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# Commander's Report

### Fellow color guardsmen,

This summer at National Congress in Savannah I was honored to take command of the National Color Guard. The Vice Commander is Scott Collins (GA), First Adjutant is Robert Meyer (NJ) and Second Adjutant is Ken Goodson (MI). I have add-

ed four new positions to the Staff. Two will be assistants: Assistant Quartermaster Patrick Wesolosky (KY) and Assistant Safety Officer Jacob Vink (IN). The others are related to "The Music", the positions are Fife Major David Embrey (MD) and Drum Major Viren Lemmer (WA). They will join the current staff of Quartermaster Charlie Scott (KY), Safety Officer Brett Osborn (VA), and Artillery Commander Dr. Rudy Byrd (AZ).

The Fife & Drum Majors will be responsible for developing an SAR Fife & Drum Corps Program, recruiting and training new musicians, and with developing a National SAR sponsored Fife and Drum competition or award. Look for their articles in future editions of this newsletter, more to follow.

The Safety Training Officers have been tasked with developing a series of safety and training videos that we will post on our sar.org webpage, Facebook and YouTube for color guard commanders at all levels to use. Look for more soon from Brett Osborn.

Another thing we are looking into is revisiting the Virtual Participation Policy. It was prematurely cancelled with little regard for the good thing happening that would be lost. We want to see how we can intelligently bring it back for the purpose of increasing participation in National Color Guard events for all our compatriots across the entire globe.

Did you know that the SAR National Color Guard officially consists of nothing more than the National Color Guard Staff and the Color Guard Committee? Color Guards are like State National Guards, they work for, and respond to their State Presidents and State Color Guard Commanders. There is no formal "National" Color Guard, beyond the staff and the members of the committee, until color guardsmen from the various states gather at an approved National Event, then and only then, do they fall under the operational command of the National Color Guard Commander or a National Command Staff representative.

Did you know that all Color Guardsmen are members of the Color Guard Committee? Any color guardsman attending a National Congress or a National Trustees' Meeting can vote at that Color Guard Committee meeting as a fully accredited member of the committee. The National Color Guard Commander and his staff, like the Chief of Staff of the US Army and his staff with the National Guard Bureau, are responsible for policies and standards that effect all color guardsmen. I and my staff, through the National Color Guard Handbook provide the policies that govern the Color Guards, but you the color guardsmen have a voice and a vote in approving those policies.

As I stated earlier, the activities and processes of the National Color Guard are governed by the National Color Guard Handbook. The handbook is a pretty good document, but it is overdue for a front to back review and that will be led by Vice Commander Scott Collins and the staff. We will be looking for input from the field and the revised handbook will be presented to the committee at a future Leadership Meeting for approval. In the meantime, the current handbook remains in effect. However, this handbook is only useful if you bother to read it, and if your color guardsmen comply with what is written there. It is not binding or really enforceable by the National Color Guard Staff beyond those things that are distinctly National responsibilities like establishing the criteria for and approving the award of National Color Guard Medals. It is inherent on you the State Color Guard Commanders to work with your State Presidents on his vision for you and your color guardsmen and to ensure they are complying with the policies and guidance set forth in the National Color Guard Handbook.

As we execute our SAR 2026 Strategic Vision and grow the SAR, we should be positioning ourselves for the expected opportunities the 250th Anniversary will present, we want the Face of the SAR to be both historically accurate and representative of the organization. I'm not a fan of folks wearing tricorns with their blazers, jeans under a hunting frock with tennis shoes, or SAR medals on their regimental coats, but many folks seem to do so and enjoy themselves, so who are we at National to tell them they cannot do as they please at state or chapter events. But the National Policy is very clear on what is and is not allowed at National Color Guard events. It is your responsibility as State Color Guard Commanders, along with your State Society Presidents, to direct and police the activities of your Color Guardsmen. The Color Guard is a great tool for your State Society, use them well.

And while it is very true that, "The Color Guard is the Face of the SAR", Color Guards are a component of SAR State Societies and Chapters. They are locally based and locally led. Some states and chapters are really good at what they do, they have written guidance, conduct training and certification programs, they have black powder insurance policies, and they enforce standards within their organizations. They are

loosely run like military organizations with chains of command that report to their state presidents, support state and local events, participate in Nationally approved Color Guard events, and share their activities and photos in the SAR Magazine, and in the CG Newsletter. Many State Societies have formal incentive programs where they offer rebates to new Color Guardsmen as they outfit and equip themselves, and some even have Color Guard "Supply Rooms" where they hold uniforms, weapons, and flags that older compatriots have turned in that new Color Guardsmen or new chapters can use. These states are the ones where the Color Guards are growing, expanding their outreach and

their impact. Not surprisingly these are also the state societies that are

thriving and growing.

Other Color Guards are more like social clubs that get together occasionally, come to chapter meetings to post the colors, wear a mixed bag of period uniforms, costumes, and civilian clothing, and they do things they like doing, in the way things have always been done, within their distinct groups. There is room for both types of Color Guards within the national organization, but as we strive to become Past President General Wright's, 'Nationally recognized voice on the American Revolution", we would all prefer the former to the latter.

It is also our responsibility to provide guidance and assistance to state Color Guard Commanders as they develop their Color Guards. A little coaching while setting the proper example with dress and commands goes a long way. But we the National CG Staff must always keep in mind that the Color Guards and Color Guardsmen are your State Color Guards,

not ours.

The National Color Guard is the Staff, the Committee, and temporarily those Color Guardsmen who participate in any of the three sanctioned annual meetings: Spring and Fall Leadership, and the Annual Congress; as well as those attending the list of approved Historic Sites and Celebrations which serve as National Color Guard Events. These are the events where your State Society Color Guardsmen earn credit towards their National Color Guard Medals. The National CG Command Staff is encouraged to have a representative attend each of these geographically dispersed events. We will strive to support as many as we can.

Below is an extract from the Color Guard Handbook regarding the protocol for National Color Guard Command Staff when they are attending a National Events you may be the sponsor of:

By protocol, the Commander, followed by the Vice Commander and each Adjutant in order of seniority, will have command of any Color Guard participating at any designated National Event (See section on National Events) or any event where the President General is in attendance. The Commander, or other ranking national color guard officer shall have the right to defer command to a State Society or local Color Guard Commander, but this is not automatically assumed. In the event command is deferred, the ranking national color guard officer(s) shall march at the head of the color guard along with the acting commander. If command is not deferred, the State Society Commander shall be allowed to march at the head of the color guard with the National Commander or other command staff.

We on the National Color Guard Staff are here to help you with growing and expanding your Color Guards, and we are never more than an email or phone call away. Please feel free to reach out and we will be more than happy to help you develop the Face of Your State Society.

## Vice-Commander's Report


## FREE CONTINENTAL UNIFORM, SURE | WILL WEAR IT. THAT'S HOW IT STARTED.

SO PLEASE send photos in largest resolution possible and make sure that the submissions are not blurry.
- DO NOT SUBMIT HEIC graphics
- DO NOT embed photos in documents or messages. Sned them separately as attachments
- DO NOT end in content that does not have Color Guard involvement.

# THE 2022 WASHINGTON JOMB VIGIL

17 September at Mount Vernon

You feel something very special marching across the grounds of Mount Vernon, a light mist on the Potomac River and an early fall chill on the morning air. You are in formation, a fife and drum accompanying you and your fellow Compatriots, descendants of the very men who once marched to war in similar formations commanded then by the man we come to honor, our first Commander and Chief, General George Washington. As you cross his property and make your way down to the Washington Family Tomb, where he and First Lady Martha lay you can't help but realize these are same fields and vistas, he once saw on his morning rides around the property. You stand your guard mount in front of the tomb, silently, in a replica continental uniform, or the dress of the militia, or a frontiersman, holding a period weapon, honoring the man most responsible for our victory over the British in the war and later the man who presided over the Constitutional Convention, and became the first President of these United States. ## BATTLE OF BLUE LICKS

I was honored to join President General Bruce Pickette and his First Lady Rita, Former PG David Sympson, VPG Central District John Turley President Scott Giltner and other members of the Host Society, Kentucky as well as the officers of the National Color Guard Staff, Vice Commander Scott Collins (GA), Quartermaster Charlie Scott (KY), Assistant Quartermaster Patrick Wesolosky (KY) and Assistant Safety Officer Jacob Vink (IN) at the Memorial Ceremony commemorating the 240th Anniversary of the Battle of Blue Licks. There were well over 100 people in attendance including 51 Color Guardsmen representing 11 States. Seventy-one Wreaths were presented.



#### War of the Frontier

Although the main British army under Lord Cornwallis had surrendered at Yorktown in October 1781, virtually ending the war in the east, fighting on the western frontiers of Georgia, the Carolinas, Virginia, Pennsylvania and New York continued. Aided by the British garrison at Fort Detroit, Indians north of the Ohio River redoubled their efforts to drive the American settlers out of western Virginia (now Kentucky and West Virginia) to strengthen the British position in the ongoing peace negotiations. In July 1782 a meeting took place at the Shawnee villages near the headwaters of the Mad River in the Ohio Country, with Shawnee, Delawares, Mingo, Wyandot, Huron, Miami, Ottawa, Ojibwa, and Potawatomi representatives in attendance. As a result, 150 British rangers under Captain William Caldwell (of Butler's Rangers) and some 1,100 Indian warriors supported by Pennsylvania Loyalists Alexander McKee, Simon Girty, and Matthew Elliott set out to attack Wheeling, on the upper Ohio River. This was one of the largest forces sent against American settlements during the war. The expedition was called off, however, when scouts reported that a force under George Rogers Clark, whom the Indians feared more than any other commander, was about to invade the Ohio Country from Kentucky. Caldwell's army returned to the Mad River to oppose the invasion, but the attack never came. Most of the Indian warriors returned to their homes.

#### The Siege of Bryan Station

Caldwell and about 50 Loyalists, supported by 300 Indians, crossed the Ohio River into Kentucky. They meant to surprise and destroy the settlement of Bryan Station, but the settlers discovered them and took shelter within their stockade. Caldwell and McKee's force laid siege to Bryan Station on August 15, killing all of the settlers' livestock and destroying their crops, but withdrew after two days when they learned that Kentucky militiamen were on the way. Five Indians were killed and two wounded during this short siege.

The militia arrived at Bryan Station on August 18. The force included about 47 men from Fayette County and another 135 from Lincoln County. The highest-ranking officer, Colonel John Todd of Fayette County, was in overall command, assisted by Lieutenant Colonel Daniel Boone, the famed frontiersman. Lieutenant Colonel Stephen Trigg and Major Hugh McGary led the Lincoln County contingent. Benjamin Logan, colonel of the Lincoln militia, was gathering men and had not yet arrived. The militiamen could pursue the raiders immediately, to keep them from escaping, or they could wait for Logan to arrive with reinforcements. Daniel Boone advised waiting for Logan, who was only a day away, but others urged immediate action, pointing out that the enemy force had a 40-mile (60 km) lead on them. Boone felt compelled to go along, so the Kentuckians set out on horseback over an old buffalo trail before making camp at sunset.

#### The Fight at Blue Licks

On the morning of August 19, the Kentuckians reached the Licking River, near a spring and salt lick known as the Lower Blue Licks (today within Nicholas County). A few Indian scouts were seen watching them from across the river. Behind the scouts was a hill around which the river looped. Todd called a council and asked Daniel Boone, the most experienced woodsman, what he thought. Boone said he had been growing increasingly suspicious because of the obvious trail the Indians left. He felt the Indians were trying to lead them into an ambush.

Hugh McGary, known as both a fierce Indian fighter and an unstable hothead, urged immediate attack. When no one listened, he mounted his horse and rode across the ford, calling out, "Them that ain't cowards, follow me." The men immediately followed McGary, as did the officers, who hoped to restore order. Boone remarked, "We are all slaughtered men," and crossed the river.

Most of the men dismounted and formed a line of battle several rows deep. They advanced up the hill, Todd and McGary in the center, Trigg on the right, Boone on the left and a thin line of skirmishers to the front. As Boone had suspected, Caldwell's force was waiting on the other side, concealed in ravines with Caldwell's Ranger in a blocking position to the front and the Indians arrayed to the right of the advancing force. When the Kentuckians reached the summit, the Indians opened fire at close range with devastating accuracy. After only five minutes, the center and right of the Kentuckians' line fell back. Only Boone's men on the left managed to push forward. Todd and Trigg, easy targets on horseback, were shot dead.

The Kentuckians began to flee down the hill, fighting hand-to-hand with Indians who had flanked them. McGary rode up to Boone's company and told him everyone was retreating, and that Boone was now surrounded. Boone ordered his men to retreat. He grabbed a riderless horse and ordered his 23-year-old son, Israel Boone, to mount it. Israel suddenly fell to the ground, shot through the neck. Boone realized his son was dead, mounted the horse and joined in the retreat. Caldwell had lost seven killed and ten wounded during ambush.

#### Aftermath

The largest Revolutionary War battle fought in Kentucky lasted 15 minutes and was a resounding British victory. The Patriot force suffered 100 casualties or roughly 54% of their force. Roughly 70 men from both sides were killed and some were buried in a mass grave on the site. Others remain today where they fell. The Treaty of Paris was signed eleven months later officially ending the war.

Although he had not taken part in the battle, George Rogers Clark, as senior commander, was widely condemned in Kentucky for allowing the Loyalist-Indian force to cross the river and court disaster at Blue Licks. In response, Clark launched a retaliatory raid across the Ohio River in November. His force consisted of more than 1,000 men, including Benjamin Logan and Daniel Boone. The Kentuckians destroyed five unoccupied Shawnee villages on the Great Miami River in the last major offensive of the American Revolution. No battles took place since the Shawnees refused to stand and fell back to their villages on the Mad River.

# SAFETY New Safety Officer - Brett Osborn

# Safety Complacency and Training opportunities.



I'm honored to have been selected as your new National Society Sons of the American Revolution Color Guard Safety Officer.

Following the excellent work and articles Compatriot Mark Kramer has provided as my predecessor, I want to echo some statements Mark has made in the past. "Safety is everyone's responsibility. Practice safety and represent the Sons of the American Revolution well."

When I provide Color Guard workshops and safety briefings I state, "Do not take corrective action or statements personally. All of us should be diligent and observant of potential hazards. Make corrective action, say "I understand", or "I stand corrected" and don't repeat something that has been pointed out as a safety issue.

My focus on musket or firelock safety is all should be treated and handled as loaded, until confirmed safe. Whether indoors or outdoors, when walking in

for an event with a musket, one should confirm it is safe whether it a firing event or presentation of colors. I'm not from Missouri, but my father was, so "Show Me" is the best check. A quick safety check is a good calibration and way to confirm the Color Guardsman are up to speed on their Manual of Arms, handling a firearm safely and their weapon is both unloaded and safe.

The quick way to run a Safety Check is as one or more-Color Guardsman are milling around prior to the event, tell him or them to line up. Call them to Attention; next have them Shoulder Firelocks or Carry Arms, the next command is Secure Firelock (I also

add after this Open Pan); next command is Shoulder Firelock. This is followed by Search Firelock where the ramrod is drawn out and each Color Guardsman waits until he is designated to do the ping test with the ramrod. As the inspector goes down the line, each Color Guardsman should return his ramrod to the guides holding his finger over the ramrod but not the muzzle until given the command, Return Rammers. The next command is Shoulder Firelocks. The third part of the Firelock inspection comes after the command Poise Firelock. The pan should be shut, the hammer at half cock, the firelock is checked for serviceability, hammer stall (frizzen cover), flash guard and that the trigger holds on half cock. After all are inspected the Color Guardsmen are commanded to go to Shoulder Firelocks, and when there are no further instructions, they are commanded to go to Order Arms and dismissed.

Here are some of the life lessons I've learned with inspections. We were at a Color Guard Workshop during a State annual meeting. In the hotel conference room when demonstrating the Secure Firelock procedure to the Color Guardsmen attending, black powder poured out the end of his barrel. A good demonstration by a dismayed instructor but all who attended remembered this. All firearms should be treated as loaded until confirmed otherwise.

For the Search Firelock Command, in one of my early Patriot Grave Marking events in Fairfax County. I conducted a safety check and the fourth Color Guardsman's ramrod stuck firmly in the barrel about three quarters of the way. He could not pull it out, nor could two of us trying to draw the ramrod out. I got a pair of vice grips from my vehicle, and we finally got the ramrod out. I had the compatriot make some further probes with his ramrod and large chunks of hardened powder residue and what looked like limescale fell out. When asked if the compatriot ever cleaned his musket, he said he did, but he had a short shotgun cleaning rod, and it did not go all the way down the barrel. I'm assuming he's never done a Search Firelock check before and over time there was enough gunpowder to get down the barrel to fire. Much like a fireplace chimney the build up in the barrel was accumulative. This made three of us watching this, believers in doing the Search Firelock as part of a Safety Check. Who knows what else lurks in those gun barrels? I've seen old cleaning patches show up in other Safety Checks.

Let me comment on the 132nd National Society Annual Congress in Savannah, Georgia.

These are my safety observations and not to be taken personally. When there were weapons brought to the events and I did attend the Church Memorial Service and the other events with the posting of Colors. I never observed any Safety Inspection of anyone carrying a firelock. It may have been done; I did not observe any. A great opportunity to show other NSSAR Color Guardsman from across the country how its done and that we have confidence and confirmation that all weapons were checked. Were they?

One of the host society Color Guardsman was carrying a firelock without a hammerstall (frizzen cover) and this was also pointed out to me by another Guardsman. Let's go to Compatriot Mark Kramer's Safety Officer Report in the April 2018 Issue of the SAR Color Guardsman page 35, "Color Guardsmen without this safety equipment (frizzen cover) will not be permitted to carry their firelock (muzzleloader in any SAR event: local, state, or national. It is the obligation and duty of each Color Guards to provide a safe environment for all participants." Also mentioned in the SAR Color Guard Handbook on page 24 under Firearm Inspection, Pre-Event. I'm of the opinion that no safety check was done.

Another incident that I did not observe but saw on a posted video was the host society conducted two excellent dedications of stone benches during the Congress. One was at the Spring Hill Redoubt near the Savannah Visitor Center. The dedications were attended by the host Society with a few National Society guests. The Spring Hill Redoubt service included a Georgia State Park Service employee serving both as a the firing party for a musket salute. He fired his three musket salutes with crisp precision standing on what was the original part of the redoubt. What is observable in the video is the demonstrator is ramming down his cartridges. This is also not in accordance with the NSSAR Color Guard manual page 23, paragraphs D 3. a "Wadding/patches are never to be used for Color Guard purposes. Paragraph E 3. B "Ramrods and/or other objects shall not be inserted into charged barrels." So don't use this demonstration as the proper NSSAR Color Guard procedure.

I know we write manuals, safety procedures and they become forgotten or ignored. That is the concern that we don't become complacent about standards we have documented. If someone is recognized with a short coming on firelock safety, it is a training opportunity for all. I've been corrected and continue to learn and share information. I started firing with the Congress Host Society State Color Guard in 2003. I was one of the early Guardsman firing salutes at Fourth of July and grave marking events. In what will be two decades the numbers have grown substantially with Guardsmen both carrying and shooting firelocks. As Compatriot Kramer said before, practice safety and represent the Sons of the American Revolution well.

# WELCOME THE MUSIC TO THE NATIONAL COLOR GUARD

George Washington took a personal interest in the fife and drum. On June 4th, 1777 he said, "Nothing is more agreeable, and ornamental, than good music...every officer, for the credit of his corps, should take care to provide it." The SAR has had fifes and drums involved at the chapter and state levels probably as far back as the beginning of the SAR. But, they have never been a part of the National Color Guard... until now.

Brooks Lyles, National Color Guard Commander, has taken the same interest as General Washington. He has named the very first National Color Guard Drum Major, Viren Lemmer and National Color Guard Fife Major, David Embrey. Compatriot Lemmer is the founder of the Washington State SAR/DAR Fife and Drum Corps. Compa-

triot Embrey is the author of the Fifer's Corner column in the Colorguardsman Magazine. Together they are forging a path forward for music on the national level.

Why start this now? The simple answer is America 250 is fast approaching. The National Color Guard will be involved with several events to commemorate this historical occasion. Adding music to these events will take the proceedings to a higher level. Music draws attention to an event. It draws a crowd. The complicated answer is that we are correcting an oversight. Music should have been an official part many years ago.

Drum Major Viren Lemmer commented, "In Washington State we found that when our color guard marched in a



parade it was often overlooked. But, when we added the beat of a drum, suddenly people took notice. They now look to the Color Guard with anticipation and excitement. This also makes our Color Guard stand a little bit taller, march with a little bit more pride, and let's not forget that it's easier to stay in step. This has garnered several first place awards at numerous parades."

Commander Brooks Lyles has noted, "The Music was the Heart and Soul of the Army and has been missing in the SAR's Color Guard for way too long. Fifes and drums regulated the soldier's day, kept them in step, conveyed orders and entertained the troops, and will soon be coming to a State and Chapter Color Guard near you."

Only a single event on each day may be counted. Multiple events on the same day cannot be counted multiple times. If the event is on a weekend nearest the actual holiday, that can be counted with respect to the single event limitation. For example, if a Veterans Day Parade occurs on a Saturday such as the 8th, then an event on the 11th does not count...

Note: As of the 2020 Spring SAR Leadership Meeting, a policy was adopted by both the National Color Guard and National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committees formally establishing that only the National Historic Sites & Celebrations Committee may designate National Historic Events based on that committee's established criteria. The only exception being that established Color Guard policy of recognizing President General, or his designated SAR General Officer representative, attendance at an otherwise unrecognized event will make that actual event a National Event.

# 2:00 pm 30 September 2022 Citation A/B, Brown Hotel, Louisville, KY

- 1. Meeting called to order 2 PM September 30, 2022 in Citation Rooms A/B at the Brown Hotel, Louisville, KY by Commander Brooks Lyles (NC).
- 2. Pledge of Allegiance led by Commander Lyles.
- 3. A moment of silence was observed for Col Peter Goebel past Color Guard Command-
- 4. Recognition of past Color Guard Commanders. Commander Lou Raborg (MD) was in attendance and recognized.
- 5. Commander Lyles made opening statements welcoming the group.
- 6. Introduction of Staff, Vice Commander Scott Collins (GA), First Adjutant Rob Meyers (NJ), Second Adjutant Ken Goodson (MI) who were asked to make a few comments about their area responsibilities.
- 7. The NSSAR Fife & Drum Corps Program was announced and the staff introduced:
  - a. Fife Major Dave Embrey (MD) (not in attendance) and Drum Major Viren Lemmer (WA) who made several comments to the group.
  - b. Commander Lyles made a few comments about the impact of Music and the impact it had on those those who stood the Vigil at the Washington Tomb.
- 8. Rudy Byrd (AZ) was introduced as the Artillery Commander and advised the group that we do not have a cannon.
- 9. Charlie Scott (KY) was introduced as the Quartermaster. He advised that he had excess inventory that with the group's permission would be sold to the members present at the end of the meeting. He advised the group that the money will be used for Color Guard educational programs. He discussed the excess inventory and Commander Lyles listed the items. Below is the list of items QM Scott and AQM Wesolosky declared excess with proposed prices. We have sufficient items on hand to sustain us through normal replacement operations caused by wear and tear for some time.
  - a. 14 new plastic flag stands. At \$20 each they would be a quick sale and net \$280.
  - b. Three flag cases with different degrees of damage that we don't need. I feel they

- would sell for \$25, \$50, and \$100. To buy new they would each probably cost around \$300 and selling them would net us about \$175.
- c. 12 new adjustable flag poles. This leaves 5 new flag poles for potential use. Suggested selling price \$40 each---totalling \$480.
- d. 32 new Spear style Finials, keeping 10 for future use. Suggested discount selling price of \$10 each--totalling \$320.
- e. We also have an assortment of 8 Eagle finials and 2 cross finials that we can sell for \$15 each--totalling \$120.
- f. Flag harnesses that have not been used for a long time: 5 single and 10 double. We can offer for sale 5 of the doubles at \$25 each totalling \$125.
- g. The following used flags have been in a cardboard box for at least ten years. We suggest these be offered for sale for \$10 each. Some are current and some may be outdated flags. Proceeds from sale of flags--approximately \$150.
  - SAR flag-not pole-headed nor does it have fringe
  - Indiana flag-pole-headed &; fringe
  - 2) Oregon flag pole-headed &; fringe
  - 4) Two Rhode Island flags- pole-headed &; fringe 5)
  - Missouri flag--not pole-headed with grommets
  - France flag---Grommets &; fringe 6) 7) 8) Mexico flag—Grommets
  - Delaware flag—Grommets
  - Texas flag—Grommets
  - 10) Maine flag-- pole-headed &; fringe
  - California flag-- pole-headed &; fringe 11)
  - 12) Kansas flag-- pole-headed &; fringe
  - 13) Colorado flag—Grommets 14) Conn. flag—Grommets
  - Australia flag-Grommets 15)

Commander Lyles advised that the motivation for selling the items was the need for contingency funds for future Color Guard expenses, discovered when we looked for money to contract the Training and Safety Videos to be discussed by Safety Training Officer Osborn later, and found we only had \$685 in the account.

Commander Lyles asked the group to consider a motion to sell the excess materials. Gene Moyer moved the issue and was seconded by Greg Ohanesian. The vote was unanimous to accept the motion and sell the inventory.

- 10. Patrick Wesolosky (KY) was introduced as the assistant Quartermaster.
- 11. Brett Osbourn (VA) was introduced as the Safety Officer and discussed several the issues that he felt important for the group to know. He discussed the videos he would be making involving a number of those safety procedures, along with other issues, that will be made available to the group. He advised that he is working with a group of videography students at Shenandoah University and Color Guard and Reenactors for the cast from his home state of VA. He indicated he will be using several sites within the state to film the effort. The end game is to standardize our National safety practices. The filming will take place in October 2022. The GWEF provided ½ the cost of the video or \$2,750. A donation covered the remaining costs
- 12. Jacob Vink (IN) introduced as the Assistant Safety Officer.
- 13. Commander Lyles advised the group that the Color Guard committee meeting minutes were in the last issue of the Color Guard Newsletter and the Staff Meeting Minutes in the submitted Fall Leadership Book report on Sharefile.
- 14. Upcoming National Events: Commander Lyles listed the upcoming National events and their dates-the Battle of Great Bridge lists two dates in different locations which needs to be firmed:
  - -King's Mountain October 7
  - -Point Pleasant Battle Days October 8
  - -Battle of Chestnut Neck October 15
  - -Battle of Saratoga October 15
  - -Yorktown Days October 19
  - -Battle of Red Bank October 22
  - -Ft. Mores November 19

  - -Washingtons Crossing Trial December 11
  - -Wreaths Across America December 17

Commander Lyles requested that each State Commander advise Bill Sharp of the actual date of each National Event hosted in their State along with the particulars of who attends along with the date of the event the next year.

- 15. Several Awards were issued by Commander Lyles assisted by Vice Commander Scott Collins.
  - -Bobby Hulse (KS) was awarded the Von Steuben Medal
  - -Harold Cox (WV) (not in attendance) was awarded the Von Steuben Medal
  - -Steven Gehafer (KY) was awarded the Silver Color Guard Medal
  - -David Perkins (CT) received a certificate and pin for standing the Washington Tomb Vigil
  - **-Greg Ohanesian** (SC) received a certificate and pin for standing the Washington Tomb

Vigil

- **-Dan Hilton** (NC) and **Mark Young** (TN) (not present) were awarded a certificate and pin for standing the Washington Tomb Vigil.
- 16. VC Scott Collins discussed the revisions of the Color Guard Handbook advising that the last revision was done three years ago. The Staff is attempting to work on National standards and that is what will be put in the handbook. He advised the assembly that it will take at least a year and asked the group to send him any revisions to his email address at scottcollins1775@gmail.com by Thanksgiving.
- 17. Commander Lyles reminded the group that there was not a National Color Guard, but there is a National Color Guard Command Staff. Each State has their own Color Guard that works for the State Color Guard Commander and the State Society President. They only participate in National Color Guard Events. He also reviewed protocol for when one of the National Color Guard Command Staff come to a State Event. That event remains the responsibility of the State Commander. If it is a National Event per the approved National Sites and Celebrations List, sponsored by the state or a chapter of that state, the state is still responsible for the event, but protocol is that command of the Color Guard is offered to the National Color Guard Staff representative for the event.
- 18. New Business:
- 19. Joel Parker (AL) made the following motion which was seconded by Bob Anderson (AL).

The Motion:

"That the Color Guard Committee approach the Grave Marking Committee and urge them in the strongest possible terms that any Color Guardsman who takes an active part in a grave Marking ceremony be allowed to count these events for Grave Marking points once they have achieved their Bronze medal".

This was removed from consideration, until the Spring BOM, by Commander Lyles who offered to help coordinate the issue with the Grave Marking and Medals and Awards Committees.

20. A second motion was proposed by Joel Parker that Vice Commander Scott Collins recommended to defer until the Spring Leadership Meeting before it was able to be brought to the floor. Commander Collins indicated that he would rework the motion and bring it before the group in Spring, per the comments on the first motion.

Several comments about the motion brought to the floor were made by members Dave Jones (AL) and Michael Gunn (OH).

- 21. Commander Lyles announced that the Staff would be available in the flag room at 5:30 PM and he advised the group to pick up their flags at 6 PM.
- 22. First Adjutant Rob Meyer announced that there would be a gathering of Veterans for a group picture at 6:15 PM in the corner of the Banquet room. He advised that there would be another picture taken Saturday.
- 23. Jack Bredenfoerder (OH) announced that there was a grave marking at 2 PM Sunday in the Spring Grove Cemetery in Cincinnati with a muster at 1 PM for those wanting to attend.
- 24. Meeting adjourned at 3:01 PM.
- 25. Postscripts:
  - a. \$1000 was raised through the excess equipment sale and QM Scott reports he has pledges for an additional \$400.
  - b. QM Charlie Scott is having back surgery this week, please keep him in your prayers.



I asked some basic questions to get it started and thought to set up a "Letters to the Editor" section for lack of a better term. #### From the OHSSAR Color Guard Commander Bob Hill:

Ohio's largest Color Guard Chapters are in the Cleveland and Cincinnati. The States Color Guard roster ranges between 80-100 members with 2-3 drummers.

Our Color Guard formally supports 10 to 12 events a year, mostly Patriot Grave Markings, and a few selected events out of state. For the last five October's members of our Guard have made pilgrimages to Yorktown, VA. Our biggest event is a National event, Siege at Fort Laurens, in Bolivar, OH each July, and is very well attended by the SAR of the Central District, DAR, and CAR. A Tomb Guard of the Unknown Patriot was recently added to the Siege at Fort Laurens weekend. Please view our most recent event there just last week: https://youtu.be/aej88zaX6L0. A fifer joined the event from the KY Society.

We post these events in the State e-magazine, The Ohio Country Bulletin, the National e-magazine, and The SAR Color Guardsman.

#### From the VASSAR Color Guard Commander Chris Melhuish

Virginia's Color Guard current numbers about 85, organized into four semi-au-

tonomous Regions with one drummer and one bagpiper. The VASSAR Color Guard supports 120 events during the year, of which 36 include musket/long rifle volley firing. In 2022, VASSAR Guardsmen will have participated in 20 in-state and 13 out of state National and District level events. National events that VASSAR will host include the Crossing of the Dan, Commemoration of Gen. Martin (formerly Raid on Martin's Station), the National Memorial Day Parade in DC, the July 4th march at Mt. Vernon, the Victory Day Parade and Thomas Nelson Wreath Laying at Yorktown, and the commemoration of the Battle of Great Bridge. VASSAR routinely submits articles for publication in the SAR Color Guardsman Magazine, and occasionally the SAR Magazine.

Here are a few questions and suggestions from the Commander:

What advice on Native Indian Nation flag protocol (i.e., precedence)-The protocol-An American Indian Reservation is a sovereign nation. On reservation soil the tribal flag takes precedence over the American flag. The color guard would look like this: Right Rifle Guard, Tribal Flag Bearer, US Flag Bearer, State Bearer, Left Rifle Guard. If the color guard were to march in a local parade off the reservation, then the US and tribal colors would switch.

What general liability insurance lessons learned across the entire society (the good and bad experiences), accident/incident reporting to the National Staff, accident/incident training procedures, etc.? But perhaps the most useful thing would be to establish a "best practices" blog for CG Commanders to exchange ideas and discuss challenges and opportunities or consider 2-3 Zoom meetings with all the State Color Guard Commanders to discuss a handful of mutually beneficial topics. One topic could be the 250th; another might be General Liabil-

ity Insurance and accident/incident procedures; another might be the NSSAR CG Cdr's vision/priorities.

#### From the MI Color Guard Commander Norm Palmer

The Michigan color guard roster stands at 31 guardsmen listed. We have two drummers and one SAR certified bagpiper. In 2021 we attended 15 events and in 2022 so far have attended 6. The MI Society this year hosted the Great Lakes District meeting. National and holiday events are always on our event roster. I have listed all our national events to the color guard magazine. As for a suggestion I would like the ability to have our guardsmen earn medal points via zoom for national events in parts of the country over a certain distance. I personally enjoyed the ability to join in several zoom events during covid days. Just seeing our SAR in the event field made me feel more a part of the society.

#### From the NC Color Guard Commander George Strunk (Color Guardsman of the Year)

We stand at 131 Compatriot Guardsman with five or six drummers and three or four fifers. There is a fife and drum corps in Greensboro that was associated with the Guilford Courthouse National Park and has participated in our event there every year. We support 6 NC National events, 8 NC State events, and 6 NC Chapter events. There are 31 other events in nearby states or National that we support as well as 12-20 Grave marking events each year. I submit our District and National events to the Color Guard Magazine.

I would be helpful if to post the National event list in the SAR Magazine. Many of our members are new and this would be a helpful guide

#### From the IA Color Guard Commander Mike Rowley

We have 6 members but no musicians. We support more than 30 events each year both National and District. We have submitted pictures to the National Color Guard Magazine.

#### From the KY Color Guard Commander Scott Giltner

Our membership runs between 60-70 members with 3 fifers and 3 drummers. In 2022 we supported 120 events. We host the Battle of Blue Licks Memorial Ceremony each year which is a National event and submit our photos to the Color Guard Magazine and have it posted on the National Website.

#### From the WV Color Guard Commander Ed Cromley

We have 20 members in our Color Guard with 3 drummers. We have attended 8 events this year supporting our sisters in the DAR. Our Point Pleasant Chapter

hosts the Battle Days National Event, and we send those pictures into the Color Guard Magazine.

#### From the MD Color Guard Commander David Embrey

Maryland has 23 Guardsmen with 1 fifer. We support 35 to 40 events per year and host the AMS Conference when it is our turn which we share with PA and NJ. We submit our events to the Color Guard Magazine.

#### From the MO Color Guard Commander Steven Perkins

Missouri's color guard operate as Chapter units within 3 districts, each having a District Commander subordinate to the State Color Guard Commander. The State Commander determines if an event should be classified as a state event and issues a state-wide muster call. We have just a few default state events: annual conference, State Fair Parade, and State DAR conference, and the DAR Lights of Love ceremony. If we locate and complete a first-time new patriot grave marking, that is a state muster call event. There are several drummers, and the St. Louis chapter have an associate member who plays bagpipe at occasional events.

Missouri hosts one national event: in May - Commemoration of the Battle of Ft. San Carlos, held in St. Genevieve Missouri. We have a very nice turnout this past May, which was covered in the latest Color Guards magazine.

Our Districts are very busy. The Kansas City (NW District) does 4 to 6 honor flight events, they hold ceremonies for Washington's birthday celebration, which is a joint KS-MO event. The Eastern District has a number of annual Memorial Day and veterans day events, as do the other districts. Through the year they will have 2 to 3 dozen events, many with DAR chapters.

The Southwest District does a lot with education, patriot grave memorial and re-dedications, ceremonies at the county historic courthouse for Flag Day and Nathaniel Greene's birthday, flag retirement ceremonies with the Scouts and JROTC. In 2019 the Ozark Mountain chapter CG participated in about 75 events, in 2020 25 and in 2021 we had 34.

#### From the NJ Color Guard Commander Richard W. Serfass

Our roster lists 23 members, we have access to 2 fifers and a drum corp for special events that charge a fee. We have supported as many as 34 events with 18 so far in 2022. We post 5 National Events in the Color Guard Magazine, Princeton, Trenton, Monmouth, Chestnet Neck and Red Bank. We are looking to add Bound Brook, Fort Lee and Springfield.

We are hopeful to get some ideas to help us with Recruitment, Retention and especially how to enlist Fifers and Drummers.




#### ALSSAR and DAR Flag Retirement

DAR and Alabama Society SAR gathered in Cullman, Alabama on September 25,2022 for the grave marking of Ella Marie Burns.




Ringing of the Bells

#### 241st Anniversary of the Battle of Groton Heights - September 4, 2022

On Sunday the Connecticut Line along with other members of the Connecticut SAR, as well as SAR members from New Hampshire and Massachusetts, participated in a grave marking of 4 patriots at the Col. Ledyard Cemetery in Groton. After the grave marking the final event of the day was 241st Anniversary of the Battle of Groton Heights which included unveiling the stone marker, dedicated to Jordan Freeman, a former slave and aide to Col. Ledyard, who was



commanding the fort. The laying of a wreath by CTSSAR State President, Stephen Z. Taylor and New Hampshire State President, Andrew Akers at the site inside the fort where Col. Ledyard was killed. There was the reading of the "88 Defenders" who were killed in the battle, along with a short speech by State Color Guard Commander Dave Perkins on why we commemorate this battle and then it concluded with a 3-volley musket salute from the raised platform overlooking the Thames River. On Saturday September 10th, an encampment at the Samuel Smith Farmstead c.1685 in East Lyme. The highlight for us was the terrific lunch served up by our own Howard Greene! The members of the Connecticut Line setup an encampment and preformed drilling and musket firing demonstrations during the day. #### LET FREEDOM RING Ceremony - Monday July 4, 2022

The ringing of bells celebrating Independence Day was foreseen by John Adams in July of 1776, when he wrote to his wife saying: "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires and illuminations from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forevermore."

On INDEPENDENCE DAY (Monday, July 4th), starting promptly at 1:45 PM, the First Litchfield Artillery Regiment performed a Let Freedom Ring ceremony at the All Wars Memorial in Bantam, Connecticut.

During the ceremony, using two cannons, the First Litchfield Artillery Regiment fired cannon salutes for each of the original 13 States in the order that they ratified the Constitution of the United States of America. Connecticut SAR Color Guard members carried and presented each flag of the thirteen original states at the same time that a cannon fires a salute to each state. At precisely 2:00 PM Eastern Daylight Savings Time, just as the smoke clears from the last cannon salute, nearby church bells began to ring. This is timed so that bells throughout the United States of America ring simultaneously to celebrate Independence Day.

In 1963, two men from this area of Connecticut, Eric Hatch and Eric Sloane, proposed the idea that bells across the nation, including the Liberty Bell, ring out at the same moment on Independence Day each year. Hatch and Sloane's idea was featured in an article entitled "Make Freedom Really Ring" which appeared in the February 17, 1963 issue of This Week magazine. The two Erics obtained the endorsement of Connecticut Governor John N. Dempsey and Abraham Ribicoff, a U.S. Senator from Connecticut. Senator Ribicoff took their idea to Congress and the nationwide ringing of bells, now known as "Let Freedom Ring," was adopted by Congress on June 26, 1963 and recorded as Senate Concurrent Resolution 25 [S. Con. Res. 25].

#### Ceremony honoring Gov. Oliver Wolcott, Sr. and Col. Benjamin Tallmadge

On INDEPENDENCE DAY (Monday, July 4th), starting at 12:00 Noon, the Mary Floyd Tallmadge Chapter DAR hosted a ceremony that honors Gov. Oliver Wolcott, Sr. and Col. Benjamin Tallmadge at their graves in East Cemetery (on East St. / Rte. 118, just west of the Litchfield Locker meat processing building). The SAR, the C.A.R., and the First Litchfield Artillery Regiment participated. Gov. Oliver Wolcott, Sr. was the 19th Governor of Connecticut and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. He was the second of three generations of Wolcotts to serve as Governor of Connecticut.

Col. Benjamin Tallmadge was a senior intelligence officer under General George Washington and the leader of the Culper Spy Ring. Upon learning that Maj. John André had been arrested with a pass for getting through the American lines and a set of papers detailing West Point's defenses hidden in his stocking, Tallmadge suspected Benedict Arnold to be André's accomplice. Tallmadge's actions led to the exposure of Benedict Arnold's treason. Maj. John André was found guilty of being a spy and was sentenced to hang.

In addition five patriots graves were marked: Reuben Webster, Benjamin Webster, Richard Wallace, John Hosford, and Ruth Welch Marvin.



#### Grave Marking for Boston Tea Party participant Elisha Ward - Saturday July 9, 2022

The Connecticut Line CTSSAR Color Guard participated in a grave marking of American Revolutionary Patriot and Boston Tea Party participant Elisha Ward. When it comes to acknowledging Litchfield's revolutionary War Heroes, Elisha Horton's name is seldom mentioned. It's unfortunate because he had a war record that ranked with the best of them, including being an acknowledged participant in the Boston Tea Party. This great act of civil disobedience occurring on the night of December 16, 1773, saw Elisha as a sixteen-year old patriot helping dump over 300 chests of tea into Boston Harbor in protest of an arbitrary tax placed on the tea by the British Parliament. The result of this act was an oppressive Boston Port bill, one of the measures eventually contributing to the organization of the First Continental Congress.



Following the Tea Party incident, he served with several local militias until February 1777 when he enlisted in Colonel Thomas Nixon's 6th Massachusetts Regiment. He would eventually participate in most of the battles and skirmishes in the Hudson Highlands. When Elisha's term of enlistment expired in early 1780, he re-enlisted, this time as a Sergeant Major. In April 1782 he was commissioned as an Ensign in the Continental Army. For the next three years he served in regiments commanded by Colonels Joseph Tuper, Joseph Vose, and Henry Jackson; all were involved in active engagements with the British forces. He may well have been with Colonel Vose when he led his regiment into New York City on Evacuation Day, November 25, 1783

#### Declaration of Independence



Between the second and third enlistment, Reuben Brumlett was a P.O.W., captured by the Tories in South Carolina. After his Parole, he snuck back to Virginia where he enlisted for his third time. If any soldier deserves the title of American Hero, surely Reuben Bramlett sits among them.


#### Naturalization Ceremony at the Lied Center

#### Battle of Blue Licks Memorial Ceremony

The 240th Anniversary of the Battle of Blue Licks was commemorated by the Kentucky Central Brigade on 20 August 2022. The Battle of Blue Licks, one of the last battles in the American Revolution, occurred on 19 August 1782 on a hill next to the Licking River in present day Kentucky. American Militia under the command of Colonel John Todd with subordinate officers Lt. Col. Stephen Trigg and Lt. Col. Daniel Boone were led into an ambush and defeated by a combined force of American Indians and British Rangers. The vastly outnumbered American force of approximately 182 suffered casualties of approximately 72 killed and 11 captured.

Participating in the memorial ceremony were President General Bruce Pickette, First Lady Rita Pickette, John Turley (Central District Vice-President General), Peter Davenport (Mid-Atlantic District Vice-President General), Brooks Lyle (National Color Guard Commander) and Kenneth Scott Collins (National Color Guard Vice Commander). Taking part in the ceremony were 37 SAR chapters, 18 DAR chapters, and 2 CAR chapters. Eleven SAR state societies were also represented. Kentucky Society President Scott Giltner served as the master of ceremonies.





The color guard for the ceremony consisted of two fifers, 17 riflemen, and 34 flag bearers. During the memorial ceremony, State Chaplain Don Drewry read the Honor Roll of those Patriots killed in the battle accompanied by the tolling of a bell after each name. During the Honor Roll, members of the rifle/musket team performed the drill 'mourn on arms'. The Patriots were also honored with 71 wreaths laid at the monument and a flag folding ceremony. The ceremony concluded with a flintlock gun salute followed by the sounding of Taps.



Honor Flight send-off for WWII veteran Jack Hamlin to France to attend D-Day ceremonies

On Tuesday, May 31, 2022, Ozark Mountain Chapter (OMC) Color Guard members joined the DAR and several other veteran organizations in the Honor Flight send-off for WWII veteran Jack Hamlin. The ceremony was held at the Montclair Senior Center in Springfield Missouri where Jack departed for the 7th time to France to attend D-Day ceremonies. Essential to the core mission of the SAR: honor our veterans; provide education.

His visit June 2022, accompanied by OMC member Dr. Norman Knowlton, took him to locations in Normandy. Dr. Knowlton has accompanied Jack Hamlin on most if not all of Jack's Honor Flight events, as he served as his personal physician for many years before Norm retired. They became close friends, and Jack Hamlin always asks Norm to be his chaperone. Jack Hamlin, born October 1921 and now 100 years old, has an amazing story. He becomes emotional at times when describing the different actions he was directly involved with. He is sharp in memory and in conversation when he talks about his experiences. Today, he is ever so grateful for his service, and reflection on what small part he served, along with hundreds of thousands of other soldiers, in June 1944. Jack joined the OMC for their chapter meeting July 16 and was quick to point out that he is never addressed as an "American" when approached by a Frenchman, but rather...a Liberator. For it was indeed liberation that the US Armed Forces delivered.

His Story:

Jack Hamlin participated in Operation Overlord on D-Day on June 6th, 1944. As a Member of the Coast Guard Rescue Flotilla his assigned duty, with a rope tied around his waist, wearing duty pants and tennis shoes, dove into the cold waters of the English Channel to pull out the wounded, shot, dying, and dead from

the waters on Omaha Beach. Mind you, no such thing as a wet suit existed then. He personally retrieved dozens.

176,000 soldiers participated in D-Day with 79,000 being Americans. They landed on Utah and Omaha Beaches while other nations participated on the Beaches of Gold, Sword, and Juno. Of those that participated there are less than 2,500 still alive, and only 100 who are capable of travelling to Normandy for its annual celebration. This year Jack was one of the 50 that went to Normandy for its celebration. This time, Jack was escorted by Norm and one of Jack's daughters, Julie. Jack is treated like royalty every time he visits France. Women of all ages press their way to him to

give the two-cheek kiss. He said he must have been kissed well over 500 times. He said the people of Normandy are among the most wonderful in the world.

# Monday, July 4, 2022. Part I-Perth Amboy "Let Freedom Ring" Independence Day Bell Ringing Ceremony

The NJSSAR Color Guard again celebrated July 4 this year in the history city of Perth Amboy, N.J., in a well-attended ceremony at which the city's Liberty Bell replica was rung and the NJSSAR cannon was fired repeatedly in salute to our nation's independence. NJSSAR President Charles Morgan, Atlantic Middle States Regional Vice President Robert Meyer and NJSSAR Color Guard and Cannon Crew members Edward Glidden, Frank McGonigle, Gary Beauregard, Jay Hershey and Bob Meyer were in attendance. As were the Mayor of Perth Amboy and other city and Union County dignitaries.

The day began with a morning reception at the Proprietary House, the only proprietary governor's mansion of the original Thirteen Colonies still standing. Overseen by architect and builder John Edward Pryor, construction began in 1762 and was completed in 1764.

(2022-07-04-liberty) Next the ceremony moved to Liberty Bell Park in City Hall Circle for the traditional ringing of bell at 2 pm. The bell is one of 55 full size replicas of the Liberty Bell cast in 1950 by the US Department of the Treasury to give out to US states, territories of the US and the District of Columbia. Perth Amboy was chosen as the home for the New Jersey Liberty Bell because of its historical significance as the East Jersey Capital during the Revolutionary War. The bell is rung 13 times at 2 pm, one ring for each of the 13 colonies. In addition to the cannon firings, highly spirited colonial music was provided by New Jersey Fifes and Drums



## Monday, July 4, 2022. Part II, East Jersey Old Town Village

After the Perth Amboy event, the cannon crew moved to East Jersey Old Town Village on the banks of the Raritan River in Piscataway, NJ, where celebrations of our National Independence Day were also under way. One of the highlights of the day, in which the NJSSAR cannon crew played a key role, was the live reenactment with cannon fire and a musket salute just like the one that took place nearby on July 4th, 1778, in celebration of the second anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. In addition to the 6-pounder provided by the NJSSAR, Lamb's Artillery and West Jersey Artillery participat-

ed in the firing, as did various other units firing muskets as part of the feu de joie, or "fire of joy." (A celebratory salute made by firing guns into the air sequentially along a line.) (Excerpt of "General Orders, 4 July 1778," Founders Online, National Archives, [Original source: The Papers of George Washington, Revolutionary War Series, vol. 16, 1 July–14 September 1778, ed. David R. Hoth. Charlottesville: University of Virginia Press, 2006, pp. 19–20.]

At three o'clock the feu de joie began with the Cannon fired at the Park as a signal for the troops to be put under Arms and formed ready to march. This was concluded by order of the Commander in Chief, with thirteen Pieces of Cannon being discharged, after which a single Cannon was the signal for a running fire to begin on the right of the Army and be continued to the left with Musketry and Cannon. At the Conclusion of which, on a signal three Cheers will be given, "Perpetual and undisturbed Independence to the United States of America."-

August 13, 2022: A Tribute to Two American Revolution Patriots

NJSSAR Color Guard members were proud to join the extended family of Robert I. Butler, Treasurer of the Rhode Island SAR, for a ceremony honoring his family's ancestors Capt. Edmund Munroe and Pvt. George Munroe of the Massachusetts 15th, who fell at the Battle of Monmouth, June 28, 1778. The ceremony was held at Old Tennent Cemetery in Manalapan Township, Monmouth County, New Jersey. Descendants of the Munroes laid wreaths, read an invocation and benediction, and Jay Hershey led those assembled in the SAR pledge. Compatriot Butler shared the following details of the Munroes' lives.

Edmund Munroe was born in 1736 in Lexington Mass. He entered the provincial service at an early age. He was promoted to ensign in a corps of Major Rogers Rangers and served in the French and Indian War. During that time, he was acting adjutant in Colonel Hoar's regiment at Crown Point in 1761, received a commission from Governor Bernard in 1762, and as lieutenant in His Majesty's service, he was engaged at Crown Point, Ticonderoga and vicinity until the end of the war in 1763.

Later Edmund was enrolled in the company of the Lexington Minute Men and was with them on April 19th 1775. Edmund then served in the Revolution with Rogers Rangers under Rogers and Hoar. He was commissioned lieutenant in July 1776 in Captain Mile's company and Colonel Reed's regiment. In January 1777, Edmund received his commission in Colonel Bigelow's 15th Massachusetts regiment; he served in the northern army at Stillwater, Saratoga and Bennington.

Edmund so distinguished himself that, after the capture of Burgoyne, he was presented with General Burgoyne's candle sticks. Edmund's wife, Rebecca, left the candle sticks to her son, Edmund, along with a sword the Edmund used in the French and Indian War. We have no idea where they may be today but would love to see them.

After the capture of Burgoyne, Captain Munroe joined the army under George Washington and spent the winter at Valley Forge; this was followed by engagements in Philadelphia and Trenton. On June 28, 1778 Edmund was slain at the Battle of Monmouth. His second cousin, George, was killed by the same cannon ball. This information was found in the memoir of Joseph Plumb Martin who was present during the battle. Additionally, there is a detailed account coauthored by Mark Edward Lender and Garry Wheeler Stone in "Fatal Sunday", a 624 page account of the Battle at Monmouth Court House.

George Munroe was born 1732 in Lexington Mass. He was a Private in the 15th Massachusetts Regiment serving with his second cousin, Edmund; he was present at the 1777/1778 winter encampment at Valley Forge. He served in the Revolution from March 1777 until his death on June 28th, 177, in the Battle of Monmouth; he was 46 years old. He was among the Minute Men of Lexington Massachusetts in John Parker's Company who responded to the midnight alarm of April 19, 1775. (Right) Gravestones honoring Capt. Edmund Munroe and Pvt. #### Saturday August 27, 2022 - Battle of Brooklyn

Saturday, Aug. 27, marked the 246th anniversary of the 1776 Battle of Brooklyn, also known as the Battle of Long Island, the largest engagement of the Revolutionary War. On this anniversary of such a momentous battle, the NJSSAR Color Guard crossed the Hudson to be with their fellow SAR members of New York, Maryland, and other states, convening for a ceremony at the Old Stone House in Washington Park in the heart of Brooklyn, NY.

Members of the NJSSAR, Maryland SAR and Society of the Cincinnati, New York SAR, Virginia SAR, Ohio SAR, SAR in Germany, New York DAR, New Jersey DAR, Pennsylvania Reenactors and Indian Nations representatives all took part in the ceremony. Other key members of the day's commemoration included Nancy Rosenberg, board chair of the Old Stone House & Washington Park, Kimberly Maier, executive director, and Martin Maher, commissioner Brooklyn NYC Parks. Attending from New Jersey were NJSSAR President Charles Morgan, Robert Meyer, Edward Glidden, Jay Hershey, Gary Beauregard and David Nelson.

Foremost in the day's honors was the remembrance of the Maryland 400, whose story and sacrifice in the battle is familiar to all who have studied the Battle of Long Island.

From the account provided by the Old Stone House, 3,000 soldiers were surrounded by 25,000 British and Hessian soldiers intent on quickly ending the American rebellion. After a swift attack by the British, many Americans in the hills of what would later become Prospect Park and along the Gownus Road near today's Green-Wood cemetery were trapped enemy lines. They came under fire from British cannons at the Old Stone House. To save them, General William Alexander led about 400 young soldiers from Maryland and Delaware to cover the retreat. They attacked the 2,000 British soldiers five times at the Old Stone House. They captured the house twice but with heavy casualties they had to give way. Their comrades had safely escaped and the remaining solders of the American army, some 8,000 men watching from Brooklyn Heights, including General Washington himself, were inspired by the Marylanders' sacrifice. There were 256 captured, missing or killed at the Old Stone House, part of the more than 1,000 casualties the Americans suffered during the battle.

#### Sunday August 28, 2022, 241st of the MARCH TO YORK TOWN

Each year at the end of August, the NJSSAR Color Guard joins in a parade through Westfield, N.J., honoring the day in 1781 when Continental and French regiments marched through the town en route to Virginia where they would join in the siege and ultimate defeat of the British at Yorktown.



The larger trail these regiments and many others followed, in what was the biggest allied troop movement of the Revolutionary War, make up what is known today as the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route, parts of which pass through New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, and the District of Columbia (carved out of Virginia and Maryland in 1790). The land route marched by the American and French armies to Yorktown was roughly 680 miles.

In the vanguard of this year's parade, in addition to George Washington, as portrayed by Sam Davis, were French Generals Rochambeau and Chastellux, and several African-American reenactors representing the historic 1st Rhode Island Regiment. This regiment has been noted often for its gallantry in many battles and for its including a large number of African-American soldiers, an early example of a racially integrated regiment in the American Army. The 1st Rhode Island reenactors in Westfield were led by Algernon Ward and the regiment's standard was carried by Kevin Chapman. New Jersey Fifes and Drums lent a hand as well. Members of the NJSSAR Color Guard in attendance included Atlantic Middle States Regional Vice President Robert Meyer, State Color Guard Commander Richard Serfass, Jay Hershey, James Sanford and Robert D'Amico.

The parade in Westfield is organized and chiefly sponsored by W3R-NJ, a nonprofit organization chaired by Westfield

DAR member Julie Diddell representing the New Jersey section of the National Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Association, also known as W3R.

The mayor of Westfield, Shelly Brindle, a Democrat, gave some remarks as did New Jersey State Sen. John Bramnick, a Republican

## Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter, Utah Society

Several additional compatriots from NV, CA, and AZ, hearing of this worthy cause, volunteered to drive hundreds of miles each in order to bolster our necessary numbers and experience in order to provide an accomplished Color Guard to appear for each of the events. #### STADIUM TRIBUTE TO FREEDOM ARTCLE



# Sons of the American Revolution Commemorate the 209th Anniversary of the Battle of Medina

The Battle of Medina is known as "the Bloodiest Battle on Texas soil". To understand what happened, we know Spain owned Texas as well as all of Mexico in 1812 but did little to settle the land. The inhabitants in 1812 were native American Indians, people from other Mexican states and the United States. The settlers were not happy with the oppression of the Spanish control, and they were encouraged by the recent revolution in Louisiana, so they planned their own revolution. Jose Bernardo Gutierrez de Lara and Augustus Magee, encouraged by the US, organized an expedition to take Texas from Spain. They came into Texas on August 7, 1812, and captured Nacogdoches, Trinidad de Salcedo, La Bahia, and San Antonio, where a Declaration of Independence for Texas, under the Republic of Mexico, was proclaimed on April 6, 1813. This, however, was short lived. The Spanish commandant general, organized an army of 1,830 men and marched from Laredo towards San Antonio to quell this rebellion. The Republican Army (Texas Army) consisted of about 1,400 men made up of Anglos, Tejanos, Indians, and former royalists. The Battle of Medina ensued on August 18, 1813. Most of the Republican Army was killed by the Spanish Army and their remains were left on the battlefield for several years. Finally in 1822, the remains of those in this battle were placed in a mass grave.

Members of the Freedom, San Antonio, Peter Sides, and William Hightower Chapters of the Sons of the American Revolution, commemorated the 209th Anniversary of the Battle of Medina sponsored by the Atascosa County and Medina County Historical Commissions, with a Color Guard, invocation and a musket volley for those that gave their lives for striving for the Independence of Texas from Spain. David Hamaker, a member of the SAR Freedom Chapter performed an SAR Patriot Ceremony Grave marker Re-dedication for his 6th great-grandfather, Peter Sides, who is the only known and proven soldier of the American Revolution, in the Battle of Medina. Other groups that gave re-dedications were the Daughters of the American Revolution, Sons and Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Sons and Daughters of the War of 1812, and representatives of the Mescalero Apache Native Americans. We need to remember and thank those that fought for our liberties and freedoms that we have today!







# The Freedom Chapter Of The Sons Of The American Revolution Performs As Color Guard

A naturalization ceremony was held Thursday, August 4, 2022, at the Brazos County Administration Building in downtown Bryan, Texas. There were more than 90 people from many countries that became new U.S. citizens. It was an honor for our chapter, along with the SAR Independence Chapter, to be able to present our Nation's Flags. To see the smiles on the faces as these people were sworn in, took their oath of allegiance, and heard the judge say, "You are now a citizen of the United States of America!" was remarkable.

We provided Host duties for this occasion in full uniform, welcoming guests at the door, and ushering.

The weekend events culminated on 4 July 2022, with the Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter, again augmented with Color Guardsmen from NV and AZ, providing the SAR Color Guard for the 4th of July parade in downtown St George, UT; then later that evening the chapter, along with Nevada compatriots, presented the colors at the Tribute to America Concert opening ceremony in front of 14,000 spectators in the Utah Technical University Stadium in St George.

All of this was an amazing accomplishment considering the Red Cliffs of Zion Chapter had only been Chartered five months prior to the 4 July weekend festivities and was still getting organized.

# SAR Reads Declaration of Independence in Winchester

On 4 July 2022, the Colonel James Wood II Chapter of the Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution read the Declaration of Independence on the Walking Mall in Winchester, Virginia. They marched on the



mall to the front of the Old Courthouse where they posted the flags before reading the document. It was on July 4, 1776, Congress declared the following: "The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen United States of America, when in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation."

After the end of the French and Indian War in 1763, Britain needed to pay for the war and began taxing the American colonies. The colonists felt their rights as Englishmen were being abused. This resulted in armed conflict with Great Britain which began on 19 April 1775 with the Battles of Lexington and Concord. At this time, few of the colonists wanted to separate from Britain. However, as the fighting continued, Britain asserted itself by means of large armed forces and did not make strong gestures towards reconciliation with the colonies. Americans increasingly believed they must secure their rights. A Continental Congress advised each of the colonies to establish their own governments. At the Second Continental Congress on 11 June, a committee consisting of Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston was chosen to prepare a statement of independence. Jefferson wrote the initial draft with slight changes made by the committee. It's main points include people having guaranteed rights: rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. The document was approved by the Continental Congress on 4 July 1776, announcing the separation of 13 North American British colonies from Great Britain. The Declaration of Independence outlines the history of abuses the colonists suffered under British rule since 1763 and officially records the proclamation that the United States is an independent country from Great Britain. The signers pledged "For the support of this declaration, with firm reliance on the protection of the divine providence, we mutually pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes and our sacred Honor." The actual signing of the document began on 2 Aug with seven additional signatures added later. ## Culpepper Minute Men Chapter - VA -

In 2008 Bugles Across America and the Culpeper Minutemen Chapter started an annual ceremony to remember the tragedy of 9/11, in which local citizens died, by gathering at four locations at the four times aircraft crashed into the World Trade Center Towers, the Pentagon, and a field in Pennsylvania. At each location, taps was played and salutes were rendered. Over the years this has grown to include much of the community of Culpeper, VA. In 2017, the NSSAR Color Guard recognized this ceremony as a "Massing of Colors". Sgt Maj John Champe Sponsors 246th Anniversary of the Reading of the Declaration of Independence

13 August 2022, Loudoun County Courthouse, Leesburg, VA

On 12 August 1776, two-hundred and forty-six years ago plus one day, the Declaration of Independence was read, for the first time in Virginia, from the door of the original Loudoun County Courthouse by Sheriff Philip Noland. The reading on 12 August 1776 was in response to an order by Virginia Governor Patrick Henry that the Declaration must be read in every Virginia county and town. The order by Governor Patrick Henry and repeated by Loudoun County officials is recorded in a Court Order Book in the Historic Documents section of the Loudoun County Courthouse. Copies of that Order Book entry, and other historic Revolutionary War era documents were displayed by Loudoun County Historical Archivist Eric Larsen besides the stairs of the Old Courthouse.

The Sgt Maj John Champe (SMJC) Chapter sponsored a re-enactment of the Reading of the Declaration of Independence with multiple Virginia SAR Compatriots in militia uniform, similar to the uniforms worn by the majority of Loudoun County men who marched off to the Revolutionary War. Representatives of Daughters and Children of the American Revolution joined SMJC SAR and shared in the reading of sections of the Declaration. A one-third size liberty bell brought by an SMJC applicant, and Loudoun County resident, was rung after each section was read and the bell was rung multiple times as the reading completed. "LET FREEDOM RING" and three "HUZ-ZAH's" were spoken loudly along with multiple rings as the ceremony closed. Children from the Reverend John Marks Society Children of the American Revolution (C.A.R) and their acting Senior President led the Pledge of Allegiance and handed out small American Flags and booklets of the Constitution and Declaration of Independence. Col. William Grayson C.A.R member Jacob Schwoerer was bell ringer, and carried his Society flag in Color Guard. Leesburg Mayor Kelly Burk brought greetings on behalf of Leesburg residents, and was presented a Certificate of Appreciation for her participation in the 18 June 2022 Commemoration of the Loudoun Resolves

- Name the files after the event, e.g., Paradel.jpg, Parade2. jpg and for multiple events ensure that you do not use the same file name twice!

#### To submit event text desciptions:

Within the document use the proper photo file name(s) for the specific event.

- When listing the participants in the photo *use this* format only -
- "(Photo name )-(Event name) Color Guard members L-to R - John Jones, Sam Smith, David Daniels, Edward Evans, etc"

**Do not do this** - using tabs (Event1) John Jones, Sam Smith, David Daniels,

Remember, this is for Color Guard events - not chapter events wherein a chapter member makes a presentation that does NOT include color guard participation. Such Chapter presentations are suitable for the SAR Magazine. It must be an activity that the Color Guard UNIT is doing.

# SAR Commemorates Adoption of the U.S. Constitution

On 17 September 2022, the Colonel James Wood II Chapter of the Virginia Society, Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) co-sponsored a program to commemorate the signing of the United States Constitution. The SAR combined with the Shenandoah Christian Alliance, Boy Scouts of America and other organizations at Mount Hebron Cemetery to honor the 235th anniversary of the adoption of the document that is basis for our government. The subject of the commemoration was the "History and Importance of our Constitution in These Turbulent Times". Speakers included Col. (R) Mark Quimby, the Reverand Doctor Larry W. Johnson, Compatriot Tom Reed and members of the Boys Scouts of America. After opening remarks and the presentation of historic flags, the Colonel James Wood II Color Guard presented the colors for the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Continental Congress met in May of 1787 to revise the Articles of Confederation, which had been adopted in November 1777 as a means to provide a Federal government for the States who had declared themselves a free and independent nation. These went into effect in 1781 and governed the States until 1789 when the Constitution took effect. The Articles provided a weak and ineffective government. The articles left the States as sovereign and independent and a Congress which served as the last resort on appeal of disputes. The Articles of Confederation named the new nation "The United States of America" and Congress was given the authority to make treaties and alliances, maintain armed forces and coin money. The document contained a preamble, 13 articles and a conclusion. The Congress was unicameral with one house. There was no executive or judicial branch and no checks and balances. The president of the Congress was the

president of the country. However, the Congress lacked the ability to levy taxes and regulate commerce. This led to the Constitutional Convention in 1787. It was originally chaired to revise the articles but after several discussions, it was determined a new document was needed. The States selected 70 delegates to participate with 55 showing up. After 100 days of discussion and arbitration, the Constitution was adopted and 39 of 42 delegates present signed the document. It would need nine States to ratify and on 21 June 1788, New Hampshire became the ninth State to make the Constitution the law of the land. On 29 May 1790, Rhode Island became the 13th State to approve and accept the document. The issues that made the approval process long and arduous were finally settled with the adoption of the first 10 amendments to the Constitution, known as the Bill of Rights which was adopted 15 December 1791.

After the program, a three round musket salute was fired by the SAR musket squad to commemorate the signing of the Constitution. 


augmented by the boom of the SeaFair Pirates cannon which was positioned 2 blocks behind us. The event was a great success with many thanks to all who participated.
