Winston-Salem, NC - The Massed Color Guard of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution once again provided a colorful focal point during the 121st Annual Congress.

Under the command of National Color Guard Commander Joe Dooley (VA), nearly seventy-five members from across the nation participated in the events of Congress.

The Color Guard began the week's events by presenting colors at the Winston-Salem Dash baseball game on Friday night.

The main event for the Color Guard was the annual inspection by the President General on Sunday. President General David Sympson (KY) inspected the Color Guard in the lobby of the Embassy Suites.

Following the inspection, the Color

Guard moved outside to form up for the two block parade to First Baptist Church, Winston-Salem where the annual Memorial Service was conducted.

Leading the parade was President General David Sympson flanked by Commander Joe Dooley, Vice Commander Mike Tomme (GA) and Adjutant Mike Ratcliff (TX).

Within the church, the Color Guard provided an impressive display for the gathered worshippers with color bearers carrying nearly every state flag ringed the sanctuary while the honor guard and militia marched down the center aisle. Following the service, the Color Guard retired the colors and then gathered on the front steps of the church for photographs.

The Color Guard also presented colors at the initial Congress business session, at the Tuesday night banquet and retired the colors at the conclusion of the General Officer's Installation banquet at the close of the Congress.

## Vigil held in Honor of General George Washington

Mount Vernon, VA - On Constitution Day, the NSSAR held a noon to midnight candle light vigil to honor George Washington at his tomb located at Mount Vernon.

Color Guard members from ten states and guest s gathered early Saturday morning in preparation for the event in a field just north of Washington's home. After orders of the day were read, a special vintage candle lantern was presented to NSSAR Treasurer General Joe Dooley (VA) for his leadership as a steering committee member in helping make this special vigil happen.

At noon, shift captains posted the first two state color guardsmen as hundreds of guests to Mount Vernon visited Washington's tomb that day.

The vigil had its roots some twelve months ago when members of the Great Lakes District began discussing the possibilities of a such an event in honor of our first president. Soon after, National Color Guard Commander Mike Tomme sanctioned the vigil as a national color guard event.

Representing their respective state Color Guards were Russ and Thomas Buhr, brothers from the Wisconsin Society, N Walker Chewning and M Bruce Maney of the Georgia Society, William Sharp of the Indiana Society, Allen Brahin of the North Carolina Society, David Embrey of the Maryland Society, Steve Perkins of the Massachusetts Society, Joe Dooley of the Virginia Society, and Gerald Burkland, Bill Vette, Joe Conger, Jerry Reed Sr and Dr Robert Sprague all of the Michigan Society. The official photographer of the event was Michael Ouellette from the Maryland Society.

In the solace of the moments of guard duty, one could reflect on the great accomplishments of the Commander-in-Chief.

What a high honor it was to guard his tomb, for no one else was in admittance on the estate in the evening. Special permission was obtained from the Ladies of Mount Vernon for this

vigil.

We were all sure our collective patriot ancestors were smiling.

As the peaceful evening moved towards a moon lit midnight, guardsmen paid individual respects to the General and silently removed the colors and blew out the candles that flickered light on his tomb.

Climbing the hill from the tomb, volunteer guardsmen made their way from the dark hues around the tomb to the light of the moon and house, ever respectful of the accomplishments of this great man and proud to have had the opportunity to honor him on Constitution Day.

In saying farewell to the new nation he helped create, Washington stated that "...the name of American, which belongs to you, in your national capacity, must always exalt the just pride of Patriotism..."

To the great statesman and leader of his country... no tribute this day could be more fitting.

The NSSAR Color Guard was first formed in 1989 by President General James Westlake (GA) as the Color Guard Committee. Initial co-chairmen were David J Gray (MA) and Donald N Moran (CA).

The first color guard consisted of six compatriots from five states.

The initial purposes of the Color Guard were:

- To provide guidance to and coordination of the activities of the various state color guards at national Congress and Trustee meetings, and
- (2) To provide assistance in establishing color guards on the state and chapter level.

Charlestown, MA - On 17 June 2011 the Massachusetts Society Colonel Henry Knox Regimental Color Guard attended the Bunker Hill Celebration in Charlestown. This annual event, always held on 17 June, began with an ecumenical service at St Frances de Sales Catholic Church, which itself sits at the top of Bunker Hill.

The service began with the Armed Services bearing colors to the front of the church and Color Guard concurrently marching in the left aisle of the church and other patriotic organizations marching in the right aisle.

Afterwards, all organizations mustered for a 2/3rds mile parade to Breeds Hill, the site of the monument and public celebration.

Local schools presented patriotic songs, and a series of speakers and an author presented speeches. These were necessarily brief due to light showers that began to fall as the ceremonies began.

Another consequence of the showers was the cancellation of a three volley musket salute by the Connecticut Line and other re-enactors from nearby states.

### 198th Anniversary of the Battle of Medina

The Texas Society recently celebrated the 12th annual memorial ceremony honoring the men who fought and died in the Battle of Medina, the bloodiest battle in Texas history on 18 August 1813. There were at least five Patriots of the American Revolution involved in the Guiterrez-Magee Expedition which ended at the battle.

The annual ceremony was started to honor Peter Sides, the only Revolutionary War Patriot who has been proven to have died at the battle. Peter Sides was the Patriot Ancestor of my son-in-law Brian A Childs.

The site has been dedicated by the SAR, DAR, CAR, DRT, Society of 1812, Mayflower Society and the State of Texas.

This year's ceremony featured a musket salute followed by Taps to conclude the ceremony.

## Lee's Legion - A Decade of Service in California

Colorful and historic color guards are one of the most effective ways to attract public attention to the SAR and its goals. President General Larry Magerkurth recognized this potential while he was president of the chapter. A quick survey of potential chapter members who wanted to form the unit revealed a majority having ancestors in Virginia.

After much research into a variety of uniforms, the decision was made to select the uniform of the infantry unit that accompanied "Light Horse" Harry Lee's famous light dragoons. Their regimental coats were blue with red facings and the hat was a military tri-corn. A local seamstress experience in historical uniforms sewed the uniforms for the new unit.

The first members of the Orange County Chapter's Lee's Legion Color Guard were Compatriots James Blauer, Louis V Carlson, Walter Davis, Karl Jacobs, Larry Magerkurth and Jim Shadwick. The first uniformed activity was the 2001 Huntington Beach Independence Day Parade, the largest parade on July 4th west of the Mississippi River.

Through the years since its formation, the Lee's Legion Color Guard has faced the problems of all Color Guards: scheduling events, recruiting new members, health issues, and rising uniform costs. However, the group has endured.

Today, the unit still includes two original members: James Blauer, the current commander, and Karl Jacobs. Other members are Compatriots Larry Wood, Kent Gregory, Jim Fosdyck and Dan McKelvie.

Compatriot Fosdyck, a retired LA County Sheriff's Deputy, has brought helpful experience to the group from his service in the US Army Honor Guard at Arlington National Cemetery in the 1960s.

During 2011, Lee's Legion Color Guard has a schedule that includes fifteen appearances through the Southern California area.

## National SAR Color Guard at Arlington Cemetery

Arlington, VA—Members of the NSSAR Color Guard assembled at 5:45 pm at the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington Memorial Cemetery in Washington, DC.

Before the group lined up to present the NSSAR wreath, Robert D Maxwell, a WWII veteran from Oregon, presented a wreath in honor of those who served during WWII. Mr Maxwell is a recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Following this presentation, color guard members from Georgia, Virginia and Maryland assembled under the command of NSSAR Color Guard Commander Joe Dooley and National Vice Commander Mike Tomme.

President General J David Sympson, Commander Dooley, Virginia Society President Mark Brennan, Lt Col Greg Bodge (a member of the Piedmont (GA) Chapter), and members of the George Washington (VA) Chapter walked down to the Tomb Plaza. Technician Fifth Grade, US Army, 7th Infantry, 3d Infantry Division Near Besancon, France, 7 September 1944

Technician Maxwell and 3 other soldiers armed only with .45 caliber automatic pistols, defended the battalion observation post against an overwhelming onslaught by enemy infantrymen in approximately platoon strength, supported by 20mm flak and machinegun fire who had infiltrated through the battalion's forward companies and were attacking the observation post with machinegun, machine pistol and grenade fire at ranges as close as 10 yards. Despite a hail of fire from automatic weapons and grenade launchers, Technician Maxwell aggressively fought off advancing enemy elements and by his calmness, tenacity and fortitude, inspired his fellows to continue the unequal struggle. When an enemy hand grenade was thrown in the midst of his squad, he unhesitatingly hurled himself squarely upon it using his blanket and unprotected body to absorb the full force of the explosion. This act of heroism permanently maimed Technician Maxwell but saved the lives of his comrades and facilitated the maintenance of vital military communications during the temporary withdrawal of the battalion's forward headquarters.
