

Successful Congress Staged In Texas

When the final tally was made of attendees at the 106th Annual Congress this past June in San Antonio, records showed that 335 Compatriots were registered – 328 of them official delegates – and 218 guests were on hand. This total was well above the average of similar gatherings in recent years.

The Texas Society Congress Planning Committee, under the able chairmanship of Billy E. Hightower, did a highly commendable job of organizing a wide array of business and social programs. Working with him was Maryland Compatriot Barrett McKown, Chairman of the National Congress Planning Committee.

Elected President General was Reon G. Hillegass, a Past President of the Virginia Society who was completing a term as Secretary General. Prior to that he had been Treasurer General for three years and Vice-President General for the Mid-Atlantic District. A full slate of other officers was also elected; three posts were





Compatriot Hero Recognized

A surprise ending to the evening was special recognition given to Texas Society Compatriot Arthur Conklin, who was serving aboard the U.S.S. Stark when she was hit by French Exocet anti-ship missiles and set on fire during the Iraqi attack on May 17, 1987 (this is the ship after which the U.S.S. Stark Memorial Award is named). While he was Damage Control Assistant, about two-thirds of the vessel was damaged/destroyed, with only the main engineering spaces escaping damage. Thirtyseven crew members (out of 167) were killed and 22 others were seriously injured.

Through the special efforts of the crew, the fires were extinguished, the holes patched and the ship saved. This took over two days and was followed by an extensive 18-month yard period. Compatriot Conklin, at the time a Lieutenant, was featured on the cover of Parade Magazine as "The man who saved the Stark." Now a resident of San Antonio, he is employed as a plant manager at a manufacturing firm.

Outstanding Youths Star At Congress

Our Society's dedication to furthering programs for youths across the nation was very evident at the 106th Annual Congress in San Antonio. It was then that months of hard work at the Chapter and State levels came to fruition for the Eagle Scout Scholarship Competition, the George S. and Stella M. Knight Essay Contest and the Joseph S. Rumbaugh Historical Oration Contest.

The Wisconsin Society walked off with two top honors when Eagle Scout Mark A. Hendrickx was awarded the \$5,000 scholarship and Justin Jaeck was declared as having composed the best essay to capture the \$2,000 prize. Following an exciting run-off of the Oration Contest, John Barry Dunlap of Maryland was named the winner, he received a check for \$2,000.



Justin Jaeck, national winner of the Essay Contest, presented his manuscript during the Wisconsin Society's Annual Meeting in May. Immediate Past President of the C.A.R. Wisconsin Society, he was Salutatorian in his graduating class this spring. Last year he was awarded the Bronze Eagle Trophy by the Wisconsin Society for being named top Eagle Scout.

The runner-up in the Eagle Scout competition was Albert R. Leatherman of West Virginia. He was to be presented a check for \$1,000 during a local SAR meeting. Chairing this vital program has been Texas Society Compatriot Jackson L. Grady.

Col. Charles S. Wingate, Chairman of the Essay Contest, reported that 21 State Societies participated with over 1,500 entries being received and judged. The second place winner was Joseph Thomas Leslie, a student from Louisiana, while Jaclyn M. Dahlang of Washington State came in third; they were awarded \$1,000 and \$500, respectively.

Fourteen State Societies fielded orations contestants, as shown in an accompanying photo. Their topics ranged from George Washington at Valley Forge to Patrick Henry and Thomas Paine.

As space permits in future issues of the magazine, the winning essay and oration will be reproduced, as will the essay submitted by Mr. Hendrickx.

Foundation Board Announces Changes

When the Board of Trustees of the Sons of the American Revolution Patriotic and Educational Foundation met at the time of the 106th Annual Congress in San Antonio, Former President General Clovis H. Brakebill was elevated from Vice Chairman to Chairman to replace FPG Robert B. Vance, whose one-year term had expired. Compatriot Vance continues as a member of the Board in accordance with Foundation Bylaws.

At the same time Texas Society Compatriot Frank A. Gibson was elected Treasurer to replace Henry R. Maxey, who had died in April. New to the Board, Gibson is a retired C.P.A. who holds a

BBA Degree in Accounting from the University of Texas. In addition to a successful business career, he served four years as Secretary-Treasurer of the Texas Society and is currently Treasurer.

Also new to the Board is Immediate Past President General William C. Gist. This move is in line with Foundation Bylaws that two Immediate FPGs be members; the other is Col. Stewart Boone McCarty.

Other Board members are: Phillip B. Carr, Secretary, FLSSAR; H. Ross Arnold, GASSAR; FPG George H. Brandau, M.D., TXSSAR; FPG Paul H. Walker, MASSAR; and Warren M. Yarbrough, HISSAR.

The Foundation's objective is to raise, administer and disburse funds for the major benefit of the National Society. Such funds are to be used primarily for capital improvements, but will also be employed to finance an array of programs important in carrying out the patriotic and educational goals of the Society. The Foundation is prepared to accept a range of contributions that include cash, real and personal property, charitable remainder trusts and property through planned giving.

Official SAR Tour To Spain Planned

Plans are now being developed for an official SAR visit to Spain during May, 1997 to honor that nation's government for their invaluable assistance to our country during the Revolutionary War. Indications of interest in joining the trip group are desired – now.

To be led by President General Reon G. Hillegass, the trip is being planned by Michigan Society Compatriot Donald J. Pennell, who was repsonsible for the soujourn earlier this year to the Netherlands (see complete report starting on page 12).

Compatriot Pennell states that a suitable presentation on behalf of the National Society will be offered to a high-ranking

government officer. Also included in the nine or ten night trip will be visits to Madrid, Toledo, Barcelona, Andorra and either Granada or Seville. The total cost per person is projected to be about \$2,500.

The group will be limited to 35 people, with Compatriots, wives and widows cordially invited to participate. If you are seriously interested in being a part of this historic program, please notify Executive Director Robert A. Lentz at National Headquarters – now. When details have been finalized, you will be notified and requested to make a deposit. The first 35 to submit deposits will be accepted to join other Compatriots and guests in this exciting adventure.

Six Awarded Minuteman Medal

Six Compatriots were awarded the prestigious Minuteman Medal during Recognition Night at the 106th Annual Congress in San Antonio. Each was saluted in a traditional ceremony for service of an exceptional character to the National Society. They were selected earlier this year by the Minuteman Committee chaired by Former President General Benjamin H. Morris.

The award was first presented at the Annual Congress in 1952. Since then 272 Compatriots have been honored, including the six this year. The medal is given only at the Annual Congress during an impressive program that also features recognition of past recipients in attendance.



1996-97 Membership Goals Revealed

President General Reon G. Hillegass has reiterated his strong support of membership growth for 1996-97. With that emphasis in mind, he has agreed to new goals for the year that produce a net increase of 1.500.

The ending report as of March 31, 1996 was a net of **24,276**. This makes our goal for the current year to reach a total by March 31, 1997 of **25,776**. The following data show the net membership increase for each State Society by Vice-President General Districts. It is absolutely essential for VPGs and State Presidents to make membership a priority if we are to show real growth. Remember – new applications approved plus reinstatements less deceased and drops for non-payment of dues give the net membership result.

The above figures total 1,503 due to rounding out of net increases (6.2%). Chapters which make a net increase of 6.2% must be certified by the State President by May 15, 1997 to be eligible for a Certificate of Achievement at new year's awards ceremony during the 107th Annual Congress in Baltimore.

Valuable Documents Offered

The Membership Committee recommends that each new officer at the State Society and Chapter levels be furnished: (1) A set of "Membership Guides"; and (2) A copy of the Workshop Outline" to train persons for membership recruitment. These documents have been sent to or purchased by most states. They should be reproduced and distributed. And be sure to let our Committee know should you still need them.

This year the Committee will look at how Chapters can be assisted by the State Society to achieve membership goals as itemized above. The base of the achievement pyramid is the Chapter. When Chapters make the goal, the State Society, District and National Society all benefit.

SAR Trip In May Salutes Netherlands

From May 3 to May 15, President General William C. Gist, Jr. led an SAR tour of the Netherlands and Switzerland, with side trips to Belgium and Germany. Twenty-one Compatriots and wives from the 13 states joined him.

Although the primary objective of the tour was to honor the Netherlands for their assistance during our Revolutionary War, it also included a visit to commend the Switzerland Society on their revitalization and to attend their Annual Meeting.

The tour had many "firsts." The tour traveled the most miles (average of 10,206), the most days (12), and met with the highest ranking government official of any tour in the history of NSSAR. It was the first such tour to have the Color Guard carry the "Betsy Ross" Flag; an Amsterdam newspaper noted this flag and featured it prominently in their photo.

Tour Reason Traces To 1776

Before 1775, the Netherlands had a substantial trading business operating from their island of St. Eustatius in the Caribbean (next to St. Kitts). Although the Netherlands was a neutral nation in the American Revolution, the merchants continued to trade with the U.S. providing badly needed gunpowder, lead, clothing and other military provisions. Without these items, it is probable that the U.S. would not have been able to survive the first year of the war. In 1776, a U.S. Navy Warship sailed into the harbor of St. Eustatius and their cannons were fired in reply to the U.S. salute. It was the beginning of an unbelievable series of events that were factors in our winning the Revolutionary War.

The salute, ordered by Governor Johannes de Graaff, was in recognition of another country's flag. It was the first

salute in the history of the world to officially recognize the United States as an independent nation, and honored the *Andrew Doria*, U.S. Brig-of-War commanded by Capt. Isiah Robinson. This recognition of the U.S. was to have worldwide repercussions.

Governor de Graaff had placed himself and the island in a precarious position as the Netherlands were a neutral nation and the British were attempting to blockade the island to stop the flow of war materials. During this period, the British navy captured numerous French and Spanish merchant vessels trying to supply St. Eustatius as well as dozens of U.S. ships. And in Amsterdam British Ambassador Sir Joseph Yorke was making serious threatening remarks about the failure of the Dutch to halt this trade. Eventually, the Dutch government, in order to placate the English, recalled Governor de Graaff. However, this was but a charade and the Governor was returned without censure, but without published official approval of his actions. Eventually the Netherlands paid heavily for their position as England declared war on the Dutch.

Meanwhile the British, who were already at war with France, learned that France's Admiral deGrasse had set sail for the Carribean. The British immediately ordered Admiral Sir George Rodney and Admiral Sir Samuel Hood with their fleets to the Carribean to protect their holdings in the various islands and to attack the French fleet. Soon after arriving in the West Indies, on February 3, 1781 Admiral Rodney sailed into the harbor of St. Eustatius (evidently under French Flags) and quickly captured St. Eustatius which wasn't aware that war had been declared. Rodney proceeded to strip all the warehouses and private dwellings including

6,900 hogshead of tobacco belonging to Virginia merchants. They also destroyed a majority of the buildings leaving the inhabitants to shift for themselves. Admiral Rodney brought 30 merchant ships with him to carry the booty back to England under heavy naval escort. However, on return to England over 22 were captured by the French, some were sunk and a couple managed to limp to Ireland, depriving Admiral Rodney of the biggest prize money of his lifetime.

During this period, Admiral deGrasse, who had sailed to the West Indies causing serious disruption and damage to the British fleets, soon sailed to Yorktown to fulfill his commitment to assist the U.S. in the Revolutionary War. But Rodney, in his desire to strip St. Eustatius and to protect other British islands from the French, delayed in chasing deGrasse, ignoring his primary orders to attack the French fleet. By the time Rodney finally arrived off the Virginia coast, he found Admiral deGrasse firmly in control and he sailed away without any attempt to challenge him. Thus, St. Eustatius was a contributing factor to the British loss of the Revolutionary War.

Florida Compatriot Involved

Another important action should be noted. In 1939 President Franklin D. Roosevelt ordered a bronze plaque to be placed on the island of St. Eustatius which read: "In Commemoration of the salute of the flag of the United States fired in this fort November 16, 1776, by order of Johannes de Graaff, Governor of St. Eustatius, in reply to a national gun fired by the U.S. Brig of War Andrew Doria – Here the sovereignty of the United States of America was first formally acknowledged to a national vessel by a foreign official."

That plaque was carried by Capt. Grover S. Higgenbotham, USN (Ret) and a member of the Naples Chapter, Florida Society; he was graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1935. Capt. Higgenbotham, then a Lt.-Junior Grade aboard the Battleship *Wyoming*, delivered the plaque. He carried the plaque down the ship's ladder to a motor launch, but had two buoys attached to the plaque so it would float in case he dropped it in the ocean. Lt. Higginbotham also attended the presentation that was conducted by Capt. Robertson of the *Wyoming*.

On the morning of May 9th in the city of The Hague, the tour was joined by the United Kingdom Society's Secretary, the Switzerland Society's President and William P. Pope, a member of the Virginia Society, who has just been assigned to the Hague's American Embassy as Deputy

Chief of Mission. The tour assembled in the U.S. Embassy's auditorium for a small reception.

Following the reception, President General Gist presented a Silver Good Citizenship Medal to U.S. Ambassador K. Terry Dornbush, P.G. Gist was followed by Ambassador Pennell who expressed his appreciation of the great assistance provided by several members of the Ambassador's staff. In Ambassador Dornbush's acceptance speech he stated that: "the 'First Salute' is today an historic symbol of the deep friendship between the U.S. and the Netherlands, and that later on that day the NSSAR will remind the Dutch people of the important role their country

played in the history of the American people." He concluded by "giving additional thanks to Mr. Gist and Mr. Pennell for this "commendable act."

Following the presentation, the tour group walked to the Netherland's Parliament Buildings, where President General Gist presented the Gold Good Citizenship Medal to Mr. Tjeenk Willink, Chairman of the First Chamber of the States General (their "Congress"). U.S. Ambassador Dornbush, Mr. Tjeenk Willink, President General Gist, and Ambassador Pennell were seated at the speakers table.

The office of the Chairman of the First Chamber is equivalent to the head of the

U.S. Senate or the British House of Lords and has significantly more power than the Second Chamber. The Netherlands did not have a king or queen until 1815; in 1776 the States General was ruled by the Chairman. In addition they didn't have a First and Second Chamber at that time, so Chairman Tjeenk Willink who was presented the medal was the equivalent to the Chairmen who ruled in 1776.

Location Steeped In History

The presentation took place in the Assembly Room of the First Chamber which was the same room where the States General met with the recalled Governor of St. Eustatius to discuss the possibility of disciplining him. It was also the same room that the States General approved the ten million dollar loan to the U.S. in 1781. It was the first time Ambassador Dornbush or any of his staff had been in any of the rooms of the First Chamber.

Chairman Willink gave a lengthy speech thanking the Society for the medal, and stating that: "In recent decades the Netherlands has often been described as 'America's most loyal ally.' This has also been how many Dutch people have seen their country, a self-image which has not been, and is still not, contradicted by the United States."

He also said: "While I am grateful for this mark of honour, it is with some unease that I stand before you today - It is because the Dutch have difficulty in coming to terms with their own past. Last year, for example, we did not feel entirely comfortable with the 50th celebration of our own liberation in May 1945. Not, of course, because we are not grateful for this liberation, for which mainly young Americans made great sacrifices and in some cases paid with their lives - No, it is because we have difficulty with our own contribution to history. How heroic, determined and merciful were we ourselves during the war years? - When I see how your National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution commemorates the

founding of your very powerful country, I realize only too well the need for modesty."

Ambassador Pennell made the acknowledgement to the Chairman's remarks and concluded the ceremony. Mr. Tjeenk Willink then conducted a tour of the Parliament Buildings which was followed by a reception.

In the evening a reception sponsored by the NSSAR was held in Voorborg. This was followed by a dinner during which Ambassador Pennell presented Certificates of Appreciation to three members of the Ambassador's staff.

City of Maastricht Visited

Another significant presentation had taken place previously. On May 5th. President General Gist presented the Silver Good Citizenship Medal to Mr. T. Bovens, Deputy Mayor of Maastricht. Ambassador Pennell also presented certificates of Appreciation to two city officials. The presentation was held in the Theater Aan Het Vrijthof in Maastricht and was followed by a reception.

The city of Maastricht was selected to represent the "2nd level of Dutch government" for all of the Netherlands. Maastricht was chosen as it was the first Dutch city liberated in WWII, and the only city liberated by solely U.S. troops. The tour group stayed in the same hotel that the U.S. Army used for their headquarters in Maastricht, and was present on their National Holiday (Liberation Day) which honors the U.S. for their WWII sacrifices.

The following morning the tour visited the 65-acre Netherlands-American Military Cemetery in Margaraten where 8,301 headstones of Americans mark the burial of those who fought to liberate the Netherlands. In addition there is a large wall listing the names of an additional 1,722 who were missing in action.

Attend Events In Switzerland

Following the events in the Netherlands, the tour group flew to Geneva to honor the Switzerland Society, which had been dormant but was recently rejuvenated. That visit included a reception and dinner at the home of President Richard C. Owens, and a reception and dinner at their Annual Meeting. A Geneva newspaper had an article and photo about the NSSAR visit to Geneva.

The Swiss Society had also reactivated their annual debate between two of Geneva's prestigious private schools. It was held at the Ecole Internationale School of Geneva. The subject was the pros and cons of Federalism. The judges were P.G. Gist, Swiss SAR Count Denys Crapon de la Caprona and Ambassador Pennell as Chairman.

A summary of the places visited in the Netherlands includes tours of Maastricht, Leiden, Delft, Edam, Amsterdam, Lisse, Rotterdam; Zaandam, Volendam and Marken; visiting the North Sea, a 70-acre

tulip park, windmills, Rembrandt art museum, a flea market; witnessing a diamond cutting operation, Edam cheese making and Delft porcelain manufacturing; taking a night wine & cheese canal boat tour; and walking through Leiden

where the Pilgrims stayed after being ejected from England and before they came to America.

In Switzerland the group toured Geneva, had a VIP tour of the United Nations and took a panoramic scenic train to Interlaken where President Gist was given a surprise 61st birthday party. They also rode a cable car – transferring three times, up to 10,000 feet arriving above the clouds and eating at

a revolving restaurant – took a steamer across Lake Brienz to a wood-carving village; and finally a bus tour over the Alps and a tour of Lucerne and Zurich before flying back to Amsterdam for the flight back home.

Lineage Workshops Effort Gaining Momentum Among SARs, DARs Alike

The Lineage Research Workshops Program, instituted about a year ago, has two important objectives: (1) Find men in your community who are qualified for SAR membership, and: (2) Help those interested in SAR to properly complete their applications.

Experience to date shows that successful workshops may be staged in varying degrees of size – from large to small – as indicated in a few case histories reported below. Most importantly, it is necessary to be knowledgeable about researching family lineage and completing applications.

A review of the program after its first year shows slow, but steady implementation by State Societies and Chapters. Here are a few examples that could well be adapted to your particular needs.

Charles T. Galbraith, President of the Empire State Society's 1st New York Continental Chapter, co-sponsored an all day workshop at the National Archives Northeast Division in New York City, with Archives personnel, DARs and other hereditary societies participating. Its purpose was to familiarize potential members with the admissions requirements of each organization represented. Attendees also had the opportunity to become familiar with the holdings of the Division's facility. A fee of \$25 was charged.

John W. Smith, West Virginia Society President, conducted a one-day workshop jointly with a DAR Chapter Regent. Five men and 20 women attended, with each man interested in SAR membership. This was a "hands-on" session held at the James E. Morrow Library of Marshall University at Huntington.

Illinois Society Genealogist Charles B. Schweizer reported that the General George Rogers Clark Chapter conducted workshops in three communities to help attendees with family lineage and completing SAR applications. The number of students ranged from 12 to 27. Efforts resulted in six SAR applications. More workshops are planned in the fall.

Lowell E. Nichols, Sr. of the Indiana Society targeted Recreational Vehicle Rallies. He and his DAR wife held workshops at four such rallies in the state this spring, with more coming later in the summer.

Arizona Society Genealogist Charles Harrar and Registrar Kenneth Hales have been busy recruiting new SARs. At his country club, Compatriot Harrar obtained 17 potential SARs, while seven new members have been confirmed and about seven have pending applications. Compatriot Hale conducted two Genealogical Training Courses at a local Air Force Base.

Graham T. Smallwood, a noted genealogist and member of the District of Columbia Society, has been appointed to chair that Society's Workshops Committee. This approach to boosting membership fits well with their Constitution and Bylaws under "Recruiting, which shall be a lookout committee for securing accessions to the membership of the Society."

These descriptions indicate a variety of scenarios for Lineage Research Workshops and point to the fact that no matter how a prospective member is approached, ultimately two factors emerge to get his membership approved: (1) Lineage Research is necessary to determine his relationship to a Revolutionary War ancestor, and (2) The application for membership must be acceptable.

From the beginning of the Workshops Program it was envisioned that SAR and DAR could work effectively as a team, when appropriate, in this important endeavor. Presently, the DAR is focusing its attention to "in-house" workshops to train appropriate members of their Chapters how to complete acceptable application papers. This activity is coordinated with DAR State Societies by the eight DAR Division Vice Chairmen (named in the Winter Issue of *The SAR Magazine*).









GEORGE WASHINGTON'S SEAL RING is the most valuable possession of our Society. Owned and used by Washington, it has a setting of carnelian in which is incised the Washington Family crest.

GEORGE WASHINGTON KNEELING IN PRAYER is depicted in this magnificent 9-foot-tall bronze sculpture on the grounds of the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. Nearby his Continental Army camped during the fateful Winter of 1777-78 of the Revolutionary War.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON FAMILY is a handsome illustration on display at our Headquarters. "New" U.S. History Standards Still Wrong!

"Who controls the past, controls the future: who controls the present controls the past." So wrote George Orwell in his 1984.

The original standards of the "Goals 2000" have been done away with and are gone. Some might believe that the war is over and victory is ours. But the struggle remains and we must ever remain alert for the "New Standards" are on the way.

How could such national standards ever have been created? Are they even desirable? Are national educational standards of any type something that America needs? Is there any danger that such standards could be "hijacked" by federal bureaucrats and extremists on either the left or right, who could use them to impose their notions of political correctness upon our children?

These standards have been created because of a powerful prevailing attitude among revisionist historians who teach that American history is the story of how white western Europeans exploited minorities and their struggle against that dominant power structure to the exclusion of all other factors.

Our System Fosters Diversity

One of the great hallmarks of the American educational system is that we have been able to maintain a great diversity in teaching. This is why, despite many complaints and faults, that we have the best university educational system in the world today. So avoidance of a National Ministry of Education, as so many other countries have, with all of their rigid standards, has contributed to our success.

But the Commonwealth of Virginia, which refused to accept "Goals 2000", has lost over \$10 million dollars in the last year for refusing to accept them. One must conclude that "Goals 2000" is just another step in the continued reduction of the ability and rights of individual states to educate their youth.

This effort to establish federal controls on local education has not ended with history. The "Goals and Standards" for other subjects are being completed and are being attacked by authorities in those fields for much the same reasons that your Task Force has raised.

History Standards Still Wrong

The new standards have been released and the "New History Standards" have got it all wrong again! The authors claim that all of us belong to a "Great Convergence" of Europeans, Africans and Native Americans.

John Locke Was Right

John Locke wrote, "In the beginning all the world was America," for he believed that America would escape the very conditions of oppression that these new standards hail as our beginnings. Locke had America in mind when he first articulated the doctrine of rights, natural and inalienable, criticized slavery, defended women's right to inherit and other important aspects of what America was all about. But no sooner than this background to our Declaration of Independence is noted in these new standards that the focus turns to slavery. Then the students are asked to "show how the ideas that inspired the American Revolution influenced the 20th century revolutions in Mexico, Russia, China, Cuba, and Vietnam." That revolutions made in the name of Marxist-Leninism are cited as products of the American Revolution can only mean that students will have absolutely no grasp of the philosophical foundations of our Declaration of Independence and Constitutional Republic.

Compatriots, your Task Force will continue to work hard to keep you informed as to our progress in opposing these "Goals and Standards." We also wish to remind you that these standards, revised or not, are not consistent with the stated purpose of the SAR. Our Charter. granted by Congress, obligates us to perpetuate the memory of those who achieved our nation's independence.

The Task Force deliberated for some time over the development of suitable guidelines to help in our struggle to preserve United States History. The following suggestions are offered for inclusion in State Society and Chapter programs of action.

1. Establish State Task Forces to monitor 5. Each State Society and Chapter should their state education organizations to ensure that "revisionist" material does not creep into the school curriculum. Also to serve as legislative "watchdogs" to be aware of and ready to fend off attempts to engage in "Revisionist" efforts of revising the accurate teaching of U.S. History.

7. Invite an outstanding teacher to be the guest at a luncheon or dinner and then recognize their efforts as an outstanding teacher. (The History Committee is in the process of developing an award at this time.) 8. Select, with the help of your outstanding teacher, an outstanding student of history. 9. Only speak with confidence on what you know; don't defend the unfamiliar or unknown. 10. NEVER ALLOW YOURSELF TO BECOME NEGATIVE! Also remain posi-

tive on this subject and do not do anything

that reflects adversely upon the NSSAR or

yourself.

Memorial Service Honors Compatriots

Nearly 600 Compatriots who were called to eternal rest over the previous year were honored during the traditional Memorial Service held on the Sunday prior to the official start of the 106th Annual Congress in San Antonio. The site was the historic Saint Mark's Episcopal Church, which was organized in 1858.

The SAR Combined Color Guard led a parade of Compatriots and guests from the Hyatt Regency Hotel to the church and posted the Colors there in a dramatic ceremony. Presiding was President General William C. Gist. Also participating in the solemn program were Chaplain General Rev. Earl-Clayton Grandstaff: Past Chaplains General Rev. Frank MacD. Spindler and Rev. Charles E. Page; Texas Society Chaplain Rev. John B. Stepp; Secretary General Reon G. Hillegass; and Former Presidents General Carl F. Bessent, James R. Calhoun, Charles F. Printz and James R. Westlake.

As he has for a number of years, FPG Bessent recalled the lives of several departed members, with emphasis on service to the Society and the communities in which they lived. He first singled out those who had been General Officers: Augustus diZerega, Kansas Society - Vice - President General, Genealogist General, Minute Man: Stanley W. Eno, Connecticut - VPG; Gen. Wesley Hamilton, Washington Society -VPG, oldest living General at time of death; Leland Hawkins, California Society - VPG: Asa E. Phillips, Massachusetts Society - VPG, Historian General, Minute Man; Willis G. Tetrick, Jr., West Virginia Society - VPG, Genealogist General, Minute Man; Charles A. Vencil, California Society - VPG, Registrar General, Minute Man; Hugh Wilkinson, Louisiana Society - VPG; and Col. Carroll Wright, Virginia Society - VPG.

In addition to eight Past National Trustees, he spoke about 12 Compatriots who had been a member of our Society for over 60 years, one of them for 72 years. He continued his remarks by reporting on a few who had unusual events in their background: George Cramer, North Carolina Society, who served as a special military liaison officer for President Franklin D. Roosevelt and participated in the meetings between the President and Prime Minister Churchill; Luther Goding, Nebraska Society, who began his Postal Service career on his 21st birthday, retired after 40 years service and died at the age of 111; and John Mowry, Iowa Society, who was an FBI Agent assigned to the Lindberg kidnapping case.

SAR Military Records Still Sought

Compatriots will recall that the Spring 1996 Issue of The SAR Magazine featured a news story about the effort just launched to obtain data from SARs who at one time or another served in the United States Armed Forces, Merchant Marine or perhaps even under the flag of a foreign government.

Historian General Bruce B. Butler, D.D.S., sponser of this massive project, stated at the time that data received would be compiled into an "SAR Military Service Archives" for maintenance at National Headquarters (what a rich source of information for future researchers!).

He reports that the response has been excellent, but that there are probably still thousands vet to be received. HAVE YOU SENT YOURS? If not - then refer back to page 20 of the Spring Issue, fill in the form's details and mail to him at 3206 Napoleon Avenue, New Orleans, LA 70126-5122. A response by September 15 will be most helpful.

Historian General Butler states that the first form came from Illinois Society Compatriot Clarence H. Vittitoe, who served as a Marine in World War II and Korea. Since then, hundreds of others have been received from 46 states and the District of Columbia. None reflected duty in WWI; the majority showed duty in WWII, Korea and Vietnam. All branches of the service are included. Ranks attained range from private and seaman to general and admiral, with the highest possessed by Lt. Gen. Herman Nickerson, USMC (Ret)., now a resident of North Carolina.

Singled out for special kudos is Jack Carmichael, Secretary of the Indiana Society's Continental Chapter. He sent photocopies of the form to every member for completion. At last report, he had received over 20 for forwarding to the Historian General.

Compatriot Butler emphasizes that it is important to enclose a copy of your Separation Papers (DD214).

Supportive of the Chapter's work on the National History Standards, he discussed his views on this issue. Presenting him with the Silver Good Citizenship Medal was Awards Chairman Paul M. Frantz.

General Thomas Sumter Chapter SARs Proud Of Efforts To Honor Patriots

The South Carolina Society's General Thomas Sumter Chapter is encouraging Compatriots visiting the Camden area to make a stop at the historic Presbyterian Burial Grounds. There they will see impressive memorials recognizing Patriots interred there.

One area is devoted to markers identifying Patriots of the Old Camden District. The first one was unveiled in 1994 by United States Senator Strom Thurmond, a member of the South Carolina Society; 20 such stones are now in place. Those of upright marble designate men who died during the Revolutionary War, while flat ones point out those who died following the conflict.

In addition to the individual markers is a large monument that is embedded in the ground adjacent to a flag pole. It bears the inscription: "Dedicated to the Revolutionary War Patriots buried on this site who lie in graves some known and others known only to God." Listed by name and military unit are five South Carolina Militiamen executed at Camden, 13 Continentals from various colonies killed in action in Kershaw County and 11 Camden Patriots who served in the South Carolina Militia, Continental Line or Rangers.

A handsome bronze plaque, erected by the Chapter, states: "This memorial is dedicated to American Revolutionary War heroes who were Patriots of the Old Camden District. Markers are for Patriots buried in graves known and unknown. Patriots in marked graves in Quaker Cemetery are: Surgeon Isaac Alexander, Surgeon James Martin, Capt. Benjamin Carter, Lt. Joseph Brevard, and Privates

Thomas Ballard, Samuel Mathis, Archelaus Watkins. Many Patriots were executed in Camden during 1780-1781." Those known appear on the monument. Hundreds of Patriots from Delaware, Maryland, North Carolina and Virginia died in Kershaw County in "The Battle of Camden" August 16, 1780, and "Hobkirk Hill" April 25, 1781. Enlisted soldiers killed in battle were left upon the fields and are buried in graves known only to God.

Placed strategically about the grounds are SAR emblems, while at the entrance walkway is a stone with the inscription "The American Revolutionary War 1775-1783." The Betsy Ross Flag flies atop the flagpole. Plans call for erecting a brick wall.

The Burial Grounds is easily accessible. Exit I-20 at US 521 to enter Camden. In less than two miles turn left on Meeting Street opposite "Historic Camden." Travel one block.

Battle of Guilford Courthouse Commemorated By State Societies

To the ancient tunes of the American Revolution - played by a five-member fife and drum corps – a processional made up of a polished color guard, SAR and DAR units and uniformed flagbearers marched on March 15th to the equestrian statue of General Nathanael Greene at the site of the Battle of Guilford Courthouse. Their purpose was to mark this significant engagement's 215th anniversary near Greensboro, North Carolina. Sponsoring the event was the North Carolina Society.

Preceding the solemn wreath laying ceremony, artillery salutes were fired by uniformed Guilford Militiamen using sixpounder cannons located at the three American Battle-lines along which similar monuments are placed honoring the Delaware, Maryland and Virginia Continentals and the militiamen of North Carolina and Virginia to the locations of their engagements with Lord Cornwallis' Regiments and Lt. Col. Banastre Tarlton's Cavalry Legion. Salutes by the sixpounders were fired at ten-minute intervals from 12:30p.m. to 3:30p.m., reverberating throughout the Guilford Courthouse Battlefield National Park.

Battle Led To End Of War

The Battle of Guilford Courthouse was fought on March 15, 1781. It was one of

the most significant battles of the Revolutionary War leading, along with the battles at Kings Mountain and Cowpens, to the end of the Southern Campaign of the South. The commanding general of the 4,143 American force was General Nathanael Greene of Rhode Island. The British Forces under Lord Cornwallis totaled 1,376, which included the dreaded cavalry Legion.

The American Army made a stubborn stand against the invading well-trained British units for two hours of intense fighting, with Greene then retreating with his force intact. Greene's tactical retreat was part of a strategy which had been devised by Washington early in the Revolution to avoid further action which might bring about a full, massive defeat. Companion parts of the general defensive strategy was to run before the enemy while employing harrassing tactics and, in a static situation, to have defense in depth in which successive lines of riflemen fired and then withdrew. The whole strategy in the preceding months had been employed successfully by Greene and Daniel Morgan, pulling Corwallis farther from his supply bases and crippling his Loyalist forces at Kings Mountain and his regulars at Cowpens.

Heavy Cost To The British

For the British, Guilford Courthouse was a pyrrhic victory. They won the field, but at a cost of casualties amounting to onefourth of their force. Conversely, Greene lost only six percent of his army.

Cornwallis reached his supply ships at Wilmington, but feeling unsafe, moved northward into Virginia where on October 19, 1781 he surrendered to General George Washington at Yorktown. Historians agree: "The victory was won at Guilford, but the surrender was at Yorktown."

Four SAR Chapters presented wreaths: The Nathanael Greene Chapter, host for the event - President Hollis B. Cahoon honored General Nathanael Greene; The Alamance Battleground Chapter - President Robert B. Day honored the Orange County NC Militia; Dan River Chapter (VA) - Past President Larry Aaron honored Col. William Washington's Dragoons; The Fincastle Resolutions Chapter (VA) -Cranston Williams, Jr. honored "Light Horse Harry" Lee's Legion.

Pearce, Jr., Registrar, also honored General Greene; Rachel Caldwell Chapter - Ms. Mary Katherine Nicholson, Regent, honored the women Patriots of Guilford; The Battle of Alamance Chapter, Regent, Mrs. Charles E. Page, honored the American Cavalry; and the West Virginia Society - Mrs. John Kauff honored the Williams' Delaware and Maryland Brigade.

By Way Of Background

On February 13, 1911, the Congress of the United States passed an act "To pro-

vide for the erection of a monument to commemorate the battle of Guilford Courthouse. North Carolina and in memory of Major-General Nathanael Greene and the officers and soldiers of the Continental Army who participated with him in the battle..." The commission awarded the contract to Francis H. Packer, a student of Augustus Saint-Gaudens, the American realist. The present monument of General Greene was unveiled on July 3, 1915.

Guilford Courthouse was the first Revolutionary Battlefield recognized as a National Military Park. On March 2, 1917, the Congress established "...a national military park at the battlefield of Guilford Courthouse." Initially, the Secretary of War supervised and directed the affairs of the park. The Executive order of July 29, 1933, transferred the 220 acre park from the War Department to the Department of the Interior.

The Minutes presented here are condensed and edited, with items marked (*) appearing elsewhere in this issue of the magazine. Full Minutes are available from Executive Director Robert A. Lentz.

1995-96 TRUSTEES MEETING - Sunday, June 9,1996

The meeting was called to order at 9 a.m. by President General William C. Gist, Jr. The Invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

The Minutes of the Spring Trustees Meeting were approved as written and published. Reporting for the Executive Committee, Secretary General Reon G. Hillegass, referred to the following actions: (1) The Treasurer General be appointed Administrator of the Life Membership Fund: (2) Directed that the NSSAR Handbook include the 1966 letter approving the NSSAR as a 501(c) (3) Organization and the letter that acknowledges donations of \$250 or more; (3) Establish a Society in Ireland provided the necessary 15 members are obtained; (4)

Proposed that the 106th Annual Congress ratify, confirm and approve the use of Treasury Bills, Notes or Bank CD's in the Permanent Fund as collateral for a bank loan in the amount up to \$85,000 on terms to be negotiated by the Society to purchase properties. As an alternative, funds to purchase the properties would be withdrawn from the Permanent Fund; (5) Proposed that the 106th Congress ratify, confirm and approve the purchase of the Borowitz/Clay properties under the options to purchase approved by the Trustees at their Fall Meeting; (6) Motion that the NSSAR affiliate with the NCPO was defeated.

The Board of Trustees of the SAR Patriotic and Educational Foundation presented the names of new members of the Board for approval: Frank A. Gibson, CPA; Robert B. Vance, FPG; and William C. Gist, Jr., FPG. On motion made and seconded, they were approved.

With no further business at hand, the meeting was adjourned.

OPENING GENERAL SESSION - Monday, June 10, 1996

The Session was called to order at 9 a.m. by President General William C. Gist. The Colors were presented by the SAR Combined Color Guard. The Invocation, given by Chaplain General Rev. Earl-Clayton Grandstaff, was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag led by Secretary General Reon G. Hillegass, Jr. The singing of the "Star-Spangled Banner" was led by FPG Charles F. Printz and accompanied by the 323rd Army Band.

On motion made and seconded, it was voted that the Minutes of the 105th Annual Congress by approved as published.

FPG George H. Brandau reported that he is continuing to work on establishing the lineage of Bernardo de Galvez. On a recent trip to Spain he obtained new documentation which needs to be translated.

The reports of Committee Chairmen were submitted prior to the Congress and distributed to attendees. Pertinent remarks follow.

Merchandise Committee Chairman Raymond N. Zimmerman reported that Miniatures of medals awarded to men and women are now available.

Budget Committee Chairman Edward S. Hoyt presented the revised budget for 1996-97 and the budget for 1997-98. On motion made and seconded, it was voted to approve the 1996-97 revised budget of \$636,900. On motion made and seconded, it was voted to approve the 1997-98 budget of \$649.800.

On motion made by Compatriot McClanahan and seconded it was voted that the 106th Congress ratifies, confirms and approves purchase of the properties under the options to purchase approved by the Trustees at the September 30, 1995 meeting. On motion by Compatriot McClanahan and seconded, it was voted to approve the use of Treasury Bills, Notes or Bank CD's in the

Permanent Fund as collateral for a bank loan in the amount up to \$85,000 on terms to be negotiated by the Society. Westlake and seconded, it was voted the 106th Congress authorize the allocation of Special Funds up to \$85,000 to purchase the properties. SECOND GENERAL SESSION - Tuesday, June 11, 1996

The Session was called to order by President General William C. Gist at 9 a.m. The Invocation, given by Chaplain General Grandstaff, was followed by the Pledge of Alleoiance to the Flao.

Bylaws Committee Chairman Edward Overton Cailleteau presented the following Bylaw Amendments for consideration:

1. BYLAW NO. 21, SECTION 4 - FUND MANAGEMENT -

On motion made and seconded, it was voted to amend Bylaw 21, Section 4, by deleting the Section in its entirety and inserting the following in lieu hereof: "There shall be a fund entitled 'The Youth Life Membership Fund' (hereinafter called 'The Fund'). The Fund shall be generated by payments made by applicants for Youth Life Membership. The Fund shall be administered by the Investment Committee in accordance with the provisions of Section 1(b) and 2(b) of this Bylaw, subject to the following provisions: (a) The Membership Fee and subsequent investment income from all Youth Life Memberships shall be pooled with the National Life Membership Fund for accounting and investment purposes. (b) When a Youth Life Member attains the age of eighteen (18) years, he shall become a regular adult life member under Bylaw No. 21, Section 3, the Ray Henshaw National Life Membership Fund. His National Society dues shall thenceforth be paid from the National Life Membership Fund provided, as with any other member, he complies with the provisions of Bylaw No. 21, Section 3, including maintaining active membership in a State Society."

2. BYLAW NO. 28 - LADIES AUXILIARIES -

On motion made and seconded, it was voted to adopt the amended Bylaws by inserting a new Bylaw No. 28 (re-numbering the succeeding Bylaw), to read as follows:

"Section 1. Each State Society and Chapter shall be authorized to allow the formation of a related ladies auxiliary which shall be named 'Ladies Auxiliary of the (Name of State Society or Chapter) Society (Chapter) of the Sons of the American Revolution." Each State Society or Chapter ladies auxiliary shall have its own charter and bylaws. Membership in a ladies auxiliary shall be open to women who are related by marriage or blood line to members in good standing of SAR." "Section 2. All costs of operation of a ladies auxiliary

organized in accordance herewith shall be borne by the

membership of that ladies auxiliary."

"Section 3. A ladies auxiliary shall provide assistance to the State Society or the Chapter to which it is auxiliary to further the patriotic, historical and educational objectives and purposes of the National Society. A ladies auxiliary may hold meetings in accordance with the schedule of the State Society or Chapter in which it is auxiliary."

3. BYLAW NO. 5, - VICE PRESIDENTS GENERAL -

On motion made and seconded, it was voted not to adopt the proposed change to Bylaw 5, by adding a new Section 3. Motion failed.

SAR Christmas Ornament Offered






