

Successful 101st Annual Congress Staged

The Missouri and Kansas Societies went all out to ensure that the 101st Annual Congress was well planned and executed, much to the delight of 310 certified delegates and 224 guests. The site of the June 15-19 meeting was Kansas City, Missouri - with the elegant Westin Crown Center Hotel serving as headquarters.

Texas Society Compatriot George H. Brandau, M.D., was unanimously elected President General; he had been Secretary

General over the past year. A full corps of officers was also unanimously voted in. As reported elsewhere in this issue of the magazine, several Bylaws changes were approved, including one raising annual dues to \$17 effective with the 1992 calendar year. Among the Resolutions passed was one involving the transfer of title to historic Washington Square in Philadelphia from the city to the National Park Service; this and six others are detailed elsewhere.

Throughout this issue are news stories about every major Congress activity from the Trustees Meeting, Memorial Service and Oration Contest on Sunday, June 16 to installation of the President General on Wednesday night. Also appearing are biographies of the General Officers and appointed members of the Executive Committee, the composition of National Committees and an updated roster of key National Society, State Society and Chapter officers.



Writing Award Winner Had to Refuse Appearance Before French Senate

Receiving the Stephen Taylor Award during Recognition Night at the 101st Annual Congress was Immediate Past Historian General Donald J. Pennell, a member of the Michigan Society. He was recognized for authoring "The Causes of the American Revolution and the Development of the United States Constitution." The Award is presented each year to the Compatriot, who, by his research and writings, has made a distinguished contribution to the preservation of the history of the American Revolutionary Era and its Patriots.

There's an interesting story here.

When Compatriot Pennell was Historian General in 1989, he was informed by France Society Compatriot F. de Tinguy du Pouet of his intent to publish a three-volume set entitled "The Universal Dimensions of the Rights of Man". The work was to be a combined effort with Andre LaPeyre; both hold doctorate degrees and are consultants in international law.

The set was to pertain to the violation of human rights, if and how they were remedied, and the long-range economic effect of those violations on the countries involved. All major nations of the world were to be included, with each chapter being written by a citizen of the nation being analyzed.

The initial request was for HG Pennell to prepare a chapter on the causes of the Revolution; this was later expanded to encompass development of the U.S. Constitution. There was to be no renumeration, but the offer presented an opportunity to gain valuable exposure for the SAR — as the project was designed for use at universities around the world and by various United Nations staff members.

His final work discussed how the Revolution was caused by numerous violations of human rights, ranging from taxation without representation to the quartering of soldiers in private homes. The long-range effect was loss of the Colonies by England, thus denying her becoming the most powerful nation in the world.

Compatriot Pennell states that "the entire effort involved many letters and phone calls, and a considerable amount of time in research to pen the manuscript. It was, of course, written in English, translated at the Sorbonne in Paris, then returned for proof reading."

Volume I was ready for introduction in the French Senate on June 18, 1990. "I was invited to be present," he recalls, "and would have been proud to attend. However, as I had been nominated to receive the

Minuteman Award at the SAR Annual Congress on the same day, I had to refuse the invitation."

The chapter includes 27 pages of French text. Copies of both the English and French (as published) versions are on file at the National Society Library in Louisville.

The Stephen Taylor Award was sponsored by the Minnesota Society in 1979 and was approved by the National Trustees when they met during the 89th Annual Congress that year. Named after the only Revolutionary War Soldier buried in Minnesota, it is given at the Congress by the Historian General, who selects the winner from entries that are submitted.

Oration subjects ranged widely. They included: impact of the Revolutionary War around the world; development of the Bill of Rights; the contributions of Gen. Tadeusz Kosciuszko to the Revolution; and Patrick

Henry's influence in his times. Judges for the Sunday night contest were: Donald J. Pennell, MISSAR; Paul H. Walker, MAS-SAR; and George N. Sells, NMSSAR. The preliminaries had different judges.

Here's the Top Oration: "A War of Words"

If you were to mention the American Revolutionary War to the average citizen today. events such as the Boston Tea Party, Paul Revere's ride, and the Battle of Bunker Hill would immediately pop into mind. People remember famous artifacts such as the lanterns of the Old North Church, the Liberty Bell, and the trusty musket; yet they seem to forget the all too important artifacts of paper. The protest essays and speeches that set in motion the wheels of freedom have been placed in a less important category. During the 1760s no one in America could be a professional novelist, poet, or playwright. Yet, a great number of Americans expressed themselves on the subjects of liberty, government, law, and freedom. In fact, 11 years prior to the first shots of the Revolutionary War, a preliminary war was being fought by the pen. The Revolutionary War was fought not only by the musket, but also by the passion of the speech, the bite of a pamphlet, and the power of an essay.

The policies of Great Britain helped forge writers of the colonists. One scholar of the period wrote, "the literary controversies of the American Revolution were conducted in little books - books inexpensive to print . . . cheap to buy, easy to read, and more significantly, easy to write." They were designed to change men's minds, address urgent problems, and sometimes touch universal issues that confront men anywhere, any time, in civil society. In response to such British measures as the Sugar Act, the Stamp Act, the Quartering Act, and the Townshend Acts, radical colonists found ample cause for words, ample cause for controversial words. One historian asserts that from 1763 to 1783, over 9,000

"little books" or pamphlets were circulated and the oral war began. One of the earliest little books, James

Otis's The Rights of the British Colonies Asserted and Proved written in 1764, summarized the "no taxation without representation" argument of the colonies. Otis discussed an issue of national importance: By what right does a government rule? It is this which insures Otis's fame as the first American enunciator of those principles which led to the framing of the American Declaration of Independence and the United States Constitution. Otis, however, was not the only writer to influence the reasoning and thinking of the colonists. Benjamin Franklin stood before the House of Commons in London and argued against the Stamp Act. A record of this session, a series of 174 questions and answers, was published as Examination Before the House of Commons. Another important protest against the Stamp Act, a series of essays written by John Adams, was published in 1768 under the title A Dissertation on the Canon and Feudal Law. To enforce the Townshend Acts in 1767, British law officers were empowered to enter citizens' houses without a search warrant. Such a denial of rights led John Dickinson, a Philadelphia lawyer and legislator, to write Letters From a Pennsylvania Farmer, which was published in 21 American newspapers and later appeared in book form. Afterwards, Dickinson was known as the "Pennsylvanian Farmer" for his stirring defense of the rights of Americans and for his searching examination of the principles of political freedom. The first American to cry for complete independence was Thomas Paine. Paine wrote Common Sense, a little book published anonymously on January 10, 1776. It sold over 100,000 copies in a three month period. It was once said by John Adams that Washington's sword would have wilted in vain had it not been for the pen of Paine.

Gradually, however, negative writings turned into more positive expessions. In July 1776, Thomas Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence. This document was truly the "culmination of the writing of the period." It carried, and continues to do so, the voice not of an individual but of a whole people. It is more than writing of the period: it defined the meaning of revolution. Even after the war was officially won, the words for the cause continued to pour forth. The most notable documents were, of course, the United States Constitution and the Bill of Rights, explaining the ideals for which the war had been fought.

Today, because of these writers, we have freedom of speech and of the press. We have the right to be vocal with our beliefs and our opinions. We have freedom of opportunity. Our Founding Fathers have left us with a rich national heritage. Even before the signing of the Declaration of Independence, their thirst for every man's right was an endeavor that would plant a seed in a new growing nation. Some writings of the period have been forgotten. But, to Americans, the outcome of these little books, essays, and speeches will never be forgotten. Even as we speak today in the 20th century, we are reaping the rewards of a war fought in the 18th century. Not only was there a war fought with the musket, but a war fought with the pen, a war of words.

Six SARs Awarded Minuteman Medal

Six Compatriots were offered the prestigious Minuteman Award during Recognition Night at the 101st Annual Congress. Each was selected to be honored for his "noteworthy service of an exceptional character to the National Society" by the Minuteman Committee, which is chaired by Former President General Howard L. Hamilton; every committee member is a past recipient. Candidates for the award are nominated by State Societies; each is given a medal suspended from a blue neck ribbon.

The first awards were presented in 1952; since then 238 Compatriots have been so recognized. The national level positions listed below were those held when nominations were considered by the committee when it met prior to the March 2nd meeting of the Trustees.



Adam Hyler -



During the Revolutionary War, privateers played an important role in the fight against the British. Adam Hyler made his presence well known in the New York Bay area — as recounted by his descendant, Compatriot George Moore.


A search for ancestors is not usually an exciting task but a few years ago, an unexpected event transpired to stir one's blood. My brother was browsing in the Rutgers University Library and found a new book on display entitled "Privateers of '76" written by Fred J. Cook. The name of Captain Adam Hyler seemed familiar and later, at home, he reviewed the Moore family tree. He found that Captain Adam Hyler, a privateer of '76, was indeed one of our ancestors!

Now, we were compelled to research this finding further since our ancestor was "famous" enough to have brought a price on his head. We learned that Adam Hyler was celebrated largely due to the interest of a correspondent for the New Jersey Gazette who lived in New Brunswick, New Jersey. This Trenton newspaper was the most widely read paper of the day among American patriots and Hyler's feats against the British offered headline news.

In February 1886 the Newark Sunday Call reprinted much of the original material for their centennial issue and in 1987, a pageant was held in New Brunswick to dramatize the life and career of Adam Hyler. Stryker's "Official Register of Officers and Men of New Jersey in the Revolutionary War" lists Adam Hyler as Captain in the Naval Service of New Jersey.

ARRIVES FROM GERMANY

Adam Hyler (or Hiler) came to New Brunswick, NJ about 1752 with his father, Philip, and a younger brother, Philip, Jr., from the Grandy Duchy of Baden in Ger-

many. The family name was Hyhler. Adam was said to have been 15 years of age at the time of immigration. The family settled just south of the main dock of New Brunswick on the Raritan River. Adam and his father founded a ferry service for passengers and freight across the Raritan Bay to the New York City area.

Business prospered until 1776 when the British seized New York City for their principal base in a determined attempt to subjugate the American colonies. New York Bay soon became the scene of vast fleets which transported arms and equipment, troops, food and supplies across the Atlantic from Europe, the West Indies, Canada and the Tory farms dotting the east coast from the Carolinas to New Jersey.

William Marriner who also lived at New Brunswick, was the first seaman to try his hand at guerrilla warfare in New York Bay. In 1776, he employed whaleboats some 26 to 30 feet long and carrying crews of 14 to 24 men to attack merchant ships at night anchored off New York City. From the mouth of the Raritan River the distance to New York is 16 to 20 miles; thus a whaleboat could be rowed with ease toward an unsuspecting ship. Then boarding the vessel quickly, overcoming the sleepy watch and hoisting sail, Marriner and his crew would sail the captured prize

across the shoals of the bay to safe hiding places of the Toms and Shrewsbury Rivers along the Jersey coast. There, the heavy British warships dared not venture.

William Marriner operated successfully until 1781 when he was captured on Long Island. He was paroled by the British on his oath that he would not raid again. Apparently, he was a man of his word because a New York newspaper credited him with another raid which he denied vehemently in a letter written to the paper. He suggested that the assault had been carried out by Adam Hyler.

HYLER'S INITIAL FORAY

Adam Hyler must have learned much from his friend and neighbor, William Marriner. Hyler's first raid was in November, 1780 and in a short span of 22 months, he became the most celebrated privateer of the New York Bay. The accounts which follow and as described in the New Jersey Gazette typify Hyler's exploits.

During the afternoon of Friday, October 5, 1781, Patriot informers brought word to Hyler in New Brunswick that a convoy of British ships was anchored inside the protected waters of Sandy Hook. Hyler rounded up his whaleboat crews and led two boats down the Raritan River to the Port of Amboy. Hyler's own boat was the

Revenge, a Hudson River-type sloop about 55 feet long, 19 feet in breadth and weighing about 85 tons. She drew only 8'6" of water and was ideal for shallow rivers and coastal shoals. Hyler and his men waited at the mouth of the Raritan for night to fall and as the murky darkness at last covered the bay, he ghosted his tiny flotilla silently toward Sandy Hook.

Near the point of the Hook, he found a great British man-of-war guarding five smaller ships, two of which were unarmed merchantmen. Hyler now instructed his two whaleboat crews to reconnoiter with leather-wrapped oars. Without a sound, the men were soon back to report that most of the crews were ashore in the log redoubt manned by Tories at the Sandy Hook lighthouse. His men had even ven-

had to work quickly against the odds of being overcome. Cargo for the captured vessels was trundled across the decks and dumped into the *Revenge* and the whaleboats. Cannon, muskets, pistols, gunpowder, cutlasses, clothing, sails, cordage, biscuits, cheese and rum were plundered. Prisoners where herded for later exchange with American prisoners. As Hyler's men worked furiously, guns ashore began to speak. The man-of-war stirred as shouted commands were heard across the water and the ship began to shake canvas sails.

Sparing one boat on which a woman and her four children lay huddled, Hyler set fire to the others and raised every ounce of sail the *Revenge* carried. He swiftly led his two whaleboats toward the

safety of open water. Behind him, burning vessels lit the sky while the huge cannon of the warship roared. The water around the *Revenge* spouted and frothed. Hyler cleared the shallows of the Raritan River safely and reached home in triumph. The *New Jersey Gazette* reported all that happened and listed his booty in detail. Under the rules of official privateering then, Hyler would split his plunder with the colonial forces.

SUCCESSES PHENOMENAL


Adam Hyler's skill and good fortune were phenomenal. He conducted seven raids during the remainder of 1781 and either captured or destroyed 11 enemy ships. Three of the prizes were turned over intact to American forces. The British High Command, now visibly angered, contrived a major attempt to capture Hyler. A fleet of fast-rowing galleys, each armed with a 24-pounder swivel gun, was made ready for Hyler along the south shore of Staten Island. Hyler was informed and avoided the galleys with ease. He continued his attacks on New York harbor without interruption.

The British became desperate. Shortly after midnight on January 7, 1782, several hundred veteran British and Tory troops were assembled for an overland attack on New Brunswick. The assault force moving quickly in sleet and rain scattered the few militia on guard and took possession of the town. The whaleboat fleet was found and destroyed but Hyler escaped capture as he was at sea in the *Revenge*.

The New Jersey Gazette reported this incident in such fervid prose that over 200 volunteers rushed to Hyler's cause. His fleet of whaleboats was quickly rebuilt and made ready for action.

In March, a Tory force stormed an American blockhouse at Toms River and captured Captain Joshua Huddy, an extremely popular Patriot leader. The British High Command turned Huddy over to the Tory leader, Richard Lippincott. Huddy was promptly hanged, much to the dismay of both the British and the Americans since he had been taken in a fair and honest military action. General George Washington ordered lots drawn for a British officer to be hanged in retaliation.

The Huddy affair soon became an inter-



tured close to the guardship without raising an alarm. It appeared as if the watch was asleep.

Hyler wasted no time. He assigned each whaleboat to attack a merchantman while he would fall upon one of the armed privateers in his sloop. The three tiny boats closed in on their targets. Swinging grapnels, Hyler and his men leaped aboard the enemy's decks. The slumbering watch awoke and screamed an alarm but it was no contest. Hyler ended the fight in a few seconds without the loss of a single man.

The alarm had been sounded and Hyler


national incident and while generals and diplomats argued the matter, Hyler decided to act on his own. He devised a plan to capture Lippincott at his home in Manhattan. He stole a long boat from a British ship at anchor off Staten Island and dressed his men in the garb of a naval press-gang. Donning the uniform of a British lieutenant, he boldly sailed through New York harbor in the midst of the British fleet and into the East River. He came to shore just east of the South Ferry landing stages. Hyler led his men in cadence up Broad Street without attracting undue attention. He reached the Lippincott mansion near 11 o'clock, pounded on the door and waited with pistol concealed under his greatcoat. A Negro servant opened the door and explained that Mr. Lippincott was not at home. He was attending an important party somewhere uptown and was not expected until morning. Didn't the Lieutenant know this?

Hyler returned to his long boat disappointed but undaunted. At that moment a rum-laden sloop from the West Indies was dropping anchor in the East River. Hyler reacted without hesitation. He quickly surprised her and deposited the crew in his own long boat. Aboard the prize, Hyler and his men hoisted sail and dashed for the Kill van Kull, a narrow waterway which separates the northern shore of Staten Island from New Jersey. At Elizabethport, he ran the sloop aground, unloaded cargo, which included well-deserved rum, and set the ship afire.

Before the end of April, Hyler was credited by the *Gazette* with three additional raids. He had destroyed or captured five more prizes including a cutter mounting six eighteen- and ten nine-pounders.

RECEIVES LEG WOUND

May brought the onset of some bad luck. Hyler was wounded when a pistol ball passed through the flesh of one leg near the knee. The wound seemed trivial at the time and Hyler continued to attack British shipping. He now was compelled to turn to the shoals and narrows of Bar-

negat Bay to escape intensified enemy pursuit. His favorite ploy was to sail his boats through a very narrow inlet called The Gut which linked the Shrewsbury River to the Atlantic Ocean. This inlet was

only navigable at high tide to shallow-draft vessels.

Hyler was now branded a "pirate" by the British and a price was placed on his head. A new plan was placed into action to capture him. Tory forces in armed rowing galleys were sent into position to catch Hyler in an ambush at The Gut. A Tory land force waited to close the trap at the base of Sandy Hook. Hyler was unperturbed when informed of the ambush. He and his men successfully attacked the Tory land force from the rear at night and then met the crews of the armed galleys as they landed on the shore in confusion to join the fight.

Hyler conducted three raids in June and captured four ships in Gravesend Bay off Long Island. On July 2 he learned of a sleek, fast schooner manning six large carriage guns laying at anchor inside of Sandy Hook. Hyler decided to take her in broad daylight using still another ruse. He instructed his men to stack cordwood on the decks of the Revenge to disguise the sloop and hide his men. He lashed one whaleboat tight against the starboard rail where it could not be seen from the shore. Then he sailed toward the schooner in a desultory and lazy fashion in order to suggest that his crew were inept woodsmen rather than sailors. The watch on on the schooner was amused.

Close aboard, Hyler swung into action. The whaleboat was released with full crew while the *Revenge* was quickly brought up under the stern of the schooner. The enemy was soon dispatched and 12 prisoners were hauled onto the *Revenge*. British ships in the area now began to converge on Hyler so the beautiful, sleek and fast schooner which Hyler sought for his own was sadly fired. This was the last

major raid of Adam Hyler. His knee was now badly infected and after a long and painful illness, he died at his home in New Brunswick on September 6, 1782.

SON BORN, NAMED ADAM

Ten days later, his wife, Ann Nevius Hyler, gave birth — a boy, who was named Adam. The New Jersey Gazette of September 25, 1782 reported that Adam Hyler was laid to rest in the old Dutch burial ground of New Brunswick. A DAR marker now locates the site on the bank of the Raritan River where Hyler launched his whaleboats. And it has been dutifully recorded that on September 14, 1850, Eliza Nevius Hyler was married to a certain George Moore of Tewksbury, New Jersey.

On May 20 President General and Mrs. James R. Calhoun, accompanied by Treasurer General and Mrs. Edward S. Hoyt, winged their way to London to begin official visits to the United Kingdom, France and Switzerland Societies. Before their return on June 1, the whirlwind trip had encompassed gatherings with our overseas Compatriots, receptions with government

dignitaries, the presentation of medals and tours of various historic sites.

While in London, the foursome was royally entertained. Included was a gala banquet attended by representatives of the SAR, DAR, Colonial Dames and Huguenots. A highlight there was presentation of the Gold Good Citizenship Medal to the Rt. Honorable Lord Hailsham of St. Mary-

lebone, former Lord Chancellor of the United Kingdom and Speaker of the House of Lords. He became a member of the SAR shortly after giving a talk at the 1981 commemoration of the Bicentennial of the Battle of Yorktown in which he stated that his ancestor fought with the Patriots. As Lord Chancellor, he was the Queen's official representative at the event.









It is interesting to note that he was also Mayor in September, 1983 while hosting a reception at the same location for hundreds of SARs and members of Revolutionary War re-enactment groups from the United States as part of the celebration of the Bicentennial of the Treaty of Paris.

On the agenda was a visit to the Chateau de Rochambeau at Vendome, the home of France Society President Comte Michel de Rochambeau; he is a descendant of Comte Jean Baptiste de Vimeur de Rochambeau, who commanded the French Army in the



Bill of Rights Exhibit Touring In Replica of Famed HMS Rose

With the guidance of Frederick K. Biebel, a member of Gen. Gold Selleck Silliman Branch No. 3, Connecticut Society, a fullsize, 500-ton replica of a Revolutionary War era frigate is on a multi-city tour from Maine to California to showcase a U.S. Bill of Rights display.

The ship is the HMS Rose, which is normally moored and maintained in Bridgeport, Connecticut as an educational and historical

The nine-month tour celebrates the 200th anniversary of the ratification of the Bill of Rights. It has official recognition from the Commission on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. The cruise features a display of historic documents related to the Constitution and Bill of Rights, including the original copy of the Bill of Rights sent to Rhode Island for ratification.

Compatriot Biebel said one of the tour's goals "is to acquaint more of America's young people with America's rights and freedoms." The head of the Bicentennial

Commission, retired Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, said it was hoped that "through this exhibit, all Americans, young and old, will take part in remembering the greatness of America's history. It is hoped they will experience for themselves this part of our nation's history which granted to all Americans the precious rights and freedoms they possess today."

Port Visits Scheduled

Prior to the Summer Issue of The SAR Magazine being published in August, the HMS Rose had sailed into several ports on the East Coast - from Jacksonville, Florida to New York City. In a fall swing through New England, she will go to Port Jefferson, Long Island, Aug. 25-27; to Newport, RI, Aug. 28-30; to Boston, MA, Sept. 29-Oct.

1; to Providence, RI, Oct. 2-7; to Bristol. RI, Oct. 8-14; to Newport, RI, Oct. 16-20; back in Bridgeport, Oct. 23-27; to Atlantic City, NJ, Oct. 30 to Nov. 6; to Baltimore, MD, Nov. 8-13; to Annapolis, MD, Nov. 15-24; to Wilmington, DE, Nov. 26-Dec. 3; and finishing in Philadelphia, PA, Dec. 5-16.

The cruise is sponsored in part by the Nynex Corporation, Southern New England Telephone and New York Telephone. Contributions from those viewing the exhibits will help to support the HMS Rose Foundation of Bridgeport, Save the Children and the U.S. Olympic Committee.

Although the HMS Rose is a replica of a ship used by the British to harrass the fledgling United States in 1776, it serves as a piece of colonial history in its home port of Bridgeport. When there, she provides educational programs about colonial and maritime Connecticut and New England, and is a highlight of various civic/patriotic programs. She is normally available for public visits and student tours. Experienced hands give guided tours of exhibits plus talks.

Also Toured Great Lakes

Earlier this year, the ship made a 20-city, 6,000-mile tour of the Great Lakes, visiting ports in the U.S. and Canada as an ambassador for the State of Connecticut. She took part in the 1986 Op/Sail celebration at the Statue of Liberty.

Fred Biebel is the Executive Director of the nonprofit HMS Rose Foundation, which oversees the use of the ship. The 24-gun, fully rigged sailing frigate is said to be the largest wooden tall ship in operation in the world.

The current Bill of Rights cruise follows another Bicentennial effort in 1987. This was the "Roads to Liberty" tour, in which Compatriot Biebel was involved as a member of the Commission on the Bicentennial of the Constitution. It also involved historical documents, traveling in an air conditioned trailer. The tour made a 26-state swing, displaying a copy of the Magna Carta on loan from the Lincoln Cathedral. Other documents relating to the Constitution were also shown.

Built in 1970

The 179-foot-long, 500-ton Rose was built in 1970 in Nova Scotia from virtually the same plans as her 1756 original. She was rescued, rebuilt and restored by the HMS Rose Foundation and Mr. Kaye Williams of the Captain's Cove Seaport Marina in Bridgeport, CT, in 1984 after her original owners let her fall into disrepair.

A crew of veteran shipwrights aided by hundreds of volunteers rebuilt the Rose in Connecticut, replacing all of the frames and planks from the waterline up. A new stem, mizzen mast and bowsprit were installed

plus several thousand feet of rigging. The work was done with financial help ranging from individual contributions up to funds of the city, state and area corporations.

British Original in Revolution

The original HMS Rose was built by the British before the Revolutionary War for the defense of England's North American interests during the French and Indian War. This was when even George Washington wore a British uniform. She was built in Hull, England in 1756. Her log showed action in the English Channel against the ports of France in the Seven Years War. In 1761 she sailed to the Caribbean and took part in the capture of Havana and Martinique.

Although the Rose was British, her friends and preservationists credit the ship with being the moving force behind at least three major strides in the early patriotic history of the American colonies.

First, they avow that American Patriot John Adams was launched into the limelight by the Rose in 1769 in an offshoot of the British practice of impressing seamen to serve on their vessels. The frigate, while on patrol off Boston, tried to impress seamen from another ship. The first officer was killed as the seamen resisted. Adams was appointed public defender of the four seamen accused of piracy in resisting the impressment. With his legal skill, they were found innocent by reason of self-defense, and Adams' career was launched.

Secondly, her friends say the original Rose was responsible for the creation of the U.S. Navy when, in 1774, she was sent by the British to crack down on the smuggling industry then prevalent at Newport, RI. The smugglers had destroyed a number of previous British ships sent against this lucrative trade, but the Rose being a larger ship fought the smugglers with success. This led to the Continental Congress creating an American Navy in 1775 to deal with the Rose on request of the Rhode Island General

And as an ironic third item, even in death in 1779 the Rose claims a plus for the Americans. That was when she was scuttled by her crew in Savannah harbor in 1779 to block a French invasion fleet. As a result, the fleet was unable to get close enough to bombard the city, thus saving Savannah from destruction.

Departed Compatriots Remembered

The traditional Memorial Service, which honors those Compatriots who have passed away during the year, was held during the 101st Annual Congress in our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church within walking distance of the Congress Headquarters hotel. Participating in various aspects of the program were President General James R. Calhoun, Secretary General George H. Bran-

dau, Chaplain General Rev. Canon Charles I. Kratz, Jr., Past Chaplain General W. Ramsey Richardson and FPGs Carl F. Bessent, Clovis H. Brakebill, Nolan W. Carson and Benjamin H. Morris

As he has in many such services, FPG Bessent recalled some of the 589 departed Compatriots who had given outstanding service to the Society: Ronald O. Baymiller, WISSAR, Past Librarian General, Chairman of the 87th Annual Congress; Rev. Joe Head, MNSSAR, who travelled the country with the SAR Liberty Bell program; Vincent Van Inwegen, NJSSAR, Past Treasurer General; and Fred T. Leathers, Past Historian General. He named several who had been prominent in their careers: Hamilton Fish, ESSSAR, 102 years old, who served as a U.S. Congressman from New York; Dr. Victor A. Gilbertson, MNSSAR, a prominent cancer researcher and physician; Gen. Lemuel Shepherd, VASSAR, who was Commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps and first Marine Corps General to serve as a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; and U.S. Senator John Tower, TXSSAR, who had served as Chairman of the Armed Forces Committee.



Chaplain General Rev. Canon Charles I. Kratz, Jr. offered an inspiring message that touched on the Founding Fathers and those Compatriots who had passed away during the past year.

The Memorial Sermon, delivered by Chaplain General Kratz, was based on Ecclesiasticus 44:1 — Let us now praise famous men and our fathers that begat us. He recalled those Patriots of old who were the Founding Fathers and what they did and compared them with Compatriots who had died still believing in the principles of the SAR and on which our country was founded.

Congress Delegates Approve Resolutions

Resolutions proposed to delegates attending the 101st Annual Congress were presented by Carl K. Hoffman, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee. All were approved and are summarized here. Full texts. available from National Headquarters, are being forwarded where applicable to the appropriate committees of the United States Senate and House of Representatives.

NATIONAL DEFENSE — That the NSSAR:

- 1. Opposes allowing the Soviets to modernize and to continue testing of their SS-18 Mod-5
- 2. Opposes grants, subsidies or economic loans or aid of any kind to the Soviet Union in so long as the Soviets insist on modernizing and testing their SS-18 Mod 5 missiles,
- 3. Vigorously reaffirms its 1984, 1988, 1989 and 1990 resolutions supporting the full funding of the Strategic Defense Initiative, and
- 4. Vigorously supports the deployment of the "Brilliant Pebbles" system to protect America.

AIDS — That the NSSAR:

- 1. Urges the federal government to retain the HIV virus, syphilis, gonorrhea and leprosy, along with tuberculosis, as communicable diseases which prevent entry into the United States for visitation or residence.
- 2. Vigorously reaffirms its 1987 resolution on the issue of AIDS adopted at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS That the NSSAR urges adoption of a federal law abolishing the National Endowment for the Arts.

AUDIT OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK

That the NSSAR supports the principles contained in H.R. 1130 which require the Federal Open Market Committee to disclose immediately

any changes in targets of the monetary policy and to allow the Comptroller General to conduct audits of the Federal Reserve.

WASHINGTON SQUARE — That the NSSAR:

- 1. Urges the City of Philadelphia to transfer the title to Washington Square to the National Park Service, and
- 2. Urges the Congress of the United States to appropriate the funds necessary to incorporate and maintain Washington Square into the Independence National Historical Park.

R.O.T.C. — That the NSSAR commends the Congress for continuing the funding for the various College and High School R.O.T.C. Programs.

Two meetings of the National Trustees and the General Sessions of the 101st Annual Congress were held at the Westin Crown Center Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri. The Minutes presented here are edited and condensed, with items marked (*) reported elseere in this issue of the magazine. Full Minutes are available from the Executive Director

1990-91 TRUSTEES MEETING — Sunday, June 16, 1991

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Presiden General James R. Calhoun. The Invocation, led by Chaplain General Rev. Canon Charles I. Kratz, Jr., was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag led by Secretary General George

The Minutes of the March 2 meeting of the Trustees were

FPG Carl F. Bessent stated that advertisements in the Fall Issue of the magazine for candidates seeking office must be camera-ready and will be discounted 15% of the commercial rate. Fund solicitations must be at the advertiser's rate, with a 15% discount for SAR projects.

PG Calhoun thanked the Trustees for their support during his term. He solicited their support in convincing the delegation of the need for the \$5 dues increase, which had also been approved by the Executive Committee. He received a standing

The meeting was adjourned at 11:20 a.m.

OPENING GENERAL SESSION — Monday, June 17, 1991

The Session was called to order at 9:05 a.m. by President General James R. Calhoun. The Invocation, led by Chaplain General Rev. Canon Charles I. Kratz, Jr., was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag led by Secretary General George H. Brandau, M.D. The Colors were presented by the Combined Color Guard consisting of SAR State Society Units and the Command College Unit at Ft. Leavenworth, KS.

Addresses of welcome were received from Kansas Society President Herrick H. Kessler and Missouri Society President William G. Buckner.

Greetings were received from Mrs. Eldred M. Yochim, President General, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; Mrs. Paul M. Niebell, Senior National President. Children of the American Revolution; Rear Adm. Joseph L. Loughran, USNR (Ret), General President, Sons of the Revolution; Mrs. Richard C. McGehee, Regent, Kansas Society, DAR: and Mrs. Ophelia Wade, Regent, Missouri Society, DAF

PG Calhoun made presentations to the Eisenhower Center and Truman Center (*).

Presentations were made to the National Society. These ranged from a rare portrait of George Washington (*) to books for the Library and contributions to various Funds.

Next were comments and reports from Former Presidents

FPG James R. Westlake, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, reported on the Committee's selections: President General, George H. Brandau, M.D.; Secretary General, Paul H. Walker; Treasurer General, Col. Robert B. Vance, Sr.; Registrar General, Col. Stewart B. McCarty; Historian General, William C. Gist, D.M.D.; Chancellor General, William R. Eddleman; Surgeon General, Robert L. Kurth, M.D.; Chaplain General, Paul T. Butler, Th.D.; Genealogist General, Everett H. Sanneman, M.D.; Librarian General, Richard E. Willson

The reports of virtually all General Officers and Committee Chairmen were submitted prior to the Congress and distributed to attendees. Pertinent verbal remarks follow.

Historian General James A. Williams, reporting as Chairman of the Museum Board, stated that paintings of these Revolutionary War personalities were in work: Thomas Jefferson Lafayette, Robert Livingston and James Armstead Lafayette a Black who served under Lafayette at Yorktown.
Chancellor General William R. Eddleman reminded dele-

gates that in order to protect the integrity of transactions and ments, the only person who can commit for the Society is the President General.

Librarian General Richard E. Willson acknowledged \$15,000 gift from Dr. John D. Brumbaugh, OHSSAR, for the purchase of genealogical records on microfilm. Chancellor General William R. Eddleman, Chairman of the

Bylaws Committee, presented proposed amendments to the

Proposal No. 1 would delete Bylaw 18, Section 6. A motion by CG Eddleman to adopt the proposal was seconded and

Proposal No. 2 amends Bylaw 19, Section 3 to raise the annual dues to \$17. After some discussion, the question was called, two tellers were appointed by CG Eddleman and a 219-23 vote was recorded in favor of the proposal.

Proposal No. 3 included four recommendations that would amend Bylaws 7, 15, 18 and 21 as proposed by the Ad Hoc Committee chaired by Former President General Arthur M. King. CG Eddleman moved that the amendments be adopted. The motion was seconded and passed. The amended Bylaws

Bylaw No. 7 — Treasurer General

The Treasurer General is the chief financial officer of the Society. His duties require that the person holding the office have experience in accounting, banking, and/or financial management. His general duties are: collecting, safekeeping, depositing and disbursing all funds and securities of the National Society. He shall be responsible for: general supervision of the accounting system and keeping the President General, Executive Committee, other officers and Committee Chairmen informed on financial affairs of the Society. He is also responsible for communications with the accounting firm retained by the Society, and agreements with financial institutions, subject to the following provisions:

(1) All funds shall be deposited in the name of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in such accounts and depositories as shall be designated by the Board of Trustees.

(2) Disbursements shall be made by check signed by any two authorized officers, except that the Executive Director is authorized to sign, without another signatory, any check for headquarters operations payable in mount of three hundred dollars (\$300) or less.

(3) Authorized signatures shall be those of the President General, Secretary General, Treasurer General and Executive Director

(4) The Executive Director and any other members, employees, and officers as shall be determined by the Board of Trustees shall be placed under bond for the faithful performance of their duties in an amount specified by

(5) The accounts of the Society shall be audited annually by Certified Public Accountants selected by the Board of Trustees, based on a recommendation of the Executive Committee. The Certified Public Accountants re port, in summary form, shall be made available to all Trustees, and to any member upon request.



Chancellor General William R. Eddleman was responsible for introducing Bylaws amendments for consideration by delegates.

(6) All funds, securities, and negotiable instruments shall be deposited, or held in safekeeping or in a safe deposit box, with one or more banks or trust companies, at such place or places as shall be designated by resolution of the Board of Trustees and shall be there held at all times subject to the joint control of the following: The President General, Secretary General, Treasurer General and Executive Director, any two of whom shall have power to issue instructions to any bank or trust company acting as depository, with respect to the sale, investment, reinvestment or other disposition of such assets. authority for which has been given by those who have that responsibility. (See Bylaw No. 21.) No officer of the Society shall receive commission, consideration or personal profit by any such transaction

Any monies and securities constituting part of the Permanent Fund or other such restricted funds of the Society shall be subject to these controls and shall be deposited and held separate from the General Operating Fund of the Society. Any change in the Investment Policy set forth in Section 2 of Bylaw
No. 21 proposed by the Investment Committee must be recommended to the Treasurer General for review and consideration. The Treasurer General shall report his conclusion to the Finance Committee for their consideration and the proposal and findings of the Finance Committee are then to be submitted to the xecutive Committee for approval or rejection.

The Treasurer General shall consult with the Finance Committee and report annually to the Trustees and the Congress on ctivities under his control

Bylaw No. 15 — Professional Staff

Section 1. Executive Director — The Executive Director, an employee of the Society, shall be employed by the President General with the approval of the Executive Committee. The terms of employment shall include a provision that the Executive Committee may, at any time, upon thirty (30) days' advance written notice by certified mail terminate such employment, with or without cause. The Executive Committee may, in its discretion, amend the terms of employment at any time.

Section 2. The Executive Director shall:

(a) take charge of, maintain, operate and serve as custodian and manager of all Headquarters properties, both real and personal, and all equipment, furnishings, books of account and records of the Society;

(b) employ the necessary authorized clerical staff for the Society and discharge same at his discretion. The salaries for the staff, as approved in the annual budget, shall be allocated by the Executive Director.

(c) perform all administrative acts for the General Officers of the Society and such other functions, consistent with the Constitution and Bylaws, which may be delegated to him by the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee or by an Annual Congress:

(d) initiate, approve, and place orders for equipment and supplies for the Society, in such manner as the Executive Committee may direct.

Section 3. Comptroller — The Comptroller, an employee of the Society, may be employed by the Executive Director at the direction of a committee consisting of the President General, Treasurer General, Executive Director and three other members with expertise in accounting or financial management, to be appointed by the President General. His duties are listed below. Qualifications for this position shall include being a Certified Public Accountant, or having educational qualifications and work experience equivalent to that of a Certified Public Accountant, preferably with at least five (5) years experience as a fund accountant.

Section 4. The Comptroller shall be responsible for the administration of all accounting functions of the Society and shall report to the Treasurer General functionally on all financial

I. The Comptroller shall assist the Treasurer General in: (a) Fulfilling his duties and responsibilities (Bylaw No. 7), by supervising the depositing, disbursing, investing, statement reporting, budgeting, and safekeeping functions of the Society's cash, securities and other assets.

(b) Supervising all personnel who share responsibility for maintaining the financial records and preparing the fiscal reports of the Society.

The Society's annual audit. 2. The Comptroller shall report administratively to the recutive Director and functionally to the Treasurer General. Bylaw No. 18 — Other Committees
Section 1. The President General shall appoint the following

Standing Committees: Internal Audit, Budget, Finance, Medical, National Headquarters, Patriotic Education and Museum Board. The duties of these committees shall be such as usually pertain to committees of that nature, except as provided by

(a) Internal Audit Committee — The President General shall appoint an Internal Audit Committee composed of three (3) members, each for a three (3) year term, with the first year's appointments to be for one (1), two (2), and three (3) year terms. Any vacancy shall be filled by appointment of the President General for the unexpired term. Each year the President General shall appoint the Chairman for the current year and one member for a three-year term.

The Internal Audit Committee will perform such duties or projects relating to the accounting and financial functions of the Society as may be specifically assigned by the President General, or it may propose any such proi ect it deems appropriate or necessary, and is authorized to secure such reports, correspondence, or other information that it needs to fulfill its responsibilities.

The results of any work done by the committee shall be reported to the President General.



FPG Carl F. Bessent reported on behalf of the Magazine Advisory Committee.

(b) Budget Committee — The President General shall appoint a Budget Committee composed of three (3) members, each for a three (3) year term, with the first year's ntments to be for one (1), two (2), and three (3) year terms. Any vacancy shall be filled by appointment of the President General for the unexpired term. Each year the President General shall appoint the current Chairman and one member for a three-year term.

The Committee shall prepare an annual budget for each fiscal year and submit each budget to the President General, Treasurer General, Finance Committee and Executive Committee for their review and approval prior to submission of the budget by the Treasurer General to the Annual Congress for its final approval. Such annual budget shall be for the fiscal year starting after the Annual Congress at which it is approved.

The committee shall review the monthly operating statements during each fiscal year, and advise the President General, Treasurer General, Executive Director, Executive Committee, and Board of Trustees, of its coments and forecast of operations as appropriate.

(c) Finance Committee — The Finance Committee is the oversight committee of the Society in which all fiscal ounting procedures and operations are reviewed and monitored. It is authorized to request any necessary or desired fiscal records.

The responsibilities of the members of this committee require that they have knowledge and expertise in at least one of the following fields: accounting, banking, financial management, or investment management. The Finance Committee shall:

(1) Review all Society financial statements, relations with banks and other financial institutions, proposed changes in investment policy, the merchandise operations and the fiscal operations of the Executive Director (2) Report directly to the Executive Committee on any

fiscal matter they believe is of importance to the Society. The President General shall initially appoint eight (8) members with two appointees having terms of one (1), two (2), three (3) and four (4) years respectively. Thereafter, he shall appoint two (2) members for a four (4) year term and fill within 90 days any vacancy for the unexpired

The Treasurer General shall be an additiona member of the Finance Committee but is ineligible to serve as Chairman.

The President General shall appoint the Chairman, who will serve for two (2) years. His removal from office may be recommended by a threefourths majority vote of the members. Any member whose attendance record, or whose contribution to the deliberations or financial expertise is considered inadequate, may be recommended for removal by a majority vote of the members to the Executive Committee

Section 2. There shall be an Investment Committee with a total of three (3) members, including its Chairman The members of this Committee are appointed by the President General and confirmed by a vote of two-thirds of the members of he Executive Committee. The term of office of committee members shall be three (3) years with one (1) term expiring each year on adjournment of the Annual Congress provided, however, that the mem-bers of this committee shall serve, and be competent to act, until their successors shall have been duly appointed and confirmed. On establishment of the committee, an pointments shall be made for terms of one (1), two (2) and three (3) years, respectively. Thereafter, one appoint ment shall be made each year for a three (3) year term Each year the President General shall appoint the Chair man which appointment is subject to confirmation by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Executive Com-

If any committee member shall be unable to serve his full term because of death, resignation, or disability, there shall be an appointment by the President Genera for the unexpired portion of the term, subject to confirmation by the Executive Committee as in the case of an appointment for a full term. The Executive Committee shall have power by a two-thirds vote, to find and determine the existence of disability for the purpose of this

The responsibilities of the members of this committee require that they have knowledge and expertise in at least one of the following fields: banking, financial management, or investment management.

The committee authorizes the investment of all funds of the Society in accordance with the established Investment Policy as set forth in Section 2 of Bylaw No. 21

or as it may be amended.

The committee is authorized to propose changes in the Investment policy of all funds of the Society and shall notify the Treasurer General, in writing of any such proposal in ample time for him to consider the proposal and to take steps to propose an amendment to Section 2 of Bylaw No. 21.

The members of the Investment Committee, the Executive Committee, the President General, and the Treasurer General, in performing their respective duties under this section, shall be limited to the obligation to act in good faith. There shall be no personal liability for losses arising from errors in judgment. No member of the Investment Committee shall receive any commission. or consideration or personally profit from any such trans-

(Recommended deletion of Section 3.)

Bylaw No. 21 — Fund Management Section 1. Types of Funds.

(a) Permanent Fund — There shall be created and maintained a Permanent Fund of the Society. The income thereon shall be accumulated and semi-annually added to the principal of the Permanent Fund, provided that any part not to exceed one-half of such income may, by vote of a majority of those voting at a meeting of the Board of Trustees, be used for the general purposes of the Society. Any part of the principal of such fund shall be expended only upon the suggestion and consideration of the Executive Committee, approved by a three fourths vote of those voting at a meeting of the Board of Trustees and ratified by a three-fourths vote of the delegates present and voting at the Annual Congress to which such recommendation of the Executive Committee and approval of the Board of Trustees shall be reported. Notice that such a proposal is to be presented at an Annual Congress and shall be given in the same manner as an amendment (b) Special Purpose Funds — There shall be created

New Forms for Filing Simple, Uniform Reports

New reporting forms have been designed for the collection and maintenance of valuable data relative to every level of our Society. according to an announcement by President General George H. Brandau.

Beginning with the Fall 1991 Meeting of the National Trustees. the new program will be implemented to facilitate the preparation of simple, uniform reports by General Officers, Vice-Presidents General and Committee Chairmen. As in the past, reports will be bound and distributed to all attendees.

Two other forms are for use by State Societies and Chapters in filing Annual Reports of such information as newly elected officers and activities. A third permits summarizing voluntary contributions to the George Washington Fund.

Reports will be on permanent file at National Headquarters. Any member may obtain access to

and maintained such Special Purpose Funds as shall be needed to segregate monies received for restricted purposes other than the purposes of the Permanent Fund or the General Operating Fund of the Society.

The principal of each such Fund shall be identified as a "Special Purpose Endowment Fund", and combined with the Permanent Fund principal for investment purposes only. The investment income from the "Special Purpose Endowment Fund", plus any income earned from other sources or from donations for operating purposes, shall be deemed to be a separate "Spe cial Purpose Operating Fund" for a specified restricted purpose, and accounted for separately, but may be nbined with other Special Purpose Operating Funds for temporary investment purposes until disbursed unless otherwise provided by the instrument trust or bequest pursuant to which the special fund was created.

Neither the principal nor the income of a Special Purpose Fund can be expended for any purpose other than that for which the Fund is established unless such expenditure is authorized in the same manner as an expenditure of principal of the Permanent Fund: provided no such expenditure for another purpose shall be contrary to law or the terms of any trust or bequest pursuant to which the fund was created.

Withdrawal of part or all of the income in a Special Purpose Fund shall be by request of the appropriate committee having authority over the Fund, with the concurrence of the President General consistent with the terms of any trust or bequest pursuant to which the special fund was created.

Withdrawal of any monies from any Special Purpose Fund which is not under the authority of an appropriate committee shall be by the authorization of the Treasurer General with the concurrence of the President General. Unless otherwise provided in the instrument

(c) General Operating Fund — There shall be created and maintained a General Operating Fund, which shall consist of the monies used for the operating expenses of the Society as authorized by the current budget The temporary investment of these funds is controlled by the Investment Committee

Section 2. Investment Policy

(a) Operating Funds — General Operating Fund and Special Purpose Operating Funds shall be invested in interest bearing checking accounts or savings or similar accounts or certificates of deposit in federally insured banking institutions (up to the federally insured maximum), or obligations of the U.S. Government or agencies of the U.S. Government whose obligations are guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the U.S. Government, for a period of time not to exceed one (1) year. (b) Permanent Funds — The principal of the Perma-

nent Fund and Special Purpose Endowment Funds, shall be invested in obligations of the U.S. Government or agencies of the U.S. Government whose obligations are guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the U.S. Government, for a period of time not to exceed ten years. Investment income, income from other sources and donations to be added to principal may be invested temporarily in the same manner as Operating Funds.

(c) Premium Amortization — If a premium is paid in making a purchase, it shall be completely amortized in the shortest practicable period that will

not materially affect the distributable income.

Section 3. Ray Henshaw National Life Membership Fund. There shall be a restricted fund entitled, "The National Life Membership Fund" (hereinafter called "The Fund"), generated by payments made by member accompanied by an application for enrollment which is in accordance with a published schedule of applicable amounts based on the age of the enrolling member and which has been approved by the Executive Committee.
The Fund shall be administered by the Investment Committee in accordance with the provisions of Section 1(b) and Section 2(b) of Bylaw No. 21, subject to the follow-

(a) Within 30 days after the end of each fiscal year an amount for income earned from the invested capital of The Fund equal to the total of the National Society dues of the enrolled members as of the end of the fiscal year shall be transferred to the General Fund of the National Society. Excess earned income shall be added to the capital

(b) If, at the end of any fiscal year, there is not sufficient income from the invested capital of The Fund to meet the requirements of subsection (a) above, the National Society shall accept the total income for said fiscal year as full payment of that year's National dues. In subsequent years any income earned in excess of that current year's dues shall be applied against the deficiency of the prior year, or years, until the total deficiency has been met

(c) Upon the death of an enrolled member his name shall be removed from The Fund's rolls and payment of National dues for such deceased member shall cease.

(d) Upon notification from a State Society that an enrolled member has been dropped from membership his name shall be removed from The Fund's rolls and payment of his National dues to the National Society's General Fund shall be suspended until advice is received from a State Society that the dropped member has been reinstated.

(e) An enrolled member who has been dropped from State Society membership shall be deemed to have forfeited all his rights to Life Membership unless advice of his reinstatement is received by the National Society within ten (10) years, the same distribution of funds shall be made as in the case of the death of an enrolled member.

(f) A list of enrolled members whose deaths have been reported in State Society annual reports shall be prepared after the close of each fiscal

(g) Enrollment in the Fund is available to all members of the Society. All applications for enrollment must come through the State Societies.

(h) In the event that this Section should be repealed, the payment of National dues of enrolled National Life Members shall continue, as provided herein, until all enrolled members are deceased or have been suspended for ten (10) years, as provided nerein. Thereupon, all funds remaining in The Fund shall be transferred to the Permanent Fund of the National Society.

Proposal No. 4 would amend Bylaw 14 to broaden qualifications for Surgeon General to include Doctors of Osteopathy. A motion by CG Eddleman to adopt the amendment was made and passed.

Proposals No. 5 and No. 6 would amend Bylaws 5 and 6 to provide for the office of Senior Vice Presiden General. After discussion, motions were made to table both proposals. They were seconded and passed.

Membership Chairman John Hallberg Jones reported that there were now 508 Compatriots enrolled as Life Members and that a total of 816 youngsters were enrolled in the Youth Registration Program. He pointed out that a new fee scale for the Life Membership Program is needed in view of the dues increase. The meeting was adjourned.

Tips on Promoting Constitution Week in Your Community

The Spring 1991 Issue of The SAR Magarine carried an informative article on page 24 that detailed ways in which Constitution Week — September 17-23 — may be commemorated in your community. Presented here are varied tools for use in communicating Constitution Week to the public, including a Proclamation, news release and radio/ TV announcement; they have been provided by the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution, Washington, DC. Just tailor to your needs!

Importantly, the media will be interested in the fact that Constitution Day was initiated when Iowa Society President Elmer M. Wentworth prevailed upon the Iowa State Legislature to provide for an observance on September 17, 1911. Other states adopted the practice and in 1949 all governors issued Constitution Day Proclamations.

In 1938 the San Diego Chapter suggested "National Citizenship Day" as part of Constitution Day for all newly naturalized citizens in the foregoing year to be recognized

into American citizenship. Constitution Day was eliminated for national observance by resolution of the U.S. Congress and approved by the President in 1952; September 17 was designated as Citizenship Day.

In 1955 the Daughters of the American Revolution promoted the concept of devoting the entire week to include both Constitution Day and Citizenship Day. The Congress and Compatriot President Eisenhower approved the resolution for Constitution Week to begin on September 17 each year.

WHEREAS, it is important that all citizens fully understand the provisions, principles and meaning of the Constitution so they can support, preserve and defend it against encroachment;

WHEREAS, the Bicentennial of the Constitution provides an historic opportunity for all Americans to learn about and to reflect upon the rights and privileges of citizenship and its responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, the President and the Congress of the United States have designated September 17 as Citizenship Day and the week of September 17-23 as Constitution Week; and

WHEREAS, the people of the State (city or community) of do enjoy the blessings of liberty, the guarantees of the Bill of Rights, equal protection of the law under the Constitution, and the freedoms derived from it;





Museum Obtaining Huge Microfilm Collection on G.R. Clark

The National Society Museum, working in collaboration with our Library, will soon make available to our membership more than 100,000 documents, letters and papers from the collection of the George Rogers Clark Illinois Regiment at the Virginia State Library. Microfilming of the entire collection has been made possible through funding efforts of the Museum.

This massive collection of materials relating to Patriot Clark — which has never before been microfilmed — represents the most elaborate information available in original manuscript form about the Illinois Regiment under his command. The material at hand will not only be made available to SARs, but will provide an important window of opportunity to scholars, researchers and schools in the Midwest.

Last fall the Museum was made aware of the need of this microfilming project. A combined effort was organized in cooperation with the SAR Library, Illinois Society Colonial Wars and Illinois Sons of the Revolution to make possible the funding of this important work. The cost which was distributed between the three societies amounted

to \$8,750. Museum Director James A. Williams agreed to act as agent for the three heritage organizations with the Virginia State Library for the completion of the project.

Besides the SAR Library, two major Illinois libraries will benefit from this work. The Newberry Library of Chicago will receive one diazo copy of the original filming as will the Illinois State Historical Library at Springfield.

The collection is essentially the papers of the Illinois Regiment of the Virginia State Forces of persons and matters relating to the Illinois Regiment. The regiment was not Continental Line, nor was it what would be considered "militia", being in fact a regular line regiment raised out of the Virginia establishment. It was raised, supplied and supported by the Commonwealth of Virginia as opposed to the Continental Congress. This unit was the only military force, besides an under-strength company of Continental Marines, sent west by either Congress or any of the states to contest with England for the control of lands in the lower Ohio and upper Mississippi Rivers. It is accurate to state that these lands, which

became the Northwest Territory under the control of the newly independent United States, were in fact secured solely through the actions of the Illinois Regiment raised and commanded by George Rogers Clark.

The Clark papers in the Virginia State Archives represent the most complete information available in original manuscript form of any other collection documenting the activities of a Revolutionary War Regiment.

The reason the collection itself had never been microfilmed to preserve this valuable information was the lack of funds on the part of the Virginia State Library. In years past, the collection had been raided for documents for various purposes, had been moved to other collections for various purposes and had been loosely reorganized and left stored in original boxes. This made it extremely difficult to sort through the collection and find specific pieces of information. Some of the documents were badly aged and would have been at risk through fire or other disaster. The collection itself is absolutely irreplaceable. These materials, once at risk, will now be saved for use by the entire academic community.


Official SAR First Day Covers Mark Desert Shield, Desert Storm

THE CHAPLAIN'S CALL By Dr. Paul T. Butler, Chaplain General

Congratulations to former Chaplain General Rev. Canon Charles I. Kratz, Jr., for the past year. "Well done!" Your completion of the publication of American Chaplains of the Revolution will be of monumental service to the Society and America. Your articles in The SAR Magazine were spiritually uplifting and challenging. Thank you, "Chappie". We count it an honor and privilege to be selected to "follow in your train".

In keeping with the spirit of the Bicentennial of America's Bill of Rights, we want to focus the coming year on the correlation of those "Rights" to the religious faith of our Founding Fathers. To this end we will be excerpting anecdotes from What The Bible Says About Civil Government, by "your's truly" in "Chaplain's Call" articles, and through a new series of "Op. Ed." sample letters, also by your new Chaplain General. The latter will soon be made available to any State Society or local SAR Chapter requesting them.

Retired Missouri Circuit Judge and now Mayor of Carthage, Missouri, Hon. Herbert Casteel, delivered the commencement address at Ozark Christian College, May 18, 1991. Mayor Casteel ardently enjoined the graduates and audience for a revival of Christian involvement and influence in civic affairs. The silence and apathy of the majority of professing believers today in our country toward civic involvement is shockingly disparate to that of our forefathers. Strong Biblical faith in America's patriarchs became the source of the freedoms we now enjoy. Our national heritage must not be now abandoned.

A letter to the editor of the Joplin, Missouri, *Globe* newspaper in 1991 heralded the Supreme Court's decision to prohibit a voluntary class of Bible instruction in an elementary school in Gravette, Arkansas:

"Freedom from religion . . . Our best judges are those who are able to divorce their personal prejudices and beliefs from the principles set forth in the Constitution. After all, we are guaranteed not just freedom of religion but also freedom from religion if we choose not to accept it, or if it differs from our own beliefs."

That may sound correct to some, but our Founding Fathers did not intend to frame a document that would ensure the permanent separation of religious principles from all government activity. Rev. Stan Wiedeman, Pastor of the Grace Evangelical Free Church, Joplin, MO, recently observed:

"John Quincy Adams said: 'The highest glory of the American Revolution was this: that it connected in one indissoluble bond the principles of Christianity and the principles of civil government.'

"John Jay, first Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, one of three men most responsible for our Constitution: 'Providence has given to our people the choice of their rulers and it is the duty, as well as the privilege of a Christian nation to select and prefer Christians for its rulers.'

"The farewell address of George Washington was considered the most significant speech in history for over one hundred years, so much so that public school students were required to memorize it for many years. In that speech President Washington said: 'Do not let anyone claim to be a true American if they ever attempt to remove religion from politics'."

In 1844 a school in Philadelphia wanted to teach morality, but without the use of religion. Most citizens considered this unconscionable. It was challenged and the Supreme Court eventually ruled against the school:

"Yes, you are going to teach your young students morality. The purest principles of morality are to be taught. But where are those principles found? Whoever searches for those principles must go to the same source from which a Christian man derives his faith. You have to go to the Bible."

In 1892 the U.S. Supreme Court rendered the following determination, based on 87 precedents:

"Our laws and our institutions must necessarily be based on, and must include, the teachings of the Redeemer of mankind. It is impossible for it to be otherwise. In this sense, and to this extent, our civilizations and our institutions are emphatically Christian."

Compatriots, by inattention or by silence we allow a small but vocal minority to rob future generations of Americans of this precious marriage of Biblical religion and our civil government. To do so would be to forfeit the inalienable human rights of life, liberty and property, granted by our Creator. As good soldiers of Christ, and in the "Spirit of 1776" let us hasten to arms!
