

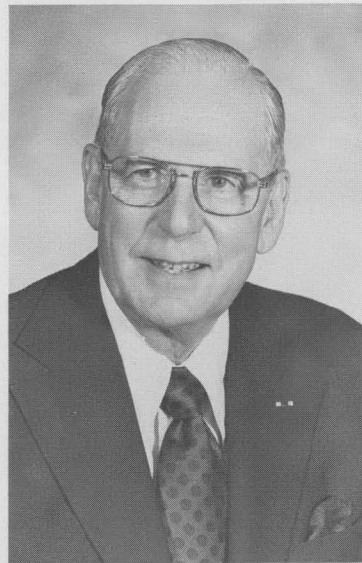
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 *The* PRESIDENT GENERAL'S MESSAGE

Compatriots, we are now into our 85th year of the Sons of the American Revolution, and we are faced with an enormous challenge—a challenge to prove we are truly the torch bearers for the causes for which our forefathers staked their lives. Let us rise to the challenge, individually and collectively, to demonstrate to ourselves and the nation the validity of our great patriotic organization.

Greatness does not come solely from a large membership, but from an accomplished, active organization. Let us look around and select those in our own community who are eligible and should be members of our Society. We need a steady increase in our number of applicants, not merely to increase our ranks, but to fill the ranks of those mustered out by the Grim Reaper. A healthy organization is one of action, including action stimulated by new, dedicated members. The SAR should be this kind of organization, and to this end I have pledged myself.

To carry out this pledge I am accepting every opportunity to visit local, state, and district meetings. Many have already been visited, and I am arranging my affairs at the college I have headed for more than a quarter of a century so that I can devote even more time to the affairs of the SAR.

I feel that it is up to each one of us to continue fanning the fires of freedom even as the rise in this country's population outstrips the percentage rise in our membership. We still have our patriotic duty to

perform remembering that no more than one out of three colonists was willing to back the Revolution. Those were truly times that tried men's souls.

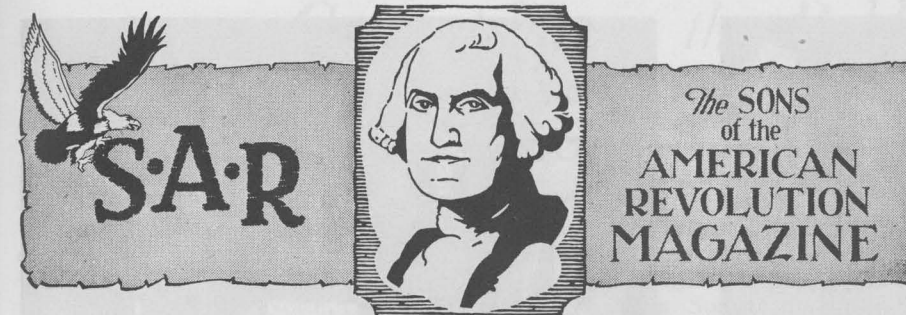
These, too, are days that try men's souls. Having survived those traumatic Five Days in August we have seen our country come to a new awakening of national conscience and appreciation for our Constitution that resulted from the sacrifices made by those brave patriots who gave cause for the Sons of the American Revolution. Now, as never before in our generation do we, the members of our organization, need to show our colors, be proud of our heritage, and be willing to assume our patriotic duty.

Let us begin by re-examining issues on the basis of Constitutionality. Let us vote intelligently and encourage others to do the same. Let us write, wire, and phone our Congressmen on all matters of importance realizing that only when our elected representatives know our minds can they truly represent us. (But then let us check to see how they voted! Compatriot Clark Erwin can help you with this.) And let us work to strengthen our Republic from the ground up by electing those men who understand that you cannot strengthen the weak by weakening the strong, that you cannot help the poor by destroying the rich, that you cannot lift the wage-earner by pulling down the wage payer, and that man's chief urge is to improve his lot and capitalism is the only system by which this urge can be realized.

For if we are to survive, we must have something to live by, to live on, and to live for. We must put aside hate and fear and grasp once more the faith, hope, and love of God and our fellowman. It is easy to tell when you are on the right road—it's all upgrade.

Only uncommon men are capable of doing uncommon things. As members of the Sons of the American Revolution let us prove to our country that we, too, are uncommon men dedicated to our country.

EDITORIAL

Part II, Article II of the Constitution of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution states that "the objects of this Society are declared to be patriotic, historical and educational". Surely these purposes justify our constant concern and interest in the actions of the elected and appointed officials who govern us. Although our organization must meticulously avoid involvement in political activities, we have every legal right to express our views to public officials and the community. Such dedication is patriotism, it is devotion to history in the making, and it is surely education for all concerned. As a single example, the National Society adopts annual resolutions at each SAR Congress, and they are brought to the attention of those in the top echelons of our government. More state societies and chapters should follow this worthy example.

All true Americans wish our new President well, and pray that the Great Architect of the Universe will guide his heart and hand. We cannot ignore the fact, however, that the bulk of national power and authority is concentrated in President Ford, Vice President Designate Rockefeller and Secretary of State Kissinger, none of whom were elected to their high offices by the American people.

During recent weeks, we have had good reason to be concerned for the future of our nation. We have seen amnesty foisted upon a public who have indicated by national opinion polls that they do not favor forgiveness for traitors and cowards. On August 30 at Ohio State University, President Ford lauded the red Chinese, calling them "highly motivated and extremely well disciplined". Our new Chief Executive has now indicated support for legislation that would supplant Rhodesia with the Soviet enemy for the purchase of chrome, and at a tremendously higher price. Such action would be nothing more than appeasement, promoted by left-leaning United Nations.

All of these are more than disturbing, but the greatest shock of all was the selection of Mr. Rockefeller as Vice President, an office but a heartbeat from the Presidency. Even the White House admitted to CBS News on August 27 that seventy percent of President Ford's mail was against this nomination. As Governor, Mr. Rockefeller made a financial shambles of New York State, but it is even more jeopardous that he is an ultra-liberal. Please, Mr. President, remember that an overwhelming vote of the American people in the last presidential election soundly rejected liberalism? Are you keeping this faith, clearly expressed by your constituents?

persons and which offers weekly interdenominational services in a beautiful sanctuary.

The military training at the Academy is established under the Marine Corps Junior ROTC. This program is based on the time-tested methods of the U.S. Marine Corps. The mission of the Military Department is to develop to the maximum the leadership potential of each cadet together with a strong sense of patriotism, respect for authority, responsibility, integrity, self-organization and self-discipline. Some 200 students attending the Academy are organized into a corps of cadets consisting of companies, platoons and squads based upon Marine Corps Units. The cadets wear uniforms and live in barracks under military discipline at all times.

Each cadet who attends the Academy for the full 4-year program first learns how to follow and then is given the opportunity to lead others. The Academy offers programs at 6 grade levels—grades 7-12—and post graduate programs. Sixteen academic units are required for a diploma. Courses are offered in the following areas: English; History (U.S., World, Economics, Government); Languages (French, German, Spanish); Mathematics (Algebra, Algebra II, Advanced Math, Trigonometry); Science (Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics), and Aerospace Science.

The Naval Academy Foundation has selected the Marine Military Academy as a preparatory school to which graduates for the U.S. Naval Academy may be sent for postgraduate work. The Academy believes strongly in competitive sports for each boy at his own level, so that every boy may develop through them leadership, the will to win, pride in physical skills, and loyalty.

The Academy has won the highest award to be given by the U. S. Marine Corps Inspector General's representatives, that of "NOTEWORTHY."

Parents who are interested in getting their sons into this extraordinary school, which draws young men from all over the U.S., should write to Major General George S. Bowman, Jr., USMC (Ret.), Superintendent, Marine Military Academy, 320 Iwo Jima Boulevard, Harlingen, Texas 78550 for entrance requirements, costs, and quota available beginning in the fall of 1974. Inquirers will be promptly sent a beautiful color brochure listing the distinguished faculty, staff members and noted Board of Trustees.

MARINE MILITARY ACADEMY



One of the finest schools in the U.S. for training young men academically, physically, morally and spiritually, under strict discipline, is the Marine Military Academy located in Harlingen, Texas and under the supervision of retired U.S. Marine Corps Major-General George S. Bowman, Jr.

SAR compatriots visiting the Academy have had an opportunity to see firsthand a preparatory school in America which was a treat to visit in an age when so much lack of discipline and promiscuity seem to be the order of the day in educational institutions across America, with but few exceptions.

Never in recent years have we seen a faculty and student body which gives a thrill up one's spine in realizing that all is not lost in America as long as a training school like this is available to the sons of parents who want to see their offspring trained into real manhood.

The Marine Military Academy is situated on 142 acres within the city limits of Harlingen, Texas. Harlingen is a city of 35,000 population, located in the ideal semi-tropical climate of the lower Rio Grande Valley. The campus setting is of unusual beauty with lush green lawns, colorful bougainvillea and hibiscus blooming throughout the year and streets lined with majestic palms. The site was formerly an Air Force Navigational School. There are a total of 34 buildings, all well constructed, all classroom buildings air conditioned and 5 dormitory buildings each with 48 rooms, tile baths and 2 cadets assigned to a room.

The largest of the buildings contains 20 classrooms, faculty offices, science laboratories and an auditorium.

There are athletic fields galore including outside basketball and tennis courts, football fields, horseback riding areas, including stables; patios for barbecues, a gymnasium, beautiful cadet dining room with superb food, game rooms and the Mary Moody Northern Memorial Chapel which seats 350

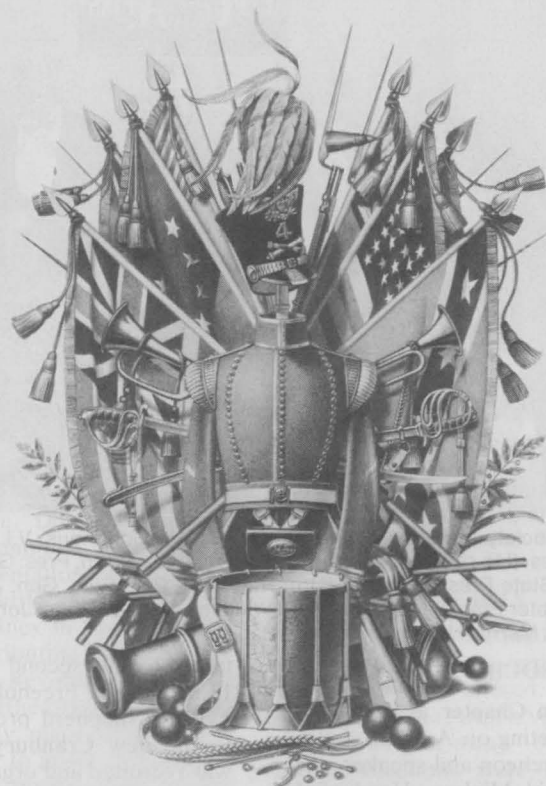
PENNSYLVANIA SOCIETY

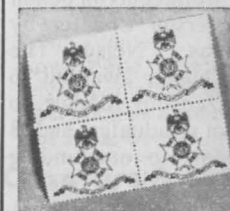

A Precedent for Amnesty

An Army deserter wrote the President from Canada that he had seen the light and repented. At a certain hour, he said, he would appear on the White House grounds ready for military service again. Identified by clothes he had said he would be wearing, he was arrested and detained. The President himself decided the case: the deserter should be returned to his regiment without penalty, except that when his term of enlistment expired, he should serve in prison the number of days he was absent without leave. The President was Abraham Lincoln.

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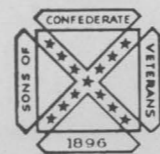

PROCEEDINGS OF THE EIGHTY-FOURTH ANNUAL CONGRESS

Monday, 24 June 1974

Following a concert by the United States Marine Band, the meeting was called to order by Pres. Gen. Marion H. Crawmer at 9:10 a.m. The colors were presented by a combined Armed Forces color guard from the Pentagon, and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Comp. de la Houssaye. Chaplain Gen. Gerhart gave the Invocation, and the National Anthem was sung to the accompaniment of the Marine Band.

An address of welcome was delivered by Pres. Warren A. Burdette of the Maryland Society. A message from the President of the United States was read. Messages were read from Gov. Marvin Mandel, Baltimore Mayor William Schaefer and the President and Senior President of the National Society, CAR., Lt. Gov. of Maryland and Mrs. Henry Stewart Jones, and President General of the NSDAR.

Chairman Lynn Gordon of the Credentials Committee delivered a preliminary report, stating that 225 delegates had registered so far and that there was a total attendance of 427 paid registrations.

State Chairman Joseph X. Harris reported on local arrangements. The Pres. Gen. called upon Comp. John Bell of Pennsylvania who reported that he had just returned from the annual convention in Ohio of the National Sojourners and he had been requested to make two presentations at the Congress. The Patriotism Award of the National Sojourners was then conferred upon Exec. Secty. Woodward and the Stony Point Chapter of Rockland County, N. Y., represented by Pres. David Quinn.

Comp. de la Houssaye moved that the letter from the President of the United States be acknowledged with thanks, together with a wish for his success on his trip to Russia. The motion was regularly carried.

The Pres. Gen. called upon Chairman Anderson of the Rules Committee who formally presented them for adoption. Comp. Morgan moved that the rules, as presented, be adopted to govern this Congress. The motion was regularly carried.

Resolutions Chairman Hoffmann then delivered a preliminary report on proposed resolutions.

At this point, National officers commenced to deliver their annual reports.

The meeting was recessed for luncheon at 11:30 a.m.

Following luncheon, the Pres. Gen. announced that since progress thus far was well ahead of schedule, the afternoon session would be dispensed with.

Tuesday, 25 June 1974

The President General called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. The colors were presented, and Past Pres. Gen. Coe led the Pledge of Allegiance. Chaplain Gen. Gerhart gave the Invocation.

The Pres. Gen. directed attention to rule 9 of the rules of this

Congress, that any delegate speaking on a subject other than a motion or amendment of the constitution or bylaws may speak only once not to exceed 5 minutes. Copies of the proposed resolutions were distributed to each delegate for consideration. Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 1. The motion was passed and the resolution was adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 2. It was altered to read "authorized by the United States Congress" in place of "of the Federal Government." With this change, the motion was carried and the resolution adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 3. The motion was carried and the resolution adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 4. The motion was carried and the resolution adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 5. The motion was carried and resolution adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 6. The motion was carried and the resolution adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 7. The motion was carried and the resolution adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 8. After much discussion concerning the advisability of changing the word "doctor" to "physician-surgeon," Comp. de la Houssaye moved that further debate be closed and that Resolution No. 8 be adopted as is. The motion was carried and the resolution adopted.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 10. Comp. Drew proposed the word "submitted" be changed to "adopted", and that "WHEREAS" be changed to "BE IT RESOLVED". The motion was carried and the resolution adopted as amended.

Chairman Hoffmann moved for adoption of Resolution No. 11. Comp. Woodward stated that the phrase "a color guard" should be changed to read "color guards." The motion was carried and the resolution adopted as amended.

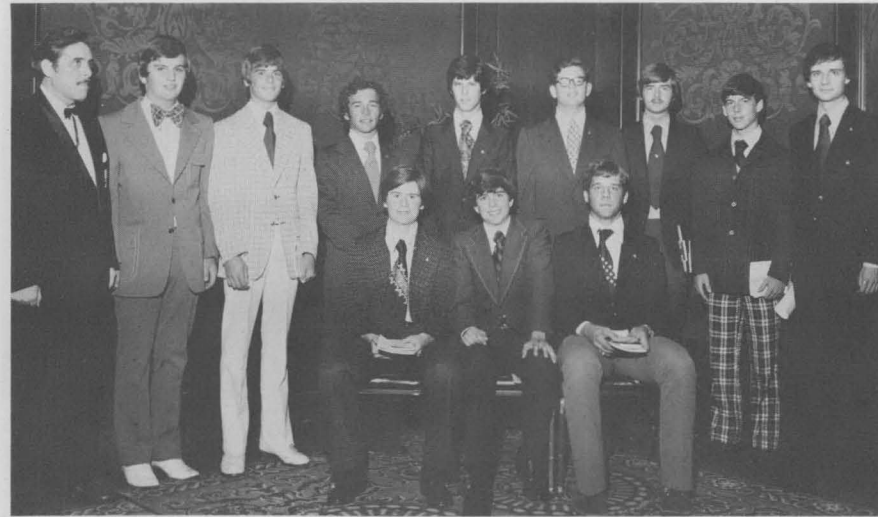
Comp. Burch read a resolution presented by the Virginia Society concerning the restoration of citizenship of Gen. Robert E. Lee and moved that this resolution be adopted as Resolution No. 9. Comp. H. Paul Porter, who is Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, was allowed the floor to advocate passage of this resolution. The motion was carried unanimously and the resolution adopted.

Following the Benediction by Chaplain Gen. Gerhart, the meeting was adjourned at 12:40 p.m.

Wednesday, 26 June 1974

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Pres. Gen. Crawmer. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Comp. Prugh, and the Invocation given by Chaplain Gen. Gerhart.

Credentials Chairman Lynn Gordon reported that there were now 254 registered delegates and a total of 439 paid registrations.

Under old business, Comp. Bryan moved that the minutes of the last Congress as printed in the magazine be approved. The motion was carried.

Under new business, the proposed budget was presented for adoption. Finance Chairman Sterling reported on the budget and finances, and moved that the budget be adopted. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

The Finance-Budget Committee was accorded a vote of thanks and a standing ovation.

The Pres. Gen. directed the Exec. Secty to read local newspaper coverage of the Congress. There was prolonged discussion of a critical article in the "Baltimore Sun."

Acting Chairman Burch of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee presented two proposed amendments: (1) to raise the admission fee from \$15.00 to \$25.00; and (2) the establishment of a standing committee to handle investments of the Building Fund. Comp. Burch then read the first proposed amendment which was to Bylaw 19, Section 1: "The admission fee for membership in the National Society, SAR shall be \$25.00." Comp. Burch moved that this amendment be adopted.

Comp. Young made a motion to amend the proposed amendment to read "effective September 1, 1974" because there are presently many applications in process and these applicants would be unfairly penalized. The motion was seconded and carried, contingent upon passage of Burch's motion. The Pres. Gen. said 2/3rds vote would be needed for passage of the motion to amend the Bylaws. Much discussion followed. Comp. Vaitses made a motion that the main motion be tabled, which was seconded. The Pres. Gen. called for a standing vote, and the motion was lost.

A motion was made to end the debate, which was seconded and carried. The Pres. Gen. called for a standing vote, which was counted. 128 were in favor of passage and 86 against. Since this was not 2/3rds, the motion lost.

Comp. Burch read the second proposed amendment, which was to Bylaw 8, Section 1, to add the words "Building Fund". Comp. Burch moved that Bylaw 18 be so amended. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

The meeting was recessed at 11:00 a.m. so the Trustees could convene.

At the conclusion of the Wednesday evening banquet, the Congress was officially brought to a close by order of Pres. Gen. Clark.

NATIONAL TRUSTEES

MINUTES OF THE MEETINGS HELD IN BALTIMORE, MD. JUNE 23 AND 26

June 23

The meeting was called to order by President General Crawmer at 10:10 a.m. Chaplain Gen. Gerhart gave the Invocation and the

Following his election at the 84th Annual Congress as President General, Dr. M. Graham Clark, Jr. returns home to a hero's welcome at the School of the Ozarks, of which he is President. When the President General's plane landed at the college's airport, he was greeted with a red carpet, the student body and faculty, a welcoming platform, a band and a "Spirit of '76" group. It was a delightful (and justified) surprise.

Pledge of Allegiance was led by Past. Pres. Gen. Coe. The roll was called by Secty. Gen. Clark, and the names are contained in the original minutes.

A motion by Comp. Sterling for the approval of the minutes of the last meeting was seconded and carried.

A motion by Comp. Sterling that visitors be allowed the privilege of the floor but not allowed to vote was seconded and carried.

At the direction of the President General, the Executive Secretary made several announcements relative to the Congress.

Treas. Gen. Lathrop read a letter from the auditors, and moved that it be made a matter of record. The motion was regularly carried.

At this time, Comp. Donald Miller distributed descriptive literature of the Cultural Laureate program and requested that it be endorsed by the Trustees. The Executive Committee had recommended the program for endorsement by the Trustees. After much discussion, Comp. de la Houssaye moved that consideration of endorsement be tabled. The motion for tabling was unanimously passed.

After much discussion, it was moved by the Treas. Gen. that the proposed budget be recommended to the Congress for adoption. The motion was regularly carried.

There was no old business.

Under new business, Comp. Morse spoke at length on the possibility of an additional annual award at the Naval Academy. No action was taken, but the Executive Secretary promised to check further with officials at the Academy.

Comp. Burn presented the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 1

Whereas, various Resolutions and declaration of policy with reference to the Permanent Fund have been adopted by the National Congress and the Board of National Trustees; and

Whereas, it is deemed proper that explicit instructions be set out as to the mechanics of transacting all business matters incident to the Permanent Fund;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Trustees of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution,

1. That all assets, bonds and securities of the Permanent Fund be at all times deemed and treated as a trust fund, set apart from the usual operating funds and accounts of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, as a corporation.

2. That all the property of the Permanent Fund be held by the Riggs National Bank of Washington, D. C., in a custodial account; or, in lieu of such an arrangement, the Executive Secretary arrange for a safe deposit box in the name of the members of the Permanent Fund Committee as trustees.

3. That the assets of the Permanent Fund shall not be listed, shown or included in any manner on the balance sheet of the National Congress, as a corporation, and the Auditor and Certified Public Accountants shall set up the income and assets of the Permanent Fund as separate and distinct from all other items on the balance sheet.

4. On the matters herein set out and provided for having been given effect, the Executive Secretary shall file with the President General, the Treasurer General and the Chairman of the Permanent Fund Committee, a copy of the custodial agreement with reference to the assets of the Permanent Fund, and the manner its income and disbursement are being handled.

Resolution No. 2

Whereas, the question of segregation from corporate funds of all assets of retirement trust funds has been under consideration by the Congress of the United States; and

Whereas, any contribution made by the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, in and to a fund to guarantee the payment of retirement compensation to its officers and employees, as such may mature in the future, cannot be considered or acted upon as an asset of the corporation, not used for the payment of its ordinary obligations,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, that the pension fund be eliminated as a part of the Balance Sheet (as now appears on page 5 of the annual reports), and all records and matters pertaining to said fund be set out in a separate report.

Be It Further Resolved that all the mechanics incident to the management and ownership of the Permanent Fund be applied to the day-to-day handling of the Pension Fund, it being the intention of this Resolution to completely segregate and set apart from the assets of the corporation all monies and assets of the Pension Fund.

Discussion followed concerning the Permanent Fund and its role as an asset of the Society.

A motion by Comp. Burn for the adoption of Resolution No. 1 was seconded and carried.

A motion by Comp. Burn for the adoption of Resolution No. 2 was seconded and carried.

The Executive Secretary thereupon commented that these funds had always been considered and treated as separate assets.

Comp. de la Houssaye stated that he wanted it a matter of record to show that the previous discussion regarding funds did not mean that there has been any co-mingling of funds.

There was no further new business. At this time, visitors and guests were introduced.

Upon motion by Comp. Van Inwegen, the meeting was adjourned at 11:20 a.m., after a Benediction by Comp. Gerhart.

June 26

The meeting was called to order by Pres. Gen. Crawmer. Following the Pledge to the Flag, the Invocation was given by Chaplain Gen. Gerhart.

The roll was called by the incoming Secty. Gen. Miller, and the names are contained in the original minutes.

Pres. Gen. Crawmer presented Chancellor Gen. Prugh to install the new officers, which was done. Thereupon, the gavel of authority

was transferred to President General M. Graham Clark, Jr.

A motion by Comp. Smith to approve the minutes of the last Trustees' Meeting was seconded and carried.

A motion by Comp. Sterling that guests be allowed the privilege of the floor without the right to vote was seconded and carried.

It was moved by Comp. Bryan and regularly passed that the next Trustees' Meeting be held on October 12, 1974.

With the opening of "new business," Comp. Carmichael asked for the sites of future Congresses. The Executive Secretary listed the following: 1975, Boston; 1976, Philadelphia; 1977, Milwaukee. Both Louisville, Kentucky, and California are being considered for 1978.

A motion by Comp. Putnam that the new names for bank signatures be authorized and approved was seconded and carried.

Comp. Garrison inquired of the procedure to change the designation of the "South Mississippi District" to "South Central District." When this body sends a formal request to the Bylaws Committee, it will be prepared for the consideration of the 85th Annual Congress.

Pres. Gen. Clark introduced Mr. Stanislav Rembski, who spoke on the mural at the D. C. Bicentennial Building.

The President General asked for any new or old business. Comp. Barton recommended that early preparations be made for the submission of a proposed amendment for the next Congress relative to dues or application fees. Comp. de la Houssaye moved that the Executive Committee prepare adequate information and their recommendations for the next Trustees' Meeting. The motion was carried unanimously.

Comp. Hewitt suggested that a goal of 3,000 new members be set to resolve our financial problems. No action was taken.

The President General announced his appointments to the Executive Committee and asked that they be approved by the Trustees. His appointees were Compatriots Marion H. Crawmer, Robert D. Savage, Carl K. Hoffmann, Walter G. Sterling and Len Young Smith. Upon motion by Comp. Bryan, it was carried unanimously.

Comp. Munson invited all present to the annual Atlantic Middle States Conference on July 12 and 13 at West Point, at which the speaker will be Pres. Gen. Clark.

Comp. Anderson reminded those present that the Building Fund Committee is asking for contributions to be in by February 1975, so plans can be made for laying the cornerstone on July 4, 1976.

Their renditions of patriotic airs and music from Broadway shows were accorded a long standing ovation. The unit has earned international fame while representing our nation on tours throughout the world.

Comp. Martin spoke relative to the Building Fund. He recommended that the membership be furnished with more details concerning the projected building, the cost and the need for it. Comp. Anderson commented that we require more than a million dollars for construction and maintenance, and that he hopes for a minimum contribution of \$20.00 per member.

Comp. Gardiner recommended a publication, the "Washington Observer". He hoped that members would purchase subscriptions to this conservative and informative publication. Subscriptions cost \$10.00 for one year, \$15.00 for two years, and \$20.00 for three years, and the address is P. O. Box 1306, Torrance, California 90505.

Upon a motion by Comp. de la Houssaye, the meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon after a Benediction by Chaplain Gen. Gerhart.

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The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, at its 84th Annual Congress, assembled from June 23rd through June 27th, 1974 at The Baltimore Hilton, Baltimore, Maryland, adopted the following resolutions:



RESOLUTION NO. 1

WHEREAS, under the 1903 Treaty with Panama, the United States obtained the grant in perpetuity of the use, occupation and control of the Canal Zone territory with all sovereign rights, power and authority to the entire exclusion of the exercise by Panama of any such sovereign rights, power, or authority as well as the ownership of all privately held land and property in the Zone by purchase from individual owners; and

WHEREAS, the United States has an over-riding national security interest in maintaining undiluted control over the Canal Zone and Panama Canal and solemn obligations under its treaties with Great Britain and Colombia for the efficient operation of the Canal; and

WHEREAS, the United States Government is currently engaged in negotiations with the Government of Panama to surrender United States sovereign rights to Panama both in the Canal Zone and with respect to the Canal itself without authorization of the Congress, which will diminish, if not absolutely abrogate, the present U.S. treaty-based sovereignty and ownership of the Zone; and

WHEREAS, these negotiations are being utilized by the United States Government in an effort to get Panama to grant an option for the construction of a "sea-level" canal eventually to replace the present canal, and to authorize the major modernization of the existing canal, which project is already authorized under existing treaty provisions; and by the Panamanian government in an attempt to gain sovereign control and jurisdiction over the Canal Zone and effective control over the operation of the Canal itself; and

WHEREAS, similar concessional negotiations by the United States in 1967 resulted in three draft treaties that were frustrated by the will of the Congress of the United States because they would have gravely weakened United States control over the Canal and the Canal Zone; and by the people of Panama because that country did not obtain full control; and

WHEREAS, the American people have consistently opposed further concessions to any Panamanian government that would further weaken United States control over either the Canal Zone or Canal; and

WHEREAS, many scientists have demonstrated the probability that the removal of natural ecological barriers between the Pacific and Atlantic oceans entailed in the opening of a sea-level canal could lead to ecological hazards which the advocates of the sea-level canal have ignored in their plans; and

WHEREAS, the Sons of the American Revolution believes that treaties are solemn obligations binding on the parties and has consistently opposed the abrogation, modification or weakening of the Treaty of 1903;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution in its 84th Annual Congress assembled, opposes the construction of a new sea-level canal and approves Senate Resolution 301 introduced by Senator Strom Thurmond and 34 additional Senators, to maintain and preserve the sovereign control of the United States over the Canal Zone.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

WHEREAS, the strength and stability of the economic and monetary system of the United States is vital to the defense of the country, and

WHEREAS, the fiscal and monetary policies of the Congress and Administration, present and past, have led to the devaluation of the dollar, double digit inflation, and the current economic crisis in the United States, and

WHEREAS, double digit inflation within is as great a threat, if not a greater threat, to the liberty and freedom and well-being of this country as the threat from our enemies without, and

WHEREAS, the basic cause of the rampant inflation is the deficit spending of the United States Congress, and

WHEREAS, under the Constitution of the United States, Congress is charged with the responsibility for all federal appropriations, and

WHEREAS, it is the urgent duty of the United States Congress to limit federal spending to the revenues of the Federal Government,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National

Society, Sons of the American Revolution in its 84th Annual Congress assembled, urges the Congress to balance the federal budget.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

WHEREAS, it was the national policy of the United States of America to intervene in Vietnam and prevent a Communist takeover of that country, and

WHEREAS, it is the duty of every American citizen to bear arms in support of the national policies of the United States, and

WHEREAS, a citizen of the United States is called upon to share the burdens of citizenship in order to insure its benefits for all citizens, and

WHEREAS, 40,000 young Americans fled to foreign countries to evade the military obligations of United States citizenship,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution at its 84th Annual Congress assembled, is opposed to any granting of amnesty to those who refused to bear arms for their country and instead, fled to foreign countries to evade their military obligations.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

WHEREAS, this country was founded by God-fearing men and women and conceived in liberty, and

WHEREAS, men of all countries have been moved by the eloquence and high spiritual qualities of the Declaration of Independence, and

WHEREAS, the Bicentennial will be a focal point for a nationwide review, and reaffirmation of the values upon which this Nation was founded, and

WHEREAS, all businesses and private citizens should display the United States Flag daily during daylight hours except during inclement weather, and

WHEREAS, it is fitting for patriots to celebrate each Fourth of July with prayer, music, fireworks and other expressions of joy and cheer, and

WHEREAS, it is the duty of every citizen and local community to take the initiative in planning a suitable commemoration of the Bicentennial,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution at its 84th Annual Congress assembled, urges its members and all citizens to fly flags daily, to ring bells and blow automobile horns on the Fourth of July at a time to be set by each community as a suitable prelude to the Bicentennial.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

WHEREAS, we believe the Federal Government has entered upon a movement to eliminate basic rights and powers guaranteed to the states by the 10th Amendment to the Constitution, in particular the control of education and public schools, the control of land, the extension of jurisdiction of the federal judiciary, the weakening of state criminal law enforcement by the imposition of untenable federal standards that result in interminable trials and sheer technicalities that often show more concern for the criminal than for the innocent victim and the long-suffering public, to name a few,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution at its 84th Annual Congress assembled, recommends that our state governors and legislators resist these federal encroachments upon state sovereignty and oppose the extension of federal grants and Supreme Court decisions.

RESOLUTION NO. 6

WHEREAS, hostile foreign nations desire to obtain advanced American technology during a period of our history entitled "détente," and

WHEREAS, the sharing of our technology with unfriendly foreign powers will weaken this country's power and protection of the free world, and

WHEREAS, the joint exploration of space with any foreign nation will result in the release of technical information vital to the defense of this nation, and

WHEREAS no foreign power has been successful in its man-in-space program,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, in its 84th Annual Congress assembled, opposes in general the sharing of any of our technology with unfriendly foreign nations and in particular the sharing of our man-in-space capability with any foreign power, and recommends that all federal agencies should intensify efforts to prevent the dissemination of critical technology to any foreign power.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

WHEREAS, the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution supports proper commemoration and celebration of the American War for Independence which gained the 13 Original Colonies their freedom; and

WHEREAS, the Battle of Cowpens, fought in South Carolina near the present village of Cowpens was a major victory for loyal Americans in their fight for liberty; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has appropriated certain funds for the improvement and enhancement of the Cowpens Battleground site; and

WHEREAS, the effect of monies spent will be much more effective and widespread, and of longer duration, if a permanent annual celebration is held at the Battleground;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution in its 84th Annual Congress assembled, favors allocation of an adequate portion of available funds for the construction of a suitable amphitheater which will be made available for the production of an annual outdoor drama based upon the Battle of Cowpens and surrounding events, so that the people of America will have a better opportunity to become more conversant with the great deeds of our illustrious ancestors.

RESOLUTION NO. 8

WHEREAS, Professional Standards Review Organization (PSRO) was established as a rider attached to the Social Security Law of 1972 without public hearings or proper consideration; and

WHEREAS, confidential medical records of every patient under any of the numerous government-sponsored health care programs will be open to PSRO inspectors; and

WHEREAS, "norms" set by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, after examination of all patient records, will change the concept of health care, nullifying doctor-patient privacy preventing full use of the doctor's knowledge, experience and training; and

WHEREAS, PSRO can overrule a doctor's decision in prescribing, hospitalization, or operating under penalty of fine and suspension from medical practice;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution at its 84th Annual Congress assembled, supports the adoption of H.R. 9375, or similar

resolutions, which would repeal the provisions of the Social Security Act which violate the confidentiality of the doctor-patient relationship which would be contrary to numerous state statutes, contrary to professional ethics, and which would lead to federal control of medicine.

RESOLUTION NO. 9

WHEREAS, there is pending in the United States Congress a resolution sponsored by Senator Harry Flood Byrd, Jr. of Virginia in which Senator William Scott of Virginia has also joined as a co-sponsor, to restore the citizenship of General Robert E. Lee,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution at its 84th Annual Congress assembled, joins in with the purpose and spirit of this pending Congressional resolution.

RESOLUTION NO. 10

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution at its 84th Annual Congress assembled, reiterates and reaffirms that all previous resolutions adopted at prior Congresses be reaffirmed.

RESOLUTION NO. 11

WHEREAS, the 84th Annual Congress of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution has been successful in every respect, and

WHEREAS, that success has been due to the efforts of those who planned and took part in the program,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, that it hereby expresses its gratitude and deep appreciation:

1. to the President General for his able leadership,
2. to the officers, chairmen and members of their committees,
3. to the loyal headquarters staff for their constant effort in providing an efficient operation,
4. to the speakers, Compatriot (Dr.) Norman Vincent Peale and the Honorable J. William Middendorf, II, Secretary of the Navy, for their inspiring addresses,
5. to the United States Navy; Joint Armed Forces (Pentagon); Colonial Guard, 175th Infantry; United States Marine Corps and the Commander-in-Chief's Guard Colors, U. S. Army, for furnishing color guards,

He holds the Gold Good Citizenship Medal, the Minuteman Award and the



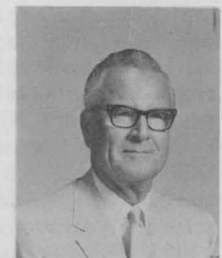

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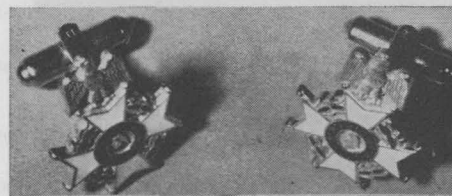

1975 RULES FOR THE DOUGLASS G. HIGH HISTORICAL ORATION CONTEST

1. The Douglass G. High Historical Oration Contest for male High School Seniors, Juniors and Sophomores, conducted by the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, will be held June 15, 1975. It will be conducted for the twenty-seventh time as part of the Eighty-fifth Annual Congress at Boston, Mass., June 15-18, 1975.
2. Each State or Local Society shall make available to Senior High School speech teacher, history teacher and/or principal in public, parochial and private schools the information regarding this contest as early in the school year as possible.
3. When more than one school is involved, a local and/or state contest must be held to determine the winners. A contestant once eliminated may not enter another Douglass G. High contest this year.
4. The expenses of the winning contestant from each state to the Annual Congress shall be paid by either a local chapter or State Society.
5. When an entry is the winner of a contest among several State Societies, the word "district" may be substituted for the word "state" in these rules.
6. In any local or state contest, any male member of the sophomore, junior or senior class of a Senior High School shall be eligible to enter, subject to such supplemental rules as the State Society may provide. However, all local and state contests must be conducted, without exception, according to these national rules.
7. Only the first place winner of a National Contest will be ineligible for participation in subsequent National Society contests. A State Society may select as first place winner in its own contest a student who may not be eligible to participate in the National Contest.
8. This contest is for original orations of not less than five minutes or more than six minutes and shall deal with American History of the Revolutionary War Period: Personality, event or document, and its relationship to events of today.
9. Before an entry is permitted to speak in a state contest, each State Society chairman must obtain from him a copy of his speech, a photograph, and a biography (to include age, home address, school, year in school, and honors and attainments both in and out of school). These data of its top three winners shall be promptly forwarded, together with the official entry blank provided, to the National Committee for determination of the entry's compliance with these rules. These data must be received by Joseph W. McLark, Chairman, 1525 Eighth St., Alameda, Calif. 94501, by June 1, 1975, two weeks prior to the contest. Entry blanks will be mailed January 1, to state chairmen when known, or to the state president.
10. Entries in the National Contest must be present twelve (12) hours prior to the scheduled time, prepared to participate in any elimination considered necessary by the National Committee.
11. No applause is permitted until all contestants have finished speaking.
12. Each speech must be essentially the same as the script submitted, and no notes may be used. Electronic amplifiers shall be used.
13. All judges in this contest must be members of the SAR and, as far as possible, members of entities not competing.
14. A committee of judges will select the winners on the following basis:

(A) Composition	(E) General excellence determines the final decision; these criteria to be used only in case of disagreement on the four other points.
(B) Delivery	
(C) Logic	
(D) Significance	
15. Contestants will be penalized two (2) points for each minute, or fraction thereof, over or under the time specified.
16. Awards: First prize, \$350; second prize, \$250; third prize, \$100; all contestants not winning first, second, or third prize, \$25. Suitably engraved money clips to all contestants. Supplemental awards are often offered by members of the Society.
17. Contestants are welcome to attend all events of the Congress. Each will receive a complimentary guest registration from the host Society.

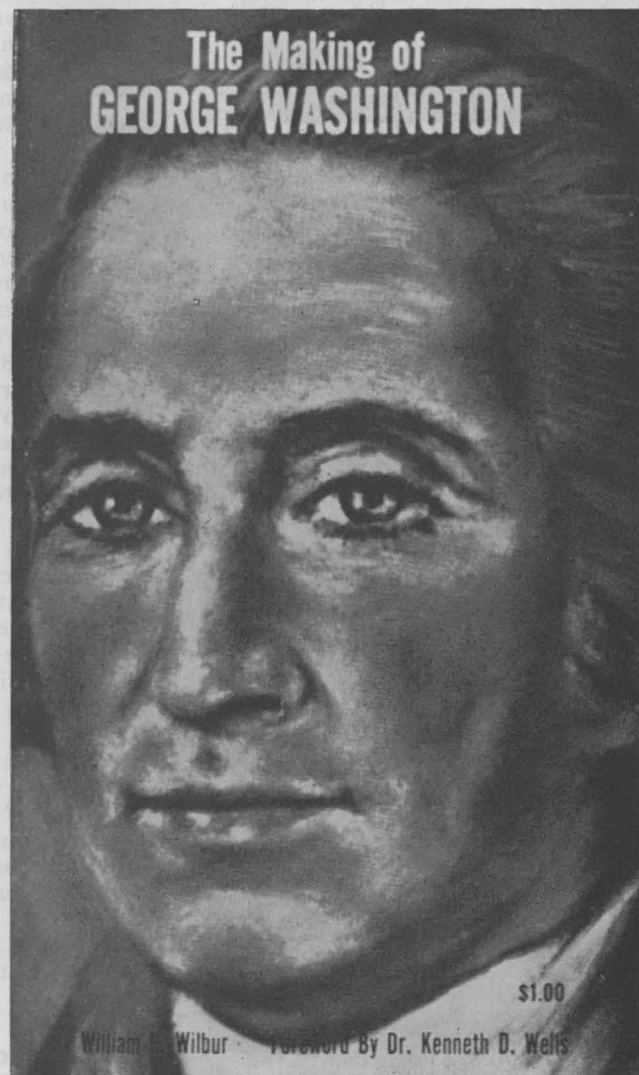

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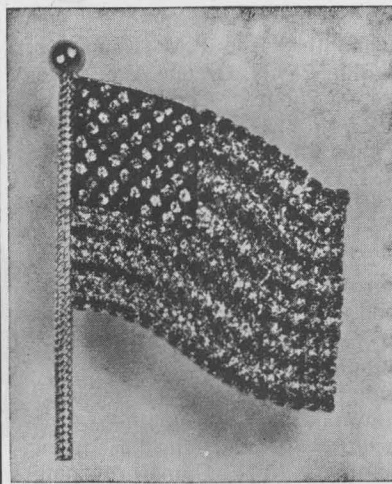

George Washington's Inaugural Sword



Provenance

The sword, 34 inches in length, is a faithful replica of General George Washington's dress sword, worn by him on the occasion of his inauguration as First President of the United States at New York City, on April 30th, 1789.

The original remains one of the most significant, most thoroughly documented of all George Washington's surviving articles of personal or military equipment.

Although Washington owned several dress and hunting swords, the Inaugural Sword is the only one he presented personally (to his nephew, son of his brother Samuel).

The sword remained in the Washington family until 1889, when it was obtained by the Washington Association of New Jersey. It is on display now at Washington's Headquarters, Morristown, New Jersey.

The original sword was made in London and bears the mark of goldsmith James Perry. The knuckle guard bears the marks of the Guild of London Goldsmiths, a lion passant; the crowned leopard's head which has identified English silver since 1300; the maker's mark, "J. P."; and the "P", which is the date stamp for the year July 1769 to July 1770.

The commemorative piece is an exact replica, faithful in every respect to the original, including dimensions, weight and materials of manufacture. It could, if necessary, be used advantageously in combat.

The engraved blade is of colichemarde shape; as a practical soldier, General Washington favored this over a straight blade. Heavy at the grip end (forte) for strength, the blade tapers abruptly to rapier thinness about one-third of the way to the tip so that the sword could be wielded rapidly to thrust or foil a pass.

Registration and Certification

The Washington Inaugural Sword is issued in a certified edition of one thousand. Each sword will be registered, numbered and accompanied by a parchment certificate from the U. S. Bicentennial Society.

In addition, the owner's name will be inscribed in the Wilkinson Sword Limited Sword Register in London, makers of the swords.

Price of the Washington Inaugural Sword is \$925. The limited edition will be allotted without prejudice; reservations will be accepted in order of post-mark date.

To reserve your sword, send your deposit cheque in the amount of \$500. Your reservation will be confirmed promptly, and you will be notified of the sword registry number assigned to you and the estimated date of shipment (at which time the balance of \$425 will become due).

In the event the edition is fully reserved by the time your instructions are received, your cheque will be returned immediately.

You may, after receipt of your sword, elect to return it in original condition within one month for reasons of your own and receive a full and unquestioned refund of your purchase price.
