The **President General's**

Message

Dear Compatriots:

The honor you have bestowed upon me as the President General of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution is greatly appreciated. I consider it an opportunity to serve and accept the challenge that will justify your confidence. The timing has never been better than the present for the Sons of the American Revolution to advance our inherited responsibility to preserve the Heritage and Freedoms our Ancestors created through Historical, Educational and Patriotic programs.





Tradition was followed during the officer installation ceremony at the Annual Congress in Phoenix when retiring President General Paul H. Walker placed George Washington's Seal Ring on the finger of newly elected PG Robert B. Vance. This is the only time that our Society's most valuable possession is allowed to be out of a bank safe in Louisville.



While serving as Secretary General, Compatriot Robert B. Vance addressed the 101st Kansas Society Conference and the South Central District Meeting. Both events were held last March in Lawrence, Kansas.



Leadership has been defined as "The knack of getting someone to do something that you want done because he wants to do it." We must inspire each to have confidence in himself through knowledge, initiative and justice. We have been exposed to these qualities and must continue with the goals and projects established for the future of the Sons of the American Revolution.

The National Society does an outstanding job with the limited funds available. It has been said, "To double your membership will triple your effectiveness." This means two times as many members to carry out our mission and double the funds to work with.

We have enjoyed a very successful year through our business operations and patriotic projects, namely the Eagle Scout Program and the Essay and Oration Contests — each with more participants and increased scholarship awards. Plans are to expand our objectives through new programs on (1) ENDOWMENT TRUST FUNDS and (2) MEMBERSHIP.

The Fund Raising Program has been established as a top priority for this Administration, with FPG James R. Calhoun as Chairman of the "GEORGE WASHINGTON FUNDS BOARD" to handle administration of the Board and collections. This program was launched the day before the close of the Annual Congress in Phoenix. I am happy to report that 56 members made substantial contributions or pledges. Our Legal Council can now prepare your Trust Agreement where you may receive income during your lifetime. More details are reported elsewhere in this issue of the magazine.

A membership development program has been established as a top priority for 1993-94, with FPG James R. Westlake as Chairman for new members and retention to be known as the MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE. The goal of a 1,500 net membership gain for the National Society has been established. Districts, State Societies and Chapters are challenged to meet a goal based on their membership by the next cutoff date of 31 March 1994. A table of State Society goals is listed in this issue of the magazine. Growth means a neincrease from new applications, reinstatements and retention of members. Districts and State Societies that meet their goal will be placed on the "NATIONAL MEMERSHIP HONOR ROLL" and receive a Certificate of Recognition.

Several State Societies have adopted a program to present the SAR MEDAL OF APPRECIATION to the DAR member who brings in three new members during our reporting year. Some Societies use five members to qualify. This medal was especially designed to recognize DARs for their contribution to the SAR. Most DARs have a member in their family qualified for the SAR on her line. Do you invite the DAR members to your banquets? Now is a good time to start working with our Sister Organization.



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

Nearly 500 Attend Annual Congress

From June 12 through 16 the Arizona Society played host to the 103rd Annual Congress, a well-organized gathering that drew 281 delegates, 14 other Compatriots and 200 guests. Arizona SARs and their ladies went well beyond the call of duty to provide an atmosphere that facilitated a productive and enjoyable meeting. Serving as Chairman of the Arizona Society Congress Planning Committee was George Orton, a Past President.

Elected President General was Col. Robert B. Vance, Sr., who had been Secretary General over the past year; his long time service at the national level has also included being Treasurer General, Vice-President General for the Foreign District-Eu-

rope, Georgia Society Trustee and a member of varied committees — including chairing the Congress Planning Committee for seven years. He named the following to the Executive Committee: William C. Gist, Jr., D.M.D. (KYSSAR), Howard F. Horne, Jr., Ph.D. (DESSAR), George Orton (AZSSAR), Russell D. Page (ILSSAR) and Paul H. Walker (MASSAR).

The only contested office was that of Treasurer General. As reported elsewhere in this issue of the magazine, incumbent Reon G. Hillegass tallied more ballots in a contest with Russell D. Page.

Cavernous rooms in the Arizona Biltmore Resort in Phoenix provided ample space for every activity except the Memorial Service, which was held at Saint Mary's Basilica in downtown Phoenix. Performing at a number of events were Color Guards from these State Societies: Arkansas, California, Georgia, Kansas, Maryland, Massachusetts, Missouri and Pennsylvania.

Biographies of all General Officers and appointed members of the Executive Committee appear elsewhere. Also reported is the composition of national committees and an updated, complete listing of key State Society and Chapter officers.

Throughout this issue are reports of every major Congress activity — from Trustees Meetings, Memorial Service and Oration Contest to installation of the new President General and his corps of officers.

Congress Approves Seven Resolutions

Resolutions proposed to delegates attending the 103rd Annual Congress were presented by Florida Society Compatriot Carl K. Hoffmann, long time Chairman of the Resolutions Committee. Those approved are summarized here. Full texts are available from National Headquarters.

NAFTA — That the NSSAR opposes the North American Free Trade Agreements and urges its Compatriots to write their Senators and express their opposition to the Treaty.

HOMOSEXUALS IN THE MILITARY — That the NSSAR most strongly opposes President Clinton's change of policy regarding homosexuals openly serving in the armed forces and earnestly encourages our Compatriots to individually state their opposition by Fax, telephone call and letter to President Clinton and to their respective United States Senators and Representatives in Washington, DC.



As he has for many years, Carl K. Hoffman introduced a number of Resolutions.

RIGHTS OF THE CHILD — U.N. TREATY - That the NSSAR opposes a signing by the President and the ratification by the United States Senate of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and urges all of its Compatriots to write the President and their Senators and express their opposition to the Treaty.

HAITIAN REFUGEES - That the NSSAR opposes any relaxation of immigration policy to allow Haitians with HIV/AIDS virus into the United States and reaffirms its 1982 Resolution on immigration.

ENGLISH AS THE OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

- That the NSSAR reaffirms its support of its 1982 Resolution which supported the amendment to the United States Constitution proposed by Senator Hayakawa of California making English the official language of the United States, which reads as follows:

"ARTICLE"

SECTION 1. The English language shall be the official language of the United

SECTION 2. Neither the United States nor any State shall make or enforce any law which requires the use of any language other than English.

GW Endowment Fund Seeking Contributions

When the 103rd Annual Congress drew to a close in Phoenix, the George Washington Endowment Funds (formerly known as the George Washington Fund) was over \$53,000 richer — thanks to generous cash contributions and pledges from nearly 50 Compatriots during the meeting. An appeal for such action had been made in an early business session by Former President General James R. Calhoun, who serves as Chairman of the GWEF Board.

Compatriot Calhoun reported that the cash and pledge total had thus surpassed the \$210,000 mark. The original GW Fund was established in 1989 as a means of supporting unfunded and underfunded NSSAR committees and projects. The National Trustees, meeting in Louisville this past February, approved a plan that set up the Board as the sole fund raising entity of our Society and to be responsible for reviewing financial assistance requests. Monies raised are invested, with earnings only expended.

A national fund raising program is to be launched later this year at the State Society and Chapter levels. Each Vice-President General is being encouraged to bolster this effort in his District.

Compatriots donating \$1,000 or more are identified as a GW Fellow; these gifts may be paid in installments of \$200 or more annually over a period of five years. Those contributing from \$25 through \$999 in any one year are entitled to be known as a GW Patriot. Upon a donor's request, 5% of his gift will be returned anually to his State Society and a like sum to his Chapter.

All contributions are tax deductible. Please make your check payable to "Treasurer General, NSSAR" and indicate that it is for the George Washington Endowment Funds program.

SECTION 3. This article shall apply to laws, ordinances, regulations, orders, programs, and policies.

SECTION 4. No order or decree shall be issued by any court of the United States or of any State requiring that any proceedings, or matters to which this article applies be in any language other than English.

SECTION 5. This article shall not prohibit educational instruction in a language other than English as required as a transitional method of making students who use a language other than English proficient in English.

SECTION 6. The Congress and the States shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

GEORGE WASHINGTON STAMP - That the Postmaster General of the United States be advised of the recent neglect in maintaining a George Washington stamp by the U.S. Postal Service and be required to take such immediate steps as are necessary to correct this oversight; and that copies of this Resolution be sent to the chairman of the Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee and such members of Congress as are deemed appropriate.

Membership Growth Goals Set For Each State Society

By Former President General James R. Westlake

At his inauguration at the end of the Annual Congress in Phoenix, President General Robert B. Vance, Sr., emphasized that membership was a first priority of his administration. He appointed FPG Westlake to lead a combined New Member and Member Retention Committee for his term of office. Declaring that most members do not want to be dropped, PG Vance pointed to the need to closely monitor unpaid members to be sure they get dues notices and close

FPG Westlake explained to the Congress that the goal set five years ago to reach 30,000 members by 1993 had fallen far short. In fact, he reported there had been a decline of 2.2%. At March 31, 1993, the official total reported by Headquarters was 23,775 active members, not including societies in other countries.

Pointing out that the 1990 Census of about 250 million citizens was about a 72fold increase over the first 1790 census. FPG Westlake indicated there were probably 10-15 million adult men eligible for SAR membership.

A challenge was made to the VPGs and the State Presidents Council by Westlake to accept the priority of a 1,500 net increase for 1993-94. He explained the campaign

for growth would be in three components: VPG Districts, State Societies and Chapters. Each state is challenged to show a net increase based on size of the State Society by the next cut-off date as shown on the table listed below. With about 450 Chapters, 50 State Societies and 13 Districts, the challenge for growth involves everyone.

Each Chapter President, State President and Vice-President General who meets or exceeds the goal for his component will be recognized at the 104th Annual Congress with a Distinguished Service Certificate. "If each component does the job," Westlake said, "the Society will meet the goal."

Societies Begun By Famed War Hero

As their state celebrates the 150th anniversary of the Oregon Trail this year, Oregon Society Compatriots are recalling how a Civil War hero — Gen. Thomas MacArthur Anderson — was the driving force in organizing the "Oregon and Washington Society" on June 6, 1891 at Portland. At the time Colonel of the 14th Infantry stationed at Vancouver Barracks, he became the first President; there were 15 Charter Members.

According to information supplied to the magazine Editor by William Cannon Chapter President Robert J. Crane, Compatriot Anderson was twice wounded and twice promoted for valor in the Civil War. He also served in the Philippines campaign, commanding the first American troops to go overseas. He fought in four major battles and led his troops into Manila to end the

During his years as Commander of the Vancouver Barracks and the Northwest Territory, Anderson sent Lt. Joseph P. O'Neil to survey and map the Olympic Peninsula. In the course of this project, O'Neil named a 7,000-foot-high peak for Anderson.

Upon his death in 1917, Anderson's body was cremated and his ashes interred at Arlington National Cemetery alongside those of his wife.

Compatriot Crane reports that as membership increased, those residing in Washington organized the Washington Society at Seattle on June 17, 1895. Thirty-four of the 59 Washington Society members demitted, leaving Oregon with 104. The present Oregon Society name was adopted at the Fifth Annual Meeting on February 22, 1896.

The William Cannon Chapter is named in honor of the only Patriot known to be buried in the state.



Pierre-Augustin Caron de Beaumarchais is well known for his comedies, *The Barber of Seville* and *The Marriage of Figaro*. Because of its critique of the French Establishment, the latter play was banned three years after it was written. Although he served in the French Court, he was sympathetic to the aims (if not the methods) of the Revolution and subsequently served the Republic. He also gave aid to the American Colonists during their revolution, as recounted in this article. cumbersome retinues. He hired seamen and officers to command his ships, paid bills, begged and borrowed and kept a steady stream of supplies going to America.


STARTED AS WATCHMAKER

But who was this Beaumarchais? What inspired and motivated him? What wound his spring of action?

Born in 1732, son and grandson of Parisian watchmakers, he himself was an accomplished watchmaker at an early age. At 19 he invented a revolutionary escapement for timepieces, a device which is still, in principle, in use today. This invention was stolen by a rival. Beaumarchais attacked him with so much wit and logic that he not only won back his rights, but he also attracted the attention of King Louis XV.

Having remarkable musical abilities in addition to his mechanical ones, Beaumarchais was soon teaching the harp, the flute and other instruments to the king's four daughters.

One talent possessed by Beaumarchais was not appreciated by the king, namely his ability to write great drama. His plays reflected too much sympathy for the plight of the lower classes. His jibes at the ruling classes were bitter, never very subtle. Nevertheless, Louis XV began using the talents of this gifted young man by sending him on diplomatic missions. Beaumarchais proved that he could handle complicated intrigue. He could wipe out old indiscretions and scandals. The king found such services

A Past President of the Arkansas Society's Old Fort Smith (now inactive) and Southwest Trail Chapters, Compatriot Branch also served as that Society's Regional Vice President; he holds the Meritorious Service Medal. His educational background includes receiving a B.A. from the University of Arkansas and M.A. from North Texas University; Fellowship Studies were highlighted by Far Eastern Civilizations at Harvard, Shakespeare Summer Institute at Yale and World Drama at Minnesota. Now retired, his professional career encompassed being Custodial Officer, Federal Bureau of Prisons; Founder-Director, Arkwild Boys' Camp; and Instructor to Full Professor of English at the New Mexico Military Institute (where he later became Chairman of the English Department and then Chairman of the Humanities Division). A resident of Cove, Arkansas, he travels 100 miles each way to attend Southwest Trail Chapter meetings in Texarkana.

But those historians generally have passed over him too casually. Damning him with tepid comment, they were obviously concerned more with those actually on the spot, men like Baron von Steuben, Pulaski, Lafayette and others, all of whom were certainly worthy of high praise, too.

Still, may we ask, were these men pivotal, were they totally as individuals, essential to America's success in the Revolution? Was Pierre-Augustin Beaumarchais essential? Perhaps more than we ever realized.

Lafayette and the other imported heroes did appear on the stage at critical moments. Beaumarchais did not come to America himself. Yet he did play an early role, and he was incessantly involved to the end.

With his old friend Arthur Lee and the more recently appointed emissaries from America, Silas Deane and Benjamin Franklin, Beaumarchais helped to rustle privateers to prey on British commerce. He assisted in recruiting officers, including some of those already mentioned, to serve Washington. He transported several of them to America at his own expense, a few with their rather

Beaumarchais' newly acquired position in the French court gave him the opportunity to meet influential people, including a banker who was a renowned business promoter. This banker taught Beaumarchais the principles and practices which enabled him to make much of the money he needed to carry through some of his projects to help

His court contacts also enabled him to meet and marry two rich widows (consecutively, of course). He bought a minor noble title after his first marriage. Then, to his original name — Pierre-Augustin Caron — he added something a bit more arresting and pretentious, de Beaumarchais. Beaumarchais was the name of a village owned by his wife. He was never averse to pressing his own advantages or creating new ones.

MEETS AMERICAN DIPLOMAT LEE

On one of his trips to Britain on the king's secret affairs, he met the aforementioned Arthur Lee, who had been sent over by the Continental Congress as confidential correspondent to report what he could learn about the facts and prevailing attitudes in England. Lee was America's first official diplomat. He was abundantly prepared for his job. At least it would seem so, for he was a product of Eton College of Edinburgh University, where he studied medicine; and of the Middle Temple in London, where he learned law.


But on arriving in London in 1774, Lee assumed a pseudonym — Mary Johnson! That choice for an undercover name would seem somewhat naive, and tailored rather to attract attention and arouse suspicion than to muffle his identity. However, he set about his work. He hired

six clerks. Behold! All turned out to be British spies. Yet he became friends with Beaumarchais, who proved to be always and forever the supporter of the victims of injustice and repression. Under the eloquent tutelage of Arthur Lee, Beaumarchais became an undying devotee of the American cause. He adopted the American Revolution.

For this one great historical stroke, we must honor Arthur Lee perpetually — even though we might have to overlook his early ineptitudes and some of his later petty obstructive acts.

With Beaumarchais, conviction transformed itself into immediate action. He began to manipulate the French foreign minister, Vergennes, and through him, Louis XVI, who had succeeded his grandfather, Louis XV, to the throne in 1774. He urged sending help to the American colonies, desperately needing help. What cheaper way could France find to injure an old enemy? But any assistance France could provide would have to be clandestine.

Every effort, therefore, was made to prevent the British from claiming any violation of neutrality. The French were weak and their recent war against Britain, the Seven Years War, which ended in 1763, had left the treasury worse than empty. In that war, the British had divested the French of most of their possessions in the New World as well as in India. Hard to replenish empty coffers without something coming in from overseas possessions.

FORMS SECRET TRADING COMPANY

Though the spirit of vengeance burned in every French breast, their leaders felt impotent. They knew that they must not risk war with Britain — unless they could first see the American colonies winning a commendable victory with their own armies. Beaumarchais here found himself in his element. Master of intrigue and deception, he quickly conceived a bold plan. He organized a fake private commercial enterprise to be called Roderique Hortalez and Co., himself its director.

He began the operation with a 1,0000,000-franc gift from the French government; a like amount soon followed from the Spanish government. With these sums, and with what he could borrow from individuals and provide from his own resources, he began to buy, wherever available in Europe, all sorts of military supplies — cannons, muskets, gunpowder, wool cloth for uniforms, duck for tents. All of these supplies were then funnelled to the colonies by Roderique Hortalez & Co., via St. Eustatius Island in the Caribbean, there to be transferred to American ships.

St. Eustatius is a little dead volcanic cone about 12 miles in area. It was only meagerly blessed with a poor harbor, but it soon became a beehive of commerce. Hundreds of ships came each year. At one time Beaumarchais was said to be operating 40 vessels, some purchased, some leased or

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hired. He even fitted out one armed warship, at his own expense, *The Fier Roderique*. It was convoying ten cargo ships when it was commandeered by the French Admiral D'Estaing to fight the British off Grenada. It fought well but its captain was killed and the cargo ships it escorted were lost.

Oh, the British had to know something about the secrets of Hortalez & Co. Britain, however, was not eager to take on another foe at that time. For the colonial war was turning out to be somewhat more than the little episode King George III at first expected. So Britain chose to overlook Beaumarchais' "private company", or merely to protest, not too vehemently, through diplomatic channels. Vergennes was always ready to assure the British of French innocence and goodwill.

BATTLE OF SARATOGA CRITICAL

Well, the subterfuge of Roderique Hortalez & Co. continued until the Battle of Saratoga, that battle often referred to by historians as one of the decisive battles of the world. Saratoga's immediate and far-flung consequences — all aiming toward the freedorn of mankind — justify the term decisive.

General Burgoyne's defeat at Saratoga occurred in spite of a carefully laid plan by the British war office to cut New England off from the rest of the country. Burgoyne was to come down from Montreal. Lt. Col. Barry St. Leger was to march from Lake Ontario. General William Howe was to go up the Hudson River. All were to rendezvous at Albany, in New York. The jig-saw pieces for this pretty British picture failed to fit into its frame.

St. Leger ran into our General Herkimer and was turned back at the Battle of Oriskany. And General Howe — did he prefer to spend the winter dancing with the Tory belles of Philadelphia? Or did he not receive his orders to meet Burgoyne? Anyway, instead of sloshing his way up the Hudson, he proceeded to capture Philadelphia, the colonial capital, where he stayed put.

Burgoyne was left in the tangled woods between Lake Champlain and Albany. There General Gates' army, under the command of Daniel Morgan and Benedict Arnold, encircled him and obliged him to surrender with his 5,800 troops and all his equipment, October 17, 1777.

Beaumarchais' supplies had arrived on time.
It usually took from three to six weeks for news of events in America to reach France. Beaumarchais got the news of Saratoga before the French government did. In his unrepressed elation at the glorious news, he set off at breakneck speed (and wrecked his carriage) to inform Louis XVI, who would now feel free to make a treaty of trade and alliance with the American Congress.

An alliance would mean recognition of the independence

of the American colonies. Recognition meant certain war

French entrance into the war eventually resulted in Spanish intervention, reluctant though it was. Spain wanted no foolish precedent of colonial independence in America. Her own colonies might try playing the same game. So Spain joined the war as a French ally, but not as an American ally. Her reward was to be recovery of her former bastion at the entrance of the Mediterranean, Gibraltar; she did not get that back either.

I ED DANGEROUS LIFE

It might seem from the foregoing that Beaumarchais lived a life of almost unending successes and popularity. Not so. His life was more a life of unending struggle, never one of ease.

Although a majority of Frenchmen did embrace his goals wholeheartedly, he still had many enemies. They generally were people envious of him because of his abilities and prosperity, because of his friends in high places, and because he was not of high birth. He did, in fact, have enemies at about every turn in life — resulting in endless lawsuits, imprisonment, exile, and one duel, successfully consummated.

Even the American Congress did not value him properly. Congress, however, was probably preoccupied with other pressing business, such as paying the soldiers. Beaumarchais' constant reminders to Congress to send shipments of tobacco, indigo and rice as payment for war supplies most often went unheeded. Congress still owed him hundreds of thousands of francs when he died.

WAS GIFTED PLAYWRITE

One additional accomplishment of Beaumarchais should not be ignored; it too is relevant to our theme, namely, his

dramatic works. His *The Barber of Seville* is particularly pertinent (it was set to music later in an opera by Rossini). It has been said that Beaumarchais' literary efforts were made for recreation, for a change of pace in a life of intense action. Maybe so. But his plays contributed to his main purpose. The wit and satire in his plays helped arouse sentiment against oppression, and that is what Beaumarchais' vocation was about.

The sequel to *The Barber*, namely *The Marriage of Figaro* (destined to be an opera by Mozart), did its part to inspire the forces behind The French Revolution. But that would be another episode.

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Patriotic Societies Meet At Mount Vernon

The Ann Pamela Cunningham Convention Center on the grounds of Mount Vernon, the historic Virginia home of George Washington, was the early April setting for the Fourth Annual Congress of The National Congress of Patriotic Organizations. In attendance were individual members as well as official representatives of such diverse hereditary and other groups as the Aztec Club of 1847, Continental Society Sons of Indian Wars, Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge, Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the U.S., National Flag Foundation, National Order of the Blue and Gray and Sons of the Revolution.

Elected President was Wilson King Barnes, Jr., a Past President of the SAR Maryland Society,; he took over from James R. Westlake, a Former President General of the SAR. Other SARs assuming officer posts were: L. C. Kielman, Treasurer (he is Historian of the War of 1812 Maryland Society); Raymond N. Zimmerman, Jr., Registrar (President, John Paul Jones Chapter, MDSSAR); Barrett L. McKown, Historian-Archivist (Past President, MDSSAR) and Carroll J. Collins, Merchandise Chairman (Secretary, MDSSAR).

Highlights included a distinguished panel that discussed demographic trends of the future including the changes in our popula-

tion and the multi-culturism which accompanies it; an address by Neil W. Horstman, Resident Director of Mount Vernon; and a Memorial Service at the Washington Tomb.

The NCPO met in its inaugural session during April, 1990 at the Washington, DC

Walker presided over the event, while offering scripture readings were Former Presidents General Clovis H. Brakebill, George H. Brandau and Benjamin H. Morris. Secretary General Robert B. Vance, Sr., led attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The traditional highlight of the service was paying tribute to the 540 Compatriots who were called to eternal rest the preceding year, as conducted by Former President General Carl F. Bessent. He pointed out that some were prominent in government, finance, commerce, industry and education — with many of them being leaders in the SAR.

Compatriot Bessent singled out five who demonstrated steadfast service at the national level: Howard E. Coe, Connecticut Society, 63rd President General; Dr. Gradie R. Rowntree, Kentucky Society, a physi-



Launched earlier this year, the National Society's program to provide genealogical research assistance to military base personnel is being expanded under the administration of President General Robert B. Vance, Sr.

Your input will greatly assist the Oriskany Battle Chapter — in cooperation with the State of New York and local DAR and other groups — in an effort to assist with preservation of the Oriskany Battlefield. According to information supplied to the magazine Editor by Chapter President Jon N. Austin, the battlefield's monument lists only a portion of those who served in the battle on August 6, 1777. The objective is to recognize all of the patriots who fought and died there.

The battlefield is located in Oneida County, about five miles east of Rome on NY 69. The engagement was the key to the success of the garrison at Fort Stanwix in holding out against the siege by British General Barry St. Leger, which thwarted the British plans to overrun the Mohawk Valley. General Burgoyne was thus deprived of reinforcements which might have permitted him to smash his way to Albany.

1992-93 TRUSTEES MEETINGS - Sunday, June 13, 1994

Fife Symington and City of Phoenix Mayor Paul Johnson.

Greetings were received from the following: Honorary President General Mrs. Eldred M. Yochim, on behalf of the Daughters of the American Revolution; Senior National President Mrs. Philip W. Bernstorf, on behalf of the Children of the American Revolution; President Miss Elizabeth Lee, on behalf of the C.A.R.; Regent Mrs. Henry C. Rilling, on behalf of the DAR Arizona Society; President General Mrs. James E. Haynes, on behalf of the Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America.

Presentations were made to the National Society. These ranged from books for the Library to contributions to vari-

Next were comments and reports from Former Presidents General.

On motion made and seconded, it was voted to change Bylaw No. 7, Section 2, to read as follows: Disbursements shall be made by checks signed by any two authorized officers, except that the Executive Director is authorized to sign, without another signatory, any check for headquarters operations payable in such amount as determined by resolution of the Executive Committee, and when authorized by FAX upon proper documentation, the Executive Director may sign check for an amount determined by resolution of the Executive Committee. The Executive Director shall supply the documentation to the authorized officer and with FAX approval add the plate signature of the Treasurer General, or in his absence the President General or Secretary General.

A motion by CG Sargisson to change the application fee to \$50.00 in Bylaw No. 19 was seconded. An amended motion to defer the effective date to October 1 for this Bylaw change, if passed, was seconded and passed. The motion to amend Bylaw No. 19 failed to pass.

Richard G. Sauner, Chairman of the Handbook Committee, reported that the new NSSAR Handbook is now available and asked that old copies be destroyed.







Florida Air Rescue Squad Awarded Heroism Medals

Capt. David Willingham, a member of the Florida Society, and five other crew members of Helicopter No. HH60 of U.S. Air Force Rescue Squadron 301 were recently awarded the Heroism Medal by the Miami Chapter.

Last November HH60 was ordered to rescue a critically ill sailor aboard a freighter some 300 miles east of Miami; the 56-year-old man had lapsed into unconsciousness and was suffering from possible diabetic shock. The unit had received the request from the Coast Guard on November 12, but due to poor weather conditions, the helicopter was not able to launch until the following

The mission was especially hazardous in view of the long flight hours, unfavorable weather and a mandatory refueling activity. When the ship was reached, the helicopter maintained a hover while two pararescue specialists were lowered with a stokes litter. Controlling the craft were the pilot and his co-pilot, Compatriot Willingham.

While the rescuers began their initial medical assessment and prepared the patient for the hoist, the helicopter was refueled mid-air for the return trip. Because of the design of the ship's superstructure, the cop-

ter had to remain 100 feet over the deck, thus denying any visual reference to help maintain a steady hover. The problem was overcome, however, as was the one caused by 15-foot swells which made the ship pitch wildly with the waves. The sailor was brought to Miami for continued treatment.

The squadron has seen a great deal of rescue duty. For example, in the aftermath of Hurricane Andrew, it saved more than 135 lives of victims suffering from a wide variety of debris-related injuries — ranging from cardiac arrests and car accidents to premature births.
