250TH ANNIVERSARY EVENTS SAFETY PLANNING

As we continue to move forward in the celebration of 250th anniversary events, the national Society has developed an overall general plan in the organization and implementation of upcoming events. As such, these plans boil down into two categories, Increased participation in current events and the establishment of new commemorations. In both cases, multiple plans need to be developed to ensure success of the event. One of the first plans that need to be developed is a comprehensive safety risk analysis. This will answer many questions, that in turn will drive additional plans to make the event a success. Will attendance be of considerable size that regulated parking is required? Crowd control? Medical/ EMT support? Police? Permits? Utilities/Sound System? Internet/WiFi Coverage? Media? Sanitation? etc. etc. Do we have these resources available in our organization? Do we need to reach out to local authorities? private companies? The Social changes that have occurred and continue to develop demand that we take a closer look at how we plan events.

A part of the general plan calls for an increase in color guards and their participation in current and newly planned events. In doing so we must consider the four greatest inherent risks to the Color Guard, members, and guests. These include the firing of weapons, slips, trips and falls, environmental and ergonomic risks and overhead dangers.

This is the first article that will address the planning of a national event in which the color guard will be taking an active part. These guidelines may also be used in support of state and chapter events. In planning any event, a safety risk assessment is vital to minimize risk and keep those attending safe. In developing such a list, the following questions help identify risks that may be present. The answer with the least risk is shown

Firing of Weapons

1. Do we have the minimum distance to fire? 150 feet Y
2. How many will fire?
3. What is the condition of the ground in which they are to fire?
Has the weather been dry? N Are there any water restrictions declared? N
4. Can the sound of the volley be amplified? N
(Exposure to noise greater than 140dB can permanently damage hearing. Almost all firearms create noise that is over 140-dB level. A small caliber rifle can produce noise around 140dB, while large bore rifles and pistols can produce sound over 175 dB. Firing weapons in a place where sound can reverberate off walls and other structures may amplify sound levels and increase the risk of hearing loss.)
5. Will a mortar or cannon be used? What is your minimum setback? Do you have crowd control barriers? Y
6. Who is the designated safety officer?
7. Has a weapons check been done? ping test? flash guard? hammer stall? Y
8. Is anyone wearing a polyester uniform? N
9. Have all those that are firing been trained? where? when? Y

Slips trips and falls

Is this an indoor or outdoor event?

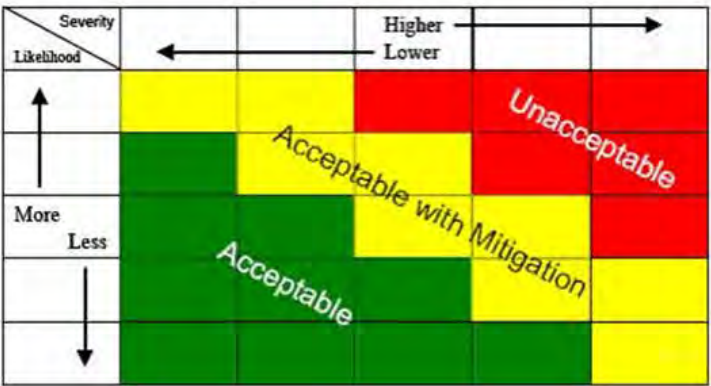

Overhead Hazards

4. Are there any ceiling fans? chandeliers? N
5. How high are the ceilings? How high are the flag poles?
6. Any bulkheads?
7. Will the color guard be marching through doorways? how high are they?
8. Are there any trees?
9. Are there any additional overhead hazards? N

In the development of any risk assessment, it is important that all parties involved be a part of the process. In this case, this should include the organizer, the color guard commander, safety officer and any others that may take an active role in the event. Part of completing the assessment then assuring that steps are taken to mitigate or eliminate the risks. There are several ways to do this including the development of a spreadsheet, that not only lists all the questions, addresses mitigation responses for the risks but also assigns a risk level to each area of concern. There are many types of these charts that help more clearly identify the potential severity and likelihood of the risk.



It is important to note, that although many of these questions do not pose a serious risk, a combination of several can. Reducing much of the risk is reducing the time duration. Many guardsmen can stand for 30 minutes but when you add marching in a parade in the sun for an hour in 90 degree weather, that is a very high risk.

There are many programs that educate safety principles. Swan in one such example.

- S- Safety is everyone's responsibility
- W- We care for each other
- A-All accidents are diminishable
- N-Nothing we do is worth getting hurt for

In fulfilling our objective to honor our patriot ancestors and educate our members and the public we must not endanger the health and well being of our members and those that attend our events. If we take time to consider our guests safety and comfort, we create events that they will want to attend and return to.

At the George Washington Tomb vigil, It is the steep grade going down and the brick pathway to the Tomb that plays a big part in the risk at the commemoration. Last year a guardsman fell on the pathway, severely injuring his hand. Some years, the heat and humidity can also hamper efforts. We are fortunate to get guardsmen come from all over to participate, some driving all the way from Michigan and Texas.



At the Cowpens commemoration, the march is short with a small incline on concrete. This year however the weather played a factor and the commemoration had to be moved because of a large snow storm that was forecasted the next day. The colorguardsmen did an outstanding job adjusting their schedule and despite a unfounded rumor that the guard size would be limited in size, over thirty five members came out to participate, mainly from the Georgia and North Carolina color guards.

VICE-COMMANDER'S REPORT

We are coming to the end of a successful two-year command tour for National Color Guard Commander Lou Raborg, and the entire National Color Guard Staff and I would like to thank him (and Becky) for his service, leadership, and miles and miles of travel in support of the National Color Guard, over these two very challenging years.

In Commander Raborg's last write up as commander, he addresses safety and the safety issues that color guard commanders on the local levels: chapter, society, and event, need to be aware of to ensure they conduct events that are both safe and fun, not only for the public, but for the color guardsmen themselves. He also sets the stage for a series of articles to come, written in coordination with the National Historic Sites and Celebrations Committee, that address how best to plan and conduct National Color Guard Events. Future articles will address: Planning Timelines and Checklists, How to advertise an event, Online Signup/Registration programs, Inviting the President General and VIP Protocols, and where to find guest speakers. Let me know if there are any other topics you want addressed.

I have had the honor to participate in many Color Guard events, both national and local, since the last edition of our Color Guard Magazine including the Anniversary of the Halifax Resolves (N); the Private John Ford Grave Marking; the Captain James Martin Grave Marking; the Mec-Dec Day Celebration in Charlotte; the Vincennes Rendezvous (N) and the Battle of Ramsour's Mill (N). This Monday I will march for the first time with North Carolina Color Guardsmen in front of an expected crowd 20,000+ in the Faith Fourth of July Day Parade in Salisbury, NC.

Coming up immediately after the Savannah Congress there will be National Color Guard Events in Ohio, Kentucky, New York, Connecticut, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, and New Jersey. I'd like to hear/see something from the Color Guard Commanders of each of those states about the dates and plans for their events, and I'd like to see notices posted in the Color Guard Magazine, on the sar.org website, on the host society websites and on sar.officer.net to include the dates, times, locations (w/GPS programmable addresses) and agendas for the events. The only way to increase participation is to increase people's knowledge of the events. They truly are not national level color guard events unless you advertise them, invite national officers, and have more than just your local chapter color guard there in support. We have a mission to expand the visibility of the organization and it starts here and now.

And regarding "The Face of the SAR" that I mentioned in my last article, I have received exactly one photograph of a Color Guardsman for the "Face of the SAR" graphic we are trying to put together, and that was from the Texas Society. Thanks to the Texas Color Guard Commander(s) and now, how about the rest of you get that picture of that guy, who is the face of your color guard submitted so he can be recognized, and we can finish putting the graphic together.

The National Events listed above count toward earning the SAR Silver Color Guard Medal and National Von Steuben Medal for Sustained Achievement (See the NSSAR Color Guard Medals section). Dates published above are of the actual battle / commemoration date. Guardsmen should confirm the actual date of the event listed above with published event invitations on the National Society SAR website or with the host state society.

*A local event celebrating Memorial Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day may be counted as a National Color Guard event for the purposes of applying for a Color Guard Medal. Only a single event on each day may be counted. Multiple events on the same day cannot be counted multiple times. If the event is on a weekend nearest the actual holiday, that can be counted with respect to the single event limitation. For example, if a Veterans Day Parade occurs on a Saturday such as the 8th, then an event on the 11th does not count..

Note: As of the 2020 Spring SAR Leadership Meeting, a policy was adopted by both the National Color Guard and National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committees formally establishing that only the National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committee may designate National Historic Events based on that committee's established criteria. The only exception being that established Color Guard policy of recognizing President General, or his designated SAR General Officer representative, attendance at an otherwise unrecognized event will make that actual event a National Event.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

In many ways, the Long Knives Chapter from Southern Illinois is most fortunate. We have over a dozen Compatriots that are available to assist in various Color Guard functions, be it Parades, Flag Retirements, Grave Markings, National Holidays, Cemetery Markings, or other significant Events. To keep our Unit “sharp”, training is an important aspect. Whether it is marching drills, Von Steuben’s Manual of Arms, safely loading and discharging our muskets, or even “praying in formation”, we practice our maneuvers. Recently, The Long Knives Chapter has added cannons to its available arsenal of appropriate tools for Salutations and Memorial Services. The Long Knives now currently have three cannons ranging from three pounders to sixteen pounds that are privately owned by our Compatriot members.

To safely and legally operate and fire our cannons, extensive training is required. Certified black powder cannon instructors use curriculum developed by Commander Everett Rhine of Rock Ridge Artillery and John Hill, Keeper of the Magazine, of Colonial Williamsburg to present the lessons. Every Compatriot Artillery School attendee participates in a two hours of classroom instruction. A written test is then required to be “passed” before the class advances to “hands on” dry fire drill. All participants are required to practice at each of the five cannon crew stations several times. When all of this practice has been completed safely to the satisfaction of the two instructors, the cannon is wheeled out side to the firing range. Blanks are fired, never projectiles! Each artillery student then will use live black powder to demonstrate mastery of technique. Once again, every student practices at each of the five different gun crew stations with the gun firing blank rounds at each location. All students are trained in every gun crew assignment.

Students perform to the Gun Commander’s instructions:

- Advance the Worm, Worm the Piece (x2),
- Advance the Sponge,
- Attend the Vent,
- Sponge the Piece (x2),
- Handle the Charge,
- Ram down the Charge,
- Pick the Vent,
- Prime the Vent with Fuse,
- Make Ready,
- Prepare to Fire,
- FIRE, and repeat until it is time to
- Retire the Piece, and
- Dismiss.

The Long Knives are proud of the fact that we now have eleven Artillery Certified Compatriots and the cannons to assist our fully qualified musket Color Guard.



EDITOR’S CORNER

I am happy to see a short submission for the Dakota Society - a first time!! Welcome and I hope to be getting something for the October issue, too.

I really enjoy seeing the many events and activities that are submitted. It’s obvious that these color guard commanders are wanting to highlight their state’s color guardsmen and how well they are promoting the S.A.R. To some degree I envy those members taking part in these interesting events.

In the previous three months I kept an eye on the FACEBOOK page “Sons of the American Revolution” and noted several color guard activities in states. I sent out a message to the state Color Guard Commanders with the number of times that there were postings of their activities in hope that I would be getting many of those activities submitted for this issue. What happened? Only a few of those events were submitted. I’m not sure why someone can put the event on FACEBOOK and not have it for this magazine. I see many states have events but don’t submit, i.e., AZ, GA, IL, MA, MN, OR, PA, SC. Then states that had numerous events only sent in one or two. If you look at this issue you’ll see that a few states have pages and pages of their events listed. So encourage the state commanders to keep abreast of what your color guard units are doing and urge them to report to you so you can understand how successful the color guard is in your state - and report those successes to me for inclusion here.

Now on a different tack. One way to keep from falling into one of the following holes is to read the Submission Guidelines at the end of this issue. Perhaps print that page out and keep it handy for the next issue’s submission.

One state’s large submission took me 5 hours to work through text and photos to place the events into a, hopefully, coherent aggregate. Another, smaller submission took 2 hours. The problem was basically not following my submission guidelines for sending in Photos with the identifiable naming convention and having the text for the event using the photo name. A few submissions sent a document with several paragraphs listing the all activities without a clear name of the event - or answering the 5 questions below. Then what is hard for me is that there was no indication in the paragraph which photo went with that paragraph. A couple submissions were missing photos which makes it real hard when I have to edit the text for it make sense.

Another issue needing an explanation is that of chapter presentations. Too many times I will get an event description and photo(s) for Chapter X presenting a JROTC, Eagle, Rumbaugh, etc certificate/medal. These events ARE worthwhile and I am glad that the chapters are thus engaged in our youth and promoting the S.A.R. However, these are NOT color guard activities/events. Especially when it’s a chapter officer and not the Color Guard making the presentation. These type of events are perfect for the SAR Magazine but not for this publication. I expect to get messages from submitters asking why their event wasn’t listed. The above explains why it’s not in here.

If your color guard is active in something when you write it up for me make sure that in the text you specify what that (state) color guard did for that event: present the Colors, marched, laid wreaths, etc. Too often, what I get is the several names of chapter members who were at the event with no indication that they were/are part of the color guard and performing as such.

What readers will likely need to understand about your events are the answers to the basic questions: Who? What? Where? When? and Why? of these events. If you can answer most of those questions readers (and I) will get much more out of your color guard stories.

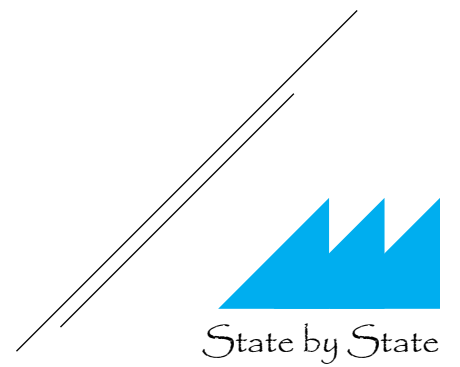
7. It was announced that the 2022 National Society Color Guardsman of the Year was George Strunk of North Carolina.

247th Patriots Day Parade in Concord, MA

On Sunday April 17 several members of the Connecticut and New Hampshire color guards started to arrive in Concord to be able to get a good evening meal and some good sleep before Monday morning. But it being Easter our usual choice the Colonial Inn closed earlier than normal. So, I found myself (Dave Perkins) along with PG Wright

and MASSAR State President Ed Hoak having dinner in an Asian Fusion restaurant. Food was great and the conversation and stories were excellent!

By 8:30am on Monday we were all arriving at the Keyes Street public parking area and prepping to walk over to the muster location for the start of the parade. When we reached our spot in the parade formation area, the temperate was cool, and the sky was sunny, and so another Patriots Day parade was soon to begin. By the time we stepped off, we numbered eight compatriots from Connecticut, New Hampshire and Massachusetts. It was a good time had by all! 245th Battle of Ridgefield and Funeral Procession

2022 marks the 245th Anniversary of the Battle of Ridgefield, an important Revolutionary War action fought on the very roads and paths of Ridgefield, CT that are universally used today. The Town of Ridgefield and Ridgefield Historical Society celebrated the occasion with a full weekend of events, turning back the clock, and bringing the history and characters of the time alive, as well as introducing new important discoveries regarding the Battle. This year, the anniversary events of the Battle of Ridgefield are enlightened by the December 2019 discovery of four human skeletons from the Revolutionary War period, which were uncovered during renovation of an antique home in the center of town. This discovery and the subsequent research made possible by a grant awarded to Ridgefield Historical Society by the National Parks Service American Battlefield Protection Program has brought renewed and intense interest to the Battle and made this anniversary celebration particularly poignant.

American forces were encamped at the South end of town and British forces were encamped at the Northern end of Main Street for two nights. A select group of the SAR Connecticut Line fully participated in the reenactment battle on Saturday along with 200 other reenactors, which included cavalry and artillery units. The battle followed the 1777 route through the center of Ridgefield along Main Street lasted about 2 hours. Downtown Ridgefield looked like a scene out of a history book as the 5th Connecticut Regiment and others reenacted the only inland battle fought in Connecticut during the Revolutionary War. The huge crowd of spectators who lined both sides of Main Street were transported back in time 245 years to the exact place where the Battle of Ridgefield raged. The series of skirmishes between American and British forces looked real, with cannons fired, soldiers on horseback, and some who fell to the enemy. There was even a barricade erected where American Militia, led by Generals Benedict Arnold and Gold Selleck Silliman met the British, hoping to keep them from retreating further south. A cannonball fired by the British, a stark reality of the fierce battle, remains lodged in Keeler Tavern today.

The Battle of Ridgefield 245th anniversary events are highlighted by the fact that skeletal remains of Revolutionary War soldiers from the battle were found in the downtown area in 2019 and early 2020. [Read more about the skeletal remains on the Ridgefield Historical Society website.] On Sunday, May 1, those remains were part of a funeral procession and ceremony, rooted in the traditions of the late 1700s. The Battle of Ridgefield Ceremonial Salute began at Ballard Park at 11:00am. The combined forces formed a funeral procession along Main Street and slowly marched to the Titicus Cemetery accompanied by horse drawn wagons carrying four wooden caskets. Following a brief ceremony at the cemetery and a 3-volley combined musket salute, the combined forces returned to their encampments and concluded the weekend's events.

Thank you to the Ridgefield Historical Society, the Town of Ridgefield and members of the 5th Connecticut Regiment and The Brigade of the American Revolution for all that you did to make the 245th Anniversary of the Battle of Ridgefield one for the history books.



247th Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill

As in 1775, men from Connecticut made the journey North to fight alongside their colonial brothers. 2022 marks the twenty sixth year in a row, members of the Connecticut Line participated in the commemorative exercises in Charlestown, Massachusetts on Friday June 17th along with members of the NHSSAR, MASSAR and Missouri Color Guards. Due to a scheduling change, the usual 10:00 am memorial service at the Church of St. Frances de Sales and parade up to the Bunker Hill Monument grounds were canceled. Ceremony was moved to 3:00 pm. Prior to the ceremony starting, the NPS preformed a safety inspection, and each man was allowed to use their own cartridges if 2F black powder. The color guard from the USS Consti-



tution "Old Ironsides" presented the colors, and then greetings from the National Park Service, Boston City Council, British General Consul of Boston, MASSAR State Vice President and several others. Special guest speaker was B. J. Farrell, Commander of the USS Constitution. At the conclusion of all the greetings and songs, the color guard provided a three-volley musket salute. After the playing of taps, the combined SAR Color Guards marched to each of the four gates and society wreaths were placed at the Connecticut, New Hampshire and Massachusetts gates to commemorate the men who fought at the battle from those states



Patriot Grave Marking for Cpl. Samuel Jackson awarded Badge of Merit

On the 14th of May 2022 at the Old Bethlehem Cemetery in Bethlehem Connecticut the Gov. Oliver Wolcott, Sr. Branch celebrated and recognized the military service and the awarding of the "Badge of Merit" by General Washington to Cpl. Samuel Jackson of the 1st Company, 3rd Regiment, Connecticut Line, Continental Army. A bronze plaque sponsored by both the SAR & DAR was unveiled at the base of his headstone, commemorating his many years of service in the Continental Army which included Valley Forge, Battle of Germantown and Battle of Monmouth.

The ceremony also recognized the services of four additional American Patriots. The ceremony included representatives of the State SAR, Connecticut Daughters of the American Revolution, the local American Legion, the Bethlehem Historical Society, the Museum of the American Revolution in Philadelphia and state and local government representatives.



An educational encampment at the local Bellamy Ferriday house and garden, a Connecticut Landmarks property that is within ½ mile of the cemetery; provided an opportunity for the local elementary school to learn what life was truly like in the late 18th century.

Four Patriots that were honored are: Pvt. Ebenezer Bird, who fought at the Battle of Brooklyn Heights; Sgt. Moses Knapp, swore an oath of allegiance; Pvt. David Leavitt, swore an oath of allegiance; and Sgt. Nathan Burton, who swore an oath to uphold and defend their Liberty's and Freedoms fourteen days after the Declaration of Independence had been signed and who fought at the Battle of Brooklyn Heights.

The Connecticut Line presented the colors and provided a 3-volley musket salute following the placing of wreaths and flags at each of the five patriot grave sites within the cemetery. Compatriot Peter Stothart was the host for the ceremony, and the event planner was Compatriot Mike Bird.



Naugatuck Memorial Day Parade

One of the largest Memorial Day parades in the state is held in the town of Naugatuck, an old mill town along the Naugatuck River. This year six members of the Connecticut Line were in the fourth division. The crowds were large and loud, with great applause with every musket volley we fired. As we passed under the steel overpasses for Route 8 of which there were several, we fired our muskets and the reverberations made for tremendous noise, pleasing the large crowds. By the end of the 2-mile parade route we had nearly emptied our cartridge boxes, about 25 rounds per man and our muskets were very hot and abso-

lutely filthy. Following the parade, the host organization (Town of Naugatuck) provided free food and drink to all the participants. The Connecticut Line received a \$300 donation from the event organizers, which be used to offset the cost of our insurance. The six color guardmen were David Perkins, Dan Dudley, Derek Brockhoff, Martin Spring, Bill Spring and Peter Stothart. 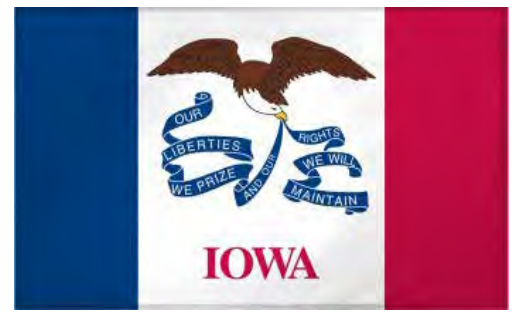
Florida Color Guard

MICHIGAN -

West Michigan Chapter Patriot grave marking

The Michigan Society of the Sons of the American Revolution was organized January 10, 1890, in Detroit, with ten members. And on October 11, 1897, first marked the grave of Patriot Hero Colonel John Francis Hamtramck. Born 1754 and at age 49 died in 1803. We are here today, with our DAR sisters, to rededicate the grave of this Hero.

Hamtramck joined the cause at age 19 in 1775 and joined General Montgomery's forces into Canada where he was taken prisoner at the battle of Quebec and joined Benedict Arnolds defeated forces as they left Canada. And given the rank of Captain.

In 1779 he led his 7th Company, 5th New York Regiment in August and fought in the Battle of Newtown. And that Winter Camped in Morristown with the rest of the Continental Army.

In February 1780 signed a petition with 65 other officers regarding the depreciation of currency. It asked that either their pay be increased, or their resignations accepted. Washington acknowledged their situation but refused to accept their resignations.

In October the regiment was sent to reinforce West Point, after having spent the summer marching through New Jersey and by this time Arnold's treason had been discovered.

July of 1782 his regiment marched to the siege of Yorktown where Hamtramck's company was the first to occupy an American trench parallel to the British defenses. Under Major Nicholas fish Hamtramck led his company in Hamilton's assault on Redoubt 10.

He completed his muster and dismissed his company on May 2, 1783. Without a home he remained in New Windsor and was denied permission to remain in the army. June 3, 1783, he was brevet promoted to Major and discharged.

On April 12, 1785, Hamtramck was called back to service an appointed as a Captain. Serving in the First American Regiment (the only standing army remaining from the Continental Army of the Revolution).

He was sent to Fort Pitt in 1786 and in October promoted to Major and constructed Fort Steuben which later became Steubenville Ohio.

In 1787 he traveled west with General Josiah Harmer to Illinois making a treaty with local tribes. Hamtramck took command of Fort Patrick Henry and constructed a new fort which was named Fort Knox, after United States Secretary of War Henry Knox.

1789 Hamtramck became the de facto government in the Vincennes region and in 1790 married Marie Josephe Edeline and had 3 daughters. As a reward for his service in the American Revolutionary War he chose bounty lands on the Wabash and Illinois Rivers.

Between 1790 and 1792 Hamtramck commanded his men at the Battle of Fallen Timbers along with many encounters with local Indian tribes. Returning to Vincennes he negotiated peace with the native nations of the Illinois Country.

In 1793 he was relieved of command of Fort Knox and ordered to Fort Washington where he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel Commandant of the 1st Sub-legion in the Legion of the United States, to secure the Northwest Territory.

The Passing of MOSSAR Colorguardsman Francis (Frank) Chandler Furman

On June 14, 2022 Francis (Frank) Chandler Furman, a long-time resident of Rolla, Missouri, died in Pleasanton, Kansas, on June 14, 2022 after an extended illness. He was born on February 3, 1955 in Washington D.C. to the late Greene Chandler and Martha (Morrow) Furman of Chevy Chase, Maryland. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in geology from Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois and a Master of Science degree also in geology from Bowling Green State University in Ohio where he was inducted into Sigma Gamma Epsilon, the national honor society for the earth sciences. After working as a geologist for Texaco in Louisiana Frank resumed graduate studies in geology at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville and the University of Missouri-Rolla (now Missouri University of Science and Technology). Frank's scientific work mainly focused on the geology and geochemistry of shales, carbonate rocks (limestone and dolomite), and lead, zinc, and copper deposits. Among the professional organizations to which Frank belonged are the Geological Society of America, the American Association of Petroleum Geologists, SEPM, the Society of Economic Geologists, and the Missouri Academy of Science. He enjoyed helping and advising aspiring young geologists.

Frank was widely respected in his profession and contributed significantly at national and international meetings and to the scientific literature. He received a number of awards for the excellence of his scientific work. He was always willing to pitch in and help in every situation. Frank was a member of the Salem Avenue Baptist Church in Rolla and was active in the Ozark Patriots Chapter (OPC) of the Sons of American Revolution; the Missouri Society, SAR Color Guard; and the Rolla Friends of the Library. Frank will be missed by all of his friends and colleagues. Burial was held at Gloster Trinity Cemetery, Jessie Latin Road, Gloster, De Soto Parrish, Louisiana.

Hannah Cole Day Observance – Boonville, Cooper County, Missouri

On May 7, 2022 members of the Missouri Society SAR Color Guard participated in the Hannah Cole Day Observance hosted by the Hannah Cole DAR Chapter at Boonville, Cooper County, Missouri. Members of the Martin Warren, M. Graham Clark, and Independence Patriots SAR Chapters participated.

Hannah Cole was one of Missouri's earliest settlers, arriving in 1809, with her husband William Temple Cole, and kids. He was killed on July 20, 1810 by Indians leaving her alone with nine children. She built a home, which was used as a fort in the War of 1812, where it provided a safe water source for settlers. She obtained the first business license to operate a ferry in 1816 across the Missouri River. The first county circuit was held in her house/fort. After the settlement of Boonville, her home was used as the first school, church, and voting place in the county. Her father Halbert McClure Allison (1736-1813) was an American Revolution Veteran. She died in 1843.

Memorial Service for Compatriot Wilber Jean Kephart

On 21 May 2022 the Northwest District of the Missouri Society Color Guard in collaboration with the Martin Warren Chapter, Missouri Society, SAR, conducted a memorial service for deceased Compatriot Wilber Jean Kephart. Compatriot Kephart was President of the Martin Warren Chapter, Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution from 2000 through 2003.

Commemoration of the Battle of Fort San Carlos May 29, 2022

The most documented and chronicled significant battle west of the Mississippi river during the Revolutionary War (May 26, 1780) was commemorated at the St. Genevieve Catholic Church Sunday, May 29, 2022. SAR Color Guard from Missouri and Kentucky joined the St. Genevieve Militia. They mustered near the French Cultural History Museum and then while protected by 10 muskets marched 3 blocks to the church. The colors were carried forward into the sanctuary in great ceremony to bagpipes played by Wayne Davis of the SSL chapter, and Linda Hartung, also from St. Louis. After colors were posted at the altar rail, Margaret Carr, of the Commemoration of the Battle of Fort San Carlos Society opened the ceremony with remarks and invited museum curator Geoff Giglierano to present a history of the battle. Over 300 of the men who fought off the British and native American allies at Fort San Carlos were from St. Genevieve. One of the principal militia men was Francois La Vallee. He and two sons, in European tradition, are buried beneath the sanctuary of the church. Following the commemoration, the colors were retired and led out of the church by the bagpipes. Those in attendance observed muskets from the militia and Color Guard each fire a separate single volley.

NEW HAMPSHIRE –

New Hampshire opened the second quarter of 2022 with two 250th events. The evening hours of 8 April saw a detachment of our Color Guard firing volleys at a plaque dedication for the Pine Tree Riots in Weare, NH. This commemorated the whipping of a sheriff and deputy attempting to arrest the local sawmill owner for possessing oversized pine logs and refusing to pay the fine. The two were then run out of town. This was one of the first overt acts of rebellion against oppressive English laws. The following day, 9 April, brought us back to Weare for ceremonies in the town center celebrating the same event.

Pine Tree Riots



On 23 April another group from our Color Guard was in Nottingham to participate in the 247th anniversary of the Nottingham Militia responding to the Lexington Alarm and marching out to Cambridge in the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

On 20 May the Color Guard represented SAR at the dedication of historical markers in Durham and at the State House in Concord. These marked visits by General Lafayette on his Farewell Tour of the United States in 1824 and 1825

The Color Guard supported DAR at a Patriot Grave Marking in Hooksett on 28 May. Despite the rain, successful volleys honored this American Patriot.



Memorial Day was marked by the Color Guard appearing in the Littleton parade on 30 May. A ceremony honoring Littleton war dead followed.



New Hampshire SAR was represented in Concord, MA, on 18 April, for the 247th Anniversary of the American-British engagement at the Old North Bridge, marching in the parade.



At Ft. Constitution (formerly Ft. William and Mary) in Newcastle, on 12 June, NHSSAR CG rendered honors at a DAR dedication of a plaque recounting the Colonials' assault on the fort. On 14 December 1774, locals stormed the fort and overcame the six man garrison, removing the stores of gunpowder, and on 15 December they returned and removed arms and canon.

New Hampshire had a small representation at Bunker Hill Day in Charlestown,

MA, on 17 June. A wreath was placed at the New Hampshire Gate to the Monument, and honors rendered. New Hampshire troops commanded by Colonel John Stark played a vital role in the battle.

Finally, on 25 June, the Color Guard was in Francestown for their 250th Anniversary, staffing a static display and marching in their parade. A short ceremony followed the parade.

April 8, 2022, Lafayette Lodge No. 27, Rahway, N.J.

The NJSSAR Color Guard was invited to Lafayette Lodge No. 27 of Free & Accepted Masons in Rahway, N.J., for the unveiling of a plaque (see picture 1) presented by The Lafayette Trail commemorating Maj. Gen. Gilbert du Motier Marquis de Lafayette's visit to Peace Tavern in Rahway on Sept. 24, 1824. (The Lafayette Trail Inc. is a nonprofit organization that marks the footsteps of General Lafayette during his farewell tour of the United States in 1824-25.) The Founder and President of The Lafayette Trail, Julien Icher, presented the plaque with the mayor and members of Rahway's city council in attendance. Lafayette's own Masonic apron was displayed, brought to the site by the grand Lodge of Free & Accepted Mason of New York.

April 9, 2022: Old Presbyterian Graveyard Wreath Laying

Commemorating the 245th year (April 13, 1777) of the Battle of Bound Brook, the NJSSAR Color Guard laid a wreath at the Old Presbyterian Graveyard. The Old Presbyterian Graveyard was the original cemetery located behind the Bound Brook Presbyterian Church. The church was destroyed by fire and hurricane in 1896. The oldest known burial is from 1744, but the cemetery was likely in use from about 1700. It is uncertain how many people are buried in this cemetery. About 700 are identified, but

there may be as many as 1,500. From 1976 to 1998 the Battle of Bound Brook Monument was located here, until it was moved to Billian-Legion Park

After some years of financial and legal issues between the borough and the DAR Camp Middlebrook Chapter, the latter deeded the tract to the borough as a public park in 1934. An estimated 70 Revolutionary War soldiers are buried in the graveyard, about forty-five of which are identified; three of the War of 1812, one of the Mexican War and four of the Civil War

April 9-10, 2022: Battle of Bound Brook Cannon Firing detail

April 27, 2022: DAR Honoring Revolutionary War Soldier Oliver Cromwell

The NJSSAR Color Guard presented the Colors at a ceremony placing a plaque honoring the Original Home of Revolutionary War Soldier Private Oliver Cromwell in, Burlington, N.J.

Oliver Cromwell, born in 1753 in Burlington County, was an African-American Continental soldier who served as a private in the 2nd New Jersey Regiment between 1777 and 1783. He fought in many of the battles that eventually lead to American victory and independence. He received the badge of merit, and George Washington signed his discharge papers. He lived to be 100, and during his later years he sat outside his home on East Union Street engaging with passerby and neighbors alike.

It is this home that the official NJDAR plaque marks.

Guests included Burlington Mayor Barry W. Conaway; DAR President General Denise VanBuren; DAR Historian General Laura Kessler; re-enactors of the 1st Rhode Island Regiment, based in Trenton; NJDAR State Regent Bonnie Matthews; Cromwell descendant Jane Fox Long; DAR America 250 National Chair and Secretary of the U.S. Semi quincentennial Commission Lynn Forney Young; State Historian Deborah Hvizdos; and NJSSAR Color Guard members Rich Serfass, Roger Williams, Charles Morgan, Robert Meyer and Ken McGill. Also attending were descendants and other relatives of Oliver Cromwell.

April 27, 2022, DAR America 250 Revolutionary Patriots Marker at the Battle of Assunpink

The New Jersey State Society Daughters of the American Revolution unveiled the DAR America 250! Patriots Marker (See picture of plaque) at Mill Hill Park in Trenton, New Jersey. The Battle of Assunpink Creek was a pivotal moment in the American Revolution. Twice during the 10 Crucial Days from Christmas 1776 to early January, American forces met their foes in Trenton and defeated them. After the famous Crossing of the Delaware, the Americans went on the offensive for the first time, attacking the garrison in Trenton, defeating the Hessians. Then on January 2, 1777, the Continental Army met British and Hessian troops on the banks of the Assunpink Creek in what is now Mill Hill Park. Three times the British tried to storm the bridge and were repelled with terrific losses. One Continental said, "The bridge looked red as blood, with their killed and wounded and their red coats." This second

battle in Trenton was the lynchpin of the offensive as Washington's troops were able to defeat both British and Hessian troops that night. The Continental Army then marched to victory in Princeton for the third and final battle of the campaign.

Hosting the event was NJDAR State Regent Bonnie Matthews with the NJSSAR Color Guard posting our Nation's colors. Guests included Trenton Mayor Reed Gusciora and DAR President General Denise VanBuren, DAR America 250 National Chair and Secretary of the U.S. Semiquincentennial Commission Lynn Forney Young, DAR Historian General Laura Kessler and NJDAR State Historian Deborah Hvizdos.

June 23, 2020, Springfield, NJ Wreath-Laying Ceremonies: Battleground Cemetery and First Presbyterian Church

Two events were held in Springfield commemorating the 242nd anniversary of the Battle of Springfield, June 23, 1780: a wreath laying at the Battleground Cemetery, followed by a march and wreath laying at the First Presbyterian Church.

Battleground Cemetery

The first wreath laying took place at Battle Ground Cemetery, a small burial ground that sits on the battleground itself. Soldiers from both sides of the conflict are thought to be buried there. The NJSSAR Color Guard posted the colors for the presentation. Among those attending were NJDAR Vice Regent Linda Jurczak, Church and Cannon DAR Regent Heath Sanford, and the Mayor and Police Chief of Springfield.

First Presbyterian Church

The NJSSAR Color Guard, NJDAR and members of the Springfield community marched from the Battle Ground Cemetery to lay a wreath at the First Presbyterian Church.

During the Revolutionary War, the church sanctuary was used as a warehouse for armaments. And some history suggests that the church’s parsonage was used as General George Washington’s local headquarters. During the Battle of Springfield, it is said that Presbyterian pastor James Caldwell (Chaplain to the Continental Army), realizing that his comrades were running out of ammunition, ran into the church and grabbing the Isaac Watts psalters, tore out pages and gave them to the soldiers to use as wadding for their muskets. While the wording is uncertain, it is said that as Caldwell distributed the psalters, he encouraged the fighters, shouting “Give ‘em Watts Boys” (or, some say, “Put Watts into ‘em, boys!”) You no doubt know Isaac Watts’ most famous hymn, “Joy to the World.”

In 1905, the State of New Jersey erected a statue of the Continental Soldier on the front lawn of the church on land deeded to the state for the grand sum of \$1.00. This statue sits on the grounds of the smallest State Park in NJ, a mere 5’ by 5’.

The Battle of Springfield involved thousands of troops on both sides, New Jersey militia and loyalist forces, and directly involved some of the Revolutionary War’s greatest leaders, including George Washington, Nathanael Greene, Henry “Light-horse Harry” Lee, Jedediah Huntington and Wilhelm von Knyphausen.

The battle came close on the heels of the Battle of Connecticut Farms, now Union, fought on June 7, 1780. Both battles hinged on failed attempts by British and Hessian forces to engage directly with Gen. Washington in the open field and raid the military stores at Morristown.

On June 7, 1780, Hessian and British troops marching north from Staten Island for the Hobart Gap, between Summit and Milburn, from which they hoped to attack and capture Morristown, ran into fierce resistance from regiments of the Continental Army and New Jersey militia. When the British and Hessians failed to reach their objective, they unleashed their fury on the town of Connecticut Farms, burning it to the ground.

The Battle of Springfield, fought June 23, 1780, was the last Revolutionary War battle fought in the north. Again, just a few weeks after Connecticut Farms, British and Hessians attempted to reach the Hobart Gap and force Gen. Washington into a vulnerable position where his army could be annihilated. Both attempts by the enemy failed in their objective. Though of great importance, these battles today are known to few besides historians.

Warren Heritage Society and SAR commemorate Patriots Day

On 16 April 2022, the Warren Heritage Society and Colonel James Wood II Chapter of the Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution cosponsored a Colonial Patriot Day at the Balthis House, the oldest house on the oldest street in Front Royal. Also participating was the French and Indian War Foundation and a vintage blacksmith, covering the early part of history in what is now Warren County.

Melanie Gregory of WHS coordinated the events throughout the day and Waltraud Hornick and Vernee Peterson of the WHS prepared a meal of pork stew and corn fritters on the fireplace in the outdoor kitchen. They used the same techniques as the colonists in the backcountry of the Virginia Frontier. At this time, cooking was done exclusively on wood-burning stoves and fireplace hearths, both of which radiated intense heat. An outdoor kitchen, kept the heat, the smoky smells and the risk of fire out of the main house. The hearth was level with the floor to allow for cooking ease. Dutch ovens with a grooved lid were the main cooking vessel. These pots were placed on the hearth floor on top of a bed of hot coals. The same glowing coals were then spread evenly onto the pot lids. Game, beef and pork were often cooked on a spit over the open fire. Kettles were suspended over the fire from a metal swinging arm.

There were several presentations given by the members of both groups on the Balthis House, colonial equipment, blacksmithing, cooking demonstrations, muskets and safe firing procedures. The house is a rare surviving example of a two-story wood frame Federal-style townhouse. The house has many architectural elements salvaged from other houses of the same era that were demolished, and includes appointments of furnishings of the period. The original section is three bay and the house was expanded to its present size in the mid-19th century. Also on the property are the outdoor kitchen, playhouse, general store, smoke house, Ivy Lodge, Belle Boyd Cottage and WHS Archives.

Front Royal was a prosperous center of wagon manufacturing, serving the westward expansion of the US. The Balthis family were successful blacksmiths and in mid-19th century, had additions built on the original house. A small blacksmith's shop has been built as a recreation of the time. Jay Hatfield, worked hard in the blacksmith shop forging and shaping metal. He gave several presentations on the different kinds of equipment that he made.

All of the buildings were open with demonstrations and presentations at all locations. At the end of the day, the Colonel James Wood II Chapter provided a musket salute, firing three rounds in honor of all patriots. Participating for the SAR were Sean Carrigan, Dale Corey, Allan Phillips, Nathan Poe, Will Reynolds, Eric Robinson and Marc Robinson. In addition, French and Indian War Foundation members Dale Corey, Eric Robinson and Marc Robinson provided demonstrations and incite into the French and Indian War era on the Virginia Frontier. Jan Long and Elizabeth Cagle dressed in colonial attire, adding to the atmosphere with Jim Heflin, (retired archivist) and SAR compatriot adding insight and information about the history of the county. SAR and ARC Commemorate Memorial Day at National Cemetery

On 30 May 2022, the Colonel James Wood II (CJWII) Chapter of the Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and the American Red Cross, with support of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2123 co-sponsored a commemoration to all military who paid the ultimate sacrifice in service to the country. The practice of decorating soldiers graves is an ancient custom. Graves were decorated with flowers in the US during and following the Civil War and while numerous locations claim to be the originator of Decoration Day, Waterloo, NY was officially recognized as the birthplace of the observance in 1966. The ceremony was held at National Cemetery in Winchester. Stacy McFarland, Executive Director of the American Red Cross (ARC) of the Greater Shenandoah Valley provided a welcome followed by an Invocation from the Reverend James Simmons of the SAR. Middletown Commemorates Memorial Day with the SAR

On 30 May 2022, the Colonel James Wood II (CJWII) Chapter of the Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) participated the Middletown Memorial Day Recognition and Wreath Laying Ceremony held at the Middletown Veterans Memorial. Memorial Day is a day of remembrance for those who have died in the service of the United States of America. Memorial Day in the U.S. was borne out of the Civil War and a desire to honor our dead. It was officially proclaimed by Commander in Chief, Grand Army of the Republic, General John A. Logan, on 5 May 1868 by General Order Number 11. "The 30th of May, 1868 is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land." The date was chosen as it was not the anniversary of any particular battle and possibly as a date when flowers would be in full bloom. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery as 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the soldiers buried there. He stated "If silence is ever golden, it must be beside the graves of 15,000 men, whose lives were more significant than speech and whose death was a poem the music of which can never be sung." It was observed every May 30 until the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which took effect in 1971, when Memorial Day was moved to the last Monday of May. In December 2000, Congress passed a law requiring Americans to pause at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day to remember and honor the fallen. The ceremony was conducted by Raymond Steele with chaplain duties by Reverend Clay Knick. Presentation of the Color was conducted by the Colonel James Wood II Chapter of the SAR led by commander Brett Osborn. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Raymond Steele with the National Anthem sung by Geovanni Rodriguez. Remarks were presented by Karen Shrum, Senior Advisor to the Under Secretary for Benefits in the Veterans Benefits Administration. This was followed by a wreath laying by Mayor Charles Harbaugh, IV and Karen Shrum to honor those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in service to the country. An Empty Chair ritual was presented to honor Gary Fletcher, a veteran who was an important member of the Middletown Community. He was responsible for the construction of the Veterans Memorials in Middletown and Stephens City as well as the Korean War Veterans Memorial in Winchester. The Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2123 Honor Guard fired a three volley salute in honor of those who did not return. Taps was played by Andrew Paul as the final curtain in the commemoration of Memorial Day. Commemorating Daniel Morgan

On 18 June 2022, the Colonel James Wood II Chapter conducted a commemoration to General Daniel Morgan. The event was held at his gravesite in Mt Hebron Cemetery to commemorate Morgan’s contributions to the victory in the American Revolutionary War, beginning with the Bee Line March in August 1775. After the battles of Lexington and Concord on 19 Apr 1775, the Second Continental Congress authorized 10 rifle companies to be recruited from local militia ranks. Two of these were to be from Virginia. Virginia answered the call to aid the Continental Army in June 1775. The Berkeley County Riflemen, which mustered under Captain Hugh Stephenson in Mecklenburg on 21 June and a second, mustered under the command of Daniel Morgan from Frederick County at Winchester on 22 June. Morgan was chosen by a unanimous vote by the Committee of Frederick County to form one of these companies and became its commander. He recruited 96 men in 10 days and assembled them at Winchester on 14 July. His rifle company of marksmen was nicknamed “Morgan’s Riflemen”. The long rifles used were more accurate and had a longer range than other firearms at that time, but took much longer to load. The company raised by Stephenson had planned to meet Morgan’s company in Winchester, but found them gone. Morgan marched his men 600 miles to Boston in 21 Days, arriving on 6 Aug. Stephenson’s unit marched from Morgan’s Spring, arriving in Cambridge after 24 days on 11 August. These marches became known as the Bee Line march. Both companies covering 600 miles in a relatively short period of time. Daniel Morgan would go on to experience one of the most adventurous paths among Colonial officers. He was taken prisoner at the Battle of Quebec on 31 December 1775 and paroled by the British in 1776. He returned to the Army to led successful battles at Saratoga and the decisive victory at Cowpens in January 1781. At the Cowpens, Morgan used tactics never before used in developing a double envelopment to encircle the British which resulted in the total destruction of one of the British elite units. The aftermath of the battle saw General Lord Cornwallis move his army to Yorktown and an eventual defeat at the hands of the colonial forces led by George Washington. Participating for the Sons of the American Revolution were members of Colonel James Wood II (CJWII), Culpeper Minutemen (CMM), Fairfax Resolves (FR), General Daniel Morgan (GDM), George Mason (GM), George Washington (GW) and Sgt Maj John Champe (SJC) Chapters. The Daughters of the American Revolution were represented by the Lanes Mill (LM) chapter. The ceremony was emcee’d by Dale Corey with chaplain duties presented by Rt Rev Larry Johnson. Michael St Jacques of CJWII provided a presentation on the Bee Line March which was followed by presentation of wreaths. Ernie Coggins, 1st Vice President of the Virginia State Society presented greetings as well as a wreath for the State. John Petrie (CJWII), Bill Schwetke (CMM), Dave Cook (FR), Paul Parish (GDM), Ken Morris (GM), Richard Rankin (GW) and Ken Bonner (SJC) presented honors for the SAR chapters with Anita Bonner presenting for the DAR. The color guard was a combined Virginia State guard. Brett Osborn commanded the Color Guard carrying the U.S., Virginia State, National Society SAR and 250th Anniversary of the Revolutionary War flags. Ken Bonner led the Honor Guard carrying the various chapter flags. Marc Robinson was the commander of the sentinel squad. A 15 man musket salute a three round salute to honor Daniel Morgan. Commemoration of the 248th Anniversary of the Loudoun Resolves

The “Spirit of Loudoun” Revolutionary War Memorial at the Historic Courthouse in Leesburg was the site of a Signature Event for the Sgt Maj John Champe Chapter as the chapter sponsored the first ever Commemoration of the 14 June 1774 signing of the Loudoun Resolves. The Resolves were crafted in response to the Intolerable Acts of 1774 that, amongst other actions, blockaded Boston Harbor. Other Colonies looked to Virginia for guidance and thirty (30) Virginia Counties created Resolves, including Northern Virginia Counties Prince William, Fairfax and Loudoun and neighboring Frederick County in Maryland. The protest against the Intolerable Acts was a major step toward Revolution started ten months later at Lexington and Concord.

Mayor Kelly Burk of Leesburg made remarks and presented Chapter President Ken Bonner a Proclamation commemorating the Resolves. The Proclamation was signed by Mayor Burk and members of the City Council.

For five days before the Ceremony, the Chapter ran a notice of the event in the local newspaper “Loudoun Now” in the “Get Out Loudoun” section. As a result, several community members attended and later remarked they had no idea Loudoun County had such a deep and important history.

A combined Color Guard presented Colors to open the ceremony. Eleven uniformed Virginia SAR Compatriots attended, representing five Northern Virginia Region Chapters. Four NSDAR Chapter ladies attended.

President Ken Bonner was Master of Ceremonies, VP Barry Schwoerer gave a Historical Perspective of the Loudoun Resolves and local Historian Mrs. Nancy Spannaus gave a summary of the noteworthy men in Loudoun County who led the effort to draft the Resolves and who were Revolutionary War leaders. A bell was rung after the reading of each of the Resolves

For more than two weeks, about 30,000 U.N. soldiers and marines fought enemy forces four times their number on rugged terrain in brutally cold weather. Over a thousand U.S. Marines and soldiers were killed and thousands more were wounded.

SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

As I continue to receive submissions that are not in conformance to the guidelines I will reiterate these in Large print. The most common submissions deal with photos - then text.

To Submit Photos:

- DO NOT embed in a text document - send as **file attachments** only.
- Send as JPG, GIF, PNG files. **Do NOT** send HEIC format.
- Send original resolution photo. A 33x39 pixel file is unusable.
- Name the files after the event, e.g., Parade1.jpg, Parade2.jpg and for multiple events ensure that you do not use the same file name twice!

To submit event text descriptions:

- Within the document use the proper photo file name(s) **for the specific event.**

- When listing the participants in the photo **use this format only** -
- “(Photo name)-(Event name) Color Guard members L-to R - John Jones, Sam Smith, David Daniels, Edward Evans, etc”

Do not do this - using tabs

(Event1) John Jones, (Event2) John Jones,
Sam Smith, David Daniels, Sam Smith, David Daniels,
Edward Evans, Frank Fields Edward Evans, Frank . .

Remember, this is for Color Guard events - not chapter events wherein a chapter member makes a presentation that does NOT include color guard participation. Such Chapter presentations are suitable for the SAR Magazine. It must be an activity that the **Color Guard UNIT** is doing.
