

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Commander's Report

Compatriots,

Fellow color guardsmen,

We have come to the end of a long winter and hopefully the conclusion of the pandemic that has plagued us these last two years. Thankfully as the plague has abated this season has seen more events return with increased live participation. With such, more guardsmen have fulfilled their medal requirements. I approved the following medals for our hard working guardsmen and the support they have received from the ladies. Silver Color guard medals were approved and earned by: Julian Hershey (NJ), James L. Howard Jr. (NJ), Jay A. De-Loach (NC) and Leamon D. Ducan. Von Steuben Medals were approved for William Schwetke (VA), Robert "Bob" L. Anderson (AL), Darryl Addington (TN), David Rasmeur (FL) and Dennis H. Harris (TN). Finally, Molly Pitcher awards for approved for Anita Bonner (VA), Elizabeth J. Collins (SC) and Marika Jane Wesolosky (KY).

In the field:

To start the year, on Sunday Jan.2 I attended the commemoration of the Battle of Princeton with PG Davis Wright, Vice commander Brooks Lyles and Second Adjutant and VPG of the North Atlantic District Robert Meyer. Roger Williams did an outstanding job as MC. Due to an impending storm, commemoration of the Battle of Cowpens had to be moved to Saturday Jan 15th. All four of the command staff, Brooks, Scott, Rob and myself attended. Even though we had a last-minute change of date, over 35 guardsmen from Georgia, North and South Carolina attended. On Feb. 12th I attended the Virginia Societies Annual meeting and presented past Virginia commander Bill Schwetke his Von Steuben Medal, Virginia commander Ken Bonner his Silver Medal and Anita Bonner the Molly Pitcher medal. On Feb 19th, I was with the Philadelphia Continental Chapter for their George Washington commemoration. The guard presented the Colors at Washington Square, Independence Hall and marched to the Museum of the Revolution two blocks south. After a very enjoyable lunch I marched over to Independence Square and spent time with many tourists, posing for photos and telling stories of our founding father and patriots of the period. On Feb 26th 246th I attended the commemoration of Battle of Moores Creek Bridge with North Carolina Commander George Strunk along with VC Brooks Lyles, Adjutant Scott Collins and guardsmen of the NC, VA, GA, KY, MD, IN Societies. While there I Presented Marika Weslosky her Molly Pitcher award. On March 3rd-6th I attended the Spring Leadership Louisville, KY. Unfortunately, due to strong storms coming through the east coast, The Battel of Guilford Court house commemoration had to be cancelled. On March 26th my wife and I attended the commemoration of the Battle of Thomas Creek in Jacksonville, Florida. I Lead Color guard with VC T. Brooks Lyles Jr. and Florida commander Steve Fields. STAYING IN THE RANKS, OUR SENIOR GUARDSMEN

Throughout my tenure as our national commander, I have been asked many questions about the performance of our guard and its participation in our events. Many seek interpretation of our handbook rules and guidelines, to confirm or clarify its many points. Many of the questions deal with the organization of an event and the guards participation including concern for our older guardsmen.

As far as interpretation of participation, standing in the crowd even in uniform and watching an event is observation. I consider any man that is in uniform and marches with the color guard, participating. Although the typical duties for our guardsmen consist of the presentation of the colors, carrying a flag, a musket, or playing an instrument, fife or drum, I still give credit to a guardsman that marches with the guard, without such. He will typically march behind the flag bearers, although the commander may see a better position for him depending upon the space at the event. I also believe, like the rest of the guard, he has an obligation to stay for photos. I take this position based on how we perform in Louisville and Congress. In Louisville we are limited to the number of flags we can post in the ballroom, so we only use the national flags and the first thirteen colonies. At Congress we use all the national and state flags. In both cases there are times when we have more men than flags. Since many of our men fly into these events, not everyone can bring a musket. We allow all men to march, and if we have the space we create a cordon of extra guardsmen, which makes a nice display. We make it work and we thank all men that march with us. Recently, We added drummers and fifers at the Congress in Seattle and in Louisville. Because of the indoor space and safety concerns I purposely kept them in the back of the room when inside. A typical drumbeat can exceed 120dBA and can be painful to some, especially those with hearing aids. An indoor space can also amplify this effect and the harm that may be done.

In many instances I have commanders and guardsmen themselves looking for ways that our eldest guardsmen can still participate. These questions focus on the ability of a guardsmen to stand for a length of time, to march with a flag or carry and raise a musket. As far as not being able to stand for a long period, I stress to many of our senior guardsmen to take their personal health and abilities into consideration. If you need to bring a chair, bring one, sit in the shade, make sure you have eaten and bring water if it is hot. Wait to get in line until you have to. Discuss with the commander beforehand how long you may need to stand. Discuss with the organizer what the guard's duty will be. I am very adamant about organizers using guardsmen as a backdrop for a speaker. The time needed and the weather are critical factors in this. If you have a long-winded speaker that believes the event is an extension of his Sunday service then you want to make sure your guardsmen do their duty and then retire. When it comes to an event that may be extremely hot or cold you want your speakers to have an optional short program and let them know which will be used.

With guardsmen that may be a little unsteady on their feet to march with a flag, I would suggest posting the colors in place and only lead off carrying the American Flag. When the guard gets into position with the posted colors, have the guardsmen do a quick turn to retrieve the colors and present them for the Pledge, National Anthem, America's Creed, etc. and then have them turn to

re-post them. I think in small venues, especially in tight rooms or rooms with platforms and stairs or cemeteries where the ground is uneven, this is a good option. You also do not have to retrieve the colors. Many times, it's advantageous for the taking of photos after the event.

There will however eventually come a time when even the hardiest of us must take a seat and watch the parade go by. We must be content to sit and cheer on the young men as they perform.

After working with OSHA and MOSHA in an industrial environment for the past four decades, I always look to minimize risk to my co-workers. I challenge all guardsmen to look out for their comrades and keep them safe. Keeping our guardsmen safe is my primary concern. Pro patria,

VICE-COMMANDER'S REPORT

The Face of the SAR

How many of you have heard or even used the phrase, "The Color Guard is the Face of the SAR"? Whether you have heard it, used it, or even believe it, it is very true to the public. When we appear in public, we are the SAR. When the public is asked about the SAR what they have seen, remember and talk about is us, The Color Guard. This is truer now than it has been for some time, and while we are trying to raise the public profile of the entire organization, we the Color Guard are at the forefront of that effort.

At this Spring's Leadership Meeting the Executive Committee approved, and the Trustees presented **SAR 2026**, the NSSAR Strategic Planning Committee's Five Year Operational Plan for the organization. This plan is an addendum to the SAR's Strategic Plan which was approved by the Trustees in 2017. The plan states the SAR's Mission for our 250th Anniversary is: "To Become a Major Recognized Voice of the American Revolution by Educating America about our Patriotic and Historic past". It includes seven major goals, the second of which is Patriotic Programs. Below is an extract from the base document:

Goal #2 – Patriotic Programs

Raise awareness of the SAR as a Patriotic Organization and Reenergize America's Sense of Patriotism

Objective 2A: Increase local profile by showing the SAR's Colors.

- 1) Increase state society Color Guard membership by 10% annually.
- 2) Participate in at least one new public event each year.
- 3) Lead by example in your local communities, by Society and Chapter visibility and actions.
- 4) SAR Color Guards will participate in local events and parades
- 5) Present **SAR 250th Flags** to local schools and local organizations at a flag raising ceremonies.
- 6) Present **SAR Flag Certificates** to local organizations and local citizens **in uniform.**
- 7) Establish a Media and Social Media presence in each chapter's community.

There is a lot we can do with this mission; nothing is unrealistic or unobtainable. We need to grow our Color Guard by 10% annually. If a Chapter has 5 Color Guardsmen and they add one that is a 20% growth and you have met the objective. If a Society has 20 members and adds two, that is a 10% growth and they have met the objective. If you participate in one new event each year you have met the objective. If you participate in one school flag raising ceremony and present the school with an SAR 250th Flag you have met the objective (maybe two objectives). These are minimum standards and are meant to establish achievable goals and a road map for the future for those chapters and societies that are looking for guidance or wondering what they ought to be working on. The 250th Anniversary does not start nor end on 4 July 2026. It has already started, and it runs through September 2033, the anniversary of the Paris Peace Accord and the departure of the last British soldier from American soil.

The other thing I would like State Society Color Guard Commanders to start working on is related to the phrase, **The Face of the SAR**. My intent is to put a graphic together that incorporates a map of the United States with an actual image of a Color Guard member, from each state within the outline of their state. It would be a graphic representation of the **Actual Faces of the SAR Color Guard.** But to make it work I need .jpg images from you of a CG Member from your units, in uniform, with at a minimum the state society and the compatriot's names included in the email. Please submit your images to me and Steve Williams. I'm not going to tell you who's picture to submit, it is up to you to choose who best represents your Color Guard.

The National Events listed above count toward earning the SAR Silver Color Guard Medal and National Von Steuben Medal for Sustained Achievement (See the NSSAR Color Guard Medals section). Dates published above are of the actual battle / commemoration date. Guardsmen should confirm the actual date of the event listed above with published event invitations on the National Society SAR website or with the host state society.

*A local event celebrating Memorial Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day may be counted as a National Color Guard event for the purposes of applying for a Color Guard Medal. Only a single event on each day may be counted. Multiple events on the same day cannot be counted multiple times. If the event is on a weekend nearest the actual holiday, that can be counted with respect to the single event limitation. For example, if a Veterans Day Parade occurs on a Saturday such as the 8th, then an event on the 11th does not count...

Note: As of the 2020 Spring SAR Leadership Meeting, a policy was adopted by both the National Color Guard and National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committees formally establishing that only the National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committee may designate National Historic Events based on that committee's established criteria. The only exception being that established Color Guard policy of recognizing President General, or his designated SAR General Officer representative, attendance at an otherwise unrecognized event will make that event a National Event. actual event.



In this issue we have three Tunes that are not AWI Fife &Drum tunes but tunes that I have played at a number of different SAR Ceremonies. They're not used often but they are god to know.

The first tune is the Star Spangled Banner or "To Anacreon in Heaven" which first appeared about 1776 and written by British composer John Stafford Smith. It's not requested often but it is a good tune too know. Adopted: March 3, 1931 as Our National Anthem .


The next tune is Taps. Starting as a French Bugle call, it was used prior to and in the early part of the Civil War - 'General Call 12' - To Extinguish Lights. Union General Daniel Butterfield, thought the call was too formal to be used for 'Lights Out', so he rearranged it by changing some of the notes and their timing, and on a summer night in late July of 1862 in Virginia, those 24 notes were played by brigade bugler Oliver Norton for the first time. The following morning, Norton was visited by several brigade buglers for the




Our third tune is "The President's March" which was composed by Philip Phile to welcome George Washington as he rode through Trenton New Jersey in 1789 on his way to New York for his first inauguration and became the song "Hail, Columbia" when it was arranged with lyrics by Joseph Hopkinson in 1798. By the 1830's, Hail to the Chief was being used more and more for the President and Hail Columbia started to be used for the Vice President as well as being used as a National Anthem.

Note: Hail Columbia was considered one of the first tunes thought to be Our National Anthem from around the world.

SAFETY

Environment and Environmental issues

"We are getting older and the injuries we sustain can cause life changing repercussions".



No, this quarterly safety message isn't going to address climate change. But the environmental issues and the environment in which we find ourselves while representing the Son of the American Revolution. Last month I received an email from our National Color Guard Commander Lou Raborg, prior to the leadership meeting in Louisville, asking me to address the weather issues as it relates to the safety of our Color Guard members. Seemed odd to me as the weather on the west coast wasn't an issue; however, at the time those on the east coast were being impacted by severe winter weather and slips and falls were our commanders' main concern.

Each region within SAR's sphere of influence has different issues relating to weather; our environmental issues. These environmental issues differ greatly between the regions covered by our chapters and state societies.

However, there are a lot of commonalities with each of our environments, the physical areas in which we participate. Environmental issues (weather) and our environment (physical area) affect each of us differently. We have all experienced slip and trip hazards, low obstructions, someone who commits a safety violation by not paying attention to their environment. If we as individuals, our safety officers and commanders identify the environmental issues and the hazards in the physical environment. We can prepare, and reduce injury to the compatriots participating.

There no way to say this delicately. "We are getting older and the injuries we sustain can cause life changing repercussions". In our younger years we had greater toleration of weather changes. Marching in 105-degree heat with 5 percent humidity or 95-degree heat with 90 percent humidity might have been uncomfortable in our teens or early twenties or thirties but not as hazardous as it is now that we are older. As young men if we stumbled while walking, we were able to catch ourselves without a second thought, or if we fell, we would simply get up brush ourselves off and continue. Now as we are older our ability to react to our environment has been diminished; however, situational awareness of our environment and associated hazards allows us to prepare and reduce accidents.

Normally, we all can prepare for some of the environmental issues we face in ad-

vanced of the event based on the expected weather. Identifying weather related hazards in advance of the function such as ice in the winter. And in warm weather realize the necessity to hydrate prior to the event and provide an area for cooling down with water to hydrate after the event.

Although we cannot discount the effect of the weather conditions to our fellow compatriots. It was the slip and fall hazard that Color Guard Commander Raborg was concerned about prior to the Leadership meeting in Louisville. This concern is well founded. Although, slips and falls occur in normal life our participation in events can increase the likeliness of an accident. The following information comes directly from the CDC; https://www.cdc.gov/falls/facts.html.


Fall Facts:

- Those 65 and older, more than one in four will fall
- One out of five falls will cause serious injury
- Falls among adults 65 and older caused over 34,000 deaths in 2019
- Each year over 300,000 adults 65 and older are hospitalized for hip fractures.

The facts sound grim; however, preparation on our part can reduce our being one of these statistics. As we get older our bones become more brittle, our eyesight diminishes, and we don't have the balance we did as when we were younger. Our personal issues can be discussed with our physicians and with their counsel maybe help reduce or compensate for the effects of aging. Although, aging is not within our control, how we adapt to the environmental issues and our environment certainly is. We can identify the hazards and make them known to all of our member prior to the event. These hazards identified are issues we can prepare for and possibly prevent. Dressing for the event based on the expected weather and hydrate if necessary. Walking the route that we will be taking prior to the event looking for hazards. Realize the hazard may be those above our heads; lighting, trees and wires. If you see a fellow compatriot performing an unsafe act or about to enter an unsafe environment - "SAY SOMETHING". We may have identified one individual as the safety officer; however, safety is everyone's responsibility. These are things that are definitely within our control. As patriot Benjamin Franklin said: "If you fail to plan, you are planning to fail."


February...

tion on Nov. 8, 1944. At that time, his body could not be recovered. His remains were identified in July 2021 and interred at Alabama State Veterans Memorial Cemetery.



After having to be postponed due to inclement weather, a "double header" grave marking was performed in Somerville, Alabama on March 19, 2022 in the Tennessee Valley region of north Alabama.

First up, was a celebration for Patriot Electious Thompson at the Russell Cemetery maintained by Pines Church in Madison County, Alabama. Again, not only was the Alabama Society Color Guard on hand but also the Honor Guard was able to pay fitting tribute with a gun salute as bugler played at the closing of the ceremony.



Winding up the day, festivities were able to bring an almost year-long project of tender loving care to the Crawford Ryan Cemetery. Through grants and other donations of time and money, the cemetery was cleared of brush, gravestones were repaired and new life was given a historical landmark which played tribute to not only Patriot William Ryan but also his descendants.





Finishing up the month, guardsmen from all over the state came to the center of Alabama in Montevallo to meet at the American Village. Classes were held in the colonial courthouse to discuss the drill, marching, and color guard standards developed from the historical Manuals of Exercise of Pickering and Von Steubens. 



Commemoration of George Washington's Birthday

The 290th Anniversary of the birthday of President George Washington was commemorated by members of the Gov. Isaac Shelby chapter on 19 February in Middletown, Kentucky. Mr. Kirkpatrick spoke on how George Washington was a mentor and father figure to several key leaders in the American Revolution, such as Henry Knox, Alexander Hamilton, and the Marquis de Lafayette.

Later in the evening, the SAR members honored their Patriot Ancestors for their contributions in the American Revolution. Each SAR member recognized his Patriot Ancestor(s) by reading aloud his Patriot Ancestor(s) name and service provided in the American Revolution. A white carnation was then placed on a ceremonial table for each Patriot. At the end, a total of 53 carnations had been presented in remembrance of those who helped found our nation.

252nd anniversary of the 1770 Boston Massacre, and 246th anniversary of the Siege of Boston.

March 4, 2022 represents 2-anniversaries in the story of the American revolution. It is the 252nd anniversary of the 1770 Boston Massacre, and 246th anniversary of the Siege of Boston. On March 4, 1776 American troops under orders from General George Washington, under the cover of darkness out maneuvered the British Regulars, secured Dorchester Heights overlooking Boston and the harbor. 2,000 men prepared the hilltop for receipt of the cannon delivered from Fort Ticonderoga, NY. The expedition was led by Boston native, Henry Knox.

On the evening of March 4th, the anniversaries were marked by MASSAR Col. Henry Knox Regimental Color Guard with 3-events.

The first venue was Framingham town's old burying ground where the first meeting house stood in 1698 and is the final resting place of 89 Revolutionary War Veterans. They include family members of the Col. Henry Knox Color Guard. The Color Guard laid a wreath and delivered a prayer to the remembrance of the Veterans, followed by a 3-volley musket salute.

For the second venue, the Color Guard marched ¼ of mile to Framingham's Buckminster Square, the location of the Patriot Blacksmith Minuteman statue, complete with anvil. On April 19, 1776, in the early morning mists of that new day, Framingham's Minutemen responded to the alarm and mustered at the Buckminster Tavern, then marched off to meet the British Regulars in what turned out to be a 22-mile-long battle between Lexington and Boston. The statue faces towards Lexington. It commemorates a special less known story in the roll up to the Battle of Lexington and Concord that in turn set off the chain of events ending with the founding of the American Republic.

Author historian, Ray Raphael, wrote of the pivotal role played by Blacksmiths in Massachusetts in the American Revolution. From his book published in 2011 titled ""Revolutionary Founders, Rebels, Radicals, and Reformers in the Making of the Nation" describes how in Worcester, MA, Timothy Bigelow a 33-year-old blacksmith in 1774, organized a trade convention for blacksmiths from the surrounding towns. From this meeting, 43 blacksmiths pledged to no longer do any work for those named as "Tories" whom they labelled as enemies of this country, and to refrain from doing any business with any laborer, mechanic, tradesman or others who did business with these enemies of the country. Further, they encouraged all others including farmers to call meetings in their towns to devise sanctions against their local "Tories." The result was that ordinary citizens began taking leadership roles away from the Tories in their respective local towns. And, by the later part of 1774, these local blacksmiths were preparing for war, turning their shops into armament factories, dividing up powder, mending guns and casting bullets.

At Buckminster Square, the Col. Henry Knox Regimental Color Guard formed a defensive circle around the statue of the Patriot Minuteman Blacksmith. Facing outward, the Guardsmen fired 3 musket volleys in memory of the Minutemen.



Ten Crucial Days Wreath Laying Events December 26, 2021 and January, 2 2022


The Princeton Chapter NJSSAR and the Washington Crossing Chapter PASSAR organized four wreath-laying commemorations during the "Ten Crucial Days" - December 25th to January 3rd. Adjacent to the re-enactments of Washington Crossing the Delaware, the battles of Trenton, Assunpink, and Princeton, the New Jersey and Pennsylvania Color Guard Units were joined by members of Color Guard units from the



Delaware, Virginia, and Maryland societies.

What are "The Ten Crucial Days?" In December 1776, a mere six months after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, General George Washington's fledgling American Army and the cause of liberty were on the verge of being extinguished. A disastrous New York campaign that fall had resulted in the loss of more than half of Washington's troops, as well as the confidence of Congress and his fellow citizens. Retreating through "the Jerseys" with the remnants of his ragtag Continentals, Washington, and his soldiers sought refuge on the west bank of the Delaware River, having narrowly escaped King George III's British troops and their Hessian auxiliaries. Doubling as peace commissioners, British General William Howe and his brother, Royal Navy Admiral Sir Richard Howe, reasoned that further bloodshed was unnecessary. They assumed that the rebellious American soldiers—many of whose enlistments were scheduled to expire at year's end—would no longer be able to offer any significant resistance. Settling into winter quarters, General Howe ordered his regiments to set up a string of cantonments posted through the Jerseys.

George Washington saw something very different... Taking stock of his army's desperate situation, the rebel commander-in-chief would launch his forces into a series of victorious engagements, of which British historian Sir George Otto Trevelyan later wrote, "It may be doubted whether so small a number of men ever employed



The four wreath-laying events commemorating these actions were a tour de force, with multiple hereditary organizations, the military, and local officials represented. Joining the SAR were officers and members of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Society of the Cincinnati, the Sons of the Revolution, local dignitaries, and officers of the military units with lineage to the Battle of Princeton including:

- 2nd Battalion Royal Anglian Regiment B Leicester Company (UK), representing the 17th Regiment of Foot,
- 1st Infantry Division, 1st Battalion, 5th Field Artillery (Fort Reilly, KS), representing the New York Provincial Company of Artillery (aka "Alexander Hamilton's Own"),
- Pennsylvania Army National Guard, 1st Division, representing the Philadelphia Associators, 111th Infantry Battalion,
- Pennsylvania Army National Guard, representing the Philadelphia Artillery Battalion, 103 Engineer Battalion (aka "The Dandy First"),
- Delaware Army National Guard, representing Haslet's 1st Delaware Regiment, the 198th Signal Battalion,
- New Jersey National Guard, representing Neil's Battery, East New Jersey Artillery, the 112th Field Artillery Battalion.

Following the re-enactments were wreath-laying ceremonies at the Washington Crossing Monument, the Trenton Battle Monument, the site of the Battle of Assunpink Creek, and at the Memorial Grove at the Princeton Battlefield. President General Davis Wright,



Vice President General Robert Meyer, and Color Guard Vice Commander, Brooks Lyles, were present for all four events. Color Guard Commander C. Lou Raborg was present for the events on 2 January.

Stay tuned...much bigger plans are in place to commemorate the Ten Crucial Days each year leading up to America250. This year, there will be wreath-laying events on Sunday, Dec. 11, 2022, after the re-enactment of Washington Crossing the Delaware,



January 2, 2022, The Battle of Princeton

On the morning of January 3, 1777, there was an important victory for General Washington's Continental Army. The battle came one week after the famous Crossing of the Delaware and victorious Battle of Trenton, and a day after the Second Battle of Trenton (also known as the Battle of Assunpink Creek) at which Washington and Cornwallis and their men fought to a bloody stalemate from the opposing banks of Assunpink Creek. Under cover of darkness on the night following the battle, General Washington stole a march on Cornwallis, leaving Trenton with 4,600 men to attack the British at Princeton. Soon after sunrise, American and British troops clashed in the fields and orchards just west of Princeton, yielding yet another victory for the newly resurgent Continental Army.

Honoring those who fought in the battle, and especially those who gave their lives, the NJSSAR Color Guard were part of an impressive group of compatriots from the Sons of the American Revolution who gathered from a number of states, with SAR President General Davis L Wright presiding. Other SAR officials playing important parts in the day's observances included National Color Guard Commander Lou Raborg and Vice Commander Brooks Lyles, North Atlantic District Vice President General Robert Meyer and NJSSAR President Charles Morgan. Adding to the pageantry and importance of the occasion, active U.S. servicemen from the legacy units that fought at the Battle of Princeton attended, including from Britain, an officer representing the 17th Regiment of foot. Dignitaries from the Society of the Cincinnati in New Jersey, the Princeton Battlefield Society and others attended as well.

The NJSSAR Color Guard's own Roger Williams, president of the Princeton-Cranbury Chapter, served as master of ceremonies for the day. Other members of the Color Guard present from New Jersey included Color Guard Commander Rich Serfass and Jim Howard (both from the South Jersey Chapter), Jay Hershey and Dave Nelson (West Fields), and Mike Magnum (Somers), Color Guard members from Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Virginia SAR Societies. Also attending were Pennsylvania's SAR President Andrew Lick and Beth Watkins, Regent for the Pennsylvania Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution; Virginia SAR President Jeff Thomas; and T Jeffery Clarke, of the NJ Society Sons of the Revolution.

January 2, 2022, The Battle of Assunpink Creek

The Battle of Assunpink Creek, also known as the Second Battle of Trenton, was a battle between American and British troops that took place in and around Trenton, New Jersey, on January 2, 1777, and resulted in an American victory. Representatives of units who participated in the Battle of Princeton earlier in the day from the Continental Army and the British Army were invited with the following units attending:

- 1. B "Leicester Company" 2nd Battalion Royal Anglian Regiment Rutland, England - representing the 17th Regiment of Foot
- 2. 1st Battalion, 5th Field Artillery, "Alexander Hamilton's Own", FT Reilly KS-representing the New York Provincial Company of Artillery,
- 3. 1st Battalion 111th Infantry. Pennsylvania Army National Guard representing the Philadelphia Associators,
- 4. 103 Engineer Battalion, "The Dandy First". Pennsylvania Army National Guard representing Philadelphia Artillery Battalion
- 5. 175 IN Regiment Association and 1st Battalion 175th Maryland Army National Guard representing Smallwood's Maryland Regiment.
- 6. 198th Signal Battalion. Delaware Army National Guard representing Haslet's 1st Delaware Regiment,
- 7. 112th Field Artillery Battalion New Jersey National Guard representing

February 19, 2022, NJSSAR Annual Washington's Birthday

This was an exceptional meeting with the SAR President General Davis Wright in attendance. He had also honored us by attending our last 4 Color Guard events: Washington's Crossing, Trenton, Princeton, and Assunpink Creek. P/G Davis spoke on the emphasis on July 4, 1776, and the SAR 250th Program

My focus at the meeting, as the New Jersey Color Guard Commander, was to recognize the New Jersey Society SAR Color Guard for an outstanding year 2021. In my report I highlighted that there were 37 members (7 new), that 3 of the 13 State Chapters were designated as Chapter Color Guard units, and that Color Guard Members participated in 29 events statewide (1 in PA).

Additionally, we awarded 3 SAR Bronze CG medals (Sam Davis, Jake Rue, and Roger Williams, 2 SAR Silver Medals (Jay Hershey and James Howard) and initiated a New Jersey Color Guardsman of the Year recognition going retroactively to 2019 (2019 – Richard Blundin, 2020 – Robert Meyer, 2021 – Richard Serfass, and 2022 – Ed Glidden, who also was our nominee for the SAR Color Guardsman of the Year). Jay Hershey and Jim Howard were also promoted to Lieutenant in the NJSSAR Color Guard with responsibilities in the Northern and Southern sections of New Jersey.

Our guest speaker was New Jersey's premier author of the Revolutionary War Larry Kidder. His new book, THE REVOLUTIONARY WORLD OF A FREE BLACK MAN, the story of a free Black man Jacob Francis of Amwell Township, Hunterdon County, New Jersey who was indentured out by his free Black mother to age 21. Jacob enlisted in a Massachusetts Continental regiment in October 1775 and served through the siege of Boston, the New York campaign, and the Battle of Trenton. When his enlistment expired on January 1, 1777, he left the army and went back to his birthplace to find his mother and learn his family surname.

Other items on the agenda of importance were:

- P/G Davis Wright was presented with a "Gentlemen's Cuttoe," a replica of the American Revolution George Washington's Hunting Sword, circa 1775
- The Scouting USA State SAR Eagle Scout award was presented to our first female Eagle Scout, Heidi Kiss. Her brother took the award last year.
- The Board of Managers approved the placing of Grave Markers on the cemetery where Jacob Francis is buried.
- State Chapters were notified of State Funds that selected Revolutionary War sites in their area are receiving leading up to the 250th.
- BOM approved and encouraged recognizing the Navy Sea Cadet and Civil Air Patrol unit of NJ with Bronze Good Citizenship Medals.
- William Schultz was recognized for years of service as the State Boy Scout Coordinator.



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


Silver Color Guard Medal Awarded

Grave Marking Stephens City

On 19 March 2022, the Colonel James Wood II Chapter of the Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution cosponsored a grave marking ceremony with the Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in Stephens City. The ceremony commemorated the memory of the five Revolutionary War Patriots buried in the church cemetery. John Nicholas DeLong was born 19 Jul 1756 at Bowers, Berks, Pennsylvania, the son of Johannes Delong and Maria Katherina Dussinger. He was married to Elizabeth Margaret Goose about 1778. He was listed in the census of Frederick County in 1782 and was taxed in Winchester in 1785. He and Elizabeth had 10 children. John Nicholas served as a Private in Captain Smeck's 5th Company,

2nd Battalion, Berks County Militia, Pennsylvania. He died 21 Feb 1823. John Grim/Krim was born October 1755 and died 19 April 1840. He was married to Juliana Mainzer. In 1776, he volunteered as a rifleman in Andrew Bare's Company in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He fought in the Battles of Staten Island, Trenton and Ft Washington. He was among the troops who marched captured Hessians from Trenton to Philadelphia. He then joined the "Flying Camp". a unit created to reinforce the Continental Army on an emergency or temporary basis. He lived in Rockingham County until finally settling in Frederick County around 1811. Jacob Kline was born 23 August 1736 in Zweibrucken, Germany. He was the son of Nickolaus Klein and Maria Eva Klein. He came to this country when he was sixteen years

old with his parents and settled in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. In 1759, he married Anna Eva Dyusong in Lancaster. In 1764, they joined several other families and moved to Frederick County, Virginia, where he was a farmer. In 1773 he bought a farm on Spring Run and with Eva had 11 children. Eva died in 1815 followed by Jacob who died on 27 August 1816. During the Revolutionary War, he served as a Private in the German Regiment of the Continental Forces. John Krider, Jr was born 1754 and died 1814. He was married to Mary Krider and served as a Private in the German Battalion. Nicholas Samsel was born 2 May 1749 in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, the son of Johann Paul Samsel and Catharina Borm. He married Anna Elizabeth Ott, 26 August 1770 in Lehigh County, Pennsylvania. They were the parents of nine children. During the Revolutionary War, he served as a Private in the 7th Company, 2nd Battalion of the Northampton County, Pennsylvania Mili-

tia. At some point after the end of the war, he migrated to Frederick County, Virginia. Nicholas died in Frederick on 4 November 1817 followed by Anne in 1827. The ceremony was conducted at the Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church Cemetery, emceed by Dale Corey. The Virginia State SAR Color Guard commanded by Brett Osborn presented the colors, followed by greetings given by Virginia Society SAR President Bruce Meyer, Virginia Society Children of the American Revolution Sara Cox, Virginia Order of Founders and Patriots of America Governor Michael Weyler, Stephens City Mayor Michael Diaz and Pastor Janice Marie Lowden. A dedication to the graves was presented by Corey and Pastor Lowden with the monument uncovered by compatriots Marc Robinson and Will Reynolds. Family presentations were given by Kathy Nibley accompanied by her husband Reed Nibley and her brother Rob Preston accompanied by his wife Kathryn Preston, descendants of John Krim. Mary Ann Vaughn,

accompanied by her daughter Laurie Bassler and grandson Nicholas Bassler, descendants of Jacob Kline. Wreaths were presented by President Meyer, President Cox, Governor Weyler. Additional chapter wreaths were presented by President Thomas "Chip" Daniel (Colonel James Wood II), Vice President John Thomas (Fairfax Resolves), compatriot Paul Cox (Colonel Fielding Lewis), Vice President Leamon Duncan (Colonel William Grayson), Past President Ken Morris (George Mason), VASSAR 1st Vice President Ernie Coggins (George Washington), Vice President Barry Schwoerer (Sgt Maj John Champe), Deborah Corey (DAR John Alexander), Anita Bonner (DAR Lanes Mill), Anna Cox (C.A.R. Colonel Spotswood Alexander Society) and Kathy Nielsen for the family. A three volley musket salute was provided by the Virginia State Color Guard Musket Squad prior to the retirement of the colors.
