchase these booklets for only \$1 each from NSSAR Merchandise. These 2,000 copies are only the first run—more will be printed as needed.

Dooley believes every SAR member should carry a booklet at all times. More importantly, he asks chapters and state societies to distribute them to elementary and high school students. SAR chapters and state

societies also are encouraged to give this booklet to guests at chapter and state meetings, contestants in essay or oration contests, JROTC or ROTC cadets sponsored by the chapter or state society, and Eagle Scouts sponsored by the chapter or state society.

There will be other opportunities for SAR compatriots, chapters and state societies to distribute copies of the Declaration and the Constitution—now in a booklet with our name on it.

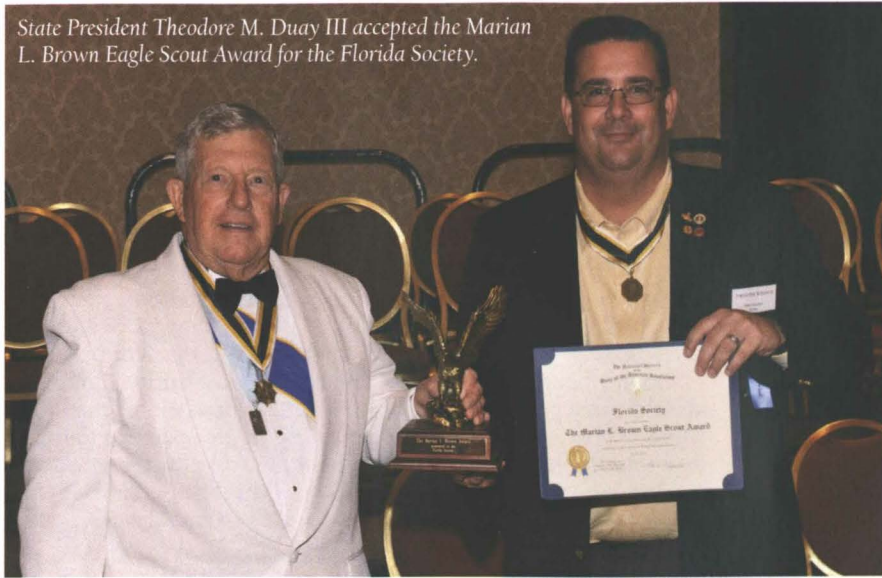

THE ROBERT E. BURT BOY SCOUT VOLUNTEER AWARD—To the compatriots who act as role models and provide outstanding dedicated service to the young men in the Boy Scouts of America. Winners: Derek J. Brown, California; Robert G. Hess, Louisiana; James M. Mize, Colorado; Kirk D. Rush, Kansas; Donald L. Webb Jr., California.

THE WILLIAM M. MELONE AWARD—To the state society that has the largest number of new and approved supplemental memberships. Winner: Texas Society with 136; second place: Virginia with 128.

THE MATTHEW SELLERS III AWARD—To the Vice President General who makes the best percentage over quota, based on last year's membership results. Winner: Joe E. Harris Jr. of the Intermountain District with 28 percent; second place: Gene P. Butler of the Western District with 19 percent.

THE RICHARD H. THOMPSON JR. AWARD—To the state society that at year's end has the smallest number of members dropped from the rolls for nonpayment of dues. Winners: Canada, Hawaii, France, Mexico and Spain, each with zero drops.

THE KENTUCKY CUP—To the membership chairman of the state society that enrolled the largest percentage of new members. Winner: Utah Society with 58 percent; second place, Vermont Society with 30 percent.

THE EUGENE C. McGUIRE AWARD—To the state society enrolling the largest number of sons, grandsons and nephews of SARs and DARs. Winner: California Society with 146; second place, Virginia Society with 139.

THE DAR/SAR MEMBERSHIP AWARD—To the DAR state society with the highest percentage of recruiting SAR members (cash award). Winner: Wyoming Society with 100 percent; second place, Oklahoma Society with 87 percent; third place, Montana Society with 82 percent.

THE ARTHUR J. TREMBLE AWARD - 1776 TROPHY—To the state society that reinstated the largest number of dropped and resigned members. Winner: Texas Society with 135; second place, Georgia Society with 83.

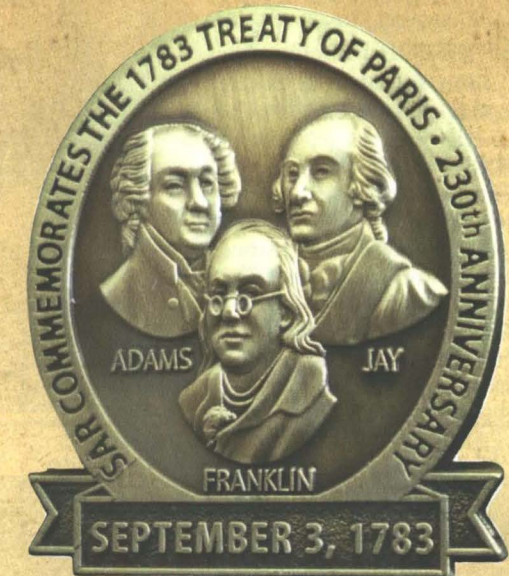

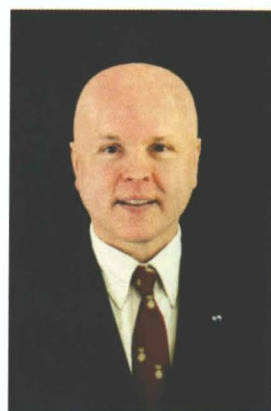

II.A. PARTNERING WITH THE MOUNT VERNON LADIES' ASSOCIATION GEORGE WASHINGTON PORTRAIT PROGRAM (OPPORTUNITY FOR STATE SOCIETIES AND CHAPTERS)

Currently, the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association (MVLA) offers a beautifully framed replica of Rembrandt Peale's Porthole Portrait of George Washington. Although the MVLA makes this portrait available for free to elementary, middle and high schools, Mount Vernon also is asking for contributions to defray its costs associated with this program. A donor contribution form on the MVLA's website allows donors to contribute a minimum of \$275 to underwrite the

cost of one of these portraits of George Washington. Mount Vernon has graciously discounted the minimum donation to \$250 for SAR state societies and chapters that participate in this President General Initiative.

From July 11, 2013 through July 15, 2014, every state society or chapter that coordinates with an elementary school, a middle school or a high school to have one of these beautiful portraits of George Washington hung in the school, as part of the MVLA's George Washington Portrait Program will be awarded an NSSAR streamer. If a state society or chapter arranges to have a portrait hung in more than one school, it will be awarded a star to be affixed to the streamer for every school beyond the first.

For each portrait given to a school by Mount Vernon, an SAR state society or chapter must: Coordinate with the principal of the school; and remit a contribution of \$250 by or in the state

society or chapter's name to the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association, designating the school for which the contribution is made, and referring to the MVLA's George Washington Portrait Program:

Schools must:

Send a letter to the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association, signed by the principal and on school letterhead, requesting the George Washington portrait and referring to the contribution from the SAR state society or chapter; and agree to hang the George Washington portrait in a very public, visible place of honor in the school, such as the main lobby or hallway, central office, library or auditorium.

(If possible, try to send the state society or chapter's donation to Mount Vernon in the same envelope as the school's letter requesting the George Washington portrait.)

Accompanying each portrait is a George Washington Celebration Kit with suggested activities to commemorate the portrait's dedication, as well as suggested lesson plans for classroom use.

NSSAR Director of Education Colleen Wilson is the SAR point of contact on this PG Initiative. Please send Colleen a copy of the school's letter requesting the George Washington portrait and any other correspondence with Mount Vernon about this project. Colleen will keep track of which SAR state societies and chapters donate to Mount Vernon to facilitate a school's acquisition of the George Washington portrait. 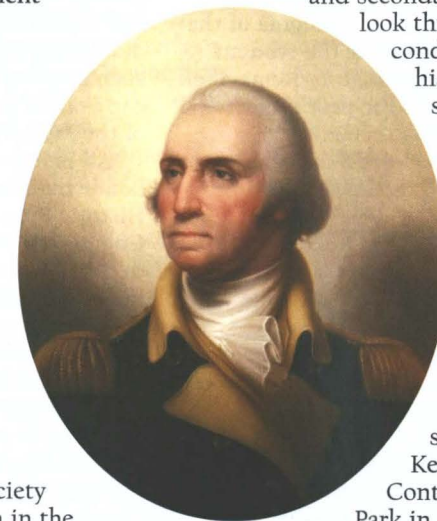

If state societies or chapters account for their participation in this President General Initiative here, they cannot also count it in Tab 7, Section E;

Tab 7, Section E, which is for the presentation of framed copies of our founding documents. This has been amended to include "framed portrait of George Washington." If state societies or chapters account for their participation in this President General Initiative here, they cannot also count it in Tab 3, Section B;

Tab 16, Section A has been amended to include a donation to the MVLA, along with the other SAR Funds previously listed.

II.B. PARTNERING WITH THE MOUNT VERNON LADIES' ASSOCIATION PROMOTING HISTORY DAY PROJECTS ON GEORGE WASHINGTON (OPPORTUNITY FOR STATE SOCIETIES AND CHAPTERS)

We all know what a school science project is, and probably most of us prepared one while we were in junior high. But did you know that these days, many students prepare history projects and are participating in the history equivalent of a science fair? The Mount Vernon Ladies' Association encourages these history projects, and I would like the SAR to encourage them, too.



For those who are not familiar with National History Day, it is a program to foster the study of history by junior high and high school students. Students choose a historical topic related to an annual theme, and then conduct primary and secondary research. Students are encouraged to look through libraries, archives and museums, conduct oral history interviews, and visit historic sites as part of their research. After a student has analyzed and interpreted his sources and has drawn a conclusion about the significance of his topic, he is then able to present his work as a paper, an exhibit, a performance, a documentary or a website.

In the spring, students may enter their history projects into local National History Day contests, where they will be judged by professional educators and historians. The best local history projects move on to state contests. The winners of state contests are eligible to attend the Kenneth E. Behring National History Day Contest at the University of Maryland at College Park in June. This is where the best National History Day projects from across the United States compete. For more information about National History Day, please go to <http://nationalhistoryday.org>.

This year, the MVLA is offering an incentive for students to conduct History Day projects that examine George Washington. The SAR is going to help Mount Vernon with this effort.

The NHD theme for 2014 is Rights & Responsibilities in History. The MVLA will award \$1,000 to the best project on George Washington within this theme.

What can the SAR do?

First, SAR state societies and chapters should contact the National History Day organization to find out about local History Day competitions. Then, offer to help the local managers. SAR members may serve as judges in local History Day competitions. SAR state societies and chapters are encouraged to offer their own incentives and awards to students who participate in History Day competitions. In the past, some state societies and chapters have presented Outstanding Citizenship pins, Bronze Good Citizenship Medals or cash awards to these students. Please consider these or other incentives for these young students of history, and please become involved in local NHD competitions.

Secondly, take note of the students whose projects are related to George Washington. Please be aware that the History Day projects related to George Washington may not win the local or state competition. That doesn't matter: the MVLA and the SAR want to encourage the study of George Washington, even if other history projects win in local, state and national History Day competitions.

For any student whose project examines some aspect of George Washington, write a letter to:

In your letter to her, please:

Identify yourself and the SAR state society or chapter on whose behalf you are writing. Please provide your address, or an address for the SAR state society or chapter; identify the student whose NHD project examines George Washington, along with the name and address of his/her school; briefly describe the student's project (50 words or less); and identify the local NHD competition, when and where it took place, and whether the student's project on

George Washington won at the local NHD competition.

In response, the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association will send the student a special Certificate of Achievement, with the insignia of the MVLA and the NSSAR, commending the student for his/her study of George Washington. Remember: the MVLA will award \$1,000 to the best project on George Washington within this theme.

SAR state societies and chapters that complete the steps described above will be awarded an NSSAR streamer.

III. MEMORIALS, MARKERS & MONUMENTS (OPPORTUNITY FOR STATE SOCIETIES AND CHAPTERS)

"Johnny Appleseed" is a pseudonym for John Chapman (1774-1845), who is credited with having introduced apple trees to large parts of the Northwest Territory.

The SAR should be the Johnny Appleseed of the American Revolution. We should drop seeds every place we go—seeds that honor the heroes and events of the American Revolution. Memorials, markers and monuments are some of the seeds that SAR state societies and chapters can plant all over the country.

From July 11, 2013 through July 15, 2014, every state society and chapter that erects a permanent memorial, a marker or a monument to honor a person, place, event or document associated with the American Revolution will be awarded an NSSAR streamer.

If multiple state societies and/or chapters collaborate on the erection of a single memorial, marker or monument, each state society and/or chapter that collaborated shall be awarded a streamer.

A memorial, marker or monument may be as simple as a Revolutionary War Patriot Grave Marker, such as those available through the SAR Store, or a plaque such as those placed at Presidios by the California and Arizona societies, or a statue or other monument such as the bust of George Washington placed on the grounds of the Louisiana State Capitol by the Louisiana Society.

The memorial, marker or monument must be permanent, that is, it must be cast metal or carved stone. It must have clearly cast or engraved on it "SAR" or the words "Sons of the American Revolution." It may also name the state society(ies) and/or chapter(s) that placed it or erected it. The memorial, marker or monument must clearly honor a person or persons, a place, an event or document associated with the American Revolution.

The sponsoring state society(ies) and/or chapter(s) should submit the following to the

Historic Sites, Celebrations and Re-enactments Committee:

A 5x7 or 8x10 photograph of the memorial, marker or monument; a statement of no more than 500 words explaining why this memorial, marker or monument is significant; and any ancillary material such as press releases, newspaper accounts or a copy of the program for the dedication or unveiling of the memorial, marker or monument.

All memorials, markers or monuments that honor the American Revolution are important. The Historic Sites, Celebrations and Re-enactments Committee will have the challenging task of determining which of the memorials, markers or monuments submitted to it are the best. The sponsoring state society(ies) and/or chapter(s) of the single best memorial, marker or monument, as determined by the Historic Sites, Celebrations and Re-enactments Committee, will be awarded a \$1,000 cash prize at the 2014 NSSAR Congress. The sponsoring state society(ies) and/or chapter(s) of the second best will be awarded a \$500 cash prize; third place will receive a \$300 cash prize.

Let me repeat: all memorials, markers or monuments that honor the American Revolution are important. Determining which is the best among these important memorials will not be easy.

I would like to have all of these new memorials, markers or monuments displayed at Leadership Conferences and Congresses, so compatriots from all over the country can see them.

So, sponsoring state society(ies) and/or chapter(s) are asked to bring the following to the 2013 Fall Leadership Conference, the 2014 Spring Leadership Conference and the 2014 NSSAR Congress:

A 5x7 or 8x10 photograph of the memorial, marker or monument (the same photograph submitted to the Revolutionary War Graves Committee); and a brief description of the memorial, marker or monument on a 3x5 index card or piece of paper.

Mark Anthony, chairman of the Historic Sites, Celebrations and Re-enactments Committee, is the SAR point of contact on this PG Initiative. If you have any questions about this PG Initiative, please contact Mark at mcgt90@bellsouth.net. Mark will keep track of the SAR state societies and chapters that have erected a permanent memorial, marker or monument. Please send the documentation requested above to Mark.

For the purposes of the Americanism Contest, a state society or chapter's participation in this President General Initiative may be recorded on the Americanism Score Sheet in either Tab 10 (if a historic marker) or Tab 11 (if a grave marker).

IV. HELPING THE USO HELP AMERICA'S MILITARY (OPPORTUNITY FOR STATE SOCIETIES AND CHAPTERS)

In 2010, President General Ed Butler (2009-10) presented the Distinguished Patriotic Leadership Award to Sloan Gibson, president of the United Service Organizations—the USO. For all the USO does to help our men and women in the military and their families, this was a well-deserved award. But I believe the SAR can and should do more.

From July 11, 2013 through July 15, 2014, every state society or chapter that donates \$250 to the USO, or the equivalent value in goods or time, will be awarded an NSSAR streamer. If a state society

or chapter donates more than \$250, for every increment of \$250 beyond the initial \$250—in cash or the equivalent value in goods or time—the state society or chapter shall be awarded a star to be affixed to the streamer.

Go to www.uso.org to learn the locations of USO Centers in your town or state. Contact the nearest USO Center, and tell them you want to donate cash or goods or volunteer your time. If you need help finding or connecting with the nearest USO Center, please contact Lisa Ferrari at USO headquarters. Her number is listed below.

In the name of your state society or chapter, donate \$250 in cash, \$250 worth of goods, \$250 worth of your time, or a combination of these totaling \$250.

If your state society or chapter makes a cash donation, you may designate it to be allocated to your local USO Center, or toward one or more of several USO programs, specifically:

★ **Operation Phone Home.** At USO centers in combat zones, the USO provides a private network for troops to make free calls to home, and have access to computers with high-speed Internet connections. A \$100 donation will allow 280 soldiers to call home using the USO satellite network.

★ **Warrior & Family Care.** The USO has established a first-class network of support for our wounded, ill and injured troops, their families and caregivers, as well as the families of the fallen. The USO Warrior & Family Care program supports the continuum of care that gives these men and women the best chance to heal with honor.

★ **United Through Reading.** This program allows a parent deployed overseas to read aloud a story to his or her child. This special story time is recorded, and a DVD is mailed home. A \$500 donation will help 55 deployed parents read a bedtime story to their children.

★ **Mobile Entertainment Gaming Systems** is a portable, self-contained and highly durable multimedia platform created to give our troops endless hours of fun and relaxation. Each MEGS supports Xbox 360, Sony PlayStation 3 and the Nintendo Wii.

★ **Operation USO Care Packages.** Since 2003, the USO has distributed more than 2.3 million packages to troops around the world, giving them the comforts of home and sending a strong message of support from the citizens they serve. An amount of \$1,500 will provide 100 USO Care Packages.

★ **USO2GO.** The program is designed to send much-needed electronic gaming, sports/musical equipment and personal care items to troops in remote locations.

★ **USO Center Operations.** The USO provides services, programs and entertainment at more than 160 USO Centers in the U.S. and around the world. In 2011, USO Centers were visited more than 8 million times by troops and their families.

★ **Entertainment.** The USO is probably best known for entertainment tours that bring celebrities and performers who graciously donate their time and talents to visit our troops and families wherever they serve.

Most local USO Centers do not have banking capability, so cash donations must be sent to USO headquarters. Please be sure in your correspondence to USO headquarters to make clear for which USO program or local USO Center your donation is intended. A special donation form has been posted on the SAR website. Please use this form for cash donations.

If compatriots in your state society or chapter wish to donate goods, check with the local USO Center first and ask what they need. Be sure to retain documentation of the dollar value of your donations of goods. If you donate a case of bottled water, for example, save the receipt. If you

donate a used book or other household items, check with the local USO Center to determine the dollar value of such donations. If you have any questions about the dollar value of the goods or items you would like to donate to the USO, please contact Lisa Ferrari at USO headquarters.

If compatriots in your state society or chapter wish to donate time, ask about volunteer opportunities at the local USO Center. Be sure to keep track of the hours you volunteer at the local USO Center. For purposes of this President General Initiative, for every hour of your time volunteered for the USO, your state society or chapter will be credited with a \$10 donation. USO Point of Contact:

V. RETENTION CHALLENGE (OPPORTUNITY FOR STATE SOCIETIES)

Every state society that begins calendar year 2014 with at least 95 percent of its membership—as that membership is determined to be as of Dec. 31, 2013—will be awarded an NSSAR streamer.

The Registrar General and the staff registrar will determine the membership of each state society as of Dec. 31, 2013, and shall then compare that number to the membership of the respective state society as of Jan. 31, 2014, giving state societies time to submit their annual reports. A streamer will be awarded based on the determination of the Registrar General that a given state society has retained at least 95 percent of its membership.

Each state society may, at its own discretion, implement such programs as it shall deem to be most appropriate and effective, to incentivize its chapters to retain at least 95 percent of its membership.

The 110th President General

Lifelong interest in history, genealogy leads Joe Dooley to post

Joseph W. Dooley was sworn in as the 110th President General of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution on July 10, 2013 at the 123rd NSSAR Congress in Kansas City.

He is descended from at least three patriot ancestors: Morris Earle (1757-1833), Guiliam Bertholf (1730-ca. 1785) and Johannes Carson (1752-aft. 1820). Earle served as a private, and later a corporal, in the New Jersey Continental Line. Guiliam Bertholf, also from New Jersey, was a supporter of the patriot cause, and was arrested and held by the British. Carson served as a private, and then a sergeant, in the militia from Ulster County, New York. Joe suspects another one of his ancestors may have been among the patriots who were killed in the Grahamsville Massacre in New York. The search for additional patriot ancestors continues.

Joe is a senior rate analyst and technical writer at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. He also worked for the Department of Defense, both at the Defense Fuel Supply Center and in the Office of the Secretary. Prior to working for the federal

government, Joe held jobs in property management, church administration and film production. In the film industry, he produced and acted in a few feature and industrial films, and worked with such notable actors as Tom Hanks, Dabney Coleman and Adam West.

Joe graduated with distinction from George Mason University, majoring in history and English. He pursued graduate studies in English at the University of Virginia. In addition to his technical writing, Joe has published small works of fiction, as well as pieces of literary criticism. Among his published genealogical works are *The Descendants of William Joseph Dooley* and *The Descendants of Morris Earle the Patriot*, and his wife Elizabeth Terhune. Joe plans to publish updated editions of both works in the next several years. He also is working on a compilation of Dooley family records from the Irish Midlands from the late 18th through the early 20th centuries.

Joe served as president of the Virginia Society in 2007-08, and hosted the 117th NSSAR Congress in Williamsburg. While president of the Virginia Society, he spearheaded the installation of a monument to black patriots of the American Revolution. The names of 26 patriots of color are inscribed on this monument, which stands

at the Elam Baptist Church, the third-oldest historically black church in Virginia.

Joe is a Life Member, a George Washington Fellow and a Minuteman (Class of 2009). He has served as Secretary General (2012-13), Treasurer General (2011-12), Genealogist General (2008-11) and commander of the NSSAR Color Guard (2009-11). Since 2008, he also has served as the founding director of the SAR Annual Conference on the American Revolution. He has chaired or served on numerous national committees, including the Color Guard, Membership, Genealogy, Medals & Awards, Master of Ceremonies, Handbook and Congress Planning committees. Joe has been the first-line sponsor for more than 200 new members.

During the time Joe was chairman of the Membership Committee and Genealogist General, he drafted the memorandum of understanding that formed the basis of a contract between the SAR and Ancestry.com. By the terms of this contract, Ancestry has digitized all SAR applications and indexed the names of the first three generations. The SAR-Ancestry contract also provides for Ancestry to post on its website SAR applications that were approved through 1970. In part because of the inclusion of SAR applications on Ancestry.com, the SAR has enjoyed an increase in new membership applications.

As a result of Joe's establishment of the SAR Annual Conference on the American Revolution, some of the nation's best historians gather annually to present papers on various topics related to the American Revolution. Among the historians who have attended the SAR Annual Conference are three winners of the Pulitzer Prize. The papers from the first SAR Annual Conference on the American Revolution, which convened in 2010, are expected to be published by the University of Virginia Press in an edited, peer-reviewed volume in 2013.

Joe is a major contributor to The Center for Advancing America's Heritage. He also has contributed to the NSSAR-Harvard University research project into black patriots of the Revolution (go to www.archives.com/Patriots). Joe is a Silver Palm donor to the Arthur M. King Eagle Scout Scholarship Fund. He has made an additional contribution to the Eagle Scout Fund in honor of his late brother, Bill, who was both an SAR member and an Eagle Scout. Joe is a significant contributor to the JROTC Endowment Fund, the George S. & Stella M. Knight Essay Contest Fund and the NSSAR West Point History Award Saber Fund.

Joe is a member of the Sons of the American Legion, in honor of his father, Wil, a World War II veteran who died in 2002. For six years, Joe served as a senior leader of the Children of the American Revolution. He is a member of, or is working on his membership application for, the following: the Sons of the Revolution, the Society of Colonial Wars, the Descendants of Colonial Clergy, the Society of the War of 1812, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Flagon & Trencher, the Dutch Settlers Society of Albany, the Descendants of Founders of New Jersey, the Order of the First Families of Maryland, the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick, and the Ancient Order of Hibernians in America.

In 2007, Joe received the President's Volunteer Service Award for a lifetime of volunteer community service. The chairman of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission presented the award with a certificate signed by President George W. Bush. In 2008, the Texas Society SAR arranged for Gov. Rick Perry to name Joe an Honorary Texan. In 2010, Gov. Steve Beshear commissioned him a Kentucky Colonel.

Veracity in Freedom

Luis Edmundo Vasquez's "Veracity in Freedom" was named the winner of the 2013 Joseph S. Rumbaugh Oration Contest. Following is the text of Vasquez's speech.

"When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands, which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation." With these words, Thomas Jefferson, one of our nation's most prominent founding fathers, iterated the unchallengeable dogma, which he believes to be intrinsically true: that certain unalienable rights are shared by peoples of all nations, civilizations, and cultures. The Declaration of Independence was signed by our forefathers in 1776—236 years ago—and yet, the Declaration of Independence is clearly one of the most lasting and impacting documents on our modern society as a whole.

Before the signing of the Declaration, it had been over a year of constant, brutal fighting with the British. The Seven Years' War (around 15 years earlier) had only further deteriorated and depreciated the relations amongst the British and the Americans. Debt from wars beleaguered the British government, thus becoming the catalyst for the taxes imposed on the 13 colonies. But when one analyzes these taxes placed on the Americans by the British, one can't help but wonder why the colonists were so enraged by these taxes. Taxes such as the sugar act, tea act, molasses act, and stamp act really didn't raise the price of these goods a notable amount. No one was going hungry or something of the sort due

to imposing of these taxes. So what was it that really infuriated the Americans? It was no representation. The Americans weren't represented in the British Parliament; in other words, Americans had no diplomatic way to object to or fight against these new taxes. Money, though a meager amount, was getting taken out of their pockets and the Americans could not do anything about it. Eventually, when it became apparent to the Americans that simply protesting these taxes wouldn't be enough, the last resort option needed to be done: war with Britain; a war fought for their rights, rights believed to be unalienable, rights that (as the Declaration of Independence states) government is obligated to protect. It was a war for freedom.

The main event of 1776 wasn't to come on a battlefield or during a war; it was the signing of the Declaration of Independence that was the remarkable feat. However, the desire for independence wasn't the main reason for the instigation of the war against Britain; rather, it was the book *Common Sense* by Thomas Paine. This book promoted the idea that settlement by words with Britain was not possible and iterated a strong belief in independence at all costs. With the help of the book, quickly the American mood shifted toward independence. Eventually, on June 7, 1776, a gesture to affirm independence came before Congress, and finally, on July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was finished and signed. But what was the real, initial effect of this signing? That very day that the Declaration was signed, a handwritten copy was passed on to the printing shop of John Dunlap, who made around 200 copies that night. On July 8, 1776, after hearing the Declaration, crowds in many cities tore down and destroyed representations or signs of the royal power. George III was despised tenfold. A sense of American nationalism pervaded throughout the people, with

the main catalyst being the signing of the Declaration of Independence. In the future, a plethora of similar independence statements were modeled off of the American Declaration, with cogent examples including the Venezuelan Declaration, Vietnamese Declaration and even the Declaration of Secession by the Confederate States of America—all modeled off of the American Declaration. The Declaration of Independence was truly the epitome of influential documents.

As we look back on history past the date of the signing, we could easily see how the Declaration shaped our country up to this modern era. The propinquity of the freeing of the slaves to the signing of the Declaration wasn't by chance; rather, Abraham Lincoln rightly interpreted the statements initially found in the Declaration, which stated that all peoples shared the rights of "... life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." The Bill of Rights, which is the name by which the first 10 amendments to the United States Constitution are known, is in essence an expansion on the Declaration of Independence.

While the Declaration of Independence made general statements about unalienable rights, the Bill of Rights offers specific rights and laws, from freedom of speech, press and religion, to the right to keep and bear arms; the freedom to petition; prohibition of cruel and unusual punishment; and compelled self-incrimination. The Bill of Rights is essentially a further development on what Thomas Jefferson had written earlier in the Declaration of Independence.

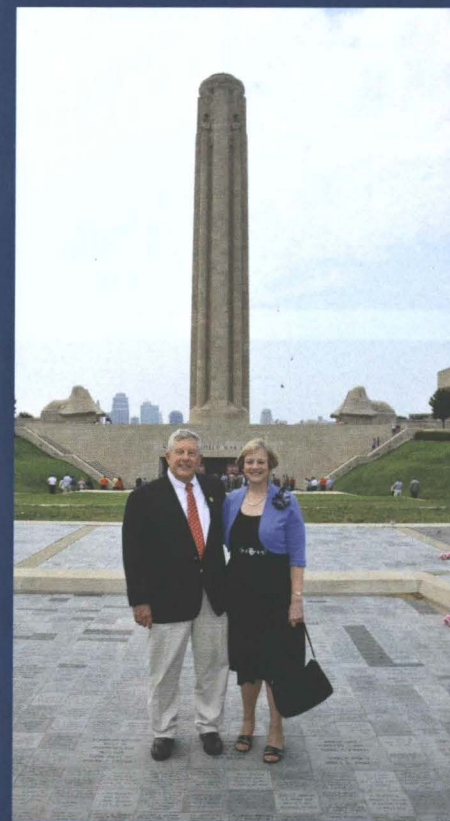
Every morning at my school one thing remains persistent throughout the year; the reiteration of the Pledge of Allegiance as a class. The ultimate words of the Pledge of

Allegiance, "with liberty, and justice for all," always persist within my mind for a short time after I speak them along with my class. The Declaration was the paramount document that has shaped our world, as we know it today. All around America, the eternal effects of the Declaration of Independence are exceedingly overt, and it all began with a pen held by Thomas Jefferson, writing a sentence that began with "When in the course of human events ..."

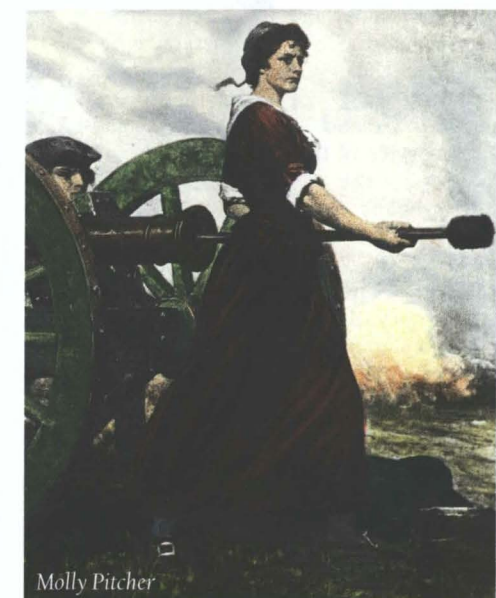
earn the Molly Pitcher Medal, a woman must be present at, and support, the SAR Color Guard at qualifying SAR Color Guard events.

SAR Trip to Ireland

Set for May 2014

President General Joseph W. Dooley and the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution are leading an SAR delegation to Ireland in May 2014 to honor the service of the Irish and Scots-Irish patriots of the American Revolution, specifically Commodore John Barry, the father of the U.S. Navy, who was born in Tacumshane, County Wexford; and Charles Thomson, the secretary of the Continental Congress and a signer of the Declaration of Independence, who was born in Maghera Parish, County Londonderry.

The planned itinerary is as follows: participants will arrive at the Dublin Airport on May 2, where they will be met by travel staff. If you choose to arrive in Europe before the start of the SAR trip, you may arrange to meet us at the Dublin airport. Our bus will

depart once everyone has arrived and take us to our hotel. In the afternoon, we are planning to visit the Glasnevin Cemetery, which is the Irish version of Arlington National Cemetery. Iconic Irish figures are buried in the cemetery—Daniel O’Connell, Charles Stewart Parnell, Jeremiah O’Donovan Rossa, Eamon De Valera, Michael Collins, Countess Markiewicz, Maud Gonne McBride and many others. The cemetery has a digital archive of the people buried there, which is a great genealogical tool. Later, we will travel to the Royal Irish Academy for a special welcome talk from Professor Nicholas Canny, followed by dinner at the historic Kildare Street University Club.

May 3 will feature a panoramic sightseeing tour of the City of Dublin, visiting St. Patrick’s Cathedral, built to honor Ireland’s patron saint. Nearby is the well where tradition holds St. Patrick baptized converts when he

visited Dublin. We also will visit Trinity College, which houses the famous *Book of Kells*, a ninth century illuminated manuscript of the Gospels. In the evening, we will visit the private residence of Ireland’s president and plan to have an audience with President Michael D. Higgins, followed by a dinner in Dublin. On May 4, we will visit the historic Guinness Storehouse and learn about the rich history of the company. That evening, we will dine at the Brazen Head, Ireland’s oldest pub, dating to 1198.

On May 5, the tour will head west to the mighty Cliffs of Moher, which are 700 feet high and offer views of the Aran Islands and the Dingle Peninsula. We will visit Bunratty Castle, built in 1425, the most complete medieval fortress in Ireland. Dinner will be a medieval banquet, with a night spent in the Limerick Hotel. On May 6, we will continue south to the former Kingdom of Kerry, where we will visit

the spectacular Dingle Peninsula and see the beautiful Lakes of Killarney. We will spend the night in Ireland’s second-largest city, Cork. On May 7, we will travel north to County Tipperary to visit the Rock of Cashel, the traditional seat of the Kings of Munster. After a tour of the Cashel, we will continue to Wexford, where we will lay a wreath at the Commodore John Barry Memorial on Crescent Quay. The memorial was a gift from the people of the United States to the town of Wexford in 1956 to honor the father of the American Navy. We then will return to Dublin.

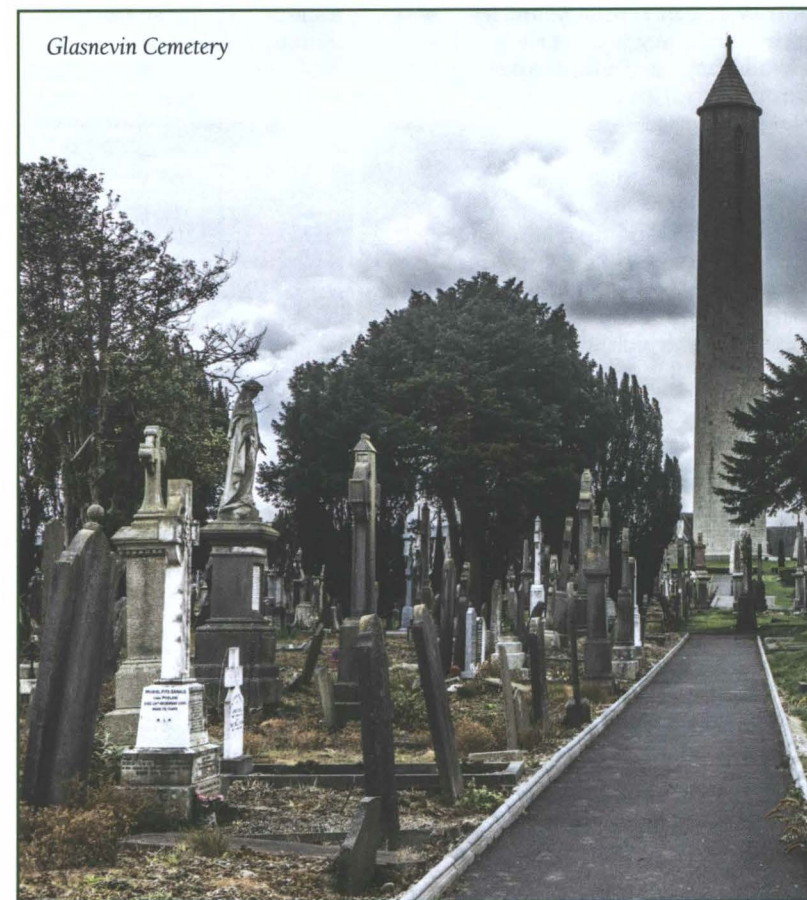
On May 8, we will head north through St. Patrick’s Country to Northern Ireland. We will visit Downpatrick, the ancient capital of the Kingdom of Lecale, and Down Cathedral, where St. Patrick is believed to be interred. We will continue to Belfast, capital of Northern Ireland. The peace process has brought a measure of optimism to the rebellious city, and we will step back in time with a visit to the infamous Victorian-era Crumlin Road Gaol. On May 9, we will continue north, passing through the nine Glens of Antrim to the Giant’s Causeway, created by

lava outflows 60 million years ago and reputed to be the creation of legendary Irish giant Finn MacCool. Next will be a visit to Bushmills Irish Whiskey, the oldest distillery in Ireland, with an original license from 1608. On our return, we will stop in the village of Tobemore in the town of Maghera, the birthplace of Charles Thomson, secretary of the Continental Congress and a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

May 10 will be devoted to a tour of the City of Belfast. We will tour the Protestant neighborhood of Shankill Road and the Catholic neighborhood of Falls Road, and see murals documenting “the Troubles,” as well as visit the open gate of the Peace Wall standing between the two neighborhoods. We will visit the RMS Titanic Museum, located where the ship was built between 1909 and 1911. The trip will conclude with gala farewell dinner in a Belfast restaurant, and we return home the following day.

est in history and the long-standing relationship between France and the U.S., which was most evident

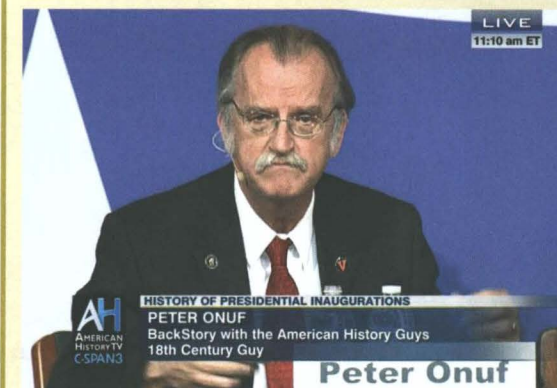

The conference was dedicated to the late Lance Banning of the

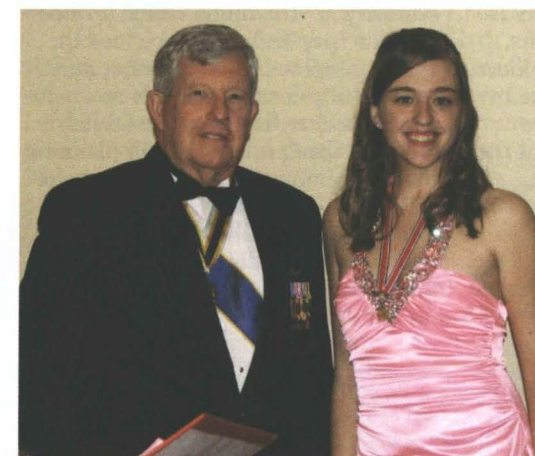
The 2013 SAR Annual Conference on the American Revolution convened in St. Louis on June 21-23. The topic for this year's conference was *Revolutionary Prophecies: The Founders on the Future*. Robert M.S. McDonald of the U.S. Military Academy once again served as the SAR Distinguished Scholar and facilitated the event.

Each scholar presented a paper on a particular founder and what that founder expected for the future of the United States. The theme of the conference determined the location. Many founders anticipated America's westward expansion, and St. Louis is considered the Gateway to the West. The conference took place at the Millennium Hotel, and all attendees' rooms had a view of the Gateway Arch.

University of Kentucky. Many of the presenters—Todd Estes (Oakland University), Patrick Mullins (Marymount University), Michael Schwartz (Ashland University) and several others—had been doctoral students under Banning. Legendary scholar John Murrin of Princeton University also attended, and participated in the tribute to Banning, who had been one of Murrin's doctoral students decades earlier.

Peter S. Onuf of the University of Virginia and the American History Guys led a roundtable discussion of the various papers, examining overarching themes in the Founders' visions and fears for the future of the republic. Onuf will assist McDonald in editing the published volume of the conference papers.

Bermuda-Born Patriots of the Revolution

On March 25, the Daughters, Sons and Children of the American Revolution honored two Bermuda-born patriots of the Revolution—St. George Tucker and Thomas Tudor Tucker—in a special ceremony and reception hosted by the Bermuda National Trust at the Historic Tucker House Museum in the Town of St. George's, Bermuda. Bermuda Gov. George D.R. Fergusson and Robert Settje, U.S. consul general to Bermuda, attended and spoke during the ceremony.

Thomas Tudor and St. George Tucker were the younger sons of Henry Tucker Sr., who was the reputed leader of the Bermuda Gunpowder Plot of 1775. Their older brother, Henry Tucker Jr., served as president of the Governor's Council and was married to the daughter of George James Bruere, who was the British governor of Bermuda. Gov. Bruere's son, John, was killed fighting for the crown at Bunker Hill in 1775. Prior to 1775, the younger brothers had made their way to the mainland to make their fortunes—Thomas, a physician, to South Carolina, and St. George, a businessman and lawyer, to Virginia. As tensions between the colonies and Great Britain increased, the brothers had to choose sides, and they chose the colonies. More than a year before the Continental Congress would declare independence from Great Britain, the brothers had separately advised rebel leaders that 112 barrels of gunpowder could be found in the unguarded magazine at St. George's. Ultimately, about 100 of those barrels

were "borrowed" and used by Americans against British forces on the mainland. The Tucker House, where the ceremony took place, was purchased by Henry Tucker Jr. in 1775, and is one of the many historic 17th and 18th century buildings that make up the St. George's World Heritage Site.

In addition to their reputed roles as instigators of the Bermuda Gunpowder Plot, both Tucker brothers served in the military during the Revolution. After the Revolution, St. George Tucker went on to a career as a distinguished lawyer, professor and jurist in Virginia. Thomas Tudor Tucker represented South Carolina in the First U.S. Congress and was treasurer of the United States for more than 26 years until his death in 1828.

Lt. Col. William White, president of the Bermuda National Trust, served as master of ceremonies at the March 25 event, and the Rev. W. David Rath, rector of St. Peter's Church, the oldest Anglican church in continuous use in the Western Hemisphere, gave the invocation. Nancy Arton, regent of the Somers Isles Chapter in Hamilton, Bermuda, represented the DAR. Michael J. Elston, VASSAR chancellor and president of the George Washington Chapter, gave remarks on behalf of the SAR. Emily Elston, Virginia State librarian and president of the "Light Horse Harry" Lee Society, spoke and represented the C.A.R. during the ceremony.

The three organizations presented a wreath to be displayed under a painting of St. George Tucker that hangs in the Tucker House.

Fergusson and Consul General Settje both stressed the importance of the social, economic and strategic ties between Bermuda and the U.S. The governor, upon receiving the SAR Certificate of Appreciation, quipped that he was somewhat hesitant about accepting a "certificate of disloyalty." Elston said, "The ties between Bermuda and the United States are deep and innumerable ... We are your nearest neighbor, your second-largest trading partner, and the primary source of your tourists. Most importantly, we are friends. And tonight's event is a reminder that this is nothing new. It is a celebration of those connections, both historic and modern day; and it is a recognition of one small part of our shared history."

During the ceremony, the SAR announced a program of activities through 2015 designed to bring attention to the role of these Bermuda-born patriots, commemorate their birthplace in Bermuda, honor their final resting places in the U.S., and educate Americans and Bermudians on the long-standing ties between the two countries. Wreath layings will be held at St. George Tucker's grave in Nelson County, Va., on Nov. 2, 2013, and at Thomas Tudor Tucker's grave in Washington, D.C., on May 3, 2014. The program will include the commissioning and sale of a limited-edition pin. The funds raised will be used to "pay Bermuda back" for the stolen gunpowder by donating a portion of pin-sale proceeds to Bermuda charities and to establish a fund for the C.A.R. to use in planning its commemoration of the 250th Anniversary of the Revolutionary Era, which will begin in just 10 years.

Vincennes Rendezvous

The SAR national ceremony marking the 234th anniversary of George Rogers Clark's 1779 capture of Fort Sackville from the British was held on Saturday, May 25, in the Rotunda of the George Rogers Clark National Historical Park in Vincennes, Ind.

Upon learning of Clark's capture of Kaskaskia, British Lt. Gov. Henry Hamilton led a force from Detroit to Vincennes, arriving there on Dec. 17, 1778. After deciding to postpone an attack on Kaskaskia until spring, Hamilton sent his Indian allies home for the winter.

Realizing his small force would be unable to hold the Illinois posts if Hamilton had sufficient time to gather his forces, Clark decided to attack Vincennes immediately and, on Feb. 6, 1779, departed Kaskaskia with 172 men, including some French volunteers. After a march of some 240 miles through flooded country, often shoulder deep in water, Clark's force arrived at Vincennes on Feb. 23 and surprised the British. Thinking Clark's force was much larger than it was, Hamilton surrendered on Feb. 25. As the result of Clark's defeat of the British, American claims in the old Northwest served as the basis of the cession of these lands, encompassing all or parts of the current states of Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and part of Minnesota, to the United States at the Treaty of Paris in 1783.

Escorted by members of the INSSAR, those presenting wreaths honoring George Rogers Clark were President General Stephen A. Leishman, VPG Central District Forest B. Chilton, INSSAR President Dr. William E. Sharp III, KYSSAR President Thomas E. Geimeier, OHSSAR Color Guard Commander William A. Robinson, WVSSAR Past President Lance Carter, INLASAR President April Legler, INSDAR Southern District Director Cherie Baxter, KYSDAR representative Judy E. Carter, INSC.A.R. President Hannah Vandermolen, as well as compatriots representing seven INSSAR and three KYSSAR chapters.

Following the ceremony, President General Leishman placed American flags on the graves of patriots buried in the cemetery of the Old Cathedral Catholic Church, which adjoins the grounds of the George Rogers Clark National Historic Park.

Marvin Vickers spoke at the ceremony. The Shoals Post of the American Legion and area Boy Scouts also participated in the event.

Tatum, of Henry County, Virginia, served in the Virginia Militia under the command of Col. Abram Penn and fought at the Battle of Guilford Courthouse, N.C., in March 1781. He also fought at

Eutaw Springs, S.C., and at Yorktown, where Lord Cornwallis surrendered his command. Additionally, Tatum furnished supplies in assistance of the Revolution on April 23, 1782.

Approximately 80 people attended the ceremony and the following reception hosted by the Pinson Historical Society.

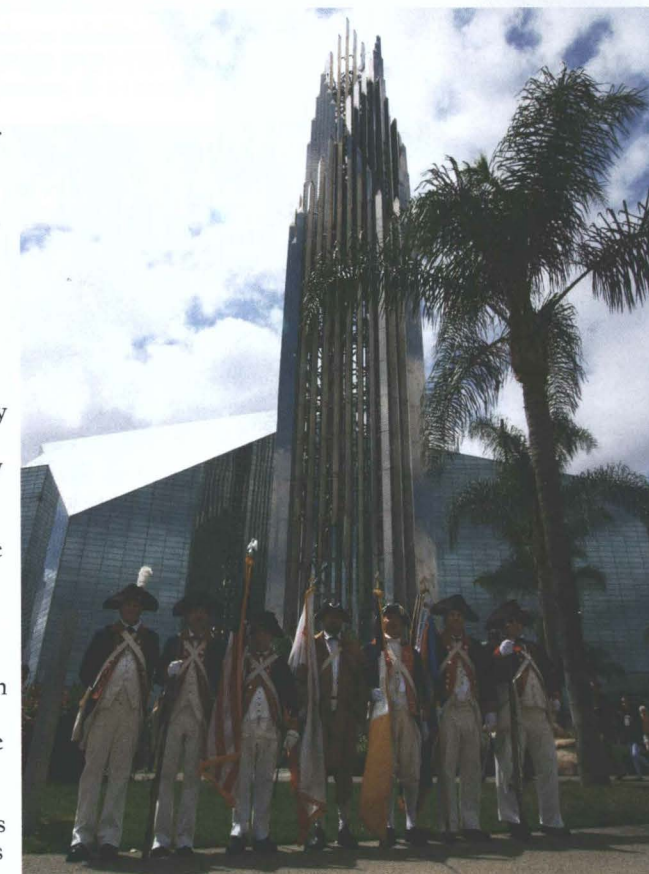
CALIFORNIA SOCIETY

Special guest, former U.S. Air Force fighter and test pilot and Compatriot Danny Cox, was interviewed about his lineage and fighter pilot experiences.

SAN DIEGO CHAPTER

Casa de España (House of Spain) in San Diego celebrated the 210th anniversary of the Battle of San Diego Bay



on April 21, 2013. The master of ceremonies was Jesus B. Benayas, president of Casa de España in San Diego. Other program participants included D. Enrique Ruiz Molero, consul general of Spain in Los Angeles; Maria Angeles O'Donnell Olson, honorary consul of Spain in San Diego; and representatives of the Spanish Army, Navy and Air Force. The keynote speaker was Compatriot Philip L. Hinshaw, CASSAR vice president for membership. Mayor Bob Filner, the 35th mayor of San Diego, addressed the audience and reflected on his appreciation of early California history gained during his 20 years as a history professor at San Diego State University.

The Battle of San Diego Bay occurred on March 17, 1803, when the American brig *Lelia Byrd* entered San Diego Bay to buy sea otter pelts. The Spanish government forbade such trading, but the Americans persisted. Some crewmen were captured at the beach but were able to escape or were released. An hour later, Fort Guijarros fired its 9-pound cannons to prevent the *Lelia Byrd* from sailing out of San Diego Bay. The ship's crew mounted six 3-pound swivel guns and fired several shots at the fort. A hat was waved and both parties ceased firing, bringing the battle to a peaceful ending.

Hinshaw's presentation focused on Spain's involvement in, and contribution to, the American Revolution. The role of the San Diego Presidio in Spain's war against Great Britain is recognized by a plaque in Presidio Park commemorating the financial contribution of the Presidio Soldados (soldiers) and Native Americans to Spain's war effort. In 1778, Father Serra, founder of the San Diego

Mission, wrote: "We prayed fervently last evening for the success of the colonists under one George Washington, because we believe their cause is just and that the Great Redeemer is on their side."

The uniforms worn by Compatriots Hinshaw, Ernie McCullough, Steve Ludwiczak and Robert Smith attracted much attention and many questions about the SAR. Smith's patriot ancestor was Lt. José Francisco De Ortega, commandant of the Presidio of San Diego during the American Revolution.

CONNECTICUT SOCIETY

The Silvermine Elementary School in Norwalk, Conn., recently held a Spirit Rally, below. A major part of the rally was a flag retirement ceremony as a new flag had been donated to the school. During the ceremony, the students were given a history of the flag and flag etiquette by Roger Sherman Branch No. 5 members Ed Isaacs and Roger Smith, who was in the uniform of the Third New Jersey Regiment.

Also as part of the ceremony, a Certificate of Commendation in recognition of exemplary patriotism in the display of the U.S. flag was presented to school Principal Ivette Ellis.



FLORIDA SOCIETY

The only native of St. Augustine and Spanish East Florida known to have supported the patriot cause during the American Revolution and served in that territory was honored with a memorial marker in Tolomato Cemetery on April 13. The Gainesville and St. Augustine chapters honored the memory of Francisco Xavier Sanchez during dedication ceremonies at the cemetery, where he was interred in 1807.

Sanchez (1738-1807) was one of Florida's most successful planters. His life and career spanned three colonial regimes. His landholdings stretched from the Diego Plains north of St. Augustine to the St. Mary's River and west to the St. Johns River. After Spain ceded control of East Florida to the British in 1763, Sanchez remained in the territory. Under British rule he provided fresh meat to the British garrison, but he was regarded with suspicion by British Gov. Patrick Tonyn when Spain joined the war against England in 1779.

When Sanchez learned that his countrymen and others were prisoners of the British, he provided food and clothing. Among those held at Fort St. Mark (The Castillo de San

Marcos) were three signers of the Declaration of Independence: Thomas Heyward Jr., Arthur Middleton and Edward Rutledge.

More than 100 people attended the ceremony. The speaker was Ron Sanchez, a descendant of Francisco X. Sanchez and a St. Johns County commissioner. Also participating in the dedication ceremony were Jim Partin of the Gainesville Chapter; Oscar Patterson III and Rev. David Baker of the St. Augustine Chapter; Elizabeth Gessner, president of the Tolomato Cemetery Preservation Board; and Fr. Ed Booth of Cathedral Parish. The JROTC unit from St. Augustine High School provided the color guard.

Among those attending the dedication were 24 Sanchez descendants and members of The Los Floridanos Society. The marker was designed, purchased and placed by the Gainesville and St. Augustine chapters.

Frederica Patriots Day Celebration on St. Simons Island

Unusually cold and rainy weather was not able to dampen the success of St. Simon Island's Frederica Patriots Day Celebration on April 19-21. The event, now in its ninth year, commemorates the "shot heard 'round the world" on April 19, 1775, and the American Revolution's Frederica Naval Action on April 19, 1778.

Ninety people participated in the Parade of Patriots. Color guards included GASSAR and FLSSAR, Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay and Brunswick High School Naval JROTC. Other participants included Golden Isles Fife & Drum Corps, BHS Navy Drill Team, and DAR and SAR members dressed as Revolutionary War figures. Local elementary school students braved the early morning showers to parade with replicas of Revolutionary War flags and wooden muskets.

At the memorial ceremony in the Island Casino, middle school students amazed attendees with the recitation of the "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere" and the singing of an inspiring patriotic medley. Forty wreaths were presented by DAR and SAR Chapters, including five for the first time, and Marshes of Glynn Chapter members in colonial dress gave life to "Four Events that Shaped Revolutionary Georgia." A musket salute and "Taps" concluded the morning's official program.

Colonial festival exhibits were arranged throughout the casino, and SAR and DAR members answered questions about the items displayed for visitors.

Many worshippers dressed in Colonial attire sang hymns to the notes of the historical clavichord. The Rev. Whit Chapman, senior pastor of Frederica Baptist Church and a member of Marshes of Glynn Chapter, presented the sermon, much of which he selected from a sermon delivered in Boston in 1778.

ILLINOIS SOCIETY

On May 6 at 6 p.m. the La Grange-Le Portage Chapter DAR and members of the Salt Creek and Fox Valley Chapters SAR, in color guard dress, and a group of Brookfield residents held a dedication ceremony for the new oak in Kiwanis Park. The ILSSAR performed the flag ceremony.

A storm on June 21, 2011, which produced wind gusts of up to 75 mph, leveled trees throughout Brookfield, and one of the casualties was a magnificent white oak—the Constitution Oak, so named because it was standing at the time the U.S. Constitution was signed in 1787. The tree received the designation in 1987, the bicentennial of the Constitution's signing.

The DAR became interested in helping replace the tree when one of its members, Brookfield resident Wendy Herder, mentioned that the Constitution Oak had blown down in a storm.

The DAR has long been interested in conservation and reforestation efforts. According to Ashley Lubenkov, the LaGrange Chapter, founded in 1927, was involved in planting hundreds of trees during the 1930s. The organization contacted Brookfield Village Forester Scott DeRoss, who was happy to help find a suitable replacement—a white oak like the one that preceded it.

The original Constitution Oak was estimated to be between 300 and 327 years old when it was dedicated as a local landmark in 1987. Chris Stach, writing in the *Riverside-Brookfield Landmark* in 2005, noted that the tree not only predated the Constitution but the births of all of the country's Founding Fathers.

SPRINGFIELD CHAPTER

The Springfield Chapter held its April meeting at Clayville, which is listed on the National Register of

Historic Places. Built by the Moses Broadwell family in 1824, Clayville was a stagecoach stop and is the oldest brick building in Sangamon County.

Springfield Chapter Compatriot Jerry Smith, a descendant of Moses Broadwell, who served in the New Jersey Militia during the American Revolution, welcomed chapter members to "his house," presented a program on the history of Clayville and led members and guests on a tour of the historic site.

The chapter's newest member, George Selby, whose patriot ancestor Elijah Mayfield served in the militia with Gen. George Rogers Clark, received his NSSAR membership certificate, and Compatriot Cletis Underwood was presented the C.C. Hall Meritorious Service Medal, which is given only when a worthy candidate is recognized for his SAR service.



INDIANA SOCIETY

The ceremony began with the guardsmen marching onto the field, unfolding a new American flag, briskly raising it to the top of the flagpole, and then slowly lowering it to half staff. The guardsmen also participated in populating the first row of flags for the Field of Flags.

A musket demonstration and salute also were part of the program.

IOWA SOCIETY

Iowa SAR member Don E. Stout is passionate about restoring the Old Rose Hill Cemetery in Mahaska County, Iowa. Many of the earliest pioneers and settlers in the county are among those buried there. Stout first became interested in the cemetery following the death of his mother and his retirement from the U.S. Postal Service in 2004. Maintenance of the cemetery grounds had suffered for years due to limited funding and a lack of younger volunteers to help with the physical work required.

The rural cemetery's fence lines had become overgrown with brambles, brush and fallen trees. Trash and old floral arrangements littered the perimeter. The grounds had deteriorated to the point where the cemetery association was no longer able to sell new burial plots. Stout became a member of the Old Rose Hill Cemetery Association Board of Directors in 2009 and was elected association president soon after. He immediately set about recruiting younger

volunteers and board members to help get the cemetery grounds back in shape.

To date, the fence lines have been cleared of brush and fallen trees. Scrub trees that had grown up along the fences are being cleared so that the fences can be repaired. Vegetation that had grown wild has been removed, revealing grave markers previously hidden. Don also has drafted and worked to implement new association bylaws and general cemetery policies. With the help of his son, Don Jr., a new website was created, featuring original founding documents and cemetery history, announcements, current and vintage photos, a list of veterans and a link to Findagrave.com where every burial in the cemetery and a photo of each headstone can be found.

Four generations of Stout's family are buried in Old Rose Hill Cemetery and he travels there several times a year from his home in West Des Moines to work with volunteers. He is a believer in the importance of remembering those who came before and the sacrifices they made to ensure our freedoms and prosperity.

KENTUCKY SOCIETY

On May 1, 1780, the Virginia General Assembly and then-Gov. Thomas Jefferson approved the town charter of Louisville. George Rogers Clark recruited early Kentucky pioneer James John Floyd, who was placed on the town's board of trustees and was given the authority to plan and lay out the town. Jefferson County, named in honor of the governor, was formed at this time as one of three original Kentucky counties from the former Kentucky County, Va. Louisville was, and is, the county seat.

To commemorate Jefferson County's founding, members of the SAR, DAR, Colonial Dames, Daughters of the Confederacy and the War of 1812 Societies gathered in front of a statue of Thomas Jefferson at the Louisville Courthouse before going to the Western Cemetery to honor early settlers of Louisville and veterans from the wars represented by the societies.

LOUISIANA SOCIETY

Memorial Day marked the 13th annual Avenue of Flags in Lake Charles, La., one of the largest displays of memorial flags in the United States, with this year's flags numbering 890. The flags are flown on either side of the gravel roads winding through Orange Grove-Graceland Cemetery on Broad Street. The flags are raised at sunrise and retired at 6

p.m. Visitors are welcome to tour the Avenue of Flags by either walking or driving. Calcasieu-Gov TV station televises the event each year.

Each flag represents a specific veteran—the official “casket flag” presented at the funeral. Each flag is numbered, and information about the veteran is catalogued. The families have in turn lent or donated the flags to the SAR for use in the patriotic Avenue of Flags display. Memorial flags measure 5 feet by 9 feet and are generally too large for proper home display.

The mission of the Avenue of the Flags is to respectfully display the U.S. flag on Memorial Day to honor our veterans of all branches of the military, past and present. The project was started in 1983 by the Oliver Pollock Chapter of SAR. Then-chapter president, the late Dr. Rex Smelser, envisioned the Avenue of Flags becoming the nation's largest display of U.S. flags. Beginning with 50 flags the first year, it has grown to 890. The Avenue of Flags has been honored with awards, including an official Southern Travel Treasure by *Southern Traveler* in 2009, and the Top 20 Events in the Southeast in 2004 and 2012 by the Southeast Tourism Society.

Each Memorial Day, a recently deceased veteran is memorialized in a special, moving morning ceremony in the cemetery.



His or her flag is hoisted, and a eulogy is given along with other patriotic speeches and patriotic music. LASSAR members participate, dressed in colonial military uniforms. All five branches of the military were represented this year, along with Compatriot Randy Roach, mayor of the city of Lake Charles; Compatriot The Most Rev. Glen John Provost, the bishop of the Diocese of Lake Charles; and Compatriot Ted Harless, master of ceremonies.

SAR members and volunteers from other organizations—including four local Boy Scout troops, local Cub Scout packs, ROTC, The Blue Knights, U.S. Army Reserve, U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Marine Corps League, Louisiana National Guard, American Legion and local businesses—erect the display on Memorial Day. Every year, a local Boy Scout completes his final project to become an Eagle Scout, enhancing the Avenue of Flags. The flags are stored at Navarra's Jewelry Store in Lake Charles when not being flown. Local dry cleaners donate their services after the Memorial Day event to clean the flags as needed.

Anyone who has a veteran's flag that is not being flown to honor a loved one is invited to donate it to be included in our display. We take care of the flags entrusted to us and deeply respect the personal sacrifices represented by each flag. Your flag may be flown in our display by contacting Compatriot Ted Harless, 127 W. 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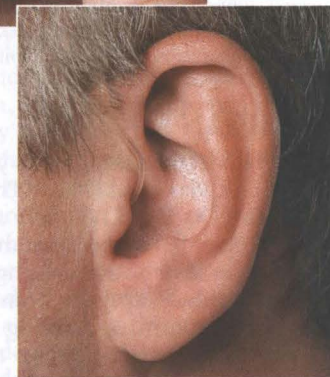
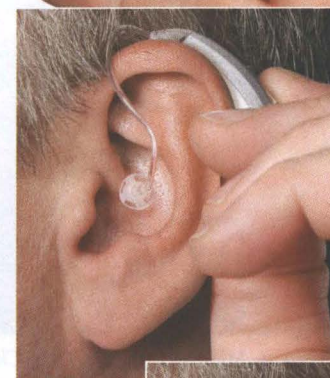
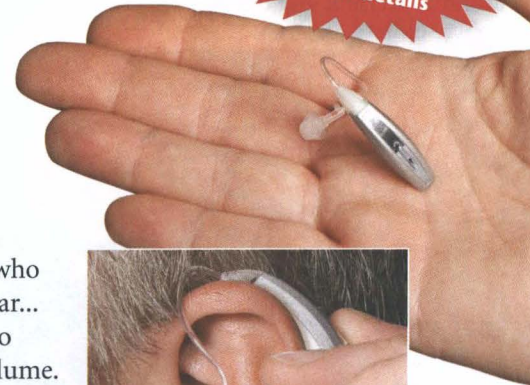
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MAINE SOCIETY

MICHIGAN SOCIETY

One hundred years ago this year, the Detroit Chapter of the MISSAR was established. The Michigan Society was formed in 1890. Until 1913 only a Western Michigan Chapter in Grand Rapids had been established. Most MISSAR meetings and the 1899 National Congress were held in Detroit. As state membership grew from fewer than 100 to more than 360 in 1901, many residing in and around Detroit, it was time for a Detroit Chapter to be organized. During these early years, more than 100 members would come to Detroit for the state's Board of Manager (BOM) meetings. Most were held in hotels in the city with orchestras playing, patriotic songs sung and banquets following the meetings. On Nov. 1, 1913, the Detroit Chapter meeting followed the BOM meeting, both held at the home of Albert Henry in Grosse Pointe Farms, and 100 members attended from all over the state, even the Upper Peninsula. Members were transported between the downtown train stations and Grosse Pointe by electric car.

The chapter was active, with meetings and speakers discussing the Revolutionary War. Some of the meetings had speakers who represented all branches of military service, and this was particularly true in the years leading up to World War I. In one such meeting, the fathers of sons "over there" in France talked about their sons' letters home and news reporters discussed their trips to the front.

The 1938 minutes of the BOM meeting, held in Detroit with the Detroit Chapter, featured the participation of industry in preparation for the next war. It seems that lend-lease and other world events were moving the country toward the inevitable, long before Dec. 7, 1941.

As we look back on the century, it is interesting and educational to see how the MISSAR and the Detroit Chapter reflected the times and how current they were in their programs as well as their discussions on the Revolutionary War and the patriots who fought in it. For example, in 1935, they sponsored a debate by Wayne University Students on

the pros and cons of the New Deal. This was a current topic at the time, given that President Franklin D. Roosevelt had just been elected at the height of the Great Depression that saw more than 25 percent of the country's workforce out of work.

As this centennial year progresses, the Detroit Chapter's history will be further reviewed and highlighted in the PowerPoint presentation that summarizes its activities and reflects on some of the century's more poignant moments. The presentation shows copies of actual documents, such as meeting minutes, and uses pictures that relate to the decade under discussion. The presentation will be available to the MISSAR and its chapters and will be placed on the MISSAR website.

MISSISSIPPI SOCIETY

On Saturday, May 4, the Birmingham Chapter (ALSSAR) joined with the Mississippi SAR to mark the grave of Lazarus Reeves, a Revolutionary War soldier buried in Summit, Miss. George Brown, a descendant of Reeves, is a member of the Birmingham Chapter, and his cousin, Kay Brown Allred, is a past regent of the Judith Robinson DAR Chapter in McComb, Miss.

This was a Southern District event, and the color guard was provided by the LASSAR. Reeves and his wife are buried on land he owned, which is still owned by some of his descendants. John Taylor, vice president general of the Southern District, presented a district wreath; Gerry Brent, president of the MSSAR, presented a wreath; John Wallace presented a wreath from the ALSSAR; Steve Ray of the LASSAR presented the Louisiana wreath; and a wreath from the James Huger Chapter also was presented.

Bill Clement of the Birmingham Chapter gave the remarks dedicating the marker. The event was attended by 49 people, many of whom are descendants of Reeves, DAR and SAR members.

NEBRASKA SOCIETY

Compatriot Robert Knott, past Nebraska state president, participated as a member of the SAR and the Society of the War of 1812 in the June rededication of a bronze plaque, below, commemorating a hero of the War of 1812. The rededication was the result of remodeling work at Central High School in Omaha, Neb., where the plaque was placed in 1912.

Current NESSAR President Fred Walden and Omaha Chapter President William Webb, who are members of the War of 1812 Nebraska Society, also participated in the ceremony. The plaque commemorates Capt. James Lawrence, whose naval tactics were successful against the British Navy



in February 1813 when Lawrence's sloop of war, *Hornet*, sunk the brig-sloop H.M.S. *Peacock* and killed or wounded more than a quarter of the crew. Lawrence was mortally wounded in another battle, in which his last spoken command was: "Don't give up the ship."

The ceremony at Central High School continues the joint activities of the War of 1812 Society, the SAR and the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War to educate students about the history of their country and commemorate our patriots.

The compatriots, all in period clothing, took about 15 minutes each to talk about the hardships and exploits of their patriot ancestors, the life and hygiene of the time, some of the famous battles fought in New York State and the weapons used. Chapter President Jim Eagan brought along some historic treasures from the chapter's collection of Revolutionary War artifacts unearthed at the Saratoga Battlefield and purchased nearly 100 years ago.

The teachers encouraged the presenters to share stories about their patriot ancestors, including anecdotes on the

brutality of the war, and information about hard times and difficult living conditions, and regarding the Palatine German immigrants—topics that are rarely touched upon in school textbooks.

The students were fascinated, attentive and excited by what was shared, and the feedback was positive. The chapter hopes this is the start of an annual event and looks forward to visiting other schools as well.

Francis Marion statue dedicated

The city of Johnsonville, in eastern Florence County, dedicated a statue of Brig. Gen. Francis Marion, "the Swamp Fox," at its annual Heritage Festival on May 18, while also celebrating its 100th anniversary.

Mayor Steve Dukes headed this community project. The dedication was about three years in the making as many Johnsonville officials and residents provided financial support.

The 2,000-pound bronze statue, sculpted by Florence artist Alex Palkovich, was erected on the banks of the Lynches River at Venters' Landing off Highway 41/51.

The SCSSAR was represented at the event by President Carroll Crowther, Senior Vice President Dan Woodruff, National Trustee Doug Doster and Compatriots Wayne Cousar and Frank Brown.

The SCSSAR wreath as well as wreaths from the Battle of Eutaw Springs, Col. Robert Anderson and Gov. Paul Hamilton chapters were presented during the dedication ceremony. Sherilyn Woodruff of the SCSDAR presented the Gen. Nathanael Greene DAR Chapter wreath.

Crowther and Marilyn Altman, SCSDAR Past State Regent, brought greetings and gave comments.

On May 25, the South Carolina Society hosted a commemoration on the 233rd anniversary of Buford's Massacre at the battle site in Lancaster County, S.C. SAR members from South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee and Georgia attended.

On May 29, 1780, Col. Abraham Buford commanded some 350 Virginians who fell to attack by Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton. As the Americans attempted to surrender, a massacre followed in which 113 Americans were killed and 150

were wounded. Five British died and 13 were wounded. As a result of the massacre, the battle cry of "Tarleton's Quarter" was heard throughout the Carolinas as Gen. Cornwallis' army was chased to Yorktown and final surrender.

Past NSSAR VPG Greg Ohanesian coordinated the event. Others attending were VPG Steve Pittard, Past VPG Sam Powell, Past NSSAR Chaplain Clark Wiser, NCSSAR President Jim Wood, TNSSAR Past President Bob Hughes, GASSAR Vice President Don Ray Thomas and at least 100 other distinguished guests.

TENNESSEE SOCIETY

On April 19, a formal unveiling ceremony was conducted at the Museum Center at Five Points in downtown Cleveland, Tenn., bringing to fruition the six-year effort by the chapter to erect a bronze statue of its namesake.

The statue unveiling ceremony had been well planned to cover all contingencies, but the weather was one area that did not cooperate on this day. Because of rainy, stormy weather, the program had to be conducted inside the Museum Center at Five Points, with the unveiling itself performed after the weather subsided.

Stan Evans, founder of the chapter, spoke of when he and his wife, Maggie, came to Cleveland, Tenn., 12 years prior. Maggie, who is a descendant of the Cleveland family and knew that the city was named for Col. Benjamin Cleveland, asked if there was a statue of him there. They found other statues but not one of Col. Cleveland. Evans also learned there were no local SAR chapters, so he proceeded to organize the Col. Benjamin Cleveland Chapter, which was chartered on Dec. 5, 2003.

The next speaker, Phil Newman, chairman of the statue committee, told of the long, hard years since late 2007 when the decision was made to create a statue, and of the fundraising efforts hindered by an economic downturn and a wave of tornadoes.

Cleveland Mayor Tom Rowland, also a member of the chapter, spoke and congratulated the chapter on its success with the statue. He read Resolution No. 2013-23 stating the acceptance of the donation of a statue from the chapter.

TNSSAR State President Colin Wakefield presented Stan with the Silver Good Citizenship Medal, and honored Maggie with The Daughters of Liberty Medal. After the benediction and the close of the meeting,



members unceremoniously unveiled the statue in the rain.

Cleveland, a man of valor and courage, was born on May 28, 1738, in Orange County, Va.

In 1778, he was appointed a colonel in the North Carolina militia and elected to the North Carolina House of Commons. He was elected a state senator in 1779. A fierce believer in the patriot cause, he became known as the "Terror of the Tories" for his treatment of them during the Revolution.

In 1780, Maj. Patrick Ferguson, one of Gen. Cornwallis' commanders, threatened to lead an army of Tories across the mountains to crush patriot forces in the Watauga District of east Tennessee. A group of mountain men from east Tennessee decided to strike first! Combining with patriots from southern Virginia and western North Carolina, and later with others from South Carolina and Georgia, the overmountain men converged at 3 p.m. on Oct. 7, 1780, and defeated the Loyalists under Ferguson. Cleveland played a key role in the Battle of Kings Mountain by leading his men on the battlefield. He was one of the primary American commanders in the battle, along with Cols. Sevier, Campbell, McDowell, Williams and Shelby.

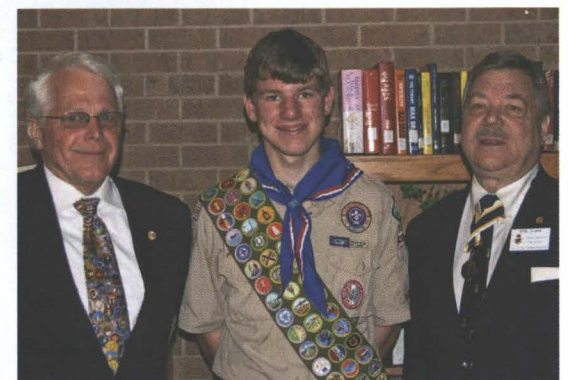
The Tennessee General Assembly has approved the TNSSAR's bill authorizing a license plate that will bear a representation of the historic Gadsden Flag, known for its motto, "Don't Tread On Me." The sample, above right, is a representation and is not the final design. "We believe this will be an especially successful fundraising venture for the Tennessee Society, and we are extremely proud of



the great work of Compatriot Joe Chambers of the Kings Mountain Chapter TNSSAR, who coordinated the effort with his state representative," said Compatriot Rick Hollis. "Some will question why we chose to not include SAR. The simple truth is that it is a fundraiser, and we believe this design promotes a much broader appeal. Once the program is in place, we expect to generate \$30,000-50,000 annually."

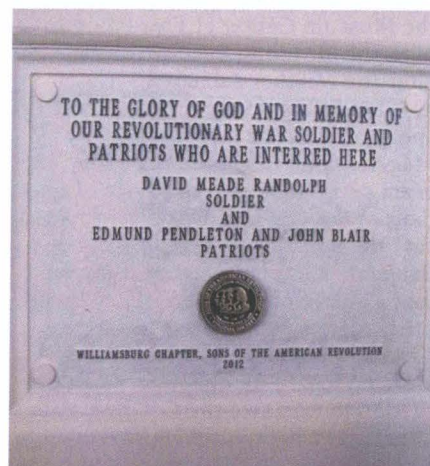

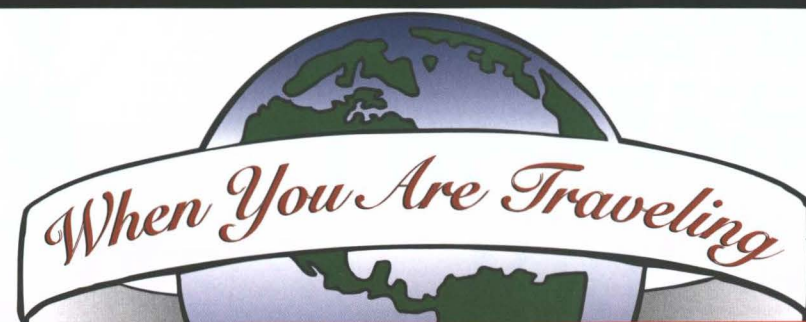
