
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Role Models for Youth

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1779 - The American Revolution - 240 Years Ago - Lest We Forget . . .

January 22 – Claudius Smith (Loyalist guerrilla leader) is hanged at Goshen, Orange County, New York for acts of terrorism upon the people of the surrounding communities, including aiding British ally Chief Joseph Brant.

February 23–25 – The Battle of Vincennes or The Fall of Fort Sackville – Frontier battle won by American militia forces.

June 1 – Benedict Arnold is court martialed for malfeasance in his treatment of government property.

June 16 – In support of the U.S., Spain declares war on England.

July 3 - 5 - British Major General Tryon's division lands in East Haven Connecticut, met with spirited resistance from a band of local militia, take Black Rock Fort.

July 7 – Tryon's forces in the Battle of Fairfield destroy 54 barns, 47 storehouses, burned 83 homes, two churches, and municipal buildings including a schoolhouse, the courthouse and the

local jail.

July 11 – In the Battle of Norwalk Tyron's forces are weakly opposed by about 50 local militia, easily dispersed. The destruction of the village and its commercial infrastructure destroyed.

July 16 – United States forces led by General Anthony Wayne capture Stony Point, New York from British troops.

July 22 – Battle of Minisink. The Goshen Militia is destroyed by Great Britain's ally - Mohawk Chief Joseph Brant's forces.

July 24 – American forces led by Commodore Dudley Saltonstall launch the Penobscot Expedition in what is now Castine, Maine, resulting in the worst naval defeat in U.S. history until Pearl Harbor.

August 1 – Francis Scott Key is born. Author of The Star Spangled Banner (died 1843).

August 19 – Battle of Paulus Hook brought the Patriots success over British forces when Major Light Horse Harry Lee launched a nighttime raid on the British controlled fort. Lee was rewarded by the Second Continental Congress with a gold medal, the

only non-general to receive such an award during the war.

September 12-21 – Battle of Baton Rouge: Spanish troops under Bernado de Galvez capture the city from the British.

September 16–October 18 – Siege of Savannah. The siege itself consisted of a joint Franco-American attempt to retake Savannah. On October 9 a major assault against the British siege works failed. During the attack, Polish nobleman Count Casimir Pulaski, leading the combined cavalry forces on the

American side, was mortally wounded. With the failure of the joint attack, the siege was abandoned, and the British remained in control

of Savannah until July 1782, near the end of the war.

September 23 – Battle of Flamborough Head: The American ship Bonhomme Richard, commanded by John Paul Jones, engages the British ship Serapis. Jones famously says, "I have

not yet begun to fight!" The Bonhomme Richard sinks, but the Americans board the Serapis and other vessels, and are victorious.

October 4 – The Fort Wilson Riot takes place. After the British had abandoned Philadelphia, Attorney James Wilson successfully defended at trial 23 people from property seizure and exile by the radical government of Pennsylvania. A mob whipped up by liquor and the writings and speeches of Joseph Reed, president of Pennsylvania's Supreme Executive Council, marched on Congressman Wilson's home at Third and Walnut Streets. Wilson and 35 of his colleagues barricaded themselves in his home, later nicknamed Fort Wilson. In the fighting that ensued, six died, and 17 to 19 were wounded. The city's soldiers, the First Troop Philadelphia City Cavalry and Baylor's 3rd Continental Light Dragoons, eventually intervened and rescued Wilson

and his colleagues. The rioters were pardoned and released by Joseph Reed.

November 2 – The North Carolina General Assembly carves a new county from Dobbs County, North Carolina and names it Wayne County in honor of United States General Anthony Wayne.

December 25 – Fort Nashborough, later to become Nashville, Tennessee, is founded by James Robertson.

December 1779 – May 1780 Continental Army in fifth winter quarters at Morristown.

Memorial Day A Day for Remembering

On Monday May 27, 2019 the Utah SAR gathered at *This Is The Place Heritage Park* in Salt Lake City, Utah to commemorate this special national holiday. President Bill Simpson, his grandson, Aiden McCormick, and members of the Utah SAR color guard: Trent Grandy, Chase Grandy, Matt Marchant, Gregg Hansen, and Doug McGregor were in attendance.

Due to inclement weather, the Utah SAR contingency was housed in the "Social Hall" building located on Main Street, where the color

guard set up their displays for American Revolution soldier life, as well as an SAR information table.

The color guard was honored to raise the flag and bring it to half -mast in the morning. At noon the color guard

Compatriot Darwin Samuel Hunt of Cedar City, Utah, passed away on March 6, 2019 in Cedar City, Utah. He was the son of

Darwin volunteered for service in the US Army and served during the Korean conflict and in the Utah National Guard. Patriot Smith served as a Captain in the Massachusetts Militia, a member of the Committee of Safety from 1771-1775, chairman of the Tea Committee, 1773, and a provincial congress delegate. As a member of the Utah SAR, David served for many years as the State Society Chaplain and Member of the Board.

Our condolences to each of their families.


Book Review

At our Annual Member Meeting on June 1st, special recognition was given to Lyle Gingery and Gregg Hansen for the outstanding service that they gave to the SAR Patriots 4-H Club and the Utah SAR Color Guard. As a token of appreciation, they were presented copies of "Washington's Immortals" by Patrick K. O'Donnell. We pass on this

review of the book on the chance you may be looking for a good read. It is available in paperback form at a modest price.

Washington's Immortals: The Untold Story of an Elite Regiment Who Changed the Course of the Revolution by Patrick K. O'Donnell c.2016

Have you ever wondered ... is there a nonfiction book that tells the story of the American Revolutionary War in an interesting and informative way, with stories that are seldom told, with details from letters and diaries not well known?



Washington's Immortals is that book. The author focuses on a group of Maryland soldiers, and follows their involvement in the Revolutionary War from 1775 to 1783.

The "Maryland Heroes" became an elite fighting unit -- one that Washington trusted and would send to do difficult, dangerous tasks in the "deeds" required to bring defeat to the Red Coats. Famously known in their day as the "Immortal 400," they fought in the Battles of Brooklyn, Trenton, Princeton, Camden, Cowpens, Guilford Courthouse, and Yorktown.

Patrick O'Donnell engages the reader in stories of sacrifice, struggle, defeats, and triumphs. Among the many stories contained in the book, a few stories of the brave men that tell us of their friendships, their love for family, and their daring escapades that made a difference in the outcome of battles and, ultimately, the war. His book will capture your imagination with accounts of the, at times, starving, threadbare-naked, group of heroic men who made a decision to leave their farms, businesses, and loved ones to take up arms for the defense of liberty, and the attainment of America's freedom from British tyranny.

Did you know that Patrick O'Donell has written eleven critically acclaimed military books and is considered one of the world's preeminent militarily historians — recognized as a seasoned expert on elite, and special operations units, and "irregular warfare?" The writer's style is light, yet detailed, and not pedantic or intellectual. The book Washington's Immortals was written to appeal to a wide audience of readers.

The pages of this newsletter give you a good overview of all that's been happening since our last newsletter was published last fall. So, I won't spend a great amount of time repeating everything that has already been written. I will express my feelings and impressions as I participated in the events that have taken place thus far this year.

Our George Washington Birthday Banquet, co-sponsored with the Utah Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), in my opinion, is one of the best annual events we have. This year's event, held at "Liberty Hall," included the induction of two new compatriots, and we had two talented guest speakers: Angela Johnson, artist of the George Washington sculpture "Stand Your Ground!" (picture on page 3), and "American Ride" TV star, Stan Ellsworth. If you would like to learn more about our Founding Fathers, I highly recommend getting a copy of Stan's book, Renegades & Rebels: Epic & True Stories of our Revolutionary Heroes. It's almost like watching episodes of "American Ride." We are grateful to have had Angela and Stan help us celebrate George Washington's Birthday.

I spent part of Memorial Day with my grandson, and Utah SAR compatriot, Aiden McCormick, at *This is the Place Heritage Park*. I was touched as I watched members of our color guard present the colors in a solemn ceremony that included the singing of "The Star-Spangled Banner" by a small choral group made up of park actors. Each time I sing our national anthem, I become a bit emotional, thinking about the struggle for freedom and independence of our patriot ancestors, in both the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812.

At the end of April, I had the privilege of attending, for the second time, the Utah DAR's Annual Conference held at the Double Tree Suites in Salt Lake City. My wife, Sheila, and I are grateful for the warm welcome given to us by Utah DAR Regent Susan Holt and the other Daughters in attendance. This year's topic of celebration was the 150th Anniversary of Driving the Golden Spike. I hope that you have an opportunity to get involved in at least one of the 150 events scheduled this year in commemoration of this event.

One of the activities I've become personally involved with is NSSAR's project that takes member applications and extracts the data from the applications into a system that will allow individuals who are seeking to find a patriot ancestor to easily search the extracted data. Utah has a small team of three working on Utah applications. This team is composed of me and Compatriots John Arnold, and Kyle Walker (new member), and I am pleased to say that our current batch of applications is just about completed. Thank you, gentlemen,

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for your willingness to become engaged in this important project. If anyone else would like to join the team, please contact me.

I've reflected a great deal on what it means to be a member of the Sons of the American Revolution as I've been working on this project. One aspect of the project includes editing the information on each patriot on the application; this includes adding information about the type of service performed and in which state, searching for and adding grave information using "Find a Grave," and adding reference information. Each time I begin this step of the process, I get to see how many other compatriots are tied to the same patriot. Some of these patriots have a number of descendants that have become members of the SAR. But most I've seen have only our Utah SAR member as their sole descendant. For those member applications that show children, especially sons, I find myself wondering why those sons haven't taken steps to add their names to their patriot ancestors.

When my father became a member of the SAR in Georgia, I initially looked into joining while living and working in California. I hesitated moving forward at that time because I felt that, when I finally joined, I wanted to be able to be an active participant and contribute what I could to the society. After moving to Utah, my other commitments lessened to the point where I felt I could now become that active participant, and I moved forward with my application.

I am sure that there are many of those who have applied to become members of the SAR in Utah who have had similar feelings and have felt that "Now isn't the best time to become an active participant... maybe later." According to current statistics, the Utah Society has 105 active-dues-paying members, including eight junior members and five dual members. This number has not really fluctuated much in the years I've been a member of the Utah SAR Board of Managers, even though we may have had anywhere from 15 to 40+ new member applications approved each year. I don't bring this up to point a finger at those who don't remain active by paying their dues each year. Instead, I'd really like to have your suggestions as to what we can do to make your experience as a member of the Utah SAR a better one. I know that opportunities for greater participation happen when there are chapters for our members to meet with more frequently and to become involved in the programs of the NSSAR on a local level. I believe if we can get 10 or more compatriots in our major population areas (Ogden, Salt Lake City, Provo, St. George) who would be interested in helping the Utah Society reestablish chapters in these areas, we would all benefit by the additional opportunities to be more involved, without too large of an extra time commitment. The job is always easier when there are more hands involved in the work. We, as a board, will give you all the support and assistance necessary, if you are interested in helping us make your Society membership more rewarding.

I am honored to be serving as your president, and I am dedicated to helping the Utah Society become a pleasurable experience for each of our members.
