lems that will be involved in the transactions.

The property in Chevy Chase, Maryland, which we heard so much about during the Congress was visited and carefully examined by several members of the Society who are knowledgeable about construction and real estate; almost without exception their feelings about that property were strongly negative. We have now been informed that that property was very recently sold to Nigeria. There is no other property under consideration for purchase at this time.

The reasons given at the Congress for disposing of our property in Washington are still valid and compelling. It was placed on the market in August at an asking price of one million dollars. At least three foreign governments have expressed an interest in it. It thus behooves all of us to find a new headquarters or a place to build one, as we have had two offers, and the problem is immediate. The Executive Committee will have to decide first where our new headquarters will be located. The choice of cities will not be limited to any area. Generally, however, the city should be more or less centrally located, have good air transportation and be near good hotel and motel facilities. If any of our members know of properties either improved or vacant that would be ideal for our new headquarters,

The Eighty-sixth Congress authorized our Executive Committee to sell our present headquarters property in Washington and to acquire a new one. It also authorized me to appoint a special committee to assist and advise the Executive Committee in carrying out these transactions. I have duly appointed the "Special Real Estate Committee" and it is now in the process of helping to define the prob-

lems that will be involved in the transactions.


The Special Real Estate Committee would also be interested in your thoughts as to the type of building best suited for our headquarters.

Harry Woolever, Jr., Chairman for the How-They-Vote Committee is in the process of modifying this program, which is one of the best we have in the SAR. His committee will try to work closely with our SAR members of Congress and try to enlist their help with this program. We are also working on a method of letting our legislators in Washington know how we feel as individuals about legislation that is before them.

The SAR is composed of members with all degrees of political philosophy. Our purpose is to inform our members as to what is going on in Congress and show them how they can make their thoughts known to their senators and representatives. We are a Patriotic Society and most of us believe in Keeping America First and Free. We are opposed to those, who because of selfish interest, would take away our freedom. We therefore, as SAR individuals, can exert a great influence if we are given the tools to do so. This is what we intend to do.

We should all get behind our Liberty Bell Program. We have the Bell, a motor home and trailer. Joe Head, one of our younger members, will take our Bell from Washington, DC in October south through Virginia, the Carolinas, Georgia and then on to Florida this winter. We want all of our members to line up schools where Joe can talk to our young people. Where possible, the chapter president and membership chairman should be with Joe and take advantage of the fine publicity this program will generate. If handled properly, this program could go far in increasing our membership as well as teaching our children and grandchildren patriotism.

### MISDIRECTED MORALITY

The recent changes in U.S. policy towards Africa, made by Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, if tolerated by the American people and endorsed by Congress, promise to be the initial steps in the next national surrender to communism and hypocrisy.

Mr. Kissinger calls for "Majority Rule" in Rhodesia and suggests the application of "unrelenting economic pressure" to effect it. He pledges aid to the opponents of Rhodesia and promises to push for U.S. economic sanctions against that country.

It is a noble and proper course for our nation; to encourage Majority Rule throughout the world; if we imply by that term, adherence to democratic ideals. This, however, is not what Mr. Kissinger means by "Majority Rule." No, he is not directing his criticism at minority rule in general, but only at White dominance in a Black country. He is not censuring the minority rule in the governments' of dictators, military juntas, or communistic oppression. He does not suggest that "unrelenting pressure" be applied to governments controlled by a minority of communist party leaders, by a minority of military leaders or by a minority of one single dictatorial despot. Mr. Kissinger's proposed sanctions are only directed at Rhodesia and its minority of white leaders.

If one condemns minority rule, he must condemn most of the governments in the world and practically all of the African governments, where oligarchy and autocracy predominate.


I contend that it is the height of hypocrisy to pledge assistance to Mozambique, a Maoist dictatorship, so that its forces, already supported by Cuba and the Soviet Union, can invade Rhodesia for the purpose of instituting Majority Rule. Where is Majority Rule practiced in Mozambique, Cuba or the Soviet Union?

If we are to intervene internationally on behalf of this noble ideal, let us do so, across the board. Let us direct our indignation at all governments which are based on minority rule and oppression. And if we choose to undertake this moral crusade, let us first direct our "unrelenting pressure" at those nations hostile to us rather than beginning with an assault on one of the few pro-western nations in Africa, one of our few African allies against communism and our only non-communist source of chrome.

Let us not, like Mr. Kissinger suggests, prove our dedication to democratic ideals by driving Rhodesia into the open arms of communism.

Two 14-year old boys were Ray's only help in digging out the buried bus, leading them to safety after a 16-hour imprisonment. Both Michael Marshall and Robert Gonzalez will receive Bronze Good Citizenship Medals. The other 24 children will receive letters of congratulations for their bravery. Silk flags and patriotic books will also be presented at a school assembly where parents, SAR members and the public have been invited to attend.





Chase Viele capably served as Master of Ceremonies, and was assisted by Buffalo Chapter Pres. Thomas H. Speller and Rochester Chapter Pres. Stuart C. Rogers. The principal speaker was US Congressman (& SAR Compatriot) Jack F. Kemp. Pres. (Dr.) E. K. Fretwell of State University College also addressed those present. The program included patriotic music by the Coachman's Band, and a color guard

salute and rifle salute by the VFW. As Alton Bakeman, a great, great, great grandson of the Veteran, watched, an SAR marker was placed at the grave. Devoted to the country for which he fought, Daniel Bakeman cast his first vote for George Washington and his last for Ulysses Grant. During the program, Chairman Viele read a letter from President (& SAR Compatriot) Gerald Ford, commending the SAR for having conceived and executed the ceremony. The newspaper, TV and radio media supplied full coverage and the Associated Press transmitted the news throughout the nation. Bakeman's wife, Susan (Brewer), failed to reach her husband's 109½ years, but she did live 8 months after her 105th birthday. Bakeman's name was misspelled in the records, which denied him a military service pension until age 107, but in 1867, Congress passed legislation granting a pension of \$500 annually, retroactive to 1866. This enabled him to buy his own carriage, and he participated in 4th of July parades. Before that, he had provided his own

Bayside as winner of the Chapter's 1976 Scholarship Award. She received a \$500 check to continue studies toward an MA Degree at Columbia Univ. The historic junction of the French Army under General Rochambeau with that of Gen. Washington on July 6, 1781, was celebrated on that date this year at the Odell House, one-time Rochambeau's headquarters, in ceremonies sponsored by the Chapter for the 1976 Bicentennial. French Ambassador Jacques Kosciusko-Morizet unveiled a life-size bust of Rochambeau which was accepted on behalf of the American people by N.Y. Gov. Hugh Carey. Gateway Motel. The following day, Chapter members joined in a memorial service at the Groveland Ambuscade in honor of Lt. Boyd, Sgt. Parker, and 15 scouts who died Sept. 13, 1779, defending the army of the Clinton-Sullivan Expedition. At its June 17th meeting the Chapter heard Mr. Sheldon Fisher discuss "Rochester During the Revolution". On July 3rd, the Chapter participated with the DAR and CAR in a parade in downtown Rochester. On July 4th, the Chapter manned a booth at the Irondequoit Town Hall during celebrations there. Later that day, the Chapter co-sponsored a ceremony at Hooker Cemetery with the Irondequoit Historical Society. Comp. Henry Emerson officiated at the unveiling of a new headstone and an SAR Marker at the grave of Revolutionary soldier Petit Loder.

The **Stony Point Chapter** participated in three significant Bicentennial events during June and July. On June 13th, the Rockland County Bicentennial Comm. dedicated a flag-encircled area at the County office site to the 13 original states. Planted before each flagpole is the state's tree. In the center, a large stone bearing a plaque commemorating the occasion designates **Stony Point Chapter** as sponsor for the N.Y. flag and tree. At an "old fashioned" 4th of July arranged by the Stony Point Bicentennial Commission, a time capsule was buried in the lawn of the town hall. 
The **Syracuse Chapter** took part in a Bicentennial Parade sponsored by local patriotic organizations and the Masonic

Deacon Clark fought in the Battle of Bunker Hill, and was an early settler from Conn. to the Lackawanna area.

The **Continental Congress Chapter** participated in recent DAR services and ceremonies at the grave of Philip Livingston, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. In attendance were Comp. The **Lt. David Cox Chapter** held its annual meeting with a DAR chapter on Aug. 6 at Shatley Springs, N.C.






#### WEST VIRGINIA SOCIETY

## OUR WILL TO SAVE FREEDOM SEEMS TO BE VANISHING

by Gen. Ira C. Eaker

The year 1975 will be known for many things: recession, inflation, the energy problem and the power struggle between the Congress and the President. But I suggest that historian of the future, when viewing the past year in retrospect, will label it accurately as a period of U.S. retreat.

The opening session of the 94th Congress pointed the way. It threw out, or downgraded, some of its ablest leadership. It established budget committees, duplicating and frustrating the functions of its appropriations committees. It challenged the authority of the President to conduct diplomatic initiatives with other governments, assuring stalemates in this critical area. Finally, it continued and increased U.S. unilateral disarmament at the very time when the hazards to our security and freedom were increasing at an ominous rate.

Some of our leaders made valiant efforts to awaken our people and warn our Congress of the dangers of continuing disarmament. Able Dr. James R. Schlesinger, former secretary of defense, warned that our continued leadership of the Free World depended on the maintenance of parity of military strength with the Soviet Union.

More recently he said: "In overall military manpower, the Soviets have added 1.2 million men to their armed forces over the past decade, while the U.S. has dropped 1.5 million men. So the Soviet armed forces are now well over twice the size of the United States forces."

Dr. John McLucas, until recently secretary of the Air Force, a dedicated public servant, put the issue of "guns or butter" in proper perspective when he said last November: "In the last 10 years, the Defense budget has risen 68 percent; however, federal aid to education, manpower and social services increased 257 percent."

Gen. George S. Brown, our military senior, as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, recently stated: "The Soviet Union has embarked upon a massive program of major strategic force improvements and deployments. Since 1965, the Soviets have retained over 12,000 strategic aircraft and missiles, while we have reduced ours to about 400."

We have also had ample warning from abroad. Alexander Solzhenitsyn put it this way, "There is no guarantee for anything in the West. You want to believe otherwise, so you cut down your armies, you cut down your research. But believe me, the Soviet Union is not cutting down anything. Soon they will be twice as powerful as you."

But there is no current evidence that these warnings have awakened our people to their hazards or stimulated the Congress to deal with the vital issue of national security.

In 1775, our people, with extremely limited means, had the courage and resolution to win our freedom. Now, with ample resources, we lack the concern and resolution to preserve it.

The supreme tragedy is when freedom dies while its defenders sleep.

## THE FUTURE OF THE PANAMA CANAL



Will the Canal continue to serve the needs of world commerce if and when it is transferred to Panamanian sovereignty? Answer: Probably not

Panama is wholly unqualified to assume physically, technologically, and politically the grave responsibilities involved in the maintenance, operation, sanitation, protection, defense, and improvement of an engineering work as great as the Panama Canal. Whereas the United States is bound by international treaties to preserve the neutrality of the canal and to keep it free and open to the vessels of all nations "on terms of entire equality... and at charges of traffic which are just and equitable," Panama is bound only by the 1903 treaty. The claims which Panamanian negotiators have already and repeatedly made for income from the Canal operation show that they regard the Canal primarily as a source of both national and personal wealth to be exploited for their own unjust enrichment. Besides what defensive capability does Panama have to prevent a Soviet takeover of this international waterway? Only the United States possesses this capability. It is a requirement of national honor that the United States continue militarily to prevent the seizure and to defend the freedom of the Panama Canal in perpetuity in accordance with its solemn treaty commitments.

As to the strategic importance of the Canal to the United States two retired commanders of the Pacific fleet, Admiral John S. McCain, Jr., and Admiral U. S. Grant Sharp, have emphasized the indispensable strategic value of the Canal to this country. Thomas Moorer, former Chief of Naval Operations and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has ex-

pressed the same views. Admiral Elmo R. Zumwalt, speaking on nationwide television, testified to the presence of Soviet nuclear-firing submarines patrolling both coasts of the North American Continent. Every anti-submarine warfare unit of the United States Navy can transit the Canal. It is the lifeline of the republic and essential for the prepositioning of defensive forces in both oceans. The often expressed concern over the impossibility of moving aircraft carriers through the Canal is groundless, for transit has been eliminated from their design characteristics. All missile-firing units of the modern navy can transit the existing canal.

The economy and prosperity of the United States depends on the Canal, which handles 16 per cent of the ocean-going traffic of the nation. The future of the Canal as a maritime facility lies in the transit of bulk shipments, such as oil, iron ore, coal, grain, and container cargoes. Any interference with canal traffic or any reduction in the efficient operation of the canal or any unreasonable increase in canal tolls will adversely affect the economy of every state in the Union.

The diplomatic justification for renegotiations has been exaggerated by State Department advocates. Recent action by several Latin American governments declining General Torrijos' invitations to attend a Pan-American conference in Panama call in question the State Department allegation of unanimous Latin American support of Panama.

The Soviet Union already possesses a major beachhead in Cuba. Its submarines and other naval vessels based there prowl at will in Caribbean waters. The United States base at Guantánamo is virtually under siege, and the Castro government in Cuba is supporting a "liberation" movement in Puerto Rico endangering an important United States naval base there. A Soviet Axis of power including Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rican liberationist forces already exists in the Caribbean and receives support from Trinidad-Tobago and Jamaica. The critical situation of the United States in the Canal Zone, produced largely by Washington policymakers, is not a mere local question between the United States and Panama. It is part of a global power struggle directly related to the security of the United States and the entire Western Hemisphere.

The Caribbean-Gulf area is well on the way to becoming a Red Lake. Upon the defense of the Canal Zone by the United States depends the fate of the Canal. Upon the fate of the Canal depend the safety of world sea lanes and the fate of the entire Caribbean-Gulf area. On these factors depends the survival of the United States as a free and independent nation and the safety and welfare of the American continents.

Are any alternative courses of policy and action still open to the United States in relation to the Canal Zone? Answer: Yes.

It is a minimal obligation of every president of the United States to use his executive power not to dismember the national territory of the United States but to deliver the territory in its entirety undiminished to his successor in office. Where is it written that the President or his Secretary of State can give away national territory as a condition of negotiating a new treaty? Neither the Constitution nor the law gives him any such authority. Even the State Department officially acknowledges that the president's power to negotiate is limited to subject matter which "is appropriate for international negotiation." (Statement of Carl F. Salans, Deputy Legal Adviser, Department of State, in House of Representatives, Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries, Hearings, *Panama Canal Treaty Negotiations*, November 1971-August 1972, Serial No. 92-30, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 1972, pp. 14-15.) But clearly the surrender of the national domain is not such subject matter. The decision as to renegotiation of the purchase of the Canal Zone, which was bought and paid for by United States taxpayers and which belongs to them, rests entirely with the American people and their elected representatives in the Congress. Despite the barrage of misleading and dishonest propaganda that has been directed to them the

American people have spoken overwhelmingly against its surrender.

Panama can have nothing to say about the future disposition of the Canal Zone. Nor are the President and Secretary of State empowered under the Constitution to give it away nor or at any future time. The presidential and other executive disclaimers of United States sovereignty already made account in part for the financial deficit which the canal has been incurring since 1972, for the first time in 59 years. As long as the executive is trying to surrender sovereign authority over the Zone and calling in question its status as a United States territory Congress will quite properly refuse to appropriate funds needed to achieve a major modernization of the canal which will increase its business and enable it to transit larger ships.

The essential premise of future action by the United States in relation to the Canal Zone is to terminate the current negotiations with Panama and to assert officially the continuance of undiluted sovereign control over the Canal and its protective framework, the Canal Zone. In addition, legislation, already pending in Congress, should be enacted into law providing for United States citizens in the Zone to elect a delegate to the Congress so that they may have legislative representation in Washington, may enjoy the inalienable right of self-government, and will not be subject to unauthorized arbitrary and oppressive action by executive departments. Further, the defense force of the United States in the Caribbean should be strengthened by the reactivation of the Special Service Squadron to show the flag in the Caribbean. Once the fact of United States sovereignty over the Canal Zone is reaffirmed work can be resumed toward completion of the larger third locks authorized by Congress in 1939 in accordance with the approved Terminal Lake-Third Locks plan. This project when completed will enable the Canal to accommodate all bulk carriers capable of navigating in restricted waters and will serve the interests of world commerce efficiently for many decades to come. This can be accomplished under present treaty arrangements and does not require a new treaty. But Congress will not authorize the expenditure of public funds for completion of this long-needed improvement unless its status as sovereign territory of the United States is assured and maintained in perpetuity.

With the termination of negotiations the United States should work with Panama to help the Panamanians understand that the best guaranty of their national sovereignty, freedom, security, and prosperity lies in maintaining the grant of sovereignty to the United States in the Canal Zone. The alleged indignity or humiliation which Panamanians suffer from the fact that the United States Zone bisects the republic is insignificant in comparison with the economic benefits which Panama has long received from the Zone and the Canal and will continue to receive under an enlarged interoceanic canal. United States officials should undertake to do what they have unfortunately thus far failed to do, namely, to demonstrate by easily available hard facts the benefits that have accrued not only to Panama but to virtually every other Latin American country from the successful operation of the Canal by the United States since it was opened to world maritime traffic in 1914. Pride in accomplishment, not a sense of guilt, should characterize the attitude of the United States on this question. To regain our self-respect on this issue will increase the moral strength of this nation in dealing with Latin America and will help to enable this country to regain its lost reputation for leadership and greatness.



The virus which causes influenza seems to change its makeup every 10 years or so. When such a major change occurs, worldwide epidemics follow because few people have immunity to the new virus. The Asian flu of 1957 and the Hong Kong flu of 1968 are examples of worldwide epidemics.

Scientists have now identified a swine-like influenza virus. It was first identified in early 1976, following an outbreak of influenza at Fort Dix, N.J. Several hundred recruits were infected, and one died. Scientists do not know for certain if this virus will spread to the general population during the next flu season. If it does, it could develop into a worldwide epidemic strain and cause extensive illness and death. A virus of this sort may have caused the 1918 epidemic. It is estimated that 20 million persons died with 500,000 fatalities in this country in 1918-19.

The Federal government, through local health departments is coordinating an unprecedented effort to vaccinate essentially the entire population before significant transmission of swine influenza takes place.

Certain people, such as those with chronic medical problems and the elderly, need protection against swine flu and Victoria flu that was around last winter. One dose of vaccine containing both types will be made available first for people over 65 and people of all ages who have a chronic disease, such as diabetes or heart, lung and kidney disease. Later, the vaccine will be made available for all healthy persons over 18.

These vaccines have been field-tested and shown to produce very few side effects. Some people who received the vaccine had fever and soreness during the first day or two after vaccination. The flu vaccine contains a killed virus. Thus, no one will get flu from taking the vaccine.

Because the virus used in making the vaccine is grown in eggs, people highly allergic to eggs should not take it.

A mass immunization program has already begun and people can protect themselves by taking swine-flu vaccine.

It is the opinion of the scientists that the vaccine is safe.

All those eligible for immunization with swine-flu vaccine should consult their local health department for information on where to obtain the vaccination.

# NATIONAL TRUSTEES

## MINUTES OF THE MEETING AT NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS, WASHINGTON, D.C., OCT. 30, 1976

The meeting was called to order by Pres. Gen. Matthew B. Sellers at 9:30 a.m. The Invocation by Chaplain Gen. Holt was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. The roll was called by Secty. Gen. Garrison, and showed that a quorum was present. The resignation of Neill F. Amsler from the Board of Trustees was announced, together with the Texas Society's nomination of Thomas O. McWhorter as his successor. A motion by PPG Sterling to accept the resignation, and to elect the nominee, was seconded and carried. PPG Clark stated that the projected Distinguished Service Medal of Maltese cross design had been approved in style and name at the June 13 Trustees' Meeting. A motion by Surgeon Gen. Rowntree to approve the minutes of the June 13 & 16 meetings, with PPG Clark's correction, was seconded and carried. A motion by PPG Clark to extend visitors the freedom of the floor without the right to vote was seconded and carried. The recommendation of the Executive Committee to transfer \$13,600.00 from the Building Fund to Comp. Joseph Head's Liberty Bell program was discussed at great length. Comp. Head pointed out that, with this funding, the National Society, SAR, would have possession of the bell, trailer and mobile home. He further advised that the funds were available from interest earned by the Building Fund. Altho such earnings are an integral part of the Building Fund, it was pointed out that these monies had not actually been donated by contributors. Comp. Robt. Reynolds moved for adoption of the Executive Committee's recommendation. His motion was seconded and carried. Exec. Secty. Woodward then asked Comp. Head to have the mobile home (the towing vehicle) relabeled to show the SAR, not the Liberty Bell Foundation, as the sponsoring organization. This, Comp. Head promised to do. When queried about the availability of funds for travel expenses such as meals, gas, tolls, etc., Comp. Head commented that the VFW would furnish the required financing. Discussion followed relative to chapter & state society participation and publicity involved in this bell program. PPG Martin moved that an effort should be made to restore the \$13,600 to the Building Fund by encouraging donations to an "SAR Liberty Bell Fund" for this purpose. Pres. Gen. Sellers suggested that future donations to the Building Fund be so directed, even if not earmarked for the Bell Fund, but this suggestion was declined. There was more discussion, after which Comp. Ireland moved to table the original motion. This was seconded and carried. A motion by Librarian Gen. Hamilton to propose an amendment creating an office of Senior Vice President General was seconded and carried. Discussion ensued, including a statement by Bylaws Chairman Thompson who said that his Committee expects to submit drafts for revised bylaws at the Feb. meeting. Thereupon, a motion by Comp. Bothwell to refer the previous motion to the Bylaws Committee was seconded and carried. Pres. Gen. Sellers then entertained a motion to rescind the previous adoption of the Distinguished Service Medal in both name and design. A motion by PPG Morgan to disregard the recommendation was seconded and carried. Supporting the recommendation of the Executive Committee, a motion by Comp. Bryan to authorize and adopt a new National plaque, the Florida Award, was seconded and carried. The new Admiral Furlong Award, a beautiful hand-carved plaque, was displayed by the artist, Comp. Frank Kinnamon. A motion by PPG Sterling for a standing vote of thanks for Comp. Kinnamon was seconded and carried. Prolonged applause by the standing congregation was a tribute to his skill and generosity. There was much discussion of the possibility of a National life membership that would transcend current state limitations. A motion by Comp. Bryan to refer this suggestion to the Bylaws Committee was seconded and carried. Comp. Chunn suggested amendments to the bylaws that would create 2 new classifications of memberships: Posthumous and Perpetual. A motion by Chaplain Gen. Holt to refer these proposed amendments to the Bylaws Committee was seconded and carried. A resolution in support of the FBI and Director Kelley was submitted and read by Law Enforcement Chairman Burden. A motion by PPG McGuire to adopt the resolution was seconded and carried with a standing vote of agreement. A motion by PPG Sterling to set Feb. 11 and 12 for the next Executive Committee and Trustees' meeting was seconded and carried. A report on the projected sale and relocation of National Headquarters was presented by Exec. Secty. Woodward. It was noted that the Ivory Coast has now made a sales offer surpassing that of the previous high bidder, Bangladesh. Altho the Executive Committee already has full authority, a motion by

Surgeon Gen. Rowntree to authorize the Executive Committee to negotiate, sell and buy, was seconded and carried. The meeting adjourned for lunch at 12:15 p.m. and reconvened at 1:45 p.m. Relative to the new Nominating Committee, Pres. Gen. Sellers announced his appointment of National Trustees Robert G. Luckey (N.M.) and Lyman D. Tout (Iowa). He then announced that the State Presidents' Caucus had appointed Compatriots Joe Basore (Ark.), John Naisby (N.J.) and Judson Mason (Va.) to the Nominating Committee. Pres. Gen. Sellers reminded attendees that it is not the duty of the Committee to go out and search for candidates. Comp. Woodward pointed out that nominations to the Committee must be accompanied by a biography, together with a letter from the nominee in which he agrees to serve to the best of his ability, if elected. A motion by Comp. Bryan supported the recommendation of the Executive Committee whereby bylaws, membership material, protocol, etc. will be reproduced on loose-leaf paper for consolidation in a binder. Such pages will be sold at slightly above cost. This motion was seconded and carried. On behalf of the Penna. Society, Comp. Limberg presented a Penna. Society Bicentennial Plate to the National Society. The presentation was followed by a standing ovation of gratitude. Registrar Gen. Carmichael commented that new memberships were very disappointing for 1976, especially since it is our Bicentennial year. There was discussion of the current versions of SAR stamps which are in large supply but not selling satisfactorily. A motion by Comp. Luckey authorized the Executive Secretary to reduce the stock by whatever means he thinks most suitable, including sale at reduced prices. Comp. Woodward reminded attendees that written officers' and committee reports submitted for Trustees' Meetings are kept on file. They can be perused on the premises, or photocopies can be furnished by mail. Woodward further announced that the National Society had earned \$556.71 for sponsoring the recent Alaska cruise, without any cost to our Society. He further reported that Mrs. Howard E. Coe and Mrs. Robert D. Savage are physically incapacitated, and that their countless friends should remember them with get-well cards. It was suggested that name tags would be a good feature at future meetings, and Comp., Woodward promised to have a supply on hand at that time. At this time, State Chairman Ronald Baymiller invited those present to plan for attendance at the 87th Annual Congress in Milwaukee. Elaborate arrangements are being made. There was lengthy discussion concerning the Trustees' limitation of 2½ pages of unsolicited material in the SAR Magazine. A motion by Comp. Bothwell for rescinding the rule was later withdrawn by him because budgetary limitations rendered the motion impotent. A motion by Comp. Luckey was seconded and carried whereby the current \$1 per member allotment be increased to \$2. (This will be submitted to the next Congress as a proposed amendment to the bylaws.) Comp. Luckey then moved for a proposed amendment increasing the National dues by \$2. The motion was seconded, but defeated. Finance Chairman Hayes reported that our financial condition was satisfactory and "on target". A motion by PPG Smith authorizing the traditional Christmas bonus of 2 weeks pay to Headquarters staff members was seconded and carried. A motion by Comp. Nunnally was seconded and carried whereby chapters and state societies may obtain "How-They-Vote" accountability letters without charge if they include them in mailings to their memberships. For the National Headquarters Committee, Comp. Burdette reported on the Committee's inspection of our present site and of a proposed one that proved to be unsuitable. Resolutions Chairman Carl Hoffmann urged that proposed resolutions be submitted to him in February but, in any event, before the end of March. Resolutions should not be presented on the floor of the Congress unless they are of an emergency nature. Under "old business", a question was raised concerning churches with historical backgrounds that had been promised SAR plaques. The Exec. Secty. recounted explanatory details that had occurred 10 years ago. Chairman Miles of the Special Real Estate Committee presented details pertinent to a new site for our National Headquarters, and reported that all Compatriots were welcome to send suggestions as to possible locations. He promised that criteria for a new headquarters would appear in the SAR Magazine. There being no further business, a motion by PPG Len Young Smith was seconded and carried. Chaplain Gen. Holt delivered the Benediction, and the meeting adjourned at 3:10 p.m.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution continue wholeheartedly, enthusiastically and totally to support Director Clarence Kelley in his efforts to maintain and improve the Federal Bureau of Investigation as our country's top law enforcement agency.


