

- A. First Attack made by General Knyphausen by Detachments from the Hussars of His Corp de Brigade, the Regiments of Waller, and two Battalions of the 1st Battalion of the 2^d Regiment under Lord Percy.
- B. Second Attack by the 1st & 2^d Battalions of Light Infantry and one Battalion of the 1st & 2^d Reg't of Foot to be supported by the 1st & 2^d Battalions and 3^d Regiment under Lord Percy.
- C. Third Attack intended as a feint by the 1st Reg't commanded by Lt Col Lister, and supported by two Battalions of the 2^d Reg't.
- D. Fourth Attack by one Battalion of British and one of Hessians under Earl Percy.
- aaa Barracks built by the Americans for their Water Guards and used as a battery upon the Movement of the King's Army to New York.





5. THE "OLD JERSEY" PRISON SHIP, 1780





Interior of the old Jersey Prison Ship, in the Revolutionary War.



