

Commander's Report

Compatriots,

Fellow color guardsmen,

After almost sixteen months color guard members from twenty-five state societies joined together for our national congress in Renton, Washington. This included Washington color guard commander Neil Vernon and twenty other members of the Washington color guard, for many of them, it being their first opportunity to attend our national congress. Neil joined the national command staff in leading the color guard throughout the congress and did an outstanding job both in performance and working hard behind the scenes to make sure all details were carried out. The color guard's duty started on Sunday with our breakfast meeting, followed by the church service that was held in the hotel this year. With the start of the Congress, the virtual events credit policy was rescinded and is no more. On Monday morning the guard opened congress and, in the evening, we lead guardsman Paul Callanan to receive his color guardsman of the year award. Tuesday, we presented the colors and then retrieved them at the following evening banquet to close the congress. At the closing banquet, Virginia Commander Ken Bonner and past VA commander Bill Schwetke joined the commanders and helped lead two columns of guardsmen through the retirement ceremony. On Wednesday afternoon forty guardsman joined President General Jack Manning and Washington state president Dr. Keith Weissinger in a grave marking ceremony honoring Captain John Noebel Wallingford, a civil war veteran, who was the son of Jonathan Wallingford a veteran of the Revolutionary war. There was a little confusion in the ranks regarding credit for the event for the grave marking medal, which national chairman Gary Green (NC) clarified and in response the color guard gave a resounding chorus of God Bless America to end the ceremony. Although the congress was slightly smaller than in years past, due to the continued effects of the pandemic, it was very well organized and everyone had a good time. My congratulations and thanks to our national conference chairman Paul Callanan and our Washington host society for and outstanding job.

Less than a month later, on Aug 13th, color guard members from many states joined together at the Atlantic Middle States Association meeting in Annapolis, Maryland. District Color guard commander, and past national commander David W. Hoover (MD), lead the color guard in presenting the colors at the Saturday evening banquet. David was awarded the gold Roger Sherman medal from the district for his dedicated work as district commander. Members of the national color guard command staff, including VC Brooks Lyles (INT), 2nd adjutant Robert Meyer (NJ) and myself dressed down as we had to perform other office duties.

On Saturday August 21st, I attended the Battle of Blue Licks ceremony. The ceremony was led by Kentucky president Steve Mallory, with support of state color guard commander Scott Giltner, national quarter master Charlie Scott and many guardsmen and other members. It was very well organized, both prior to the event and in its procession. Members of the DAR and CAR took active parts and there were well over a hundred in attendance, including former PG Lindsey Brock. First adjutant Scott Collins and I were given roles and helped lead the color guard that also included guardsmen from numerous states. Part of the ceremony included a well-orchestrated flag folding ceremony along with many wreath presentations.

I hope to see many of our guardsmen later this month at the fall leadership meeting in Louisville, where we will consider two additional medals for the color guard.


OLOR GUARD NEWS

Three new national events were approved:

- a. Siege of Fort Morris, GA, held in November of each year.
- b. Frederica Naval Action, GA, held in April of each year.
- c. Any Washington Birthday event a National Event.

Two new color guard medals were approved in concept by the color guard committee. One for Youth Participation and one Lifetime service award. The Youth participation award would be for any youth that is not a SAR junior member. There would be no points system, just participation in three color guard events for year for three years. Commander Raborg solicits from the color guardsmen's opinion's on service requirements for the Lifetime service award and funding for both medals. Documentation will be sent to members by mid- November and a Zoom conference call will be set up for a final vote on the criteria before being sent to the medals and awards committee for approval.


REVOLUTIONARY WAR (AMP SANITATION

This article is about sanitation practices in Revolutionary War camps. An often overlooked aspect of soldier's health and safety, sanitation rules were critically important and saved many soldiers and militiamen from agonizing bowel ailments and deadly afflictions. This essay is not for dinner table conversation. Let me be blunt. A lot of men that initially served in the American Revolution left what few sanitation manners they knew back home. When it came to going number one and number two they often behaved like farm animals or woodland creatures. That is until they met a tough Continental Brigade Major or an Orderly Sargent who enforced sanitation rules

Careless men created extremely unclean and dangerous conditions in camps. Many of them viewed outdoor camps as one a big toilet. They relieved themselves wherever convenient. Any tree or bush became a spot to "water the daisies." A fallen tree was a convenient seat for a bare butt. Washington was shocked by what he saw when he took command in Boston in 1775. He singled out New Englanders and commented that they were a "dirty and nasty people" who ease themselves wherever they please. Indians were said to avoid the white man's camp because they fowled the water upstream.

It was not for lack of knowledge that waste disposal practices threatened the army's health. In New York City, where Colonel Andrew Ward and my ancestor, Sgt



William Fowler, were stationed during June and July 1776, General George Washington and his so-called "surgeons" insisted that new latrines be dug and old ones filled regularly. Additionally, they required that trenches be dug and maintained around the camp periphery to channel rainfall runoff away from camp. Smaller diversion channels were required around each tent to insure proper drainage mainly to

keep sleeping quarters dry. Officers and sub-subalterns were responsible to establish and enforce sanitation rules in their regiments. They were ordered to assign enough men to maintain these rules. Sentries were to insure that men actually used latrines. Anyone caught violating the rules was subject to court-martial and discipline. Appropriately, punishment often resulted in the guilty being sentenced to dig and clean latrines. One can imagine that it was a strong deterrant.

During hot weather it was especially important to enforce sanitation rules. In the summer of 1775, Colonel David Waterbury served under the old war horse, General David Wooster. It was at his Harlem Heights Camp in New York City that he learned sanitation rules. By late July, Waterbury's Connecticut Provincials were moved to a less desirable wilderness camp just north of the Mohawk River on the west bank of the Hudson River. It was an old Indian camp located near Half Moon, New York. Waterbury was challenged to maintain sanitation in this camp. It was damp and humid and mosquito infested. Under crowded and confusing circumstances insects, bacteria and micro-organisms multiplied in standing water and at the butcher's waste pile and his men suffered. He did his best but a number of his men ended-up convalescing in private homes in Albany. For months unsafe conditions remained an ongoing impediment to Waterbury during General Philip Schuyler's 1775 Canadian Campaign. By November a large part of the army was sick in bed. Contagion ran ramped (sic). A variety of illnesses occurred in the camps. If even one man got sick it spread like wild-fire because of close quarters. (Enlisted men slept spoon style with five or six in an a-frame tent. Officers slept in more luxurious canvas cabins four to a tent; still too close for safe distancing.)

Improperly cooked food was another source of sickness. Today everyone knows about food poisoning can cause debilitating cramps and dysentery. Proper cleaning and safe cooking practices were well known to soldiers back then. Unfortunately inexperienced cooks and hungry men could easily overlook them. Improper cleaning of utensils was the common cause of so-called "camp fever or flux," ie, diarrhea. It was the job of subalterns and officers to insure that meat, seafood and vegetables were thoroughly boiled.

Colonel John Fellows from Berkshire County Massachusetts, learned rules of sanitation and safety during 1776 while in Boston. At the time, he commanded a regiment of men near Cambridge and Roxbury for several months. During the summer of 1776 he invoked a couple key sanitation rules that he learned at his Chelsea Camp while in New York City the previous year. His orders of August 9, 1776 stated, "...as the health of the soldiery in a great measure depends upon cleanliness of the camp the general directs:

- 1. '... a suitable number of men should be appointed each day to maintain camp boundaries, clean the grounds and dig latrines."
- 2. '... no soldier (should) go into the river for swimming or bathing [betwixt] the hours of 7 in the morn and six in ye afternoon...."

His sanitation workers were called collimen (aka colour' men) and were responsible to inspect, cover and construct new latrines as well as the removal of butchered livestock waste. Presumably the "no-swimming" hours



coincided with the tide, contaminated water and unsafe conditions.

Later in the Fall, General Washington noted that men in his New York camps were were "puking up." In response he ordered that all camps be cleared of discarded offal (butchered waste from livestock) and that latrines be diligently maintained. While contaminated food caused illness the prominent sickness, at that time, was smallpox.

During 1777 at Saratoga, General Horatio Gates, no doubt, tightened up camp cooking rules when two men died after eating stew. A soldier reported that two French doctors found, "...uncooked meat lay like a clod in their stomach..." True or not, it was a reminder to all that meat must be thoroughly boiled before being eaten.

This article by no means enumerates all cases of poor sanitation and camp rules that existed in Revolutionary War camps. Many officers, subalterns and so-called surgeons employed strategies of the day to control sickness and disease. Hopefully this essay informs the reader of typical sanitation measures and practices that were practiced during the American Revolution.

The National Events listed above count toward earning the SAR Silver Color Guard Medal and National Von Steuben Medal for Sustained Achievement (See the NSSAR Color Guard Medals section). Dates published above are of the actual battle / commemoration date. Guardsmen should confirm the actual date of the event listed above with published event invitations on the National Society SAR website or with the host state society.

*A local event celebrating Memorial Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day may be counted as a National Color Guard event for the purposes of applying for a Color Guard Medal. Only a single event on each day may be counted. Multiple events on the same day cannot be counted multiple times. If the event is on a weekend nearest the actual holiday, that can be counted with respect to the single event limitation. For example, if a Veterans Day Parade occurs on a Saturday such as the 8th, then an event on the 11th does not count..

Note: As of the 2020 Spring SAR Leadership Meeting, a policy was adopted by both the National Color Guard and National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committees formally establishing that only the National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committee may designate National Historic Events based on that committee's established criteria. The only exception being that established Color Guard policy of recognizing President General, or his designated SAR General Officer representative, attendance at an otherwise unrecognized event will make that event a National Event. actual event.

ALITTLE ELBOW GREASE

For Compatriot or Patriot Grave Marking ceremonies that involve the Color Guard, something to consider prior to a ceremony is cleaning an existing grave marker. We have Compatriot Marshall "Peachie" DeHaven in the Virginia Society, who maintains a couple of family cemeteries that include Revolutionary War patriots and has cleaned more than 70 grave markers in local cemeteries including veterans, family and friends. He has assisted not only our Colonel James Wood II Chapter, but the local Daughters American Revolution Chapter with cleaning existing grave markers of Revolutionary War patriots prior to grave marking ceremonies with the approval of the local cemetery management.

THE PROCESS

Compatriot DeHaven uses lots of water, a gallon of D2, ¼ cup of Dawn detergent, a soft bristle brush and a little elbow grease for cleaning tombstones.

When it comes to tombstone and monument cleaning, the most important thing with any liquid cleaning material is try to keep it ph neutral.

All household cleaners contain some byproduct like sodium that will do some damage to gravestones.

The real no-no in cleaning a tombstone is a wire brush. This can remove layers of stone and sometimes inscriptions.

Power washing is not recommended. The problems are the amount of pressure and the softness of stone. Damage can happen to the mortars and soft bricks on historic grave stones.

Do not clean a gravestone more than once a year.

Do not clean a gravestone that is flaking, chipped or has loose pieces on it.

D/2 PRODUCT DESCRIPTION:

Fast acting: 10 to 15 minutes contact time.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

Always do a spot test sample before proceeding with the gravestone cleaning. The D/2 cleaning solution works best when air and surface temperatures are $45^{\circ}F$ or above. Use D/2 undiluted for the best results. In the event of plant exposure, rinse all plants with water in all planted ground areas.

Before embarking on any grave-cleaning project, Compatriot DeHaven says, the first step is to get permission if you are working on a grave that isn't a relative's. "If it's your own family, that's one thing. If not, you need to approach the cemetery office or the church if it's a church cemetery. You need to get permission from someone." You also need to assess the condition of the headstone.

If you decide to proceed, you'll need plenty of fresh water so you can rinse away the residue entirely. If a hose isn't available, fill several buckets or gallon jugs. A few gallons of water should be enough for a single grave marker, per Compatriot DeHaven. Also get a few soft bristle brushes. No wire brushes, and no brush attachments for drills. A blue tarp and large garbage bags are needed to cover and protect other grave markers from splashing residue from cleaning.

Completely dampen the stone, apply the cleaning product, then brush away the growth. Rinse frequently as you go and rinse completely when you are done. The stone may still look a little orange (from the D2), but it will probably require more elbow grease.

An earlier article, Graves Of Our Founders: Recent Southern Trip, in the SAR



Magazine, Summer 2018, Lawrence Knobb, Joe Farrell and Joe Farley. "The grave of Gen. Daniel Roberdeau. Continental Congressman & signer of the Articles of Confederation, lies under a well-worn slab without further adornment. Something more must be done for Roberdeau."

Prior to this article, in the Winter 2013-2014 edition of SAR Maga-

zine, the Virginia Society with the Colonel James Wood II Chapter did a joint monument dedication with the War of 1812 Society and dedicated a monument at the Morgan Veteran's Cemetery @ Mount Hebron for 40 Revolutionary War soldiers that included General Roberdeau's name. More than \$5,000 was spent on this monument. Many of the Revolutionary War patriots remains at Mount Hebron Cemetery were in unmarked graves and included members of the Dutch Mess who were part of General Daniel Morgan's original Rifle Company raised in 1775.

The Colonel James Wood II Chapter made the priority at Mount Hebron Cemetery to locate, add gravestones and do grave marking ceremonies for the enlisted and forgotten soldiers of the Revolutionary War. The local Winchester Fort Loudoun DAR Chapter did take up the issue of cleaning up the four Revolutionary War graves of General Officers including General Roberdeau's grave that had DAR markers. The actual cleaning of his tombstone was done by Compatriot DeHaven, (photo included) and members of our VASSAR Colonel James Wood

Chapter Color Guard participated in the DAR Grave dedication cerewith mony, re-enactors from Fort Roberdeau in Pennsylvania. Pleased to say, more was done to improve the gravesite of this Patriot Founder.







SAFETY

Short but to the Point

Bayonets, Swords, Halberds, and Spontoons

Over the past couple of years, I have written about various safety issues pertaining to our involvement in public events. Ranging from the safe handling of our firearms to the safety of our compatriots and the public. However, it occurred to me that one area that I have failed to mention was the safe handling of edge weapons. This is probably because one could assume that the safe handling of edge weapons should be common sense. At this point many of you are thinking that common sense isn't that common. However, I choose to think of this topic as something that we should mention to ensure that all of us handle edge weapons safely.

There are four common edge weapons that com-

patriots may carry or have for demonstrations purposes: bayonets, swords, espontoons and halberts. The most common is the bayonet for the Brown Bess or the Char-

leville. Rifles of this period did not have the ability to attach a bayonet. Swords are probably the next most common with espontoons and halberts occasionally being present at our events. While having a keen blade might be advantageous for an edge weapon in battle, this is not the case for our demonstrations for the public. As our edged weapons are not going to be used in battle they should be "**DULL**" and "**Blunt**".

While the simple rule of not pointing an edge weapon at anyone should be followed, there are a couple of differences with each of our edge weapons that should be discussed. The bayonet was probably the most used edge weapon used during the American Revolution and are commonly seen at our events. The safe handling of the bayonet is paramount for the safety of our compatriots and the public. The bayonets should never be attached when firing your musket. The bayonet should only be fixed to your musket when outdoors. I don't actually know where that rule comes from; however, while in the ceremonial guard we only attached bayonets while marching outdoors. If demonstrating the use of the bayonet in battle and pointed in the direction of a compatriot participant there should be several feet between the bayonet and the participant, I

would recommend at least six (6) feet. The audience doesn't need to actually need to see you stab your fellow compatriot; they'll get the idea.

While the sword is the next most common edge weapon carried by our compatriots it is rarely unsheathed (out of scabbard) unless being carried in a parade at "carry" or during "present arms". At carry the sword is unsheathed and the dull edge or back of the blade is resting against compatriot's shoulder with the point pointing upwards. At carry the sword is reasonably safe, but remember it could be dangerous if the compatriot should trip and fall. During present arms the movement of the sword goes from bringing the hilt of the sword toward the chin with the tip of the sword pointing upward away from the compatriot then moving the sword to a downward position away from the body with the tip of the sword pointing toward the ground. During this maneuver, the compatriot should be aware of their environment and ensure that there is a safe distance between them and others in the area. Again, I would recommend approximately six (6) feet clearance between the compatriot and others.



While few chapters have espontoons and halberts, the safe handling deserves some consideration. For the most part the espontoon and halbert is carried with the tip of each pointing upward and therefore little chance of poking or stabbing anyone. However, when the espontoon or halbert are at "present arm" they are pointed horizonal to the ground and can reach over six feet from the compatriot. Therefore, it is particularity important there is considerable distance between tip of the espontoon and halbert and others in the area. Although the espontoon or halbert should be horizonal to the ground, if based




on the available clearance the compatriot might choose to lower the tip to protect others in the area from inadvertently being poked.

A compatriot dressed in colonial garb and presenting as a <u>chapter</u> member is <u>not</u> functioning as a Color Guard unit. State Color guard commanders should pass on these guidelines when communicating with his state's color guard members.
- The deadline for submission of content is the end of the month prior to the Issue date: December 31 for the January Issue, March 31 for the

- April issue, June 30 for the July Issue, and September 30 for the October issue
- The state Color Guard Commanders should be sending that message to all of their state's chapter color guard members/commanders.
- Please use the chain-of-command when submitting content. Chapter Color Guard Commanders should submit to their state's Color Guard Commander who then uses his judgement to submit to this Editor.
- IMPORTANT When submitting photos, please do NOT embed them into any document (PDF or WORD) but send them in the original resolution.

General David Wooster & Reverend Ebenezer Baldwin Grave Markings - September 18, 2021

BOTH PATRIOTS DIED IN SERVICE TO THEIR COUNTRY

On Saturday September 18 at the Wooster Cemetery in Danbury Connecticut, the Connecticut Line colorguard and members of the Rev. Ebenezer Baldwin Branch No. 9 participated in two

grave markings. The event was sponsored by the local Masonic Union Lodge No. 40 and the DAR Mary Wooster Chapter. The first was for Gen. David Wooster was mortally wounded in the Battle of Ridgefield in April 1777. The second was for the Rev. Ebenezer Baldwin who died upon his return from the Battle of New York in late September 1776. Chaplain Ebenezer Baldwin served with the Militia units from his Danbury parish who fought during the defense of New York. Administering to the soldiers that were extremely sick with disease, an illness that eventually Rev. Baldwin died from on October 1, 1776.

240th Anniversary of the Battle of Groton Heights -September 4 & 5, 2021

On Saturday September 4, SAR members of the Connecticut Line participated in the defense of Ft. Griswold along with re-enactor units from Connecticut, Massachusetts, and New York.

On Sunday the Connecticut Line along with other members of the CT SAR participated in a grave marking of 4 patriots at the Col. Ledyard Cemetery in Groton. After the grave marking the final event of the day was 240th Anniversary of the Battle of Groton Heights which including the reading of the 88 Defenders who killed in the battle, a speech by State Color Guard Commander Dave Perkins on why we commemorate this battle and then concluded with a 3-volley musket salute from the raised platform overlooking the Thames River.

LET FREEDOM RING Ceremony -Sunday July 4, 2021

The ringing of bells celebrating Independence Day was foreseen by John Adams in July of 1776, when he wrote to his wife saying: "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires and illuminations from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forevermore."

On INDEPENDENCE DAY (Sunday, July 4th), starting promptly at 1:45 PM, the First Litchfield Artillery Regiment performed a Let Freedom Ring ceremony at the All Wars Memorial in Bantam, Connecticut

During the ceremony, using two cannons, the First Litchfield Artillery Regiment fired cannon salutes for each of the original 13 States in the order that they ratified the Constitution of the United States of America. SAR Color Guard members carried and presented each flag of the thirteen original states at same time that a cannon fires a salute to each state. At precisely 2:00 PM Eastern Daylight Savings Time, just as the smoke clears from the last cannon salute, nearby church bells began to ring. This is timed so that bells throughout the United States of America ring simultaneously to celebrate Independence Day.

In 1963, two men from this area of Connecticut, Eric Hatch and Eric Sloane, proposed the idea that bells across the nation, including the Liberty Bell, ring out at the same moment on Independence Day each year. Hatch and Sloane's idea was featured in an article entitled "Make Freedom Really Ring" which appeared in the February 17, 1963 issue of This Week magazine. The two Erics obtained the endorsement of Connecticut Governor John N. Dempsey and Abraham Ribicoff, a U.S. Senator from Connecticut. Senator Ribicoff took their idea to Congress and the nationwide ringing of bells, now known as "Let Freedom Ring," was adopted by Congress on June 26, 1963 and recorded as Senate Concurrent Resolution 25 [S. Con. Res. 25].

Also, Eric Hatch was a resident of Litchfield and one of the co-founders of the First Litchfield Artillery Regiment. It was chartered as a private military force of horse drawn artillery under Connecticut Statute Chapter 505, Section 27-102 in July of 1964. Coincidentally, in 1973, Eric Hatch died on Independence Day (as did John Adams and Thomas Jefferson), but not until after the regiment had finished his ceremony that day. The First Litchfield Artillery Regiment has been performing this ceremony for over 50 years now.

On INDEPENDENCE DAY (Sunday, July 4th), starting at 12:00 Noon, the Mary Floyd Tallmadge Chapter DAR hosted a ceremony that honors Gov. Oliver Wolcott, Sr. and Col. Benjamin Tallmadge at their graves in East Cemetery (on East St. / Rte. 118, just west of the Litchfield Locker meat processing building). The SAR, the C.A.R., and the First Litchfield Artillery Regiment participated.

Gov. Oliver Wolcott, Sr. was the 19th Governor of Connecticut and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. He was the second of three generations of Wolcotts to serve as Governor of Connecticut.

Col. Benjamin Tallmadge was a senior intelligence officer under General George Washington and the leader of the Culper Spy Ring. Upon learning that Maj. John André had been arrested with a pass for getting through the American lines and a set of papers detailing West Point's defenses hidden in his stocking, Tallmadge suspected Benedict Arnold to be André's accomplice. Tallmadge's actions led to the exposure of Benedict Arnold's treason. Maj. John André was found guilty of being a spy and was sentenced to hang.



August 2021 Battle of Blue Licks Memorial Ceremony

On 19 August 1782, American Militia under the command of Colonel John Todd with subordinate officers Lt. Col. Stephen Trigg and Lt. Col. Daniel Boone were led into an ambush and defeated by a combined force of American Indians and British Rangers. The battle, one of the last in the American Revolution, took place on a hill next to the Licking River in present day Kentucky. The vastly outnumbered American force of approximately 182 suffered casualties of approximately 72 killed and 11 captured.

The Kentucky Society SAR honored the Patriots killed in the battle with a memorial service held at the Battle of Blue Lick monument in the Battle of Blue Licks State Park on 21 August. After having conducted a hybrid ceremony in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, this year the ceremony was able to return to a full in-person ceremony. Kentucky Society President Steve Mallory served as the master of ceremonies.

Participating in the ceremony were Lindsey Brock (President General 2014-2015), Billie Brock, (President, National Ladies Auxiliary), Jesse Moore (Central District Vice-President General), Lou Raborg (National Color Guard Commander) and Kenneth Scott Collins (Senior Adjutant National Color Guard). Taking part in the ceremony were 27 SAR chapters, 13 DAR chapters, and 2 CAR chapters. Nine SAR state societies were also represented.

The color guard for the ceremony consisted of two fifers, 13 riflemen, and 30 flag bearers. During the memorial ceremony, Past Kentucky State Chaplain Geoff Baggett read the Honor Roll of those Patriots killed in the battle accompanied by the tolling of a bell after each name. During the Honor Roll, members of the rifle/musket team performed the drill 'mourn on arms'. The Patriots were also honored with 58 wreaths laid at the monument and a flag folding ceremony. The ceremony concluded with a flintlock gun salute followed by the sounding of Taps.

Grave Marking for Shadrack McClendon of the 2nd South Carolina Regiment

In Summerville, Louisiana, on September 18, 2021 the Enemund Meuillion chapter of the Louisiana Society Sons of the American Revolution conducted a grave marking and memorial for Revolutionary War veteran Shadrack McClendon of the 2nd South Carolina Regiment. America's Spanish Savior: Bernardo de Gálvez

In 1776, there began a revolution in the American English colonies which affected the future of many people. This American Revolution affected more than just those people along the East coast fighting for selfgovernment. By 1779, it had affected people living in a Spanish colony called "Luisiana."

About 242 years ago, a certain group of people of Acadian descent in Luisiana took a very keen interest in this revolution. When Spain became involved in this war, her old enemy (England) had a strong military force concentrated up the Mississippi river at Natchez. This force, sniffing at Luisiana's northern border, was eager to pounce upon the weak Spanish Province. The Governor-General in New Orleans, Bernardo de Galvez, upon getting the word that war had been declared against England, called to arms her various militia units in Luisiana for help.

One such unit, the Opelousas Post Militia (OPM), responded with great eagerness. This was so because the 100 or so members of this Post was made up of a majority of men of Acadian descent, men who they and their ancestors had been uprooted and deported several years earlier (1755-61) from their beloved homeland of Acadie, Canada.

Thus, in the hot, sweltering month of August of 1779, and just after a horrific hurricane had battered New Orleans and the southern portion of Louisiana, the men departed from their farms and families. They crossed the flooded

Atchafalaya swamp in anything that could float to join Galvez with his small professional army marching up the Mississippi from New Orleans to confront an expected English attack on his province.

They met Galvez at today's St. Gabriel, and from there were involved in the attack of the small, lightly defended British fort at Manchac. Capturing it, Galvez with his little army and his militia forces then headed for the more formidable fort at Baton Rouge, sometimes referred to as Ft. Richmond. That fort was besieged on 20 September and taken the next day. The formal surrender took place on 22 September, 1779. A grateful Galvez thanked his militias, paid them for their service, and sent them home

Galvez, promoted to Brigadier General, then went on to successfully attack the British at Mobile and Pensacola. Some individuals of the various Louisiana militias followed him in those campaigns, but most of the Opelousas militiamen returned home to their farms and families. Today, many people living in southwestern Louisiana can trace their family tree to these militia patriots. You may check the names of these patriots listed on the OPM militia roll listed on this pamphlet and elsewhere



Memorial to Commander Emeritus (1967 1988) Col. Henry Knox Regimental Color Guard, Richard King Thorndike

Family, close friends, colleagues and members of the Col. Henry Knox Color Guard assembled in a service of celebration of life and thanksgiving on the 1-year anniversary of Richard Thorndike's passing on September 19, 2020. Richard was a 50-year member of

the Sons of the American Revolution was personally instrumental in the 1967 return to life of the Color Guard after its disbandment in 1953 at the end of the Korean War.

Born in Boston, MA March 27, 1938, Richard Thorndike was a direct decedent of Revolutionary War veteran Israel Thorndike. His ancestor at the outbreak of the war 1775 joined the Massachusetts Navy. Israel's service to Country continued in 1788, he was a pro-ratification delegate to the Massachusetts Convention on the question of ratifying the newly proposed United States Constitution.



August 7, 2021 - John Outwater Sign Unveiling

The Moonachie Municipal Complex in the Borough of Moonachie was the scene for the recognition of Captain John Outwater with a sign dedication. Captain John Outwater's Company of the Bergen County Militia Regiment was one of twenty-five companies raised by Act of the New Jersey Assembly in 1776. However, due to the demoralizing retreat of the Continental Army across New Jersey after the Fall of New York and the surrounding American positions, it seems the Company did not actually form until early 1777. When the Company was assembled in Hackensack, the Company elected its Company Commanders: John Outwater as Captain; Adam Boyd, Lieutenant, and Abraham Allen, Ensign.

When not repelling raiders or invasions, the company concentrated on interdicting Loyalist trade with the British in New York. Goods for the British were often sent down the Hackensack River and the goods and transporters would be seized by Outwater's men. The Justice of the Peace would then award the goods to the captors. Sometimes Outwater's militia guarded prisoners for the Sheriff.

In December 1780, the State legislature commissioned the Outwater's Company as New Jersey State Troops. State Troops were considered a cut above militia; the comparative stability of their long-term enlistment allowed them to be assigned more important and intensive duties. They served as State Troops through 1781

There is an effort underway, working with the American Battlefield Trust and the Burlington County Battlefield Alliance, to designate a location and monument for the Battle of Petticoat Bridge

Summer Color Guard Events

A small contingent of SAR Color Guardsmen were present in Zanesville, Ohio at the military funeral of a World War Two sailor finally coming home, a sailor killed at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on December 7th, 1941. He was Seaman 1st Class Russell C. Roach of the battleship USS Oklahoma which was capsized and sunk during the Japanese attack that brought America into the war. Roach was among the 429 crewmen who were killed. He was unknown until his remains were identified on Oct. 17, 2019. Roach enlisted in the Navy in 1940 and was only 22 years old when he died. He grew up in Zanesville and was the first casualty of World War Two from Muskingum County. On Wednesday, August 11th, his hease was received by a large crowd of the public and local officials, media, Navy personnel, the VFW and

American Legion, escorted by a large contingent of The Patriot Guard Riders (motor-cyclists) who often attend the funerals of US military members and first responders. Many Roach family members were also present. The day was very hot and sunny. A few American Legion members and a sailor actually faint from standing in the heat. The ceremony was of course solemn, and it was an honor to attend and pay respects despite the heat.

Activities at Hocking Hills Liberty Camp for Kids

Since the establishment of the first Hocking Hills Liberty Camp for Kids in Logan, Ohio in 2015, members of the Hocking Valley Chapter SAR have been involved with the camp's education to children about the American Revolution. The camp was originally established by Director Denise Whalen supported by her family and friends of the nonprofit group 3E Learning Enterprises (Essential Educational Experiences) that taught adult classes on the US Constitution. The camp is

held on the beautiful grounds of the semi-rural Cornerstone Baptist Church, and although Liberty Camp teaches about Christianity in early American history, the camp is unaffiliated with the church. The camp is held during the last full week of July, for three (3) hours each evening between 6 to 9 PM and is full of wonderful experiences for the children, ages 8 - 12, promoting the same goals as the SAR in education, history, and patriotism.

This year the camp was held from July 26th - 31st. Monday was registration and orientation, but the kids immediately learned about the early settlement of America at Jamestown and Plymouth, colonial life and religion, and watched a blacksmith at work and cloth being made with a spinning wheel. Tuesday the children watched Hocking Valley Chapter members perform the "Meaning of the 13 Folds" flag folding ceremony. These same SAR members then taught three (3) 20 minute classes (the children are divided into three groups) on Paul Revere's Ride and events leading up to the "shot heard 'round the world" at Lexington Green. In other classes the children learned about the Declaration of Independence and met King George with his ideas about taxation (the children earn coins throughout

the week, but to their chagrin, King George wants his cut), and they met the "fighting reverend," Peter Muhlenberg. Then lastly, they met Sybil Ludington riding in on her horse warning of the redcoats approach. It might be added that in between classes, the kids learned colonial children's games, sang patriotic songs, and had snack breaks.

On Wednesday the kids met James Armistead Lafayette, a slave who earned his freedom as a spy for the Continental Army. The Revolutionary War came alive with a visit from the 8th Pennsylvania Regiment of the Brigade of the American Revolution (compatriot Bob Hill is a member of this reenactment regiment). The kids were taught about a Continental soldier's uniform and weapons, watched a demonstration on loading and firing muskets as well as a cannon (the cannon firing was a huge thrill for the kids). The kids also learned how to make cartridges and the workings of a firelock.

The kids watched the formal posting of Colors, and learned more about the Continental Army, Militia, and the medicine and instruments of an Army surgeon on Thursday evening by the Hocking Valley Chapter compatriots. Then on Friday the children learned the history of the Star Spangled Banner, the Constitution and Bill of Rights, and the difference between a Republic and a Democracy. On Saturday the children and their parents were introduced to Pastor Ed Bonniwell, a member of the Cincinnati Chapter SAR and Ohio Society Chaplain. Pastor Ed opened with a beautiful prayer and gave an eloquent 45 minute rendition of Divine Providence and its role in our ultimate victory and independence. The pastor then joined his compatriots in a formal ceremony with a musket salute as they planted a Liberty Tree with the children. During a great potluck picnic afterwards, everyone was treated to period music by the Heritage Fife & Drum band. The kids then bought items with their earned coins from the Liberty Store, and two lucky children won bicycles in their selection as "Outstanding Campers."

This year the Ohio Society donated \$500 to the Liberty Camp and it is hoped this support will continue into the future.

Cincinnati Chapter at DAR 250 Patriot Marker

Texas SAR hosts the 2021 South Central District Annual Meeting (MOKAT) In Richardson, Texas

Over the weekend of August 27-28, 2021, the Texas Society of the SAR hosted the annual meeting of "MOKAT" at the Hilton Hotel in Richardson, Texas. So, what is "MOKAT"? Glad you asked. MOKAT stands for Missouri, Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Texas, the states that make up the South-Central District (SCD). The district is led by Texas' own Vice President General (VPG) Larry Stevens, Texas SAR. It was also mentioned that the SCD has been in existence since 1975.

On Friday afternoon, August 27th, five candidates for National SAR offices spoke to the assembled attendees, explaining their qualifications for the position. Those that spoke included Fred Olive, Librarian General; Darryl Addington, Treasurer General; Tony L. Vets, Treasurer General; Gary O. Green, Genealogist General, and Brooks Lyle, Historian General. Each candidate introduced themselves, described their qualifications, and then took questions from the attendees.

The Friday evening banquet was well attended with close to 50 attendees. It was especially gratifying to see several wives in attendance also. Mr. Rob Shenk, Chief Museum Content officer for the National Medal of Honor Museum planned for construction in Arlington, Texas, was the guest speaker.

In addition to an impressive power point presentation about the anticipated physical design of the museum, Mr. Shenk described the ideas that will be incorporated in the design to not only tell the stories of Medal of Honor recipi-

ents, but also to highlight the common heritage around what it means to be patriotic and to "inspire the hero within ourselves." Mr. Shenk explained that the project has raised over \$100 million of the planned \$185 million that will be needed to build the museum, which is expected to open in 2024.

The Saturday morning session included the attending delegates from the five member states of the SCD, along with the visiting National SAR officers and candidates for National SAR leadership positions. The various candidates spoke to the group and responded to questions from those in attendance.

The attendees also discussed the issues of membership retention and new member training ideas, all in an effort to improve retention of those members that join the organization. The consistent theme is that each State should tailor their membership retention programs to match their members and prospective members interests and do what they think will work for the membership of that particular State.

Each State president/representative described the number of chapters in their state, and the total SAR membership for that State. Oklahoma has 5 chapters and 332 members; Arkansas has 10 chapters and 227 members; Kansas has 13 chapters and 958 members; Missouri has 15 chapters, and 790 members and Texas has 48 chapters and 3102 members, with the recent addition of a chapter in Atlanta, Texas. Interestingly, if you add up the numbers from the other four states in the SCD (43 chapters and 2307 members) it is less than the comparable numbers from the State of Texas.



Each year after the parade and dinner, the Medal of Honor personnel are taken to the Gainesville Chamber of Commerce/Convention Center where they meet the public and sign books and photos. I visited with Pat Brady and James Taylor to get their view on the new Medal of Honor Museum to be built in Arlington, Texas. They welcomed the new location and hoped that everyone who visited it would take something away. They said we needed to take the time to read what each receipt did to receive their medal. They suggested that many should consider the military service as a career and obtain a college education.

How does this medal compare to others? It is awarded by the President of the United States of America. It could be compared to the Public Service Awards from the SAR or a SAR member receiving the Patriot Medal. You don't have to go out looking for them; they come to you unexpected. 
