

Productive Annual Congress Held In Chicago

When the gavel was lowered to signal conclusion of the 113th Annual Congress held in Chicago during early July, the nearly 400 Compatriots and guests on hand whole-heartedly agreed that the Illinois Society had done a commendable job of handling a myriad of details. Largely responsible for seeing that business and social activities moved along smoothly was Joseph E. Smith, who served as Chairman of the Host Society Congress Planning Committee. He was backed by Maryland Compatriot Barrett L. McKown, Chairman of the National Society Congress Planning Committee.

Elected our new President General was Raymond G. Musgrave, a member of the

West Virginia Society who previously had been Secretary General. Note the special news story on page 11 about him as based on an interview conducted at the Congress by California Compatriot Marston Watson. All of the selections of the Nominating Committee, except one, were also elected—as reported elsewhere in this issue of the magazine. The post of Historian General was contested, with Maryland Compatriot Bruce A. Wilcox being elected by secret ballot.

The new PG named the following to the Executive Committee: former President General B. Rice Aston, TX; Walter F. Baker, NM; Charles R. Lampman, CA; J. Philip London, DC; and Robert W. Proctor, MA. He also has announced membership of National Committees as shown beginning on page 20.

All of the key Congress programs, except the traditional Memorial Service on Sunday, were staged in the elegant Hyatt Regency Hotel in the heart of the city. Photos accompanying this news story portray many of the meeting's highlights. Added news and actions of special interest to the broad membership follow.

Opening Business Session Monday, July 7th

Prior to the opening of the Congress on Monday in a cavernous room in the Hyatt, attendees and guests were treated to a rousing band concert by members of the U.S. Navy Band stationed at Great Lakes Training Center north of Chicago. This set the scene for the entry of General Officers, National Trustees and several dignitaries marching behind the National Society Color Guard consisting of over 50 Compatriots from State Societies across the nation. Addresses of welcome were given by representatives of the SAR and DAR in Illinois. These were followed by greetings from Mrs. Paul M. Niebell, Sr., Honorary Senior

Committee Reports Made

After reports of the General Officers and Vice-Presidents General had been given, Committee Chairmen gave theirs. Selected ones are summarized here.

Several Resolutions were approved as introduced by Charles W. Britton, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, as follows:

 Urge the Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services to include written questions in its citizenship test on our common civic culture, the founding of our country and our history and the ability to communicate in the English language, and that the test include written questions concerning the rights, duties and responsibilities of citizenship, especially those duties set out in the Oath of Allegiance including the oath of sole loyalty to the United States, the oath to support and defend the Constitution of the United States, and the oath to bear arms to protect the United States when called upon to do so. The Resolution also resolved that a

copy be delivered to the President and Vice President of the United States, and to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

• Convey to President George W. Bush their (the NSSAR) affection, admiration and gratitude for having served so well and wish him Godspeed in his efforts to bring peace to America and freedom and opportunity to the people of Afghanistan and the Middle East. The Resolution also resolved that the President General deliver the Resolution to President Bush.


 Convey to (British) Prime Minister Tony Blair their (the NSSAR) affection, respect and gratitude which he has so justly earned. The Resolution also resolved that the President General deliver the Resolution to PM Blair.

• Urge the Congress of the United States to pass legislation that would establish

English as the official language of this nation. The Resolution also resolved that copies of it be circulated by NSSAR Compatriots to members of the House of Representatives and members of the United States Senate in their respective districts and states.

• Call on Congress to pass legislation authorizing the National Park Service to establish a program to observe the 225th anniversary of the American Revolution and to authorize and appropriate sufficient funds to support the NPS program. The Resolution also resolved that a copy of it be sent to Compatriot President George W. Bush and to the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives with a request that it be distributed to each member of Congress. Since this action was taken, President General Raymond G. Musgrave has appointed a special National Committee

Congress Delegates Boost Applications Fees

Upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and concurrence of the Budget Committee, delegates to the 113th Annual Congress in Chicago voted to increase Membership Application Fees effective with the 2004 membership year.

During a discussion of this important move, which was done in accordance with National Society Bylaw 19, it was reported that a study of the actual cost of processing applications had been conducted in 2001. It revealed that fees only covered a portion of the processing cost, thus creating the need to subsidize them from other funds. The fees increase will avoid this problem.

The new fees, as reported below, will be effective November 1, 2003 for applications submitted on or after that date. The fee for supplementals is effective January 1, 2004.

Changes Made In Bylaws

Bylaws Chairman Edward Overton Cailleateau introduced proposals to change the National Society Bylaws. These had been approved by the National Trustees at their Spring 2003 meeting and voted that they be sent to the Annual Congress for con-

- · One amends Bylaw 19 that, in effect, sets the date when dues shall be paid by a State Society to the National Society and how such payment shall be calculated.
- The other amends Bylaw 18, Section 1(a) by deleting Paragraphs 2 and 3 in their entirety.

Report By The Registrar General

Registrar General Roland G. Downing reported that the total membership at the end of 2002 was a record 27,743. As of just before the Congress, this figure stood at 25,998 because of drops/reinstatements and added new members. He praised local leaders (in particular, Registrars, Genealogists and Recruiters) who are making it possible for the SAR to grow while other similar organizations are losing members. He reported that "Census of Qualified Prospects" forms are to be automatically sent to new members as they join; their replies will be added to the existing National Prospect Database at Headquarters, while contact information will be distributed to Chapters for recruiting. He stated that a new Youth Membership Pamphlet has been prepared and is accessible on the NSSAR web site. Additionally, a new universal membership application form for all categories of membership has been created; the old forms are still acceptable.

New Avenues for Membership

Dr. Ralph D. Nelson, Chairman of the

International Development Council, reported that the Germany Society has transcribed a roster of the troops who were recruited from the German-speaking states and fought at Yorktown as part of the French Expeditionary Force. The Germany Society plans to publicize this list in Germany and the United States to attract descendants who are eligible to join the SAR. He also reported that in February 2003 the Genealogy Committee, Executive Committee and the Trustees approved guidelines for patriotic service in New Spain (the Southwest U.S., California and Mexico). These include (after the formal declaration of war by Spain against England) any member of the army or navy of Spain or militia or "donativo", providing they were stationed in New Spain.

Delegates Resolve To Mark War Events

Delegates assembled in Chicago for the 113th National Congress unanimously approved a resolution calling on the United States Congress to task the National Park Service with establishing a commemorative program to observe the 225th anniversary of the American Revolution. The resolution also says Congress should provide the funds the NPS will need to carry out the project.

As luck would have it, there is identical legislation pending in both houses of Congress that, if passed, will accomplish this SAR legislative mandate. The Senate bill is sponsored by Hillary Clinton of New York and John Warner of Virginia. Principle sponsors of the House measure are Maurice Hinchey of New York and Jo Ann Davis of Virginia.

Compatriots are asked to contact each member of their congressional delegation and urge him or her to co-sponsor these important pieces of legislation. The 225th anniversary period actually began in October 1999 with the 225th anniversary of the Battle of Point Pleasant and will continue through September 2008 when we observe the 225th anniversary of the signing of the peace treaty in Paris, France.

In addition to this congressional initiative, President General Raymond G. Musgrave has appointed a special committee to help guide the State Societies and Chapters through the remaining 225th anniversaries associated with the American Revolution.

For example, next year we have the 225th anniversary of major battles at Kettle Creek, GA; Vincennes, IN; Stony Point, NY; Paulus Hook, NJ; the Battle of Flamborough Head (the Bonhomme Richard under John Paul Jones vs. Serapis); the coldest winter of the war at Basking Ridge near Morristown, NJ; and a few other events of note.

The committee will hold its first formal meeting during the Fall Trustees Meeting in Louisville at the end of September. It draws its members from a wide range of expertise within the Society to include members of the color guard, writers, historians, reenactors, and Compatriots with broad experience in working with Congress and the National Park Service.

Robert L. "Bob" Bowen of Virginia will chair the committee. Others include SAR Magazine Editor Win Williams (WI); Headquarters Dispatch Editor Don Moran (CA); Historic Celebrations Committee Chairman Les Foster (MD); Flag Committee Chairman Walter Baker (NM); Newsletters and Periodicals Committee Chairman George Thurmond (GA); CASSAR Trustee Chuck Lampman; NCSSAR Vice President Joe Harris; Winchell (Win) Carroll (PA), Historic Celebrations Committee; Dennis Marr (NY), National Park Service Committee: John Sauer (WV), Color Guard Committee; and Vice-President General Andrew Johnson (DC), Government Relations and SAR-W3R Committees.

Library Launches Unique Web Site

On Memorial Day of this year the Library of Congress launched a new web site called Courage, Patriotism, Community featuring three presentations: Experiencing War, Stories from the Veterans History Project; Patriotic Melodies, Selections from "I Hear America Singing"; and Community Roots, Selections from the Local Legacies Project. The site is accessible at www.loc.gov/courage.

Experiencing War (www.loc.gov/warstories) features selected stories from the Library's Veterans History Project in the American Folklife Center. Created by an Act of Congress in 2000, the project provides veterans and the civilians who supported them the opportunity to record for posterity their wartime experiences. These poignant accounts, told through video, audio and written personal accounts from 21 veterans and civilians, also include photos, diaries and scrapbooks. This initial release will be followed by many more from the 7,000 collections received to date. Encompassed are materials relating to World Wars I and II and the Korean, Vietnam and Persian Gulf Wars.

Patriotic Melodies (www.loc.gov/patrioticmusic) features some of the nation's most beloved patriotic tunes as well as the story behind the creation of each. The 26 initial selections include "The Star-Bangled Banner", "America", "Anchors Aweigh", and "Yankee Doodle Boy."

Community Roots (www.loc.gov/folklife/roots) documents America's local festivals, community events and other grassroots activity. One local tradition has been selected to represent each state, the District of Columbia, the territories and trusts. For example, included is Buccaneer Days in Texas, which celebrates a time in history when pirate ships sailed the Gulf waters.

Six New Minutemen Recognized At Congress

In 1951 the Minuteman Award was created to salute Compatriots who have given outstanding service of an exceptional nature to the **National Society**. A maximum of six may be offered each year, with those recognized at the 113th Annual Congress reported in this news story.

The first awards were presented at the Annual Congress in 1952, with former President General Benjamin H. Powell receiving the initial one. Since then 308 Compatriots have been so honored, including those in Chicago in July. In addition to a handsome certificate, the award consists of a sterling silver medal which bears the likeness of a Revolutionary War Minuteman.

Here are those honored this year (the positions indicated were held as of or previous to the Congress):

Charles F. Bragg – Indiana Society. Compatriot Bragg was admitted to the SAR in 1991 and has since served as National Trustee of the Indiana Society and Vice-President General for the Central District. He has served on numerous Committees, including as Chairman of the Membership, Library Task Force and Library Fund Drive Committees, and as a member of Americanism, Genealogy, Long Range Planning and George Washington Endowment Funds Board. He organized two new Chapters in Indiana and has been first line signer on 114 Membership Applications.

Edward Overton Cailleteau – Louisiana Society. Admitted to the SAR in 1968, Compatriot Cailleteau has served as National Trustee for the Alaska and Hawaii Societies and as Vice-President General for the Southern District. He has been a member of the Bylaws Committee

for 17 years, 10 of those as Chairman. He has also seen extensive involvement in the C.A.R., Congress Planning and Resolutions Committees. His SAR experience encompasses the formation of two new Chapters in Louisiana.

Thomas Fisher Craft, Jr., Ph.D., – Georgia Society. – Compatriot Craft was admitted to the SAR in 1991 and has been National Trustee of the Georgia and Switzerland Societies and Vice-President General for the Southern District. His extensive service includes membership on 19 Committees, a number of them as Chairman, Co-Chairman or Vice-Chairman. Committee assignments vary from the George Washington Endowment Funds Distribution and GWEF Fund Raising to Music. He helped organize two Georgia Society Chapters and has been the first line signer of 37 Membership Applications.

Meet Your President General: Raymond G. Musgrave

If there is one word that could describe how the 100th President General, **Raymond Gerald Musgrave**, feels about his life, it might be *pride*.

He is proud of his accomplishments in a law practice that was started by his grandfather. One of ten children in a coal town in Mason County, West Virginia, grandfather Frederick Gerald Musgrave completed only the 8th grade but eventually graduated from the West Virginia College of Law in 1901 and started a practice in Point Pleasant, West Virginia. His son Raymond Frederick Musgrave, Ray's father, opened a law practice in Mullins, West Virginia, which he later moved to Winfield, West Virginia. There, he practiced law and was elected to West Virginia State Senate. Afterwards, Ray's grandfather and father formed their law partnership in Point Pleasant as Musgrave and Musgrave, which this President General has carried on for the last thirty-nine years. Ray's brother, Compatriot John Musgrave, is the lottery director in West Virginia who once paid out a record \$137 million dollars to a lottery winner.

Like many young men in his day, Ray graduated from high school and matriculated at West Virginia University. Not ready for the rigors of a college education, Ray soon found himself in construction with his uncle at Cape Canaveral, Florida. A year later he entered the University of Charleston where he received his undergraduate degree in clin-

ical psychology. He graduated in 1964 from the West Virginia College of Law and became a third-generation member of his grandfather's and father's law practice.

Ray is proud of his accomplishments as a trial lawyer and as Proctor in admiralty law. He has been a defense attorney in a number of capital cases, argued cases before the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals and appeared before the United States Supreme Court.

Pride in Ray's family was evidenced by their presence at his installation during the 113th National Congress in Chicago. His son by a previous marriage, **Matthew Gerald** Musgrave, holds a highly responsible position at Charleston in the new Department of Homeland Security and is married to Lisa. They have Ray's grandson Ian (age 7) and granddaughter Leigh (age 5).

There is a romantic story to be told as well. In 1973, a stunningly beautiful and fashionable model from Houston, Texas brought her family's legal business to the Musgrave law office at Point Pleasant. Heads turned and hearts fluttered that day when Twila (Blair) Kerr Jordan walked in the door. Not wanting to rush things, Ray and Twila spent the next eighteen years cultivating their friendship and eventually developing a courtship, which led to their marriage in 1991. Twila's two sons by a previous marriage are Richard Jordan and Andrew Jordan, who respectively are parents of their six grandchildren.

Ray's pride in his country and the Sons of the American Revolution is evidenced by his early involvement in the Children of the American Revolution, and later in his dedication at the chapter, state and national levels of the SAR. He co-founded the Point Pleasant Chapter in 1994 and has served the National Society as Chancellor General, Secretary General and now as President General. There is no doubt that he hopes to instill that same sense of pride in those who want to join him in advancing America's heritage, invite others to join this Society and promote Americanism in the far corners of this country.

MATTHEW B. SELLERS III PRESIDENT GENERAL 1976-1977


Matthew B. Sellers, a member of the Florida Society, was elected President General during the Annual Congress held in 1976 in Philadelphia – fittingly to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. It was during his term that the replica of the Liberty Bell was purchased and is now on display at our Society's National Headquarters in Louisville. For several years the bell toured about the country under the guidance of Minnesota Compatriot Joseph Head. He presented countless lectures about the historic artifact to a wide range of audiences, with emphasis on school children.

It was also during his tenure as President General that the National Headquarters in Washington, DC was sold to the Ivory Coast for use as their Embassy, followed by a move to an office building in Alexandria, Virginia until a new location could be found. An extensive search concluded with acquisition of the present facility in Louisville.

Prior to becoming PG, Compatriot Sellers had held a variety of posts at the national level, including that of Genealogist General and National Trustee of the Florida Society. At the state level he served as President of the Fort Lauderdale Chapter (1971-72) and as Treasurer, Senior Vice President and President of his Society. While he was President, the Society hosted the 83rd Annual Congress in Palm Beach.

Compatriot Sellers was the proud recipient of numerous medals, including Minuteman; Patriot; Gold, Silver and Bronze Good Citizenship; and War Service. His memberships included the Society of the Cincinnati, Colonial Wars, Sons of the Revolution, Washington Family Descendants and Magna Charta. He also was an active Mason.

Born in New York City in 1919, he attended Lehigh University and was graduated from Franklin and Marshall College with a B.S. in Chemistry. He then joined the U.S. Navy prior to World War II and served on two destroyers, which operated with the Fast Carrier Task Force and participated in most of the battles in the South Pacific. He retired after the war



as a Commander with 14 battle stars on his Pacific Campaign Ribbon.

His professional career following military duty was varied. He was District Manager, Ohio Branch of Snow Crop Frozen Foods; Vice President and General Manager of Urban Laundry of Baltimore, Maryland; and Vice President and Secretary of Filterite Corporation of Maryland. After moving to Florida, he became a real estate broker – and managed to find time to be active in the Coral Ridge Yacht Club, where he held a number of officer positions, including that of Commodore.

PG Sellers was called to eternal rest on May 12th in Fort Lauderdale. He is survived by his second wife, Marilyn, two daughters and several grandchildren and great-grandchildren. His first wife, Gene, passed away in 1986.

Top Winners Of Youth Contests Saluted At 113th Annual Congress

The 5th Annual Youth Awards Luncheon, staged during the 113th Annual Congress in Chicago, honored five students who captured first place in as many National Society competitions. At age 18, he has over 12 years in Scouting, including Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Varsity Scouting. He has earned 34 Merit Badges, including American Heritage, Genealogy and Law. Aaron had been attending Colorado State University, majoring in Music Education.

Chosen as the Outstanding JROTC Cadet for 2003 was Cadet Captain Patrick Fourroux of Belaire High School in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He was originally sponsored by the General Philemon Thomas Chapter. It was reported that last year's winner, Cadet Lieutenant Colonel Jonathan Coward of Florida, will soon be heading to the United States Military Academy at West Point for four years of studies aimed at a career in the Army.

Wisconsin Society Dedicates Plaque Honoring Patriots Buried In State

April 19, the very anniversary of the Battle of Lexington and Concord in 1775, was the date selected this year by the Wisconsin Society to unveil and dedicate a bronze plaque honoring 40 Patriots buried in the state. The site was the Wisconsin Memorial Park Chapel located in the Milwaukee suburb of Brookfield.

Serving as Master of Ceremonies for the event was Past Society President Winston C. Williams, while the guest speaker was Robert F. Galer, Chairman of the National Society's Revolutionary War Graves Committee. A wide variety of other individuals and groups also participated, making the overall program a memorable one. These

Wisconsin; and members of the Patriots American Heritage Youth Organization of Waukegan, Illinois led by Compatriot Greg Bozarth.

The program, which lasted nearly two hours, was highlighted by the recitation of brief information about the life of each Patriot with emphasis on his Revolutionary War service. Interspersed between groups of such readings were items related to the occasion – from the reading of proclamations to special presentations to participants. The climax took place when the plaque was blessed in a moving ceremony staged by military veterans from both of the Indian Nations.

The search to locate Patriot burial sites by the Wisconsin Society began several decades ago. Over the past two years or so, an intensive effort was made to verify which of those actually saw service in the Revolution. The list was narrowed to 40; one was an Oneida, two were Stockbridge-Munsee. The Society has since published a booklet about the 40, including their service record and place of burial. This program was spearheaded by Compatriot Harold Kubertanz, who also was responsible for organizing and directing the dedication.

Utilizing an antique bell that came down through his family, Compatriot Roger Boeker rendered a single toll before each Patriot's background data was presented.





Old North Church Fund Campaign For Restoring Historic Windows

If you can hear the cheers of Paul Revere, Captain John Pulling and Robert Newman, then you already know about the Bush administration's reversal of a longstanding policy that now allows federal grants to be used to renovate churches and religious sites that are designated historic landmarks. What does this mean for the Old North Church and its *Adopt a Window* campaign?

The article on *Just Who Held the* Lanterns on April 18, 1775?, and the companion article on *Financial Aid Sought to* Restore Old North Windows (SAR Magazine, Winter 2003, 4-9), provide background material for this historic change.

Secretary Norton commented in news reports that the change "ends a double standard" and opens the way for religious institutions to apply for funds under the Save America's Treasure program. It is worth noting that a 1995 regulation upheld by the Justice Department under the Clinton administration let stand the policy of not providing grants to houses of worship with active congregations, even if the church buildings were designated landmarks. The Justice Department under the Bush administration reversed that policy, which it felt would end a discriminatory double standard that has been applied against religious prop-

Interior Secretary Gale A. Norton announced the award of a \$317,000 grant to the Old North Foundation of Boston, on behalf of Christ Church (historically known as Old North Church), which gives a significant boost to its nearly \$1 million renovation plans. Credit for preparing the Foundation's grant request goes to Cheryl P. Aldridge, former director of Program Development at Old North Church.

The first magazine article offers an interesting scenario on who really carried the lanterns up the steep church steps on that historic night. The details of the famous events of April 18 have been permanently etched in American history, which subsequently led to Old North Church's historic landmark designation and eventual creation of the Old North Foundation of Boston, a non-profit 501(c)(3) corporation. It is the Foundation's goal to solicit the funds to repair and restore the Church's historic windowpanes that are nearly 280 years old.

erties. Taxpayers already support the upkeep of 24 active churches on park properties across the country, including a chapel in Yosemite Park.

It is no surprise that the organization of Americans United for Separation of Church and State and its executive director, Rev. Barry W. Lynn, vehemently oppose this policy change as unconstitutional. They have already threatened to sue over this policy shift. However, a number of First Amendment experts agree that providing federal grants to preserve religious sites is constitutionally permissible.

Windows To Be Restored

The Old North Church vicar, Rev. Stephen T. Ayres, made it clear that none of the grant money would be used in the church's operations or normal maintenance program. In fact, he says, "We will only receive the \$317,000 grant as reimburse-

ment for what we spend on the window project. In this way, no grant money can or will be spent on anything else other than for this restoration." What is involved in this project?

Rev. Ayres stated that 42 windows, with 2,012 windowpanes, must be restored or replaced. Restoration specialists, armed with microscopes and modern technology, will look at how to match the original paint color, without the lead content of course. The newly hired executive director of the Old North Foundation of Boston, Elizabeth Kimmel, will oversee and coordinate much of this project.

The vicar anticipates that bids will go to appropriate contractors by the end of the year, with expectations that the project will last about 12 months. "We will have minimum interruption to our normal activities," says Rev. Ayres. "Parishioners, tourists and wedding couples will only notice one or two windows with boards in place of glass." However, the vicar reiterated that the Old North Foundation still needs another \$400,000 or more in contributions to complete the window restoration project, as well as set up an endowed maintenance account. He stated that these funds likely would have to come from individual donors.

How Best To Protect Historic Sites In Philadelphia Causes Wide Debate

Independence National Historical Park in Philadelphia is the center of an argument that rages around many well-known national monuments and important public buildings. Since 9/11 there has been increased concern about protecting these sites. Many feel that the reaction has been too strong and that increased security has led to a defacto victory for the terrorists.

On 9/11 the city had refused to close this block because of its importance to the economic viability to the Old City section. In its General Management Plan in the mid-1990s, INHP had proposed closing the block to clear the view of Independence Hall from the new Liberty Bell Pavilion of all modern clutter such as trucks, cars and buses.

and former Governor of Pennsylvania, Tom Ridge, asked the city to reconsider. Nevertheless, the block was opened as scheduled with a large public ceremony and celebration. The day before the opening INHP announced that it was planning to close Independence Hall indefinitely in order to adjust security plans. This action was widely interpreted as retaliation for the opening of the block. The reaction was so severe that the Hall was reopened a few days later.

In May the Superintendent of INHP, Mary Bomar, took our local Senators and Congressman on a tour of the current security facilities. A plan to surround the entire Park with an 8-foot-high fence – similar to

In December of 2002 the city agreed to close the block permanently based, in part, on a security evaluation funded by the Department of Interior. The decision led to a public outcry against it and general negative reaction to other security measures imposed by INHP without public input. A local group, "The Coalition to Free Chestnut Street," funded another study of the security plan at INHP which was presented to the Mayor in February. The study stated that the current security plan offered little or no protection for the historic sites and had appeared to be implemented to show that the Park had at least tried something to protect the buildings.

In March the Mayor reversed his decision and announced that the street would be opened again on April 1st. A few days before the opening Secretary of Homeland Security Interstates – was floated. The plan was rejected as being too extreme and was withdrawn. As recently as mid-June the Secretary of the Interior, Gale Norton, wrote to the Mayor asking him to reconsider his decision in view of the opening of the New National Constitution Center. All indications are that the city will remain adamant.

While the closing of Chestnut Street has

received the most public attention, there have been many complaints concerning the overall implementation of security at the Park, some of which the Park acknowledges are valid. It has become clear the heavy-handed security plans are going to be unacceptable to the public and that new, far more sophisticated – and expensive – systems will have to be developed.

Flag Protection Amendment Begins **Journey Through The 108th Congress**

Capitol Hill is not a visitor-friendly place these days. It used to be. But, that changed on September 11, 2001.

I was there that day to hear some testimony the National Commander of The American Legion had prepared to present to a joint session of the House and Senate Veterans Affairs Committees. The first attack on the World Trade Center occurred while we were moving from one House Office building to another. The second attack occurred while we were waiting to learn about the first attack. Then, a short while later, we could hear a muffled explosion coming from the southwest. That would be the Pentagon.

It was at that point that we were asked to move quickly, without running, and vacate the House Office Building we were in. Only later would we learn that a fourth plane was in the air, heading for the nation's capital. The passengers would eventually overpower the hijackers of that plane and bring it crashing to the ground in a field in western Pennsylvania.

All of that was brought home to me on June 3rd when I visited Capitol Hill for the final floor vote of HJRes-4, the Flag Protection Amendment, in the House of Representatives. The proposed 17-word amendment says, "The Congress shall have the power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States." An identically-worded piece of legislation is currently before the Senate. SJRes-4 has not yet been

Very Tight Security

In years past, visiting the Capitol was an exciting experience. Sure, there was security, but not like it is today.

To visit the House Gallery today, you enter a long white tent-like structure on the south side of the Capitol. A guard there checks to make sure you have a visitors pass signed by a lawmaker. When a sufficient number of "visitors" have arrived, they are taken to an adjacent white building where they go through a metal detector. Once cleared, they are told to exit that building and follow the path to the Capitol.

The experience is much like what cattle must feel in the stock yards. Only the smell is not the same. A series of temporary wooden ramps and pipe fences guide you around to the front of the Capitol and inside a small doorway. Once inside, you're on your own to follow the signs and find the Visitor's Gallery.

I arrived in the Gallery at about 1:30 that afternoon. The final vote on House Joint Resolution 4 (the Flag Protection Amendment) did not occur until after 5:30. In the interim, there was a series of procedural votes on other matters, and a debate and vote on having a final vote on the Flag Protection Amendment. When the dust

cleared from that debate and vote, more debate ensued on the actual bill, followed by the offering of a substitute. The substitute was debated and when it failed to gain the required supports, a final vote on the underlying bill was ordered. And, at 5:54, it was announced that HJR-4 had passed by a vote

Compatriot Hatch Sponsor In Senate

The Senate version of the Flag Protection Amendment had 57 sponsors when this was written (principle sponsor is Senator Orrin Hatch, Compatriot of Utah) and 56 co-sponsors. Senator Dianne Feinstein of California heads the list of co-sponsors.

The Flag Protection Amendment has cosponsor support or pledged support in both Houses of Congress from every state except Hawaii and Vermont, but when you toss the House out of the equation, support in the Senate comes from only 38 of the 50 states. The opposition includes Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington and Wisconsin. And that, despite all 50 state legislatures having passed memorializing resolutions calling on Congress to pass a proposed constitutional amendment to protect the flag and send it back to the states for further debate and ratification. It seems the farther some Senators get from their home states, the quicker they forget their constituency.

Final passage requires a 2/3rds vote in both Houses of Congress. The 300 votes received in the House were 10 more than was needed. In the Senate, the number of pledged supporters is 64, four more than is needed to cut off a filibuster, but three shy of the votes needed to pass a proposed constitutional amendment. Our Founding Fathers did not intend for amending the constitution to be easy. And, that is one reason there have been only 27 amendments.

Based on the numbers we've just reviewed, it doesn't take a rocket scientist to see that if we're going to be successful in the Senate, we need the support of three more Senators. Where will we get them?



The House Judiciary passed the Flag Protection Amendment on May 21, 2003 by the vote of 18-13 and forwarded it to the full House for its consideration. The House later voted favorably for the bill by a vote of 300-125.

Unfortunately, there are no Senators who say they are undecided. The 36 Senators listed as opponents include those who have voted against the amendment in the past and those who say they don't support the issue. The Senate did not vote on a Flag Amendment in the 107th Congress. As a result there are a few Senators who do not have a senate voting record on the issue. Senators in that category include Mark Pryor of Arkansas, Thomas Carper of Delaware, Hilary Clinton of New York, and Maria Cantwell of Washington.

Three of the senators who were seeking the Democratic presidential nomination when this was written have voted against the Flag Amendment in the past, but with 80% of the people in support of the flag protection initiative, we should ask them to reconsider their previous position. Put John Edwards of North Carolina, John Kerry of

Massachusetts, and Joseph Lieberman of Connecticut on that list.

Three of the Democratic presidential candidates support the Flag Amendment, Senator Bob Graham of Florida, Congressman Dennis Kvcinich of Ohio and Congressman Richard Gephardt of Missouri (although Gephardt did not vote on the issue this year).

The National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, passed a resolution in support of the flag protection issue at its 112th Annual Congress in Nashville last year. We are one of 144 patriotic, community, veterans, labor and like-minded organizations coalesced under the banner of the Citizens Flag Alliance. The CFA has only one mission: to gain passage of a proposed constitutional amendment to protect Old Glory. The author of this report is the SAR liaison with the CFA.

Purple Heart Stamp Issued

Mount Vernon - George Washington's historic estate in Virginia - was the setting in late May for a ceremony that saw the First Day of Issue of the Purple Heart Definitive Stamp staged by the United States Postal Service. This was an especially significant day for former President General Stewart Boone McCarty, who was in attendance as a recipient of the medal 53 years ago to the day while on duty in Korea as a member of the Marine Corps.

Participating were the U.S. Army Brass Quintet, the Armed Forces Color guard and John E. Potter, Postmaster General and CEO, United States Postal Service. Remarks were offered by Mrs. Robert E. Lee IV, Vice Regent for Maryland for the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association (which owns Mount Vernon); Congressman Tom Davis of Virginia; General Claude M. Kicklighter, Assistant Secretary for Policy, Planning and Preparation. Department of Veterans Affairs; and William A. Wroolie, National Commander, Military Order of the Purple Heart. In the audience were several hundred holders of the Purple Heart.

The Purple Heart is awarded in the name of the President of the United States to members of the U.S. Military who have been wounded or killed in action. It is the oldest military decoration in the world in current use and the first award made available to a common soldier.

By way of historical background, it should be noted that on August 7, 1782, during the Revolutionary War, General Washington issued an order that established a badge of distinction for meritorious action. The badge, which consisted of a heart made of purple cloth, is known to have been awarded to three sergeants from Connecticut regiments. Identified as the Badge of Military Merit, the award was distinctive because it was available to the lower ranks at a time when only officers were eligible for decoration in European armies.

After the Revolution, no more American soldiers received the Badge of Military Merit. In 1931 General Douglas MacArthur (a Compatriot), at the time Army Chief of Staff, furthered an effort to establish what became the Purple Heart Award - to be issued on the bicentennial of Washington's birth, February 12, 1932. It was decreed that recipients of the Meritorious Service Citation Certificate during World War I, along with other eligibles, could exchange their award for the Purple Heart.

President Truman retroactively extended eligibility to the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard to April 5, 1917 to cover World War I. Succeeding Presidents also made adjustments in the program to include certain conditions of eligibility. In 1958 Congress chartered the Military Order of the Purple Heart.

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

Treaty Facsimile At Club In London


In September of 1983 a large contingent of Compatriots and guests traveled to France and England to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Paris, which established "Firm and Perpetual Peace" between Great Britain and the United States

The treaty was drafted in the Round Room of Viscount Shelbourne's home off London's Berkeley Square; he later became the Marquess of Lansdowne and his residence became the private Lansdowne Club. The draft treaty was then sent to Paris where it was signed by the American Plenipotentiaries. A facsimile of the final page is on display at the Club, while Great Britain's original copy of the document is in the custody of the Public Record Office in

When the 1983 contingent visited the Club, they dedicated a plaque which commemorates the important event that took place there. Leading the group was President General Warren G. Hayes.

Former PG McCarty Visits Site

Earlier this year former President General Stewart Boone McCarty stayed at the Lansdowne Club (through a reciprocal arrangement with the Army/Navy Club in Washington, DC) while in London researching the history of World War II at the Imperial War Museum. He reports that the plaque is still on display and that he viewed the facsimile, which was produced and placed on the wall of the Round Room by the Club's Board Members.

The Old Mulkey Meeting House Historic Shrine in Tompkinsville, Kentucky was the site of an April program staged by Kentucky and Tennessee Compatriots to salute 21 Patriots who are either buried there or memorialized by special markers. Two were veterans of the War of 1812 while two served in the Civil War. So, as part of Memorial Day observances, several hundred people attended the program, as well as TV stations and newspapers. Over 50 flags decorated the site as bronze plaques were placed on all of the graves. Involved in the program were a firing squad, cannon squad, and two Color Guards. The SAR covered Patriot Wheat's Grave with a Betsy Ross Flag, and after folding it properly, passed it along to a Wheat family member, along with a binder with all of the records, programs, news releases, etc., concerning the project.

It looks like the ranks of the SAR and DAR will surge as a result of this project! The SAR currently has two Wheat members with five applications pending, and is working on six more. The DAR has eleven Wheat family members, three pending and two more in the works.

During the Revolution, the area was known as the Ramapo Clove (the Dutch word for pass), and helped to protect the blockhouse which was just to the east. First used by Native Americans and then by early settlers, this pass was one of the few ways settlers from "north of the mountains" could travel to conduct legal business.

The Chapter Color Guard led the procession which included SAR Color Guards from Georgia and North Carolina, the New Jersey Light Infantry, Guilford Courthouse Fife and Drum Corps, wreath and flag bearers from units of the SAR, DAR and C.A.R., and Colonial Dames of the XVII Century, George Thurmond, Vice Chairman, Southern Region Historic Sites and



Astronaut Byron Lichtenberg presented a program based on his two space shuttle missions to eager Compatriots of the Athens Chapter at a recent meeting. Dr. Lichtenberg, an Athens resident, participated in his first mission, SPACELAB 1, in 1983 aboard the shuttle Columbia. His second flight came in 1992 aboard the shuttle Atlantis. Dr. Lichtenberg explained how he prepared for each flight, the effect of zero gravity with the spacecraft, the details of viewing earth from space, and the sensation of reentering the earth's atmosphere. He previously served in the Air Force, where he flew combat missions in Vietnam, earning 10 air medals and two Distinguished Flying Crosses. He is currently a captain for a major airline, and is also a consultant to NASA. For his educational, historic and patriotic duty to his country, Dr. Lichtenberg was presented with the Silver Good Citizenship Medal.





Mark Grave Of Continental Surgeon

The National Society, assisted by the Fairfax Resolves Chapter of the Virginia Society, marked the grave of Dr. James Craik in mid-May at the Old Presbyterian Meeting House in Alexandria. He was the Chief Physician and Surgeon of the Continental Army and a close personal friend of General George Washington.

According to information sent to the magazine by Virginia Compatriot Robert E. Bowen, NSSAR Executive Director James N. Randall attended the ceremony and placed a wreath on behalf of the Society. Also presenting wreaths were James A. McCafferty, Vice-President General for the Mid-Atlantic District, and John Dickie, President-elect of the VASSAR.

The program was organized by VASSAR Vice President Larry McKinley. Past President Dr. John Sinks described the life and service of Dr. Craik during the Revolutionary War.

Compatriots will recall the news story that appeared in the Winter 2003 Issue of the magazine that reported the gift of a miniature portrait of Dr. Craik to the National Society Museum in Louisville by Kentucky

Compatriot and Mrs. James S. Craik; he is a direct descendant of the famed Patriot. The miniature was rendered by Charles Willson Peale and has been appraised by a professional to be valued at \$500,000.

After graduating from Medical School in Edinburgh, Dr. Craik came to America and settled in Virginia in 1750. Some sources claim that he was commissioned a surgeon in Col. Joshua Fry's command, which Major George Washington commanded after Fry's death in 1754. Both Craik and Washington took part in General Braddock's ill-fated attempt to subdue both the French and their Indian allies in the summer of 1755. From then on Washington appears to have increasingly relied on Dr. Craik as his personal physician.

During the Revolutionary War, Dr. Craik served in the medical department. He was present at the surrender of Cornwallis in 1781. After the conflict, he moved to Alexandria, Virginia at Washington's request. He was called when Washington became seriously ill and died in 1799. His grandson, the Rev. James Craik, came to Louisville, Kentucky in 1844.

contributions of American Indian patriots, which have been ignored for too long.

"Unfortunately, the article also perpetuates the myth that American Indians in general, and the Oneida in particular, were "removed" from the eastern United States in the 19th century. Although some Oneida Indians did indeed relocate to Wisconsin and Canada, many remained on their ancestral homelands in Central New York, where their descendants form a thriving community today. In 2002, the Oneida Indian Naiton, located in Upstate New York, has its own government and its own economic base in the same place where our ancestors decided 225 years ago to cast their lot with the American colonists.

"The Oneida people are proud of their place as America's first allies. We are active participants in ceremonies marking the anniversary of the Battle of Oriskany and we are partners with Fort Stanwix National Monument, where some of our ancestors are

buried in the same grave with other patriots at the Tomb of the Unknown Revolutionary War Soldiers. In fact, our Members and our employees have formed a Revolutionary War re-enactors group, of which I am a part, to demonstrate the interactions among American militia and Oneida warriors during this critical period of history.

"I invite you and the author to visit the Oneida Indian Nation in New York, so you can experience for yourself both the rich history and the vibrant present of our ancestral

Huge Family Files Free On Internet

Progeny Software, a Nova Scotia, Canada-based firm that produces CDs for sale by the NSSAR, has announced a free genealogy web site for searching one of the world's largest collection of family trees.

According to Progeny President Bob Thomas, Internet searchers can simply type in the name of a family member in the search field and find every mention of that name in the database. People can quickly see if the collection contains their ancestors before they decide to purchase the records on CD.

These 55-million genealogy records have been submitted by people worldwide to The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. These unedited family tree files are compiled and published by the Church in a growing collection of CDs called Pedigree Resource File (PRF), with over 1,000 new family trees added each month. While the Church also publishes these records online, www.findyourfamilytree.com is a web site solely dedicated to promoting the PRF collection.

"All 55-million names are lineagelinked," Thomas emphasizes. "If you find one ancestor, changes are you'll find hundreds, possibly thousands from that branch of your family tree."

Along with the individual's name, the online search directory also reports life events (with dates and place names), parents, and contact information about the submitter. With this information, the researcher can decide whether to purchase the PRF CD.
